TAX CUT TO BE 300 MILLION

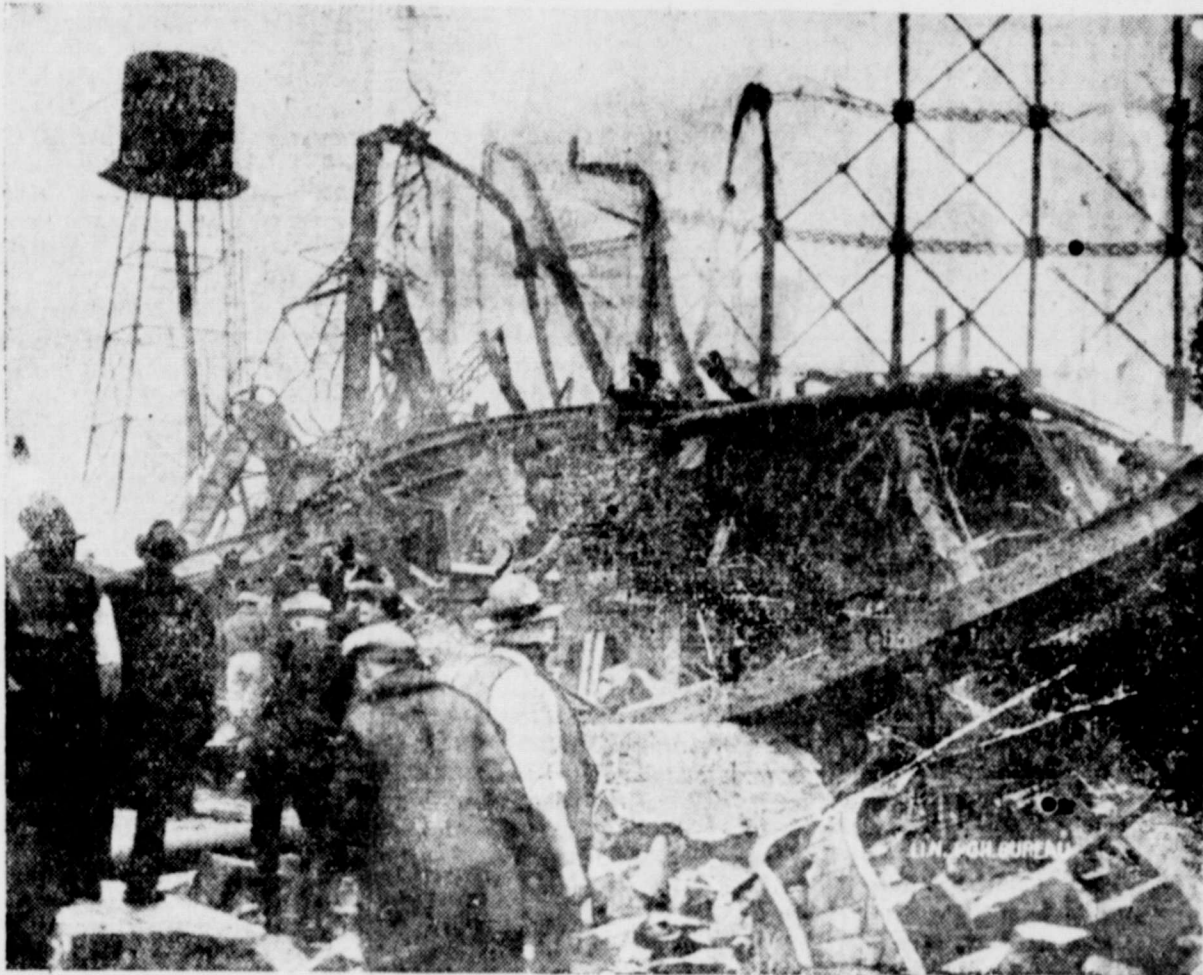

Suit Filed to Restrain Sale of the Sillix Oil Producer

H. W. Flowers, of Callahan county, one of the owners of the Sillix et al McMillan No. 1, has filed suit in the 35th district court here asking the court to restrain and enjoin L. D. Ladd et al from carrying out a contract in which deals with the sale of the Sillix well to the Vacuum Oil Company for a sum less than \$200,000.

The original petition was filed here Wednesday afternoon by Ben L. Cox, of Cox & Hayden, Abilene attorneys.

Flowers' suit is against L. D. Ladd, Ed Hill, B. C. Rhone Jr., Charley Dutton and the Vacuum Oil Co.

In his original petition, Flowers declares that he is the owner of 50,300 of the well and the 3,100-acre block. He alleges that Ladd and associates have contracted to sell the well for less than \$200,000. The properties he alleges, are worth at least \$1,000,000.

The petition says that the owners of the controlling interest, Ladd and others, are using bad judgment in selling the controlling interest in the well to the Vacuum company as they have been made better offers for the property. He alleges that the sale of the well, if allowed, will cause him great injury and loss and in his prayer asks the court to perpetually restrain and enjoin the defendants from carrying out the contract and for general and special relief that might be due him through law and equity.

Flowers was employed at the well for some time and is one of the smaller owners of the property.

In his suit against Ladd and associates the plaintiff is attempting to prevent them from selling the controlling interest in the discovery well and only producer in Runnels county, which has been averaging approximately 100 barrels of 45 gravity oil since August 27.

This is the latest of several civil suits arising out of the bringing in of this well.

According to an announcement made here several days ago by H. A. McLean, of this city, also a minor owner, one-half interest in the well and of the 3,100-acre drilling block has been sold to the Vacuum Oil Company. He did not make public the consideration but it was rumored to be around \$135,000 and for the drilling of two wells on the block by Vacuum.

If the deal has not already been made this will probably hold.

ROCKEFELLER BUYS JAPANESE SCREEN

TOKYO, Nov. 16.—One of the two famous Soami Japanese screens, in the possession of the Murai family of bankers for generations, has been sold to John D. Rockefeller, Jr. The other, also owned by the Murais, has been turned over to Prince Chichibu, heir-apparent to the throne.

visit to Japan in 1922. At that time the Murai family would not consider a sale. But when the treasures were put up at auction this fall, a Tokyo art dealer bought the screen in behalf of Mr. Rockefeller, paying a reported price of \$15,000.

PARENTS BLAMED FOR PETTING BY STUDENTS; MAY GET JAIL TERMS

(By International News Service)
CLEVELAND, Nov. 17.—Parents of student "petters" have been promised jail terms in Cuyahoga county by judges of the juvenile court bench, according to Juvenile Court Judge Harry L. E. Eastman. Judicial machinery is being oiled preparatory to making "examples" of parents who permit delinquency among their children.

"Petting, illegal operation of autos and general juvenile delinquency can be traced to the door of parents in nine cases out of 19 cases," Judge Eastman claims. "In the majority of cases the young people are only imitating the high-stepping example of their elders."

The parent who is out for a good time, and thereby sets a bad example is the guilty party, in the opinion of Judge Eastman, who anticipates putting into operation his theory of sentencing parents to jail for delinquent acts of their offspring, within the near future.

INVENTION EXHIBITION SHOWS ODD DEVICES

LONDON, Nov. 17.—The International Exhibition of Inventions which was held in London, recently, revealed many remarkable devices. Among them were:

A safety razor worked by clock-work.

A walking-stick which every time it strikes the ground provides a light for safety in walking.

A device attached to the inside of the hat which will keep the head clean and disinfect the hair.

For women there is a machine that will wave the hair, after which, it is claimed, no re-setting is required, and there is no scorching or frizzing.

For the benefit of people attending patriotic demonstrations an umbrella has been devised from which, on pressing a button, the national colors fly out.

As a companion to the singing kettle, there is a saucepan lid on which a bell rings when the boiling point is reached.

Another interesting invention is the "air bicycle", on which a rider sets his sails, and is carried from one hilltop to another.

Gold Rush at Denver Booms Newlin Gulch

DENVER, Nov. 17.—A "gold rush," reminiscent of the days of '59, when ox cart caravans crossed the plains containing pioneers in search of the valuable metal that made Colorado famous, is being re-enacted within ten miles of Denver.

Hundreds of persons have flocked to the Newlin Gulch district, south of Denver, where development work is under way and where already large quantities of the precious metal have been taken from a newly discovered gold reef, believed by many to be one of the most valuable ever found in Colorado.

Several leases have been let to prospectors, all containing the provision that they sink a shaft to a depth of at least 75 feet.

It is thought by some geologists that the deposit may resemble the famous Rand Reef, Transvaal District, South Africa, and precautions are also being taken to unearth any deposits of platinum that might be hidden at a depth.

Gold on Surface

Officials of a placer gold company who have been taking gold from the surface in profitable quantities since the first of September, believe the deposit is situated in an old volcano crater. Others forward the opinion, however, that all the gold found there has been washed down from the nearby mountains.

The metal now being panned assays at \$20.10 an ounce. The 338 million dollars of gold mined in Cripple Creek prior to January 1, 1927, averaged between \$18 and 19 per ounce. Pure gold is worth \$20.67 an ounce.

Gold is being panned daily by hand in the newly discovered area and the placer company has a machine of recent invention that pans ore automatically.

Belief that the discovery is producing gold local to the area is expressed by several mining engineers, although some have contended that the metal panned has been washed down from the mountains.

The fact that the placer gold is jagged-edged and rough indicates, according to those who favor the "local area" contention, that the metal is from a reef in the district, and not from a distance.

Commenting on his belief that the Newlin Gulch discovery is a new reef of fabulous value, J. D. Caldon, 83-year-old geologist, who was a pioneer in the Johannesburg and Rand area of South Africa, declared:

Due to Old Volcano
"Make no mistake about it, this Newlin Gulch area is identical with the Rand area. The metal is surface gold, fine and flaky, and is identical with the Rand reef production. The surface rocks are the same and the entire geological conditions are very similar. I have traced the formation for more than fifty miles in a ragged, horseshoe shape, which indicates a gigantic volcano for-

mation extending over the entire area."

This volcanic eruption, according to Caldon, is much older in geology even than the great peaks of the Continental Divide.

"When the eruption took place," Caldon said, "possibly millions of years ago, the crater walls stood above the surface, just as they evidently did in the Rand. In the process of time they were eroded away and the reef, or crater, was buried beneath its own debris."

Caldon claimed there was every indication that the Newlin Gulch gold was finer than any.

30 SECONDS TO DETER- MINE HUNTER'S GUILT

AUSTIN, Nov. 17.—Thirty seconds will determine whether J. Gordon, of Gulf, Texas, is guilty of violating the game laws.

Gordon was arrested at Matagorda, charged with hunting before half an hour of sunrise.

The state game law recites that, during the open season on game, a hunter cannot fire a shot before "half an hour of sunrise or after half an hour after sunset."

An appeal was made to Will J. Tucker, state game commissioner, to settle the issue in question. Gordon claimed that he fired a shot at 6:09 a. m.

Tucker's decision, as telegraphed to Gordon, was: "If you can prove you did not fire the shot before 6:09 o'clock, you are safe by 30 seconds. The federal weather bureau man gives sunrise at Matagorda at 38 minutes and 30 seconds after 6 o'clock."

400 MILES PER HOUR IS PREDICTED FOR 1933

LONDON, Nov. 17.—A speed of 400 m. p. h. will be attained by aircraft before 1933 is the prediction of Major Oliver Stewart, an airman-author.

He prophesies that the speed of the machine of the future will look ever more as if it had grown than it does now. It will have polished surfaces, its engines will

run faster. A change of engine shape, may also be expected in order to eliminate the projecting cylinder banks. Possibly, the swash-plate engine, similar to those constructed in America, may gradually come into favor. Variable pitch airscrews will be employed. The pilot will be enclosed in a small cabin with a transparent roof extending some distance in front of him.

STUDY SERUM FOR SLEEPING SICKNESS

(By International News Service)

CHICAGO, Nov. 17.—A serum partially successful in destroying trypanosomes, organisms causing sleeping sickness, is being developed at the University of Chicago by Professor William H. Taliaferro. It was announced here recently.

While the serum has not been developed to the point of establishing a certain cure for the malady it is successful in arresting the spread of African sleeping sickness, which is closely re-

lated to the American form, it was announced.

Experiments conducted with a mouse, Prof. Taliaferro explained, caused complete recovery. Sleeping sickness germs injected into the rodents caused death within five days. Mice that have been treated with the new serum have been found to be immune to the disease. To a mouse given the serum three days after contracting sleeping sickness recovery was reported by Prof. Taliaferro.

Prof. Taliaferro stated he believed the discovery of the new serum to be a major advance in the study and treatment of sleeping sickness.
