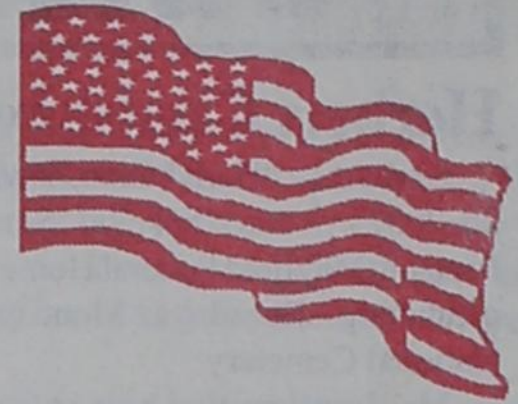

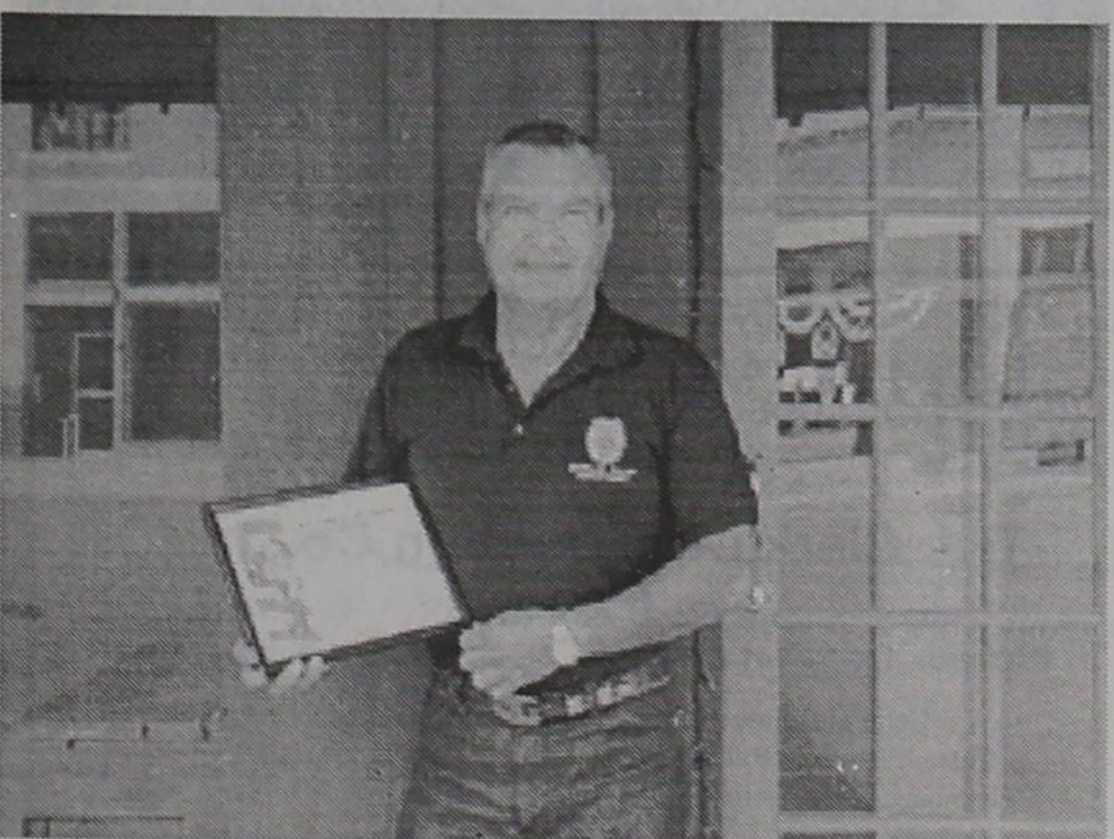

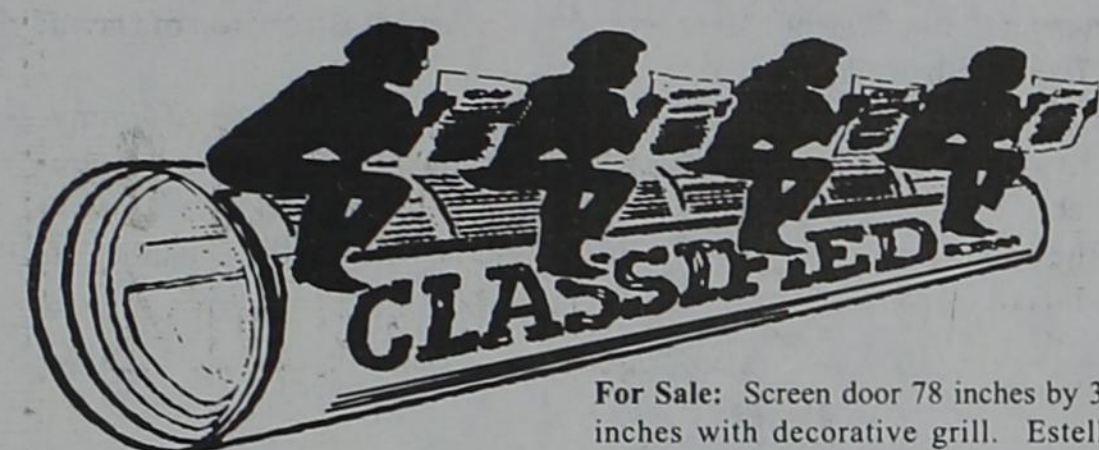
He was preceded in death by grandson, Conrad Clapp and sister, Jocelle Underwood.

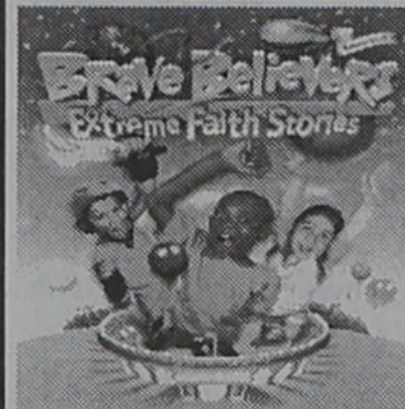

APPLICATION. H.L. Perrin and Erma Lee Perrin, RR 1 Box 120, Ranger, Texas 76470, and Ronnie N. Love and Barbara Ann Love, 5202 FM 571, Ranger, Texas 76470-7607, applicants, seek to amend Certificate of Adjudication No. 12-3485, as amended, pursuant to Texas Water Code §11.122 and Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission Rules 30 TAC §§295.1, et seq. The Executive Director recommends that notice should be published and mailed pursuant to 30 TAC §§295.152 & 295.158 (b)(8) to the water right holders in the Brazos River Basin.

Certificate of Adjudication No. 12-3485, as amended, authorizes H.L. Perrin, et ux and Ronnie N. Love, et ux to maintain an existing dam and reservoir on Salt Branch, tributary of the Leon River, tributary of the Little River, tributary of the Brazos River, the Brazos River Basin, and impound therein not to exceed 350 acre-feet of water. Ronnie N. Love, et ux are also authorized to divert 148 acre-feet of water per annum out of the aforesaid reservoir at a maximum total diversion rate of 2.9 cfs (1300 gpm) for agricultural use to irrigate 148 acres out of a 316.4 acre tract of land in the Thomas A. Howell Survey, Abstract No. 152 in Eastland County. The time priority of the 148 acre-feet of water to irrigate 74 acres at a maximum rate of 1.11 cfs (500 gpm) is January 2, 1973. The time priority for irrigation of the additional 74 acres of land with a maximum diversion rate of 1.78 cfs (800 gpm) is April 6, 1973.

The diversion point is located on the perimeter of the reservoir at approximately 32.347° N Latitude, 98.603° W Longitude.

The Certificate contains a special condition whereby the authorization to divert the water will expire on December 31, 2000. Other special conditions apply.

Applicants seek to amend Certificate of Adjudication No. 12-3485, as amended, by extending or deleting the expiration date of December 31, 2000.

The application was received on December 19, 2000. Additional information was received January 14, 2002. The application was determined to be administratively complete on May 3, 2002.

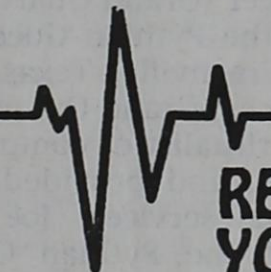

The Executive Director recommends that notice should be published and mailed pursuant to 30 TAC §§295.152 & 295.153 (c)(1) to the water right holders in the Brazos River Basin.

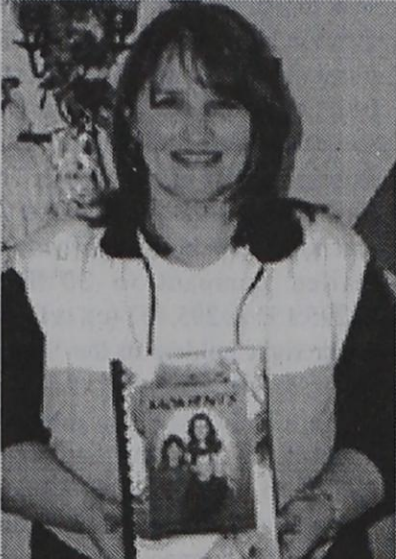
The weather was nice and cool and rainy most of the day Sunday. We got about an inch of rain in our community.

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USDA Emergency Farm Loans

Secretary of Agriculture Ann Veneman named eight counties in Texas as eligible for USDA emergency farm loans due to losses caused by drought, high winds, and excessive temperatures that occurred last year.

Veneman says the emergency loans will help farmers recover from losses due to severe weather conditions.

Haskell County was named as a primary disaster area, while Jones, Shackelford, Stonewall, Throckmorton, Baylor, King, and Knox counties are contiguous, meaning they are eligible for emergency loans.

All qualified farm operators in primary and contiguous disaster counties will be eligible for low interest emergency loans from the Farm Service Agency (FSA).

Farmers in the eligible counties have eight months from the June 21 declaration to apply for the loans to help cover part of their actual losses.

FSA will consider each loan application on its own merits, taking into account the extent of losses, security available, and repayment ability.

In addition to emergency loans, the FSA has a variety of programs available to farmers to help them recover from disasters brought about by drought and high temperatures.

APHIS and the New Department of Homeland Security

This week the House Agriculture Committee held a hearing to get input from the agricultural community regarding the proposal to move the Animal Plant and Health Inspection Service (APHIS) to the new Department of Homeland Security.

A number of folks are concerned about the impact that such a move would have on the ability of APHIS to monitor and eradicate plant and animal diseases, wildlife control, and issues relating to the export of US commodities.

It is clear there is a need to better coordinate the efforts of our government to protect us against the threat of terrorism. This week's hearing is a first step in helping us to develop a solid, common sense proposal.

RMA Provides Relief to Texas Cotton Farmers

The Risk Management Agency (RMA) has issued a manager's bulletin allowing for early release of dry land Texas cotton acreage that has not emerged due to insufficient moisture.

This bulletin provides that such cotton acreage may be appraised and released as early as June 25 in counties with a June 5 final planting date, and as early as June 30 in the June 10 planting date counties.

USDA to Report on Cattle Market

The USDA is continuing to study the reasons cattle prices have fallen in recent months. Many cattle producers believe the decline has been brought about because of manipulation by large meatpackers.

Secretary Veneman believes there are three more obvious factors that are depressing cattle prices:

- Russian cutbacks on US poultry imports have hurt all US livestock products.
- Japanese fears over mad cow disease reversed the steady growth we had seen in US beef exports.
- The drought in the Midwest has brought more cattle to market.

It has also been noted that the cattle currently coming to market are significantly heavier.

Beef Check-off Ruled Unconstitutional

Last week, a South Dakota judge ruled that the \$1 per head nationwide beef checkoff is unconstitutional and ordered collection of the fee to stop by July 15.

The beef checkoff program raises more than \$80 million a year, with half the money going to the Cattleman's Beef Promotion and Research Board, and the other half to qualified state beef councils.

The National Cattleman's Beef Association says it will appeal the judge's ruling. Secretary Veneman is disappointed with the ruling, and says USDA believes programs like these are effective tools for market enhancement.

Beef & Pork Production at Record High

The USDA has reported that last month's production of red meat was a record high for the month of May.

Beef production for the first five months of 2002 was up four percent from last year. The average weights for cattle headed to market were up 25 pounds. Average live hog weights are up four pounds from last year.

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Statement by Congressman Charlie Stenholm Concerning The Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America

June 26, 2002

Visitors entering my Washington office frequently comment on an item which dominates my desk area -- right next to the U.S. flag is a framed print which declares in large letters, "In God We Trust."

The Ninth Circuit Court in California would argue that such a plaque has no place in my official office. I have news for them: I care a lot more about what God thinks than what one circuit court thinks. I am a citizen who believes deeply in the rule of law but I believe even more that this Nation's trust in God is fundamental to both our past history and our future success.

Today's news that the Ninth Circuit Court declared the Pledge of Allegiance unconstitutional because it includes the words "under God" is outrageous and I cannot believe higher courts will allow the ruling to stand.

The authors of our Constitution made it clear that they intend the government to be neutral between religious factions and denominations. But so many of the precious documents created by our Founders, as well as our printed and coined money and many other facets of our government are liberally sprinkled with references to God, the Creator, Divine Providence and other evidences of the threads of faith. I believe that it is precisely this undergirding of faith which has kept our Country strong throughout its history.

I am pleased that the Senate immediately passed a resolution expressing its strong support for the Pledge of Allegiance and instructing its legal counsel to intervene in the case to defend the constitutionality of the Pledge. I am hopeful that the House Leadership will follow suit quickly.

Tomorrow morning I will stand proudly in the House Chamber to once again recite the Pledge of Allegiance and I have every intention of including the words "One Nation under God." As the events of the last year have taught all Americans to unite under the banner of patriotism, and as we approach our Independence Day holiday, I urge every American to renew his or her pledge to the United States of America, united UNDER GOD.

This July 4th, Let's Remember We're Still One Nation Under God

Washington, DC - Last week's 9th Circuit Court of Appeals decision that the Pledge of Allegiance is unconstitutional has caused millions of Americans to rise up in anger over this absurd ruling. Fortunately, the judge who issued the decision put a stay on it the following day in order to allow time for appeals.

My grandchildren who attend California public schools will be impacted by this foolish decision. I am deeply offended by this ruling and pray that more rational judges will overturn it on appeal.

While it is unlikely that this decision will stand, it certainly points out the need for the appointment of federal judges who understand the history of religious freedom in this nation. We also need judges who believe their job is to interpret the law, not create it.

For more than a year, ultra-liberal Senator Patrick Leahy (D-VT) head of the Senate Judiciary Committee, has managed to stonewall dozens of President Bush's federal judge nominees. These are judges who respect the Constitution and are committed to judicial restraint. They aren't judicial activists who seek to use their powers to engage in social engineering for liberal causes. This is why they're being held up by the pro-abortion and pro-homosexual Senator Leahy. His hypocrisy is showing on the Pledge issue. A year ago, he had dropped the words "so help me God" from the oath administered to Senate witnesses. Now, he's claiming to be alarmed at the court's decision banning the Pledge of Allegiance. It must be an election year.

I am calling upon all Americans to express their outrage at the Senate for blocking decent judges to the federal bench. One way to express this outrage is to sign an online petition asking President Bush to use his powers to make recess appointments of judges when the Senate is on vacation. Oddly enough, the Pledge of Allegiance decision has been met with a strange silence by the liberal National Education Association (NEA), a pawn of the sodomy lobby in the U.S. The NEA, which loudly condemned the Supreme Court's decision permitting school choice through vouchers, has gone mute over the Pledge ruling. The NEA can't be silenced in its condemnation of vouchers and a persistent call for the promotion of homosexuality to young children, but why hasn't it spoken out about the Pledge of Allegiance decision? Parents would do well to find out if their local schools are having children recite the Pledge each day.

The Pledge decision has prompted the Senate to reaffirm the "One Nation Under God" reference in S. 2690, an Act that will undoubtedly be passed by both Houses very soon. The Act notes that on July 4, 1776, America's Founding Fathers issued a Declaration of Independence from Britain. In this Declaration, they appealed to the Laws of Nature, and of Nature's God and then boldly asserted: "We hold these Truths to be self-evident, that all Men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty, and the Pursuit of Happiness."

If given the chance, the 9th Circuit Court of Appeals would probably rule that the Declaration of Independence is also unconstitutional because it refers to a Creator and God. (One can only wonder how the NEA would react if children began reciting the Declaration once a week in school.) The robbed tyrants on the 9th Circuit court might also declare our Constitution to be "unconstitutional" because it refers to the "Year Of Our Lord" in Article VII of this historic document.

As we celebrate America's liberty this July 4th, let us remember the words of Thomas Jefferson, the author of the Declaration, who wrote in 1781: "God who gave us life gave us liberty. And can the liberties of a nation be thought secure when we have removed their only firm basis, a conviction in the minds of the people that these liberties are the Gift of God. That they are not to be violated but with His wrath? Indeed, I tremble for my country when I reflect that God is just; that his justice cannot sleep forever."

This July 4th, let us also remember the words of James Madison, known as the Father of the Constitution, who wrote: "We have staked the whole future of American civilization, not upon the power of government, far from it. We have staked the future of all of our political institutions upon the capacity of mankind for self-government; upon the capacity of each and all of us to govern ourselves, to control ourselves, to sustain ourselves

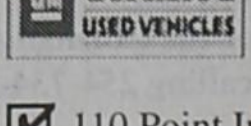
