New education reform bill outlined

The Texas association of School Boards has issued a report on the special session of the Texas Legislature on the tax package and the education reform bill.

The report begins "Well, it's over. It took all 30 days but the Texas Legislature finally agreed July 3 on a tax package to go along with the education reform bill that had been passed earlier. They even had a fat lady sing to signify that they had completed their work."

Now the work begins for school districts, T.E.A., teacher colleges and others who will be affected by the legislation.

The 226 page education reform bill, House Bill 72, is being called the most comprehensive education legislation ever passed in any state.

Although most of the requirement of HB 72 must be dealt with in the upcoming school years, several other requirements have been postponed so that school districts may phase in these changes.

Starting in the spring semester of 1985, districts will have to comply with State Board of Education rules limiting participation in and practice for extracurricular activities during the school year and school week. Also beginning that semester, students must maintain a 70 average in all academic subjects to participate

in extracurricular activities.

Another provision requires that the school year, for students, cannot begin prior to September. This goes into effect for the 1985-86 school year.

Also in the 1985-86 school year, districts will be required to offer prekindergarten to eligible four-year olds. Once a district identifies 15 children who are unable to speak and comprehend English or who are from a family whose income is below subsistence level, half-day classes must be offered. The district may be exempted from this requirement by the commissioner of education if the district would be required to construct classrooms.

Beginning with the 1985-86 school year, a district may not enroll more than 22 children in kindergarten, first and second grade classes. The district may be exempted for one semester at a time if the enrollment limits work an undue hardship. By the 1988-89 school year, these limits will apply to the third and fourth grades.

Not later than the 1985-86 school year, minimum basic skills competency tests will be administered at the first, third, fifth, seventh, ninth and twelfth grades. An exit level test will be given in the eleventh grade. A student must pass this test before he or she can receive a diploma.

Finally, not later than September 1, 1986, districts must implement discipline management programs.

The bill also establishes significant changes in the way salary administration will be conducted in the future. The bill changes the state salary schedule for teachers by raising minimum salaries, using fewer longevity steps, and establishing a career ladder pay system with four promotional levels. The bill also gives local districts much greater control over salaries of non-teaching personnel by removing the pay grade classification system with minimum salaries prescribed for each position. The new law has no minimum salary requirements for paraprofessional employees and requires only that all professional and administrative employees be paid no less than the minimum salaries specified.

In 1984-85 the local districts must calculate the new step placements and salaries for all teachers and personnel above pay grade seven in the 1983-84 system. The law requires each employee in this category to be placed at the lowest step that gives them at least \$170/month over their previous state base salary (not including local supplements). For other school employees, such as paraprofessionals, no immediate changes are

necessary in the pay system, other than determining the annual pay raise for those employees applied to their current salary.

The bill establishes a career ladder pay system that includes four promotional levels with state funded salary bonuses at each level. The level two supplement is \$2000, level three is \$4000, and level four is \$6000. If more teachers are eligible for supplements than available funds allow, then districts may either reduce the supplements to no less than \$1500, \$3000, and \$4500, respectively, or increase performance standards to restrict eligibility or both. These supplements must be added at each level regardless of whether teachers are being paid above state minimums.

To assist districts in implementing HB 72, the Texas Association of School Boards will host a post-legislative seminar Saturday, July 28, at the LBJ Library Auditorium on the UT-Austin campus.

The seminar is intended to provide board members and administrators with timely, practical information in preparing for the 1984-85 school year. Staff members from TASB, the Texas Education Agency, and others knowledgeable about the changes will provide explanations of various provisions in the bill.

New home prices below U.S. average

A Spearman family can buy a brand new home, with most conveniences, for prices ranging from \$55,000 to \$88,000—considerably below the \$101,000 nationwide average cost of a single family dwelling.

The size of the average new home in Spearman will vary from 1,450 square feet to 2,000 square feet of living space according to realtors.

The "average" new home will be brick veneer construction, with an attached garage and a central heating and cooling system.

It will also come with a built-in oven and range, carpeting and often a fenced backyard.

"The average price of a home in Spearman is probably lower than the national average because of the wage scale here, compared to other areas, realtors note. Building materials should cost approximately the same.

The average prices realtors quote are those for homes built on the speculation that a buyer will be found.



Now is the time to buy a new home in Spearman. Check with

Century 21, Emmett Sanders or Virginia White.

Most of the larger homes—those 2,500 square feet and larger—are built under contract and cost \$100,000 or more.

New home prices in Spearman compare favorably with those in Texas. Statewide, a medium priced home sells for \$73,300.

There is a good home market in Spearman, even though mortgage interest rates are two to three percent higher than six months ago. Local realtors note there is good inventory and selection of homes for sale here and more people are in the market.

Home sales in Spearman slowed last spring after an increase in interest rates. The market apparently is regaining some lost ground.

A conventional home mortgage loan at a fixed rate of interest is currently 15 percent while variable mortgage rates range from 11 1/2 to 13 1/2 percent.

Mortgages at the variable rates are adjusted after reviews on a 6-month or 12-month basis.

The current Federal Housing Administration loan rate is 14 percent, plus mortgage insurance while Veterans Administration home loan carries a 14 percent interest rate.

Vehicle registration

Vehicle registration fees will increase of August 1, plus an increased gasoline tax of 5 cents per gallon and 1 cent per dollar in sales tax for automobiles under the new Texas Automobile Registration law.

Car owners will also begin paying an additional \$5 registration fee for all cars and trucks beginning in December.

Motorcycle fee will have the largest increase, rising to \$18.55 Aug. 1, 1984, to \$24.50 on Aug. 1, 1985 and to \$30.75 on Aug. 1, 1986 according to the bill passed during the Texas Legislature's recent special session.

There are three categories of license and registration fees for automobiles and small vans. The categories will be based on age of the vehicle, rather than the weight system used in previous years.

Class I vehicles, which were those weighing 0 to 3,500 pounds but now include all vehicles six years older, will increase from \$15.80 to \$28.50 beginning Aug. 1.

On Aug. 1, 1985, the fee for

vehicles in Class I will increase to \$34.25 and on Aug. 1, 1986 to \$40.50.

Cars in Class II currently cost \$25.80 to register. Under the old method, the category included all vehicles weighing between 3,501 and 4,500 pounds. It now includes all vehicles three to six years of age.

Fee for Class II vehicles increases to \$36.30 on Aug. 1, to \$44.50 on Aug. 1, 1985 and to \$50.50 on Aug. 1, 1986.

Fees for vehicles in Class III currently are \$33.80. That fee will increase to \$46.30 on Aug. 1, to \$52.25 on Aug. 1, 1985 and \$58.50 on Aug. 1, 1986.

Class III vehicles currently include those weighing from 4,501 to 6,000 pounds. The new method will be for all vehicles three years and under.

Also included in the bill, which is to be signed into law this week by Gov. Mark White, is a provision to increase sales tax on cars from 4 cents to 5 cents.

Each county retains 5 percent of all tax monies generated through the collection of automobile sales tax.

The officers for the Spearman Rotary Club for 1984-85 installed

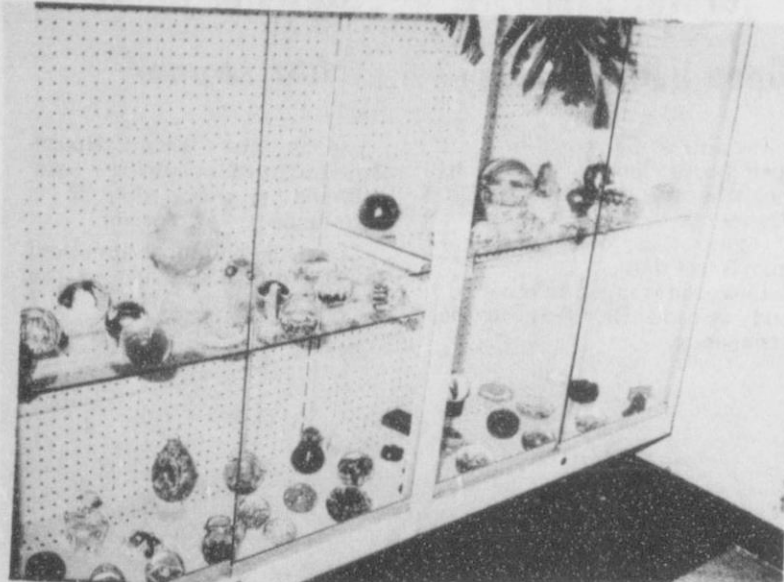

Police Dept. has busy week

On July 5, 1984 at approximately 8:34 a.m., a complainant contacted the Spearman Police Department and related that person(s) unknown had broken the large front window out of the old McClellan Grain Co. building. An officer was dispatched. Upon arrival at the McClellan Grain Co., the officer observed a hole in the front glass window. A search of the area was made and the officer was unable to locate the object that broke the window out. A report was made on the incident and investigation is continuing.

On July 7, 1984 at approximately 1:55 a.m., an officer was dispatched to a Spearman residence in reference to a prowler. Upon arrival the officer was met by a white female subject who advised the officer that she had heard someone at her back door. When she looked out she saw a subject running toward the back fence. She then called her brother and he contacted the Spearman Police Department. The officer checked the back door and observed that someone had cut the back screen door with a sharp object (possibly a knife). The cut

was by the door latch on the screen door. The officer checked the area but did not locate anyone.

On July 7, 1984 at approximately 8:24 a.m., an officer observed a vehicle parked in the 300 block of Townsend. The windshield on the vehicle had a good size hole in it. Upon further investigation, the officer observed a square cement block in the front seat and resting against the dash. From the appearance of the broken windshield and broken glass on the seat of the vehicle, it appeared that a person or persons unknown had thrown the cement block through the windshield. The officer was observing the damage to the vehicle when a white female exited the residence. The officer advised the subject that it appeared that someone had thrown a cement block through the windshield of her car. She advised that the car belonged to her son. The officer left to get a camera to photograph the damage. Upon returning to the scene a white male subject was standing by the vehicle. He advised the officer that he didn't know who

had done this, but he would take care of it. He advised that he had some strange incidents happen in the last few days with some guys in a pickup. He advised the officer that he did not want to talk about them, but after a few minutes, went ahead and tried to describe the pickup to the officer. The officer advised the male subject that if he would tell him who they were the Police would take care of it. The subject advised that he didn't know the guys by name but he would find out.

On July 8, 1984 at approximately 11:46 a.m., an officer was dispatched to a Spearman residence in reference to an injured pigeon on their roof. Upon arrival the officer was met by a white female who advised the officer that the bird had been on their roof since last night and the bird appeared to have one of its wings hurt. She told the officer to shoot the bird so it wouldn't suffer. The bird was disposed of by the officer.

On July 9, 1984 at approximately 2:33 a.m., an officer was advised of a subject pushing a motorcycle in the 100 block of

West Kenneth. Upon arrival in the area, the officer observed a white male getting off of a motorcycle at a Spearman business. An interview was conducted with the subject. During the course of the interview, the officer noticed a strong odor of an alcoholic beverage on the subject's breath. The subject slurred his words and was unsteady on his feet. The officer placed the subject under arrest for Public Intoxication and transported him to the Spearman Police Department where he was properly booked, then transported to the Hansford County Sheriff's Office. The subject's motorcycle was brought to the Spearman Police Department for safekeeping.

On July 9, 1984 at approximately 4:47 p.m., a white male subject came to the Spearman Police Department to report a hit and run. The subject advised that he had gone to a Spearman business to purchase some parts and upon returning to his vehicle, discovered it had been hit by another vehicle. The subject advised that this took place between 2:30 and 3:00 p.m. on this date. The officer took photographs of the damage

and advised the subject he would try to locate the other vehicle. The officer spoke with the owner of the business and he advised the officer that he remembered the subject being at the place of business because he spoke with the subject. He advised the officer that he remembered where the subject had parked his vehicle and the subject wasn't in the place of business over 15 minutes. He stated that he couldn't remember what vehicle could have possibly hit the subjects vehicle.

On July 10, 1984 at approximately 10:47 p.m., the Spearman Police Department was contacted by the Hansford County Hospital who advised that they had received a call from a Spearman resident who related that a white male subject was at her residence and had been involved in a fight. The ambulance was notified.

Spearman Police Officers were dispatched to the subjects residence. Upon arrival the officers observed a white male subject lying on the kitchen floor. The complainants face was covered with blood. She related to the officers that the complainant had been attacked by his son and that the complainant had left his residence and had come to her house. The complainant informed the officers that his son informed

him if he called the law he would kill him. The officers were informed by the complainant that his son had been drinking and would fight the officers if they try to arrest him. The officers departed from the subjects residence and proceeded to the complainants residence. One officer was left at the subject's residence in case the son returned to fight with his father before the ambulance crew could remove him from the house. Upon arrival at the complainants residence the officers entered the complainants residence and made a search for the subject. The officers observed blood on a bar in the dining room. Also the glass top of the bar was broken. Further investigation revealed a bedroom door had been knocked off its hinges. A thorough search of the residence and the outside grounds had negative results in locating the subject. The next door neighbors informed the officers that they were aware that a fight had occurred next door between the complainant and subject. And that the last time they saw the subject after the fight he was on foot traveling in a northerly direction. As the officers proceeded to their patrol units to search the area for the subject, a white

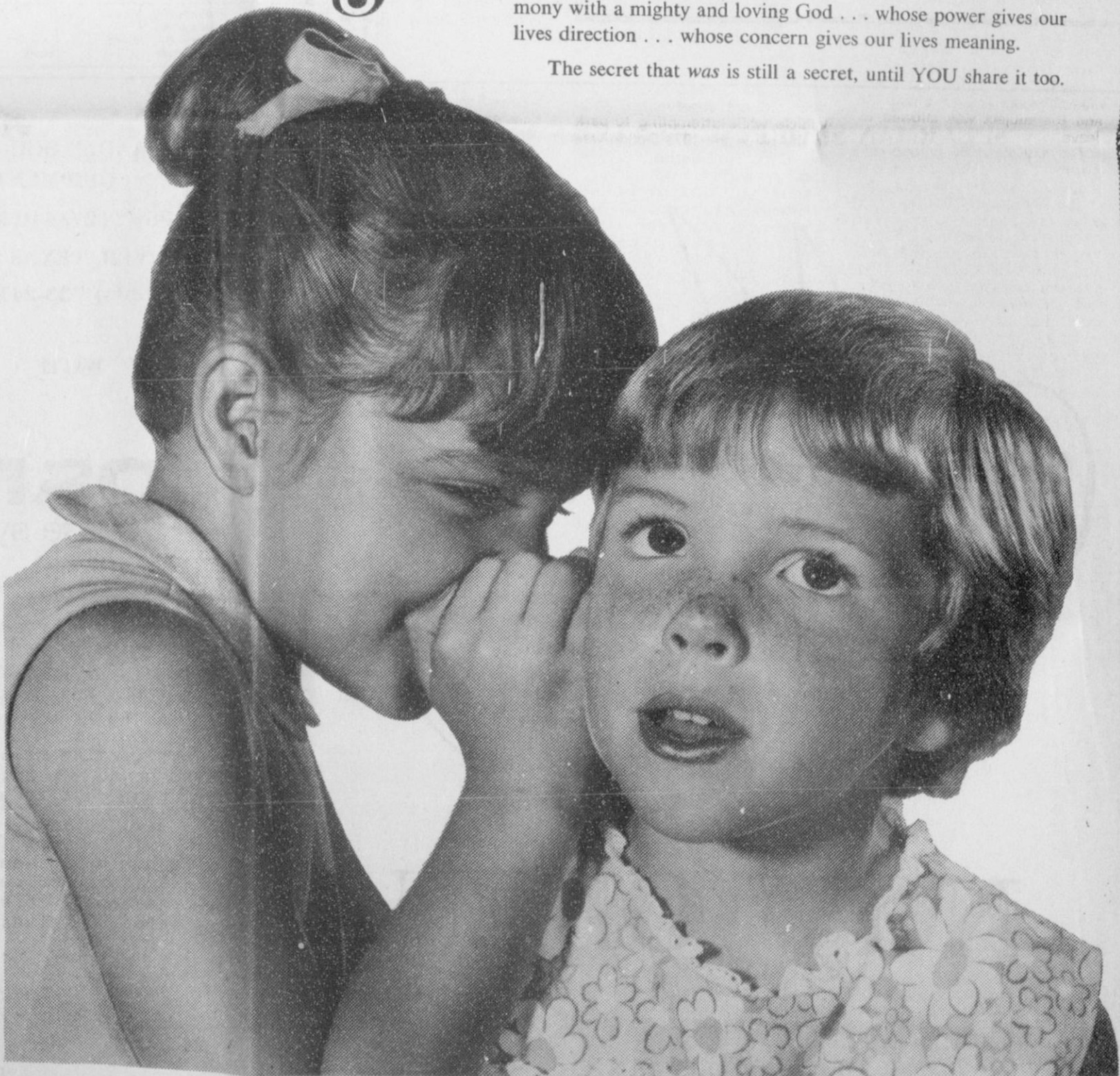

male on foot approached the officers and asked them if they were looking for him and that he had had a fight with his father. The subject was informed that he was under arrest and was being charged with assault. The subject was transported to the Hansford County Sheriff's Office and placed in jail. The Spearman Police Officers proceeded to their patrol units and observed a white female subject on foot walking toward them sobbing. The female subject identified herself to the officers. She wanted to know where the subject was, and she was informed that he was in jail. She was informed that the subject would be arraigned in City Court at 10:30 a.m., Thursday morning, and that since she was a witness to the fight that she would have to appear in court also. At approximately 12:30 a.m., the Chief of Police proceeded to the Hansford County Hospital to check on the welfare of the complainant. The doctors related that the complainant had two lacerations over the left eye and was complaining of a sore rib cage. The doctor stated that the complainant would be kept in the hospital over night.

On July 9, 1984 at approximately 7:54 p.m., a male subject called the Spearman Police Department and reported that someone or something had broken a window on his vehicle. 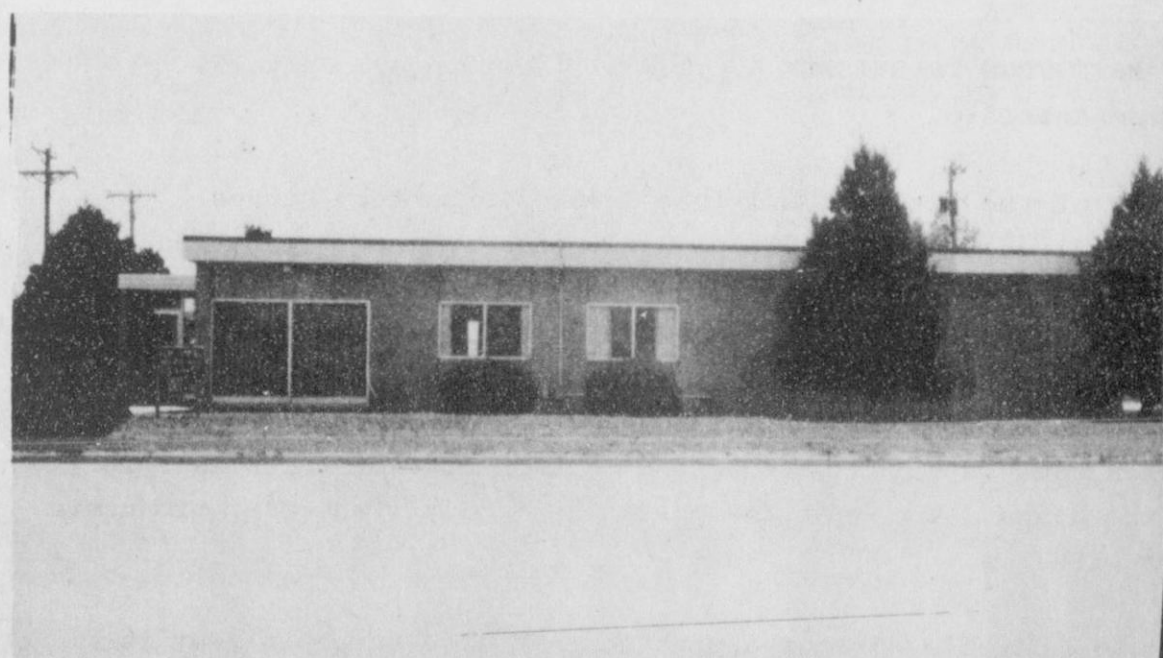

Texans enjoy backyard barbecuing and eating as much as anybody in the U.S., and chicken barbecue is an all-time favorite.

A few simple steps will enable you to enjoy mouth-watering chicken barbecue to your heart's content.

Chicken barbecuing involves four basic steps: First, split the birds in half and sprinkle each half generously with salt and black pepper before placing on the pit. To shorten barbecuing time cut halves into parts.

Second, make sure coals are white hot before putting the chicken on the grill. Any type of cooker can be used, but keep the coals 8 to 12 inches from the cooking rack for best results.

Another basic step for top-notch chicken barbecue is to use a basting sauce during the cooking process which contains no tomato product or sugar because such sauces burn easily. A basting sauce will keep meat moist and juicy and add a desired flavor. Apply basting sauce and turn halves frequently.

Suggested ingredients for a basting sauce: 1 tablespoon salt, 1 teaspoon black pepper, 1 stick butter or margarine, 2 margarine, 2 tablespoons Worcestershire Sauce and a few drops of hot sauce or red pepper. Heat and mix over a low flame until the butter or oleo melts; then add the juice of one lemon (vinegar may be substituted). Next fill the pan with water and heat but do not boil. Spices such as garlic salt or lemon pepper can be added to suit personal preferences.

To top off the barbecuing process, apply a finishing sauce to the chicken about the last 20 to 30 minutes before cooking is complete. This is the most critical time during the entire cooking process. Check the meat carefully and turn it frequently to avoid burning the finishing sauce.

Several types of finishing sauce are available and vary

from milk to hot. To prepare your own sauce (for chicken halves), use the following: 1 cup cooking oil, 1 cup vinegar, 1 cup catsup, ¼ cup sugar and ¼ cup water. Add salt, Worcestershire Sauce, hot sauce, garlic and other seasonings to taste.

Chicken barbecue should be complete in about 1½ to 2 hours. Cooking longer with less heat usually results in the most

flavorful, juicy and tender barbecue. Placing the cooking rack closer than 8 inches to the coals will reduce barbecuing time, but the meat will be drier and less tender.

A test for doneness is to twist the drumstick which is connected to thigh. If the joint between the thigh and drumstick is loose, the chicken is ready to eat. Another test is to cut into the meat at this joint. The moisture in the joint will run clear if the meat is done.

The fun part of chicken barbecuing is to develop your own secret recipe and cooking style. The four basic steps outlined can be varied to suit your style and taste.

One variation is to debone the breast and thigh meat and marinate it overnight in the refrigerator in a mixture of 16 oz. herb-seasoned Italian dressing and 8 oz. picante sauce. Cook in the same manner as before while basting with the marinating sauce.

For another type of marinated chicken barbecue, suggestions are a soy-teriyaki (or Worcestershire) sauce marination for two-to-four hours before cooking.

Most of all, let your imagination be your guide and have fun. Who knows? The world's greatest barbecue chef may be in your own backyard.

ACS-Sun Sense

To sun or not to sun—that is the question but only you can answer it! We have become a nation of sunworshippers and our pursuit of the sun has become a year 'round occupation. Enjoying activities in the sunshine with adequate skin protection is one thing. Broiling, unprotected, year after year to get tan is quite another.

The fisherman, the farmer, and the bathing beauty have quite a bit in common—the danger of skin cancer from prolonged over-exposure to the sun. "It's that time of year when we must remind ourselves to use sense in the sun to avoid over-exposure which can cause skin cancer. Cancer of the skin is diagnosed in over 400,000 Americans each year" said Fran Maupin of the Hansford Unit of the American Cancer Society (and one of the 400,000!).

"It is important to note that most skin cancer is encouraged if not caused by excessive exposure to the sun. People whose occupation places their work outside—for example a lifeguard or construction worker—should be very careful. So, also, should fair-skinned people. Senior citizens (of which I am now a member) should also take care in the sun."

Since skin cancer occurs more frequently than other types of cancer, it is important to know its early warning signals: a sore that does not heal; change in size or color of a wart or mole. "If a symptom appears, the person should not try to wish it away (no such fairy); nor try to 'doctor' it himself—see your physician as soon as possible. Skin cancer is highly curable if detected and treated in time (I know for mine was detected in time and treated in time—how lucky can one get?)

That's why it is so tragic that about 7,000 people are expected to die of skin cancer this year. They will be victims of a disease that is largely preventable and highly curable.

The American Cancer Society has available skin cancer leaflets and an educational film entitled "Sense in the Sun." For further information contact that ACS office at 806-353-4306 in Amarillo. There are leaflets on "Sun Sense" at the Gruver City Hall and Gruver Library.

At this time of the year, the ACS advises people in our area to: Take sunshine in small doses; wear a broadrimmed or billed hat or cap and long sleeved shirt; use a beach umbrella; and apply a screening lotion or cream (one of the total screeners really does the trick); and above all USE SENSE IN THE SUN!

My hunch is that most of us hate rattlesnakes as well as all snakes. "I don't care if that is a bull snake, it's still a snake!" Sounds familiar? And yet there are some people who travel hundreds of miles to participate in rattlesnake round-ups. I am one of these people. I go to the round ups. I catch the rattlers. I skin them and I eat them! Why? Why not!

I go to the rattlesnakes round ups for several reasons: To get away, I do a lot of my unwinding, reflecting, and relaxing while I am driving. I enjoy taking pictures, standing in line for an hour waiting to indulge myself on deep fried rattlesnake. And of course I am there to hunt rattlers! I enjoy hunting rattlers because there is an element of danger. I could get bit. But my chances of getting snake bit are very slim. My chances of getting into a car accident in Dallas, Austin, or Houston is greater than getting bit by a rattler. But round ups are fun. Let me tell you.

At Sweetwater, Texas two years ago, a man had found a rattlesnake den. He started to poke into the hole with his snake hook. All of a sudden a jack rabbit came running out of his hole right upon his lap! Two years ago in Sweetwater, I was walking along with my friend. We were walking side by side. Apparently there was a rattler in between us

though we did not see it! My friend stopped walking for some

reason and I had continued walking. All of a sudden my friend

screamed. I had turned around. I screamed too! There in between his legs moving along was a four foot Western Diamond Rattlesnake! At this time my friend was about two feet in the air. I had decided to take advantage of the moment by taking my snake tong and catching the snake. Do you hear the excitement?

The round ups are not only a source of excitement but the round ups are a source of information. There are information seminars dealing with subjects as: snake identification, how to hunt and how to handle rattlers safely, and what to do in the event of a snake bite. These seminars also distinguishes between myth and fact. Here are some examples:

Myth: a rattler snake can jump forward like a frog, striking a person ten feet away.

Fact: a rattlesnake can only strike about one half their body length, but don't test that with your hand.

Myth: rattlers get up to 10 feet long in this part of the country. Fact: in the Panhandle there are two varieties of rattlesnake: The Western Diamondback Rattlesnake. The longest recorded length 86.4 inches. The Prairie Rattlesnake. The longest recorded length is 60 inches.

Fact: the new born and smaller rattlers are more dangerous than larger rattlers because their venom is more concentrated. Forty percent of the snake bites are "Dry Bites." There is no venom injected. The rattlesnake decides either to inject or simply to bite as an additional warning along with rattling.

Myth: Rattlesnakes always rattle before striking.

Fact: Don't believe that! In fact a rattlesnake does not have to be coiled up in order to strike!

Myth: The number of rattles on the tail indicate the age of the snake.

Fact: The number of rattles on the tail indicate the number of times that a snake has shed its skin! There is a rattle formed each time that a snake sheds its skin.

Fact: A rattlesnake does not need to be alive to inject venom! Servicemen have been injected by a loose fang that was embedded in a tire while changing tires! Look out Alton!

By now you may be wondering if I am crazy for hunting rattlers. You may be absolutely correct! But I love hunting rattlers. In fact I have a Problem: I need rattlesnakes. I would be glad to hunt for rattlers on any ranches/farmers land. I only use my snake tong and my snake hooks; no firearms!

If I could get enough rattlers Colonel Sanders better watch out!

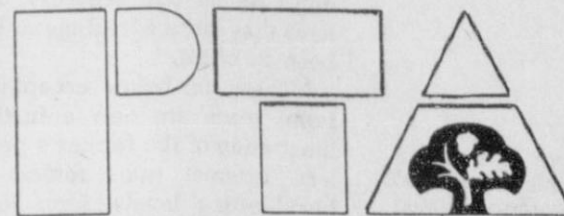

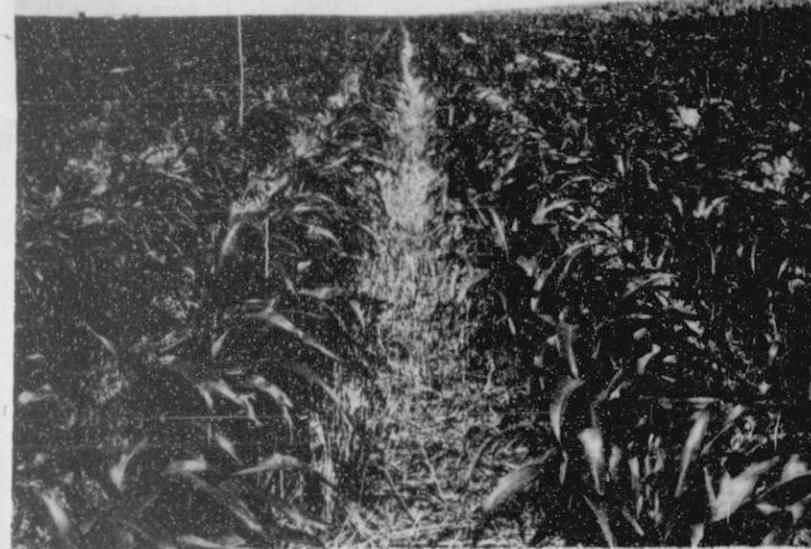

This grain sorghum planted directly into wheat stubble is making maximum use of crop residues. However, planting into lesser amounts of crop residue can still help to reduce soil erosion, conserve soil moisture, and improve the tilth of the soil.

Sweep type tillage equipment, rod weedeers and chisels usually leave adequate amounts of residues on the soil surface to provide the above benefits. For further information on crop residue use contact the Soil Conservation Service in Spearman.

Grain sorghum profitable in feeding

High technology helps to make a feedlot operation a paying one. More feedlot operators now use a nutrition specialist and computers to manage the ingredients they will use as finishing rations for livestock.

Dr. Kenneth Eng, Eng-Inc., a beef nutritionist from Casa Grande, Arizona, works over a large part of the United States and worldwide. On an annual basis, his clients will feed more than one million cattle.

When asked which grain he preferred, Eng said, "We have no preconceived bias as to which is the best grain. We strictly look at it from a total diet standpoint and how we can put together the best ration most economically. In the overall industry, this is not always the case. For example, some people like to feed corn because they want to see something yellow in the feed. We don't think that is significant from a performance standpoint.

"We like grain sorghum because we think the price is attractive more often than not. We use a lot of grain sorghum and price is the reason."

While grain is the largest single ingredient of the ration, it must be considered simultaneously with other ingredients. Those ingredients would include roughages like cotton seed hulls, alfalfa, or silage, plus all the supplemental ingredients that might be needed.

The way grain is processed determines how much feed value can be realized. Eng said, "Where we can do an excellent job of processing the grain, it may have 97% of the value of corn." He further stressed that the nutritional level of grain sorghum may drop considerably if it is not correctly processed.

The protein value of grain sorghum is a little higher than that of corn but lower than that of wheat. Eng continued, "When the cost of supplemental proteins is high, for example, if the price of soybean meal is high along with the price of urea, then the computer—which we tend to use a lot—will favor the use of wheat." Wheat would probably be limited to 50% of the grain in the ration and the other grain would be chosen relative to price.

Dr. Eng said when the rations are balanced properly, there is no difference in the carcass value of beef fed on one grain vs. another.

Mabry Foreman, a rancher, farmer, and feedlot owner in Felt, Oklahoma, is one of Dr. Eng's clients. He feeds only his own cattle in his 5,000 unit feedlot. Foreman said, "I raise quite a lot of grain sorghum myself. But then, I also buy additional grain to feed. The price differential is nearly always such that we feed sorghum."

Foreman said when comparing one grain to another with a balanced ration, he finds no difference in the time required to finish the animal. "Profit is the objective of my feeding operation," Foreman concluded, "and for the last several years, I have found it more profitable to use grain sorghum than corn."

Melanomas are usually distinguished by a dark brown or black pigmentation. They start as small, mole-like growths that increase in size, change color, become ulcerated and bleed easily from a slight injury.

TREATMENT: There are four methods of treatment—surgery, radiation therapy, electrodesiccation (tissue destruction by heat), or cryosurgery (tissue destruction by freezing).

PREVENTION: Avoid the sun between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m. when ultraviolet rays are strongest, and by using protective clothing. Use one of the growing number of sunscreen preparations, especially those containing such ingredients as PABA (para-aminobenzoic acid). They come in varying strengths, ranging from those that permit gradual tanning to those allowing practically no tanning at all.

Girlstown needs your help

Recently the Borger Campus of Girlstown, U.S.A. received a challenge grant from the J.E. and L.E. Mabey Foundation of Tulsa, Oklahoma in the amount of \$339,000. Girlstown will receive the \$339,000 from the Mabey Foundation "IF" an additional \$667,078 can be raised by August 31, 1984. This money will be used to construct a much needed residential treatment center for girls on the Borger Girlstown campus. The new project will cost approximately \$1,016,000.

The Borger Campus of Girlstown, U.S.A. has operated for seventeen years as a basic child care institution with a licensed capacity of twenty-five girls. Girls have come for care because of abuse, neglect or family problems that prevented them from being able to live in their own homes. Many girls have been served through this program.

In recent years it has become apparent that there is a real need for a non profit residential treatment center for girls in the Panhandle of Texas. Existing children's homes are having many girls referred for care who have more severe problems than can be effectively handled in regular child care programs. These problems include drug and alcohol abuse, run-away, school and family problems. More and more girls are victims of family violence and sexual abuse. There-

fore, Mr. Marshall Cooper, Executive Director of Girlstown, U.S.A. received permission from the Girlstown Board of Directors to convert the Borger campus into a residential treatment center for thirty girls. In order to make this change, a new facility specifically designed to meet the special needs of the girls to be served by the treatment center must be constructed.

Girlstown needs your help. In order to receive the \$339,000 from the Mabey Foundation, \$667,078 must be raised by August 31, 1984.

A section of land valued at \$288,000 has been given by a lady in Pampa. The proceeds from the sale of this land will be applied to the needed \$667,000.

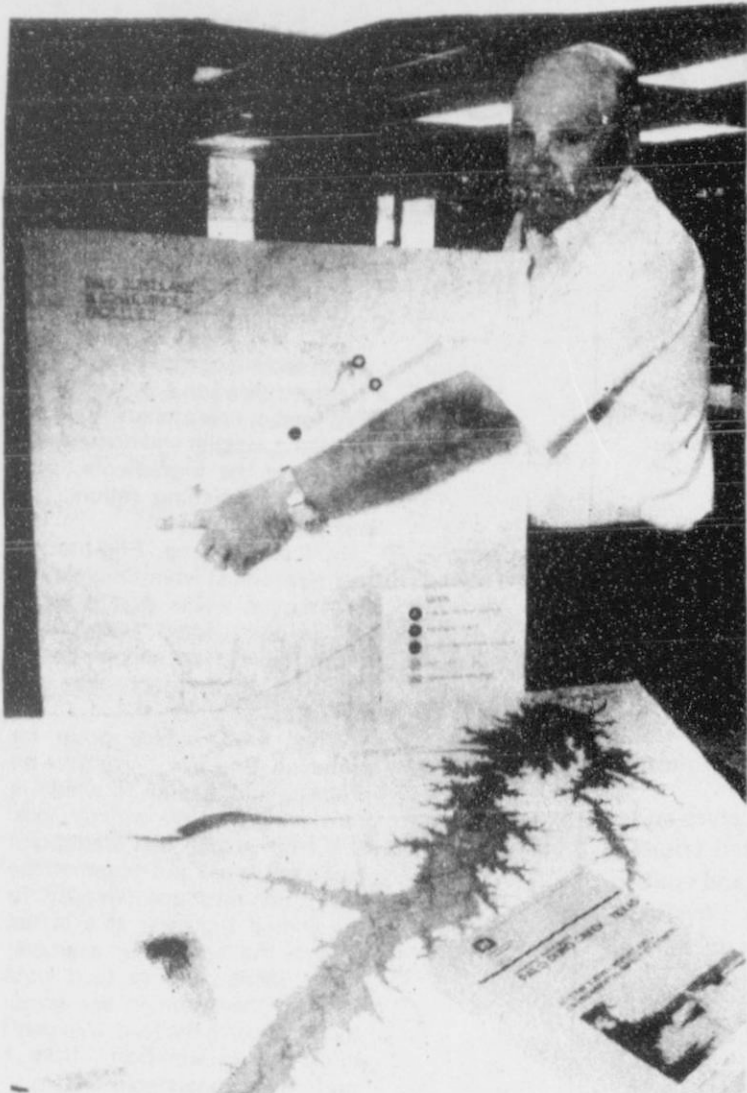

Hightower attends

White House ceremony

Congressman Jack Hightower today attended a White House ceremony to observe the 30th anniversary of the Food for Peace Program which is important to the nation's farmers and U.S. foreign policy. President Reagan asked Hightower to attend the special East Room ceremony as part of a select group of national leaders recognized as promoters of U.S. agricultural exports.

"This program is really unique in the nation's history, and it's very important to food producers in our district because it helps move our farm commodities out into the world to hungry nations," Hightower said. "This program helps move our districts' wheat and wheat products, cornmeal, dairy products and other commodities. It's an important program for economic, foreign policy and humanitarian reasons," Hightower said.

The food for Peace Program, a part of the Agricultural Trade Development and Assistance Act of 1954, has been the basic food assistance vehicle of the United States. During the history of the program, almost 653 million pounds of U.S. farm products, worth over \$33 billion, have been

moved out to more than 1.8 billion hungry people in over 100 countries. The program is aimed at opening new overseas markets for American farm products, helping nations develop into good trading partners for the U.S., and also providing important help to some of the poorest U.S. allies faced with domestic problems of drought, famine and malnutrition.

Hightower, a member of the House Select Committee on Hunger, is also a member of the Agriculture Subcommittee of Appropriations which has jurisdiction over the program. Hightower has been an advocate of expanded agricultural exports, and has had representatives of both Japan and South Korea in his Washington office to urge them to purchase more farm commodities and lower their import barriers.

"Rather than embargoing agricultural products, we need expanded exports to more and more trading partners," Hightower said. "This program helps us get a foot in the door market-wise, it promotes goodwill, lowers U.S. storage costs and helps reduce farm surpluses that tend to depress market prices."

"Food For Peace" program in 30th year

The president of the state's largest family farm and ranch organization, the Texas Farmers Union, noted that this year is the thirtieth anniversary of the 'Food for Peace' program, and that during the Fourth of July period, Texans and all Americans have just one more reason to be "proud patriots."

"The 'Food for Peace' program is an example of the finest sort of out American spirit," claims Mike Moeller of Hays County.

"Started in 1954, the program has made us million of friends throughout the world, and brought us billions of dollars in agricultural exports as developing countries were helped to their feet. United States food aid is more than charity abroad; the program is a major part of the U.S. commitment to poorer countries to help themselves. Japan, Korea, Taiwan were all at one food aid recipients, and they are now all big buyers of American agricultural products. The program is one of high-minded principles, and it serves both givers and receivers in the process."

Also known as Public Law (P.L.) 480, the 'Food for Peace' program has delivered almost 653 million pounds of food worth \$32 billion to people on almost every continent. In 1984 the produce of one out of every fine U.S. crop acres is shipped to developing countries. These exports include 65% of our total wheat exports, 38% of total corn exports, 71% of our total rice exports, and 90% of our non-fat dry milk exports. The

state of Texas has benefited directly from P.L. 480; more so than any other state except for Kansas. In a state-by-state breakdown provided by the Agency for International Development, Texas in 1982 had a share of \$76.7 million of P.L. 480 exports (the Kansas share was \$83.8 million). "American food aid and trade help to stabilize some of the more turbulent areas of the world by injecting low-cost or free food into local economies," continues Moeller.

"People are more likely to listen to reasonable voices when they and their children are fed; the eradication of world hunger doesn't end with just feeding the hungry, though. It involves the restoration of dignity for individuals, and training them in the art of self sufficiency in agricultural production."

James stresses the value of patience and speaks of the farmer who patiently waits for his harvest in the time of the early and latter rains. The early rain is in the months of October and November and the latter in March and April. Crops are planted so they will grow in the rainy season.

"Be patient therefore, brethren, unto the coming of the Lord. Behold, the husbandman waiteth for the precious fruit of the earth, and hath long patience for it, until he receive the early and latter rain." — James 5:7

Parity remains at 58%

WACP—Figures released by the United States Department of Agriculture at the end of May indicate that the parity index remains at 58% for the fourth month in a row.

Parity is the relationship between the price received for a commodity, and its purchasing power in today's market place, versus the same transactions performed during the years between 1909 and 1914. It is a yardstick that farmers use to measure the relative strength of farm income today, as compared to the "Golden Age" of agriculture in the early 1900's.

To illustrate, the price received today for a bushel of wheat is \$3.60, as opposed to the parity price of \$7.51 per bushel. That means that while the cost of living and raw materials has gone up drastically in the past seventy years, that bushel of wheat will buy only half as much as it did in the beginning of the century.

Texas Farmers Union president Mike Moeller of Hays County claims that this recent index is only another chorus in a now-familiar song.

"The Reagan administration keeps pointing out the strong recovery that the nation is making; farm prices certainly don't reflect that recovery, nor have they since Mr. Reagan has been in office."

"These far-below acceptable farm prices are only a further illustration of the farmer's problem. Interest rates remain at blood-letting levels, farm foreclosures are at an all time high, and now we have a continuation of the status quo price levels. People out in the country-side as us, 'When is it going to get better?', and we tell 'em to go ask President Reagan; we aren't prophets nor are we optimists."

FHA seminar planned

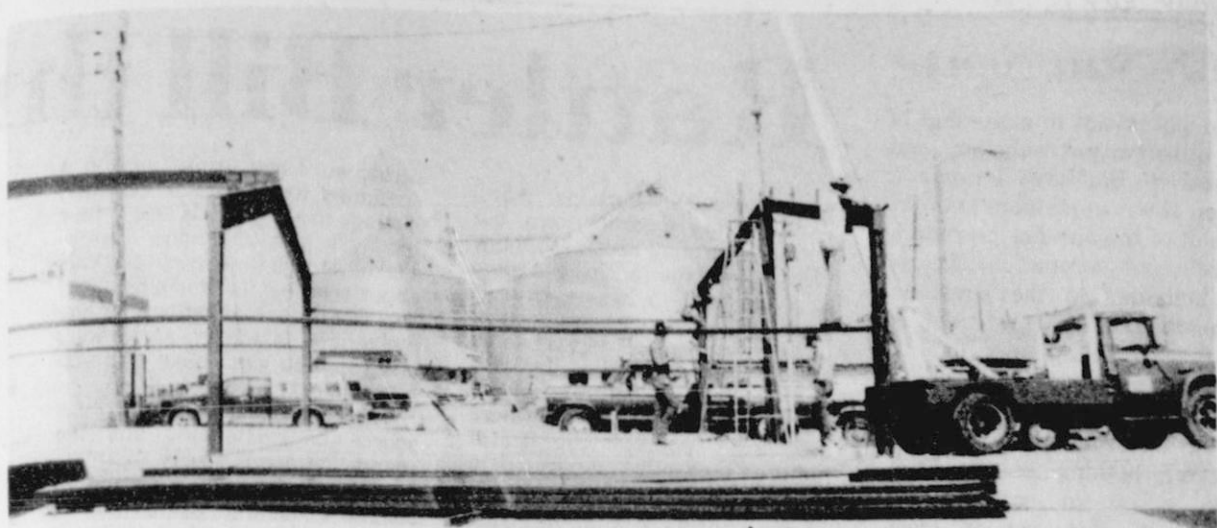
