Helps for Control Of Coccidiosis

Lawrence Morris, associate extension poultryman of Oklahoma A. and M. College, has the following to say about coccidiosis in poultry and its control:

Coccidiosis is one spring chick trouble that can always be expected in the average bunch of chicks. There are several species or kinds of coccidiosis, and it is common to both young and old birds, although it is seldom fatal to old birds.

Coccidiosis commonly affects young chicks between 3 and 12 weeks of age, and it is especially bad during warm, damp weather. Affected birds are generally dumpy and listless. Close observation will show, usually, bloody droppings. There is no cure-all for coccidiosis. The best and surest cure is to clean the brooder house each morning, putting in only enough fresh litter to absorb the droppings. Keep things as dry as possible. The disease is spread by the chicks picking up the disease from the droppings and by eating dirty and contaminated feed and water. Medications in the drinking water, as potassium permanganate, diluted acids and vinegar, have all been recommended and used but their benefits are of doubtful value.

Cleanliness is the surest and best treatment. A light flush of black-strap molasses has been recommended by some. Use eight tablespoons per gallon of drinking water. Mash made of four pounds regular

Wheat Bins Should Be Sprayed Before Storing New Crop

STILLWATER, Okla., June 3.—(Special)—With harvest around the corner, it's time to sweep and garish that wheat bin with an insecticide.

It isn't a time to take chances with grain storage facilities, insists F. E. Whitehead, of the Oklahoma A. and M. College entomology department. Whitehead points out that with elevators and terminals three-fourths filled and the largest farm storage in history, anti-insect insurance needs to be taken out for all available storage facilities.

First step in proofing granaries against the worst pests, lies in sweeping out the empty bin with extreme care to remove every particle of grain and other material.

Even one particle is dangerous to the new grain crop. Whitehead emphasizes, since it is almost certain to harbor a worm and thus start infestation.

Wooden bins should be sprayed after this thorough sweeping. An effective spray may be made of one gallon of dormant spray oil, nine gallons of water, and three ounces of lye. One gallon of the mixture is enough for 500 sq. ft. of space. It may be brushed on as well as sprayed.

Recent research work indicates that stored wheat is attractive to many species of grain infesting insects which fly to the bins in large numbers. These beetles and weevils breed in many places outside of the grain bins such as in chicken feed. No one knows how far they fly but doubtless the nearer the source of infestation the greater its potential damage to stored wheat. Traps show these insects may come in through the ventilators in a steel bin, for example. Screening out such places and sealing over cracks will do much to help keep the infestation down, and a tight bin may also be better fumigated.

Wheat stored with a high moisture content is much more likely to be severely injured than wheat with a low moisture content.

A lack of any evident insect infestation of last year's wheat by probing may not necessarily indicate that the wheat is safe. Sometimes the infested grain is localized and this spot may be missed by the probe. A careful watch of stored wheat, especially last year's crop, is highly essential if losses by insects are to be minimized.

Clean Eggs Aid Poultry Industry

COLLEGE STATION, June 4.—Produce infertile eggs, keep 'em clean, gather them at least three times daily, and more Texas eggs will reach the consumer, says George P. McCarthy, Poultry Husbandman of A. and M. College Extension Service. After gathering, cool them promptly in an open wire mesh, or wicker basket which allows the air to circulate between the eggs. Placing the basket in a cool, slightly moist room, helps the eggs to keep their quality.

As fertile eggs tend to spoil rapidly, McCarthy suggests removing all roosters from the flock when the hatching season is over. He also warns that overcrowding in a flock will do as much harm as the outbreak of a disease, and often is a contributing cause to coccidiosis. Shortage of housing space can be relieved by building a range shelter or brush arbor, which permits pullets to roost in the open beneath a roof to protect them from rain or hail.

"If you are feeding a good mash and they have a good green range, you won't recognize them as the same pullets after a couple of weeks."

Management is a highly important factor in obtaining satisfactory

production from a poultry flock. If the hens are not eating as they should, are pale and losing weight, and feathers are rather dry and brittle, they should be treated for intestinal parasites, McCarthy says.

Floor line ventilators in summer are one of the best things to have in a poultry house. It makes the house cooler, "and a flock of chickens which are comfortable can be expected to produce." (A copy of the poultry house bulletin may be obtained from county agricultural agents).

As careless handling and packing are responsible for most breakage, McCarthy suggests packing all eggs in standard cases, with the small end pointing downward. Cover the top of the case with a pad of excelsior because it is the top layer which most often gets crushed.

Qualifications Farmers Need For New Trucks

Information on the eligibility of farmers to purchase new farm trucks is given by A. W. Jacob, extension economist, marketing, Oklahoma A. and M. College. He gives the following information:

A large percentage of the agricultural products is now moved to market by trucks. Many of these trucks in use now by farmers are becoming depleted and the tires are getting thin. According to announcements from the war rationing board, there seems to be about 150,000 new trucks available for civilian uses during the war. This is a very small supply as during 1941 alone 650,000 trucks were purchased.

Under the rationing regulations farmers may establish eligibility for new trucks under two classifications: (1) class 2 for transportation of food and materials connected directly with the war effort; (2) class 3 for transportation of food and material indirectly connected with the war. This classification covers most trucks.

The procedure for farmers making application for trucks is to fill out application (PD-310), then to supply the following information:

(a) That he cannot fill his needs by leasing the equipment of others.
(b) That he cannot fill his needs by pooling his present equipment with that of other operators.

(c) That he cannot transfer some of his present vehicles now being used for less essential purposes to the use for which he is requesting the new vehicle.

(d) That if the vehicle is to be used for replacement, the replaced vehicle is incapable of being repaired to serve his purpose.

(e) That he has been unable to find a used vehicle that will meet his needs.

From the above qualifications it appears that most farmers will find that regrouping of trucking in the community should be thoroughly explored before making application for a new truck.

During the next few years transportation should be given careful study and plans made in advance to meet the situation.

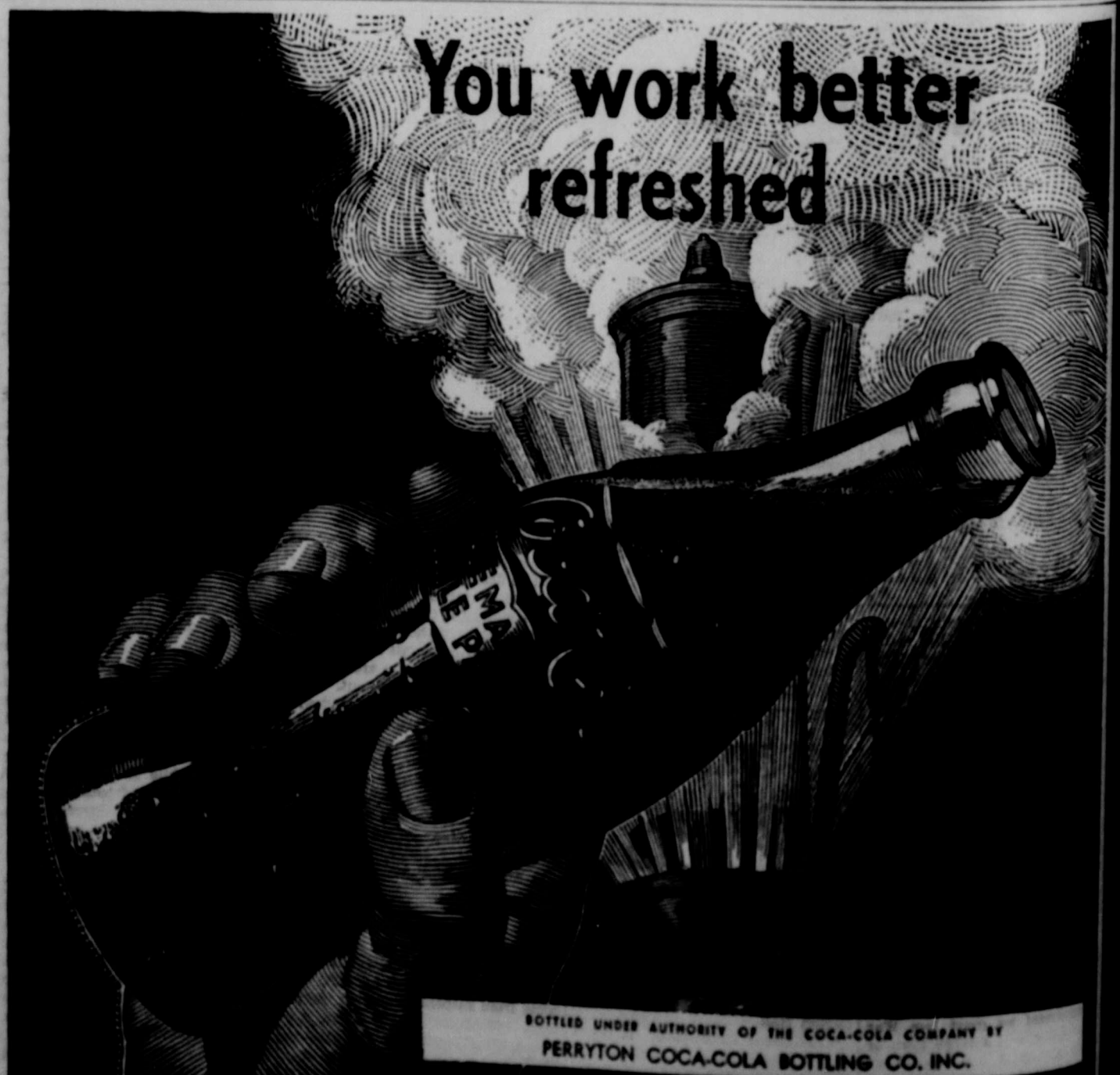

Wartime Credit Regulation



It directly affects every family or individual using charge accounts or installment buying. These undersigned Perryton firms ask the cooperation of customers in complying with Federal Regulations.

A recent order of the Federal Reserve Board, acting under the authority of the President of the United States, requires all stores granting credit to make certain changes in their credit services. The new restrictions will in no way disturb a long and mutually agreeable relationship. You can continue to buy merchandise and have it "charged", or buy certain items on the installment plan, just as you did in the past, with the following stipulations:

1. Accounts are due, as in the past, with rendition of statement, or shortly thereafter, but every charge transaction MUST now be paid by the 10th of the second month following the purchase. Accordingly, all purchases made during May and any previous unpaid balances must be paid by July 10, OTHERWISE WE SHALL NOT BE PERMITTED TO CHARGE FURTHER PURCHASES. This schedule of payments will continue as long as the order remains in force.

2. The maximum permissible maturity of installment sales has been reduced to 12 months, and the required down payment for all articles covered has been increased to 33 1/3 per cent. Exceptions to this rule include automobiles, for which down payment of one-third and maximum maturity of 15 months has been retained, and furniture, for which the required down payment, formerly 10 per cent, becomes 20 per cent, the maximum maturity being 12 months. Minimum installment payments are set at \$1.25 per week or \$5 monthly.

The consumer credit control regulation became effective May 6, 1942, and has been broadened to include all lines of retail business and almost every article of personal and household use. Perryton business firms ask their customers to bear in mind that the regulations on credit are instituted by the Government and must be conformed with. They are intended to put a brake on rising costs and encourage the paying off of debts. Please do not ask your merchant to make any exceptions.

How To Win the War

The next time you hear a friend grumbling about the fix we're in, tell him to read, "How to Win the War," by Owen Lattimore, personal political adviser to General Chiang Kai-Shek picked by President Roosevelt, in the June issue of American Magazine. This most stirring lesson of the war brings home to the American people one of the most inspiring messages since the war began.

"The length of this war and the kind of world we shall have when peace comes depend considerably on China—and the lessons we Americans can learn from China," Owen Lattimore said.

"China, her best lands invaded, her cities sacked and looted has fought off Japan for nearly five years of bitter war," said Mr. Lattimore. "She lacks planes, tanks, artillery, machinery, steel. She has less gasoline in a year than we can burn in one Sunday of pleasure riding. Jap planes bomb her towns and villages at will. Millions of her people have been killed or wounded. Their morale is excellent. Sometimes they worry a little about the morale of the United States. They want to know what they can do to help us."

"An American returning from China to his native land in these days," Mr. Lattimore said, "feels a sense of strangeness and unreality."

"He hears a young man complaining about the tire shortage—and eh thinks of a long caravan of Chinese straining along rutted roads, each drawing a quarter-ton of freight toward the armies 500 miles to the front."

"He hears a housewife upset by the difficulties of getting a nurse because so many have gone into the Army—and in his mind's eye he sees the wounded Chinese soldiers dying in the field because China lacks medicines and ambulances which could save their lives."

"He hears a prosperous American moaning over how the war will cut into his income—and he remembers the millions of Chinese families whose savings have been cut 95 per cent by the inevitable inflation."

"He hears able-bodied men discussing nervously what would happen if the enemy obtained a foothold on our coasts—and he thinks of the Chinese, who are completely undaunted by an enemy which long ago took over all their coasts and large cities and most fertile lands."

"I do not complain of this. It is natural enough. I have no doubt that we (under the same spur of danger, would do as well as the Chinese. But why must we wait for such a spur? If we can look on the Chinese with intelligence and imagination, if we can learn from them how they work miracles by teamwork, by self-sacrifice, by a proud new spirit of fighting for a better country and a better world—then we, too, can work miracles. We can win a quicker victory and a greater peace. If you want to know how to win the war, study China."

Your Contribution

Sugar and gasoline rationing are only the beginning—the American people are going to have to pull in their belts more and more. It has been estimated that half of the nation's \$40 billion armament output scheduled for 1942 must be supplied by men and machines that produced civilian goods last year.

The construction of new plant facilities has just about reached the end—except where absolutely necessary. Strategic metals and materials that go into building cannot be shot at or sent at the enemy in the form of bullets and bombing planes.

Our peacetime industries employing nearly 13 million workers are rapidly converting to war production.

A recent survey has shown that fifteen weeks after Pearl Harbor eleven major lines of civilian production were already under conversion or drastic curtailment orders from the Government.

This is sharply significant to civilian consumers, who must forego more and more comforts and luxuries. It means no more refrigerators, no more radios, no more automobiles, no more vacuum cleaners. Our washing machines are now being made into bomb fins and anti-aircraft machine gun mounts. Our refrigerators are becoming searchlights. Our typewriters are becoming rifles and fire-control instruments.

The men on the fighting front need weapons and more weapons—we must not let them down. To take care of their needs the shortage of consumer goods will grow, and hence the need for rationing. Cheerful acceptance of rationing is one of the things everyone can do to help win the war.

SUGGESTIONS FOR THE CARE OF YOUR Electric Washer

Your electric washer is a friend in need these busy wartime days. It not only saves you time and energy; it helps you conserve clothes and linens and reduces your laundering costs. Here are some timely hints that will make your washer last longer and give you better service:

- Drain washer immediately after washing. Rinse tub thoroughly. Remove agitator or suction cups and rinse.
- Remove any soap curd or lint that may have remained in tub, agitator or suction cups with soft cloth or sponge.
- Rolls and frame of wringer should be wiped dry. Release pressure on rolls when not in use. Saves the spring and the rubber.
- Wipe connecting cord dry, coil and hang up carefully. Do not allow to kink and crack rubber insulation.
- Leave cover off tub until all dampness has evaporated, to prevent mustiness.
- Follow manufacturer's instructions concerning oiling and lubricating requirements. Consult dealer from whom you bought washer if in doubt.
- If washer is stored outdoors, bring inside and let stand an hour before using in very cold weather. This gives grease in gear case a chance to soften and may prevent a burned-out motor.
- Do not overload washer with too many pieces and do not use too much water. Follow manufacturer's directions.
- Remove large buttons, buckles, etc., before running clothes through wringer. Otherwise you may break same or chew up wringer rolls.
- Put a cover over your washer when not in use, if stored where dust can accumulate.

Home Storage of Gasoline Makes Real Fire Hazard

AUSTIN, June 2.—With indications pointing to a possible nationwide system of gasoline rationing, Marvin Hall, State Fire Insurance Commissioner, warns against storage of gasoline at home.

"The storage of any quantity of gasoline at home," he said, "promotes extreme fire hazards. Gasoline, when stored and handled through the regular facilities of the oil industry and kept in standard tanks, is relatively safe as a result of safeguards incorporated in the design of equipment and the training of personnel over a long period of years. However, gasoline is a dangerous explosive if kept in all sorts of cans and make-shift containers, stored in basements and garages, and poured from open containers."

Hall explained that gasoline vapor, produced when the fluid is exposed to air, is highly explosive and can be set off by electric sparks or careless smokers. The vapor, heavier than air, may flow along the ground under buildings or into basements, to be ignited and flash back from a considerable distance.

"Fire insurance can be voided under the Texas standard fire policies," Hall asserted, "if gasoline is stored on the premises without a permit of consent from the insurance company. Thus, if stored gasoline contributes to a fire destroying the property insured, policies could not be collected if the insurance company had not granted permission for storage of the gasoline."

An R. A. F. Pilot's Last Letter To His Mother

Among the personal belongings of a young R. A. F. pilot in a Bomber Squadron who was recently reported "Missing, believed killed," was a letter to his mother—to be sent to her if he were killed.

"This letter was perhaps the most amazing one I have ever read; simple and direct in its wording but splendid and uplifting in its outlook," says the young officer's station commander. "It was inevitable that I should read it—in fact he must have intended this, for it was left open in order that I might be certain that no prohibited information was disclosed."

"I sent the letter to the bereaved mother, and asked her whether I might publish it anonymously, as I feel its contents may bring comfort to other mothers, and that every one in our country may feel proud to read of the sentiments which support an average airman's duties. I have received the mother's permission, and I hope this letter may be read by the greatest possible number of our countrymen at home and abroad."

Dearest Mother:

Though I feel no premonition at all, events are moving rapidly, and I have instructed that this letter be forwarded to you should I fail to return from one of the raids which we shall shortly be called upon to undertake. You must hope on for a month, but at the end of that time you must accept the fact that I have handed my task over to the extremely capable hands of my comrades of the Royal Air Force, as so many splendid fellows have already done.

First it will comfort you to know that my role in this war has been of the greatest importance. Our patrols far out over the North Sea have helped to keep the trade routes clear for our convoys and supply ships, and on one occasion our information was instrumental in saving the lives of the men in a crippled lighthouse relief ship. Though it will be difficult for you, you will disapprove me if you do not at least try to accept the facts dispassionately, for I shall have done my duty to the utmost of my ability. No man can do more, and no one calling himself a man could do less.

I have always admired your amazing courage in the face of continual setbacks; in the way you have given me as good an education and background as anyone in the country; and always kept up appearances without ever losing faith in the future. My death would not mean that your struggle has been in vain. Far from it. It means that your sacrifice is as great as mine. Those who serve England must expect nothing from her; we debate ourselves if we regard our country as merely a place in which to eat and sleep.

History reounds with illustrious names who have given all, yet their sacrifice has resulted in the British empire, where there is a measure of peace, justice and freedom for all, and where a higher standard of civilization has evolved, and is still evolving than anywhere else. But this is not only concerning our own land. Today we are faced with the greatest organized challenge to

Christianity and civilization that the world has ever seen, and I count myself lucky and honored to be the right age and fully trained to throw my full weight into the scale. For this I have to thank you. Yet there is more work for you to do. The home front will still have to stand united for years after the war is won. For all that can be said against it, I still maintain that this war is a very good thing; every individual is having the chance to give and dare for his principles like the martyrs of old. However long the time may be one thing can never be altered—I shall have lived and died an Englishman. Nothing else matters one jot nor can anything ever change it.

You must not grieve for me, for if you really believe in religion and all that it entails that would be hypocritical. I have no fear of death; only a queer elation. . . . I would have it no other way. The universe is so vast and so ageless that the life of one man can only be justified by the measure of his sacrifice. We are sent to this world to acquire a personality and a character to take with us that can never be taken

Blue Stamp Foods Available in June

Blue stamp foods available during June to families taking part in the Food Stamp Program in Ochiltree County were announced today by Dan L. Boyd, Area Supervisor of the Agricultural Marketing Administration.

The foods for June are the same as those listed for May except for fresh apples and fresh pears, removed because of a seasonal short supply position, and Irish potatoes, removed because an increasingly favorable price position no longer warrants additional market support. With these changes, the complete list, as issued by the Agricultural Marketing Administration for the period June 1 through June 30 in all stamp program areas, is as follows: shell eggs, butter, fresh oranges and grapefruit, sweet potatoes, fresh vegetables (do not include Irish potatoes), corn meal, dried prunes, hominy (corn) grits, dry edible beans, wheat flour, enriched wheat flour, self-rising flour, enriched self-rising flour, and whole wheat (Graham) flour.

times and places at which, and the periods for which applications shall be made. The board may appoint qualified persons to act as deputies examining applications and issuing canning certificates.

In the case where the board approves the application of a consumer who has an excess supply of sugar, if the excess sugar is more than the amount allowed, a certificate may be issued or the excess sugar reduced by the amount allowed. If the excess sugar is less than the amount of the application, the excess shall be cancelled and a certificate issued for the difference, and War Ration Books may also be issued immediately to such applicants whose excess sugar supply has been cancelled.

Sugar allowed under this amendment shall be used only in the quantities, during the period, and for the purposes for which it was allowed.

If sugar allowed under this amendment is not used during the specified period, the applicant shall within thirty days after the end of that period report the fact to his board. If a certificate was not used, it shall be returned to the board for cancellation.

If a certificate was used but the sugar bought was not used for canning or preserves, the War Ration Book or Books of the individual or the family shall be returned to the board. The board shall remove from the Ration Book or Books stamps having a weight value equal to the amount of sugar, but, if the amount of such sugar exceeds the weight value of stamps to which a value has already been given, the book or books shall be retained by the board until stamps in weight value equal to the amount of sugar not used for canning or preserving become valid. If the sugar was allowed against an excess inventory, the board shall revoke this allowance. If another application for sugar under amendment is granted, the appropriate adjustment shall be made.

Price control still was important. Most retailers were still trying to comply with the regulations, with the knowledge that OPA inspectors soon will be dropping into stores everywhere in the Southwest to see how they are getting along. One of the first things that the OPA men will be interested in is whether the retailers are complying with the provisions concerning marking of prices on cost-of-living commodities. If a merchant is not sure, he should write to the OPA at Dallas and get a copy of the regulations—study it, and comply with it.

On the price control front, Mr. and Mrs. Southwest looked on with approval when the OPA issued a dictum concerning prices on certain farm merchandise.

It was the first price regulation applying solely to finished wearing apparel and it covered a wide range of 1942 fall-style goods. The special regulation, effective May 29, sets the maximum prices for fall styles of women's, girls' and children's cloth coats, suits, dresses and many other outerwear garments, at the highest price charged by each seller, for a garment of substantially equal quality during the base period of July 1 through September 1, last year.

Other developments included warnings to the meat industry, and to others, that they must comply with the Price Control law.

Now that school is out for the summer, additional "manpower" is expected to be turned loose in the important field of salvage. There's still a big job to do, in spite of the fact that most of the waste-paper shortage is under control. Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts and other groups will be invaluable to the summer in systematic campaigns to collect rubber, tin, steel and copper—materials that are needed so badly.

Now is the time for everyone to go all out for getting in the scrap. We'll never need it any more than we do right now.

Coffee-Tea Quotas Increased: "Relief quotas" of coffee and tea, in addition to the quotas allowed by WPB tea and coffee conservation orders, have been granted to 13 defense areas in the Southwest, where population has increased 10 per cent or more during the last year. The additional coffee or tea obtained by dealers under this WPB grant must be sold for consumption within the specified defense area.

Use of Zippers Allowed: Continued use of zippers fabricated prior to April 1 is permitted in a recent amendment to WPB's zipper limitation order, affecting various garments and articles, such as swim suits, corsets, luggage, pocketbooks, sports jackets, overshoes and furniture slip covers. Supplies of copper, steel and zinc for manufacture of zipper fasteners to be used in these articles was cut off by the WPB on April 1.

Price Warning Issued: A warning that ignorance of the price control law will not be accepted as an excuse for violations, addressed specifically to the meat industry in the Southwest, also is applicable to others who must operate under price control. Max L. McCullough, region OPA administrator, said.

Fixture Manufacture Stopped: An order virtually halting the manufacture after June 30 of sinks, drinking fountains, water closet bowls and tanks, and other plumbing fixtures, has been issued by the War Production Board. The order prohibits use of metals other than joining hardware, coating, or reinforcing mesh in production of these fixtures. At least 250,000 of the more essential of these plumbing fixtures are believed to be on hand now, enough to meet requirements for a considerable period of time.

starve to death while we are writing letters to each other.

Of course a good answer to many of these questions would be, "We didn't know anything about them." But why didn't they know? Isn't Dalhart a part of the system? Isn't the present and future of this community of enough interest to the telephone company to keep posted on these matters? We can raise our quotas and go over the top on a dozen drives while we are going through the process of advising the telephone company that the drive is going on. If the telephone building were to catch on fire do you think the employees would call the Mayor and ask him to call a session of the City Council to see if it would be agreeable to send the fire truck to the fire?

Why isn't there sufficient business in Dalhart to justify a local manager who can give some time and attention to community problems? Who profits more from the development of this community than this particular utility company? Is it because there is no competing company in Dalhart that we are not entitled to more consideration than we get from the Southwestern Associated Telephone Co.? Is it because they think their city franchise gives them the right to take everything and return nothing?

I'm perfectly willing to apologize to this company if my impressions of it are incorrect but I've sure got to have more proof than a two dollar a month contribution to the local USO and in the meantime billing the organization for a similar amount for telephone service?

Step on me if I'm wrong. I can take it. And in this instance I hope I'm wrong.

This outburst of mine will probably cost The Texan several dollars worth of business. The company can get its directory printed somewhere else but we can't get telephone service from anyone else. But if it should result in a right-about-face by the telephone company we can afford to lose their business.

G. A. Rupperecht, chairman of the Ochiltree County Salvage Committee, feels sure that many are not aware of the importance of sellers of scrap iron designating that scrap be credited to the Ochiltree County Salvage quota.

Regardless of who you sell it to, Mr. Rupperecht asks that you insist that the buyer mark it as being a part of the committee's quota. This is the only way that Ochiltree county will receive credit in the state wide drive for scrap iron and steel.

Then there's another angle that is all important. On all scrap credited to the county drive, the committee receives from the Russell Wrecking Co. an additional ten per cent. This is not deducted from the price you receive. Mr. Russell is giving this extra ten per cent to assist in the drive.

The money received by the committee from this ten per cent bonus is used to defray advertising and other expenses necessary to carry on the campaign. Mr. Rupperecht states that all money over the absolutely necessary expense will be probated among organizations carrying on war work.

The campaign is lagging. The goal for the four weeks drive was set at 100 tons. It started on May 23 and closes on June 13. To date only a little over 40 tons have been received.

A salute to Carl Ellis for the

"bang-up" job he's doing as chairman of the Ochiltree County War Bond and Stamp sales committee. With an assigned quota of \$11,300 for May, Ochiltree county rang almost four times that much in bond sales, \$42,050.

To date since bonds and stamps were placed on sale last summer, citizens of this county have loaned to their government, \$273,825.95.

January 1, Ochiltree county was assigned a quota for the year of \$306,300. On a monthly basis, this figures \$25,525. For five months, it would be \$127,625. On June 1, with five months of 1942 gone, the county's total for the year was \$132,575.95, \$24,950.95 over the quota.

This splendid record reflects the prosperity and patriotism of Ochiltree county folks, and judging from reports of bond sales in other counties, we are inclined to believe that we must rank at the very top of all Texas counties in sales per capita.

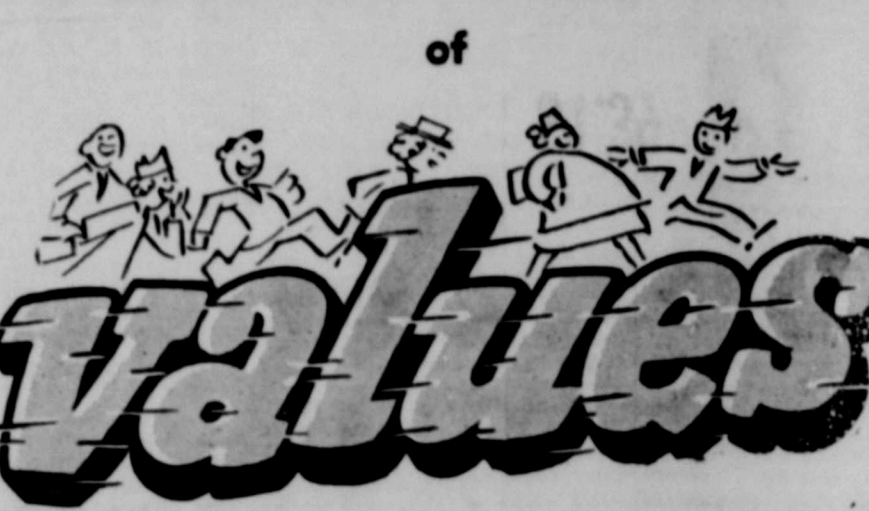

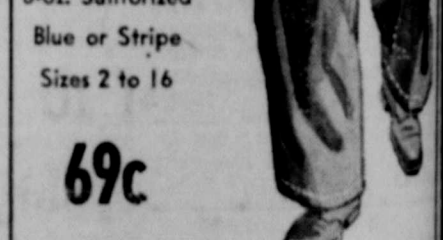
