East Texas Sheriff Thought Fatally Shot In Fray \$175,000 Suit Echoes Killing Of Mexicans At Stanton

Bank Association Will Probably Be Held Party In Case

Mexican Consul, On Behalf Of Families Of Slain Men Takes Civil Action As Aftermath Of Killings.

\$150,000 IS ASKED AS EXEMPLARY DAMAGES

Consul Says Government Is Satisfied With Criminal Action Taken by State; Raps Bank Assn. Rule.

(By Associated Press)
DALLAS, Jan. 4.—Suit for \$175,000 of which \$25,000 is requested as actual and the remainder as exemplary damages for the deaths of Hilario Nunez and Norberto Diaz, all shot in front of a bank at Stanton, Texas, last month, will be asked in a civil suit to be filed shortly, Mexican Consul R. Canto Lara announced here today.

The Texas Bankers Association, as sponsors of the \$5,000 reward for "dead bank bandits" will doubtless be made parties to the suit in the plaintiff's petition, Mr. Lara said. The Dallas consul has just returned from San Antonio conferring with the consul general. The suit will be on behalf of the families of the slain men, Mr. Lara said.

"I am certain that the consul general at San Antonio is willing for me to say that our government is satisfied with the steps already taken by the civil authorities of Texas to deal with the criminal aspects of the situation, if there are any. Governor Dan Moody already has announced that special prosecution would be furnished in the trial of C. C. Beum, Glascock county deputy sheriff, and Lee Smith, of Wink, who are charged with murder.

Honduras Gives Record Welcome

Stores Close and Whole Nation Celebrates Visit of Lindy; Will Fly to Managua in Fight Zone Today

(By Associated Press)
TEGUCIGALPA, Jan. 4.—The stores in Tegucigalpa, including the barber shops, were closed for the first time in history; the main street, carpeted with needles, the residents passing to and fro in gala attire and waving flags as if a great holiday—such was the scene today when the American legation after a comfortable rest and long sleep.

It was an early hour for 9 o'clock had been set for his reception at the presidential palace where the president, Miguel Paz Barahona, decorated him with a gold medal, and the finance minister followed with a personal gift and his autograph. An hour later, the good-will ambassador was in the halls of congress which he has become familiar to him since he flew from Washington.

SENATOR BLEDSOE (Story Below)

Senator Bledsoe To Be Candidate To Succeed Self

Lubbock Attorney, Veteran Of Legislature, Plans To Make Aggressive Race To Keep His Position.

State Senator W. H. Bledsoe, Lubbock attorney and veteran of ten years in the legislature, will be a candidate to succeed himself in the democratic primary election of Saturday, July 28th, according to his statement to the Morning Avalanche here today.

One of the most prominent members of the senate, Mr. Bledsoe was first a candidate for representative in 1917 and was sent to the house from this district that year. He was re-elected in 1919 and in the same year was elected as senator after the fatal shooting of Senator Steve Bell, of Crowell, and has been in the senate ever since.

Mr. Bledsoe's career at Austin has been marked by a number of vital occurrences. While still a member of the house, he introduced the impeachment resolutions against Governor James Ferguson in 1917 and was subsequently sent before the senate to represent the house of representatives in the same matter.

Introduced Tech Bill

In 1922 he introduced in the senate the bill calling for the establishment of the Texas Tech University.

A fractured skull caused his death, attendants said. His has been the funeral arrangements.

Submarine Gives Up Three from Its Cargo of the Dead

First Bodies of Those Held In Water Tomb Are Raised To Surface Wednesday By Salvaging Crew.

NAVAL INQUIRY COURT OPENS DELIBERATIONS

Administration Takes Steps To Insure a Thorough Probe and Survey to Prevent Other Disasters.

PROVINCETOWN, Mass., Jan. 4.—The sunken submarine S-4 today yielded the bodies of three of the forty men who lost their lives when the ship was rammed and sunk off Cape Cod eighteen days ago. Divers carried the bodies from the engine room and from the ocean bottom they were raised slowly to the surface at the end of ropes lowered from the salvage ships on the surface.

With no attempts at identification the bodies were placed in baskets and put aboard the destroyer Maury which started tonight for the navy yard at Boston. There they will be transferred to the navy hospital at Chelsea where identification will be made.

Although there was no opportunity for a thorough medical examination the appearance of the bodies indicated the three men were drowned rather than suffocated. They bore little evidence of the long immersion in the water. All of the bodies were fully clothed and when found were on the floor of the compartment.

Joseph L. Eiben was the first diver to enter the submarine and the one who found the bodies. For several days everything had been virtually in readiness for the diver to go into the hull through the hatch leading to the engine room and only weather conditions interfered. The sea was fairly calm this afternoon and C. L. Applegate was the first diver sent. He opened the hatch and after a few minutes was raised to the surface.

Eiben was then sent down with two other divers, R. C. Wilson and F. A. Mattox. While Wilson and Mattox remained on the deck beside the open hatch Eiben climbed

Smith Lays Down Political Views

It Takes 99-Printed Pages To Hold All Platform; Enforcement of Prohibition Law Advocated.

(By Associated Press)
ALBANY, N. Y., Jan. 4.—In 99 printed pages totaling more than 30,000 words, Governor Alfred E. Smith laid before the legislature today and incidentally before the country—a summary of his political platform. By many of his friends and opponents it was considered a fairly complete exposition of the platform on which he might be considered a candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination.

Among points he covered which might be deemed to have national scope, Governor Smith urged state development and control of public water power sites; restoration of the direct primary; extension of basic home rule laws to towns and villages and control by municipalities of public utilities within their jurisdiction. With reference to the broad question of prohibition, the governor urged adoption of an amendment to the state constitution to provide that no amendment to the federal constitution be ratified by future legislators until it had been approved by a referendum.

The message also contained a declaration for strict observance and enforcement of the prohibitory laws. No legislation affecting prohibition was suggested.

BUDA SCHOOL BURNS

135 Pupils Luckily Escape In Blaze

BUDA, Texas, Jan. 4.—The 135 pupils of Buda high school escaped uninjured when the two-story brick building was destroyed by fire Wednesday.

Only the school piano and a small amount of equipment and books were saved. Loss was estimated at \$30,000. The children were marched out and gathered about the playground as the building burned.

Marines On Guard Against Raids by Sandino's Troops

Battle In Congress Over Policy In Nicaragua Echoes Fighting Near Managua; Some Praise.

MANAGUA, Nicaragua, Jan. 4.—American marines and Nicaraguan national guardsmen in the town of Quilichal are on the lookout for an attack by the rebel general, Augusto Sandino, who is believed to be awaiting a favorable opportunity.

Particular care is being taken to prevent a surprise attack on Marine patrols, pack trains, and reinforcements which are being sent daily to Coatal, which is the distribution center supplying Quilichal and the rest of the embattled region.

The very quiet of the situation has put the marines on guard. Sandino is understood to have established a republic in Nueva Segovia after other liberal generals laid down their arms in compliance with an agreement negotiated by Henry L. Stimson, President Coolidge's personal envoy. He is said to have changed the name of San Fernando to Sandino, coined some money, and established prohibition in territory under his control. McNIDER RESIGNS

Robbins Is New Assistant War Secretary

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4.—The long expected resignation of Assistant Secretary Hanford McNider of the war department materialized today when President Coolidge immediately nominated another man, Charles Burton Robbins, of Cedar Rapids, to succeed him.

The resignation of McNider who first came into prominence as national commander of the American Legion, was accompanied by an interchange of complimentary letters between him and the president, in which Mr. Coolidge took cognizance of the assistant secretary's desire to return to business pursuits.

SEEK COOK PAROLE

Head of Counsel Which Sent Up Explorer Pleads

FOR WORTH, Tex., Jan. 4.—Former United States District Attorney Henry Zweifel, who headed government counsel in the case in which Dr. Frederick A. Cook was sentenced to 14 years, and nine months in Leavenworth penitentiary for using the mails to defraud, announced today he would join local business men in an appeal to President Coolidge to reduce Dr. Cook's sentence to a degree that he will be eligible for parole immediately.

Two Children Are Drowned In Tub By Grandmother

Woman Then Drowns Self In Same Manner; No Motive Found To Shed Light On Deed.

MOTHER WAS AWAY AT CLUB MEETING

Kiddies Were One and Six Years of Age; Tragedy Happened at Indianapolis Late Wednesday.

INDIANAPOLIS, Jan. 4.—Two children, aged 1, 2 and 5 years, were drowned by their grandmother who also drowned herself in a bath tub at their home in a prominent residential district here late today. The victims were Helen Shonle, 1-2 years; her sister, Dorothy 5, and the grandmother, Mrs. Ella Shonle.

The tragedy was enacted while the mother of the Shonle girls was at a club meeting. The mother found the youngest child and the grandmother in the bath tub on her return home. The other child's body was lying on a table. No reason was assigned for the act.

ENJOY SNOW

Tech Representatives at Detroit See Ford Plant

DETROIT, Jan. 4.—Texas Technological college delegates to the annual convention of International Students' conference here experienced a change from the warm weather which attended the first three days' sessions when a snowstorm deluged the city the fourth morning of the meeting.

DIRIGIBLE READY

Trans-Atlantic Flight Of Air Liner In Spring

LONDON, Jan. 4.—The new dirigible passenger liner R-100 will make its inaugural Atlantic flight this spring, according to Charles Burrell, managing director of the airship Guarantee Company, announced today that he would sail for New York January 11 to complete landing arrangements for the huge craft.

Passengers already are making reservations. It was said, and the fare is expected to be about 120 pounds (\$600). The R-100 has accommodations for 100 passengers for its trans-Atlantic voyage, and ten tons of mail.

MEXICO AIR LINE

Night Mail Into Texas Will Begin February 1

CHICAGO, Jan. 4.—Opening the way for air mail communication between Mexico City and the United States and moving the Southwest, Chicago and the North Central territory, twelve hours nearer, the National Air Transport, Inc., will start night flying over its Chicago-Dallas line on February 1.

The international phase of the new communication schedule is made possible through the Texas Air Transport which holds contract for carrying mail on two lines out of Dallas to Galveston and Laredo.

SMITH DECLINES

New York Governor Will Not Attend Dinner

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4.—Governor Smith of New York has declined to attend the Jackson Day dinner to be given by the Democratic national committee here on January 12, but it was not apparent tonight to what extent his decision may upset the plans of the party leaders for a general get-together.

CHILD INJURED

Mother Watches, Helpless, As Auto Hits Girl

While her mother watched helplessly to aid, eleven-year-old Betty King, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Oscar King of near Tahoka, was run over by an automobile and sustained a fractured left leg at about 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

The girl was returning home with a number of school-mates from the Dixie school house, about nine miles north of Tahoka, when the accident happened. According to witnesses, the girl was playing tag with the other children, and unaware of the approaching car, darted in front of it.

The driver of the car stopped to aid, and the child was brought to the West Texas hospital here for treatment.

Grand Jury Hears Hickman Account Of Fatal Robbery

For Second Time Youthful Slayer Details Hold-up; Mother and Sister Will Testify at Trial.

(By Associated Press)
LOS ANGELES, Jan. 4.—William Edward Hickman, confessed slayer of little Marian Parker, today for the second time detailed the holdup by himself and his 15-year-old accomplice, Welby Hunt, which resulted in the fatal shooting of C. I. Thomas, Rossmore druggist, on Christmas eve, 1926.

The youth's second telling of the story of the holdup, first given to jail officials several days ago, was before the county grand jury which is considering the voting of indictments against the young holdup men.

Although the bullet that fatally wounded Thomas has been shown to be the same calibre as the pistol carried by Hunt, California law would hold both equally responsible for the murder. Hickman was the last witness of the day before he made a remarkable memory of details of the crime. He drew a map of the scene where the shooting occurred when a policeman opened fire on the holdup men. Hunt took advantage of his privilege and refused to testify before the grand jury.

Fire Death Toll Is 8 In Arkansas

Three More Children Burn To Death, Following Fatal Blaze of Morning; Charge Echoes Fire.

(By Associated Press)
COTTER, Ark., Jan. 4.—Frank Floyd, 16, Velma Parlin, 14, and her five-year-old brother, were burned to death today when fire destroyed the T. C. Farlin home, eight miles west of Cotter, bringing the child fire victim toll in Arkansas today to eight. Velma rescued three younger children, but was trapped when she sought to save her brother, Charles, Charles Floyd and his daughter, Edna, escaped.

Five children of W. G. Denby, near Little Rock, were burned to death in a fire which destroyed their farm home early today.

CHARGE TO FATHER ECHOES DENBY FIRE

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Jan. 4.—W. G. Denby, whose five children were burned to death when his home near here was destroyed by fire today, was arrested tonight on instructions of the prosecuting attorney and placed in jail on an investigation charge and denied bond.

Coroner Samuel G. Boyce said his inquiry disclosed that the heads of the children were crushed. Falling timbers might have caused it, he explained.

BRIBE TRIAL DELAYED

Nacogdoches Peace Officer Lying At Point of Death, Names Deputy As Man Who Did Shooting; No Details

No Charges Filed Pending Outcome of Injuries To Sheriff; Assault Also Suffered Wounds.

OFFICER VIGOROUS FOR ENFORCEMENT

Sheriff Was Out On Raid When Shooting Occurred; No Information Regarding Fight Given.

(By Associated Press)
NACOGDOCHES, Texas, Jan. 4.—T. G. Vaughn, sheriff of Nacogdoches county, late today accused Deputy Sheriff Carl Butler, 48 years old, of shooting him, near here early this morning.

Vaughn was shot in the abdomen and was believed to be dying late tonight. In what he believed would be his last statement, he told former Judge A. T. Russell, local attorney, that the wound was inflicted by Butler, who is under guard in his home here with bullet wounds in his arm.

No charges have been placed against Butler, pending the outcome of Vaughn's injuries. "It is a very regrettable affair," Tom Lambert, chief deputy, and now acting sheriff, said.

Lambert also declined to discuss details of the shooting. Vaughn and Lambert left town yesterday morning in a small coupe, presumably to go on a raid, it was learned. The two drove past Butler's house on their way to the spot where the shooting took place within half a mile of the deputy's residence. Butler went to the home of his mother-in-law, Mrs. J. S. Sumlin, and telephoned Mrs. Vaughn that her husband had been shot. He then went to his own home where his wound was dressed. The wound in Butler's arm which broke the bone, was declared by physicians able to have been caused by a .45-caliber bullet.

SNYDER PLEA TODAY

Last Move for Clemency To Be Made at Albany

ALBANY, N. Y., Jan. 4.—The final appeal for commutation of the death sentence imposed on Mrs. Ruth Brown Snyder and Henry Judd Gray, her accomplice in the murder of her husband, Albert Snyder, will be made to Governor Smith at noon tomorrow. The execution of Mrs. Snyder and Gray, in the Sing Sing death house, has been set for the night of January 12.

The governor received today from Edgar F. Hazleton, of Mrs. Snyder's legal staff, a request for a respite of thirty days.

ARREST MINERS

State Police Arrest 125 for Mass Picketing

DENVER, Colo., Jan. 4.—After several weeks of comparative inactivity, the Colorado coal miners' strike which was called by the Industrial Workers of the World, on October 18, took on new life today. State police arrested 125 strike sympathizers for mass picketing in Huerfano and Fremont counties and staged a raid on the I. W. W. headquarters in Walsenburg.

MURPHY IMPROVING

Man Hurt In Auto Smash Not Internally Hurt

Jimmy Murphy, 33, local drug clerk who was injured when the car which he was driving collided with a laundry truck and overturned at Tenth and Avenue Q, Tuesday, is not internally injured as was at first feared, according to reports from the West Texas hospital, where he was taken following the accident. He suffered a severe shock, but his only bodily injuries are bruises.

Your Pet Perfume

By NEA Service

What an achievement to capture and bottle the soul of a flower—its fragrance!

Yet how many of us ever stop to wonder whence came that delicately scented drop that expensive and highly desired last touch we put on our persons before going out to dinner or tea?

The story of perfume is a real romance dating back to before the time of Cleopatra and the ancient Greeks. These peoples of centuries ago had few materials and no technical knowledge such as we possess today, yet they were able to make perfume of delicate and lasting fragrance. This was proven conclusively when the tomb of Tutankhamen was opened. It seems hard to believe that an odor would persist throughout all those centuries, but fragments of scented stills lingered in the ancient mummy cloths.

The great hub of the perfume industry today is at Grasse, France. Here and at Cannes, Nice and Monaco, places whose very names suggest the greatest elegance in dress and fashion, millions of pounds of blossoms are produced annually. Here the vast gardens of the perfume yield fortunes in orange blossoms, roses, jasmine, violets, cassia and tuberoses. The elusive fragrance of these blossoms is distilled and extracted that hundreds of millions of people may satisfy an aesthetic craving for beauty of scent.

Thousands of peasants toil daily that the blossoms may reach the zenith of perfection. The cultivation affects the odor which will eventually be given out by the extracted oil, so every precaution is taken to understand the peculiar needs of the various species. Nothing short of the best is acceptable. Then, when the blossoms in their prime are gathered, great boilers swallow them up. To some, water is added and they are boiled; the fragrance issuing forth being carefully distilled. Others have their essential oils extracted by a steam process. Still others have various solvents added to them that this the precious oils may be separated.

While the petals of flowers are the largest and most important source of our vegetable perfumes, certain leaves, bark, wood, seeds, roots, fruit rind and resinous gums are also used.

There are raw materials other than these however, without which the perfumer would be totally un-

Beauty! How and Why

THE PRINCIPLE OF DEODORANTS

After plentiful use of soap and water, we come to the disquieting realization that there still remain unpleasant body odors which cannot thus be removed.

Let us study the matter. We find that in the laboratory of the body many wonderful chemical changes are constantly in progress, that waste matter results, and that some of it is deposited on the skin through the pores. These deposits, containing many chemicals of unpleasant odor, are not always soluble in water, and not removable by soap. So we must find some element in which they are soluble or which neutralizes them.

This is the principle underlying all deodorants today. A few drops of liquid or cream compound in the equivalent of a glass of water, used as a wash, will afford relief. Dainty alcohol or liquid antiseptic compound are also good. Borated talcum is an absorbent and corrective. Besides these, there are many fine proprietary articles, both in liquid and in powder form, as well as creams.

able to combat his previous liquids. These are the secretions of the glands of certain animals. The four kinds of animal perfumes are musk, civet, castor and ambergris. The first three are produced by such animals as the musk deer, muskrat, musk ox, Florida alligator, civet and beaver.

The source of ambergris, perhaps the most important, was for many years a mystery. Large masses of a waxy substance were found floating in tropical seas. It was determined that much experimentation that by adding a few drops of this substance to perfumes under the proper conditions a lasting quality was given to the scent. So an effort was made to discover the source of ambergris. It was finally found to be a secretion from the whale.

These four animal perfumes are known as "fixatives" because they cause the odor imparted by the vegetable essences to last. They make the finished product tenacious. Since the public now demands that all perfumes cling, it would be waste without useless to attempt the successful marketing of an "unfixed" vegetable essence.

The trade of the perfumer is an art as well as a science. From the same recipe the true artist and the layman would produce a very different article. It takes an innate knowledge of scent perfection as

HOOPER SEES GOOD YEAR AHEAD FOR UNITED STATES

The phenomena usually accredited as a monitor of a slump were absent and United States enters the New Year with the forces of stability dominant in the business world. Secretary Herbert Hoover of the commerce department said a statement regarding business prospects for 1928. Mr. Hoover explained, however, that such industries as agriculture, textiles, bituminous coal and some metals still lagged behind. He held to an important bearing on the future decrease in wholesale prices of non-agricultural products, pointing out that to a great extent to which industry had accommodated itself to the decline makes for a sounder condition for the coming year.

"There is an ample supply of credits at rates," Mr. Hoover said. "The somewhat larger stocks of goods accumulated the summer are being reduced; there is no consequential speculation in commodities; the crops have been abundant; prices are at a high level; we are recovering from some unemployment, especially in the motor car industry. "There is peace in most sections of the world except bituminous coal; there more peace in the international world than at any time since the war; the foreign world is recovering its economic strength and buying power; therefore, the foreign trade is steadily increasing, the phenomena usually accredited as a precursor of a slump are therefore absent."

Of the changes in prices, which he characterized as "important shifts in our economic world," Mr. Hoover said: "While the average wholesale price of commodities at about 50 per cent above pre war is today the same as a year ago, yet if we divide them into agricultural and non-agricultural goods, it will be found that the average price of non-agricultural products has fallen in the months from about 60 per cent above pre war level to 51 per cent pre war while the average of agricultural products central markets has risen from about 10 per cent above pre war to about 53 per cent above pre war."

"However, prices on the farm show a rise of from about 30 per cent to 40 per cent above the pre war basis. Manufacture and distribution have by savings and diminished profits accommodated themselves to this situation of decreasing prices without reduction in the average level of wages. But the great extent to which industry has accommodated itself to lower prices by decreased costs makes for a sounder condition for the ensuing year. Despite decreasing prices, production and consumption of manufactured commodities have been maintained upon high level, as shown by car loadings of the class of goods, which have been about equal to those of last year."

AID YOUTH, NOT CONVICT

Speaking before the Rotary club at Austin, former Gov. Pat M. Neff of Texas stirred his listeners when he charged that "crime has been made a vocation of the profession of law-breaking and law-breaking today is the most profitable in the state of Texas." The speaker centered his attack on citizens of the state who, he claims, are spending their time making things easy for the criminal instead of working toward the betterment of youth. People raise a howl about the high cost of education in Texas," Mr. Neff is quoted as saying. "It is high time that some of you raised a voice against the high cost of ignorance in the state. Solicitations and appeals are constantly pouring into the state offices to make it easier and easier for the convict. If you have any money to spend on the youth of the state, go out and find some one not in the penitentiary. Don't help the convict," he concluded. Prompted by a desire in conformity with the views expressed by Mr. Neff in the last paragraph above, a bunch of Denton Kiwanians spent one day recently at the Boy Scout hut in the city park there which is sponsored by the Kiwanis club to give some personal service in the interest of the boys. We are told by the Denton Record-Chronicle that pine slabs had been secured from Texarkana with

The hut is now very attractive, with the large rock chimney, pine logs on the lower half of the walls and the upper half covered with shingles. It is such a worthwhile contact with the boys of this state, that will lessen the number of crimes and criminals.

MORE POLITICS

There are six bills before the House of Representatives, calling for reapportionment of members on the basis of the census of 1920, in accordance with the constitution.

For the first time the plain mandate of the constitution has been ignored, with the result that a system of "rotten boroughs" has come into existence.

There is no excuse in the world for the failure of Congress to reapportion the representatives. It is simply rotten politics. It is simply a matter of fear that some of the states will lose a few representatives and others will gain some and the fear is that there will be a change in the complexion of Congress, and things will not go as well possibly for a certain class of people.

Now, according to the best judgment in the House, no reapportionment will be made until after the 1930 census. Therefore, some states will get more votes in the electoral college than they are entitled to.

The whole subject of districts for Congressional elections should be looked into. The average population per district for the nation is 211,877. Detroit, with 1,420,000 people, has only two districts, although entitled to more. Gerrymandering has been resorted to in other places. These practices should be investigated.

SAFETY AND THE SUBS

Considerable discussion follows the loss of the S-4. Everybody and his brother is rushing into print to tell the navy how accidents of this kind should have been prevented. Some valuable suggestions may result and future lives be saved, but, it seems that most of them have been considered and eliminated for one or two reasons. Either they have been:

(a) Impractical, or,
(b) The installation of various devices, to be used after accidents, would sacrifice essential safety in operation, and tend to increase accidents.

While we hold no brief for the naval experts, who have considered and reported on many suggested safety devices, it does seem to us that they should know something of the risks to be run. If, in their judgment, it is safer to put every ounce of space and strength into making submarines safer in operation, rather than in providing equipment and devices for use only after accidents, the layman will have to accept their verdict.

Naturally, there will be a full investigation by Congress and the suggested safety devices will be advertised. The naval experts will have to justify their exclusion by overwhelming reasons or suffer the harsh condemnation of the public generally. The fate of the trapped submarine sailors is too fresh in memory, and their slow death too harrowing to be lightly overlooked.

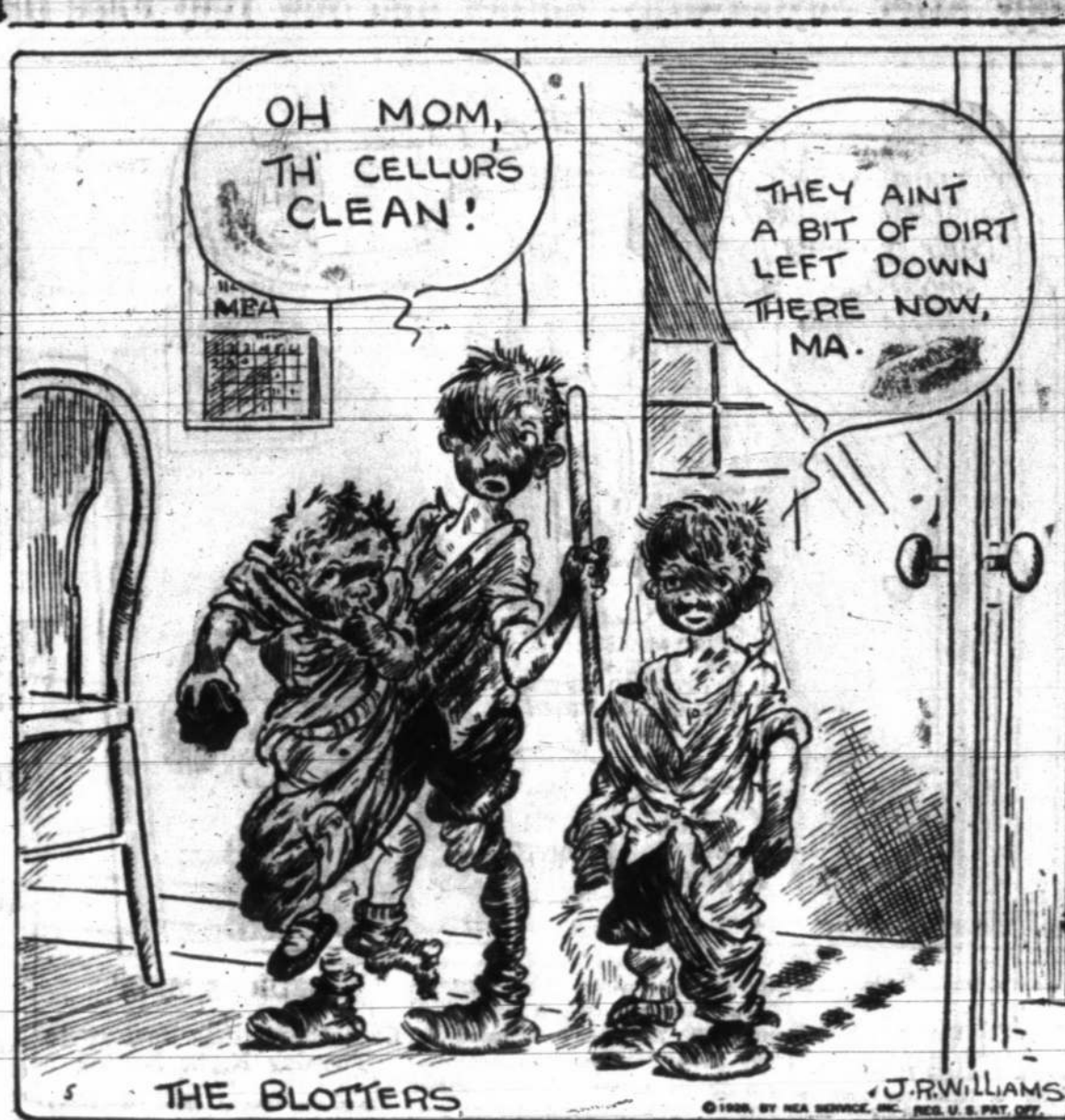
NATURE'S STAMP

UNIFORM ACCOUNTING FOR CRIMINALS

Establishment of criminal statistics in every state of the union, is recommended by the National Crime Commission.

Based upon the findings of an investigating committee headed by former Governor Frank O. Lowden, of Illinois, the report states that America has more crime than any other civilized nation and has the world's worst criminal statistics.

Annual police reports of America were termed little less than ridiculous. The statistical bureaus recommended by the crime commission, coupled with central identification bureaus also suggested, would be of enormous assistance to the federal census bureau in tabulation of criminal data.

In civil affairs such as operating railroads, public utilities and national banks, the law requires uniform reports of the most intricate character and private companies have to furnish these reports to state and federal governments so that public officials can check them in the smallest detail.

In public affairs and police court records, why cannot the same uniformity and thoroughness be required?

Why should the criminal be encouraged in carrying on his work due to lack of public information regarding his crime? Why not keep as accurate a check on criminals as we do on honest and legitimate business?

Why blame the war, the modern jazz age, bootleg liquor, the movies, revolvers or our large cities for the "crime profession?" Instead of warring on the criminal, we pass more laws further restricting law-abiding citizens in the hope that the criminals will be checked by a new law. He laughs at such tactics knowing the more laws we have, the more loopholes there are for him to crawl through and evade punishment. Uniform laws, uniform enforcement and uniform penalties would get results.—Denison Herald.

YOUR HEALTH

When a person is resting, his organs on certain functions that are necessary to life. The glands secrete, the heart beats, the breathing goes on.

As a result there is a consumption of oxygen, a formation of carbonic acid, an expenditure of energy and the production of heat. The expenditure of energy is minimal because it is necessary only for the carrying on of the automatic functions of life.

When the individual is awake, he carries on other activities, such as involves motion of muscles which are superimposed upon the fundamental and automatic activities. If the individual is in the body to develop heat to keep the individual at a normal temperature.

Allowing For Atmosphere. Obviously, an attempt to measure his basal metabolism will take into account this factor and he will be provided with a sufficiently warm atmosphere to make it unnecessary for the body to produce heat for that purpose.

The quantity of heat produced during the time when the individual is in perfect repose depends on the weight of the individual and the total surface of his body. These factors are, of course, correlated. The greater the extent of the surface of the body, the more the surface is exposed to cold or change in temperature.

Medical investigation has shown that the basal metabolism of the individual varies according to the automatic activities of the body. In some glandular disturbances, particularly of the thyroid gland, the basal metabolism is increased due to hastening of the body functions. In other conditions, when the glands are inactive, the basal metabolism may be lowered.

Another Deciding Factor. This science has available another measurable factor with which to determine the state of health of the human body and its ability to respond to various stresses.

The fact that conditions are measurable and that they occur again and again in the same way, under the same circumstances, makes scientific fact. Such things are not to be changed with belief.

BETTER FARMING MUST BE ENCOURAGED

If there is one plan which should be encouraged in Howard county it is that of crop rotation. Planting the one crop in the same plot of ground year after year is nothing short of mining the land and in the course of years it will become non-productive.

Cotton is especially hard on land and Howard county farmers who plant cotton year after year in the same old field are courting disaster. If you doubt this statement make a trip to the black land belt of Texas and see what has transpired where cotton has been planted in the same fields year after year. The lighter soils of West Texas cannot stand up under this bad practice nearly as long as has the deep, black land. Read the following account of a trip to the county agent of Shafter county, recently made to East Texas, which we clip from the Albany News:

During a recent trip to East Texas in company with R. R. Pool and Jesse English and in search of Jersey cattle, the county agent saw the results of one-crop systems as he had never seen before. Also, the great place that the hen, the cow and the sow hold in Texas agriculture and the influence they have on the wealth and happiness of the farmer. During this trip he party traveled through various types of country, soil and kinds of agriculture. One locality stands out in my mind as a living example of a horrible condition brought about by a one-crop system for farming. The farmers here grow only cotton and all kinds of livestock.

This locality is located in the east of the black belt. The soil is black as coal and 20 feet deep. No reason why it should not produce a crop with any country on earth. Yet this very community is poverty stricken, bankrupt, broke, and all in all in the hardest shape of any place I've ever seen. The houses are un-down, the barns have gone to rack, the fences are all gone, lots of the people have moved away, the fields are not in cultivation, what people there are seem to stay because they can't get away. Talk about Near East relief. These people are near us to the East and they sure need relief.

The town that is the center of this farming locality, at one time was a busy, peppy growing town. Now the buildings are run down, the streets are not kept up, the bank went broke, half of the merchants have gone broke and the other half look and act like they

are well on the road to bankruptcy. Everybody has a face a mile long and would not smile for fear of breaking their features. Special notice was taken of the autos we saw on the streets. They were all old on an run down. The latest model we saw in town at all was an old 1925 model Ford coupe. We saw no good teams in the country. They were all broken down, rat-tailed old mules.

Go by many houses along the road and they would not have a single chicken on the place, not a hog, and in many places, not even a milk cow. The fences were all torn down, no pastures, no place to keep livestock. They raise no feed, yet it is a fine corn country. They have no barns or grain bins. Just a wire corral and haul out meal and hulls from town to feed their work animals.

This locality, so a merchant told us, used to make 8,000 to 15,000 bales of cotton. This year he said they would barely make 2,000 bales. A few years ago land in this place sold for \$50 an acre to \$100 per acre with the majority of it worth about \$50 per acre. Loan companies have practically the entire country. One-crop systems of farming have allowed ditches to come into the fields. Many tracts of land have been taken by gullies because it was not terraced.

While traveling through this land of wasted resources, occasionally, like an oasis in a desert, you could see a well improved, well kept up, farmstead. The house was nice, painted, and well kept. There was a good little barn, granaries, cow sheds, barn lots, chicken houses and all in all looked like someone lived there and were doing well in the world.

What Made the Difference? A second look showed a big bunch of hens, four to six cows, Jerseys, two to 12 hogs, and right there is the difference in this thrifty farmer and the bankrupt farmer. The thrifty farmer grows corn feed for his hens, hogs, pigs and cows; he can rotate his crops and as a result his land produces better; he has plenty of eggs, meat, milk and butter to use at home and some to sell. His income is steady, he's getting by—he's making a little money. The county agent took special notice and wherever he could see a big flock of hens, several milk cows, some hogs and some feed, he could always see a well kept farmstead in good shape. On the other hand, none of the badly run down places that showed its owner was getting places had these features about the place.—Big Spring Herald.

What Should a Philosopher Know About It?

"A man past 30 is incapable of love," is the latest dictum of Dr. Will C. Durant, and pending the report of Signor D'Annunzio it may be well to examine this statement while the atmosphere is still unsaturated with heat.

Our good notion is that if Dr. Durant had stopped to think about two seconds longer he wouldn't have made the statement. It would have occurred to him that to say a man is incapable of love after 30 is to say he is incapable of writing poetry after 30.

The quality that a man needs to be a poet is the same quality that he needs to be a lover. It is of ecstasy and imagination all compact, and age has nothing to do with it. Samuel Johnson was a lover at twice 30. Naturally, being a poet, he didn't write much poetry, but he was a poet just the same, because he had a poet's illusions. One of them was that his wife was a "pretty creature," which she wasn't. The flippant will try to explain that the old doctor was near-sighted, but that is a lie. His wife was pretty to him because he was in love with her.

As long as a man can have illusions—and he can have them through life if he happens to be a poet—he is capable of love. Dr. Durant says it can't be "the full flame of love." What makes him think so? In youth a man mistakes a rush light for the full flame of love; that's why so many men marry young. It is only after the hot fever of youth has passed that a man learns to distinguish between a spark and a flame.

Whom did Shakespeare love—the Anne Hathaway of his youth or the dark lady of the sonnets? The young poet wrote no sonnets to Anne. The mature poet was led by the ear by the dark lady. It was not the full flame of love that the poet poured into the sonnets, then Dr. Durant is a poor judge of sonnets.

We are afraid he is a poor judge of love also. It's the penalty perhaps of concentrating too much on philosophy. He should forsake that barren science if it is a science, which we doubt, and woo a little of that irrationality that is poetry and love. They can't be put into a straitjacket like philosophy, no system can be founded on them, and they are not susceptible of any scientific explanation, which is perhaps why they are so popular. For the same reason they cannot be disposed of by dicta; and we are surprised that Dr. Durant didn't know it.

Now we make way for Signor D'Annunzio.

Small Town Lovers Copy After Snyder-Gray Murder And Now They Face Hangman's Noose



LIKE MRS. SNYDER, MRS. JOWERS HAD HER LOVER IN THE HOUSE

By NEA Service
HOMER, La., Jan. 4.—When a Long Island housewife named Ruth Snyder plotted with her co-set-seller lover, Judd Gray, to club her husband to death, the echoes of the affair were heard in the remote confines of the Louisiana town of Haynesville, near here. They put an idea in the heads of Elisha Swift, ne'er-do-well soft drink salesman, and Mrs. Effie Jowers, wife of a small-town storekeeper.

As a result, J. F. Jowers, the husband, is dead and Mrs. Jowers and Swift have confessed to his murder and are facing trial for their lives in a crime that is almost the exact counterpart of the Snyder-Gray murder—except that it was, if possible, even more sordid and repellent.

Copied Ruth and Judd
The two prisoners admit that the Snyder-Gray crime was their model.

Mrs. Jowers, a thin, discouraged-looking woman who looks even less like a principal in a flaming romance than Mrs. Snyder, says: "Swift and I read about the Snyder-Gray murder. Every detail of it. Swift thought he could improve on it by hiding the body so it could never be found. We thought that Gray and Ruth Snyder had made a mistake in leaving the body where it was."

Swift and Mrs. Jowers had been maintaining a romance for a year—a romance that everyone in town knew about but Jowers. Swift visited Mrs. Jowers every day when Jowers would come home before he left. Swift would hide in the attic until Jowers had fallen asleep.

This might have gone on indefinitely had not the Long Island murder been found. We thought that Gray and Ruth Snyder had planned a mistake in leaving the body where it was."

At last Jowers' high-pitched shrieks announced that he was asleep. Mrs. Jowers called Swift. He came into the bedroom. Mrs. Jowers held a light and Swift swung a four pound sledge hammer. It was soon over.

Jowers was too heavy for Swift to carry down to his auto. So Paul was pressed into unwilling service and father and son dragged the body downstairs, across the living room floor and loaded it into the auto. Then they drove for miles to a bridge over a lonely bayou, where Swift tied heavy weights to the body and dumped it into the water.

The next day Mrs. Jowers announced that her husband had left her. Her story was generally disbelieved, but Sheriff John Coleman, suspicious, went to her home to question her.

It was Sunday and she was varnishing her living room floor. This made the sheriff more suspicious so, a few days later, when she was away, he entered and examined the floor.

As he suspected the varnish was being used to cover blood stains. Mrs. Jowers and Swift were arrested. After a brief questioning they confessed, implicating the boy. Paul Dupuis found Paul at a movie and brought him to the jail. The boy seemed relieved at being arrested.

"I'm glad you got me," he said. "I couldn't sleep ever since that night. Lots of times I was going to tell about it, but Pop wouldn't let me."

Then the boy revealed a strange, shadowy drama—the drama of the semi-literate soft drink salesman forcing his son to help with a murder, stifling the boy's protests with blows and threats and compelling him to take part in a tragedy that robbed the lad of sleep for days afterward.

When the two went to Jowers' home together Paul knew that Jowers was to be killed. "I wouldn't do that, Pop," said the boy. "I won't help you do it."

"You'll do just as I say or I'll thrash you," snarled Swift.

Then later, on the rickety bridge over the lonely bayou while father and son posed the lifeless body on the rail, Paul pleaded again. "I told Pop that wasn't any way to do it," he says. "I told him that if he was going to do that he ought to bury him right. I told him he should be buried. I asked him how he would like to be done that way."

But the boy's protests were useless. Swift made him help put Jowers' body in the creek. Later it was Paul who showed the officers where the body was.

Mrs. Jowers and Swift offered to plead guilty and accept life sentences. But the prosecutor refused, announcing that he would put them on trial and demand the death penalty. The trial will begin soon.

And in the courtyard of the jail where they are confined, right under the window carpenters are at work on a new cell for the two prisoners.

Now, the two prisoners are in Louisiana's counterpart to the Snyder-Gray murder. The principal is a little lower in the scale to be sure, but the whole affair is a little bit more sordid—a trifling shadow on a bright sun.

But it is a parallel as Mrs. Jowers rather proudly says.

Trying to Escape
Mrs. Jowers like Ruth Snyder, thought her husband too contentedly with the rule. Which life had placed him. She told, in jail how once, years ago, she had induced him to quit being a roving preacher and become a storekeeper.

"Now, of course, I wouldn't like this to become known," she said in her drawing voice, "but Mistuh Jowhu was not such a very good preacher. He wasn't educated so very good. You know, a preacher has to be pretty educated these days to get any money. So we decided he was to quit bein' a preacher."

An then—along came Swift, with a promise of relief from the life of a village storekeeper's wife. And then came the accounts of the Snyder-Gray murder.

Aviation Science Better's Windmill

Air Industry, After Borrowing Idea, Now Ready to Return It to Farm, With Improvements.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4.—Aero-nautics, having borrowed the windmill from the farm to adapt it to the needs of a new art, is ready to pay the debt by returning the implement, scientifically refined, to the farm for the operation of lighting plants.

The old-fashioned windmill has been used for generations chiefly to operate pumps, but for 150 years prior to the World War little progress had been made toward a scientific understanding of its principles.

Aviation development during the war, however, brought the aerodynamic method of analysis to the problem, and within the last few years windmills have been made useful for driving radio-electric generators, centrifugal gasoline pumps and similar accessories of the airplane.

Regan By Army

The new analysis of the windmill was begun in the Army aerodynamics laboratories at Dayton, under the supervision of E. S. Fales, chief of the department of radio-electric-generator drive, working in collaboration with H. R. Stuart, who handled the generator development in the war-time aircraft radio program. As a result of their researches, outlined before the American Society of Mechanical Engineers by Mr. Fales, he said it has been possible to devise a propeller-type, high speed windmill for non-aircraft use which will operate the generator of a farm lighting plant.

Due to its improved lightness, efficiency and cheapness and to its higher rotative speed, he said competition with gasoline farm lighting plants is now possible.

Fifteen or 20, he added, are in use to light beacons on airways between Cheyenne and Salt Lake City. They differ from the old-fashioned American or "wind rose" and Dutch types in their blades, which are one to four in number of streamline cross-section, like those of an airplane propeller.

The speed of revolution, he placed at six to 16 times that of the "Wind Rose" type, wheel of equal diameter in equal wind velocity.

"CLOW" BULB MADE

New Product Gives Light After Current Off

EAST PITTSBURGH, Pa., Jan. 4.—Ordinary electric bulbs glow only when wired to electric power and go out instantly when the power is turned off. In the laboratories of the Westinghouse Electric company, however, Dr. Phillips Thomas, research engineer, has developed a bulb without wires which glows when held in a magnetic field and ceases to glow for 15 minutes after the power is shut off.

Were such bulbs used for lighting, a brisk person could turn on the lights in his bedroom and undress before the room was dark.

Dr. Thomas produced the bulb in the course of experiments on power by radio. He says it is not practical at present for general illumination.

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Corruption Hit By Turks' Ruler

Kemal Pasha Lets Associates Know That Era of Graft in Nation Is At An End.

ANGORA, Turkey, Jan. 4.—Hurling a golden bejeweled cigarette case across the banquet hall of the presidential mansion and shouting, "I refuse by accepting this gift to ally myself with those who steal the money of the Turkish people," Mustafa Kemal Pasha, president of Turkey, recently gave a dramatic slap at governmental corruption with which the nation is still re-sounding.

The donor of the cigarette case was a cabinet minister whose transactions had just been exposed to the press before the banquet in question.

Determined to break the tradition of governmental acceptance of bakshesh, as he has killed other immemorial customs, the executive followed up his spectacular refusal of the cigarette case by forcing the implicated minister to resign.

He has acted also to eliminate dishonesty among officials by ordering that salaries be paid regularly, instead of in the slipshod and spasmodic manner of empire days.

And by ruling that deputies, ministers and officials of the people's party may hold no position in monopolies, banks or other business concerns in which the government is interested.

Mustapha Kemal's personal honesty is acknowledged even by those who do not sympathize with his policies. His entire fortune, including his model farm, a mansion at Tchan-Kaya and gifts from the nation and foreign rulers, estimated at about \$500,000, he has willed to the people's party.

MOTHER AND SISTER

TO BE ON STAND

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 4. (AP)—The mother and sister of William E. Hickman will take the stand here today in the trial of the youths charged with the slaying of Marian Parker.

No Action Proposed.

That was not strong or specific enough for Heflin, of Alabama, who offered a resolution to repudiate the Stimson Nicaraguan agreement and demanding immediate recall of the marines. House activities did

not go beyond the speeches. No action was proposed but Representative Huddleston, of Alabama, declared the "war" in Nicaragua, was that of the administration, not of the people.

From the Republican side Wainwright of New York and Begg of Ohio, defended the Nicaraguan policy as necessary to protect not only American but other foreign lives.

"Must Maintain Policy"

"We must maintain the Monroe Doctrine or disavow it like a man," Begg said, while the Democratic leader, Garrett, of Tennessee, contended that while Americans abroad should be protected, he would like to know what American lives or property had been in danger in Nicaragua. There was no business before the House except the president's message, asking legislation to create an S-4 investigation commission of three civilians and two retired admirals, with full congressional powers, and the \$89,000,000 money bill for the state, justice, commerce and labor departments, reported out of committee for later debate.

Chairman Butler, of the naval committee, was ready with the necessary resolution to round off the administration's move to still clamoring over the submarine disasters until the facts and possible remedies can be examined impartially. So after a first hand exposition from La Guardia of New York, of the difficulties of the salvage operations, derived from a mid-winter cruise to the scene in a sister submarine, the House called it a day after two-hour session.

HIT AT GRAND JURY

Civil Action May Be Taken On Sinclair Probers

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4. (AP)—Striking back at the federal grand jury that charged Harry F. Sinclair, William J. McGowan, and five associates with conspiracy to obstruct justice, counsel for Sinclair announced today that they were considering "serious civil action" against the members of the jury based on the fact that no indictments were returned. As a preliminary step toward the contemplated action, a motion was filed in the supreme court of the District of Columbia, to expunge from the court records all mention of a presentment returned by the grand jury last Friday.

The presentment was returned after District Attorney Gordon had declined to draw up indictments, based on it.

down the ladder into the compartment. Almost immediately his foot struck the first body. When it lay in a slight depression in the floor of the submarine, somewhat above the hatch and on the port side.

Tells of Finding Bodies

A moment later, on the opposite side of the compartment, he found the second body. The third was near the control room but farthest forward. He then lifted each body up to the opening in the hull where the other divers raised them to the deck of the submarine. Wilson then entered the hull and aided Eiben after the three bodies had been taken from the compartment. The divers signalled for a line to be lowered. The bodies were attached and raised to a point about ten feet below the surface.

The three divers were then raised to the surface and a surf boat was sent to the diving platform. Carrying baskets provided previously for the purpose, the bodies were lifted to the surface and immediately out into the baskets and covered with canvas. Each was marked with a tag. "Engine Room No. 1," "Engine Room No. 2," "Engine Room No. 3." These were the only identifications possible.

NAVAL OFFICER GIVES TESTIMONY

BOSTON, Jan. 4. (AP)—The submarine S-4 had just completed her day's work of submerged trial runs

when she was rammed and sunk by the coast guard destroyer Paulding, off Provincetown, December 17, the naval court of inquiry investigating the loss of the vessel with her 40 officers and men, was informed today.

The witness, the first to be called in the hearing which opened at the Boston navy yard today, was Lieut. Frank L. Worden, commander of the submarine S-4, sister ship of the S-4. Basing his opinion on the program of the S-3, which completed standardization trials on the Provincetown course just before the S-4 embarked on hers, Lieut. Worden said the submarine had finished two "spots"—at three runs each over the measured mile and was coming to the surface when the collision came.

ADMINISTRATION SETS INVESTIGATION ASTIR

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4. (AP)—In answer to the nation's question concerning the loss of the S-4 with her 40 officers and men, the administration took steps today to set in motion an investigation by a specially appointed commission.

Identical resolutions to carry out the president's suggestion were introduced at once in the House and the Senate with indications that final action would be taken within a few days.

Besides inquiring into the disaster itself, the commission would study and make recommendations for the improvement of devices to insure the future safety of the navy's submarine forces and to prevent so far as possible the repetition of the S-4 tragedy.

Its report would be made to congress through the president, insuring complete publicity for its findings and recommendations. The president's proposal, which included an expense appropriation of \$20,000 occasioned brief discussion in the two houses and apparently headed off the charges which had been promoted by a number of congressional statements during the Christmas holidays.

of the order there was challenged on the floors of the House and Senate today, by democratic and independent members. The challenge was withdrawn.

The challenges came less than 24 hours after the state department had explained emergency orders dispatching 1,000 additional marines to Nicaragua by the flat declaration that the Washington government "fully intends" to carry out the terms of the Stimson agreement for American supervision of the Nicaraguan presidential election this year.

Huddleston Attacks Policy. Referring to recent hostilities in Nicaragua which have cost the lives of six American marines, Representative Huddleston, (Dem.) of Alabama, declared it the "administration's" and not "the American people's" war.

We cannot have free ballot boxes at home and abroad, he said, if the ballot boxes in foreign countries. In the Senate the challenge went unanswered by regular Republicans, but in the House two of the majority party, Representative Begg of Ohio and Wainwright of New York, former assistant secretary of war, presented any implication that the department was engaged in war.

Begg Defends

"This is not a war" declared Begg. "This is preserving the peace and protecting the lives of our citizens in other countries because there is no stable government there. The United States is protecting the peace of the world."

In this view Wainwright concurred at the other end of the capital city. New York Senator Charles McNary, Republican, independent, presented a resolution which would prohibit use of the army, navy, or marines to settle disputes between Americans and foreign countries.

Senator Heflin, (Dem.) of Alabama, promptly supplemented his proposal with a resolution demanding withdrawal of the marines from Nicaragua. Both resolutions were referred to the foreign relations committee.

While the Nicaraguan developments were creating this uproar in congress, the administration put further pressure on its moves to back up the marines already in the central American country. The navy department announced that detachments from San Diego, California, and Parris Island, S. C. would sail on January 9 and that several light cruisers were enroute from various points to Nicaraguan ports.

Deny Rumors

The state department denied flatly statements of Pedro Zapata, a Nicaraguan liberal agent in Mexico City, that "several hundred" American marines had been killed in Nicaragua in recent months and information as to these casualties suppressed in the United States. The department placed the total of marine casualties to date at 16 killed and about 40 wounded, while it said estimates of casualties to the Sandino forces ranged from 381 to 456 killed, with no estimates as to the recent fighting.

He said that the present was no time for "inflammatory speech" and that the situation afforded a "most glorious opportunity for a man who wants to be careless with his facts."

In the house during the hour or so of discussion of the Nicaraguan situation, Representative Garrett, Democratic leader, affirmed the policy of protection of American lives and property in foreign countries, but asked when the life and property of any American citizen in Nicaragua had been endangered. Contending that the strife in Nicaragua was the Coolidge plan of pacification, Huddleston said that it also came at a time when "our am-

Southwest Due To Have Profitable Year In Business

Tide Turns for Better In Southwest, Avers Lynn P. Talley, Federal Reserve Governor.

(By Associated Press)
DALLAS, Jan. 4.—Disappointing returns from this district's 1926 crops have had a depressing effect upon business in the Southwest during the past year. Nevertheless, the tide has now definitely turned, according to Lynn P. Talley, governor Federal Reserve bank of Dallas.

"A fairly large and an unusually profitable cotton crop this year has more than recovered the ground lost in last year's operations and the section is more favorable than it has been at this season for several years. Current conditions of banking and business conditions, such as deposits, bank debits and prices of agricultural products, including livestock, show a healthy improvement over a year ago, notwithstanding the continued depression in the oil industry."

"The purchasing power of the agricultural population has been favorably affected by three distinct factors—reduced production costs, due principally to the heavy yields of the district's feed crops in 1926 and 1927, the higher price of cotton and the advanced price of livestock."

"Agricultural economies brought about by the low price of the 1926 cotton crop and by the large supply of home-grown feedstuffs produced last year, resulted in greatly reducing the demand for credit in connection with financing the production of 1927 crops. By curtailing their use of bank credit, the farmers found themselves at the harvest season in possession of a large equity or margin in their crops available for meeting debts current needs and reserves for operating capital in 1928."

"Their enhanced purchasing power is reflected in the rise of deposits, which on October 10, 1927, passed the billion-dollar mark in this district for the second time in its history. The outlook at this time for a progressive rate of increase in deposits each month until midwinter, with chances favorable for attaining a new high record in total deposits, at the peak point for the season."

ABILENE GROWING

442 New Homes In Year: \$3,236,628 In Permits

ABILENE, Jan. 4. (AP)—During the year 1927 442 residences were erected in the city of Abilene. The aggregate cost of these structures was \$3,236,628. Business structures, 97 of them, were erected during the same time and \$1,635,627 was expended in their building.

Permits totaling \$3,236,628 were issued by R. A. Miller, city building inspector. This total was divided among 731 different permits. The difference between the total of the residences and business building permits having been taken up by industrial building and repair jobs.

However, the 731 permits issued during the year do not show the full growth of Abilene. Building estimated to have cost \$814,300 was completed during the year in suburban districts and these were not taken into account in compiling the totals for the municipality. Of that amount, \$621,500 was in four residence additions that were annexed by the city during December.

On top of that, street paving totaling \$600,000 was laid during the year. Those two items together with the actual total of permits issued from a grand total of improvements in the city for the year of \$4,454,528.

The boy suffered a collapsed lung and broken rib in the accident.

Lean Times For Cattleman Past

Better Markets Point To New Era of Prosperity For Livestock Owners Says Arizona Man.

(By Associated Press)
PHOENIX, Ariz., Jan. 4.—There is every indication that the lean and hungry years in the livestock industry are being replaced by a period of much more satisfactory returns, according to Dwight B. Heard, former president, American National Livestock association. Information gathered from reliable sources shows that a great improvement has been experienced in the cattle business throughout the Southwest in the past year.

"The years 1920 to 1925 were depressing to those in the cattle business. However, in 1926, range conditions greatly improved and market conditions were bettered. During 1927 throughout Arizona, New Mexico, West Texas and California range conditions have been extremely good, cattle have been in fine growing condition and are reported going into the winter months in satisfactory flesh, with abundant reserve feed on the ranges."

"Stockmen report that production of calves in Arizona and New Mexico has been excellent. While it is reported that the number of cattle is somewhat below normal, California is said to have somewhat above the average of recent years."

"Prices for feeder cattle during 1927 indicate a steady increase. The market for fat beef cattle has been quite steady, with an inclination to a stiffening of prices during recent weeks."

"With the continued satisfactory operation of the Western Cattle Marketing association throughout the Southwest, it is evident that the fat cattle market will be further stabilized and prices will probably show the increase necessary to make feeding operations satisfactory."

BUT WILL THEY?

Bryan Says Demos To Carry 35 States

LINCOLN, Neb., Jan. 4. (AP)—With the right kind of candidate, the democratic party should sweep 35 states in the 1928 presidential election, says Charles W. Bryan, former governor of Nebraska, and party nominee for vice president in 1924.

The right kind of candidate, he thinks, would be "a genuine Jeffersonian democrat from the middle west, in harmony with the great agricultural states of the west and south."

If nominated, he avers, such a man could carry ten southern states, five border states, eleven western states and nine middle western states, which have a total electoral vote of 235.

Bryan set forth his views in a letter to Chen Shaver of Fairmont, W. Va., chairman of the democratic national committee.

JOHN'S OYSTER RESORT AT GALVESTON BURNED

GALVESTON, Jan. 4. (AP)—John's oyster resort, well known throughout Texas, was destroyed by fire today with a probable loss in excess of \$25,000.

Texas U. Regents Seek Legal Help

Private Attorneys Will Represent University In Oil Litigation Due To Be Heard Soon

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Jan. 4.—Assured of certainly no more than nominal support from the attorney general's department, the Texas university board of regents has turned to permit private attorneys to represent it in pending litigation affecting its vast oil tanks and involving millions of dollars, it developed today.

Validity of practically every major regulation under which the lands are leased is in the balance with the institution occupying a position peculiar to itself and differentiated from all other outside interests.

Attorney General Claude Pollard, although he has made no formal announcement has caused the board to know that his department will probably not support their position. Mr. Pollard feels that although to a certain extent he has been "committed" to a position taken by the department under Governor Dan Moody when he was attorney general, his convictions concerning the matters of law involved.

Chief among the suits are those for mandamus against J. T. Robinson, seeking the forced issuance of mineral permits on the contention that state law purporting to relinquish to fee simple owners of state lands, and that fifteen-sixths of mineral found thereon is unconstitutional.

11 STATES REPRESENTED

New Leads Into Documents Will Be Pursued

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4 (AP).—New leads in the search into the authenticity of Mexican documents published in Hearst newspapers will be pursued tomorrow by the special Senate committee at the resumption of public hearings.

Chief witnesses summoned are James B. Sheffield, former ambassador to Mexico and Arthur Bliss Lane, now chief of the state department's Latin American division, and first secretary of the American embassy at Mexico City at the time Miguel Avila procured for the Hearst interests the documents purporting to show that a Mexican fund of \$12,125,000 had been provided for four United States senators.

RULE IN COOK CASE

Violators of Federal Laws Must Begin Terms

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4 (AP).—The supreme court ruled today that persons convicted of violating federal laws can be placed on probation only before they have actually begun to serve their sentences.

Once the prison doors have closed behind them, the court declared, the federal courts before which they were convicted are powerless to shorten or suspend their sentences, and relief can come only from the president or the parole board, acting under the attorney general.

The controversy which was precipitated by Dr. Frederick A. Cook, the arctic explorer, who was sentenced to 14 years and nine months in Leavenworth and fined \$12,000 for using the mails to defraud.
