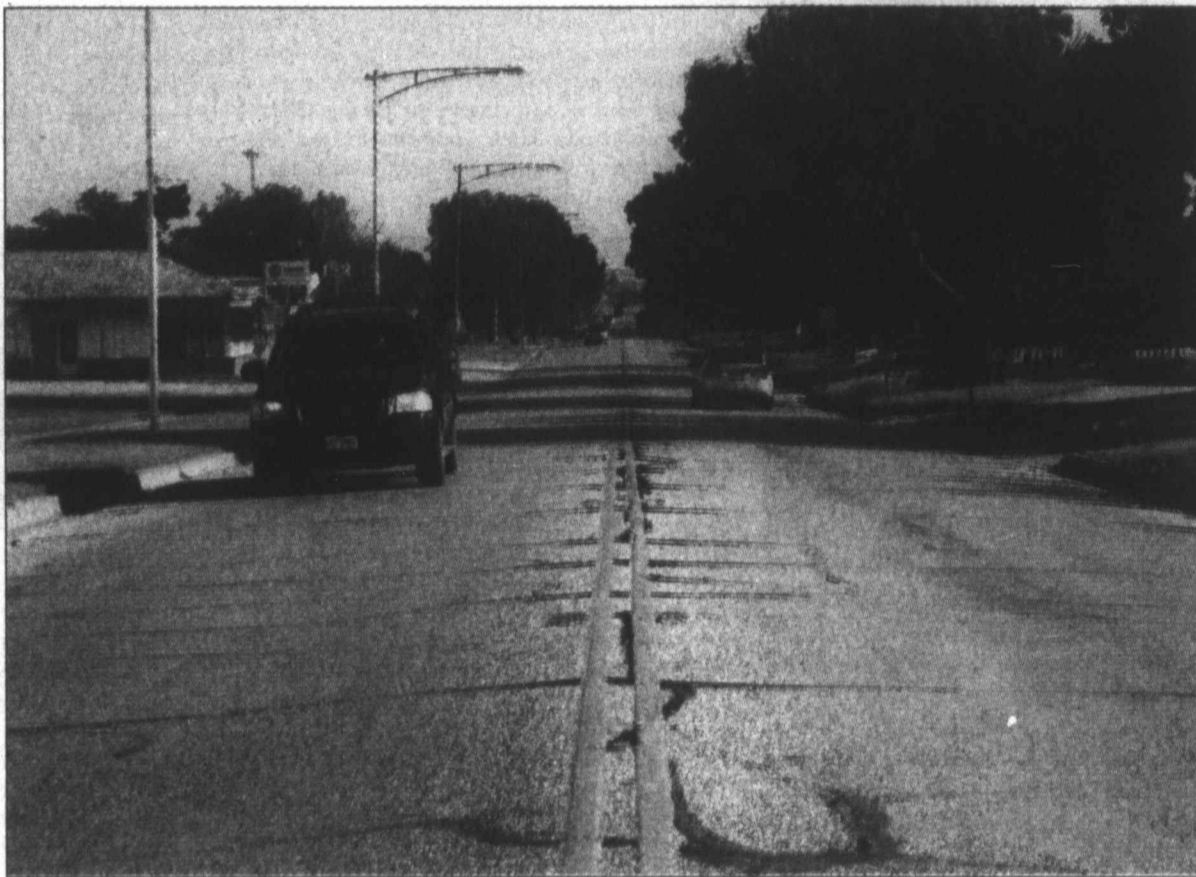

Hickory St. project still on hold



NEW PAVING COMING SOON... The Hickory Street paving project is set to begin sometime after July 4th, as Price Construction crews are just waiting for the Texas Department of Transportation to approve the paving materials.

The repaving project set to get underway on Hickory Street has been delayed. According to Knoal Jordan, Field Supervisor with Price Construction of Big Spring, the company is waiting for the state to approve paving materials to allow the project to begin.

The TxDOT contractors will begin a rehabilitation project in Mitchell County on Bus. 208, or Hickory Street, from I-20 to East 2nd Street in Colorado City. Jordan said a sample has been sent to Austin, and the company hopes to hear back sometime next week.

This project will include removing existing pavement, repairing distressed areas and placing a new hot mix asphalt to improve the driving surface. Traffic on Hickory Street will be reduced to one lane with a pilot vehicle and flagging operations during daytime hours only.

The \$1.3 million project was awarded to Price Construction and is expected to be completed later in the summer. Jordan said barricades will start going up as soon as the company's material gets approval from TxDOT.

Crews will start at 2nd Street downtown and work their way north all the way up Hickory Street to the north side of the interstate. Specifically, crews will mill off about two inches of existing pavement in most areas, with sub-grade failure areas being milled down another eight inches, which will be filled back in daily. Then, a seal coat will be put down, and crews will lay two inches of hot mix on top, much like the work on 2nd Street last summer.

TxDOT reminds motorists to be especially watchful when traveling through this and all roadway work zones, as workers and large, slow-moving equipment will be in the area.

New administrator named at nursing, rehab center

position of administrator on June 4th. Since that time, she's dealt with a few trials that few administrators ever see in their careers. Remember when the city was without water for three days? Oh yeah, and the fire that caused a complete evacuation of the facility?

Whitesides was present for both situations and has handled them with grace, according to MCHD CEO Robbie Dewberry.

While she's young to be a long-term care facility administrator, Whitesides said she has almost seven years of experience. "It will be seven years in September," she said Monday. "Everybody asks how old I am, and I tell them. I'm 30."

Her last job was in Snyder, but Whitesides is already a citizen of Colorado City. She and

her husband, Zane, live here, and she's pleased to be taking care of the residents at MC-NRC.

As an administrator, Whitesides' duties are to see that the residents are being taken care of properly and to make sure the facility is run effectively yet efficiently. She's seen every facet of working in a nursing home, as she started out as a Certified Nurse Aide (CNA).

Whitesides keeps her CNA certification current, so she can step in and do the work herself if the need arises. She said she worked her way up to the position of administration, giving her a unique perspective when it comes to dealing with staff and residents.

What's the best part about her job? Whitesides said she

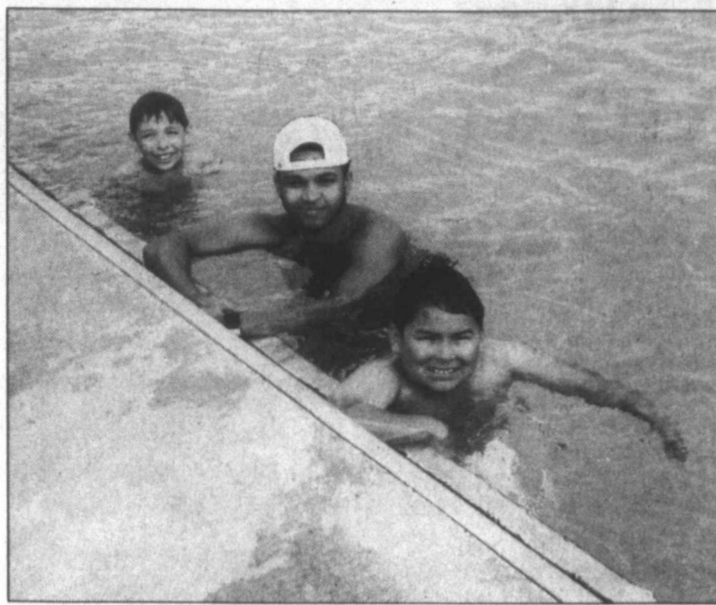
Swimming lessons continue in July

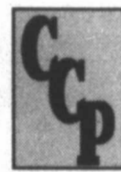

Texas DPS commissions new troopers

Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) Director Steven McCraw today was joined by members of the Texas Public Safety Commission (PSC) as the department commissioned 80 men and women as the state's newest Highway Patrol Troopers. The graduation ceremony was held in Austin.

"It takes a special kind of person to willingly sacrifice their safety in order to protect others from danger. It is that courage - that dedication - that makes us extremely proud of and fortunate for your service," said PSC Chairman Steven P. Mach. "We believe in you and are confident in your abilities to serve and protect Texas."

The A-2018 class, which is the department's 163rd recruit school, includes eight women, 16 former peace officers and 26 military veterans. The oldest graduate is 49-years-old and the youngest is 21-years-old. Eleven of the recruits moved to Texas to join the Academy. This is the first recruit class to receive specialized training that will enable them to teach the public about active-shooter events. This class is also the first to receive swift water rescue training. Both of these courses will be part of the DPS Training Academy curriculum moving forward.

"Our state is a safer place today, because these 80 brave men and women answered the call to serve and protect Texas," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "The A-2018 class is joining an elite group of law enforcement professionals, and they have a great responsibility and opportunity before them as they begin their careers as Texas State Troopers. We are proud of each of them and glad to welcome this class to the DPS family."

The new Troopers will report to duty stations across Texas in the coming weeks and spend the first six months in on-the-job training.

The Troopers began the 25-week training academy in January. Instruction covered more than 100 subjects, including counterterrorism, traffic and criminal law, arrest and control procedures, accident reconstruction, first aid and Spanish. They also received training in use of force, communication skills, firearms, driving, criminal interdiction, cultural diversity and physical fitness.

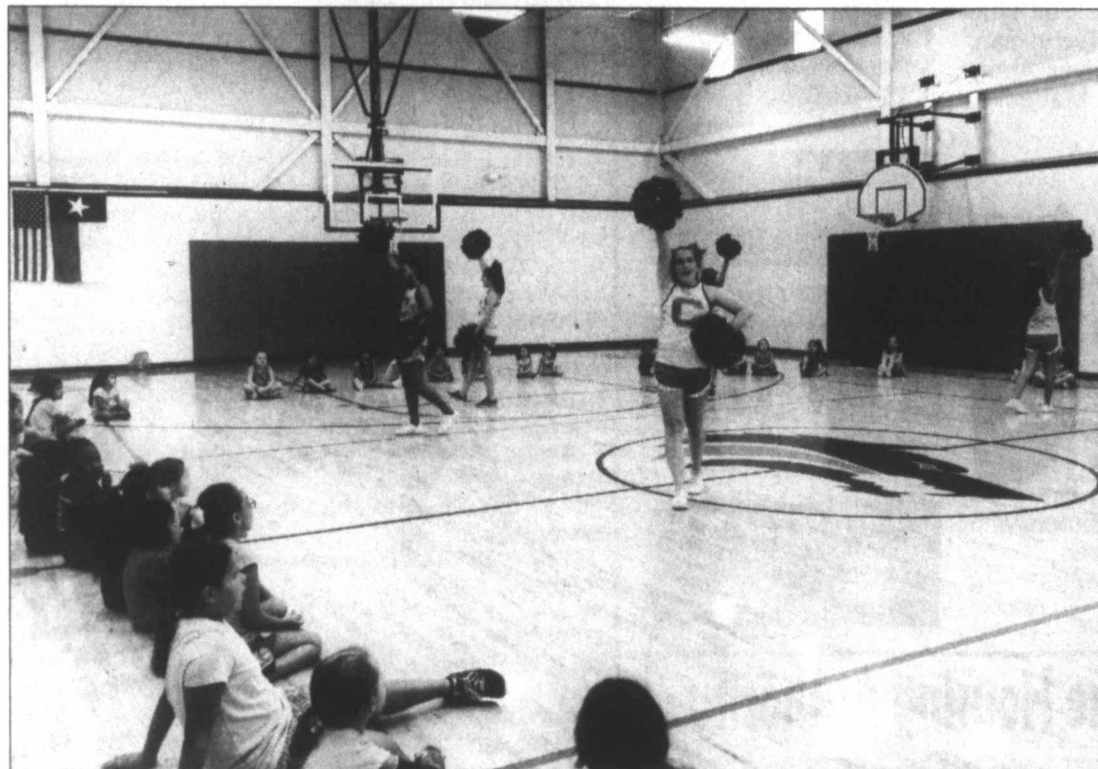

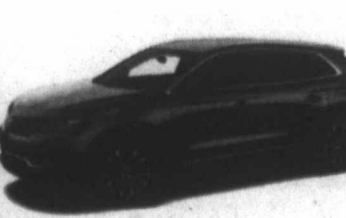

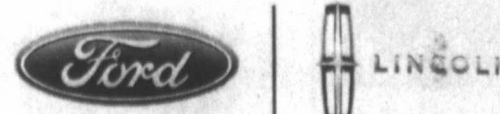

TCEQ seeking nominations for council

The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) is requesting nominations for three individuals to serve on the Irrigator Advisory Council. Two of the individuals must be irrigators licensed to work in Texas, and one individual must represent the public.

To be eligible to be a "public member", the person or person's spouse may not be licensed by an occupational regulatory agency in the field of irrigation. The person or the person's spouse may not be employed by, participate in the management of, or have, other than as a consumer, a financial interest in a business entity or other organization related to the field of irrigation. Council members will be asked to serve a six-year term beginning in 2019.

The Council is comprised of nine members appointed by the TCEQ: six licensed irrigators, who are residents of Texas, experienced in the irrigation business, and familiar with irrigation methods and techniques; and three public members. The Council provides advice to the TCEQ and TCEQ Staff concerning matters relating to irrigation. It is grounds for removal from the council when a council member misses three consecutive, regularly, scheduled meetings or more than half of all the regularly scheduled meetings in a one-year period. The Council members generally meet for one day in Austin in February, May, August, and November of each year. Council members are not paid for their services but are eligible for reimbursement of travel expenses at state rates as appropriated by the legislature.

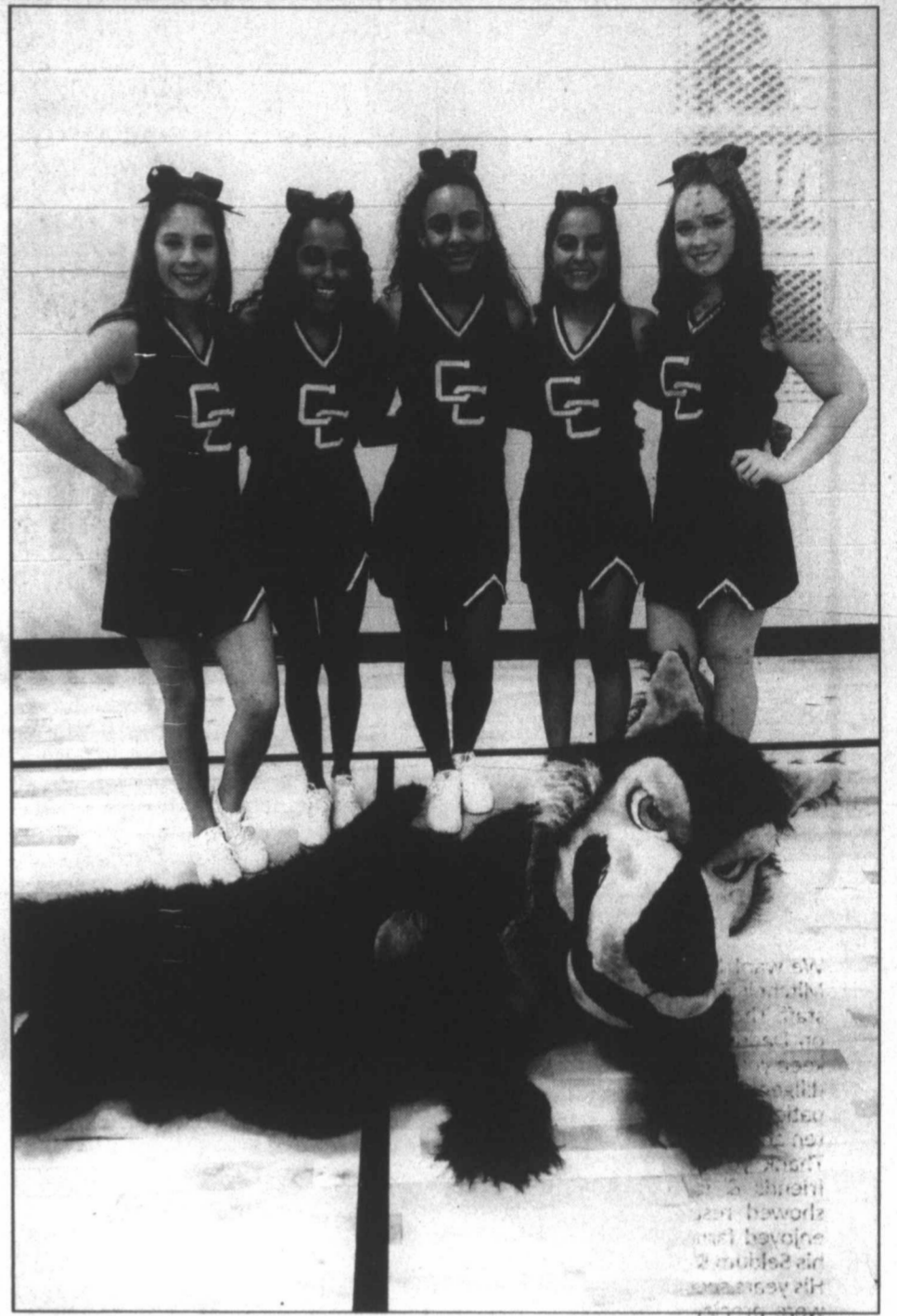
To nominate an individual:

- 2) submit a brief resume which includes relevant work experience; and
- 3) provide the nominee a copy of the nomination. The nominee must submit a letter indicating his/her agreement to serve, if appointed.

A person may nominate themselves by:

- 1) ensuring that he/she is qualified for the position;
- 2) submitting a brief resume which includes relevant work experience; and
- 3) submitting a letter indicating his/her agreement to serve, if appointed.

Written nominations and letters from nominees must be received by 5:00 p.m. on July 31, 2018. The appointments will be considered by the TCEQ at a future agenda. 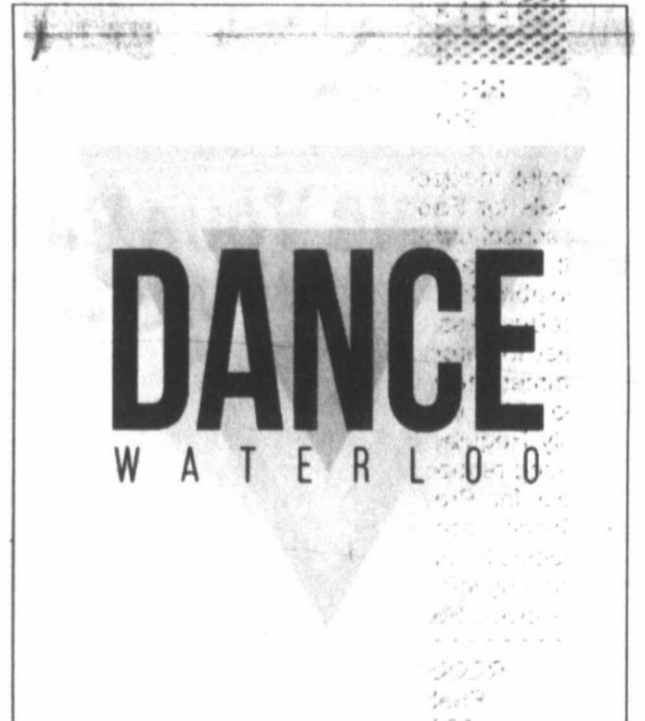

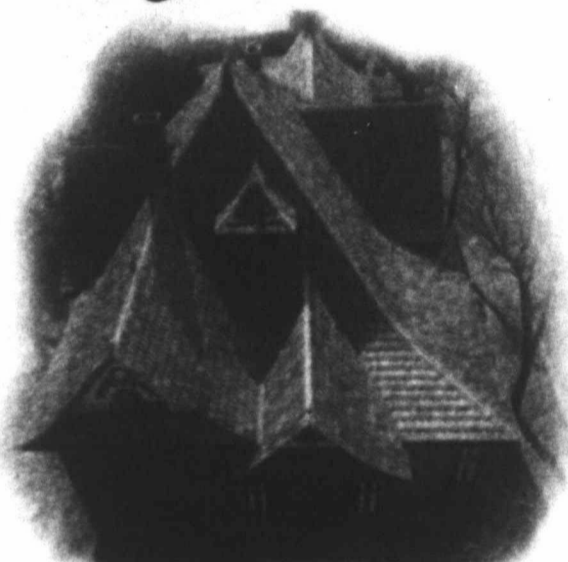

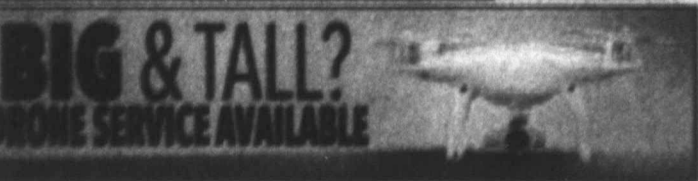
