

Gets Foot Cut Off Sunday Trying To Catch Freight Train

Glen Jennings, 21, of Hillsdale, Michigan, got his foot so badly crushed early Sunday morning that it had to be amputated. The accident occurred near the Texas and Pacific depot when he tried to catch a moving freight train and fell under it. He and his brother Charles were riding the freight and when it stopped here to wait for another train they got off to get something to eat and while they were gone the train started to leave town and in attempting to catch it Glen fell under the wheels.

He was given medical aid by Dr. W. L. Hester who called an ambulance from Colorado which took him to the Root Hospital where his foot was amputated.

Almost simultaneously with the accident here Charlie Byers, 45, of Tellico Plain, Tennessee, was killed by a freight in the Texas and Pacific yards at Sweetwater when he fell under the wheels near the passenger depot. The wheels of the heavy freight crushed his body, severed his head, partly cut off his left arm, and badly mangled his left leg.

CROP LOANS BILL SIGNED BY HOOVER

Washington, President Hoover Saturday signed the bill providing \$90,000,000 for crop production loans to farmers this year.

At the White House it was said that the president had received a report on the bill Saturday from the department of agriculture and he approved it within a short time after a visit from Secretary Hyde.

The measure, as finally approved by congress, was a compromise between the bill authorizing \$75,000,000 passed by the house and one calling for more than \$10,000,000, approved by the senate.

Measures for production loans to farmers have been passed virtually every year since 1921 but the sums were comparatively small until 1930 when approximately \$60,000,000 was voted after a severe drought which scared large sections in the south and west.

Roscoe—With the aid of fingerprints, officers of this section, including federal investigators, began a search for the bold bandit gang which early Monday morning looted the Roscoe Hardware Co. safe, knocked a knob off the post office safe, stole a sledge hammer from a blacksmith shop with which to knock off the safe knobs, and were scared away by pistol shots as they attempted to enter the Maloney Drug Store.

The Roscoe Hardware Co., owned by W. T. Thweatt, a former Loraine business man, is the heaviest loser, more than \$225 in cash being taken from his safe. Valuable papers, a collection of old coins and gold nuggets secured by Mr. Thweatt's grandfather in California during the gold rush of '49 also were taken. The robbers entered through a

Homestead Tax Exemption In Effect Now

The Constitutional amendment from taxation for state purposes up to \$3000 value, is now in effect, according to notice received by E. L. Latham, tax assessor of Mitchell county, from the State Comptroller.

The letter notifies Mr. Latham that all renditions for 1933 should designate the homestead property if any and set out the value thereof separately from the other property rendered by a taxpayer.

Under the amendment adopted by a vote of the people in the general election Nov. 8, homestead property is exempt from taxation from State taxes including general revenue, school and pension funds, but the exemption does not apply to county, special road school or city taxes. A resolution is now pending in the 43rd Legislature to make the exemption cover all taxes. This amendment would exempt homestead property to the value of \$3000 from all taxes, however the amendment now in effect applies only to State taxes.

A farm homestead is defined as 200 acres of land in one or more tract. A homestead in the city may consist of a lot, or lots, with improvements and shall be used as a home. Only one house can be included in the exemption.

Farm Loan Terms Are Made Easier

Tenant farmers can now obtain loans from the Regional Agricultural Credit Corporation without land owners waiving share crop rents, provided ample chattel security is given to secure loans, A. E. Thomas, executive vice president and manager of the corporation, announced Saturday.

In announcing he has been authorized by the Reconstruction Finance Corporation at Washington to make loans on this basis. Thomas explained that the ruling will mean much to the credit structure of Texas, since landowners will have their share of crops to take care of their own financial problems, such as paying taxes and meeting their own debt requirements.

Landowners' shares are usually a quarter of cotton crops and a third of grain crops, Thomas explained, and the new ruling does not apply to rentals arranged on any other basis.

Thomas also added that landowners will not have to wave any other liens they may hold on the chattel property of their tenants for the latter to secure loans from the corporation.

Committees of bankers, farmers and business men have been appointed or now being organized in every county in the State to accept applications from both tenant and landowning farmers. Thomas expects some of these applications to be presented this week to the headquarters of the corporation in Fort Worth or the branches in San Angelo and Houston.

Application blanks were distributed last week to the committee which have been organized in more than 40 counties and will be available in other counties as soon as committees have been formed.

One hundred and five less in the Loraine precinct are qualified to vote this year than a year ago. In 1932 a total of 387 poll taxes were issued in this precinct. This year only 282 were issued.

Only 1215 voters paid their poll tax in the county this year. Last year a total of 2144 poll tax receipts were issued.

Colorado is credited this year with a total of 600 poll tax receipts. The total in other precincts of the county are: Westbrook, 99; Spade, 41; Landers, 12; Cuthbert, 64; Carr, 26; Iatan, 19; McKenzie, 8; Buford, 48; Hyman, 16.

CAR REGISTRATION EXCEED LAST YEAR

Automobile registrations in Mitchell County to midnight of January 31, totaled 1,885, an increase of 402 over the total number reported at the same time last year. Registration of commercial cars and trucks are shown to be less than last year. For 1933 the total number is 229 as compared with 238 at the same time a year ago.

HOUSE VOTES DOWN PAY CUT

The house Saturday refused to reduce its members' salaries and insisted the capitol restaurants continue to function through federal appropriations but it did place a limit on the size, and consequently the cost, of congressional funeral delegations.

The price of haircuts and shaves, the taste of pigs knuckles and bean soup and expenditures for funerals formed the business of the day in considering the \$16,588,000 supply bill for the legislative branch.

Representative Whittington of Mississippi, and Mitchell of Tennessee, democrats, led a vigorous fight for reduction in salaries, but were soundly trounced.

Current Comment From Washington

The foreign debt problem proceeds in a satisfactory way to further consideration, though whether there is a corresponding progress toward a solution that will be satisfactory to the United States, is hard to say. France will withhold further payments for the present and let England do the talking. Britain naturally thinks that it would be best to wipe the slate clean, but states that she will not insist on so drastic a step, and is willing to talk matters over, provided that the plan settled upon may be regarded as final. In this she is probably right, since no stability in economic relations can be secured by a change that is likely to be superseded by another change. The British Ambassador to the United States has a long conference with Mr. Roosevelt, and appears hopeful and optimistic, recognizing however, that the real work will have to be done at the formal meetings between the representatives of the two nations, which are scheduled to open shortly after Mr. Roosevelt begins his occupancy of the White House.

Congress, like the Star Spangled Banner in the national anthem, is "still there," but has not done anything lately that appeals strongly to the popular mind; but perhaps the popular mind is not capable of going to the root of things. The Glass Bill has passed the Senate, and that is something. At least the phase "banking" has a ponderous and interesting sound. Almost anything may come from banking reform. During the consideration of the measure, the Senate turned a frowning face on free silver, and shelved it by a vote of 56 to 18. As inauguration day approaches, the capitol takes on the appearance of an old-time school at the last day of the terms. The party leaders, representing the teacher, realize that not much work is to be expected from the occupants of the desks. If a dais semblance of good order can be maintained until the bell rings, that is about all that can be hoped for.

The President-elect is considering the propriety of combining all transportation facilities

of the United States under one head; those who provide means of travel and transport by land, water or air being answerable to a single Federal control. Here is something which we can all understand, and there might be merit in Mr. Roosevelt's suggestion. Farming is not getting on so well just now, but it would be doing worse if the hired man had the say about the mule, the oldest son being the boss of the team, and the owner of the place holding the key to the shed that houses the plow and the hay wagon.

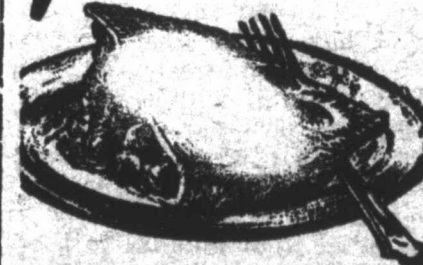

AUSTIN DISPATCHES

Austin, Feb. 3.—Moratorium of 60 days on motor vehicle licenses was granted Friday afternoon when Gov. Miriam A. Ferguson signed the bill granting an extension of registering time. The bill becomes effective immediately.

The moratorium will have little effect on the state highway revenues, but the counties will be delayed in getting their usual

revenues.

A proposed cut in state salaries that would save the state approximately \$1,000,000 per year if enacted was approved by the Senate Finance Committee Thursday. It would apply until next Sept. 1, when the reduced biennial budget will take effect.

Sen. Will Beck of DeKalb, author of the bill, would have the salary cut work on a sliding scale. Salaries of \$1201-\$1800 would be reduced five per cent; those from \$1801-\$2500 reduced 10 per cent; and those from \$2501-\$4,000 reduced 20 per cent.

This bill of Sen. Beck's does not affect constitutional salaries or the pay of legislative employees, but touches all others paid by the state in general appropriations.

Immediate prevention of any more foreclosures on mortgages on real property was sought by the House Wednesday when it passed a resolution asking the governor to issue a proclamation for that purpose until such legislation could be enacted.

A protest meeting held by the Galveston constituency this week resulted in a message to Sen. T. J. Holbrook stating that the people there did not approve of his attacks on Jim Ferguson.

Senator Holbrook of Galveston, speaking in the Senate Thursday on a point of personal privilege charged that six Texas rangers had been sent to Galveston to intimidate him and his friends as a result of his attacks on Mr. Ferguson last week. "At

whose order the rangers went to Galveston has not been ascertained," Holbrook said. "Jim denies having sent them, and ranger-captain Hammond says he went on a personal visit. Whosoever the responsibility, I think it a piece of cowardice."

Senator Holbrook charged that Jim Ferguson was trying to be a dictator. He has already shown his hand in the recent speaker-ship fight," he said. "He wanted to weld the House into a well-controlled body so that he could pass that bill which would destroy the highway commission and have the new one his own. I defy him to get that measure by this Senate."

Texas' "gin marriage" law of four years standing, enacted to prevent hasty marriages and marriages where the participants were under the influence of intoxicants, will be repealed if a bill which passed the House Wednesday is passed by the Senate and signed by the governor.

Vote in the House in favor of repeal was 93 to 36.

Sponsors of the repeal bill said that the existing law had utterly failed in its purpose of preventing hasty marriages and had only forced Texas couples to go to other states to be married.

Providing for a ginners' lien on cotton to cover cost of ginning, wrapping, repacking, or fumigating bales of cotton, the bill of Rep. R. A. Fuchs of Brenham was read before the House Friday morning.

The lien would last for one year from date of work done and in case of a landlord's prior lien, would be second.

Two of former Gov. Ross S. Sterling's reappointments on the state board of education were rejected, one confirmed, and Gov. Miriam A. Ferguson's appointments to the University board of regents were confirmed by the Senate in a three-hour closed session Monday night.

Ben F. Tisinger, Garland, and C. H. Chernesky, Houston, were rejected. Tom Garrard was confirmed to the board of education.

The Senate confirmed Mrs. Ferguson's appointment of H. J. Lutesher Stark, Orange, Dr. K. H. Aynesworth, Waco, and L. J. Sulak, LaGrange, to the University board of regents.

Action Monday leaves her free to name two members of the board of education for six-year terms. She will name three more before she retires from office, which, if confirmed, will give her majority control of the board for four years after her term ends.

Drastic revision of the Texas Judiciary system was provided in a proposed constitutional amendment approved unanimously Tuesday by the constitutional amendments committee of the House of Representatives.

T. H. McGregor of Austin drafted the amendment.

The proposal would establish a nine-judge supreme court, but contained a provision whereby

the number could be increased to 16 by the action of the Legislature if the press of business became so great that the nine judges were unable to dispose of the litigation.

The amendment would also eliminate the 11 courts of civil appeals and the district courts. The duties of the district courts would be taken over by the county courts.

A cut in the membership of both the House and Senate was proposed by Rep. Canthoy of Wood County Friday. Mr. Canthoy would limit the House membership to 21.

Sen. Ben O'Neal was chosen by the Senate Monday as a representative of Texas to be sent to a nation-wide conference of state legislators in Washington, Feb. 3, to consider correlated state taxation measures and methods to keep state taxation within one field without overlapping federal levies.

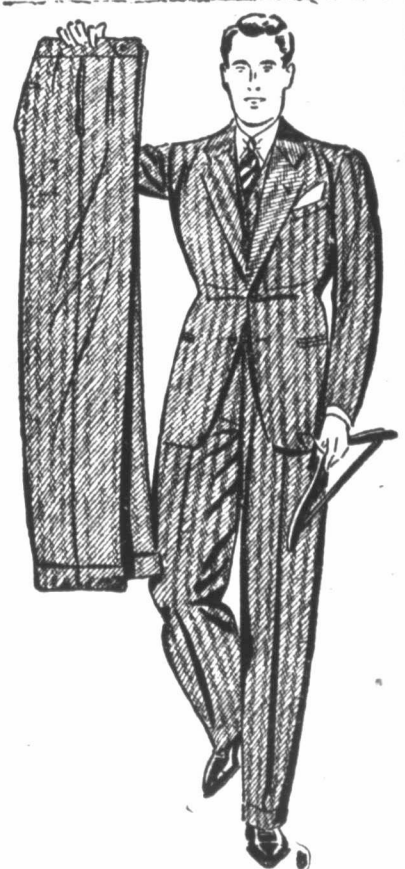

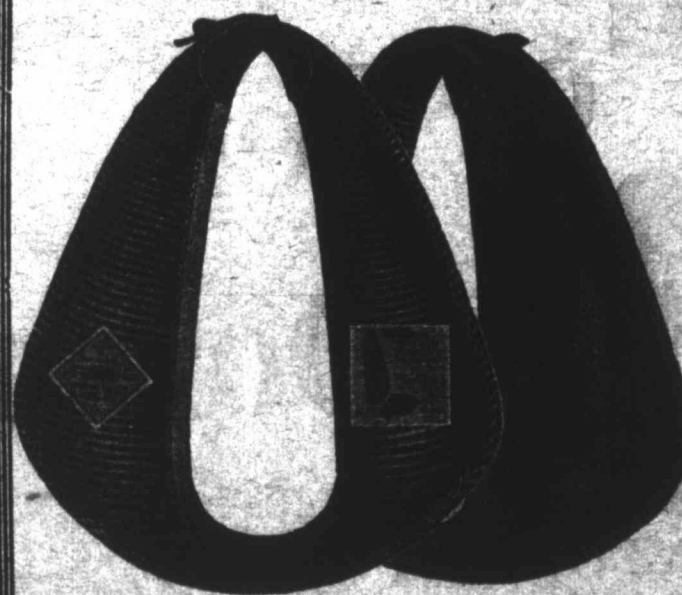

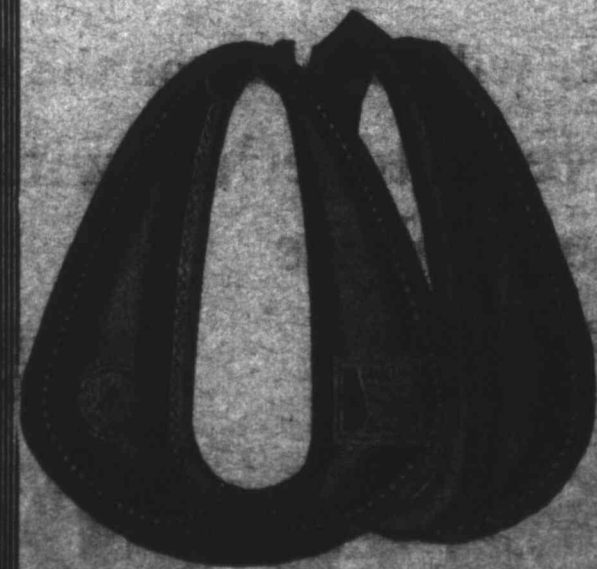
