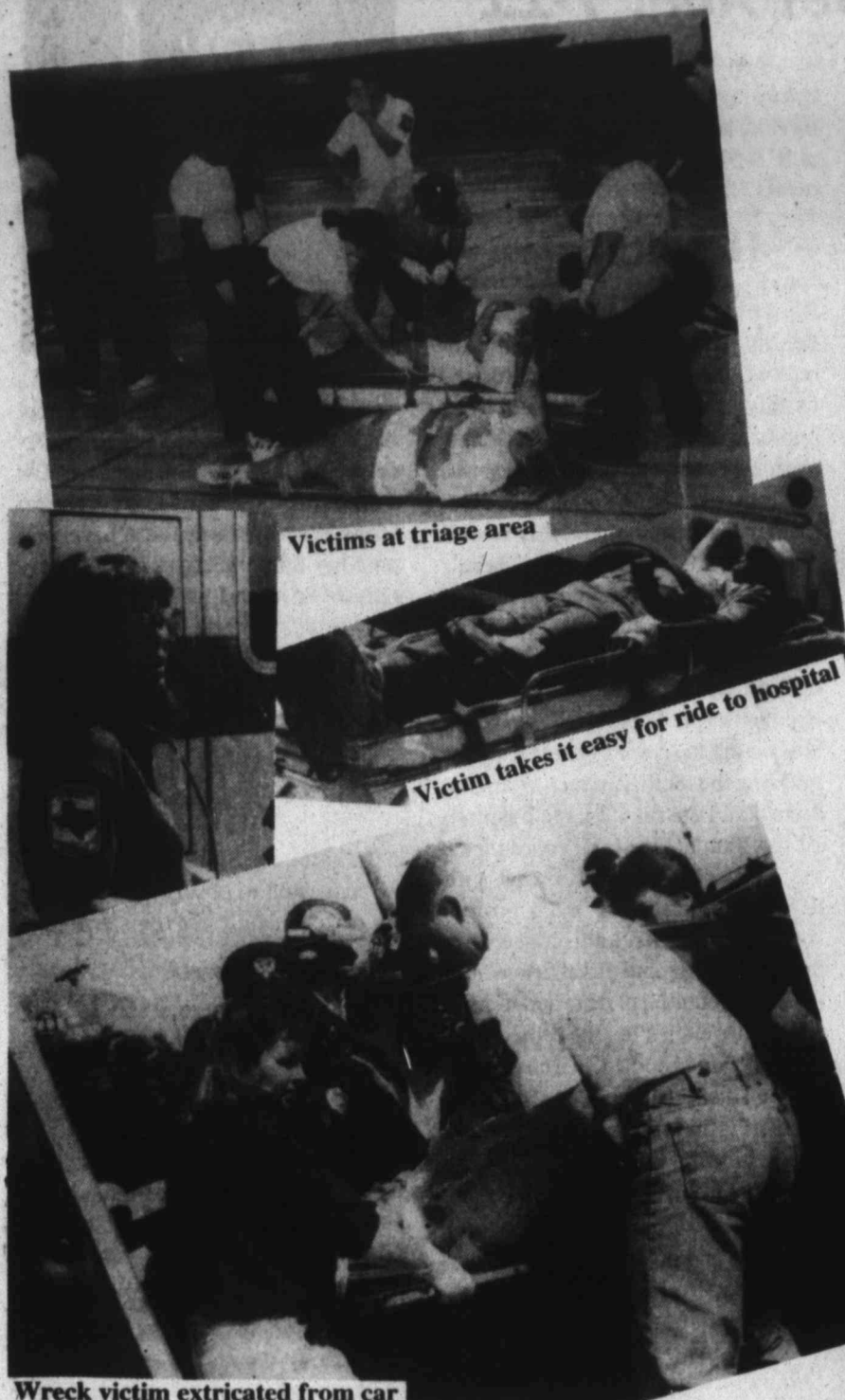

The only time a car won't start on TV is when the hero or heroine is in a desperate hurry to escape the bad guys.

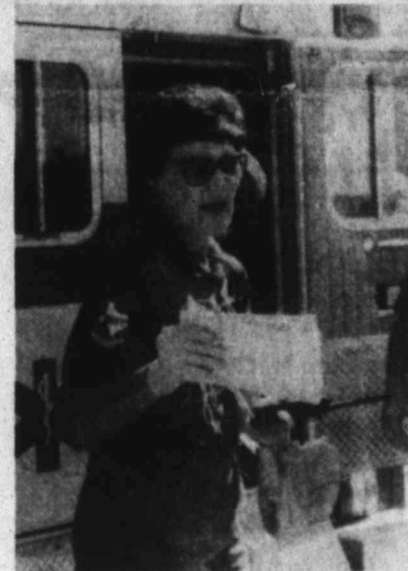
Also, nobody on TV programs set in New York City or Los Angeles ever spends the entire show period looking for a parking place.

Mock Disaster Drill Here Provides Valuable Training

Approximately 250 participants joined efforts in a mass casualty tornado drill here Saturday morning, working together to respond with fire and ambulance units from several area towns, as well as local law enforcement, city and hospital employees in the first exercise of its kind to be held here.

"I am very proud of our community, and all the people who participated in this drill should be proud of themselves," said Mayor Jim Solomon. "There were some communication problems and things did get somewhat chaotic, but on the whole things went pretty well... We identified our weak areas - it's just going to be a matter of clarifying procedures," he added.

Helping with the drill organization was Neil Coker, Lubbock EMS Program Director; Jim Majorowski, Regional Service EMS Representative, of Lubbock; and Tim Barry, of South Plains Emergency Medical Services (SPEMS).

EMS units from Tahoka, Lubbock, Brownfield, Ropes, Post and Woodrow participated in the drill, as well as fire department units from Tahoka, Wilson, O'Donnell, Ropesville and Woodrow. Lynn County Hospital employees, City of Tahoka employees, Lynn County Sheriff's Department, and Tahoka

Police Department personnel all participated in the event, and the Tahoka Independent School District allowed the use of the high school gym as a triage area where approximately 40 "victims" were brought before being transported to the hospital.

The drill started early for the volunteer victims, who reported to City Hall at 7:30 a.m. to undergo some makeup changes, including red karo syrup "blood" and some pretty grotesque-looking injuries made with chicken bones to appear as though splintered bones were coming through the skin.

Victims were then placed strategically throughout the area, including some trapped in cellars, with each victim tagged as to what type of injuries they had sustained. Some victims, unfortunately, "died" as a result of their injuries, as could be expected in any real disaster.

The drill began at 10 a.m. with a staged drunk-driving wreck with four victims trapped inside a car near the city warehouse, followed quickly by the tornado siren and a staged fire near the Methodist Church, and from there events became pretty chaotic. EMS, fire department units, and law enforcement patrols were dispatched to help victims, as well as volunteers driving pickups to help take victims to the triage area.

The drill lasted approximately two hours, and concluded with a barbecue lunch in the city park for all participants.

"I think we all recognized how complicated and confusing things can get, even in the best of situations," said Mayor Solomon. "But Tim Barry, of SPEMS, said this was the first exercise he had seen where the first half hour was productive - usually it takes longer to organize your efforts," he explained.

Participating organizations will critique themselves on their response to the drill, and representatives from each organization will meet together for a critiquing session in the near future.

"There are some things we would change next time," said Solomon. "I would like to do this type of drill again in March or April, before the bad weather season hits," he added.

"There were so many volunteers we would like to thank, and of course we can't list them all, but we would like to thank those who helped with cooking and serving the meal, the victims who allowed themselves to be 'made up' for injuries, the videographers, and several businesses who were especially helpful, including Tahoka Rotary Club, Thriftway, Lynn County News, Lynco Automotive, Witt Butane, and the Tahoka School," said the mayor.

Hospital District Approves Cumulative Voting Method

Lynn County Hospital District Board of Directors approved a cumulative voting method as a settlement agreement to a voting rights lawsuit filed several months ago by a San Antonio attorney, and will submit the plan to the U.S. Federal District Court for approval before seeking final approval from the U.S. Department of Justice Voting Rights Division.

The cumulative voting method, unanimously approved by a 7-0 vote of the hospital's directors last Thursday evening, will replace the current

at-large method of electing directors to the board if it is approved.

An ad-hoc tri-lateral committee composed of representatives from various ethnic populations within the county recommended the cumulative voting method instead of drawing up new district lines for single-member district voting. Hospital directors concurred with the recommendation and voted unanimously to submit the cumulative voting plan for approval.

In cumulative voting, each registered voter may cast as many votes

as there are places open on the board (i.e., if three places are open for election, a voter may cast three votes in any of several ways: (1) all three votes for one candidate; (2) two votes for one candidate and one vote for another candidate; or (3) one vote for each of three candidates).

In other business during Thursday night's monthly board meeting, directors voted to table any action regarding a contract with a grant consultant on the proposed retirement

facility project. Several hospital directors questioned the need for the facility, and said they would seek public input from county residents regarding the project, including the feasibility of the hospital's involvement in the retirement facility as well as the need for such a facility here.

The proposed retirement facility is a joint project of the Wes-Tex Resource Conservation and Development (RC&D) county committee and the hospital district. The RC&D is assisting in seeking grant funds for building the facility, which would be owned and operated by the hospital. At last month's hospital board meeting, local RC&D members met with the hospital directors and a professional grant consultant concerning the project. The consultant firm would research potential private and federal funding agencies for the project and write a grant proposal, at a cost to the hospital district of \$4,000 to \$12,000, depending upon the options requested by the hospital board.

The proposed \$1.2 million facility would be located on hospital grounds, and project plans include a 16-unit facility housing one- and two-bedroom units.

In other routine business, the Grounds Committee reported that the new water well was completed except for electrical wiring. Monthly bills and the financial statement were approved as presented.

Board President Virginia Griffing presented past director Jackie Stidham with a plaque of appreciation for his serving four years on the board.

All seven directors were present for the meeting, including Mrs. Griffing, Norman Ledbetter, Harold Barrett, Billy Tomlinson, Boyd Barnes, Jimmy Dorman and Mike Rivas, as well as Hospital Administrator Louise Landers.

Survivors include three daughters Anahara W. Frank of Houston, Virginia B. Wood and Suzanne Wood of Austin; and two grandsons.

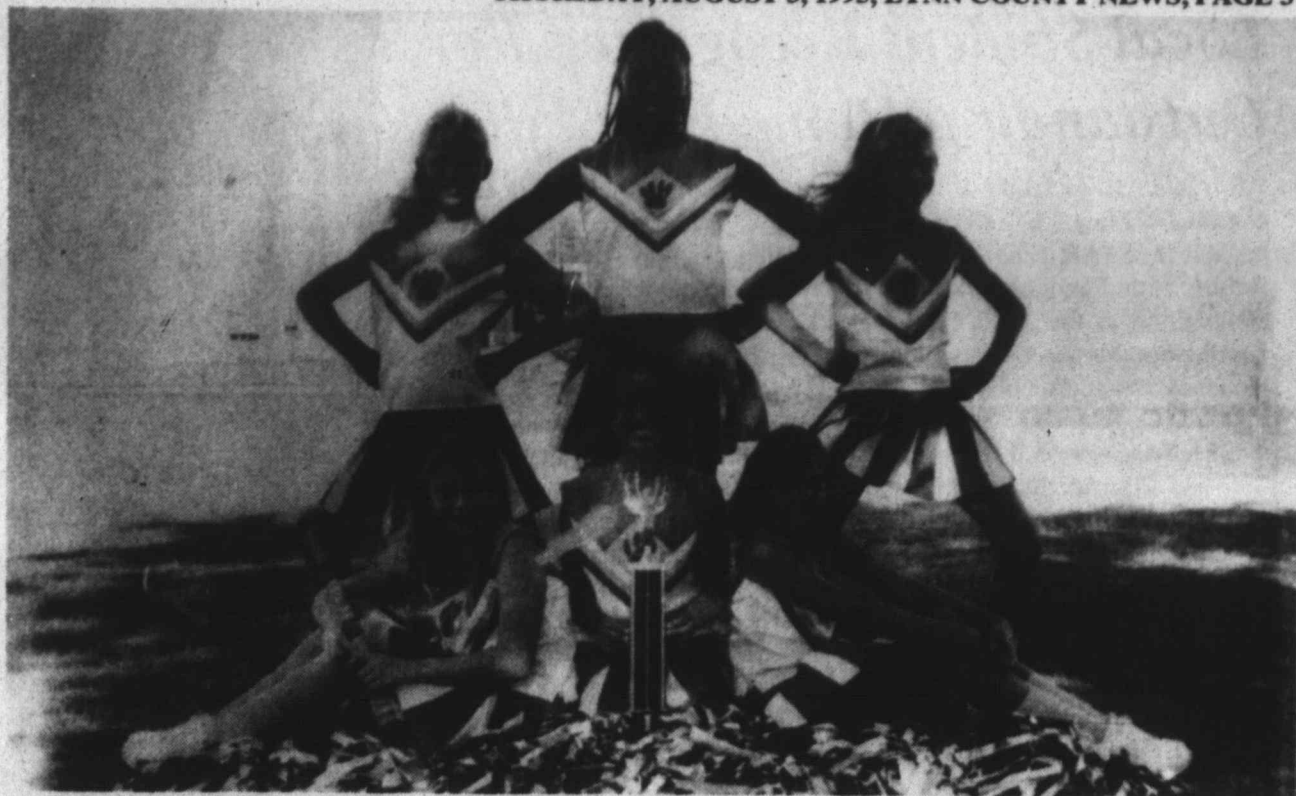
