400,000 ONLY, OCCUPATION FORCE

BERLIN, Aug. 30. (AP)—General Eisenhower said today 2,500,000 Americans in Germany would be reduced to a force of about 400,000 well before the end of winter.

COUNTRY, TOO, RESPONSIBLE, PEARL HARBOR

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30 (AP)—President Truman declared today he thought the whole country, as much as any individual, was responsible for the Pearl Harbor disaster.

He told newsmen he had come to the conclusion the whole thing was a result of the policy of the country itself, which wasn't ready for preparedness.

"INDESCRIBABLY AWFUL" JAP PRISONERS

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 30 (AP)—The condition of prisoners in war camps in Japan is "indescribably awful" the Chief Surgeon of the Third was quoted as saying.

M'ARTHUR IN JAPAN; HDQS. YOKOHOMA

ATSUGI AIRFIELD, TOKYO, JAPAN, Aug. 30 (AP)—Gen Douglas MacArthur arrived in Japan and set up headquarters in Yokohoma today amidst first alien armed forces ever to occupy the sacred islands.

He said the occupation was "going splendidly" and added the Japanese appeared acting in good faith.

Hand-picked paratroopers, seaborned marines, sailors swarmed out of the skies from the sea in unbroken streams.

They took over the Atsugi Airfield and ran up the American flag over the Yokohoma Naval Base; rode Japanese trucks into Yokohoma, and began evacuating prisoners of war from Japan.

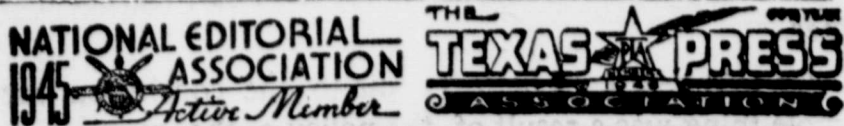

"A large number of men from an engineer battalion were dumped into the river and were buried under the twisted girders. When the bridge hit the river men of a signal outfit on the

east bank of the Rhine tapped out an SOS for medics and in less than three minutes soldiers were scrambling down the wreckage to pull men from the water and to dig out those screaming for help beneath the steel girders, rail tracks and planking."

He attended an Army Technical and a Provisional school. He entered in Sept. '43, at Aberdeen Proving Ground, then was shipped to Ft. Bragg, and has been at Pearl Harbor since. He attended GHS.

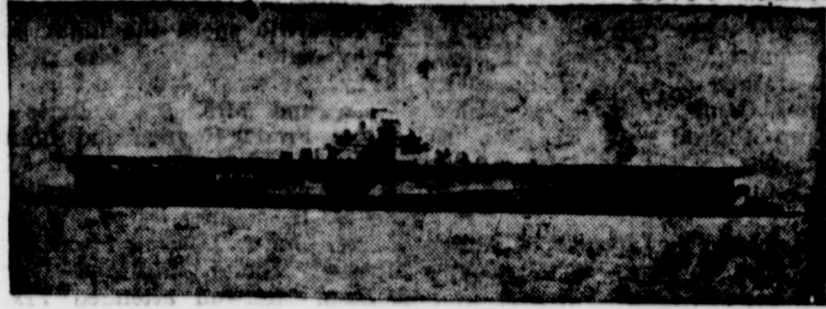

LOCAL BOY ON USS HORNET



Douglas Reed Meyers, 19, S-1/c son of Mr. and Mrs. M. W. Myers, Rt. 2, Jonesboro has returned on leave from a tour of Pacific battle duty aboard the Navy's stored aircraft carrier, USS Hornet, which is pictured above, and is now undergoing typhoon damage-repairs at West Coast Naval Base.

Named after the vessel from which Lt. Gen. Jimmie Doolittle launched the first bombing raid on Tokyo, the HORNETT has had 14 months of rugged action in the forefront of the drive back to the Jap Capital.

No enemy ever succeeded in damaging the ship, but more than 1,400 Jap planes and some 1,270,000 tons of Jap shipping bear testimony to the savagery with which she struck throughout her 150,000 mile cruise.

Launched August, '43, the Hornet struck the first blow in the liberation of the Philippines; the first installment of the full-scale carrier plane raids on Tokyo; took part in the destruction of the Yamato, 45,000 ton pride of the Jap battle fleet; weathered two typhoons and rescued an owl.

Under the affectionate sobriquet "Hornet Hotel," she served as troop transport for thousands of Marines, auxiliary tanker to hundreds of destroyers, and prison ships with accommodations for 130 Japs. During operations off the coast of Okinawa when the 120 knot gale caught her, tossing her 27,000 tons about like a ship in a washing machine. Suddenly her bow rose atop a tremendous wave and crashed downward with such force the forward corners of her flight deck folded along her sides.
