THE inroads the selective draft is making on the young men of the country is beginning to be felt in Stanton. The young men of this town and county are rapidly being called into the army training service, and their faces are not seen any more on our streets, only at such time when one or more of them, is home on leave from camp. While young men are going to camp the United States is not at war to the extent it is participating in actual fighting in the war zone, yet their leaving has left a rather drab atmosphere in the homes of Stanton and Martin County, and the Man of the Street is missing them.

I sometimes wonder whether the young man going to training camp really appreciates the congratulations extended him from the fellow who is immune to serving in the army because he's too old. I met with an incident the other day that started me wondering along this line. I was congratulating the young man about to leave for army training camp, told him I thought he was doing the manly and patriotic thing to give his service for the defense of his country, and that I believed after coming home from his year's training period he would find it had proved most valuable to him. As a matter of courtesy the young man thanked me, but I noticed the expression on the young man's face that made me suspicious, anyway, that he was accepting my congratulations with a pinch of salt. As if to say, "of course, you can say all these nice things to the boy headed into the army training camp, because you are considerably over the age limit, and therefore exempt. You are not sacrificing a good job, and leaving behind a wife and baby." That's just my individual view.

LAST week the Seminole Sentinel was sold by Sam Malone to Charlie Gregory of Arlington, near Dallas. Over thirty years ago Sam Malone was publisher, editor, devil and "floor-sweep" of the Sentinel, at that time setting 10-point by hand. Then Sam felt the urge to become a minister of the gospel. He sold out to Harry N. Stone, a prominent Seminole business man, and went to Hardin-Simmons University and received his ministerial diploma. For awhile he was instructor of the school of journalism, then the fever to get back into the newspaper business struck him, and he bought back the Sentinel about three years ago. Madam Fortune decreed that Seminole should become a prosperous little city over night, hence she "coughed-up" from the bowels of the earth liquid gold in the form of oil. On the swelling tide of prosperity rode Sam Malone, necessitating him to remove the swaddling clothes from his Sentinel and clothe it with full-grown regalia, such as investing in practically new and modern newspaper plant to care for the on-rushing business. With the rush of business from various and divers sort of rapidly locating business enterprises, and the filthy lucre falling in his lap in scowful, Sam managed to keep up his ministerial duties and religious precepts, but it was a task to keep from chiseling in on some one of the ten commandments. To be sure of his footing, and too, wishing to devote more of his time and influence to his "major life's work"—the ministry—Malone sold out.

I'm informed the new owner Mr. Gregory, is a graduate of North Texas A. & M., at Arlington, held the state championship in tennis, both in double and single for two years, and up to the time he purchased the Sentinel he was foreman and business manager of the Arlington Journal. Mrs. Gregory who will assist her husband in the operation of the Seminole paper, is a graduate of NTAC and Texas

APPROPRIATION OF \$50,000,000 RURAL AID PASSES HOUSE

\$100,000,000 PROVIDED FOR EXPANSION OF ELECTRIFICATION PROGRAM

In view of the widespread interest of West Texans in the agricultural appropriation bill which passed the House last week, Congressman George Mahon has reported from Washington as follows:

The largest item in the bill is \$500,000,000 for AAA soil conservation payments to farmers; \$212,000,000 is provided for so-called parity payments. These sums are about the same as provided in previous years.

Of special interest to our people will be the \$100,000,000 provided for the expansion of the rural electrification program for the coming fiscal year, and an increase to enable the Soil Conservation Service to cooperate more adequately with soil conservation districts in Texas.

The bill provides \$50,000,000 for the continuation of the farm tenant purchase program.

The bill now goes to the Senate for consideration and there seems to be no doubt but that appropriations made by the House will be approved.

Saddler Bros. Retain Cattle Feeder Record at Fat Stock Show

Russell and Billy Joe Sadler did more than retain their record as cattle feeders and showmen at the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show at Ft. Worth, this past week end, by winning two first and three second places, as well as placing with every calf shown.

In the 4-H club heavy class, Russell Sadler, placed his calf in second place. This calf had been champion of the Stanton show. He also placed 20th with another calf in the same class, while his brother, Billy Sadler, held a calf in 27th place in this class. Billy also won 33rd place in the light 4-H class. There were 50 monies in each of these classes with better than 80 entries in each class.

The two boys really did their winning in the "group of three calves," when Russell won the first prize and Billy followed in second place. This group class was competed in by 4-H and FFA feeders from all over the State.

After the boys had picked their top calves for showing in the club classes, their father, Virgil Sadler, selected two calves to show in the open classes, the classes provided for colleges and individual adult showmen. First prize was won in one of these classes with a calf that stood fifth in the Stanton show, and won a second prize in the next class with a calf that placed fourth in the Stanton show. The eight calves shown in Fort Worth won \$168 in prize money.

All the calves shown by the Sadlers at Fort Worth were bred by E. B. Dickinson, veteran Martin County Hereford breeder.

Martin County 4-H club boys still have 20 calves they plan to show in the three remaining West Texas Livestock shows. Calves will be shown in Sweetwater next week end by Elmer Anderson, Tom Estes, and Billy Sadler. Dry lot calves will be shown in Big Spring, March 25, and 26, by L. A. and Leroy Baker, Marshall Yates, and Tom Estes; and the remainder of the calves will be shown in Odessa, March 27-29.

Served two years as chairman of the Martin County Home Demonstration Council, and during that time was never absent from a meeting. Ten years she was active in club work at Knott, part of which time there was no county home demonstration agent in Martin county. Most of that time she met with clubs in the various homes of neighbors in nearest adjoining counties. She was secretary of the Woman's Home Demonstration Council one year in Howard county. A Council delegate five years in Martin county, and president of clubs in Martin and Howard counties four different times. She is now a member of the committee on the Land Use Planning project, and a member of the board of directors of the REA for Martin-Howard.

In January 1935 Mrs. Castle was clothing demonstrator and 1938 food demonstrator. She was responsible for introducing the first frame gardens in Martin county. Last year she was poultry demonstrator. While clothing demonstrator her wardrobe cost \$37.18 for the year. When food demonstrator she filled 238 containers of home canned goods of 21 varieties. LET'S RAISE MORE AND BETTER POULTRY

Dryness and heat are the two

most important factors that destroy value of eggs, said Miss Luckie, when she met with the Brown home demonstration club Thursday, March 6, at the home of Mrs. C. J. Martin, secretary of the club.

During her discussion of the poultry yard equipment, she said how easy to care for eggs to be sold to the market. She demonstrated several ways to candle eggs, method of cooling them, and that eggs should be kept at the same temperature at all times.

The school children are building bird houses and writing bird stories. To make it more interesting for them the club has decided to give a first prize for the best of each, and second prize for second best.

IMPROVING QUALITY OF EGGS FOR MARKET

"Every poultry producer should be interested in improving the quality of eggs because, like milk, they are among the most perishable food products," said Miss Luckie, home demonstration agent at the meeting of the Stanton home demonstration club Tuesday, March 4, at the home of Mrs. A. J. Graham.

"Every egg that grades below first represents an economic loss and low grades are in a large measure, responsible for the wide difference in price paid the producer and the price paid the consumer," Miss Luckie said. The two big factors that effect the quality of eggs, are those of dryness and heat. Miss Luckie recommended the use of fine sandpaper or fine steel wool in removing stains from eggs.

Club members voted to change the date of meeting from the fourth Tuesday to

third Tuesday in each month. Small U. S. flags in gum drops were used for plate favors to carry out the Texas Independence Day motif.

MORE MATTRESSES

The Flower Grove community completed 19 mattresses during the month of February. The Goldsmith and Pleasant Valley communities have secured their mattress center and work will begin in that community on Monday, March 17. The center will be located on the L7 Ranch.

Rural low-income families in Texas had made 205,138 cotton mattresses under the cooperative demonstration program late in February and of this number 32,436 were made in January, according to Mildred Horton, vice director of the A. & M. college extension service. Workers of the three cooperative groups, the Triple A, Surplus Marketing Administration, and Extension Service, estimate that nearly half a million new mattresses will be in use in Texas by the end of 1941.

MARKED ACHIEVEMENTS RECORD IN DISTRICT SIX

College Station, March 13.—Achievements in home demonstration in Extension District six during the past year indicated that rural people thought of national defense in terms of a live-at-home program. Home gardens of 1,000 Fisher County families, for example, were reported to have qualified for benefit payments under the 1940 AAA program. The total of AAA gardens in the district,

which comprises 39 southwest counties, was 2,351.

However, Miss Thompson, district agent in charge of home demonstration, emphasized the functioning of land use planning. Seventeen counties having the services of 19 county home demonstration agents reported that 268 farm or ranch men and women served in county land use planning committees, she says, representing 134 rural communities in the district. These communities include 15,194 farm and ranch families.

Land use planning has grown steadily in the district since it was started in 1938, the district agent says.

Mrs. Elsie Gilkerson, home demonstration agent in Martin County, last year reported that "one of the outstanding activities of 1940 in the county was the functioning of the land use committee. Each community committee elected a man and a woman to the membership of the county land use planning committee. Sub-committees were appointed to work on such problems as soil and water conservation, rural electrification and the cotton mattress program. Nineteen forty-one promises to be a greater year in land use planning."

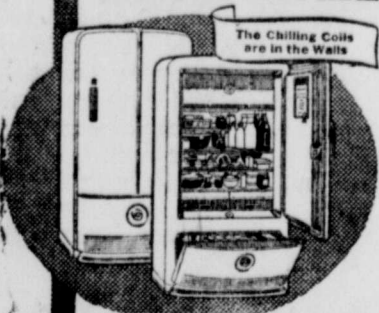

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SMALL TOWNS MUST LOOK TO LOCATING INDUSTRIAL PLANTS FOR THEIR SALVATION

The small towns must awaken to the fact that if they are to survive the encroachment the big towns are making on their trade territory they must remove the hoodwink from their eyes that "something will come along of its own volition" that will keep business rolling along as usual. Small towns do not grow and prosper that take that attitude. Generally, it's the case, they find many vacant store buildings, and that the concerns still in business are "padding for dear life" to keep their canoe riding on the turbulent waters of rapidly diminishing trade.

When the small town discovers that its trade territory is being rapidly narrowed down due to business going to neighboring towns, it must turn all its force and energy to some practical means for providing revenue. Locating of small industrial plants will solve the problem, though it requires local capital to engineer the deal.

No better example of a small town setting up a plan to create a revenue-bearing project for itself and the country surrounding need we cite, than Loraine, a small town in Mitchell county, with its cheese manufacturing plant. On a \$20,000 investment by local capital, the plant enjoyed a quarter of a million dollars' worth of business during its first year of operation. To be exact the income from cheese, cream and butter was \$123,342.74. More than a half million pounds of cheese were made, and the butterfat contained in the milk to make this amount of cheese brought the farmers in the surrounding area \$80,942.02. The area comprises all of Mitchell county, and parts of Nolan, Scurry, and Fisher counties.

One Mitchell county farmer, living ten miles of Loraine, provided the plant with 250 pounds daily. Fourteen milk cows provided this amount of milk. His checks each 15-day pay period have been from \$40 to \$55.

From the time the cheese plant started operation in February a year ago, through February 15, this year, the farmer had shipped a total of 3144 pounds of butterfat from which he realized approximately \$1006.08.

The labor bill at the plant for the first year totalled \$25,290. In connection with the manufacture of cheese a frozen food locker is operated and lockers rented at the plant the first year totalled 105 and an estimated 36,000 pounds of food was handled through them.

To commemorate its first birthday the Loraine cheese plant observed the occasion yesterday, Thursday, with a program and barbecue. Prominent speakers in their chosen field from over the state made addresses.

J. W. King, owner and editor of the Mitchell County News, and W. M. York, a prominent local business man organized the Loraine Cooperative Association. But it required about two years of hard work on the part of these gentlemen before the plant was opened for business.

The information contained in most of this story was obtained from the 12-page Progress Edition of the Mitchell County News, published last week to commemorate the first year's operation of the cheese manufacturing plant.
