Shopping season off to good start

Christmas shopping got off to a good start in Colorado City Friday as most merchants reported a brisk business despite extremely low temperatures that greeted early risers on Friday and Saturday mornings - traditionally the two best shopping days of the season.

Local merchants will have special sales throughout the Christmas season for the benefit of area shoppers.

The annual Courthouse Lighting Ceremony will be held Friday, Dec. 3 beginning at 6 p.m. and plans now are to have three sides of the Courthouse strung in lights to make it even more impressive than the first event last year.

The annual Christmas Parade will be Saturday, Dec. 4, at 10 a.m. in downtown Colorado City.

Besides numerous local entries already received for the parade, the general contractor on the prison project, Bill Harbert Construction, is planning on having an entry along with several sub-contractors, said Chamber of Commerce executive vice-president, Jay McCollum.

Entries will be accepted for the parade through Nov. 30 at the Chamber office.

Entries are also being accepted through Dec. 15 for the annual Christmas Lighting Contest which

is open to all Mitchell County residents.

All you have to do to enter this is to call the Chamber office. Judging will be Dec. 16 and 17.

First place in the contest will be worth \$100 and second place, \$75.

Third place will win a fifty-

dollar bill and a plaque will be given for honorable mention.

Some refurbished Christmas lights adorn the light poles in the downtown area and donations are being accepted for \$5 each at the Chamber office to buy replacement bulbs for these attractive Christmas lights. Also, the Chamber of

Commerce is trying to determine the date these lights were first used in Colorado City. Take a look at them tonight and let the Chamber know the date they were first used.

Also, the Colorado City Playhouse will host a special Christmas Show on Dec. 10 and 11.

Pecan Show, Bake-off set for this Thursday

The 18th annual Mitchell County Pecan Show has been scheduled for this Thursday, December 2, in the C.C. Thompson Room.

The show is again sponsored by the Mitchell County Extension Program Council Horticulture Committee and the Colorado City Area Chamber of Commerce.

Entries will be taken between 8 a.m. and 12 noon Thursday and the

judging will be at 3 p.m. that afternoon. Prior to the day of the show, pecans may be left at either the County Extension office or the Chamber of Commerce office.

Entries must be marked with owner's name, address and variety of pecan. Anyone is welcome to help process the pecans on show day.

Mary McMullen, County Extension Agent, states that each entry must consist of 43 nuts. The nuts will be judged on size, color, appearance, shell thickness, cracking quality, kernel quality and attractiveness.

All pecans entered must have been grown in 1993. Nuts must have been grown by the person showing them. Growers are limited to one entry of each named variety they grow. The grower may enter as many seedlings, known hybrids or natives as he or she wishes.

The Mitchell County Pecan Bake-Off will be held in conjunction with the Pecan Show this Thursday in the C.C. Thompson Room.

Entries will be accepted at the C.C. Thompson Room between 5 and 5:30 p.m. Anyone from Mitchell County can participate. The food exhibited must be prepared by the exhibitor. If a boxed mix is used it must be an ingredient called for in a recipe. Mixes cannot be used by themselves. Pecans must be included in the recipe as an ingredient, not just a decoration. Pecans used for the food items do not have to be grown by the exhibitor; however, it is strongly urged that Mitchell County pecans be used in all recipes.

Home Health Week will be observed here Nov. 28-Dec. 4

Mitchell County Home Health Agency, along with agencies nationwide, joins Congress and President Clinton in celebrating National Home Care Week, November 28-December 4.

This year's theme, "Home Care: The People's Choice," reflects the unanimity of voice with which the American public chooses home care as the solution to the growing long-term care problem. Millions of Americans of all ages need long-term care services, either because of a chronic illness or a permanent disability that renders them helpless to perform basic tasks of daily living without assistance. Currently, it is estimated that between 9 and 11 million Americans of all

ages require long-term care. This number could double by the year 2030 to more than 19 million.

According to a study done by Louis Harris and Associates, Inc., most Americans chose home care over institutional care for long-term care needs. "There is a pattern in terms of American attitudes toward health care, one of which is a real commitment to long-term care, especially home care," writes Harris, one of the nation's most distinguished pollsters, who released a survey earlier this year titled, "The Public Mandate for Health Care Reform in America." Eighty-five percent of the respondents said long-term care should be given a high priority within the health care system. By an overwhelming 79-14% margin, the American public preferred long-term care based on home care over institutional care. In addition, more than 80% of those surveyed favored a federal program to support home care for the chronically ill or disabled.

"Home care is an excellent and cost-effective alternative to institutional care, providing patients a way to recover in a familiar environment surrounded by their loved ones and treasured possessions," said Sandra Galyean, R.N., Mitchell County Home Health director. "Modern technology has developed to the point where virtually anything that is available in a hospital can be provided at home. Considering the spiraling costs of institutional care and the growing number of Americans in need of health care, home care is clearly an idea whose time has come."

Proclaimed by an Act of Congress and by President Bill Clinton, National Home Care Week provides the opportunity to pay tribute to the thousands of nurses, therapists, home care aides and physicians who dedicate their lives

to providing the highest quality care at home. In addition, it provides the opportunity for agencies to focus national attention on the issues of home care.

The Mitchell County Home Health Agency was founded in 1985 and has been providing high-quality professional home health care services to Colorado City and the surrounding area since that time. Employing 40 nurses, therapists, home care aides, social workers and other caregivers, the agency offers comprehensive home care from the most basic assistance with daily living to sophisticated high-tech medical treatment.

Up 6.5% Local sales tax rebates show steady increase

Colorado City's monthly sales tax rebate from the State Comptroller's Office is up 6.5% from the same period last year.

Dollar-wise, the figure increased from \$38,766 to \$40,801. For the entire year, the rebates trail 1982 figures by only 0.83 percent.

The city has received \$343,860 in rebates since the first of the year.

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Veterans to receive increase in compensation payments

The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) has announced that disabled veterans will receive a 2.6 percent increase in their compensation payments, effective December 1.

The cost-of-living allowance was included in legislation signed by President Clinton on Veterans Day, November 11. Veterans will begin receiving the higher payments in their January 1994 checks.

Almost 2.2 million veterans are affected by the increase. Their monthly payments will now range

from \$87 for a single veteran with a 10 percent disability rating to \$1,774 for a single veteran with a 100 percent disability rating.

Also affected are more than 340,000 survivors of veterans or service members who died from service-connected causes.

Veterans whose service-connected disabilities are rated 30 percent or higher may receive additional allowances for dependents, based on the number of dependents and extent of disability.

Windbreak trees sold to two-thirds of state

Reaching from the Panhandle to the Gulf Coast of Texas, the Texas Forest Service delivers windbreak trees to almost two-thirds of the state.

Bob Fewin, area forester at the agency's West Texas nursery in Lubbock, said they sell trees to nearly every county west of Interstate 35. Fewin has been involved with windbreak sales for the Forest Service, an agency of the Texas A&M University System, since 1971.

With so much territory to cover, the Forest Service lets the local Soil and Water Conservation Districts handle sales in each county. Each district sends landowners a purchase list and the landowners pay the individual districts for the trees. In turn, the districts then place orders with the Forest Service.

"We let each individual Soil and Water Conservation District handle the sales and they buy the

trees from us," said Fewin.

He said the selling season usually begins in the middle of September and runs through the last week in March. Ideally, delivery of the trees begins in the middle of February and takes approximately six weeks.

"It works really smoothly if we don't get any ice storms or snow, but invariably we'll encounter bad weather," said Fewin.

"We rent trucks and drop off trees in nearly every county in Texas," said Fewin.

Windbreak tree planting is a year-round job for the Forest Service's West Texas nursery. Fewin said they begin sowing seed in May, fertilize all summer and begin digging the trees out of the ground normally the first week in December and put them in cold storage until delivery.

"We take orders for around 2,500 landowners and sell trees directly to about 115 Soil and Water Conservation Districts," said Fewin. "We sell everything; there's a demand for more trees than can be produced."

While the individual districts are free to increase the prices they sell the trees for, the Forest Service itself only makes enough money from sales to cover their operating expenses, Fewin said.

Landowners typically use the trees for farmstead windbreaks, livestock protection, living snow fences and habitat for wildlife. Fewin said the future of the program looks promising and will continue to grow. Although the nursery in West Texas started off slow due to an initial lack of acceptance from landowners, it has overcome many obstacles in the last 15 years. Planting windbreak trees is now virtually maintenance free.

"The whole purpose of the nursery is to make it economical for landowners to plant a lot of trees," Fewin said. "We want it to be relatively inexpensive to purchase good, quality trees."

What the public does not like about lawyers

Preliminary data from a public survey on lawyer image in Texas hasn't surprised State Bar officials one bit. The two areas most mentioned as needing changes are primary goals of this year's State Bar president, Lonny Morrison of Wichita Falls.

Respondents to the survey were asked, "In your opinion, what could lawyers do to improve their image?" At least 60 percent wanted lawyers to stop "ambulance chasing," and about 55 percent said to either eliminate or limit lawyer advertising. The random mail survey was conducted by a team of University of Texas public relations students and no prompting was given to the open-ended question.

"This should help dispel some of the concerns within the profession that the majority of complaints about lawyer advertising and direct mail solicitation come from other attorneys," said Morrison, who is campaigning among Bar membership to tighten the Texas Disciplinary Rules of Professional Conduct regarding lawyer advertising and direct mail solicitation. "For years, the Bar has been flooded with complaints from the public in these two areas. They consider direct mail solicitation following an accident to be a violation of privacy and a poor reflection on the legal profession. We agree."

Morrison and representatives from trial and defense bars worked closely with the Texas Legislature to draft bills that would restrict access to the names of accident victims and would require a 31-day waiting period after an accident or event before mailing a solicitation letter. The new statutes have been challenged in a Houston federal court and a ruling is expected in December.

The Legislature, while considering the direct mail issue, also instructed the State Bar to address its rules on lawyer advertising. Morrison assembled a task force and conducted eight public hearings

around Texas. The result is a revamping of rules with an eye on consumer protection. To become effective, the rules must be approved by a referendum vote of State Bar members. More than 51 percent of the membership must return their ballots for the results to be valid and a majority of those who vote must vote "yes" for the referendum to pass.

Morrison said his biggest task in coming weeks is to encourage all lawyers to vote. Ballots were mailed on November 19 and must be returned by December 20 at 5 p.m.

"It sounds like a simple thing but it isn't," said Morrison. "Many attorneys don't advertise, so they don't think the issue applies to them. If public opinion of lawyers matters to them, then so does this vote. The survey shows the same thing we've been hearing—the public thinks advertising is beneath this profession, in many instances, and distasteful ads that appeal to greed or emotions only accentuate the problem."

"Currently, we have no way of collecting copies of the thousands of advertisements in telephone books, newspapers, on television and on the radio," said Morrison. "This limits our ability to enforce even the rules we now have. Retaining a copy for our records will ensure that we know what our members are doing and we can better protect consumers."

Final results of the survey will be ready in December. Morrison said the State Bar board will use the information to develop future programs that target the needs and interests of consumers.



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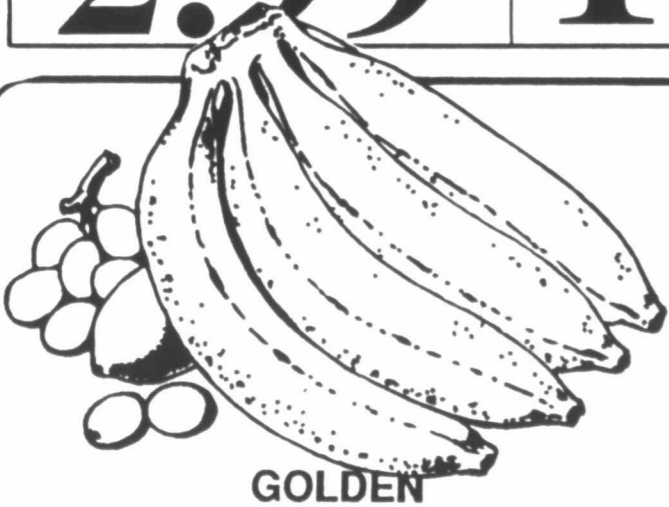
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
