Credit Buying of Gas To Be Halted Feb. 1

Petroleum Administration prohibited all credit buying of gasoline and other petroleum products for private motor cars, effective Feb. 1. The order provides that retail gasoline marketers or suppliers may not "grant, accept or participate in the granting or accepting, directly or indirectly of credit in connection with the sale of any petroleum product," but makes exceptions for sale to federal, state or local governments, for commercial use of motor boats and motor vehicles displaying "TP" ration stickers.

SOLDIER PARCELS

RESTRICTED BY ARMY

Because of the enormous amount of space used to transport packages, the U. S. Army has ruled that beginning January 15 no package may be sent to a soldier overseas unless it contains an article which has been requested by the soldier, and the request has been approved by his commanding officer.

The post office will not accept a package unless the written request bearing the commanding officer's approval is presented. Even such packages will be limited to five pounds, and may not be more than 15 inches in length. Magazines and newspapers may be mailed only by the publisher and only if the soldier is a subscriber.

"Letters from the soldiers' families and personal friends have been welcome," Secretary of War Stimson said, "and will continue to be welcomed by the army."

The new regulations were adopted when a survey disclosed that mail overseas used cargo space equivalent to the total capacity of three 11,000-ton Liberty ships.

In order to save shipping space for ammunition, food and medical supplies, the Navy also restricted Saturday the size of packages which may be mailed to men in naval service abroad.

No packages will be accepted which weigh more than five pounds or measure more than 15 inches in length or 36 inches in length and girth combined. Only one such parcel will be accepted in one week.

The announcement also said that inappropriate second and third class matter such as advertising circulars will not be forwarded to men overseas.

The limitation on package sizes is the same as that announced by the Army for overseas mail, but the Navy did not impose the restriction that articles mailed must be requested and approved by the commanding officer.

To Pave East-West Road In Lamb County

Asphalt, frozen by the government for defense projects only, has been released to allow contractors to finish hard-surfacing this route, it was reported in Littlefield last week. Dick Sturdivant, Cotton Center resident, who is an instructor in aviation at Duggan field, piloted Littlefield officials to Ft. Worth to urge release of the freezing order on asphalt.

This road is a part of the recently designated state highway through Hale, Floyd, Bailey and Lamb counties, into New Mexico.

In Hale county, the route runs from Petersburg by Tucco, and through Eagle Springs community to the Lamb county line on the west. From there it goes through Spade, into Littlefield. Cotton Center residents will be only about 8 miles from the pavement in Lamb county.

Tell everyone hello for me. As I hear, there have been lots of changes made around there since I have been away. — As well as other places. The next time you write, send me Raymond Coy's address, please.

Suppose he is still with J. F. Buske. Sure would like to see them. If there is anything worth printing in this, go ahead as far as I am concerned. Thanks ever so much to all responsible for my receiving the paper. I am always on the look out for

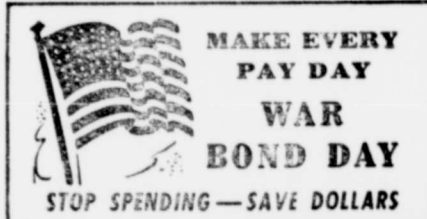
