Man Gets \$1,000 Fine And One Year In Jail

Thelma Floyd, male, was found guilty of sale of whiskey in a dry area by a Garza county jury Monday and fined \$1000 and costs with a year in jail.

M. M. Webb pleaded guilty to the charge of transporting liquor in a dry area and paid a fine of \$300 and costs. Judge H. M. Snowden found J. E. Junell of Knox City guilty on two charges of swindling by worthless check. He was fined \$15 and costs and \$25 and costs.

Kenneth Finchum was found guilty of swindling by worthless check and given a 30-day jail sentence. Mike Delocier has been charged in county court with driving while intoxicated. He is out on bond, David Willis, county attorney reports.

Paving Engineer Comes Here Today for Checkup

Bob Phillips, Holland Page engineer from Lamesa, will be in Post today to check on the paving situation, Mrs. Lorene Benson, city secretary has been informed.

Twelve blocks have been completely signed up, says Mayor T. L. Jones. Mrs. Benson has been personally contacting property owners in an effort to get the required 20 blocks signed up. Jones reminded once again of the rapidly rising construction costs and scarcity of materials which may prohibit paving at a later date.

"Once again, I want to urge people to come in and sign up. Post needs paving and you voted for it. Let's not let it go by default," he said. Church congregations have approved paving on their frontage, Jones said.

Property owners can sign mechanics' liens against the property and thus get two years to pay for the paving. A down payment of one-third will be required, with another third coming in a year and the remainder a year later. The contractor has asked once to be released from the contract. City officials are making every effort to get the paving started.

BLIND AND DEAF COCKER GETS LOST

Eagle, 16-year-old Cocker Spaniel belonging to Mr. and Mrs. Tom Bouchier and Ronnie wandered away from home Tuesday night and was lost for almost 24 hours.

Eagle is blind and deaf and walks with difficulty. It has been years since she was out of the Bouchier yard, but Tuesday they left the door propped open to bring in some luggage and she wandered away.

Thirteen years ago, Eagle was lost and recovered through an ad run in the Post Dispatch. Late yesterday Mrs. Bouchier and Ronnie after a day of fruitless searching decided to try the Dispatch again. And they were more successful than they expected to be.

Beth Hamilton had found Eagle Tuesday night and informed the Dispatch. She kept the dog in her back yard until the happy Bouchiers came and got her late yesterday afternoon. "If Beth hadn't kept her, I'm sure she would have been harmed because she is so unable to take care of herself," said Mrs. Bouchier in expressing her thanks.

Prominent Post Physician Dies In Galveston

Doctor Glenn E. Kahler, 39, one of Post's outstanding citizens and physicians died suddenly at 8:45 o'clock Saturday morning in the John Sealy hospital, Galveston.

He had been receiving treatment for more than a month after becoming ill while attending a medical convention there. Funeral rites were conducted in the First Presbyterian church here Sunday afternoon.

Doctor Kahler came to Post in 1945 after being honorably discharged from the Air Force with five years service as a flight surgeon. Probably his most outstanding military achievement was that of establishing a station hospital on one of the first airstrips to be constructed in New Guinea in the spring of 1942.

Doctor Kahler has been active in civic affairs since coming to Post. Much of the progress and growth of the city may be attributed to his efforts. He spent much time at work on the modern, well-equipped hospital which is to be constructed within the next few months.

A member of the Presbyterian church and a deacon for the past three years, he has also served as Rotary president, Chamber of Commerce director, active mayor during the summer months, American Legion leader and District Boy Scout Health executive. After his graduation from Cameron high school, as valedictorian of the class, he received a bachelor of science degree from the University of Texas and was graduated from the University of Texas Medical school at Galveston.

While at the university he was a member of Alpha Omega Alpha, a fraternity composed of the 10 per cent of the students having the highest scholastic records. He was also a member of Phi Beta Pi, medical fraternity. Upon his graduation from medical school he was associated with a Wichita Falls hospital for five years, prior to entering the army.

Two Townsites And Wildcat Top Oil News

Two townsites locations, a wildcat on the OS ranch and an offset to the new Tobe-Strawn pool of Southeast Garza county just about covers the oil news this week in Post and Garza county.

Bright, Schiff and Kennedy have completed rotary operations on townsites wells in Units 10 and 17. Unit 17 well is behind the Garza hotel and Unit 10 is behind the Methodist church. Both were to be drilled to a depth of 3100 feet.

Seaboard Oil and Republic Natural Gas, Dallas, will drill a Permian wildcat 12 miles east and south of Post in the west part of the company's OS ranch block. Hole is projected to 4000 feet. Starting date is not known.

Humble Oil and Refining company have started the No. 1 Jeff D. Justice, a quarter mile south offset to the Tobe-Strawn pool well three miles south of Justiceburg. The No. 1 Justice heirs, discovery well, was completed in February at some 7400 feet.

The No. 1 Jeff D. Justice is slated to 7500 feet and operations are to begin in the immediate future. Location is three and one-half miles southwest of Justiceburg.

Operations are tight on the No. 1 Rex and Ralph Welch well nine and one-half miles northeast of Post, slated Ellenburger wildcat. Last report showed drilling below 6400 feet with no shows reported.

They decided that each board member should bring two chamber members to the June meeting when the budget will be discussed, along with the program of work.

Cotton Plan Price Support Given By PMA

Mike E. Custer, secretary Garza County Production and Marketing committee advises that eligible cotton producers in the early harvesting areas will be able to obtain interim price-support loans on their 1951 crop at 29.68 cents per pound, according to information received from B. F. Vance, chairman of the State PMA committee.

The final loan rate will be the higher of either 29.68 cents or 90 per cent of parity as of Aug. 1, 1951, the beginning of the marketing year. As under the 1950 program, approved lending agencies may make advance loans to producers prior to the time loan values can be determined.

Vance said that the basic loan rate for 1951-crop cotton will apply to middling 7-8-inch cotton at average location. The loans will be available through April 30, 1952, and will mature July 31, 1952, or earlier upon demand. Cotton under loan may be stored in approved warehouses or farm storage structures.

Loan rates will vary with the freight rates to the mill area of the Carolinas except in Alabama, Georgia, eastern Tennessee, Florida, South and North Carolina, and Virginia, where a zone system will be in effect.

reached its constitutional limit of 80 cents, but the Legislature has empowered the commissioners to levy an additional 15 cents, upon the vote of the people, for a road tax. It can then be allocated as the court sees fit, Gossett explained.

"If this tax is not voted," Gossett said, "it will put Garza county in the position of having a fine new hospital with locked doors because of lack of funds to run it."

Gossett explained that the original sum set aside when the bonds were voted to serve as an operating fund has been absorbed in the rise in building costs, which will be some 30 per cent by the time construction gets underway. Bill Myers, representative of Wyatt C. Hedrick, architects, said that the 30 per cent figure was a conservative estimate of the rise since his firm submitted their original figures last year.

If the 15 cent road tax is voted, whatever portion needed will be allocated for operating expenses of the hospital, which is expected to take two years to start operating in the black, Gossett pointed out.

"Even if this tax increase is voted, the combined county and state rate will be reduced from \$1.52 to \$1.42 cents this year," Gossett said. "The state has lowered its ad valorem tax 30 cents on all taxpayers, making the combined total lower this year than last. I figure the hospital will cost the average taxpayer about \$4 more a year."

Gossett reiterated the necessity for voting the tax increase in order to operate the hospital for the first two years.

Post Stampede Clears \$2923 On '51 Rodeo

Post Stampede cleared \$2923.76 on the actual four-day operation of the rodeo May 23-26, Homer McCrary, secretary, announced yesterday.

A detailed financial statement will be published in the near future, McCrary stated. Total take for the four days including concessions, dances, entrance fees and gate receipts was \$12,344.34. Total expenses for the four days amounted to \$9420.58. Permanent expenses were not deducted from the \$2923.76, McCrary pointed out.

A meeting of the directors will be held Friday night at 8 o'clock and dates for next year's rodeo will be set, McCrary said.

U. S. VS. RUSSIA . . .

We have never been able to understand what the Alger Hisses, wealthy movie stars and others of that ilk see in Communism. What do the Russians have that is preferable to what we have? "The Connecting Rod," house publication of the Service Pipe Line company, gives some interesting comparisons in the current issue. The United States has 8,200,000 motor trucks. Russia has 428,000, according to the World Almanac. The U. S. boasts 41,151,326 automobiles compared to a mere 65,500 in Russia. We have 31,775 intercity buses compared to 6400 in Russia. Although Russia's land area is nearly three times as large as ours, she has only one-fourth as much railroad mileage. Some other interesting statistics are published by, of all people, the president of Calvert Distilling corporation. They reveal that while an American works seven minutes for a loaf of rye bread, a Russian works 31 minutes. For a pound of sugar, we work five minutes, Ivan works two and one-half hours. He works 10 and one-half hours for the same amount of butter we can get with 48 minutes work. An American works 10 minutes for a bottle of milk while a Russian works an hour. For a nice pair of shoes which costs an American seven hours' labor, a Russian works 104 1/4 hours. Russia's advocates point out the strides she has made in recent years under Communism. In America, college and university enrollment has increased 351 per cent in the past 30 years. Our people have savings of 136 billion dollars. Even our staggering national debt is balanced by an annual income of 90 per cent of its total. What does Russia offer any one?

REST IN PIECES . . .

"Rest in Pieces" is the title of a book of cartoons recently published by the Travelers' Insurance company. Drawn by Virgil Parch, the cartoons are peopled by well-known Saturday Evening Post cartoon faces. A tombstone with the letters "RIP" is drawn in each picture. One shows Virgil Parch's idea of the grim reaper grabbing out a motorist who will "Rest in Pieces" if he exceeds the speed limit. Another shows an inebriate holding a cocktail shaker ostensibly filled with gasoline and whiskey. Another man jaywalks right up to his tombstone, marked "RIP." Children are warned what will happen to them if they play in the street. Road hogs get their bit of advice. The woman driver is pictured giving a mongrel hand-signal and is warned. Lovers are coyly reminded that they, too, can rest in pieces, if they are inattentive while driving. Satan stands with a dustpan and broom at the bottom of a hill to sweep up the pieces of those who pass on the hill or curve. Cartoons are generally supposed to be funny. Virgil Parch is the man who draws people with prominent noses and chins and bristly hair. His cartoons are usually funny. Traffic accidents and fatalities are a very unfunny business. Each individual believes it will not happen to him. All the little cartoons drawn by Parch show the things everyone of us do everyday. When will we realize that we, too, are eligible to rest in pieces? Traffic accidents must be stopped by the drivers and pedestrians who cause them.

Texans In WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, D. C. — "The Burro Club of Capital Hill," organized only last year with John Hardesty of Texas, as its president, already has become a Washington institution.

The club, made up of 110 male secretarial employees of Democratic representatives, has built a reputation for lively programs mixing fun with serious business.

The club holds twice-monthly luncheons at which top government executives talk and answer questions. Occasionally the club throws a strictly social affair.

"We have to carry on a lot of business with these officials by telephone," said Hardesty in explaining the purpose of the organization. "Therefore, we'd like to know them personally, or at least get an idea what they look like. By the time we get through questioning them, we have a lot better picture of the way their particular agencies operate."

Hardesty is an aide of Rep. Omar Burleson of Anson. So many requests come to the average congressman that he must entrust many of them to members of his staff. A large number of the requests involve conversations with important federal officials.

Last week the Burro club had Dillard Lasseter, head of the Farmers Home administration, as a luncheon guest. In line with the policy of lining up speakers whose departments or divisions are in the forefront of the news, the club scheduled Assistant Secretary of State George McGhee as its next speaker.

Originally from Dallas, McGhee is in charge of the department's office of Near Eastern, South Asian and African affairs. The trouble spot of Iran, with its vast oil reserves,

is one of his concerns.

On the lighter side, the Burro club took a cruise about the Washington and Alexandria waterfronts aboard the District of Columbia's big red fireboat.

Hardesty's wife, Eddis Lee, hails from Lueders. They have a son, Johnny, 4.

A two-year-old orphan girl of Japanese-American blood will soon be able to come to America with her adopted parents, Air Force Sergeant E. H. Shelton, Jr., of Palestine, and Mrs. Shelton.

The East Texas airman and his wife, living in Japan for three years, fell in love with the little orphan whose American father is unknown. They formally applied to adopt her and bring her to the United States, but learned that because she is half Japanese she is excluded under the immigration laws.

So they wrote Rep. Tom Pickett of Palestine of their problem. He introduced a bill on January 9 and asked prompt consideration be caused Sergeant Shelton was expecting to be transferred from Japan.

With unusual speed, House and Senate committees approved the measure. Last week President Truman signed the Pickett bill exempting Jacquelyn from terms of the immigration act of 1924.

Sergeant Shelton and his wife, the former Elizabeth Durham of Palestine, submitted to the congressional committee numerous references from prominent East Texans.

The Sergeant's father was the late Emmett Hank Shelton, one-time county judge of Anderson county and owner of a cotton gin and other properties in Palestine.

ROGER W. BABSON WRITES THIS WEEK

Real Security Must Be Based On Individual Character and Education not Armed Might

BABSON PARK, Mass. P — No one knows whether we will have another World War within the next few years or not. Russia will not start one this summer. Her crops must be gathered and the rivers frozen over first. The Chinese Communists waited until the Korean rivers froze so that their troops would not be dependent upon bridges. The same policy applies to Russia. The critical time will not be this summer but late fall and winter. If Russia does not attack this winter, it is reasonable to believe we will have some more years of cold war.

Real security cannot be obtained by military force or by moving out of larger cities. There are many cases in history where the military force itself has turned against the government and taken over the country under a dictator of its own. Hence, in building airplanes, tanks, and other implements of warfare we may be equipping Revolutionists in our own country.

Another possible enemy of security is inflation, which the military — instead of preventing — are encouraging. England "won" both World War I and World War II. The same might be said of France and certain other countries. The people of these countries have turned away from economic security for temporary military security. There is no doubt in my mind but what we would "win" World War III if it should come; but I am sure we would then lose economic security.

Before World War I, England was very prosperous with her colonial possessions and her worldwide holdings of shipping, insurance and other stocks. Today, England is broke. Her people have no economic security. If we enter into World War III, we might end up in the same way. Your money, government bonds and other investments might be worth only 30 cents on the dollar as our country would be burdened with a terrific debt. Therefore, use your influence for world peace.

War and threat of war undermines character. From a security standpoint, certain character traits, such as honesty, for instance, are

fundamental for prosperous industry, commerce and investments. Hence, our churches, schools and homes try to instill character asets into our youth. Security in peacetime depends primarily upon character and the development of the very factors of life which military service tends to destroy.

We criticize today the criminal underworld which has been uncovered by the Kefauver Crime committee. We deplore the exposures which Fulbright's committee has shown up in connection with the RFC and other government agencies.

We hear that Washington is honeycombed with graft and inefficiency. We wonder what the reason may be. If we will turn back the pages of history, we will find that the same conditions followed the Mexican, Civil, Spanish-American and World War I. The wretched conditions today are due to the breaking down of character caused by World War II.

For security, locate where you are not likely to be bombed. Buy a place in some small agricultural community 60 miles from a vulnerable city. Use this as a summer place and as a protection. Build up bank deposits in medium-sized, safe cities for reinvestment during the next panic. The nation's banking situation as a whole is excellent and you can safely buy stock in your local bank if it is safe from bombing. Good common stocks of companies safe from bombing should be good investments for the long pull, although they will fluctuate with general business conditions. In the case of corporate bonds or preferred stocks, you should buy only "convertibles."

The most important need for security is to invest in good health and character—together with a family of well-educated and spiritually-minded children. See that your children are taught not only industry, honesty and law-abidance, but also a sound religious faith which will stand by them when trouble comes. Furthermore, train them for some specific line of work, such as the medical, engineering and business professions, or the essential trades. In other words, invest in education.

B. Kelly, Garza's First Sheriff, Comes to Area in 1892

colorful Garza old. The OS brand was started in Coleman county by a Mr. Overall and a Mr. Short. Long bought the brand from them.

Kelly, Garza's first sheriff, was born in Coryell county. At the age of 8 years, he moved to Hamilton county. Before the family moved to Fisher county in 1887, their home had been cut off from Hamilton and was in newly-organized Mills county. His father brought 200 head of cattle up from Mills to Fisher.

Young Kelly came in 1892 to this country, a part of Borden county at the time, with his pony. His father was acquainted with the Longs and he had a job with the OS when he came.

At that time there were no wells on the OS property. Cattle were watered in tanks and by scraping the Yellowhouse river. Two horses or mules were hitched to a scraper, which was something like a Fresno, and driven up and down in the river. Not many ranches owned the land, they just leased around water. One long fence was built on the east of the OS pasture which contained 200 sections.

Llano to West

West of the OS was the Llano; east, Scoggin and Brown; north, Spur (now Swenson); and south, the Jumbo spreads. Calves ran with the cows and all the rancher found with his cows were branded with his brand.

Miss Lulu Elkins taught at the Williamses, who lived on what is now the Faulkner place, when Kelly, her future husband, met her. He went to see her on horseback. Their main pleasure was attending dances. "She was an awful nice dancer," Kelly recalls.

The couple was married Aug. 13, 1899, in the courthouse at Old Emma. A Methodist minister, named Bentley, officiated. There were not many people there, Kelly says, although everyone in the country attended. Mrs. Doc Knox brought her children and came in a wagon.

For their honeymoon, Mr. and Mrs. Kelly went to Fisher county to see his father, in a buggy. It took four or five days and was a right nice honeymoon for the times, Kelly says.

At that time, settlers in this area traded at Colorado City or Snyder, although there really was not much at Snyder then. They drove cattle to Big Spring, as well as other places, Kelly says the last herd he drove to Big Spring was 3200 or 3300 calves after Long had sold to Connells.

Drove Herds

Kelly drove herds to Amarillo, Hereford, Canyon and Clarendon as well as Big Spring. Several men broke their legs on drives, he says, although otherwise not much happened. When men were hurt, they were sometimes put in the calf wagon, which was taken on each drive to haul the calves dropped en route. It was a regular long wagon with a big frame like a cotton wagon, Kelly says.

Canned corn and canned tomatoes were the only canned foods people knew in those days, he says. Diet on the trail included bacon, potatoes and sirup. They would kill a beef, then in the morning when it was cool, wrap it in a tarpaulin and put it in the bottom of the wagon. Then they would throw bedding in on top of it and the meat would keep.

A rich stew was made using all parts of the beef, known as county attorney stew, Kelly recalls. "It was really good, but so rich you couldn't eat much," he says. Frijole beans were common and occasionally the cook made a pudding.

Moved to Llano

He moved to the Llano ranch in 1903. As a cowboy, he made \$25 a month—and saved some. He was foreman on the Llano for \$50 monthly. He remembers one drive when 2000 cattle sold for \$14 a head, delivered to Amarillo. Twenty dollars a head was a good price then. But ranchers did not have to pay for their grass and did absolutely no feeding then.

At the Llano, he and Mrs. Kelly always hosted a Christmas dance. "We just moved things out in the yard and turned it over to 'em," he says. Different ones fiddled. People would come from as far away as Colorado City. Sam Wilks was also famous as a host for dances.

County Organized

In 1907, the county was organized with votes cast at the OS ranch. "We had to have about 75 voters," Kelly tells, "so we voted some of the horses who had names."

He was on the trail and came back home to find himself running for sheriff. Bob Willoughby was his opponent. "I guess I got more than 100 votes, horses and all," Kelly says.

The late J. M. Boren was named judge and the first clerk was Hal Murray. Dave Stiles was tax assessor; B. F. Wilks, treasurer; and a man named Harkey who was later whipped and run out of town, county attorney. Commissioners were Jobe Davies, Precinct 1; Sam Wilks, Precinct 2; Walter Roy, Precinct 4; and L. A. Barrow's father, Precinct 3.

There was very little trouble around here, says Kelly, except when they were building the railroad. The county had enough money to build a courthouse when it was organized, in the treasury at Gall, he says. The first court house was a stone building where George Sartain's service station now is. It had two floors, with a court room upstairs.

Stag Dances

Some times, there were stag dances, Kelly says. The men who danced women's parts wore slickers. Joe Smith, Cecil Smith's brother, could dance anything, Kelly recalls. He kept a fiddle at the wagon and one of the men was a good breakdown fiddler.

There was not much preaching until the county was organized, Kelly says. Mrs. Kelly helped organize the Baptist church here. Her sister, Miss Vena Elkins, taught the first school in Post.

Kelly recalls seeing a mule pump on the T-Bar ranch near Snyder, when he first came to West Texas. Llano had wells but it was much later before the OS drilled any. They had to drill along the river to get fresh water, otherwise it was salty, he says.

Kelly lives with his son, Elwood, in Ontario, now. He works around the house and yard to occupy his time. He left here last June, 1947. Post has really changed in the past four years, he says.

Mrs. Kelly died several years ago.

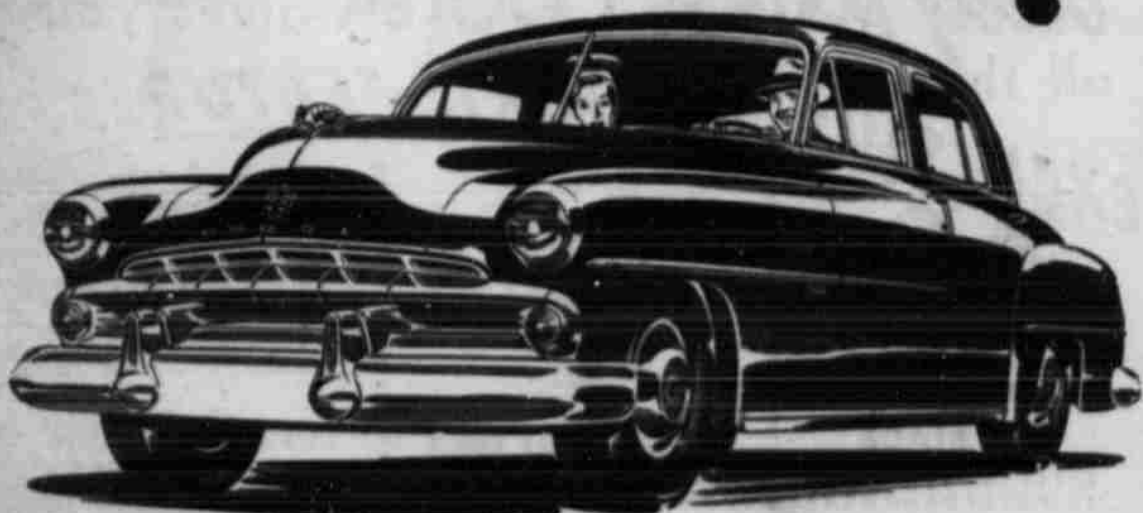

Farm Income In Texas Rises Over Last Year

Texas farm income in the first third of 1951 was 53 per cent higher than the same period last year, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reports.

Only cotton, cottonseed, wheat, fruit and vegetables showed a downward trend in income.

Total farm cash income, January through April, was estimated at \$378,316,000. More than a third of the total came from cattle sales, 63 per cent higher

Other impressive gains were made by milk and milk products, up 80 per cent, and hogs, up 60 per cent. Wool and mohair prices have more than doubled since April 1950. The 95 per cent decline in income from wheat is reportedly a result of a poor crop and correspondingly-reduced marketings.

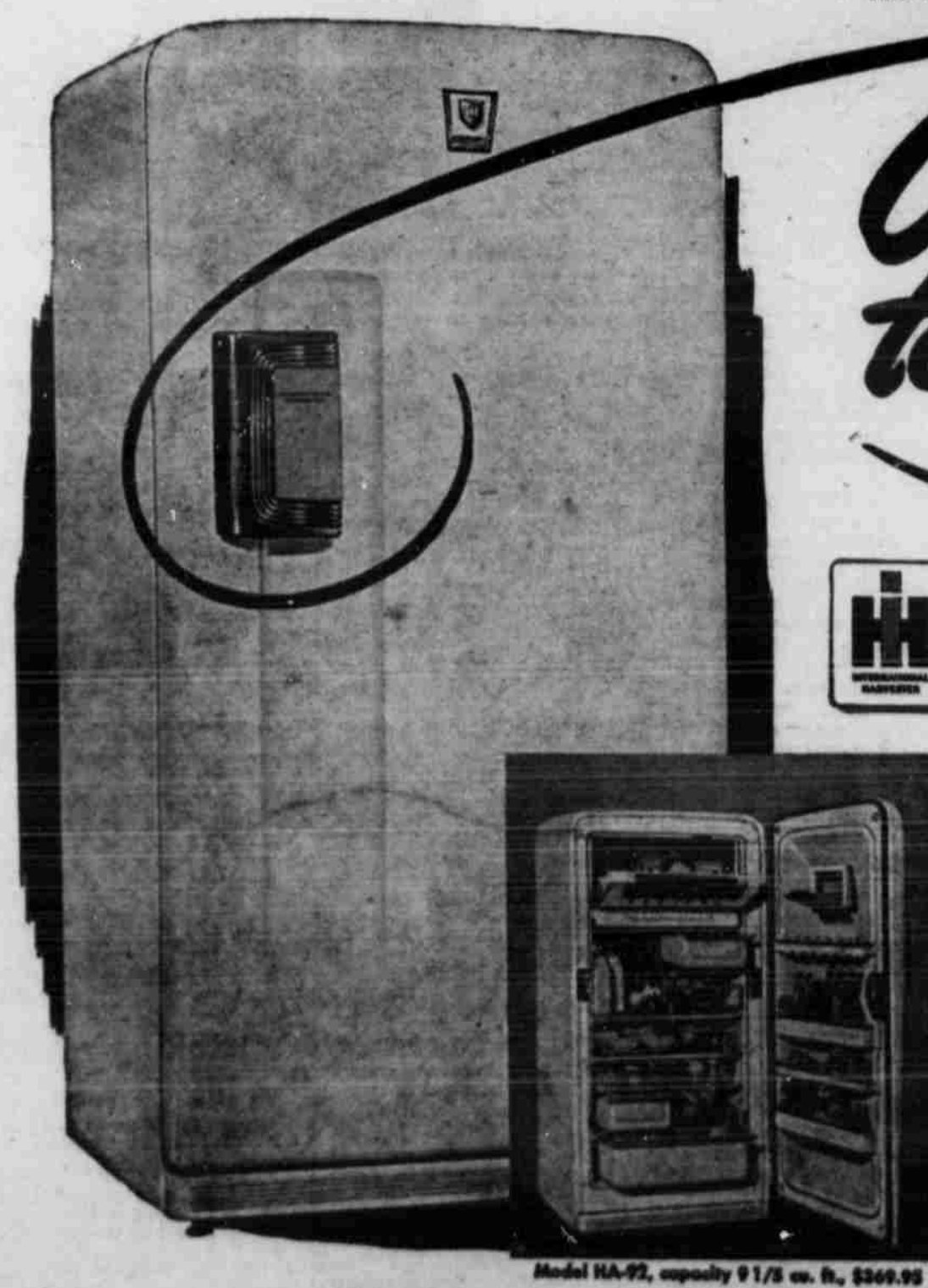

Regulations Told For Mesquite Control by PMA

Mike E. Custer, secretary Garza County Production and Market committee, advises that the Garza County Commissioner's court has approved the adoption of Public Law HB 420 regarding the control of mesquite by chemical spraying and that mesquite spraying will begin in Garza county June 18 and last through July 15 under the ACP program.

Custer urges ranchers who plan to participate in this practice and who will expect payment under the ACP program to secure flyers who have a license with the state commissioner of agriculture, and who are approved by the county committee. It is also important that operators purchase an approved chemical. These precautions are being taken for the operators protection.

On all ranches that earn ACP assistance for carrying out this practice Custer states that a preliminary inspection and measurement must be made by a representative of the county committee. The recommendation of C. E. Fisher of Spur that no mesquite be sprayed on range land located within three miles of growing cotton has been adopted by the Garza county committee.

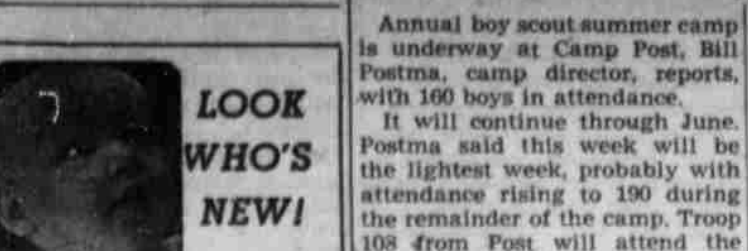

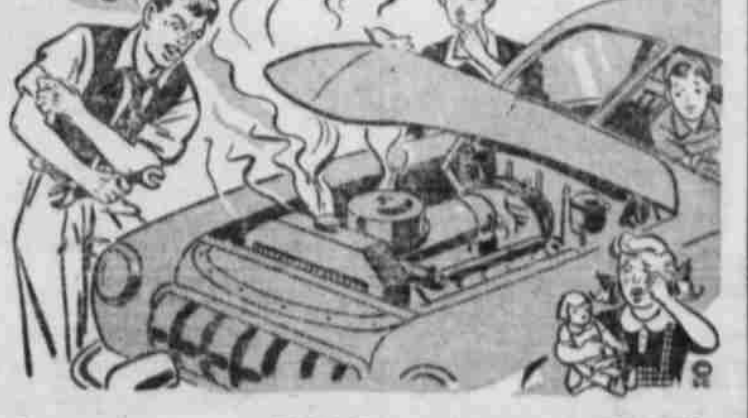
