The scientists that heard from the learned astronomer Moulton about the earth's probable age, one million million years, practically all of it still ahead of us, heard also about the size of our corner of space, our galaxy in which the sun is as a grain of sand. It is shaped like a watch, its dimensions are thirty thousand light years through from front to back, two hundred million years through the wide way, across the face of the watch. To get the distance across our galaxy multiply the number of seconds in two hundred thousand years by one hundred and eighty-six thousand miles, which will give you something over a quadrillion of miles, written with six, followed by eighteen zeros, according to rapid, probably inaccurate figuring on the edge of a newspaper. Let your little boy do the sum.

But remember there are in that galaxy of ours about one million suns, many of them a million times as big as our sun, which is a million times as big as our earth.

And the billion suns move about like bees in a swarm. If two of them come too close together, the planets of both suns are instantly wiped out of existence. That happens only once in a million billion years, on the average. But it might happen any day, therefore it is well to be always prepared with a clean slate.

SHOOTS WIFE KILLS SELF

MRS. SAM WEST, FORMER RESIDENT OF PERRYTON, IS IN AMARILLO HOSPITAL

The following article appeared in the Amarillo Daily News last Sunday's issue, and concerns people who are well known in this section. Mrs. West, one of the victims of this sad affair, operated the Panhandle Cafe in this city for some time, and left here a little over a year ago. The West family before moving to Perryton, lived at Canadian.

"Ordering his two daughters out of the room, Sam West, 45 years old, fired four shots point blank into the breast and abdomen of his wife, probably mortally wounded her, then sent a bullet through his head, dying instantly in the kitchen of an oil field shack twenty miles north of Panhandle, Saturday morning. This is the story told officers by the two daughters.

The Wests had been separated several months. They met by chance in a Panhandle grocery store Friday night and a heated argument arose between them. Mrs. West with her two daughters returned to the camp of Willis, Lewis and Triggs while West remained in Panhandle.

Early Saturday morning he entered the kitchen of the camp house unannounced and ordering the girls to leave the room, shot his wife and killed himself, according to the story told by the daughters. Hearing shots the daughters rushed back into the room to find their mother lying unconscious and their father dead by her side.

Workmen called for doctors from Panhandle. A Blackburn ambulance brought Mrs. West to the Northwest Texas hospital here where little hope is held for her recovery. West's body was taken to Panhandle. His funeral probably will be held Monday.

Little is known of either West or Mrs. West in Panhandle. He was a day laborer, doing odd jobs while she cooked at the Willis, Lewis and Triggs oil field camp."

ROWENA BRILLHART

Died at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. G. C. Brillhart, of northeast of town, little Miss Rowena Catherine Brillhart, age 12 years, 9 months and 3 days, on Saturday, January 16th. The cause of her death was pneumonia, and her condition did not become serious until late Friday afternoon preceding her death. She was well and hearty and able to attend her Sunday School class at the Methodist Church in this city on only last Sunday week. Everything that medical skill and loving care could think of was done for the little girl, but everything was of no avail, and she passed to the Great World beyond early on Saturday morn.

Rowena was born in this county on April 13, 1913, and leaves besides her parents two sisters, and five brothers, Howard and Louise, being older, and G. C. Jr., Harold, James, Mildred, and Charles, being younger. She was a very bright young girl and was in the eighth grade at school, when the summons came.

The funeral services were held at the Methodist Church on Sunday afternoon, Rev. J. S. Huckabee delivering the funeral sermon. The remains were laid to rest in the Ochiltree cemetery on Monday afternoon.

The word of her death flew over our town as on the wings of wind. Wherever it touched it left sorrow, and the expressions of sympathy for the bereaved ones were many and from the heart. Her going comes as a shadow to her friends and to her relatives who loved her so dearly. Death is a hard master. He would take from us of our brightest and best, but he cannot ever mar memory. It will serve as a balm to our wounded hearts.

SAM GRATHWELL TO LECTURE HERE

THIS WILL CLOSE PERRYTON'S MOST SUCCESSFUL LYCEUM COURSE

Sam Grathwell will lecture at the High School Auditorium on next Monday evening, January 18th, at 8:00 o'clock. This is the last number of the 1925-26 Lyceum course. The entertainment provided this year has been above the ordinary and that it has pleased Perryton folks is attested by the splendid attendance at every program.

Sam Grathwell stands today in a distinguished place on the American lecture platform, having risen to that position through his own efforts and perseverance, up from the tenements and through greatest adversity.

He used to sell papers on a busy street corner in Cincinnati, or shine shoes or run errands—anything that a small boy could do to help support a family whose father had been taken from them. Later he spent many years as factory hand, barrel painter ditch digger, saloon porter, waiter in one of Cincinnati's high class bar-rooms, elevator boy and salesman.

Grathwell started to night school at the age of ten years, after a chance word of appreciation. He entered Berea College, Berea, Ky., when he was 21, making his own way, and nine years later received his A. B. degree at Leland Stanford University. Here in his senior year he won highest forensic honors. Previous to this, while at Pacific University, he won three State and one Inter-State Oratorical contests. He holds membership in three honorary debating fraternities, Delta Sigma Rho, Pi Kappa Delta, Phi Alpha Tau, a record perhaps not held by any other man in America.

His lectures emphasize individual possibility. They are born of great experience—he was often knocked down but never knocked out. They might be termed "courage talks." But while his lectures are filled with epigram and rapier thrust, they are lighted throughout with humor, now sparkling and convulsive, playful and rippling. He not only lectures but entertains.

The subjects of Grathwell's lectures are: "Getting By Your Hoodoo", a virile challenging lecture that stimulates courage and community betterment; "Wake Up and Get Up!" which calls attention to the startling fact that 85% of those who reach 65 are not self-supporting, with the emphasis on the fact that this condition is largely due to the individual not using his own rich resources within; "Tinkers and Thinkers," and many other subjects.

About Your Health

Things You Should Know

CROUP

The word "croup" is ages old. It has no scientific meaning, but no mother is mistaken in what it implies. Its presence is announced by a drowsy, feverish condition of the baby, and by a sharp ringing, yet hoarse cough, unlike that of most other diseases. The symptoms are intensified as night approaches. At bedtime the little fellow is hard to arouse—again the hoarse, loud, brassy cough. The pulse is quick, the breathing rapid. Yes, it's croup.

Other, and more serious diseases of the little throat, exhibit radically different symptoms; diphtheria has very slight if any cough. Scarlet fever and measles begin with slight, frequent, rather loose cough, with no outcry during the effort. Pneumonia lays a heavy hand on the lung; the breathing painful, shallow, and the cough suppressed as far as possible, because very painful. Every mother should know these simple points in diagnosis.

Croup should be "nipped in the bud" if possible. You can do much if your physician is not available. He may be away on a long call and cannot come for several hours. Give baby a large dose of castor oil, after a brief, warm, sponge bath. Try to induce sweating as soon as you can. Give the juice of a roasted onion—it is sedative to the inflamed air-passages—ten drops every fifteen minutes. Rub the skin over the throat with a mild irritating ointment. If you have a family medicine closet, maybe you have a small bottle of tincture of aconite. With a dropper put five drops in a four-ounce bottle of water. For a child six months old or older, give a teaspoonful of the mixture every hour, being careful to cease giving as perspiration begins.

FACULTY COMMENT

Another mile-post has been passed as we round the corner for the second term of the year. The road from here on may be a little bit rocky, but we hope it will not be completely obstructed at any place as we should like very much to have the right-of-way over the last lap of the journey.

Many people probably never stop to think how much it costs the community to have "repeaters" in the school. A child who has to repeat his grade is an extra burden on the community. Many schools are taking notice of this fact and are working out plans to prevent so much "repeating" in the school. It is somewhat difficult to determine just what the complete cost is, but it is very much in excess of the state apportionment per capita in Texas. Hence it will be seen at once that a relatively small number of "repeaters" will soon cost the community several hundred dollars. One of the best ways to prevent this condition is to make the proper classification of students when they enter school. Patrons who are sometimes prone to

criticize teachers for "putting Johnny back," should stop to consider before doing so. No child is "put back" when he is put in the grade where he can do his best work. He is simply in the right grade. That's all. Then the community's money does not have to be spent twice on the same child to do the same thing. Is this matter worth thinking over? Watch it for a while and see.

Many of the real estate men from counties in this section of the Texas Panhandle recently had a meeting to formulate plans whereby they may be able to induce people to come to this part of Texas to buy homes. This is a good move and should have the encouragement of every one. With an influx of people to this section of the state, the schools will greatly increase in enrollments and the whole country take on a different complexion in general. Don't forget too, that land near the good schools will command a higher price. Thus any extra outlay for the schools will be more than off set by the increased valuation of the property in close proximity. It will pay to have our schools in shape for future growth and the time to start is now. Many towns and cities over the country are now paying the price for not improving when the time for improving came. However, Cleveland, Ohio, is not in this class for she saw the light of day and bought up building sites and other school property in time to ward off extremely high prices. Cleveland is now to the good by several hundred thousand dollars. Yes, "A stitch in time saves nine."

At the present time, there is a rather lively controversy over athletics in high schools and colleges. Many people are speaking out on the matter and it is interesting to note just what each has on his chest in defending his side of the question. The controversy seems destined to rage long and furious and the outcome will likely be some modification of existing rules and regulations for paying the game of football. The burden of the argument seems to be on football and the way it is conducted at the present time. The best minds of the country are going

into the subject and it is likely that some solution will soon be forthcoming.

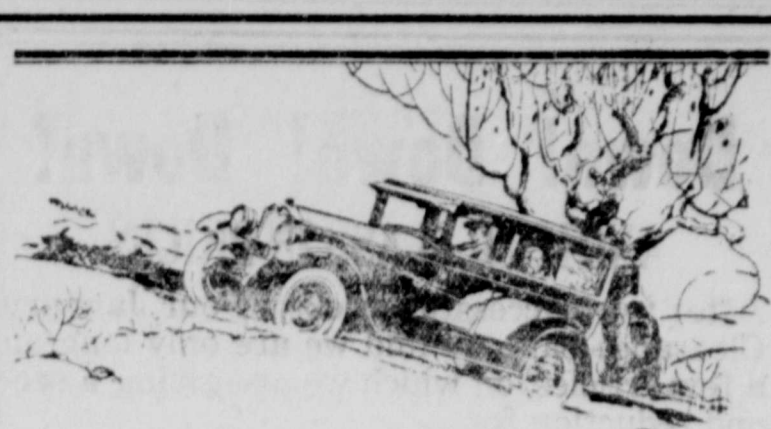

COMMISSIONERS' PROCEEDINGS

January 11, 1926

Be it remembered, that on this the 11th day of January, 1926, there was begun and holden at the Court House in the town of Perryton, Ochiltree county, Texas, the regular January Term of the Commissioners' Court of Ochiltree county. Present and presiding, J. M. Grigsby, County Judge, and other members and officers of the court present; and acting in their respective places were: E. O. Bruner, L. H. Lance, J. V. Stump and T. C. Lott, Commissioners of Precincts 1, 2, 3, and 4, respectively. Dave Shanks, Clerk, and J. S. Talley, Sheriff. Court being opened in due form of law, the following proceedings were had, to-wit:

On this day came on to be considered the claim of Henry Kempf for road damages in the southwest part of the county along the east line of Section 55, Block R, Ochiltree County, and it appearing to the Court that the claim is just and proper and should be allowed, it is the order of this court that Henry Kempf, or his assigns, be and is hereby allowed \$75.00 as road damages as aforesaid, but that said claim is payable upon the further order of this court when said road is finally cleared of obstructions. All members favor this order.

On this day came on to be considered the claim of J. M. Blodgett for road damages along and about the northeast corner of Section 46, Block R, Ochiltree County, and it appearing to the court that said claim has been heretofore agreed upon to be just and should be paid by the county, it is therefore ordered that J. M. Blodgett be allowed \$35.00 for road damages as aforesaid. But this claim is not payable until the said J. M. Blodgett shall obtain and present a deed to certain portions of the above described section at the immediate northeast corner of said Section 46; said deed to be from W. Y. Williams, or his heirs or assigns, to J. M. Blodgett and to be presented to this court for inspection and if same conveys said land with good title to said Blodgett then this court obligates itself to pay said claim, otherwise this order to be null and void. And whereas, said Precinct No. 1 is indebted to Theo. Doerrie in the sum of \$58.00 for work performed in said Precinct No. 1, it is therefore understood and agreed by and between Theo. Doerrie and the Honorable Commissioners' Court of Ochiltree County, Texas, that the said Theo. Doerrie does hereby accept a warrant issued against said Precinct No. 1, payable Feb. 1st, 1927, and that said set aside and apportioned to Precinct No. 1, by this or any future Commissioners' Court, and it is further agreed and understood that the County Road and Bridge Fund of said County, nor Precinct 2, 3 and 4 of said County shall not in any way be liable for the payment of said warrant.

On this day came on for inspection and approval the butcher's report of the City Meat Market of Perryton and the same being in due form and in compliance with the laws of the State, it is the order of the court that said report be approved. Said report covering the period of time from and including October 23, to and including December 31, 1925.

On this day came on for consideration the matter of salary for R. L. Keith and Chas. Pryor, and after due consideration it is the opinion of the court that R. L. Keith should be allowed a salary of \$140.00 per month. It is therefore the order of this court that said salary be and is hereby set at \$140.00 per month beginning with the 1st day of January 1926, and continued until a further order of this court or until said Keith shall cease in the employ of the County. It is the further order of this court that the matter of salaries for road hands shall come up for readjustment in and at the February Term 1926, and this order in no way shall bind this court after January 31st, 1926.

"On this day came on to be considered the matter of paying bounties for coyotes and jack rabbits and after due consideration it is the order of this court, all members favoring said order, that 5 cents each be paid for jack rabbit scalps and \$1.00 for coyote scalps, subject to the provisions hereinafter set out. This bounty shall not be paid after the 12th day of April, 1926. All scalps of any kind must be presented to this court on its regular meeting days and no officer is authorized to receive and burn or punch scalps. Scalps presented to any officer for payment other than the court while in regular session will not be paid for. No less than 50 rabbit scalps will be received by the court. No bounty will be paid on any animal killed before Jan. 1st, 1926. All claims must be accompanied by the affidavit of the person killing animals, stating that said animals were killed on or after January 1st, 1926, and killed in the county of Ochiltree, state of Texas; all of said claims must be paid for out of the general fund upon a further order of this court. Nothing of this order shall prohibit any person, firm or corporation desiring to do so, from purchasing scalps and presenting claim to this court, PROVIDED, that the proper affidavit shall accompany their claims, the same as if presented directly to this court."

It is the order of this court that court now stand adjourned and per diem be allowed for today's services and former services as follows: J. M.

Grigsby, \$20.00; L. H. Lance, \$15.00; E. O. Bruner, \$15.00; T. C. Lott, \$20.00, and J. V. Stump, \$15.00.

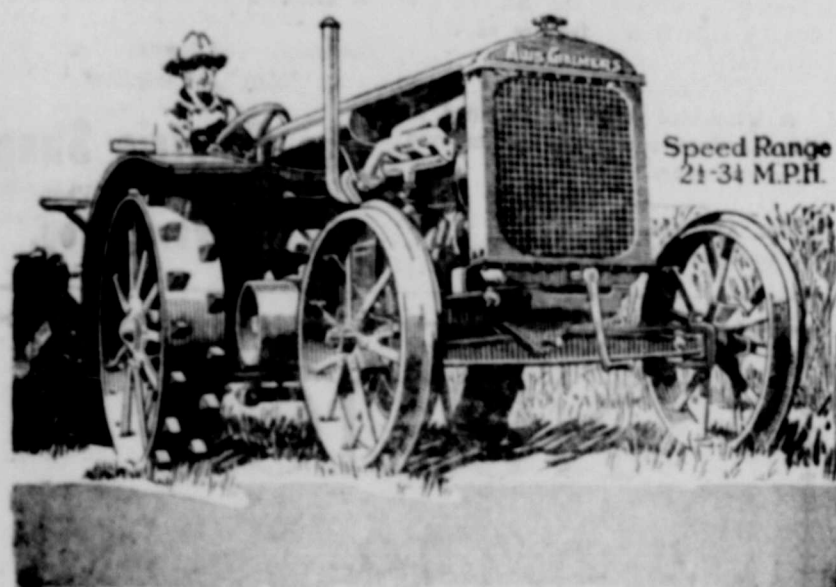

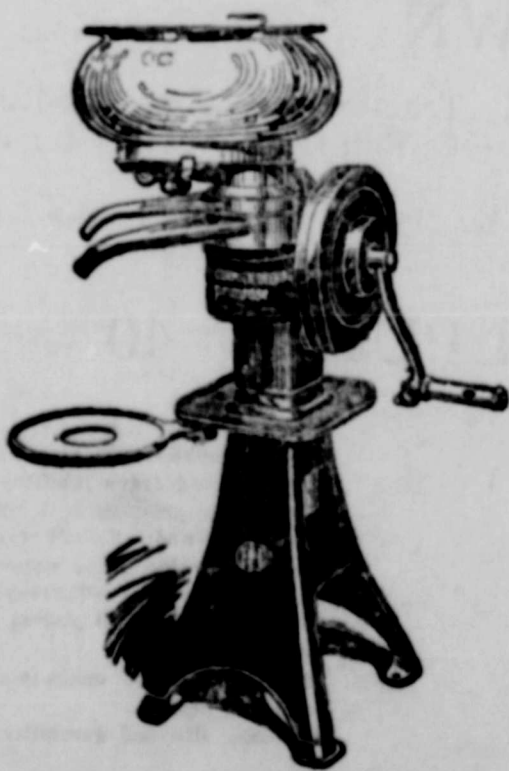

Don't Violate the Law!

The following laws were enacted for the protection of personal property
 and they must be observed in Ochiltree County. This law will be enforced to
 the full extent. The following are extracts from the 1925 State Highway
 Commission Motor Vehicle Registration Rules.

14. The driving of any motor vehicle without the owner's consent is pun-
 ishable by a fine not to exceed \$1000 or imprisonment of twelve months, or
 by both such fine and imprisonment.

Sec. 34. Climbing Upon or Attempting to Manipulate Motor Vehicle.—Any
 person who shall, without consent of owner or person in charge of vehicle,
 climb upon or in such vehicle, whether same be in motion or at rest, or should
 while such vehicle is at rest and unattended, attempt to manipulate any of
 the levers, crank or other device or to set said vehicle in motion, shall be
 guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any
 sum not to exceed one hundred (\$100.00) Dollars, or by imprisonment in the
 county jail for a period of sixty days, or by both such fine and imprison-
 ment. (Art. 1259cc. Penal Code.)
