Wheat For Pasture

H. M. Bainer, Director of Southwestern Wheat Association on Wheat Pasturing

As a pasture crop wheat is excellent for feed but as a grain crop it seldom pays to let livestock graze it extensively. To sow wheat for the double purpose of pasture and grain usually does not pay, the returns from pasturing are more than offset by the decrease it causes in the grain yield. The claim frequently made, that the pasturage secured from wheat is just that much clear gain, is not true under normal conditions. It is frequently true, however, in wheat of an early rank fall growth that needs to be held back. Experiment station results seldom show gains in yield or other beneficial results from grazing ordinary growths of wheat, but they frequently show losses of one to several bushels per acre from over-pasturing or pasturing wheat that is too small.

Of course there always are times and conditions when judicious pasturing will pay, but good judgment must be used as to when it pays and to what extent it can be done. For example, wheat sown too early in the fall often makes a rank growth and removes far more of the soil moisture and plant food than the future development of the crop will justify and under such conditions holding it back by pasturing is advisable. Much of the present growing crop is small and cannot stand pasturing. It will need all of its growth for winter protection.

The damages from pasturing wheat are usually the results of over doing it, in turning livestock on the crop before the plants are well enough started, or in grazing too closely, thereby leaving the wheat with too little winter protection. For best results, wheat should go into the winter with sufficient growth to overcome winter killing. It should cover the ground enough to protect the roots, hold the snow and prevent the soil from blowing.

New Contest Rules

Changes Have Been Made in Spelling Contest Rules By Inter-scholastic League

There has been a radical change made in the rules for the spelling contest in the University Interscholastic league this year, according to Mrs. R. S. Glaze, who was elected director of spelling in this county at the recent teacher's institute.

"Formerly," said Mrs. Glaze, "the contest has been based solely upon the spelling lists issued by the league bureau, division of extension. This year, however, the contest is based not only on this list, but on words in the state adopted spelling book. Preparation of students for the contest therefore will involve a mastery of words in both sources, the league lists and the state adopted text."

Teachers are also cautioned that the contest involves plain writing as well as spelling. Often a good speller is a poor writer and it is necessary to coach such contestants in plain writing. Every letter in a spelling paper must be clearly legible.

"No more valuable training, in my opinion, can be given our pupils than that involved in adequate preparation for this contest. The words prescribed are all words in common use, and words therefore for which the student has constant use, moreover, the ability to write a clear, legible hand is an accomplishment which many graduates of our schools fail to acquire; yet in business and the professions, and even in the trades such an ability is of the utmost importance."

"The constitution and rules of the league is now available, and teachers in member-schools may secure a copy by addressing the League Bureau, University Station, Austin, Texas."

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IS FORCED TO DRIVE CROOKS

GLEN LANINGHAM FORCED TO TAKE TWO MEN TO COLORADO SPRINGS AT POINT OF GUN

Glen Laningham, son of Mrs. C. C. Carter of this city, returned to Perryton last Sunday morning after an absence of over two days with a thrilling story of how he was forced at the point of a gun to drive two men from Perryton to about fifty miles northwest of Colorado Springs, Colorado.

Glenn makes his home with Mr. and Mrs. Jno. N. Stump, and about daylight on Friday morning, he left the Stump home to go eight miles northwest, where he was running a tractor for Mr. Stump and O. H. Black. He stated that when about three-quarters of a mile north of town, he stopped and picked up two well dressed men who were walking north. One of the men was about 38 years of age and the other appeared to be some younger and both had plenty of money.

When Laningham got to where he turned off the highway to go on to his work, he slowed down and told the men that that was as far as he could take them. When he told them that, one of the crooks pulled a gun and ordered him to drive on north. They kept on driving, circling all larger places, and stopping only at small filling stations and lunch stands, arriving northwest of Colorado Springs about three o'clock Saturday morning.

When they stopped, Glenn said they talked some of killing him but finally let him go, after cautioning him that he would be killed if he talked before returning home. They took his watch, but gave him \$5.00 with which to pay his expenses back to Perryton.

NEW HIGHWAY TO STRATFORD

MEETING HELD AT GRUVER TO PROMOTE EAST AND WEST HIGHWAY FROM STRATFORD EAST

A meeting that should prove of much interest to Perryton citizens was held at Gruver last Monday evening for the purpose of routing and making plans for the building of a highway from Stratford east to Gruver and thence on straight east from Gruver until it intercepts No. 117 the Perryton-Spearman highway. Committees consisting of Gruver and Stratford men were appointed to make the location and confer with the county commissioners as to the immediate construction of the road. This road will be of much benefit to Perryton as it will give an almost straight outlet west to the mountains. At Stratford the road will connect with U. S. 54, and also with the new road which will be built in the near future along the Santa Fe from Amarillo to Las Animas, Colo.

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SECOND ANNUAL SHOW PROMISES TO BE BETTER THAN LAST YEAR

WILL BE HELD IN DONLEY HALL; PRESIDENT E. W. ROGERS EXPECTS FIVE HUNDRED BIRDS TO BE ENTERED; 4-H CLUB SHOW

Plans were completed Saturday at the luncheon held at the New Hotel Perryton for the holding of the annual show of the North Plains Poultry Association, and the dates set for Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, December 15-18. The 4-H Club and Vocational Agriculture poultry show will be held in connection. J. L. Donley is giving his spacious hall for the show this year.

President E. W. Rogers, who presided at the Saturday luncheon, is enthusiastic about the prospects for this year's show. He estimates that there will be at least 500 birds entered in competition, about 350 were entered last year. Other speakers at the luncheon were Jack McCullum, poultry specialist of the Purina company; E. E. Marshall, vocational agriculture head in the Perryton schools; and O. O. Miller, head of vocational "ag" in the Booker schools. Representatives from a number of communities in Beaver and Lipscomb counties were present. This was the regular quarterly educational meeting of the association and the principal subjects discussed were feeding, selection, training and care of birds.

W. B. Lilly of this city, veteran of the poultry show boosters of this community, will be superintendent of the show again this year. T. D. Moss, secretary of the association, states that the catalogues will be ready for distribution the latter part of next week. One hundred and fifty new exhibition coops have been ordered. Mr. Lilly will have as his chief assistant, W. L. McDivitt, C. C. Ware, American Poultry Association official judge of Guthrie, Okla., has been secured to judge the show.

Poultry from over a large area is expected, Canyon, Amarillo, Enid, Woodward and Slaton, are among the distant points which will be represented.

The Annual 4-H Club and Vocational Poultry Show will be held in connection. This show will be for poultry only and will not be open to all. Last years show was for the 4-H Club of Ochiltree county only. A cup will be awarded to the best poultry judging team from a club or agriculture class. For any information, see or write T. D. Rangers Win From Stratford 80-0; Tie Borger 7-7

RANGERS PLAY PERFECT FORM ARMISTICE DAY

Stratford Allowed Only Two First Downs While Rangers Take 80 Points Lead

Entire Squad Takes Part

Borger Game Results In 7 to 7 Tie But Results Give Rangers Advantage

Two games were played by the Rangers during the past week, the first on Friday afternoon with Borger, resulting in a 7 to 7 tie although the locals outplayed the visitors in every branch of the game, outgaining the Bulldogs by a hundred yards and earning ten first downs as compared to three by the visitors, penetrating the Borger 20-yard line.

The second grid contest was held on Armistice day in which the Rangers ran wild over the Stratford eleven, winning by an 80 to 0 score, allowing the visitors only two first downs while they ran up twelve touchdowns and made eight points after the touchdowns.

The Rangers, playing in perfect form, showed more flash, speed, teamwork and fight than they have ever displayed during the present season. During the game, every member of the Ranger squad saw service, the second and third string men playing the major portion and showing the same offense and defense exhibited by the first string.

First Touchdown In 7 Minutes. The game opened with Stratford kicking off. Five consecutive first downs put the ball within scoring distance, with Tucker, Witt and Shockley doing most of the gaining. Tucker lugging the first one across and place kicking for the added point, 7 minutes after the start of the game.

Mounis kicked off for the Rangers and Stratford was unable to gain and were forced to punt. A thirty yard run around right end by Witt and a 23 yard gain by Tucker who raced across for the second touchdown, accounted for most of the yardage. Tucker also place kicking for point.

Block Punt And Recover. Mounis kicked off again and Stratford was forced to punt. The kick was blocked and Rupperecht recovered on the 13 yard tape. Four thrusts at the line resulted in Tucker lugging the punt over for the third Ranger touchdown, Tucker failing to kick goal.

Mounis kicked off but Stratford was unable to gain, and punted. Three plays carried the ball to the Ranger 40 yard line when the quarter ended. Play was resumed and Shockley punted. Lawler receiving and fumbling. Hamker recovering over the goal line for another Ranger touchdown, Tucker's place kick failing.

Shockley Gets Touchdown. Stratford kicked off. Hamker gained 25 yards around left end and Tucker 20 yards around right end. Three Ranger substitutes were sent in. Two more first downs and Shockley punted the remaining 9 yards through the line for the fifth Ranger counter. Tucker passed to Morris for the point but the point did not count. Rangers holding. Stratford kicked off, the Rangers being forced to punt and Stratford returning the kick. The Rangers fumble and Stratford recovers, but the oval was returned to the Rangers when a Stratford lineman attempts to catch a pass.

Three first downs were made by the Rangers in quick succession and with the ball on the Stratford 11 yard line, six more Ranger substitutes were sent in. Four more plays were attempted and on the last one

Witt lunged over for the Sixth counter, Tucker kicking goal.

Subs Make Touchdown. Tucker kicks off over the goal line. The oval is brought in and Stratford forced to punt. Witt returning the ball to the Stratford 35 yard line, when four more Ranger substitutes were sent in. The Rangers are given a 15 yard line penalty for having 12 men on the field. A pass by Dean from the 50 yard line is received by Jines who races over for the seventh Ranger touchdown. A pass, Dean to Jines accounts for the added point.

The Rangers kick-off and Stratford attempts two plays, both being thrown for a loss as the half ends. Score, Rangers 46, Stratford 0.

Withers Gets 60 Yard T. D. Stratford kicks off to resume play and on the first down, Withers runs for a 60 yard gain and the eighth Ranger touchdown, the kick for point failing.

The Rangers kick off, forcing Stratford back on every play. Withers intercepts a Stratford pass. Neither team is able to make the required yardage and a punting exchange takes place with the advantage in favor of the Rangers.

Burkstresser Gets T. D. Burkstresser takes a 25 yard pass, being downed on the 23 yard tape. Another pass on the next down to Burkstresser is good. The eighth touchdown, the Ranger's ninth, the place kick for point being good.

Stratford kicks off, the Rangers getting a first down, but Lawler intercepts a Ranger pass. On the only offensive Stratford was able to show they earned a first down. The Rangers sent in two substitutes just as the third period ended. Play was resumed and Stratford earned their second and last first down. On the next play Stratford was thrown for a loss and two more Ranger substitutes were sent in. Stratford is forced to punt. The Rangers earn a first down but lose the ball on a fumble.

Following the first Stratford play the entire Ranger first string was sent in. Stratford loses 12 yards on the next two plays and punts the ball being downed on the Ranger 32 yard line.

Rangers Held For Downs. A 4 yard plunge by Shockley, a 14 yard gain around end by Tucker and a long pass, Tucker to Witt, carries the oval to the 10 yard line. Four plays are attempted and the Rangers lack only a few inches of making a touchdown. Stratford punts, Witt returning to the 11 yard line in a brilliant run. Tucker races around end for the tenth Ranger counter and kicks goal.

The Rangers kick off over the goal line. Stratford is forced to punt. Witt receiving and returning to the 35 yard tape. Two passes are incomplete and Tucker races around right end for the 35 yard and the eleventh counter, adding point by place kick.

The Rangers kick off and on the second down Stratford fumble. Morris recovering on the 30 yard tape.

Tucker Gets 12th T. D. Witt gains 10 yards around end, Tucker 4 more. Witt 12 yards around end and Tucker races around end for the twelfth touchdown, kicking goal for the point. Another kick off was made but the game ended after the first down. Score, Rangers 80, Stratford 0.

A running account of the game follows:

Dodge Gets Broken Leg. The Rangers kicked off against the wind to Rollins who received on his 15 yard tape, returning to the 32. Four line bucks netted the Bulldogs 10 yards and a first down. O. Hanna was thrown for a yard loss around left end. Harlow gained 5 yards through the line, Morrison failed to gain around right end. The

Bulldogs were forced to punt, Rollins booting the oval outside on the Ranger 31 yard tape. Borger called time-out. Kenneth Dodge, left end for the Bulldogs being injured on the play, it being learned after the game that he received a broken leg. He was carried from the field and his brother, I. Dodge substituted.

Rangers Make First Down. Three line plays, a 7 yard plunge by Shockley through right tackle, a 3 yard gain through left tackle by Grogan and a 9 yard advance by Johnson gave the Rangers a first down.

Grogan and Shockley hit the line for a yard each. Tucker failed to gain around left end. Shockley punts and the oval is downed by the Rangers on the Borger 17 yard stripe.

Hamker Gets Good Return. The first Borger play is called back and the Bulldogs given a 5 yard off-side penalty. O. Hanna hits the line for a yard, going out-of-bounds. The Bulldogs fumble but recover for a 4 yard loss. Borger punts from their own 11 yard stripe to the Ranger 40, where Hamker receives and returns 21 yards to the Borger 39 yard tape.

Three line plays, by Shockley Grogan and Johnson, net only a yard each. Shockley punts to the 13 yard tape, Borger getting a 5 yard return.

Borger Fails To Gain. Harlow hits the line for 4 yards. O. Hanna makes a 2 yard loss around right end. The next play is called back and Borger given a 5 yard penalty. Morrison loses a yard in a line buck and the quarter ends with the ball in Borger's possession on their own 13 yard stripe.

Rangers Held For Downs. The Bulldogs punt to Hamker who receives on the center line returning to the Borger 41 yard stripe. Shockley recovers a fumble but does not lose ground. Shockley nets a yard around right end. Witt smashes out a 7 yard advance around right end. Johnson adds 7 more for a first down.

Bulldogs Own Punt. Four line bucks by Harlow, Rollins, O. Hanna and Rollins net a yard each. Borger 10 yards and a first down. Rollins and O. Hanna each gain a yard at the line but Hanna loses one around right end. The Bulldogs punt but the kick is low and one of their own men block it. Borger covering the oval on their own 27 yard tape but it is turned over to the Rangers.

The Rangers fumble, Borger recovering, but the play is called back when both teams are off-side. Grogan smashes around left end for 13 yards and a first down.

Shockley Gets Touchdown. Shockley hits left tackle for 3 yards, going out-side. Shockley races around right end for 3 more. Johnson hits the line for 2 yards. Grogan punts through left tackle for 2 yards and a first down, advancing to the Borger 3 yard tape.

Shockley plunges through right tackle for three yards and a first down. The Rangers touchdown. Tucker added point by place kick. The Rangers kicked off, Morrison receiving the oval behind his own goal line and returning to the 23 yard stripe. Morrison nets a yard around right end. Harlow fails to gain at right tackle. O. Hanna gains a yard around left end, Borger is forced to punt, the kick going high and is carried out-of-bounds by the wind on the Borger 31 yard stripe.

Shockley smashes out a 5 yard gain through right tackle as the half ends. Score, Rangers 7, Borger 0.

Both Teams Forced To Punt. The Rangers kick-off when play is resumed, booting the ball to the 15 yard yard line, the Bulldogs getting a 13 yard return. Three line plays net 6 yards and the Bulldogs punt to their own 46 yard stripe where the ball is downed.

Shockley hits right tackle and Johnson left tackle for 6 yards each and a first down. Tucker nets a yard around right end. On a reverse, Grogan carries the oval around left end for 4 yards. A pass the piskin going outside on the Borger 28 yard stripe.

Intercept Long Ranger Pass. Rollins fails to gain around left end. The next play is called back when both teams are off-side. On a fake play, Morrison loses 6 yards. Harlow hits right tackle for 3 yards. Borger punts, downing the ball on the Bulldog 41 yard stripe.

On the first down, Tucker's long pass is intercepted by LaBarge who is stopped on his 14 yard mark. Three Borger line plays net 5 yards and the Bulldogs punt out-of-bounds on their own 37 yard line.

Pass Over Goal Line. Shockley is thrown for a 4 yard loss on a reverse. A pass, Tucker to Witt is complete and Witt is downed on the Borger 8 yard line, first and ten. Shockley fumbles but recovers for a 3 yard loss. Tucker's pass falls incomplete over the goal line and the piskin is given to Borger on the 20 yard tape.

Three plays net 3 yards for the Bulldogs. They substitute Yoss for Renolds in the line. Borger punts to the 45 yard line where the ball is downed without return.

Rangers Get Penalty. Tucker's pass is incomplete but the play is called back and the Bulldogs given a five yard penalty. Tucker passes again but it is incomplete. Shockley on a reverse, gains 5 yards around right end, just as the third period ends. Score, Rangers 7, Borger 0.

Play is resumed and Shockley punts against the wind, the oval being downed on the Borger 7 yard tape. The Bulldogs return the ball, Hamker receiving and getting a 20 yard return, being downed on the Borger 30 yard line.

Block Ranger Punt. Johnson lugs the ball through the line for a 5 yard gain. Shockley gains a yard at right tackle and Grogan fails to gain at left tackle. Shockley punts but the kick is blocked. Hanna recovering it and racing down the field. Tucker overtakes him and downs him on the Ranger 18 yard line, the only time during the game the Bulldogs were able to advance the ball into Ranger territory.

Complete Pass For T. D. Rollins hits the line for 3 yards. Morrison slips through left tackle for a yard. O. Hanna fails to gain around right. Morrison passes to Rollins who goes over for a touchdown. The Bulldogs plunge the line for the additional point, tying the score.

The Bulldogs kick-off, Tucker receiving on his 10 yard line and making an 18 yard return. Johnson and Shockley hit the line for 4 yards each. Tucker follows for 2 more, lacking only a few inches of making a down. Johnson hits right tackle for 2 yards and a first down.

Hamker fails to gain around left end. Borger calls time out. Witt pounds around right end on a reverse for 15 yards and a first down. Grogan is tossed for a 2 yard loss around left end. Official time out is called. Witt loses 4 yards around right end. Shockley punts to the Borger 20 yard tape. The Bulldogs getting a 5 yard return.

Johnson Intercepts Pass. O. Hanna gains 3 yards around right end. A double lateral pass fails to show a gain. Borger substitutes Jefferson for Harlow, while the Rangers send in Hull and Ellis for Hamker and Bradford. Borger passes, but Johnson intercepts it and is downed on the Borger 32 yard line.

Shockley hits right tackle for 5 yards. Tucker's pass to Witt is incomplete. A pass, Shockley to Tucker is complete for a 9 yard gain and a first down.

Rangers Held For Downs. Another pass is completed for a 4 yard gain. Grogan and Witt fail to gain around end. Johnson blocks the line without gain and the Rangers

are held for downs on the Borger 15 yard tape.

Borger punts. Witt receiving and clicking off a 25 yard return, being downed on the Borger 36 yard stripe. Mounis is substituted for Johnson. Witt going to full.

Intercept Ranger Pass. Witt hits left tackle for 2 yards. Tucker gains a yard around right end. Tucker passes but it is intercepted by O. Hanna who is dropped on his own 20 yard line, just as the final whistle sounds ending the game. Score, Rangers 7, Bulldogs 7.

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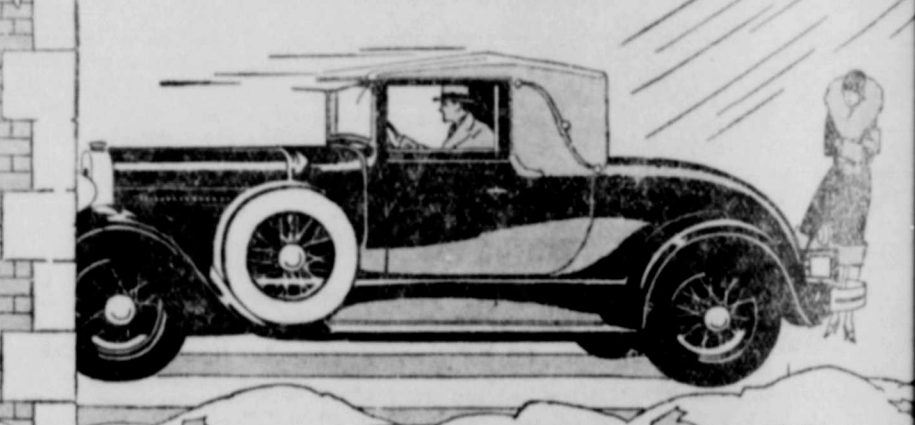

CHANGE IN INTERSCHOLASTIC LEAGUE ESSAY RULES

Radical changes in the essay writing rules of the Interscholastic League have been made this year, according to Miss Eula Wales, director of essay writing in this county.

"Heretofore," said Miss Wales, "subjects for the essay contents have been selected from certain prescribed magazines. This year, however, the subjects will be furnished from the state office of the league 'within the range of the average pupil's study, observation and experience.'"

Thus it will not be necessary for pupils entering this contest to be prepared on current news, as in the past, but much practice in actual composition will be necessary for those who expect to compete successfully. This change in the rules was made in accordance with the recommendation of the committee in the English faculty of the University of Texas which has charge of the grading of essays in the state contest. Less emphasis on amassing of information and more emphasis upon practice in composition, this committee believes, will give better results.

HELP

Out of a fund of \$30,000 established by former Senator Joseph Frelinghuysen of New Jersey, more than \$77,000 has been loaned to boys and girls on New Jersey farms to enable them to purchase pure-bred cows, swine or poultry. More than 1,000 boys and girls have been helped in this way to get a start in producing better dairy products, pork and poultry, and the effect upon farmers generally in showing them the advantages of pure-bred stock have been incalculable.

That sort of help for the farmer is decidedly practical. There is always a market for first-grade products of the sort which New Jersey thus encourages, especially in the vicinity of great terminal markets like New York and Philadelphia.

SPEED

Thirty-five minutes from the time he left the William Penn Airport in Philadelphia with photographs of the World's Series baseball game, Captain Frank Hawks delivered the pictures in a New York newspaper office. It took him 20 minutes, flying at 270 miles an hour, to cover the 90 miles between Philadelphia and the Queens Borough Airport in New York. Then fifteen minutes in a speed-boat took him to Manhattan.

This was faster than the pictures could have been sent by telegraph. Telegraphing photographs is now being done every day, but it takes half an hour or so for the details of a picture to be transmitted over the wire. Over long distances, of course, the airplane could not compete, but in this case it was the swifter method.

BLIND

The most terrible affliction which can come to a human being, in all probability, is blindness. The problem of helping the blind become self-supporting is finding new solutions constantly. The latest is the discovery that blind girls, because of their keen sense of touch, are very useful in offices where there is a large amount of mailing to be done.

The Brooklyn Bureau of Charities has set up a mailing business employing only blind girls for this sort of work. All sorts of quantity mailing is done for business houses.

These girls formerly had no other occupation than weaving coarse rugs, at which they could earn only from \$6 to \$8 a week. In the mailing work they earn from \$15 to \$20 a week. And for addressing mail, crippled girls, who cannot work at occupations requiring physical exertion, are employed.

That is the most practical sort of charity.

COTTON

More than 45,000,000 acres of land was devoted to growing cotton in the United States this year. That is five million acres too much, in the opinion of Carl Williams, the cotton expert of the Federal Farm Board.

What is needed in the South, says Mr. Williams, is the production of more food which the South itself consumes. He says there are single cities in the South where the consumption of meat and dairy products is more than the production of those commodities in the entire state. The cotton farmer who cuts down his cotton acreage and uses the land thereby released for livestock and dairying or the growing of other foodstuffs will be serving himself, his community, the cotton industry and the entire South.

It will take time, but eventually a high percentage of the land now devoted to staple crops all over the country will be used for other purposes.

LIFE

Our bodies live longer than those of our grandparents did, Dr. Charles H. Mayo, famous physician of Rochester, Minn., tells us, but our brains die just as young. What is the use, Dr. Mayo asks, of living to 90 if the brain begins to decay at 70? He is optimistic about it, however; he thinks that medical research will find means of prolonging mental life as well as physical life.

HAD NARROW ESCAPE

B. Elmore, a former resident of Perryton and a brother of Mrs. Anna Moon of this city, had a very narrow escape from death recently at Morro Bay, Calif., where he is employed by the J. V. Creath Lumber yards. Mr. Elmore was asleep in his home when it caught fire and was awakened only after it was a blaze and part of the roof had fallen in. Even the bed clothes were afire.

HERO IN A HOLE

There are heroes of the depths as well as of the heights. Bill Shroat, a Colorado oil driller, is one of them. When a big bit was lost in the hole of an oil well being drilled near Branson, and after all sorts of tools had been used in vain attempts to fish it out, Bill offered to go down the hole and make an effort to hook a line on the bit, which was 126 feet below the surface.

At first the officials of the company refused to permit him to take the risk, but finally agreed. Bill went down the 24-inch hole standing in a soft rope sling. The hole was caving badly and there was soft mud at the bottom, under which the bit was buried. After working for 30 minutes, during which he several times put his head under the watery mud, he succeeded in getting two half-hitches with a log chain around the refractory bit. He signaled to come up and the bit slowly was drawn out without further trouble.

This was the first time, so far as known, that a man has ever gone to such a depth in an oil well in that region, where even at shallow depths gas ordinarily would be intolerable. In taking such a risk of being buried alive by the mud and rock of a caving well, Bill Shroat added his name to the long list of everyday heroes, who perform their deeds of daring as a part of the day's work.

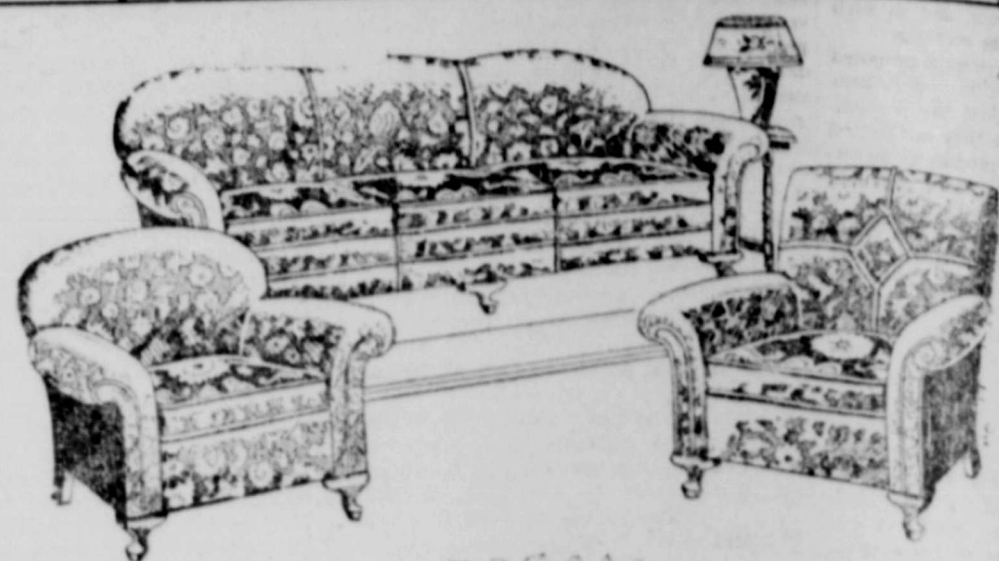

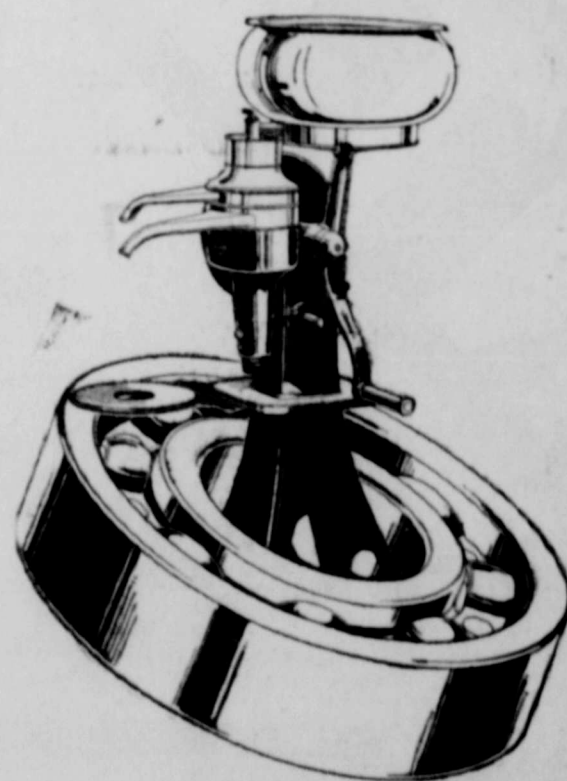

Reading the item, we went back to Mr. Callaway, president of the Lions Club and called to his attention the item and refreshed his memory of our previous conversation, and was advised by Mr. Callaway that he had talked with the editor of the Herald and had told him that the Lions Club was not behind the proposition, had nothing to do with it and also told the writer that the editor, in that conversation, told him T. D. Moss, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, had also called his attention to the matter and that the Chamber of Commerce was not behind the matter, which we suppose was ignored by the editor for reasons best known to himself, and we find the matter still continues through this channel leading the people of the city of Perryton to believe that these organizations are sponsoring a proposition that the membership seemingly has done everything to deny.

Personally, we believe it would be a mistake—in the first place, Ochiltree county at the present time owns sufficient ground for a temporary, barn-storming, money grabbing airport, which has been paid for and there is no reason we can see why it should be necessary for the city of Perryton to buy some more. We are sure that it will not overtax anyone's memory to recall the purchasing of the Fair Grounds by Ochiltree county some years ago, and casual investigation will show that it still owns it. We have heard the statement made that even if we bought this land, and it was not actually used for an airport, that it would be worth the money for hold-county and "otherwise" fairs. The writer as well as a number of other men we can name, is some poorer and considerably wiser, trying to hold the "otherwise" fairs. In other words, we have more land than we can devote to "fairs." Furthermore, we believe that when air travel is sufficiently developed that airports, like garages, will be privately owned and operated and it will not be any more necessary for cities and towns to furnish landing fields for

the method of transportation than it is to furnish garages for those who travel by automobile.

It is also being argued that the land is well worth the money and is a good bargain regardless of whether it is used for an airport or not, which the writer believes is true. In fact, we have just talked to Geo. M. Perry, the man who bought it with the intention of turning it to the city if they wanted it, and the very purpose of the conversation was to find out from him if he wanted the city to take it or was willing to keep it and pay for it, and he said he would rather keep it from an investment standpoint than to turn it at the price he paid for it. If the city of Perryton is in the real estate business, we have not before been aware of it but we do want to say this much, that the records disclose the city of Perryton, at the present time, including the paving programs already awarded and practically completed, is indebted for more than \$700,000 and furthermore, we want to say that there is at this time before the people the question of expanding the school system, which means a bond issue for that purpose, and if this eternal disposition on the part of some to follow off every jack-o-lantern that comes our way and propose a bond issue for everything that some enterprising citizen may suggest, it just occurs to us that we will find ourselves in a position where our money, will be spent for non-essentials and things that are really necessary and essential to our progress and development will have to be passed over for the reason that our credit will be gone.

The question of trying to tell an intelligent man that a small bond issue of \$12,000 don't amount to anything to us appears to be an insult. In other words, let the average person, if they are fortunate enough to still have a job, purchase a dollar's worth here and a dollar there, and pledge a dollar or two over there, and then when the collective bill is presented, see whether or not it amounts to anything. The fact of the business is that Perryton is likely to go along upon the basis of advertising by bond issues, which simply means debts, and when it finally develops that the obligations can not be met, will find itself bankrupt, as happens to be the case at the present time with a number of cities we can name.

We have written this in the spirit of friendliness and with it in our mind to let the citizenship know the Lions Club and the Chamber of Commerce and the American Legion was not one hundred per cent behind the voting of these airport bonds. And since the editor runs a paper and we do not, if he disagrees and wants to argue the mat-

ter, we here pass to him the challenge that we will rent one of the local theatres or sojourn to the court house, and if there is any expenses we will divide them, and you folks come out and listen and we will promise you a fair entertainment, at the end of which you will be the judge.

TAXES TAKE SIXTEEN PER CENT OF EVERY DOLLAR

Speaking of taxes—and who is not?—the tax collector now demands from each of us one day's labor out of each week. All of us, men, women and children, earn yearly around 80 billion dollars. Our tax bill is nearly 13 billion—one-sixth of our total earning capacity.

Look at taxes in another way: One person out of 11 who are gainfully employed is a public employee. Not so long ago we required only one person out of each 22 to perform the services which we demanded of government. A few more of our demands, and it will be one out of ten; then one out of nine, and so on and on. When will we stop saying, "The Government ought to do this, and that, and the other thing?"

Most people think the corporations and the rich pay the taxes. This fallacy, more than any other single thing, is responsible for our increasing tax burden. I once observed how skillfully one million dollars was extracted from a state legislature by the argument that most of the money would be paid by the railroads, anyway. The state, the argument ran, would be getting a dollar's worth of university buildings for 50 cents.

Another fallacy is that everything from the Government is free. Free seeds, it used to be; now free publications, free advice, free help, free this and that. Such a costly joke! There is no such thing as free government, any more than there is free rent, free clothing, or free groceries. Government costs real money. Every self-supporting citizen shares his income with the million-odd men and women now on government pay rolls.

A gentleman, visiting Washington, hired an old darky to drive him around to see the sights. The darky grew enthusiastic. He waved his arm at the Botanical Gardens, the museums, the parks and monuments and said to my friend, "Jest think. It's all free. It don't cost nobody nothin'. The Government pays for it."
