New Talco Food Store Will Open On Saturday

A new grocery and market in a new building at Talco will open its doors to food buyers on Saturday, June 17. It is owned and operated by Mr. and Mrs. A. G. Norwood, who came to Talco several months ago from Buras, La. The new store, with living quarters at the rear, is located on the Jim Morris tract along Highway 271, just south of David Teague's Snack Shop. The lot is 128x150 feet, with a 38x50 building in its center, providing plenty of drive-in parking space.

The new store was finished in white asbestos siding. Interior has wainscot and a tile board ceiling. There are numerous display counters and shelves, and electrically cooled vegetable and fresh meat display refrigerators.

Ona Hudson of Bogata, was the contractor and builder and materials for construction of the building were supplied by the Whitten Lumber Co.

Popular brands of well-known nationally advertised foods will be sold by the new store, according to the Norwoods, who issue a special invitation to the general public to visit the new store.

Mr. Norwood was born and reared in Hugo, Ok., but has resided at Buras, La., for the past ten years. He is an experienced food store operator and was for some time connected with the Rowan Drilling Co., at Buras, La. Mrs. Norwood is the former Hilda Johnson of Deport and is a sister to Mrs. Dick Rodgers of Talco.

L. W. (Red) Stone, well-known market man about Talco, will be in charge of the meat department at the new Norwood store.

Hopkins Gets Paluxy Test

Work was started this week on a 5,000-foot Paluxy sand exploration seven miles southwest of Sulphur Bluff in Hopkins County.

It will be drilled by R. M. Garrett, N. A. Moore and Ray Holbert as No. 1 Goggans estate with location 2,500 feet north and 730 feet east of the southwest corner of the A. W. Waller survey but in the John Gardner survey.

On a 90-acre tract, the well is in the Hatcherville area and will test what is locally called the Hatcherville fault. Housh & Thompson drilled a well a mile southwest which had some shows. Humble, Magnolia and several independents are supporting the test. Holbert will cut the hole.

Construction is underway on Hagansport's new school building, bonds for which were voted several months ago and contract let immediately.

Pecan Trees Will Be Planted Along Our Highways

The State Highway Department sets out many trees every year in an effort to beautify the right-of-way along the thousands of miles of roads in Texas. In the past pine and oak have been used along the highways in this area.

F. M. Davis, District Highway Engineer, with headquarters in Paris, accompanied by Mrs. Davis, were guests in the home of the editor and Mrs. Holloway last Sunday evening.

"The pecan is a long-life, deep-rooted tree and I am going to use them in our highway beautification program," he told the editor.

"They are pretty and very hardy, and will supply coming generations with nuts as well as shade and beauty," he added.

The editor gave him a real selling talk on the value of pecans for both shade and food, discussed varieties and methods of propagation.

A late completion for the spreading Pewitt Ranch Paluxy field east of Talco was Whiteley & Phillips No. 1-C Pewitt, Banks survey. It pumped 126 barrels per day from 4,468-73 feet.

Roy Gray, assistant Clarksville postmaster, gave the examining test to about thirty-five applicants.

Bogata's Green Wrap Tomatoes Moving to Market

Bogata's green wrap tomato crop started moving to market on Monday and the first car load was shipped out Tuesday night. The price was ten cents per pound, which is about three times the price paid last year.

Alexander Packing Co. of San Benito, has their grading and packing tables set up in the cotton warehouse along the P. & Mt. P. railroad right-of-way and about fifty people are employed in culling, sizing and packing.

The tomato crop is about a week later than last year and a few are pulling their tomatoes a little green, according to officials. The crop is mighty good this year, largely grading No. 1's, and they weigh two to four pounds heavier than the average lug weight of 28 pounds.

Tomato acreage around Bogata was nearly doubled this year over that of last and is expected to leave more than \$100,000 in the hands of the growers within the next three weeks.

Beginning next Monday gathering of the crop is expected to become general and will continue for about three weeks. There were 38 carloads of tomatoes shipped from Bogata last year and several carloads trucked away. With the acreage doubled and if the price remains tripled over last year, it will prove a very profitable crop—but anything can happen to tomato prices.

His was one of the most successful lives with which we are acquainted—a most gracious heritage to leave his fine family.

Former Paris Bankers Enter Innocent Pleas

Four former Paris bank officers pleaded innocent at their arraignment Monday on federal charges of embezzlement and false entries at Sherman.

The four are Alfred Kidd, Morris Fleming, William H. Snow and Ann Marshall.

They entered their plea before Judge Randolph Bryant. No trial date was set.

A federal grand jury at Tyler indicted the four on Feb. 20, 1950, on thirty-five counts charging embezzlement and misapplication of funds and false entries.

Previous indictments had been returned at Paris. Federal District Attorney Warren G. Moore of Paris said then that the government alleged about \$70,000 was involved.

Farmer Sells Personal Effects 100 Years Ago, Moving to New Country

Mrs. Emma Brownlee of Wil-
son, has sent the editor the
following sales notice taken from
the Medford (Ore.) Mail-Trib-
une:

Over one hundred years ago
Walter L. Moss of Versailles, Ky.,
left for the Oregon territory by
ox-team. Apparently a substan-
tial farmer and businessman,
Moss held a sale of farm and per-
sonal effects before he left, on
March 1, 1849.

A copy of his notice of sale
was made available to the Mail-
Tribune by Mrs. Lula E. Thur-
ston of Eagle Point. The sale no-
tice, just as it originally appear-
ed, follows:

"Having sold my farm, am
leaving for Oregon Territory by
ox-team, will offer on March 1,
1849 all my personal property,
to-wit: All ox teams except two
teams, Buck-Ben and Tom-Perry;
2 milk cows, 1 gray mare, 1 colt,
1 pair of oxen yoke, 2 ox carts,
1 iron plow with wood mold-
board, 800 feet of poplar weather
boards, 1000 3-foot clapboards,
1500 10-foot fence rails, 1 60-gal.
soap kettle, 85 sugar troughs
made of white ash timber, 10 gal-

lons of maple syrup, 2 spinning
wheels, 30 pounds of mutton tal-
low, 1 large loom made by Jerry
Wilson, 300 poles, 100 split hoops,
100 empty barrels, 1 31-gallon
barrel of Miller-Johnson whis-
key, 7 years old; 20 gallons apple
brandy, 3 40-gallon copper
kettle, 3 sides of oak-tanned leather,
1 dozen real hooks, 2 handle
hooks, 3 scythes, cradle, 1 dozen
wooden pitchforks, 1/2 interest in
tan yard, 1 32-calibre rifle, bullet
molds, powder horn, rifle made
by Ben Miller, 50 gallons of soft
soap, hams, bacon, lard, 40 gal-
lons of sorghum molasses, 6 head
of fox hounds, all smooth except
one.

is 2 miles south of Versailles,
Ky., on McComins Ferry pike.
Sale to begin at 8 o'clock a. m.
Plenty to eat and drink.

is an introduced plant from India
and is used in that country for
soil improvement. As a forage

grows tall, up to six feet, and is
bunchy in growth. This plant has
been grown only a few years in
Texas, but never before in this
area. It is hoped from these ex-
perimental plantings that it proves

Alcorn Wants International Banking Methods Given a Trial Here

Editor's Note: Achin Alcorn, philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Sulphur, comes up with a strange notion of banking this week, as follows:

Dear Editor: I was read in a paper last night which I picked up off the counter at a cafe and will return next week if they complain about it that Russia has offered to pay off its lend-lease debt of two billion dollars to the United States provided we'll accept payment at the rate of 2 cents on the dollar.

As I understand it, the United States is gravely considering this proposition. Now of course it wouldn't take me or you long to give Russia an answer on this, but that ain't what interests me right now.

What interests me is the type of international banking methods in use today, and what I'd still like to know is why we can't have some of 'em here in Northeast Texas.

Say last year I was confronted with a financial emergency, and there ain't no time of the year when I couldn't arrange one, and went to the bank and they loaned me \$500. Well, along about now say the note comes due. Under the present system we got around here, the bank sends me a brief notice that the note is due payment is expected.

But national governments don't employ such embarrassin' methods. We send a man all the way to Russia, outfit him in a new suit of clothes, and have him wait around Stalin's office a few days, when he's admitted and hands over a diplomatically-worded note sayin we hope Stalin is in

good health and his family is fine and along toward the end, as a sort of after-thought, we beg his pardon for mentioning it but there's a slight matter of two billion dollars past due now for five years. And then Russia, in about two months, gets around to offerin to settle for 2 cents on the dollar.

Now what we need here in this area is a similar system. When my note comes due at the bank, I'd like to get some international treatment. If the bank would wait five years before sending a man out here to inquire about my health and casually mention that \$500 note, and give me a couple of months to make a counter offer, say even 5 cents on the dollar. 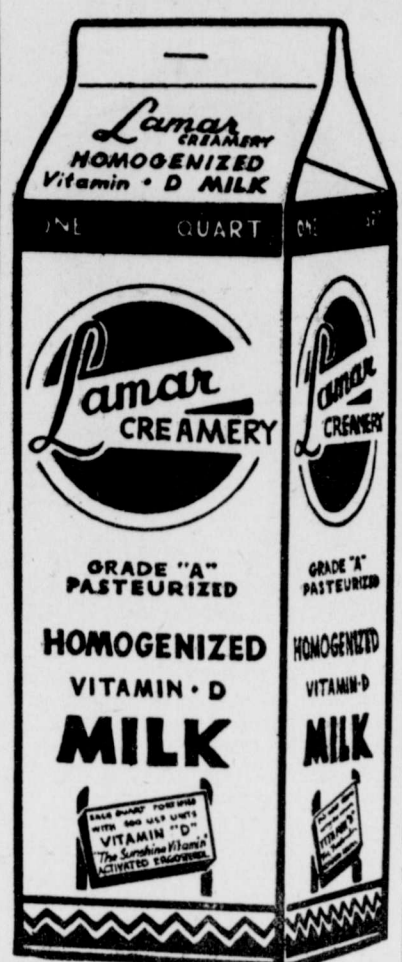

Miss Williams and Curly Lawson taught us what to do with our

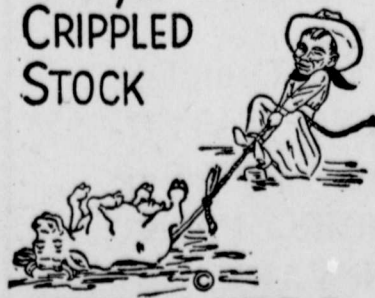
feet, and before it was over, darn if I wasn't actually enjoying myself. Going back next week, too!
