Elmer Martin Elected Colorado City Mayor

Approval of the 1980-1981 budget, election of a mayor and mayor pro-tem and the seating of two new council members were among the top items of business at the monthly meeting of the City Council of Colorado City Monday night.

The budget was adopted by the outgoing council and was approved as it had been previously set-up after several months work with one exception, that being a proposed \$1,200 donation to Woodland School from revenue sharing funds was found to be illegal under revenue sharing provisions.

Those funds were reallocated to a fund for finding and solving a water loss problem that the city has experienced for some time.

In other items, the council:

—Elected former Mayor Pro-Tem Elmer Martin as Mayor and Jesse Munoz as Mayor Pro-Tem. This will be for a one year term as Martin will be up for re-election next year.

—Opened and awarded

bids for 35,000 square yards of seal coating and for 3,143 square yards of paving work to Bob & Bobby Nobles Dirt Contractors.

—Tabled a request to close one block of a dedicated street, Erie, at the request of a citizen. The request was tabled until City Attorney Pete McKinney, can draw up an ordinance setting up guidelines for abandoning city streets. That portion of Erie that was requested to be closed was dedicated but has never been opened.

—Gave permission to the Chamber of Commerce to close Walnut between First and Second Streets from 7:30 p.m. and 12:30 a.m. on July 22 for a rodeo festival in conjunction with the annual AJRA Rodeo. The Rodeo Festival will officially open the Frontier Days Celebration. Making the request on behalf of the Chamber's Merchants' Committee were Gay Houston and Betty Williams.

—Amended the City's plumbing code setting a

fine not to exceed \$200 for those found to be in violation of the code. There was a penalty clause in the existing former city ordinance but it also included provisions for a jail term which City Manager Ray Mason said took it out of the city's jurisdiction.

The budget adopted by the council includes general fund revenue of \$832,625 and total estimated expenditures of \$823,355. The budget also calls for a three percent increase in taxes and an increase of the base sewer rate of \$1 and an increase of \$1.50 in the base water rate.

Included in the general fund was a provision for city employees to receive a seven percent overall raise plus an additional 15 cents per hour increase.

In the water and sewer fund, total revenues are anticipated to be \$519,300 and total expenditures are listed as \$514,825 including a \$155,000 transfer of funds to the general fund.

Following the approval of the budget, the council canvassed and approved the results of Saturday's election showing that Nina K. Crout received 434 votes; J.O. Dockrey, Jr., 387; J.M. (Jesse) Munoz, 492; Mac B. McKinnon, 419 and M. Odie Wise, 321 with Munoz, Mrs. Crout and McKinnon winning the three

positions up for election.

Then Mason presented plaques to Mayor Marion Bassham and Councilman Loyd Ledbetter, outgoing members of the council, neither of whom sought re-election.

Both had comments to make to the council as well as guests present and noted they had enjoyed the experience of being on the council and found it to be a learning experience.

Both also noted that the council faces a great challenge in the future in dealing with inflation.

Friday, deputies took Maria Ventura of Westbrook into custody for probation revocation.

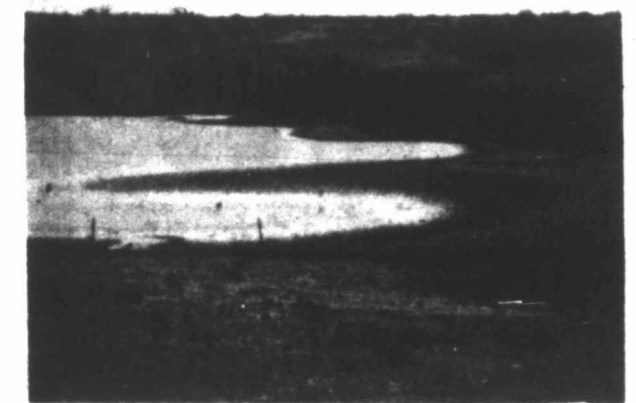
She was originally placed on probation for check forgery on May 17, 1978.

Dry Weather Grips County

The blustery winds of March have served to reinforce the need for rain in Mitchell County.

Although, according to County Extension Agent Bob Benson, sub-soil moisture is still good, there is not sufficient top soil moisture to plant crops.

Benson said with a good two inch rain, producers could plant grain sorghum this month and cotton after the May 20th target date.

"We are shooting for the May 20th date in order to control the insect problem," Benson said.

Rangelands are just beginning to green-up, Benson noted. If it does not rain within the next ten day period, the pastures will begin to turn brown and die.

About five million dollars a year are contributed to the Mitchell County economy from the cattle industry.

These cattle are generally grazed on rangeland with some supplemental feeding during the winter months.

Small grains (wheat and oats) are planted in October and November and cattle are grazed on these until March 15. They are moved to other grazing on that date if the producer plans to harvest the grains.

This year, because of a lack of moisture during the winter months, little or no grain has

been raised and cattle producers are now into a heavy supplemental feed program.

Police Roundup

The incidents of crime in Colorado City for the month of March 1980 have changed only slightly from those reported in March of 1979.

There were three felony assaults and one simple assault reported last month. Two of the felony assault cases were cleared.

In March 1979, there were four assaults reported.

Four burglaries were reported last month resulting in an estimated loss of \$65. Two of the burglaries were cleared by the department.

In March 1979, three burglaries were reported.

A total of six auto burglaries were reported last month resulting in an estimated loss of \$774.

In March 1979, there were no auto burglaries reported.

There were six thefts under \$200 reported last month. Two of the theft cases have been cleared.

In March 1979, there were six thefts under \$200 reported.

One stolen automobile was reported last month. The car was recovered. In March 1979, there was one automobile reported stolen.

Vandalisms are up from last year. There were nine vandalisms reported last month with one cleared. The total estimated damage was \$1,343.

In March 1979, there were four vandalisms reported.

A total of 35 arrests were made last month. There were 23 adults and seven juveniles apprehended.

This is broken down into several categories. There was one driving while intoxicated charge (DWI); seven drug related charges; 13 public intoxicated char-

ges (PI); two disorderly conduct charges and 12 miscellaneous charges brought last month.

In March 1979, there were 34 (32 adults and two juveniles) arrests made, broken down as follows: two DWI char-

ges; 14 PI charges; five disorderly conduct charges; four traffic infractions; two city ordinance charges and seven miscellaneous charges.

Last month there were eight automobile

Steakley Joins The Hospital District Board Of Directors

Bobbie Steakley, new board member and incumbent Bob Reilly and T.C. Moore were sworn in as members of the Mitchell County Hospital District Board of Directors Monday evening after an election which brought a record breaking 790 persons to the hospital district polls to vote.

An estimated 125 persons was the largest number to ever previously vote in the twelve

year history of the district.

The large voter turnout was attributed, in part, to the position opening created by the resignation of President of the Board Murrell Blasingame earlier in the year.

Blasingame resigned to seek election to the County Commissioner's Court.

Henry Bilberry was appointed to fill the vacancy temporarily but

declined to seek election to the position.

After votes were canvassed Monday evening, Bilberry's last official act as a member of the board was to participate in the swearing in ceremonies of new board members.

New officers were elected during the meeting. T.C. Moore, who had acted as president after Blasingame's resignation, was elected to

continue in that position.

Bobby Lemons was elected to serve as vice president and Bob Reilly, who has served as secretary of the board since its inception, was reelected to that position.

Hospital Administrator Charles Root gave his first report to the new board. He told members the new parking lot which has been See HOSPITAL Page 3

been low until this past week, according to Benson, when it rose slightly.

Producers are now being forced to keep their

herds until the market increases substantially, due to the amount of investment in the herds caused by supplemental feeding.

Retaining the herds creates another problem for the cattle producer; they must have an ample water supply.

In the southern part of the county, tanks that have not gone dry since 1932 are currently drying up.

County Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Director Don Stewart said he plans to take one such case before his County Committee this week for consideration.

He noted a request for assistance could be made, but assistance of this type no longer comes through the state office. It comes direct from Washington.

"In order to fill the stock tanks, we need a hard eight or nine inch rain comparable to that experienced by Buford Community last year," Benson said.

He noted that water run off from the Buford rains flowed into the Colorado River and on to Lake Spence at Robert Lee.

In order for the two lakes and the southern part of Mitchell County to catch run off, the rains would have to be situated so the flow would be caught by Cherry, Morgan or Champion Creeks, Benson said.

He said producers face similar problems about this time every year. "We always begin to wonder if it is going to rain."

"If a producer can make it anywhere, he can make it in this county. We are very lucky to have strong grasses here. Cotton grows great, if we get the moisture," Benson stated.

There has been 1.14 inches of rain so far this year as compared to 3.74 inches in April 1979.

The difference in rangeland grazing was made by the fall rains in 1978 when it rained 4.27 inches in September, 2.11 inches in October, .53 inches in November and .35 inches in December. This compares to 1979 when it rained not at all in September, .33 inches in October, .50 inches in November and 1.50 inches in December.

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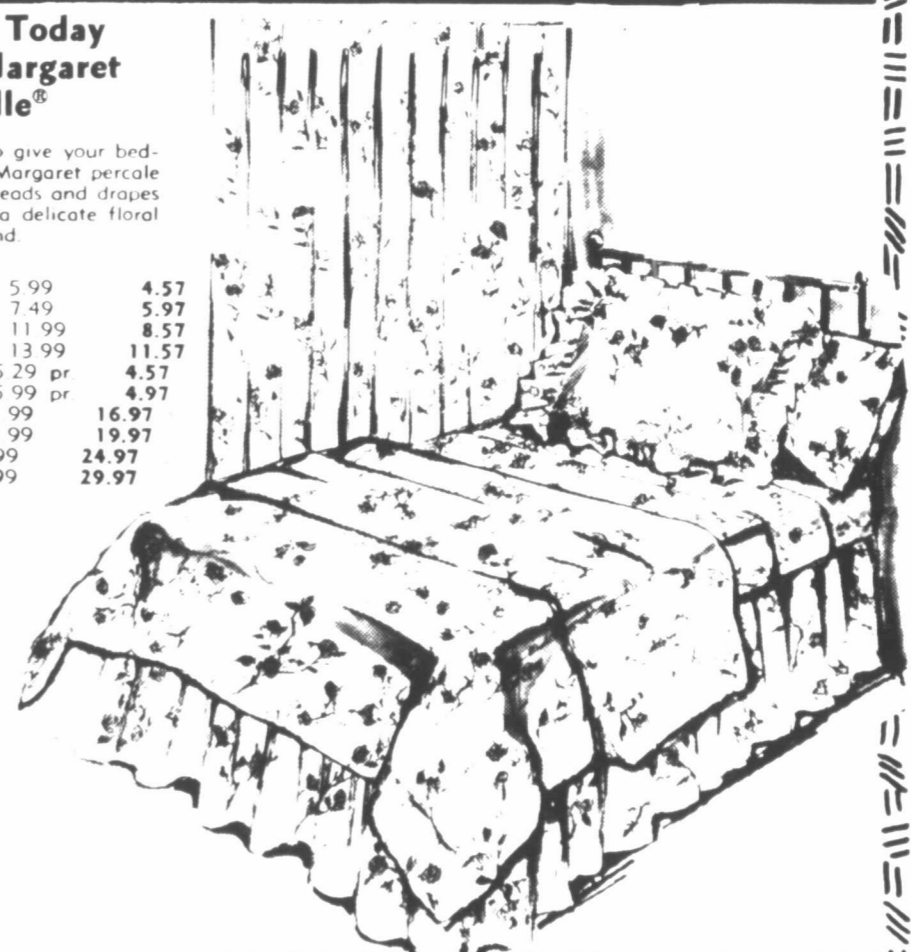

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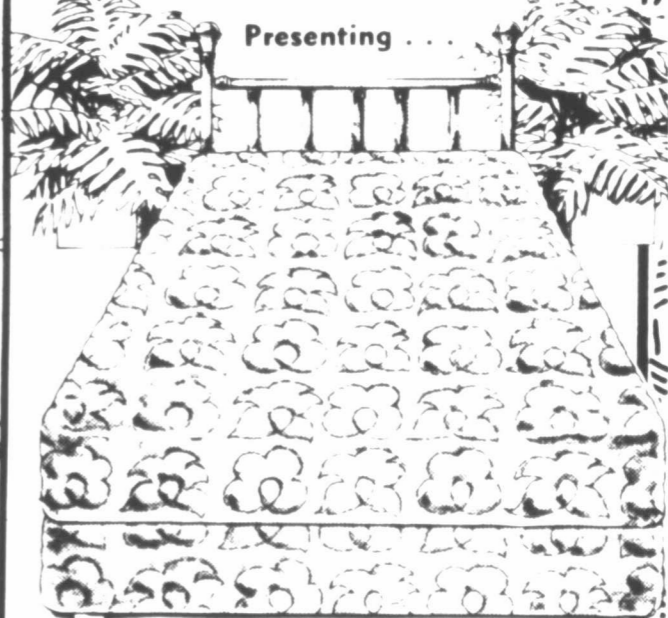
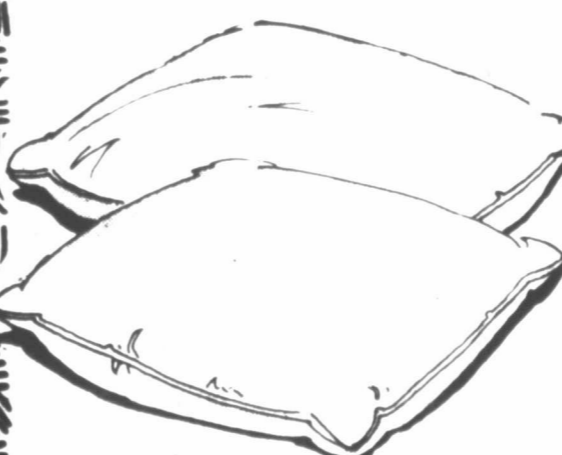

Clinton L. Harrison, 90, of Odessa, died at 11 p.m. Tuesday in the Medical Center Hospital in Odessa after a lengthy illness.

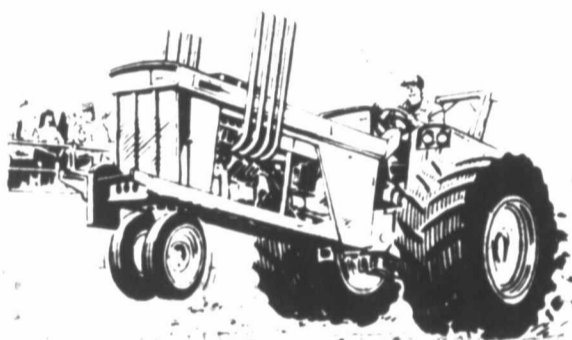

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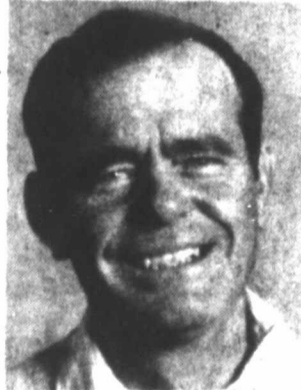

Then City Secretary Brenda Tarter administered the oath of office to Munoz, Mrs. Crout and McKinnon, after which the election of mayor and mayor pro-tem took place.

The first item of business for the new council involved opening bids for seal coating city streets. This would amount to about 35,000 square yards of seal coating, enough to seal coat 1 1/2 miles of city streets. Those areas to be seal coated include 17th from Pecos to Lone Wolf Blvd., and 10th from Austin to Lone Wolf Blvd., and others.

Bids were from Sidell of San Angelo with a bid of 65 cents per square yard, a total of \$22,750; 59 cents from Bob & Bobby Nobles of Colorado City, a total cost of \$20,650 and a bid of 58 cents from Liphams of Aspermont for a total of \$20,300.

After comments from council members Macca Findley and Nina Crout and others that the city should try to do business locally and since there was only \$300 difference, the council voted to award the bid to Nobles. The city had provided \$25,000 in the 1979-1980 budget to pay for the work.

Then bids were opened for paving a road at Fisher Park under a state grant. The bids came from the same three bidders as in seal coating work with Liphams bidding \$1.41 per yard for 3,143 square yards of paving, a total cost of \$4,431.63. Nobles bid \$2 for a total of \$6,286 and Sidell bid \$2.05 for a total of \$6,443.15.

Munoz made a motion to go with the low bid and it was seconded by McKinnon. The motion failed by a 2-4 vote. Then a motion was made to accept the bid of Nobles although it was higher, as several council members believed it would be good to keep the business locally. There was a split vote with council members Ray Dillard, Mrs. Crout and Sam Parham voting for the motion and Findley, McKinnon and Munoz voting against. Mayor Martin voted for to break the tie and awarded the bid to Nobles.

The council also opened a bid on selling Block 10, Original Town and there was only one bid for the property at the end of Third Street by the Colorado River. That bid was in the amount of \$350 from Producer's Co-Op Gin and the council accepted the bid.

Mason reported during the City Manager's report that a rabies clinic is being planned soon for a Sunday afternoon and he also requested and received the council's permission to change the siren signal for a tornado from alternating long and short blasts to one long blast as is done in other cities.

During the financial report, Mrs. Tarter reported that it looks like the city will end up with between \$45,000 and \$50,000 at the end of the month which will be the end of the fiscal year. This comes after the city having had to borrow \$100,000 at the beginning of the fiscal year. That loan has been paid off.

It was also noted that it appears the city's revenue for the fiscal year will be higher than anticipated.

During discussion of finances, McKinnon asked about the high utility bills at Lake Champion. Mason said the City had received a bill for the last month

for 222,000 gallons of water at the lake and he was checking to see what had happened.

During the council members report, McKinnon asked if lights in front of the police station could be replaced to make it easier to find at night and also asked Mason if he could start a study on the metro police system to report to the council in May after the Democratic primary to see if the council is interested in pursuing the matter.

Since the resignation of Police Chief Fred McWhorter, the council has been discussing the possibility of going metro and the county commissioners have also discussed it and it has been decided to wait until after the primary to go any further with discussion.

The council needs to have the information soon after the primary, McKinnon said.

One of the reasons for waiting until after the primary is that the sheriff's office would be in charge of the metro police force and two people are seeking that office. It has been noted that further discussion of the matter would not be fair now to either candidate.

McKinnon also noted that for years the council has discussed revising the city's charter. He suggested the council go through a part of the charter at each meeting to see if revision is wanted. If so, it could be presented next April during the regular city council election so as to save money on election expense.

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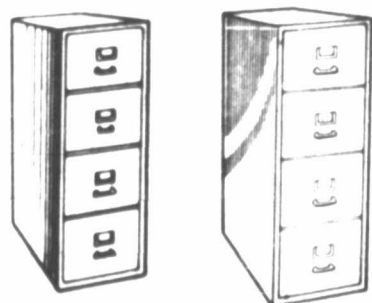

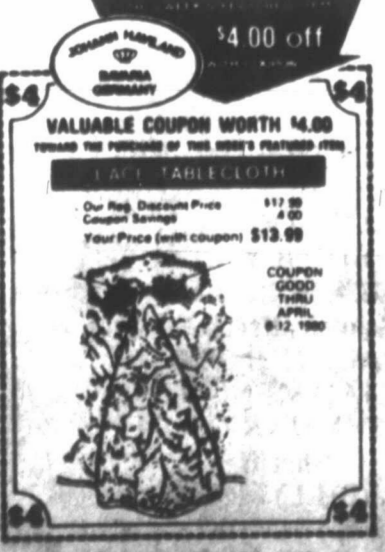
