Joins West Texas Chamber Commerce

ABILENE, Tex., Aug. 28—Paul Marable, Jr., former manager of the Denison Chamber of Commerce, has joined the staff of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. Frank H. Kelley, president, announced today.

Kelley said Marable will be manager of the Industrial Development and Water Resources departments and also will act as a general administrative assistant.

Marable has just returned from Japan, where he completed a 16 month tour of active Army duty as a reserve officer of field artillery.

He gained his first experience in chamber of commerce work as a member of the staff of the West Texas chamber. He joined that staff upon being discharged from the Army following four years of World War II service.

While he was in charge of membership promotion for the West Texas chamber its membership increased from 700 to 1,050 in three years. He resigned there to become manager at Denison, where he served until March, 1951, when called to Army duty.

At Denison he was credited with outstanding results in promotion of Lake Texoma as a tourist and recreation center, and in development of industries and retail trade.

Mitchell County and Colorado City News

Mrs. C. P. Gary, Executive Secretary of the Mitchell County Tuberculosis Association, says the final total in Chest x-rays taken in Colorado City during the 3 days stay of the State X-ray Unit was 2,675. According to Mrs. Gary the daily average of takes was a record for Colorado City.

The program was co-sponsored by the Colorado City Jaycees and the county TB association. Technicians and equipment are from the State Board of Health and expenses are paid from tax funds.

Mitchell County car owners were facing the car inspection deadline on September 6th with four out of five inspected and approved.

Colorado City's eight inspection stations had passed out safety stickers for 4,409 automobiles or other motor vehicles as of 5 PM Saturday. With a registrar of 5,459 vehicles in the county it appeared that inspection stations would be busy for the next seven days, but probably not unusually so, since many car owners would not have cars checked until after the deadline and many would not comply at all. Many car owners would not have cars checked where the expense of repair would be more than the value of the car. Others would simply ignore the deadline and continue to drive. Homer Garrison, head of the Department of Public Safety, says that regardless of whether the law is fair or not, it is on the books and he will enforce it. So, until it can be repealed or amended, the wisest thing to do would be to get that car inspected as soon as possible.

NURSES RESPOND TO RED CROSS APPEAL TO SERVE IN CRITICAL POLIO AREAS



ST. LOUIS, MO.—Answering the Red Cross' urgent appeal for 100 graduate nurses for immediate assignment as polio soared to 2290 new cases last week, nurses Helen and Catherine Lukachuk, sisters of Farmington, Mo., receive their plane tickets from Miss Adelle Brismaler, (right), St. Louis Chapter nursing official, as they leave for Orange, Tex. They picked the polio ward there from six possible assignments when they learned one doctor and a nurse, the sole trained medical help, have been splitting 24 hour daily shifts to care for patients. The father of one iron lung patient comes in daily to relieve them so they can eat. "Let me have that tough one," Helen decided, and her younger sister Catherine agreed. All available registered nurses who can be spared are being asked to contact their local Red Cross chapters for assignment to critical polio areas.

Veterans' News

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q. I am a World War II veteran and I just received notice from VA that my GI term insurance policy will expire soon. Must I take some action before that date—either to renew or convert—or will I have a grace period after wards, to do something about it? A. That expiration date is a final date and there is no grace period. If you want to continue your insurance, you must send VA your application for renewal or conversion, along with the proper premium for the new policy.

Q. I am a World War I veteran, and I've just passed my 65th birthday. Am I entitled to a V.A. pension based on my age alone? I've never been sick and I'm not disabled—but I do need the money.

A. You would not be entitled to a V.A. pension based on age alone. Pensions are paid to veterans who are permanently and totally disabled for reasons not connected with their service, and whose yearly incomes fall below certain levels. However, age, employability and the degree of disability.

Q. I recently was discharged from the WAC and would like to take a full-time course in school under the Korean GI Bill. I am married and my husband has a full-time job. We have no children. Would I be entitled to the \$135-a-month allowance paid to a veteran with one dependent? A. No. Under the law, a woman veteran would be entitled to the \$135-a-month rate only if her husband were "in fact" dependent on her.

Before I re-entered service over a year ago after having served in World War II, I bought a home with a GI loan, which was guaranteed for \$7,500, the top amount. Under the Korean GI Bill, will I be entitled to another GI loan, based on my service after Korea? A. No. Since you have used up all your entitlement under the World War II GI Bill, you will not be eligible for another GI loan under the new law.

Considerable interest in pond management for fish production is evident among many farmers and ranchers of this area. There are almost as many ideas on pond management as there are individuals. The following information has been briefed from several sources and from various farmer experiences over the state. It represents some of the best plans for pond management that has been determined so far.

The best Pond. All of the fish raised by the average family can be grown in a pond of 14 to one acre. It is better to manage a pond well than to stock several ponds and not take care of them. It is better to remove all brush and trees from the pond site. It's desirable to keep all live stock out of the pond by fencing the pond area and providing a watering place for the livestock below the dam in a metal or masonry tank.

Kind of fish. Bass and Bluegills provide the most satisfactory kinds of fish for farm ponds. A few channel cat or crappies may be added after the bass and bluegills have been in the pond a year or so. Channel cat do not normally spawn in a farm pond and they will have to be restocked after a few years of fishing. Crappie usually multiply too rapidly when stocked alone and your pond may become over stocked before you realize it.

How many fish? The stocking rate of your pond depends upon the surface area and how you intend to manage it from the standpoint of fertilization. If your pond is to be fertilized, it may be stocked with 100 bass and 1,000 bluegills for each surface acre. If you do not plan to fertilize the pond, put in only about 40 bass and 400 bluegills for each surface acre. Small fish should be used for stocking and both kinds

put in at the same time. The size of your pond should be calculated to the nearest 1/10 acre in determining how many fish to place in the pond.

Growing more fish. Fertilizing the pond increases fish production. If you do not plan to do a lot of fishing there is not much use in fertilizing the pond. It is best to use a commercial fertilizer that is high in nitrogen such as 16-23-0, or 8-8-8, or a 5-10-5 mix at 20 pounds of nitrate or ammonium fertilizer. Fifty to one hundred pounds of commercial fertilizer per surface acre at each application is the standard rate of application. Fertilizer application should be started in the spring whenever it begins to warm up—long in April and May. Applications should be made from 2 to 3 weeks intervals. A simple test as when additional fertilizer is needed is when you can see your hand in 12 inches of water. The fertilizer should be scattered in water which is less than 3 feet deep. Heavy applications should be continued throughout the summer until October. The use of commercial fertilizer will not only step up fish production, but it is a valuable aid in keeping down weeds in ponds.

When to start fishing. As soon as the bluegills have spawned once you can fish for them just as much as you want. The bass will spawn later and you can start fishing for them. Heavy fishing is important if you want to keep the pond in good shape. Don't worry about over-fishing. It is as you can hardly ever do that. What should a pond yield? You should be able to catch 25 to 200 pounds of fish for each acre of unfertilized pond per year. Each acre of your fertilized pond should produce 200 to 500 pounds of catfish and 500 pounds of carchabel fish each year.

"This year probably more Texas boys and girls than ever before will be attending school for the first time. It will be a new experience for them and many will be sent to go to, and to come from, school alone," he said. Motorists must keep this in mind. A youngster, thinking about baseball or football will often not see your car and may step off the curb in your path, Mr. and Mrs. Motorist—give the kids a brake!

For you who travel the high ways, here is a point of interest. By Texas law, motor vehicles must stop for a stopped school bus—whether you are following or approaching. Don't run down an innocent child—and there will be over one third million youngsters traveling in Texas school buses this year.

And here is a final word to mothers and fathers: Teach your youngsters these Safety Rules:

1. Where there are sidewalks use them.
2. If they must walk in the street, walk facing the oncoming traffic.
3. Cross only at intersections.
4. If riding a bicycle, ride it on the right side of the street and use hand signals.
5. Obey the safety patrols when and where safety patrols are used.

Youngsters, today, have the opportunity for a wonderful education. Send them from home to learn—not to die.

THE BATTLE FOR COTTON

Down in the Lower Rio Grande Valley, an all-out war is being waged against a dread enemy—the pink bollworm.

The battlefield isn't confined to the southern tip of Texas, however. It encompasses 189 counties extending from Val Verde in the Big Bend to Orange county on the Louisiana border.

The spoils of this war is cotton—the King of Texas Agriculture. The weapons are strict regulatory measures and practical insect control methods. And the battle has attracted the attention of economists as well as farmers all over the state, who realize that if the insect wins—then cotton can no longer be grown profitably in Texas.

Perhaps the first major victory will be won in the Rio Grande Valley Aug. 31, when cotton stalks in the four southernmost Texas counties will be turned underground. This action will help destroy the winter breeding place of the Pink Bollworm. Three weeks later, 12 counties farther north will follow suit, as will the remaining 45 counties in subsequent weeks. By October 20, all counties under planting and plow-up controls of the Texas Department of Agriculture will have done their bit to reduce the Pink Bollworm population.

The next step will be up to nature. With adequate moisture during the winter, the cotton debris

will rot—and victory will be near—but not complete.

Due to comparatively mild and dry winter last year, and to delayed plow-ups brought on by an acute shortage of labor, the Pink Bollworm buildup was astonishing. Actual counts in four counties showed thousands more "Pinkies" than in 1951. Representative sample bushels of gin trash from Cameron County had a count of 15,000 worms per bushel as compared to only 151 (corrected) last year; Hidalgo had 3,000 as compared to 103; Willacy 7,000 as compared to 13, and Starr, 6,000 as compared to 169.

The insect multiplies so rapidly as the season progresses that it can wipe out a whole crop of late cotton within two weeks. The importance of late planting and early plow-ups in infested areas cannot be overestimated but it is not the problem of the South Texas farmer alone. Every Texas farmer should clean his fields and ditches as soon as the cotton crop is gathered, for as the breeding grounds are destroyed in the south, there is little to prevent the insect from moving farther north in search for winter quarters.

The government of Mexico is combating the Pink Bollworm with similar measures. With the co-operation of every farmer in the infested areas and over the rest of the state, we can look forward to crops comparatively free of the destructive insect.
