Farmers are required to file a declaration of estimated 1943 income and victory tax and make payment by Dec. 15. Farmers who elected to make declarations Sept. 15 when most other persons made them, will need only to make an installment payment Dec. 15. Persons who made declarations Sept. 15 and wish to amend them, or those who made no declarations but since have had a change in income to require them, also should file by Dec. 15. Persons with tax installments due on that date will receive and have received bills from the district collector of internal revenue.

REDUCE MEAT POINT VALUE

The entire list of rationed beef items has been cut two or three points making the most meat available to civilians since rationing began late last March. Many pork cuts remain at the reduced value set by OPA in mid-November, and point values of lamb, mutton and all veal remain unchanged. This means an increase of approximately 30% in the housewife's meat ration for December as compared with the ration set at the beginning of November.

TOMMY SNOW, 14, IS VICTIM OF HIT-RUN DRIVER; LOCAL YOUTH FACES CHARGES FRIDAY

A charge of delinquency against Verlyn Wilson, 16, was filed in Hale county court Friday in connection with the death Wednesday night, Dec. 1, of 14-year-old Tommy Snow, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. S. Snow of Abernathy, who was struck by an automobile and instantly killed on the highway two miles north of Abernathy. Wilson was driving the automobile which struck the boy, officers said.

Officers did not learn who was the driver of the death car until about two hours after Snow was killed when young Wilson with his father reported to officers at Abernathy. Snow was walking along the highway with five companions when he was hit. Wilson and three friends were returning from a picture show.

Since Wilson is under 17 years of age his case will be heard before Judge Frank R. Day in juvenile session of county court. Judge Day said he expected to dispose of the case Friday. Wilson, son of Mr. and Mrs. G. W. Wilson who live 4 1/2 miles north of Abernathy, was in custody of Hale County Sheriff Ott Martine.

A juvenile petition filed in the court of Judge Day accused the farm youth with hit-run driving, failure to stop and render aid and with operation of a car without a driver's license, it was announced.

State highway patrolmen out of Plainview and Lubbock, Abernathy, Plainview and Hale county officers converged on the scene of the hit-run death within a short time after it occurred, which was between 10:30 p. m. and 11 p. m. A radiator ornament and the right hand headlamp from the automobile were found at the scene. The body was moved to the Snow home in the southwest part of Abernathy after officers reached the scene of the youth's death.

State Highway Patrolman Marvin Blount of Plainview said young Wilson told officers that he thought he had hit a cow on the highway, that he took his three companions, a boy, and two girls, to their homes, and after parking at a friend's house, he went with a friend to the scene of the accident. Wilson then went home and told his father what had happened, he said, and later reported to Ocie Rutledge, Abernathy city marshal, and Tom Laws, Lubbock State highway patrolman, in Abernathy.

Snow was walking along the highway with five companions. They are Wayne Payne, Lois Lansdon, Leon Cecil, Muriel Lansdon and Carl Smith.

Reports said that those in the car with Wilson were Martha Bramble, Kirby Bramble and Emogene Cecil. Royce Matthews, Tuco employee, was driving behind the Wilson car, and when Matthews saw what happened, he immediately gave chase to the death car in attempt to secure its license number. The attempt was unsuccessful, however, and officers were immediately notified.

Eugene Garvin, young son of Mr. and Mrs. R. D. Garvin, was the next motorist to arrive at the scene. He advised Snow's companions not to move the body, and Garvin returned to Abernathy to notify officers.

Last rites were held at the Church of Christ here Saturday afternoon for Tommy Carson Snow, 14, who was fatally injured at about 10:30 o'clock Wednesday night last week by a hit-run driver on the highway two miles north of Abernathy.

O. O. Newton, Church of Christ minister, officiated and was assisted by Rev. H. E. McClain, Nazarene pastor, and Rev. Frank Beauchamp, Methodist minister. Burial was in Abernathy cemetery.

Pall bearers were Fred Campbell, Bill and Buck Cecil, Carl Smith, Kirby Bramble and Eddie Blair.

Flower bearers were Emogene and Rosie Lewis, Emogene Cecil, Muriel and Lois, Lansdon, Hallie Tubbs, Zepha Campbell and Vondale White.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. S. Snow of Abernathy, four brothers, Earl and Henry, who are on sea duty with the Navy, J. V. and Joel, Abernathy, and a sister, Mrs. Agnes Kaniatobe, Los Angeles, Calif.

Tommy Carson Snow was born on May 23, 1929, at Sawyer, Okla. Formerly of Valliant, Okla., the Snow family moved to this community on April 12, this year. Tommy attended school here part of last term, and had planned to re-enter school this week. He had worked in the harvest and at a gin here this fall.

Gasoline — A-9 coupons now good for 3 gallons of gasoline.

New B-2 and C-2 coupons good for 5 gals. each. Old B-1 and C-1 stamps still outstanding good for only 2 gals. each. Endorse all stamps before use.

Shoes: Stamp No. 18 in book 1 valid indefinitely for 1 pr. shoes. It overlaps Stamp No. 1 on airplane sheet of Book 3, good after Nov. 1.

Sugar — Stamp 29 in Book 4 good for 5 lbs., thru Jan. 15, 1944.

Meats & Fats: In Book 3, brown stamps L, M & N valid now and P is to be valid Dec. 12, all good thru Jan. 1, 1944.

Processed Foods: Book 4, green stamps A, B & C valid thru Dec. 20, green stamps D, E & F, which became valid Dec. 1, are good thru Jan. 20, 1944.

Tire Inspection — A bookholders must have 3rd official inspection by March 31, 1944; B bookholders, 4th inspection Feb. 29, '44; C bookholders 4th inspection by Nov. 30; TT bookholders should have tire inspection every 6 mos., or every 5,000 miles— whichever comes first.

Between Dec. 15 and Jan. 5, all industrial users of rationed foods will be asked to re-register with their local War Price and Rationing boards. OPA officials report. This registration will be made on the new form R-1200, which is a consolidation of the former sugar form R-310, the processed foods form R-1308, and the meats form R-1605.

SERVICE BUTTONS BEING DISTRIBUTED

Plastic gold-coated military service buttons for wear on civilian clothing to signify honorable military service on and after the declaration of a period of national emergency, Sept. 9, 1939, are being distributed to issuing agencies throughout the country, the War Dept. reports. The insignia on the button is an eagle within a circle, the wings extending beyond the circle's edge. Persons whose army service has been terminated under honorable conditions will be permitted to wear the insignia.

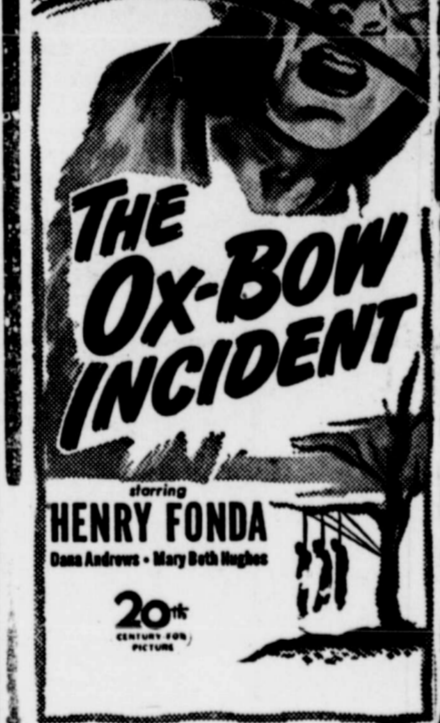
