Rain Not Near Sufficient, But Is Great Help

The year's rainfall in the Post area was increased to 1.06 inches by Sunday's rain, which measured .36 of an inch, but other sections of the County received heavier precipitation, according to reports.

In the Justiceburg area, in southern Garza County, reports had Sunday's slow soaking rain registering from three-quarters of an inch to an inch and a half.

In the west, southwest and northwest sections of the County, the rain was reported to have been considerably heavier than at Post, where the .36 of an inch was measured on the Double U Company gauge.

The Close City area was reported to have received from .50 to .60 of an inch, and about half an inch fell in the Barnum Springs area.

Precipitation in the area of Graham, on the caprock in western Garza County, was reported to have been more than half an inch.

Most observers agreed that the .36 of an inch measured in Post was the County's smallest reading following Sunday's rain, which began early Sunday afternoon and continued into the night.

County Agent Lewis Herron said that while the rain "wasn't nearly enough," it proved beneficial to the county's small wheat acreage and will enable farmers who have chiseled their land to continue with listing.

Grazing land also has been helped by Sunday's rain, with grass pushing through greener and other vegetation looking fresher from the year's heaviest rainfall thus far.

Four Candidates In Commissioner Race

Four candidates are in the race for city commissioner, and Mayor T. L. Jones is opposed for re-election in the city election Tuesday, April 7. It was announced at the City Hall following Saturday's filing deadline.

R. B. Dodson, Post jeweler, who filed Saturday for the office of mayor, announced Tuesday that he had withdrawn as a candidate.

Raymond Young, owner of the Highway Grocery, filed as a candidate for commissioner to bring to four the number of candidates for the two places to be filled. Others are E. S. (Buddy) Stewart

and R. J. (Roy) Baker, incumbents, and H. G. Flowers, an employee of Dowe H. Mayfield Co., Inc.

The election is to be held at the City Hall, with J. T. Curb as judge, and Mrs. Irene Rogers and Mrs. Virgil Priddy as clerks.

\$1,000 Mark Near In Fund Campaign

Garza County's 1953 Red Cross fund drive was nearing the \$1,000 mark through Wednesday, with most city areas and rural communities yet to report. Powell Shytles, drive chairman, reports.

Through Tuesday, reports from one city area and the greater gifts committee showed a total of approximately \$700, Shytles said.

Although the county chapter had hoped to raise its \$2,251 quota by March 15, it appears that it may be necessary to extend the campaign, at least a few days, according to the chairman.

He explained, however, that with all but one or two chairmen yet to turn in reports, there is a possibility that the total already contributed may be sufficient to assure reaching the goal by March 15.

Post Youngster Is Accidentally Shot

Guy (Sonny) Davis, 13-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Guy Davis, suffered a gunshot wound in his left leg Tuesday afternoon from a .22 rifle which was accidentally discharged when he fell while climbing a railroad embankment.

The accident occurred at South Lake when young Davis, carrying the rifle, stumbled over barbed wire as he ascended the embankment. The bullet entered the inside of his leg, about six inches above the knee.

An X-ray examination showed that the bullet penetrated a bone before going out the other side of his leg.

Raymond Ramon and his two brothers, who were nearby, summoned Norman Johnson, who carried young Davis to an automobile and took him to the hospital.

The youth was reported Wednesday to be recovering at his home here.

Board Acts On Teachers And Calls Election

The board of trustees of the Post Independent School District re-elected teachers and issued an order for the April 4 trustee election at Monday night's meeting.

Club Boys To Show Animals In Spring Stock Show Saturday

Thirty-six calves and eight barrows will be exhibited by 19 4-H Club and 14 Future Farmers of America Chapter members here Saturday afternoon at the annual Garza County Spring Stock Show.

The show is to be held at the city warehouse, with judging and grading of animals by Nathan Allen of the Texas Technological College animal husbandry department scheduled to begin at 1 p. m. Weighing of the animals will get under way at 10 a. m. at Earl Rogers' Feed Store or the Jones Elevator.

One of the FFA calves—a milk fed animal—and the FFA barrows will be shown the first of next week at the South Plains Junior Fat Stock Show in Lubbock. E. F. Schmidt, Post High School vocational agriculture teacher, said the FFA animals would be taken to Lubbock and prepared for the show there as soon as the exposition here is over.

The 4-H Club calves seen here Saturday will be shown next October at the State Fair of Texas in Dallas, according to Lewis Herron, Garza County agricultural agent.

All calves shown here Saturday which were placed on feed last fall will be graded by Allen, and the others will be judged with a grand and reserve champion selected, show officials said. Ribbons will be awarded winners.

Schmidt said Tuesday that Bobby Cowdrey, FFA chapter president, and Jerry Epley, "Greenhand" president, will be in charge of the FFA division of Saturday's show.

Women Set Up Rental Library

By turning their library of approximately 100 volumes into a rental library, members of the Garza County Home Demonstration Council may have taken the first step toward a permanent public library for Post and Garza County.

Miss Jessie Pearce, home demonstration agent, announced Monday that the books, which have been the basis of the club's reading project during the past few years, will be rented to readers at 10 cents for two weeks, with proceeds to be used to purchase other volumes and increase the size of the library.

The present modest library is in the county agents' office on the second floor of the courthouse. Readers wishing to check out the books are asked to call there.

Miss Pearce also indicated that the council would welcome donations of books from citizens of Post and Garza County as another method of increasing the size of the library.

Most of the one hundred or so volumes now on hand are works of fiction—some of recent vintage, some not so recent.

The home demonstration council established the library a few years ago for its members and for 4-H Club members of the county.

The books may be checked out from Miss Pearce or from Mrs. Lorene Cash, office secretary.

ONE-MILE RACE WITH DEATH ENDS AGAINST BOX CAR

Luck Rides With Driver In Runaway Truck

Luck rode all the way with E. R. Pierce, 28-year-old Lamesa truck driver, Friday afternoon in a wild, weird race with death in a multi-ton, six-wheel, diesel-powered truck.

The grim race began one mile west of Post when the truck's air brakes failed to function while it was coming off the caprock, swept past two schools which little more than an hour before had discharged hundreds of students, roared through the downtown section just one block south of Main Street, and came to an abrupt halt when the cool-headed driver swerved the runaway vehicle into a loaded box car at the Santa Fe depot.

The impact knocked the south end of the box car ten feet off the tracks and demolished the cab of the truck. The driver, after dropping the remnants of the steering wheel, which had crumbled in his hands, climbed unaided from the smashed cab, his only injuries a cut lip and bruised left arm and leg.

Before climbing into an ambulance which carried him to the Garza County Memorial Hospital, Pierce remarked to a bystander that he had to dodge traffic all the way on the wild, one-mile ride. "My horn wouldn't even work," he said.

With approximately 17,000 pounds of wheat in the 29-foot trailer, the truck was about half loaded, the driver said. He was en route from Lamesa to Silverton to finish loading.

Pierce, who was able to return to the scene of the crash an hour after receiving treatment at the hospital, said he learned the brakes weren't working as he crossed the first culvert west of town on the Tahoka Highway.

"I knew then," he said, "that the only thing to do was stay with it until I could stop it."

He said he started once to head the truck into a roadbank while speeding into town at more than 60 miles an hour, but decided to stop it by swerving into a box car at the depot here. He had stayed with the truck

RIDERS HELP MAKE PARADE

One of the outstanding features of any western event is the parade, and decision of the directors of the Post Stampede and Rodeo Association to invite all area sheriff's posses and riding groups to take part in the procession opening the annual event here May 27 practically assures the success of this phase of the celebration.

Popularity of the sheriff's posse has increased during the past few years to the point that few West Texas counties are without one. Newest in the fold is the Dickens County Sheriff's Posse, organized only a few weeks ago. Another new one—organized less than a year ago—is the Cochran County Sheriff's Posse, which has been invited to represent Texas at the national American Legion Convention in St. Louis this summer.

The Hockley County Sheriff's Posse, organized only two years ago, was a Texas representative last January in President Eisenhower's inaugural parade in Washington, D. C.

Chances are that all three of these newer mounted groups will ride in the procession opening our annual stampede and rodeo here May 27. In addition, there will be a number of the older organizations, each of which has won many parade trophies and otherwise distinguished itself in helping keep alive the spirit of the Old West.

There is no more fitting way in which to get a western event such as a rodeo under way than by staging a rip-roaring, true-to-the-west parade, and the fact that the parade will include good horseflesh and typical riders makes the opening procession seem even more inviting.

LET'S SEE THE STOCK SHOW

Our interest in and attendance at Saturday's annual Spring Stock Show will do almost as much toward encouraging the 4-H Club and Future Farmers of America as whatever measure of success they have in drawing down prizes on the animals they exhibit.

The annual exposition is staged as much for the average citizen as for the exhibitors. They'll feel more like their efforts have brought rewards if a sizable crowd of townspeople turn out to see their animals. Somehow or other, a stock show, no matter how large or small, doesn't seem like much unless there is a crowd milling around the pens to admire the animals. When the number of exhibitors, judges and show officials outnumber the spectators, then a stock show must be considered a failure—at least from an attendance standpoint.

It won't require much of our time Saturday afternoon to go by the City Warehouse and attend the stock show for at least a few minutes. With only a few more than thirty calves and less than seven hogs slated to be shown, it won't be a big exposition, but our interest and attendance can make it seem like a bigger one and even help it grow in the years to come.

Purpose of such events is to encourage the youngsters in the development of better livestock and teach them some of the finer points of the stock-raising industry, which will be to the county's benefit in the years ahead.

Not only the 4-H Club and FFA exhibitors, but also their instructors and advisors will appreciate it if all of us who find it possible to do so turn out for Saturday afternoon's show and take an interest in the proceedings.

What you may have heard about the piece is 100 per cent true—the article is rough, raw and tasteless, and if it was written to touch off rhabar, he'll get plenty of it. The thing for good Texans to do is to laugh and take comfort in the fact that Esquire is the only publication that would go for such trash.

Esquire is one of those magazines where, when you've loused up a story so badly that nobody else would look at it, you aren't ashamed to send it. They will buy it. If you're willing to accept peanuts, so that they can have something to cram between the men's wear and liquor ads and silly cartoon pages. They wouldn't dare run such a filthy story on the page in front of their naked girlie section for fear the darling young things would become embarrassed and scurry into their clothes.

The idea behind the whole thing, of course, is to outrage Texans to the extent to where they will snap up every copy of Esquire available. It is doubtful the publishers really see anything wrong with Texas that a few thousand circulation down here wouldn't cure.

Texans In WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, March 12 (AP)—Falling farm prices, along with a billion dollar hoard of farm commodities held by the government to stabilize the market, have Texas members of Congress worried.

As a whole they're inclined so far to wait a bit longer before hurling charges at the Eisenhower administration.

One of the best informed men in Washington on agricultural problems is Waco's Rep. W. R. (Bob) Poage, who has discussed the problem several times with Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson. A Democrat, Poage thinks farm prices probably will level off and everything will be all right.

"At least, I hope so," he said. "But, we're skating on thin ice."

The Texan explained that the Agriculture Department is authorized now to support the six basic commodities at 90 per cent of parity. (Parity is a formula designed to net the producer a fair return for his output.) The basic commodities are: cotton, corn, wheat, rice, peanuts and tobacco.

Although the authorization for the price support program exists, its success depends entirely on the attitude of the administration and the secretary of agriculture, Poage added. The cabinet member is the man who must issue the various orders and directives to carry it out, and come to Congress for more funds for the Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) to operate its purchase or loan programs if more money is needed.

In that regard, Poage points out that in 17 years that price support programs have

been in effect, the government has netted a profit of about 225 million dollars while assuring farmers billions of dollars of income they might not otherwise have had.

Pointing to the statements and acts of Benson since he took over at the helm of the Agriculture Department, particularly in regard to his attitude on falling livestock prices, Poage added:

"I'm a little worried over the lack of enthusiasm he has shown so far in the price support programs."

"Although a secretary of agriculture could sabotage a farm program, I want to make it clear that I am not suggesting that Mr. Benson will do so. I think he is sincerely trying to figure out the best way to face a difficult situation."

Many people interpreted the Republican presidential campaign statements last fall as commitments to back a 100 per cent of parity price support program.

"Whether that's true or not," Poage continued, "the Republicans are finding out that it is a hard thing to do without running into an expensive subsidy program."

Rep. Clark Thompson of the Galveston district, like Poage a member of the House Agriculture committee, has urged the immediate purchase by the armed services of large quantities of meat and livestock.

This would save taxpayers by getting the military the supplies it needs while the prices are down, and at the same time would help the producers by stabilizing the market, he declared.

Roger W. Babson Writes This Week

We Have Been Living On Borrowed Money During 20 Prosperous Years Since 1933

Babson Park, Fla.—Ex-President Truman, in his final report to congress, likened the 1952 boom to the Hoover boom. He noted that our total output has doubled since 1933; and that agricultural output has increased about 50%. There is little question but what, in many ways, the last twenty years have been kind to us, as well as devastating.

Our Big Debt

The truth is that we have been living on borrowed money. Any family can make a big show for a few years by going heavily into debt. Furthermore, Harry Truman didn't point out that in 1933 the total number of Government employees, excluding the Armed Forces, was a little over half a million. Today there are 2,500,000, not including the Armed Forces, on Government payrolls.

He neglected to mention that he had left President Eisenhower a \$260 billion debt inheritance, this being thirteen times bigger than twenty years ago. Nor did he mention the millions of people he has made dependent upon the United States Treasury for relief of one sort or another: Subsidies, pensions, price supports and all the rest.

Farmers Have Been Fleeing

It was a comfortable yet heinous prosperity, heinous because it reminded one of the stupid farmer who took everything he could out of his land without ever any thought to fertilization, crop rotation, problems of erosion, or preventive spraying. Certainly, no professional farmer would fall to do these things. Very few backyard gardeners plant without some thought to fertilization, watering and pest control.

Yet, business has been expected to turn out bumper crops year after year, with little or no cultivation; while at the same time its best plants became root bound. Vines have withered and dried up because borers and suckers ate away at the vines. This is the Republican's inheritance. It may look good to the novice, but the professional businessman and the professional farmer know business is not as healthy as it appears to be.

Most economists agree that our great new

industry—Defense—is what has kept us going since we caught up with post World War II demand. While many may have viewed Republican victory as the harbinger of happy days, former President Truman was probably more nearly correct when he likened our situation to the Hoover boom. I've said many times that governments can influence the course of economic action, but they cannot repeal Newton's Law of Action and Reaction.

There now is no such thing as perpetual prosperity. Barring war, we may well be at the down turn of the economic cycle. If we had not had the Korean outbreak in 1950, the Truman Administration would not have fared so well. Our Government is still "priming the pump" with national security expenditures to the tune of about \$48 billion annually. A peak figure of \$60 billion may be reached by 1954. After 1954, what's going to happen when Government defense spending is gradually cut back \$20 billion to a maintenance level of about \$40 billion in 1960? The only hope is to treat businessmen and investors in as friendly a manner as labor leaders have been treated.

National Defense Spending

At currently planned rates, national defense spending would purchase about 17% of our total national output by 1954, but soon drop back to only 9%. One of our main problems, then, is for merchants to find customers who can afford to purchase goods and services to take up the slack. I do not believe we can do this until a very substantial cut is made in Government spending and taxes. The bottom 80% of our population, where the mass market lies, holds only about 7% of our gross national savings! This is a very important statement. Think it over.

Eisenhower's problem is going to be a tough one, moving from a kind of straw man economics to an economics of natural law. His "eleven millionaires and a plumber" Cabinet brings to the job outstanding experience and abilities. Certainly they understand, as well as any man can, the problems of business. Time will tell how well they understand politics so as to get real results!

SAN ANGELO (AP)—Soap operas and disc jockeys may be about to drown out the coyote's wail on the lone prairie.

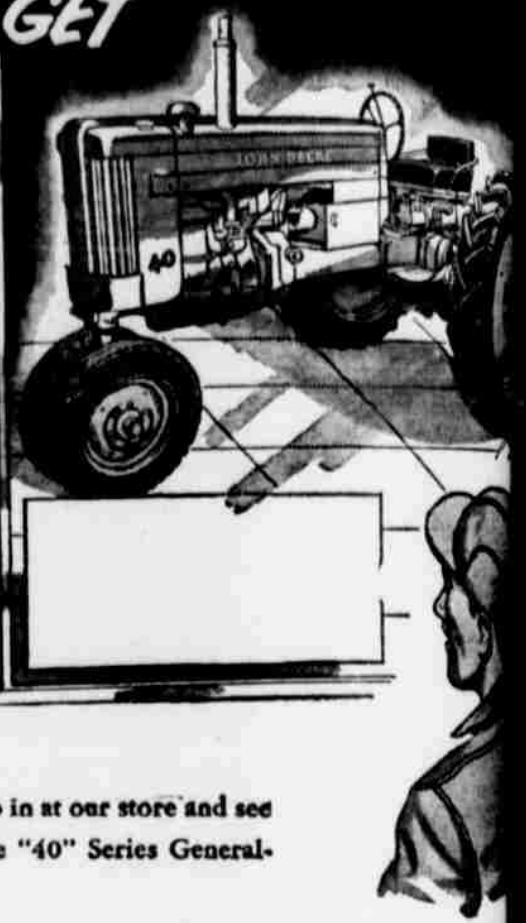

Tex.—It's either trim the floor himself to cards on the table. If any additions are made, the floor will have to pass tax bills."

Constitution prevents the floor from the money it available. Comptroller Calvert estimates how the state will return to the Legislature in excess of anticipated. The Legislature must

then make the appropriation conform to income, or increase taxes to pay the cost, or let the bill die.

Max C. Smith of San Marcos, chairman of the House appropriations committee, said his group is planning a budget that calls for expenditure of about \$162 million from the general revenue fund during the next two years. According to Comptroller Calvert, that is the amount that the general revenue fund will receive by August 31, 1955.

The state spends about a billion and a quarter per biennium, but the greater part of the money comes out of special funds—not the general revenue fund. Appropriations made by the Legislature come out of the general revenue fund.

The difficulty now is there are strong demands for more spend-

ing. Powerful groups are calling for better roads, higher salaries for teachers, and more money for old age assistance.

Recommended by Rep. Joe Pyle of Fort Worth, as his answer to the highway problem, is a toll road bill. It passed the House 122 to 8 and is now ready for Senate consideration. The bill would set up a Dallas-Ft. Worth Turnpike Authority which could issue revenue bonds and use the proceeds to build an expressway between the two cities.

Although the turnpike authority would be composed of three members of the state highway commission and three others appointed by the governor, the property would not belong to the state until after the bonds are paid off. A 35 cent per trip charge, or thereabouts, is anticipated for use of the 31-mile road, the total cost of which is estimated at \$30 million.

Rep. George T. Hinson of Minnola said the proposed management would give the toll road a state flavor without state jurisdiction.

DeWitt C. Greer, state highway engineer, doubted the wisdom of the toll road proposition. He said that taking tolls from motorists, who already pay road user taxes, amounts to double taxation.

Some members of the legislature feel that if bonds were issued, the Highway Department should be the authority to do it. These members reasoned that the Highway Department bonds would pay a low interest. Also the department could provide the roads quicker and better than a private agency. Then too, the roads would belong to the public and no tolls would have to be paid by the motorists for their use. Furthermore, private property holders would get the benefit of increased values along the right of way.

Representative Pyle contends that building the pay-as-you-ride thoroughfare would not diminish the state highway department's program in the area that two free highways already connect the two cities. . . . and that few residents would be displaced because the road would run mostly along the Trinity River . . . and that 90 per cent of the property along the right of way is owned by persons who live in Dallas and Fort Worth.

Public school teachers want annual pay increases of \$600, and they are asking the Legislature to provide the money, which would have to come out of new

taxation. College and university teachers also want higher salaries, which would be appropriated from the state's general fund.

Dr. Logan Wilson, new president of the University of Texas, recommends that the state appropriate for the school's basic operations, and that the University's revenue from oil lands be used for expansion and to hire a better faculty and staff.

"Right now," said Dr. Wilson, "based on average salaries, we are near the bottom among state universities belonging to the Association of American Universities."

Other institutions of higher learning also are having trouble keeping their top professors—and their troubles are complicated in that they have no revenue from oil.

Coke R. Stevenson, Jr., Texas Liquor Control Board administrator, is requesting a higher appropriation so that he can increase the number of his enforcement officers and cut down on liquor violators in the state.

The liquor board pays its own way—plus a healthy profit to the general fund—in terms of alcoholic beverage taxes.

Stevenson assured a senate finance subcommittee that the added number of enforcement officers he requests would pay for themselves and then some by bringing in a greater amount of alcoholic tax revenue.

Due in the Legislature is a bill setting up a program for the treatment and rehabilitation of the state's 50,000 alcoholics. The bill was prepared by the governor's statewide committee on alcoholism and backed by Alcoholics Anonymous.

Governor Shivers made two bills law by signing them—bills to provide two new state hospitals for tuberculars. One bill appropriated \$3,225,000 to build new hospitals at Harlingen and San Antonio. The other bill authorizes the removal of patients to other quarters while the new hospitals are being constructed.

The Senate did a quick turnabout in the matter of admitting female students to Texas A&M College. First the senators approved the proposition presented by Sen. W. T. Moore of Bryan. Then when they began receiving hot messages from the folks back home, they voted the bill down, 27-1. It was the fastest about-face of the session!

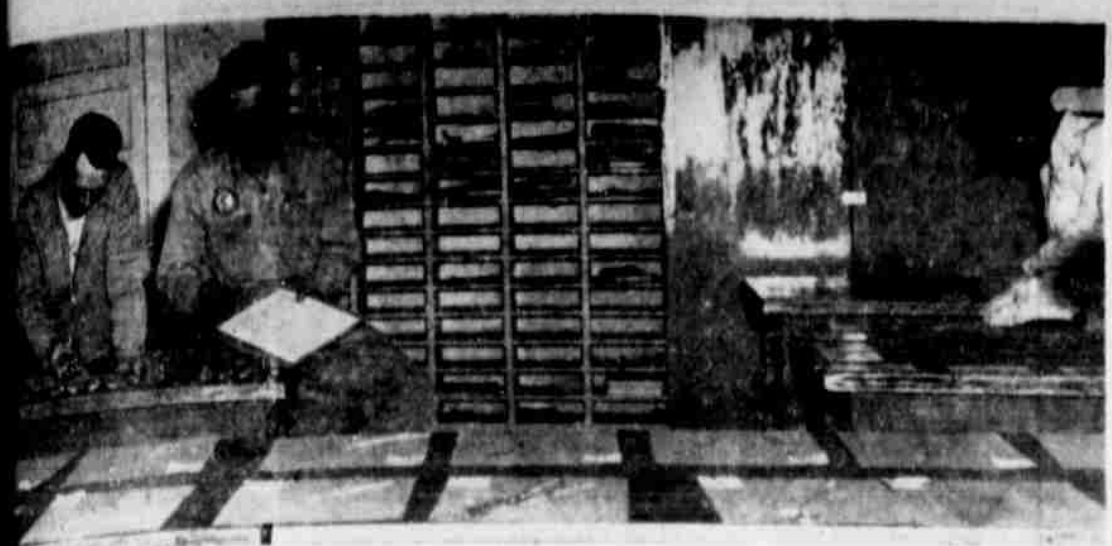

Post Antelopes Near Halfway Mark In Spring Grid Drills

During the midway mark in Post Antelope's spring training sessions, Coach Bing Bingham is beginning to wonder where he is going to get a quarterback for next starting eleven.

Although he has problems at positions and problems of all of them, Bingham is not worried at the moment. He is a field general to a dependable Darrell Stone, graduates this spring.

One of the 35 men who reached March 2 for spring training are being groomed for the back slot and at least one may develop into what the coach is looking for by the time the season opens.

Bingham named Moody Graham, 135-pound sophomore; Tom Murray, 135-pound freshman; and Roy Norman, 145-pound sophomore, as the likely candidates for the back position.

Bingham said, is looking in spring drills, but lacks a Murray, the freshman, is showing promise, but the all-important quality experience. Norman played on a season's defensive team, and a good passer, has played during center the past two years.

Chandler, 155-pound sophomore, is named by Bingham as probably his best-looking

halfback prospect. Sophomore Tommy Malouf, 155-pounder, played regularly last season at a halfback position until forced out by an injury. Bingham said that in spring practice Tommy is beginning to look more and more like his brother, Junior Malouf, former Antelope back and later a mainstay on the Hardin-Simmons University eleven.

Other halfback candidates are Mack Terry, 130-pound sophomore, and Norman Washburn, 155-pound freshman. Both played on last season's defensive team.

Bingham points out Darrell Bruton, 155-pound junior, as his hardest running back. He and Homer Cato, 138-pound freshman, are being groomed for the fullback position.

"All in all," Bingham said, "the backfield situation seems pretty well taken care of, with the exception of the quarterback post."

In fact, Bingham is so concerned over the scarcity of material at this position that he has decided to have the team operate next season from the Michigan State "T" formation instead of the split "T" employed last season. "Our new formation," said Bingham, "won't require the quarterback to also be a ball-carrier, as does the split 'T'."

At the end positions, the Antelopes have one first stringer, Left End Nolan Williams, 155-pound junior, back in harness, but will have to find replacement

at the other end for Buddy Caylor, who has joined the Marines. A likely prospect is Audie Teaff, 138-pound junior, who lettered last season at a guard position.

Both starting tackles, Bobby Cowdrey, 160-pound junior, and Billy Meeks, 180-pound sophomore, are returning.

The guard positions also seem to be taken care of, with Don Moore, 155-pound junior, and Bowen Stephens, 150-pound sophomore, back for another season. Both played regularly in the 1952 gridiron campaign.

The biggest man on the squad, 195-pound Larry Waldrup, a junior, has been shifted from a tackle position to center, and appears to have the position "cinched," according to Bingham.

Other candidates out for spring training under the supervision of Bingham and Assistant Coach Vernon Ray include Royce Josey, J. C. Shedd, Danny Redman, Novis Pennell, Dickie Beggs, Tommy Bird, Ted Tatum, Gene Suggs, Ernie Popham, V. A. Lobban, Jerry Ray Key, Lee Sullenger, James Gibson, Raymond Gary, Ronnie Kennedy, Andy Schmidt, Noel Wyatt, Leon Davies, Bobby Gordon and Jimmy Redman.

Missing from next season's squad besides Stone and Caylor will be L. W. Evans, halfback; Pete Hays, guard; Randall Lawrence, halfback; and Fred Long, tackle. Evans and Stone were co-captains.

 1 cup hot water
 1/2 cup cold water
 1 to 2 tablespoons vinegar or lemon juice
 1/2 cup Hellmann's or Best Foods Real
 Mayonnaise
 1/4 teaspoon salt

 1/2 to 1 tablespoon finely chopped onion

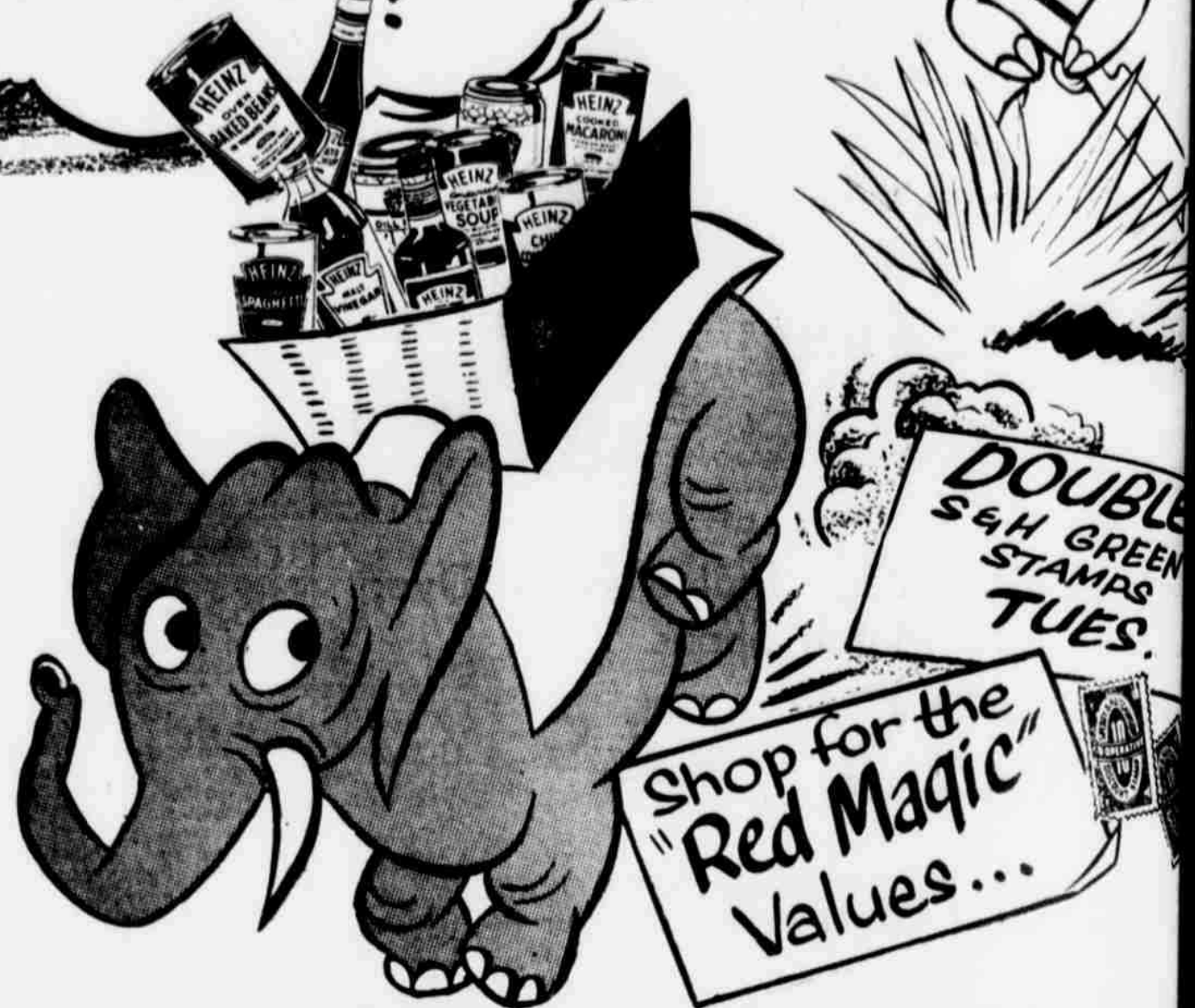
