

Last Of 3.3 Million Dollar Crop To Gins

Gins are processing the last of Mitchell County's three-million-dollar-plus 1970 cotton crop.

Only a few hundred bales remained Saturday before the harvest is complete.

The crop will be 6,600 bales more than Mitchell's cotton production last year.

Through Friday, gins reported 26,637 bales of local cotton

processed. This total is expected to climb to about 27,500 before the gins shut down and all cotton trailers are parked.

In 1969, the county produced 20,900 bales. And the light harvest was hurt by unfavorable weather that bogged the harvest pace and cut the grade of cotton.

Estimates are the new '70 cotton crop is worth about \$3,370,000. These are "round

dollars" based on cotton and seed values.

If the county's total production amounts to the predicted 27,500 bales, then that should total up to about \$2,750,000 in cash from cotton.

About \$622,000 can be figured for the seed-making a total of about \$3,372,000 income.

Clear weather has sped the current harvest to quick com-

pletion. Farmers were still in the fields in January trying to complete their '69 short harvest.

With the clear weather, cotton in the field has come to the gins in better condition. The higher quality has brought more money for the farmer.

The quick harvest has been good for gins, too. Rising costs have been big trouble for gins in recent years and the situa-

tion was complicated last year because of extra cost required for standby crews, etc., as the ginning season stretched through December and into January.

Eight gins processing Mitchell cotton this fall hurried into a busy pace and have worked around the clock trying to keep up as loaded cotton trailers filled their yards. This steady maximum work load, compared

to '69 extended harvest period, cuts gin costs.

County Agent Bobby Lemons said very little cotton was going into loan because of the grade and the fact that cotton was selling usually above loan price.

All the money from the new crop won't hit the farmers immediately. Some are having their payments deferred until after Jan. 1.

There is only one dark spot for the sunny harvest season. It has pot crop and range lands in bad need of rain.

20 On Coaching List Interviews Likely To Start In Week

Screening committee members expect to begin within a week interviews with top prospects for Colorado City's head coach and athletic director.

Target date for selection of the new director is January, according to Tom Rees, Colorado Independent School Board District board chairman.

Twenty Texas high school coaches are in the pool of applicant candidates—either with complete or preliminary application data.

Rees heads the screening committee which includes board members O. B. Trulock Jr. and Ed Thrift. Ex-officio member of the group is Supt. Lloyd McKee.

The screening committee had its first meeting Wednesday night. And it has called for all applications to be completed and placed in committee files as soon as possible.

Another meeting of the committee is scheduled Monday evening, according to Rees.

The school board chairman didn't say so, but it is expected that at that session the committee will begin its initial process of narrowing the field of candidates.

Interviews, of course, will be scheduled with those candidates

which the committee considers best qualified.

Rees said the committee now is planning for two interview sessions with prospects. This is tentative but the committee will likely conduct these interviews Dec. 13 and Dec. 20.

They expect to sit down and talk with 10 to 12 of the candidates.

The committee is not revealing who the coaching candidates are so as to encourage the best

applicants from those now successfully engaged in coaching.

However, it is known that of the 20 now listed as applicants, 7 of these are from AAAA high schools (a level above Colorado High's AAA classification), 6 are from AAA schools, 5 are from AA and 2 are from A.

Big portion of them are now in head coaching assignments, but some are assistants.

Rees said the committee will

report to the entire school board after review of applications, interviews and screening.

This does not mean the committee will recommend one top prospect, but more likely will place several top names before the board for the trustee's final selection.

The screening committee procedure has been the usual method of filling the head coach position at Colorado High for at least 15 years.

And, as when Coach Truman Nix was named athletic director, the board has made it official policy to accept applications from coaches now employed in the Colorado City school system as well as outsiders.

Rees said the committee is hopeful that the January target date for naming a new athletic director can be met, possibly by the time the school board meets Jan. 11 in its first 1971 regular session.

Fund For Brain Surgery Boy, 11, Going Back To Hospital

Gregg Hardegree is a Hutchinson fifth grader who likes to practice his flute every morning before school.

About three weeks ago he woke at his usual 6:45 a.m.

He was laughing and talking as he went into the living room with his flute.

His brothers are reluctant risers on school mornings and at 7:30 his mother called to Gregg to wake 'em up.

He did. Moments later his mother walked into the living room and discovered Gregg on the floor.

That was Nov. 12. Friday the 11-year-old boy came home from the hospital for the first time since that early morning his parents rushed him to doctors.

He has been in surgery and will return to the operating room as soon as medical specialists say it is time.

Gregg, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jimmy Hardegree, 806 East 17th St., had a large blood clot in the middle brain area.

Neuro-surgeons and a 22-day stay in Abilene's Hendrick Memorial Hospital has brought tremendous improvement, saving his life and putting him on the road to recovery.

A large blood clot in the brain area has been drained. But corrective surgery cannot be performed until swelling reduces and other conditions permit.

It is an expensive process. Very expensive, but live saving.

And friends of the Hardegree family have begun a "Gregg Hardegree Fund" to help pay for the medical expenses.

G. D. Foster and Bobby Brown said an account has been opened at City National Bank for Gregg's medical expense fund.

"On numerous occasions citizens of our community have responded when a worthy need was made known," said Foster, "and we believe they will respond now."

Persons desiring to aid the fund can make their deposits to the account at the bank.

Gregg is "up and around" to eat with his family at the table and sit in a chair during his visit home.

"But he must be back in the hospital Wednesday for more tests," said Mrs. Hardegree.

When conditions are favorable, then neuro-surgeons will repair an aneurysm in a blood

vessel in the middle brain area.

"It may be weeks before they operate," said his mother. "We are just thankful he is getting along so fine."

"His visit home was a surprise to us. It was the doctor's idea and we weren't expecting it."

Gregg has lost some side vision. This may be corrected with the surgery. If it isn't, the Hardegrees figure that is a small price to pay for his recovery.

Deputy's Post To McGuire

Bill McGuire, ex-Marine and son of a veteran law enforcement officer, is a new deputy on the staff of Sheriff Lewis Claxton.

The 24-year-old former Colorado High football star has been appointed temporarily during the serious illness of Deputy Delmer Lowe.

McGuire is the second new officer in the community within recent weeks. The other is Larry Tittsworth, 30, former Concho County deputy sheriff, who is now a patrolman with Colorado City police department.

McGuire is the son of Bob McGuire, who was chief deputy for both Sheriff R. E. (Dick) Gregory Jr. and Sheriff Claxton before resigning.

The new deputy was graduated from Colorado High in 1964 and attended University of Tex-

as and East Texas State University before entering Marine service.

While in combat in Vietnam, McGuire was wounded three times. Since his discharge from Marine Corps in 1969, he has been residing and employed here.

He is married to the former Lana Kay Shurtleff, who is a secretary in the Sun Oil Company office here.

Patrolman Tittsworth moved here with his family from Paint Rock, where he was deputy sheriff for four years, to become a city policeman.

He is a native of Valera, Coleman County, and is a graduate of Centennial High School.
