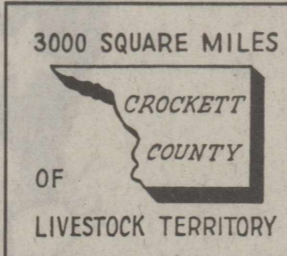

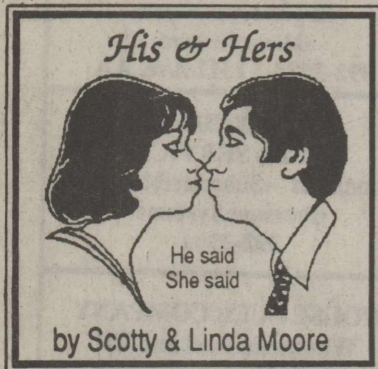

DEAR EDITOR:

Regarding the "His" section of last week's Stockman, I was shocked by one of your comments. High School Students, West Texas Scholars' recipient and delegate to the National Young Leaders' Conference

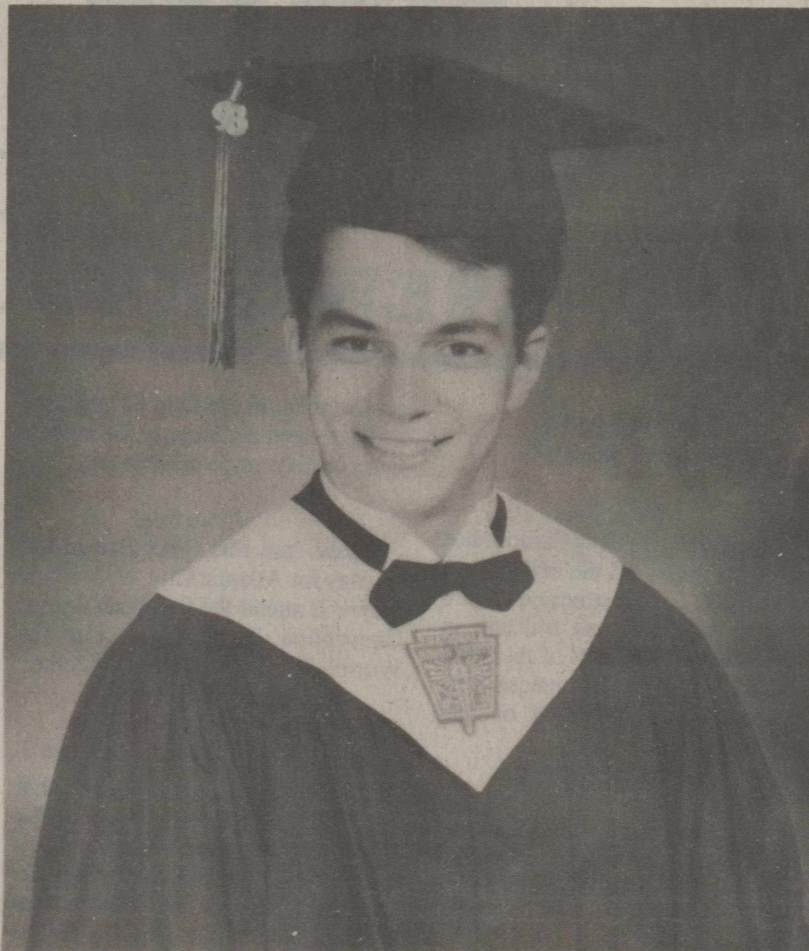
in Washington, DC.

## Legislation Focuses On Ozona Country Club

Ozona and Ozona Country Club received front page headlines in the area daily paper three times in stories of allegations that the club bars Hispanics from membership. A bill which would prevent school teams from practicing at athletic clubs that allow discriminatory membership criteria was passed in the Senate and House, reaching Gov. Ann Richards' office May 12. She has 10 days to sign the bill.

House Bill 800 was sponsored in the Senate by Sen. Eddie Lucio, D-of Brownsville. Rep. Pete Gallego of Alpine introduced the bill in the House. Unanimous approval was given in both the House and Senate.

An Associated Press story reported that Lucio said Ozona High School holds golf practice at Ozona Country Club and that Hispanic students can only practice at the club if their coach is present.

County attorney Orlando DeHoyos had requested that the team practice on the municipal course in Sonora.

The golf team is allowed to practice at Ozona Country Club at no charge. No student whose parents are not members of the country club may practice on the course unless the coach is present.

DeHoyos approached county commissioners about establishing a public golf course in 1990, but was told costs were too high.

In early 1991, DeHoyos was active in forming a non-profit organization, Ozona Golf Association, to

work toward construction of a public golf course. On Jan. 14, 1991, he announced that Ozona Golf Association had received its charter as a non-profit organization.

Ground preparation was underway at that time on the course located nine miles out of Ozona on the Big Lake highway.

House Bill 800 grew from a conversation DeHoyos had with Lucio and Gallego when they were in Ozona last fall on a political campaign.

The bill originally would prohibit discriminatory membership criteria for private clubs in rural areas and prevent high school teams from practicing at country clubs that refuse membership to minorities. The portion addressing membership criteria was put in a separate Bill, H. B. 801.

H.B. 800, which was approved, deals with schools practicing at clubs which refuse membership to minorities.

H.B. 801 stalled in a subcommittee of the House Committee on State Affairs but was re-entered and passed in the Senate Monday as Senate Bill 1463.

S.B. 1463 prohibits discrimination in the use of equipment or facilities at athletic or swim clubs in counties with a population of 5,000 or less. The bill affects clubs with more than 100 members or that receive more than \$75,000 in annual dues.

A member of Ozona Country Club said Monday that the club has nothing in its by-laws which prohibits Hispanic membership.

## Jury Finds Sweeten Not Guilty Of Murder

Members of Martin Sweeten's family stifled sobs as the jury foreman read a "not guilty" verdict May 14, ending the capital murder trial.

Sweeten was on trial for the April 8, 1992, murder of Nueces Canyon rancher Edmund James. Two other men, Tommy Ray Eiland and Andrew James Milam, were separately tried and convicted of the shooting death of James. They received life sentences in change of venue trials in Junction and Del Rio.

At the time of the shooting, Sweeten was 18. Eiland and Milam were 17.

Defense attorney Scott Stehling of Kerrville told the jury in his closing arguments that Sweeten was shocked and sick when James was killed. Sweeten's initial statement to officers was that he went to the ranch near Barksdale to talk to James about get-

ting a job.

Andrew Milam had told officers that Sweeten went crazy when James was shot. "He didn't know what we were going to do. He freaked out," quoted Stehling.

Special prosecutor Roy Barrera, former Texas secretary of state, spoke of "the law of parties" acting together in the commission of a crime. He reiterated how Sweeten's car was used to reach the ranch and how the three teenagers went to the Whataburger in Uvalde after the shooting and robbery in which a watch, \$65, and pistol and two bottles of liquor were taken.

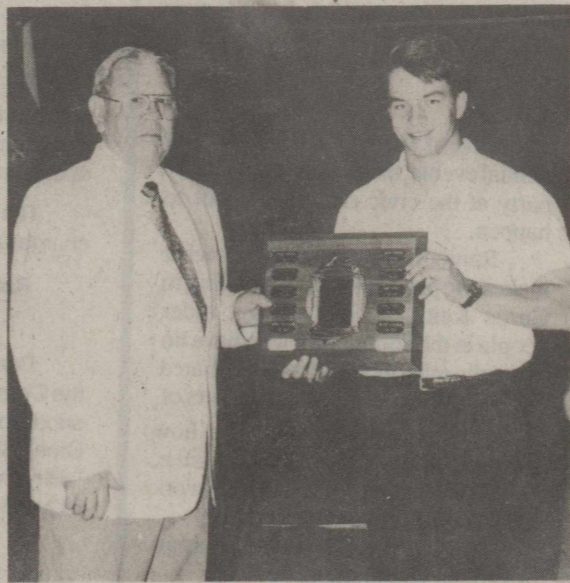
The eight man, four woman jury retired at 3:20 and deliberated three hours and eight minutes before rendering their not guilty verdict.

District attorney Tom Lee of Del Rio was prosecutor assisted by Roy Barrera. Judge George Thurmond of Del Rio presided.

## Public Notice

On April 16, 1993, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (SWBT) filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission) for approval of a new optional service, Network Subscriber Information Interface (NSII). NSII is a new service feature developed primarily for the provision of Voice Messaging Service (VMS). It will give a VMS provider (as SWBT's customer) the ability to receive originating call information from SWBT's central office and to activate and deactivate a Message Waiting Indicator (MWI) on the line of the VMS provider's patron. NSII also gives the VMS provider the ability to activate and deactivate an intermittent dial tone on a patron's line in multiple offices. The VMS provider will be able to perform these functions in multiple offices through a connection to a single Message Node office. The Message Node will be a pre-designated central office and will interconnect with all central offices within the Message Node Service Area. Upon approval of this application, NSII will be available to customers where facilities are available. Available facilities are not currently deployed statewide. The proposed effective date of this service is June 20, 1993.

SWBT estimates these new services will increase its annual revenues during the first year by approximately \$2.4 million. VMS providers and Telephone Answering Services and their subscribers are the types of customers likely to be affected by approval of these services.

"These women have been terrific to work with—patient, dedicated to improving their skills, and have become friends as well as students," said Ulmer and Moran. Another class is planned to begin in late June, to be taught in the evenings, and the instructors urged any interested persons to call the County Extension Office at 392-2721 and sign up. Class size is limited to ten.

For more information about the Adult Sewing Classes or any other Extension program, contact the Crockett County office by phoning or visiting the office, located on the second floor of the Courthouse Annex.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages, regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, national origin or handicap.

## Wool prices up from April

Sales held at local warehouses Friday brought better prices for wool than in April, but it is difficult to feel good about it since this year's prices are the lowest in 21 years, says Donnie Laughlin. Laughlin is general manager of Wool Growers.

Ozona Wool and Mohair's morning sale offered a total of 170,032 pounds. Prices on short wools ranged from 66 3/4 cents to 79 3/4 cents on a grease basis.

Bollman Industries bought the highest-selling lot for 79 3/4 cents in the grease. The 52 bags produced by Sam Perner weighed 5,941 pounds.

Anodyne Inc. purchased the second-highest selling lot from David Slaughter at 79 5/8 cents in the grease. Good 12-month wool brought about 68 cents in the grease. Prices on 61,375 pounds ranged from 55 to 78 1/8 cents a pound.

Tucker White produced the high-selling lot of 8,811 pounds bought by Anodyne for 78 1/8 cents in the grease.

Warehouse manager Terry Criner said he was pleased with the sale compared to an earlier sale although prices are still depressed compared to last year.

"It's going to be a tough year all around," Criner said.

The afternoon sale at Wool Growers saw the high-selling lot of 12-month wool go to Old Sonora Trading Post. The firm paid 82 cents in the grease for 11,683 pounds. Pro-

ducers were Ruben Whitehead, Schneeman Ranch, J. B. Parker and Pon Seahorn.

Wools sold from 41 1/2 cents to 82 cents in the grease, but the majority was in the 60 to 71 cent area.

Short wools ranged from 46 1/2 cents to 75 5/8 cents in the grease with an average of 69 cents.

Anodyne Inc. purchased two of the high-selling lots at 75 5/8 cents. The Mike Hill Ranch at Sanderson sold a 11,800 pound lot and La Mota Ranch a 4,275 pound clip.

The other 75 5/8 cent lot was bought from the Bill Carson Ranch by Bollman Industries. The lot contained 9,000 pounds.

Wool Growers sold 287,000 pounds.

Dry weather made it difficult to get extra length buyers wanted according to Laughlin, but when they found it, they paid for it, he said.

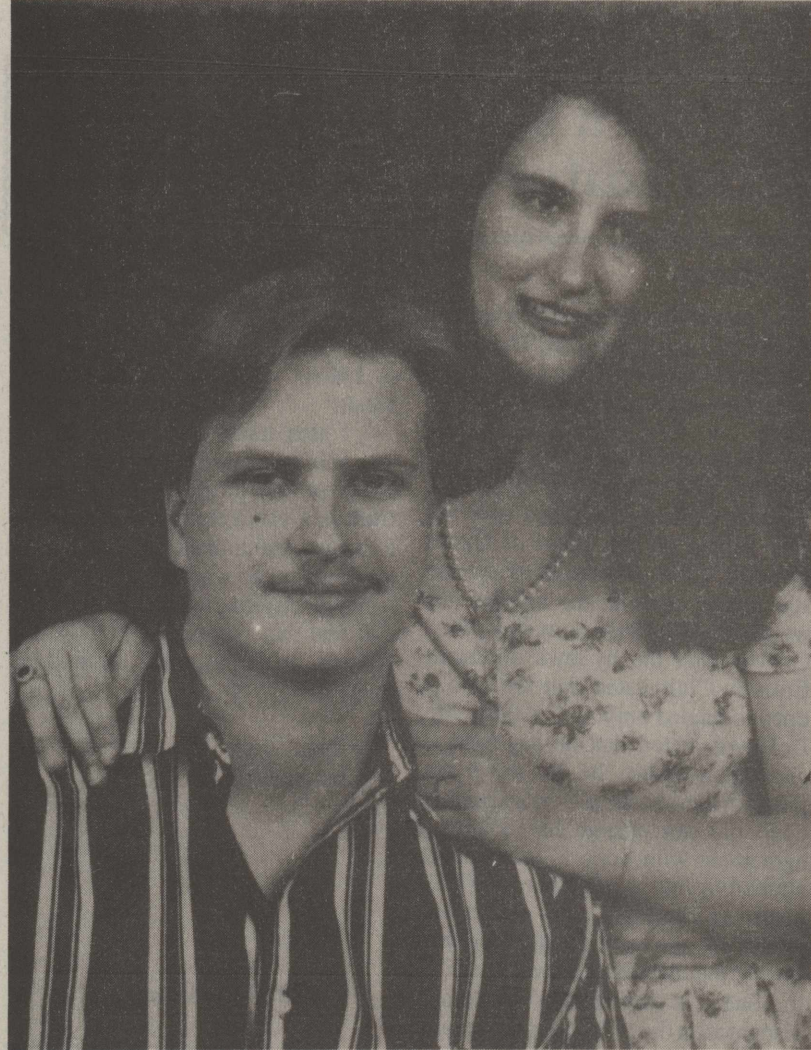

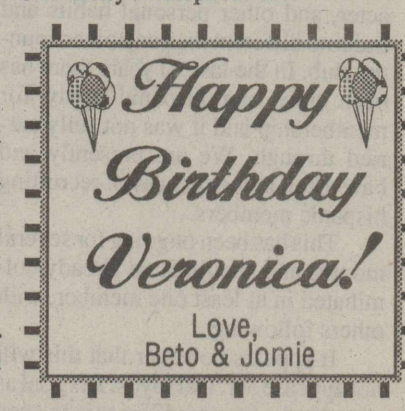

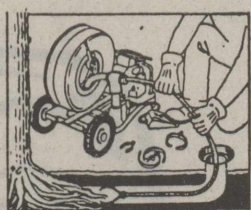
### BOOK SALE

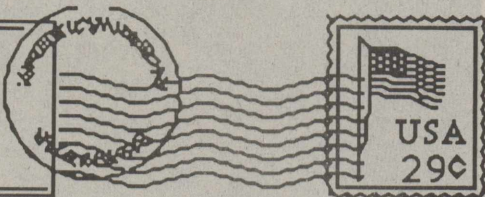

## Letters to the Editor



Dear Scotty,

I would like to respond to articles in the San Angelo Standard Times and statements made by Orlando DeHoyos and others concerning Ozona Country Club.

These views are solely mine as a member and stockholder of Ozona Country Club. I do not and have not ever served on the board of Ozona Country Club. There were several statements made in the articles that were false. The first was made by Rep. Gallego that the by-laws of Ozona Country Club stated that the club is open to anglos only, this is false. Mr. DeHoyos stated that he has tried to gain membership, he has never applied for membership. Ozona Country Club did not change its reciprocal agreement with Sonora. It has never applied to intown members anglo or hispanic. There presently are no hispanics on the golf team. Therefore stating that they must travel 74 miles to Sonora is incorrect. We have had hispanics on our golf teams before and they were allowed to practice any time during the season. The policy applied to all non-members on the team, hispanic and anglo alike.

Hispanic golfers have played in tournaments at Ozona Country Club for over 20 years. They have been welcome and competed well and won several championships here. These include the Arredondos from Kerrville, Sonny Perez, Eddie Sosa, and Bobby Manchaca of San Angelo.

Ozona Country Club does not have a policy screening membership on race. We do screen prospective members on ability to pay dues, character, and other personal habits and traits no different than any other country club. In the last 20 years there has been only one hispanic apply for membership and it was not fully carried through. We are presently and have been in the process of recruiting hispanic members.

This has been ongoing for several months and should have already culminated in at least one member, with others following.

It appears however that this will not appease Mr. DeHoyos. His goal as stated in the Standard Times is to open Ozona Country Club to the public. Mr. DeHoyos states that the club will either close or become a public facility possibly operated by the county. Who will fund this public facility and who will pay the stockholders of Ozona Country Club for their property? Ozona Country Club was built and paid for by the stockholders. It has never used public funds of any kind.

To try and mandate by law that it become a public facility without compensation to its owners reeks of socialism. This is just another example of our government trying to control people's lives and their property by legislating unfair laws. Mr. DeHoyos states that he is considered a troublemaker. I contend that maybe he has called attention to this affair in order to take it away from his troubles with the county and commissioners' court. Mr. DeHoyos is in a position to help the hispanic community more than anyone in this town, yet he uses his position not to strengthen our community but tear it apart for his own gain (playing golf). I fully agree that we should have had hispanic members before now, but sometimes these things take time, and we are now on the right track.

## Pesticide Applicator License Training Scheduled May 27

There will be a pesticide applicator license training program on Thursday, May 27, in the indoor arena of the Sul University Range Animal Science Department. Registration will begin at 8:00 a.m. and training will start at 8:30 a.m.

Those interested in obtaining a private, commercial or non-commercial license should attend. There will be con-current sessions on these trainings. The Texas Department of Agriculture will be there to administer tests after the training sessions (probably after lunch).

It is now required that you have a license to purchase many pesticides and some of the more commonly used pesticides in our area have been added to the rest.

Additionally, people who already hold a private applicators license may attend and pick up two hours of Continuing Educational Units (C.E.U.) toward their license renewal.

The training will be conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, handicap or national origin.

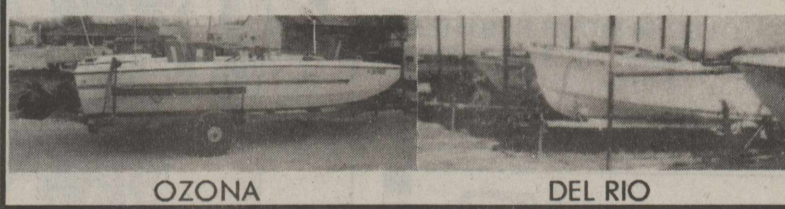
