

Conservation Program Reinstated For Farmers and Ranchers

BAIRD — The 1973 Reinstatement of Conservation Program, that was terminated in December, 1972, has been reinstated. A sign-up period to accept requests for cost-share assistance for the following practices will begin immediately: Planting Permanent Grass, Wells, Terraces, Diversion Terraces, Waterways, Control of Oak, Mesquite or Prickly Pear. Requests will be considered for approval by the County Committee on April 12, 1974. Requests made after that date will be considered by the Committee on April 26 and May 10, provided funds are available.

A sign-up period for winter cover crops will be announced at a later date. The final date to sell, lease,

release of request cotton acreage has been extended until May 1, 1974. The final date for peanuts was not extended and expired April 1st.

The reason for the extension of the final date was due to a change in disaster provisions of the cotton program. There are two kinds of disaster payments - (1) natural disaster such as drought or hail, and (2) abnormally low yields. Under the drought or hail provision, a producer must make application and the crop appraisal before it is plowed up or grazing is started. If a low yield is obtained due to natural causes an application may be filed after harvest and production evidence presented at that time.

Predator Control Meeting Re-Set For April 17 in County Courthouse

BAIRD — The Supreme Court recently lifted the restraining order on the experimental use of the M-44 device to control predators. The original training scheduled for March 6 was canceled due to the restraining order.

The new training meeting for Callahan County has been set for Wednesday night, April 17, at 8 p. m. in the District Courtroom, according to Greg Gerngross, Callahan County Extension Agent.

The program will be directed by the Texas Department of Agriculture. Representing the TDA will be Lionel Felts of Austin. Training will be provided by Dr. Milo Shult, Area Wildlife Specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Only those farmers and ranchers participating in the training meeting will receive certi-

ficates - to be certified to purchase the M-44 and capsules to use in the pilot program. A local supplier will be named in the County who will sell the M-44 and capsules to qualified producers.

Those purchasing the devices will be required to submit a monthly report to the County Extension office on the use and effects of the control system. These reports will be used to evaluate the program.

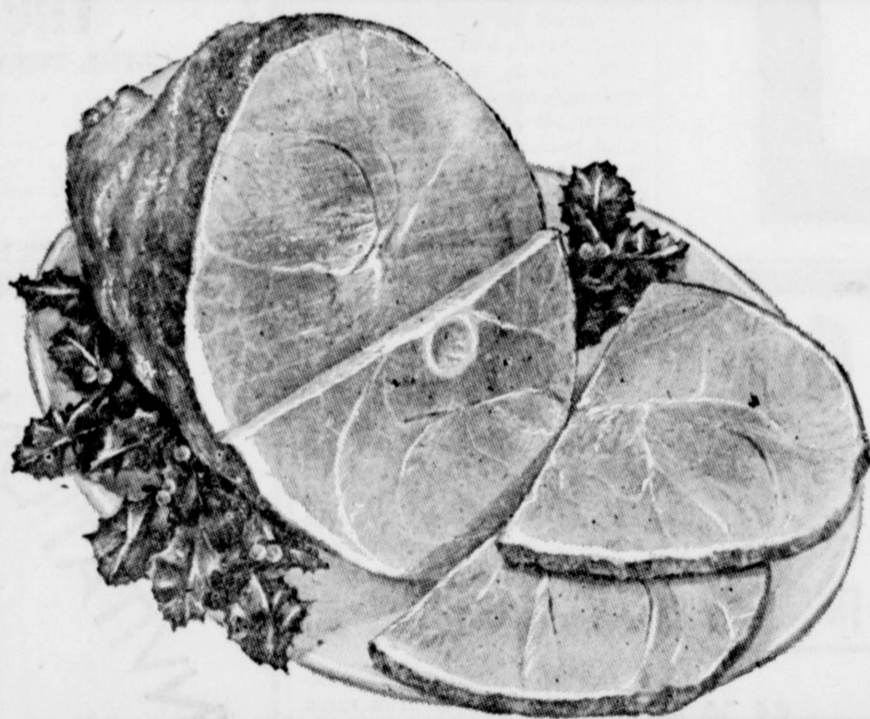

CLYDE — The Freshmen placed 4th in the Junior Division at Brownwood with 68 points. The division was dominated by Comanche who had 198 points.

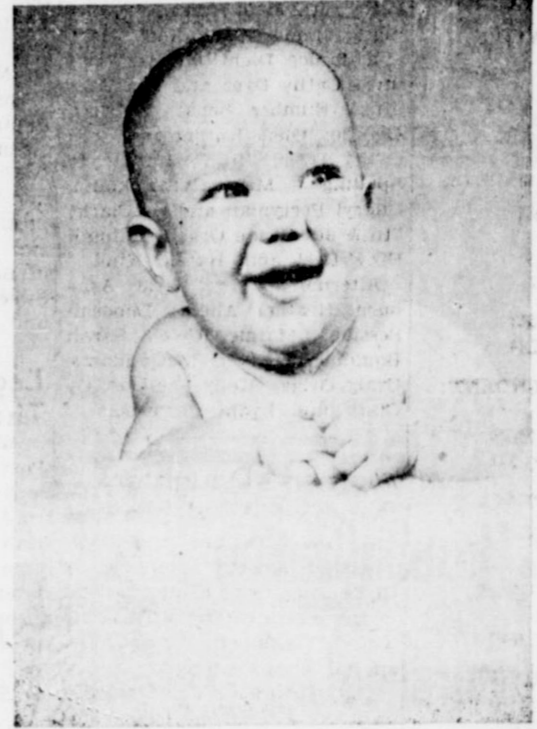

Baird Tracksters Place 3rd in District

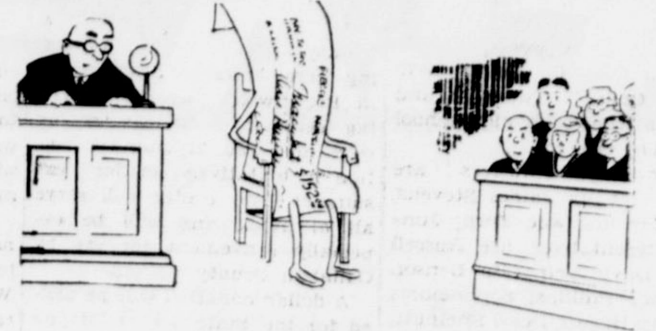
