JAPANESE BALL CLUB TO TOUR U.S.

CHICAGO, Aug. 18.—Japan is planning one of the most ambitious baseball invasions of the United States, next spring and summer, that has ever been recorded in the annals of international athletics. At the same time a group of wealthy Japanese business men are hoping to persuade two topnotch American league teams to visit Japan for an extended series of exhibition games.

This news of baseball in Japan is brought back from the Orient by Professor Fred Merrifield, who piloted the University of Chicago nine on its recent tour of Japanese universities.

"Waseda University is getting ready for a trip clear across the United States," said Professor Merrifield. "Heretofore Waseda and Keio have played only on the west coast and in the middle west but this time the Waseda men hope to arrange games with many of the leading teams in our eastern states."

"Professor Iso Abe, the 'father of baseball in Japan' and dean of the colleges at Waseda, assisted by Professor Hennigshoff of the same institution will be in charge of the trip."

"The Japanese squad expects to spend nearly five months, getting ready to tackle the American college teams and with one of the most clever and hard working sets of players in their history, they promise to win their full share of games. They plan to start from Tokyo in mid winter, spend two weeks or more in the wonderful spring climate of Honolulu playing against the versatile Japanese, American and Chinese teams of the island, then tour the west coast from Seattle to Los Angeles in the height of the western baseball season, while the mid-west and eastern campuses are still covered with snow and mud."

with Chapman's arms about their shoulders, started to walk off the field. He appeared to walk at first almost unaided, but a few moments later his legs became limp and he had to be carried bodily to the ambulance.

Mays, in discussing the accident, said that the ball he threw was a "sailor"—one that breaks sharply on one side, due usually to a rough spot on the cover. He asked for another ball before pitching to Speaker, who followed Chapman at the plate, and the ball which fatally injured the shortstop was thrown out of the game.

In baseball circles it was believed that Chapman's death would seriously hamper Cleveland's chance of capturing the American League pennant. He was a veteran and one of the mainstays of the team.

Mrs. Chapman arrived in New York this morning. She was met by officials of the American League including Tris Speaker, manager of the Cleveland team, who sought to comfort her. Speaker declared that later in the day he would issue a statement dealing with the accident. But begged questioners not to interview him now.

BOSTON, Aug. 13.—Explanation of Carl Mays, pitcher of the New York Americans, that a rough spot on the ball caused him to hit Raymond Chapman, Cleveland short stop, who died as a result of the ball pitched by Mays striking him on the head, is the subject of a statement from Umpire Evans and Dineen of the American League today.

The umpires say that no pitcher in the American League resorted to trickery more than Carl Mays, who frequently attempted rough ball in order to get a break when he pitched, making it more difficult for the batters to get hit. The alleged statement of Mays is characterized by Umpire Connelly behind the plate, as being responsible for the accident because he permitted the rough ball to stay in the game. Connelly said the "alibi" is coming with poor grace from the pitcher.

Several players on the Boston and Detroit clubs still assert that they will not go to the bat against Mays again, and will refuse to bat when he is in the pitcher's box.

CHICAGO, Aug. 18.—The American League umpires were instructed some time ago not to throw out rough balls, unless it was absolutely necessary for safety. It was said in league headquarters here today. Club owners had complained that a dozen balls were thrown out daily on the grounds that they were rough, and orders were given not to throw out the balls unless necessary to protect players from injury.

President Ban Johnson of the Americans had nothing to say regarding the statement of Umpires Evans and Dineen to the effect that Mays resorted to trickery in roughing the ball that killed Chapman.

President Johnson will attend Chapman's funeral at Cleveland and receive a report from Tris Speaker, manager of the Cleveland club, regarding the tragedy. Games for the day were called off.

The accident occurred at the outset of the fifth inning. Chapman was the first batter up and was hit by the first ball pitched. So terrific was the blow that the report of the impact caused spectators to think the ball had struck his bat. Mays, who pitched the ball, acting under this impression, fielded the ball that rebounded half way to the pitcher's box and threw it to first base in order to retire Chapman.

Then it was noticed that Chapman had collapsed at the home plate. He was lifted to his feet by other players, then he stood dazed for a moment, staggered, and crumpled up at their feet. Physicians were immediately called from the grandstand, and they administered first aid, still not knowing that he had suffered a fractured skull. Two players,

SUCCESSFUL POLE DRIVE ON AGAINST RUSS REDS

PARIS, Aug. 18.—The Polish counter offensive, with Thorn as the base, has successfully cleared the Danzig region of the Russian troops, according to a report from the French mission in Poland. The Polish forces are still driving eastward, pushing the Rus-

sians back at a rapid clip.

MOSCOW, Aug. 18.—The Russian soviet peace terms were read to the Polish delegation for the first time in the meeting at Minsk yesterday. The Polish answer is due today.

AMERICAN POLES PLEAD FOR AID

FALLS RIVER, Mass., Aug. 18.—Senator Lodge today replied to a telegram from a committee of Falls River citizens of Polish extraction urging that he as chairman of the senate committee of foreign relations co-operate in a move to extend aid to Poland.

Senator Lodge expressed his sympathy for the Poles in his message to the local Polish citizens, but said that the American relations and dealings with the situation was in the hands of President Wilson.

U. S. COMMANDER REVIEWS GUARDS

AUSTIN, Aug. 18.—Major General Dickman, commander of the Southern Department of the United States army, came up from San Antonio today to review the National Guard encampment here. The guard will break camp Friday, after a very successful encampment.

MCCULLOCH COUNTY ERADICATES TICKS

McClulloch County will be free of ticks by December 1, according to announcement that has been made by O. F. Bates, government inspector, through the Brady Standard.

The speed with which ranchmen in McClulloch county cleaned up their pastures almost sets a record for the state, it is claimed. Tick eradication work was inaugurated only two years ago, 12 months before the county was placed in Zone 1 and dipping became compulsory. The commissioners' court provided funds for the building of vats and also purchased supplies at wholesale prices to assist the stockmen.

Early this year 900 pastures had been cleaned up and only eight now remain under the ban. They will be released September 1.

NASHVILLE, Aug. 13.—By a final vote of fifty to forty, Tennessee legislature today ratified the Federal Woman Suffrage amendment.

The first vote in the House was taken on roll call and resulted in forty-nine to forty-seven. Chairman Walker, in attempting to have action on the resolution reconsidered, which caused a change in the vote, the final balloting giving ratification a larger majority. The vote being fifty to forty on aye vote. Chairman Walker is privileged to call up the resolution for reconsideration at any time within the next two days, and is expected to do so, but the suffrage leaders declare that the vote as polled is decisive and will stand.

The resolution was adopted in the senate last Friday by a large majority. The legislature adjourned after taking the suffrage vote until ten o'clock tomorrow.

Tennessee is the thirty-sixth state to ratify the federal suffrage amendment, the required number to give women the right to vote in all elections in the United States. The change will become effective in time for seven million women in the United States to vote in the Presidential election in November, unless the lower House in Tennessee rescinds their action, which is not probable.

OUR ISLANDS NOT FOR FREEDOM

HONOLULU, Aug. 18.—Independence for the Philippines before the expiration of the next twenty-five years is opposed and referred to as a "crime of the first magnitude," by Representative Randall, of California, a member of the congressional party which has been touring the Orient. The party arrived here today on their way to the United States and Mr. Randall gave out a statement showing the attitude of the party towards the proposition of the Philippines and the desire of the Philippine people in the matter.

Mr. Randall said that it was the unanimous opinion of the party that the Philippine Island is not yet ready for independence. He said that the thoughtful men are in a state of semi-terror over the prospects of the Japanese domination of Siberia, China, and Korea and the Philippines, if the United States releases the island and with draws protection.

Mr. Randall said that the party would also urge that prohibition be extended to the Philippines.

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8 TEXANS TO MISSION FIELDS

VANCOUVER, B. C. Aug. 18.—Eight Texans entered into the formation of the special shipload of Southern Baptist foreign missionaries sailing at noon today on the Canadian Pacific Liner, The Empress of Japan, for service in the mission fields of China and Japan.

Five of the Texans, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph T. Fielder of Abilene, Miss Zemma Hare of Orange, Miss Laura Helen Coupland and Miss Blanche Groves of Bridgeport, will do educational work at Chengchow, Kaifeng, Canton and Soochow, China respectively. Miss Eva Sullivan of Garner will do medical work at Yangchow, and Miss May Morton of Dallas will do medical work at Wuchow, China, while Miss Ceile Lancaster of Brownwood will do educational work in the Girls' school at Kaumoto, Japan.

The Texans, along with the other missionaries residing west of the Mississippi river, assembled at Fort Worth Sunday, August 15th, and after a farewell service there, left on special Pullmans for Vancouver where they arrived Saturday for a few days' rest before beginning the long journey across the Pacific.

Representatives from eleven Southern and Southwestern states are numbered in the big party that sailed today, including evangelists, teachers, doctors, nurses, women's workers, farm specialists and others.

A number of other new missionaries are under appointment of the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board for fields in Africa, Argentina, Brazil and Chile, but these will not sail until September. Texas will be represented in this group by thirteen young men and women, bringing the total number of new missionaries to go out from this state within thirty days up to twenty-one. The other Texans and their appointments follow: Mr. and Mrs. R. A. Clifton, New Boston, Miss Bertha Lee Hunt, Hillsboro, Miss Alice Bagby, Miss Essie Fuller and Rev. and Mrs. E. G. Wilcox, Fort Worth, and Rev. and Mrs. J. J. Coward, Milford, assigned to evangelistic and educational work in Brazil; Rev. and Mrs. B. W. Orieck, Madisonville and Miss Mildred Mihlis Austin, evangelistic and educational work in Argentina, and Miss Agnes Graham, Yoakum, educational work in Chile.

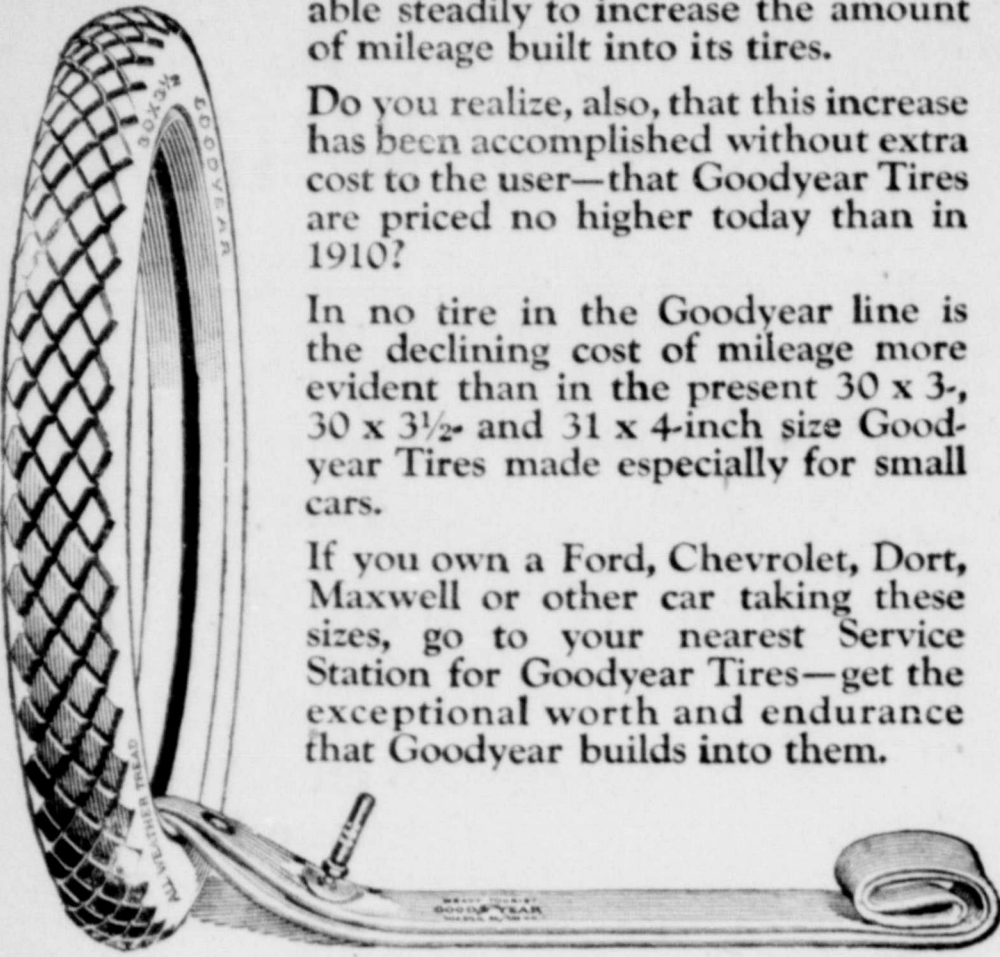
