Build More Sidewalks.

The question of sidewalk building is interesting a great many of the Goldthwaite people and the time is not far distant, the Eagle believes, when the subject will receive more attention from the residence owners and others interested in the growth and development of the town. Imagine every block in the "built up" portion of the town outlined with cement sidewalks of uniform width, with good street crossings at every corner. Plant shade trees along these walks and in a short time Goldthwaite could be made one of the most beautiful towns in all the state.

Some of the advocates of sidewalk building have suggested a city ordinance requiring the property owners to build these walks, but the council has not taken any action on the subject and probably will not, for some time to come.

Cone Johnson has notified the prohibition committee that he will be ready to take the stump for state wide prohibition on May 15.

The state-wide prohibition campaign is now on in dead earnest and the leaders on both sides claim to be certain of victory.

Detectives have arrested J. J. McNamara, general secretary of the iron workers association, charging him with being implicated in dynamiting the Los Angeles, Cal., Times building some months ago. The arrest was made at his home in Indianapolis and the officers claim to have found a considerable amount of explosives on the premises controlled by McNamara and to have other incriminating evidence. He was carried to Los Angeles.

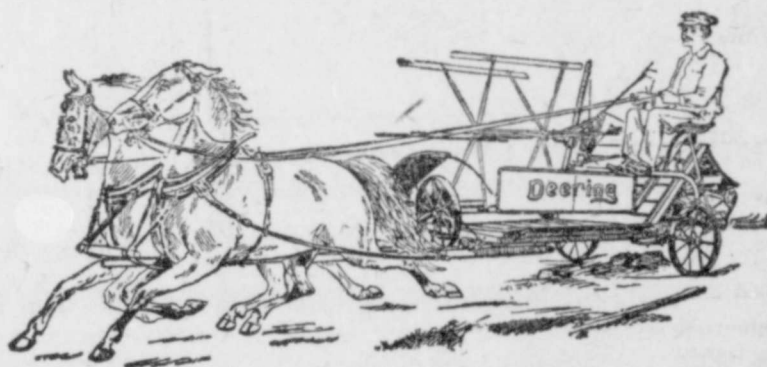

The city marshal of Trinity was assassinated Monday night near that city.

Rains all over the state have made crop prospects good in every section.

An armistice of five days was effected in a portion of the Mexican territory Monday, in order that terms of peace might be discussed and an agreement reached if possible.

A burglar secured \$2100 from the pockets of prospectors at the Cross S. ranch below San Antonio Monday night. The prospectors were asleep in a hotel and their pocket books were stolen.

The Gutenberg Bible, the first book ever printed with movable type, sold in New York this week for \$50,000. Henry Huntington of Los Angeles, Cal., was the purchaser. He also bought the third book printed with movable type, paying therefor \$12,000.

Burglars dynamited the post-office safe at St. Jo, Wise county, Monday night and secured \$1000 in money and stamps. Of this amount \$400 was in unsigned bank currency, but the burglars can easily forge the signature of the bank officers and make the bills negotiable.

Good roads should be the uppermost thought in the minds of all who are interested in the development of the town and country. This is an era of road building and Mills county can not afford to be behind the procession. Let's build and improve the public roads all over the county.

The state wide prohibition campaign was formally opened by the prohibitionists in a state convention at Waco last Friday. There were many prominent men from all parts of the state in attendance upon the convention and the expressions of confidence in the success of the movement seemed to be sincere and they certainly were enthusiastic.

A mistake in signals caused a collision between the Katy flyer and a freight train at Alvarado Sunday night and the engineer and fireman on the flyer were both killed and the two engines were badly damaged and several box cars torn to fragments. The trains were to pass at Alvarado and it is thought the signal to the freight to back into the siding was misunderstood by those in charge of the passenger train.

The committee on accounts in the lower house of congress has dropped from the list of house employees fifty names of persons who could not be found and whose duties were not known. It appears that these people were formerly employed in one capacity or another about the capitol, but most of them are not in Washington at this time, notwithstanding their salaries go steadily on. This is not the only place where the committee has found loose methods in transacting the public business. Another leakage found was where typewriters for which the government paid \$100 each had been handed out to various persons and no record kept of what disposition was made of them.

Find Cost of Crops.

One of the difficulties under which many farmers labor is a lack of information as to the cost of various farm products. There is little knowledge available that gives any definite idea of what crops cost because this must be determined by the farmer himself under his own conditions. The cost of producing corn on one farm where improved implements are used and a progressive system of management is in operation is much less than where it is grown without these advantages. Planters recognize a wide difference in managing different types of soil. Distance from market must also be considered.

The cost of the various crops should be determined by the manager in a series of years by keeping careful accounts of farm operations. Let the cost be ascertained each year for five years, then find the average cost per year. This will enable the grower to determine which crops pay the best profits so that the unprofitable crops may be eliminated.

On the farm profits must be estimated carefully and it is no small matter to arrive at the truth. In business where articles are bought it is not a difficult problem to ascertain profit and loss. But the farmer produces his crops by his labor, and his capital is in his soil and farm equipment in teams, tools, etc. To find the cost of crops an inventory of the farm, including interest, taxes, insurance, teams of labor, etc., must be taken in. The farm must be charged with interest on the investment, with labor and other cost of producing crops, and credited with the price received for the products. If a part of the crops is fed to animals, as will be on a well managed farm, then the value of animals and animal products must be taken into account. Agriculture requires the application of business principles and those who fail to apply system to business management seldom find it profitable.

At the beginning of the year is the time to take the inventory of teams, feed, livestock, farming implements and other assets and liabilities in beginning a system of accounts. Put your farm on probation and demand fair profits upon the capital and labor required to produce crops and livestock.—Farm and Ranch.

Interesting Lecture.

An Armenian with an unpronounceable name lectured in the Methodist church Sunday night and in the opera house Monday night on the conditions and customs in Armenia. His talk was interesting and entertaining and the large congregations appeared to be well pleased. His American name is Kallejian, (Collegian), but there are no letters in the English alphabet to spell his real name. As an evidence of the peculiar names in his native country: He was born in Hesenig, county of Mamulaterziz. He charged 25 cents admission in the opera house and spoke to a crowd limited by the size of the room. He went from here to Mullin.

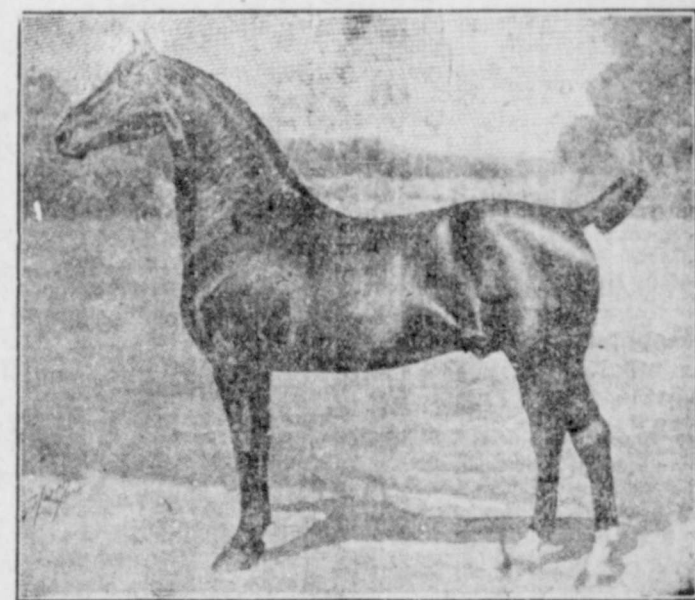

Bonds Defeated.

The election to determine whether or not this precinct would issue \$50,000 in bonds for road purposes was held Tuesday and resulted in the defeat of the bonds.
