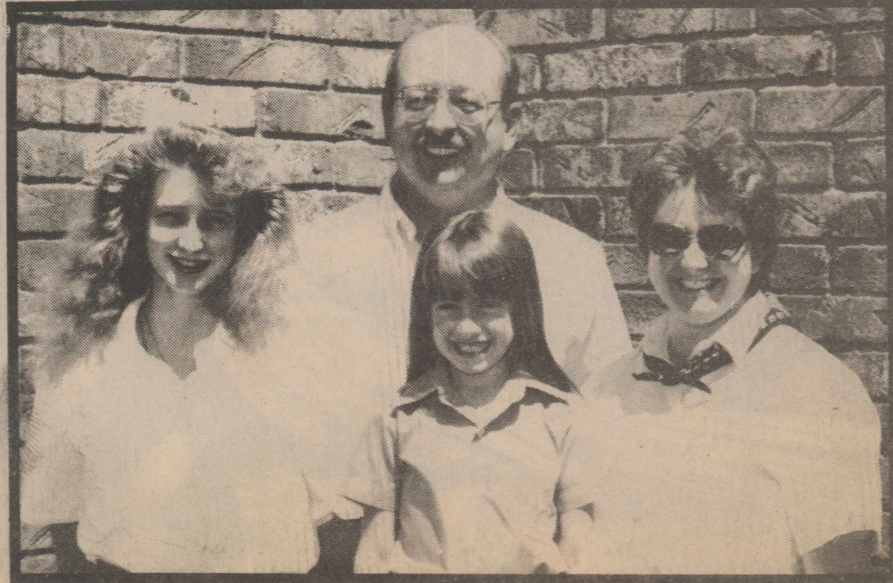
### Commissioners Vote \$24,000 For New Signs

Texas Highway Patrolman Allan Arnwine investigated a one vehicle accident 4.6 miles West of Rotan last Sunday night, at the Bruce Cox corner, that resulted in an injury to driver Joe Don Helm of Roby.

According to Arnwine, Helm was travelling west in a 1985 Chevrolet pickup and failed to navigate the turn at the Bruce Cox corner. Helm overturned the vehicle causing extensive damage to the vehicle. A passenger in the pickup was not at the scene when Arnwine

arrived but will be issued a citation for failure to wear a seat belt.

Helm was cited for "Unsafe speed and not wearing a seat belt," according to Arnwine.

Helm was treated at the Fisher County Hospital and released for a laceration in the area of his back, according to the highway patrolman.

The incident took place at approximately 7:30 p.m., Sunday night, June 3rd.

## Rotan Names Mickey Early New High School Principal

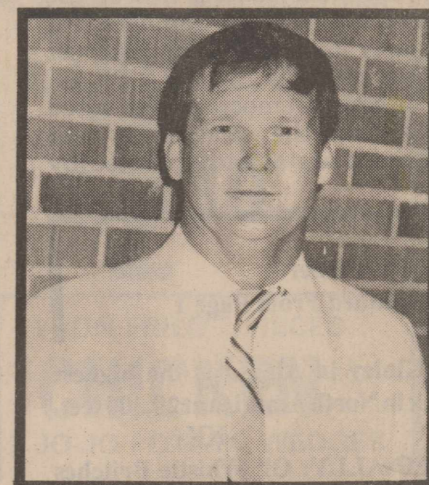
The members of the Rotan School Board, during a special session last Friday night, re-assigned principals for the 1990-91 school year.

"The board basically honored a request that Jim Cain made earlier, that he be considered for the vacancy in junior high," commented Rotan School Board President Pete Fowler.

Fowler indicated that he still does not have any official announcement concerning filling the vacancy for a head football coach. "I feel like it will be at least Tuesday night, June 12th at the regular board meeting before we have any further word on filling the vacancy," said Fowler.

As far as filling the vacancy created with the resignation of high school science teacher Guy Nelson, Fowler indicated that the board may wait until after July 1st and the arrival of new Superintendent Steven Ervin before making a decision in that area.

## Commissioners Operate Precincts On \$667,985, Local And Motor Vehicle Taxes Are 90% Of Total

Fisher County Commissioners operated their four precincts on \$667,985.76 in 1989 with 90-percent of the funds used coming to commissioners in the form of taxes collected and motor vehicle department fees collected, according to a report by Fisher County Auditor Pat Neep. Ms. Neep released the report to Commissioners several weeks ago as part of her annual report to 32nd District Judge Weldon Kirk.

Commissioners averaged collecting \$167,000 each or a total of \$667,985.76 during 1989. Of the total collected, \$380,883.42 came to commissioners in the form of ad valorem taxes collected or 57-percent of the total and \$220,922.78 or 33-percent, came in the form of M.V.D. (Motor Vehicle Department) fees collected. The remaining 10-percent came from lateral road, interest, \$5.00 fee and other miscellaneous receipts.

Each commissioner basically received the same funds during 1989. The funds, mainly because of interest collected, did vary from a low of \$165,581 to Precinct 2 Commissioner Billy Henderson Meek to a high of \$168,718 to Precinct 3 Commissioner Jay Hendon.

Commissioner Precinct 1 Charlie Meek received \$167,595 while Commissioner Precinct 4 Jimmy Wright received \$166,089.

# State Capital Highlights

Once again, the Legislature adjourned in failure and, despite the leadership's slim hope for success in yet another special session, many rank-and-file legislators are saying forget it.

At week's end, weary lawmakers braced to hear the first official word from the special master appointed to draw a school finance "Robin Hood" plan.

Special master William Wayne Kilgarlin said he might force consolidation of rich and poor school districts, a politically unpopular concept to say the least.

The Robin Hood plan basically adds state-appropriated funds to a portion of local school district property taxes and divides them equally among the state's public school students, taking from the rich districts and giving to the poor ones in the process.

"Keep Your Shirt On" While Houston school officials expressed "fear for the whole state," Gov. Bill Clements advised them to "just keep your shirt on. In due course, we'll get a bill passed."

House speaker Gib Lewis echoed the optimism somewhat: "One thing I am trying to prevent is to allow the master to write the school plan for the future of Texas education. I think that is the job of the Texas Legislature."

The leadership may want a legislative plan, but Black and Hispanic lawmakers predicted they'll prefer a court-ordered plan.

One member of the Black Caucus, state Rep. Fred Blair, D-Dallas, vowed "if the bill comes back anything less than \$555 million, there's no way our Caucus will support it."

The top two Hispanic House members also echoed that stance. Speaker Pro Tem Hugo Berlanga, D-Corpus Christi, predicted that Hispanic lawmakers will go with the master's plan once they see it.

**Bloc Vote Doubtful** "Once the (Hispanic) members look at the impact of the master's plan vs. the legislative plan, it's a foregone conclusion. I don't think we are going to be able to hold the membership to go up against the master's plan."

Eddie Cavazos, chairman of the House Hispanic Caucus, said its members may not vote for any legislative plan. "That's fine. Let them (Republicans) deal with the master."

But the point is, the Hispanic and Black blocs united can stop any bill from coming out of the House, not by sheer numbers, but by party loyalty and the prospect of later reprisal.

The eight Democrats who voted to sustain the governor's veto last week are already painted by

some Democrats as traitors. "They, along with our governor, ought to be proud of turning our schools over to our courts," said Sen. Carl Parker, D-Port Arthur.

Should Blacks and Hispanics sink the Legislature's plan, they'll risk wearing the blame, and the now-stale attempts by Parker and others to fix all the blame on Clements will be undermined.

The issue is so sensitive and emotional that most lawmakers probably prefer to let the master take all the blame.

**Abortion Group Targets** The Texas Abortion Rights Action League, an Austin-based pro-choice group, has targeted ten political candidates for defeat, all Republicans.

The group also gave its strongest endorsement to Democrat Ann Richards, candidate for governor.

Richards' opponent, Clayton Williams, heads the hit list. Others include Robert Mosbacher and Buster Brown, GOP nominees for Lt. governor and attorney general. Also named were nominees for Senate and House races in Austin, Bryan/College Station, El Paso, Wichita Falls, Georgetown and Houston.

"The Texas Abortion Rights Action League should be renamed the Ann Richards Fan Club," commented the Mosbacher campaign.

**Other Highlights** \* The Senate confirmed the appointment of Chairman Paul Meek to the Public Utility Commission.

\* Victor L. Heller, former Arizona tourism director, took over as president of the new Texas Travel Industry Association shortly before state tourism director Eugene Dilbeck abruptly quit that job after less than nine months.

\* Controversial Valley grower Othal Brand withdrew his name from nomination to a pesticide board, apparently with the knowledge that Brownsville state Sen. Hector Uribe would use the senatorial courtesy privilege to block him.

Brand, a Republican and mayor of McAllen, has long been at odds

with farmworker unions and local Mexican-American Democrats.

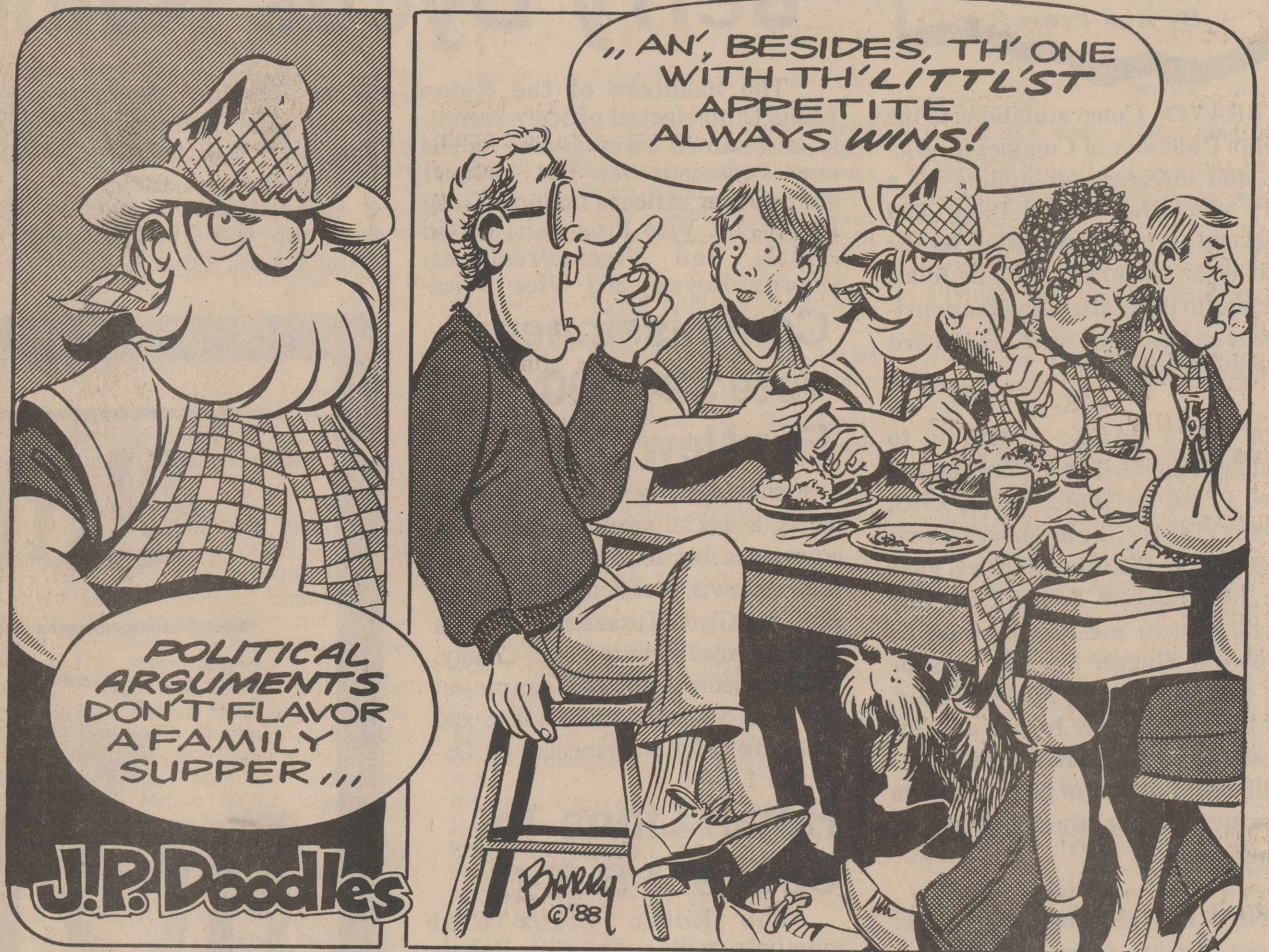
His March statement about the pesticide chlordane, "Sure, it's going to kill some people but they may be dying of something else anyway," set off a wave of objections.

\* Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby this week will represent his mother, Oveta Culp Hobby, in ceremonies honoring the late President Dwight D. Eisenhower.

Mrs. Hobby, 85, is one of the three surviving Cabinet members of the Eisenhower administration and was the first U.S. Secretary of Health Education and Welfare.

### Ten Area Schools Sign-Up For New Clear Fork At-Risk Education Coop

A total of ten area schools have signed-up to be a member of the Clear Fork Cooperative, a network of schools who hope to form a student at-risk education cooperative at the old McCaulley School site, according to James Logan, Superintendent of schools at Markel and the fiscal agent for the cooperative program.

The ten schools are: Anson, Aspermont, Haskell, Hawley, Leuders Avoca, Merkel, Roby, Stamford and Trent. "We hope to have a minimum of 60 to 65 students at the school the first of September", said Logan.

"We are in the process of accepting applications for an administrator (principal) for the Clear Fork Cooperative at the present time. "We realize that the whole key to making this thing

work is a good principal', said Logan. He has had three people make application for the position and he indicated that he is confident that the board will select a candidate for the job on Wednesday, June 13th. "We are definitely going to open up in the fall", commented Logan.

After the administrator for the school is hired, Logan feels the board will be looking at hiring 4 to 5 teachers to make up the staff.

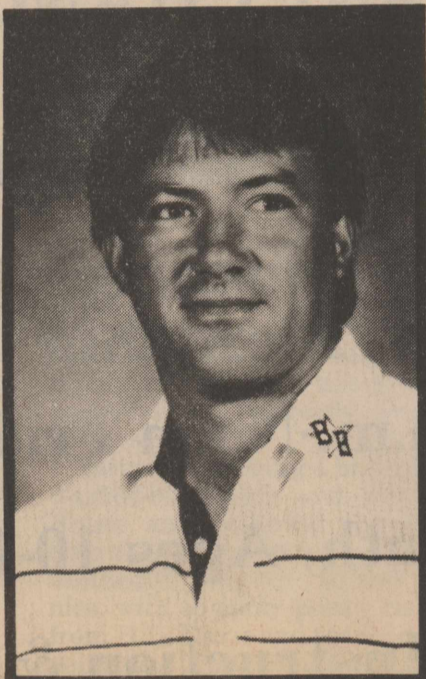
The ten members schools each pledged \$5,000 in start-up funds for the establishment of the school that will serve students at-risk of failing, dropping out of school or who already have dropped out of one of the ten members' schools.

## Roby School Board Hires Four Key Individuals

The members of the Roby School Board hired four key individuals, voted to pay an initial start-up fee of \$5,000 to the Clear Fork At-Risk Cooperative at McCaulley and reviewed the results of the 1990 TEAMS tests during a special board meeting on Tuesday night, May 26th.

The board offered contracts to a new high school principal, elementary principal as well as a football coach and girls basketball coach.

Board members present for the meeting were David Boyd, Bryan Justiss, Andy Moore, Marie Henry, Jeff McClure, Dr. David Morris and Lance McWilliams. Others present were: Athletic Director Ron Francis, Counselor Mrs. Thrailkill and Roby High School Principal George Price.

The board offered a contract to Joe Joplin of Seminole as the elementary principal. Joplin was hired on a 7-0 vote by the board and will receive a local bonus of \$4,000 next year as a first year Roby principal.

The board offered a contract to Guy Nelson of Rotan as the high school principal. Nelson was hired on a 7-0 vote by the board and will receive a local bonus of \$4,000 next year as a first year Roby principal.

The board hired Brad Thiessen of Bridgeport as the football coach. Thiessen was hired on a 7-0 vote by the

board and will receive a local teaching bonus of \$1,300 and local coaching bonus of \$3,200 next year.

The board hired Gail Gregg of Floydada as the girl's basketball coach. Gregg was hired on a 5-1-1 vote by the board and will receive a local teaching bonus of \$1,300 and local coaching bonus of \$3,200. Board members Boyd, Justiss, Moore, McClure and McWilliams voted in favor of hiring Gregg. Board member Morris voted against and board member Henry abstained from voting.

Prior to going into closed session Dr. David Morris requested clarification on items on the agenda to be discussed in executive session. Morris was under the impression, after attending a Region 14 Education Service Center meeting earlier this year, that items to be discussed in closed session were supposed to be clearly outlined as to the subject, purpose, etc. on the board agenda. Morris indicated that he felt the public had the right to know what their elected officials were planning on discussing in closed session. Board President David Boyd and George Price are to check into Morris' request for clarification further and report back at the regular June board meeting on June 11th.

A discussion also was conducted that centered around a letter presented to the board by Jenny Blaine requesting

that the board give consideration to purchasing letter patches for band students. Price informed the board that the school, under UIL rules, could only spend so much. He is to check further into this item and report back to the board.

Board members reviewed the TEAMS test scores for 1990 with Mrs. Thrailkill. The area of the TEAMS test that seemed to cause the most trouble for Roby students was writing. Board members were concerned with the low writing scores and are looking into solutions to be implemented to reflect improvements.

In grade 3, 100% of the 21 students tested mastered the math portion of the test; 95% mastered reading and 90% mastered writing. In grade 5, 89% of the 21 students tested mastered the math portion of the test; 85% mastered reading and 75% mastered writing.

In grade 7, 95% of the 21 students tested mastered the math portion of the test; 90% mastered reading and 71% mastered writing. In the 9th grade, a total of 94% of the 18 students tested mastered math; 94% mastered reading and 38% mastered writing.

In the 11th grade exit-level test administered to 23 students, 20 passed all tests and 3 failed one of the two tests (math and language arts), according to Mrs. Thrailkill's report.

The board accepted the resignation of Elementary Principal Mickey Early. He recently resigned to take a principal position at Rotan.

A discussion, centering around who is the Roby High School Superintendent during June, resulted in the appointment of George Price as the interim superintendent. Jimmy Laurie officially re-

tired on June 1st and Price doesn't officially take over until July 1st leaving a 30-day gap.

Board members approved the expenditure of \$5,000 in start-up costs by the Roby ISD to the Clear Fork At-Risk Cooperative at McCaulley.

The final item of the night was the approval, by the board, of payment of \$5,750.00 in the form of an amendment to the original contract for the Ti-In television network for Roby ISD.

The board meeting ended at 1:15 a.m., Wednesday, May 27th.

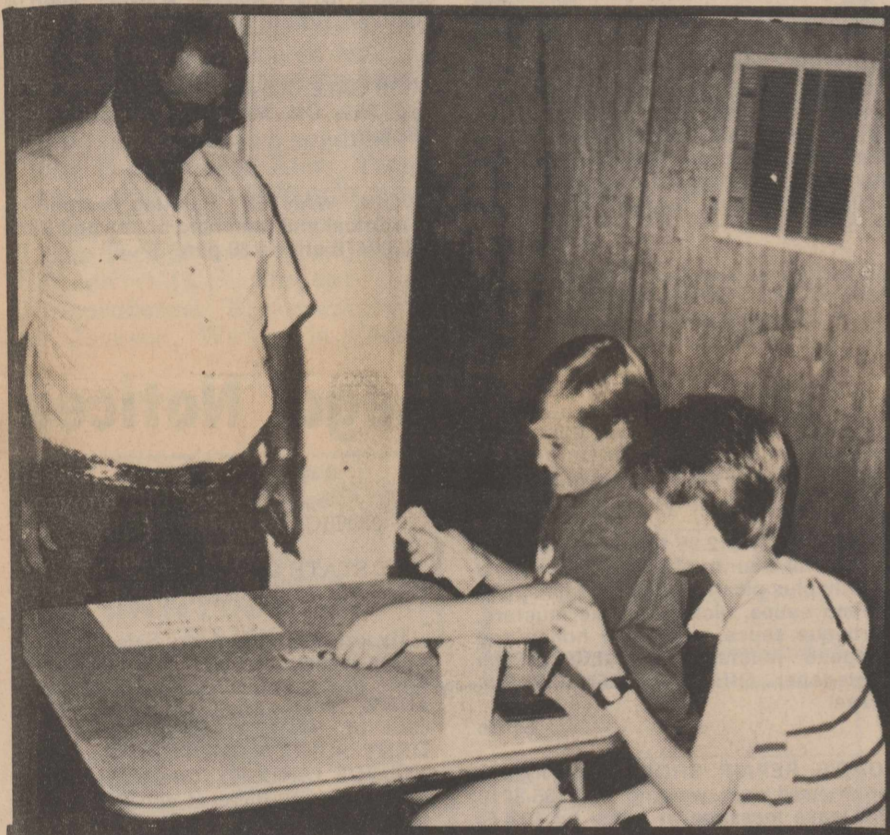

Pursuant to the settlement, while not admitting liability, Southwestern Bell, the other local exchange telephone companies in Texas, and AT&T Communications of the Southwest, Inc. have agreed to pay refunds to those WATS/800 customers who paid overtime charges attributable to the rounding practices for intrastate WATS/800 services at any time between September, 1976, and February, 1987. The refunds will be based upon either the actual or estimated amount of overtime charges attributable to such rounding practices. An exact refund will be determined for customers able to produce copies of their WATS/800 service bills. For customers who do not have copies of their WATS/800 service bills to establish actual overtime charges paid, an average refund of \$4.53 to \$5.95 per WATS/800 service line per month will be applied. All claims will be subject to verification. The refunds will also include interest at the rate of 7.80% per annum.

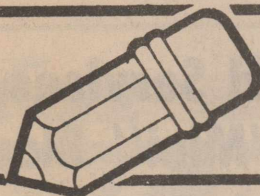

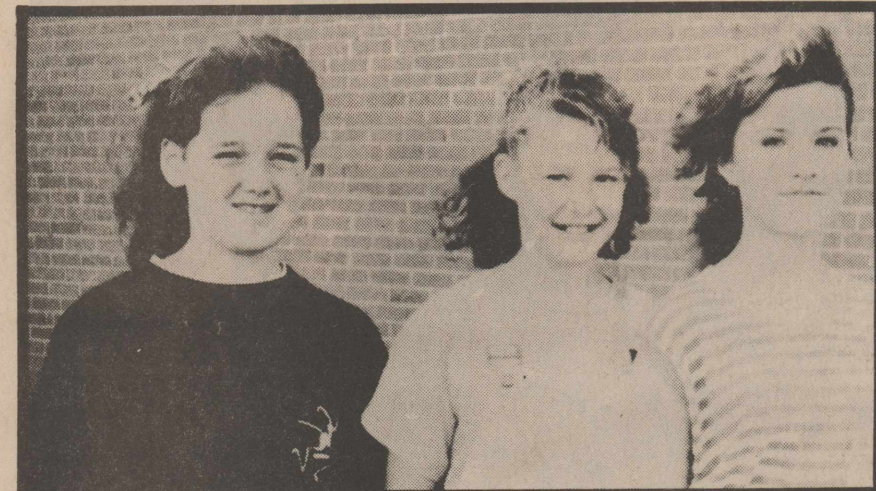

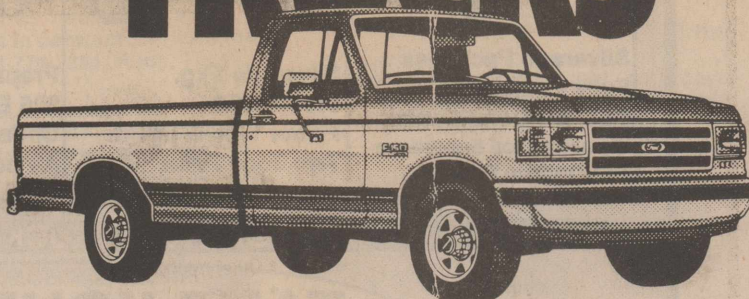

## Eight Schools Sign Up To Be Members Of Hobbs At-Risk Education Center

A total of eight schools and possibly a ninth, according to Sweetwater Independent School District Coordinator Frank Davis, have signed-up to be members of the Hobbs At-Risk Cooperative Education Center.

Davis indicated that Roscoe, Colorado City, Loraine, Hermligh, Blackwell, Ira, Sweetwater, Rotan and possibly Snyder have indicated interest in joining the association.

The fiscal agent for the association will be Sweetwater ISD. David Welch, Superintendent, is in the process of interviewing and hiring a manager for the Hobbs site.

Davis projected that a total

of 10 to 14 personnel (teachers and aides and secretaries) will be needed to serve the projected 60 to 80 students that are expected to enroll when the facility opens in late August.

Frank Davis is anticipating one professional and three aides for the day care facility and a staff of approximately 6 - 8 teachers and two teacher aides / secretaries.

Davis is in the process of working through Region 14 Education Service Center obtaining grants. The start-up cost for each school will be \$5,000 initially; \$5,000 in the fall and the ADA funds that each child will

generate. As a safety valve, assuming that enough grant money is not received, the schools

have agreed to supplement that ADA money with up to \$1,000 per student.

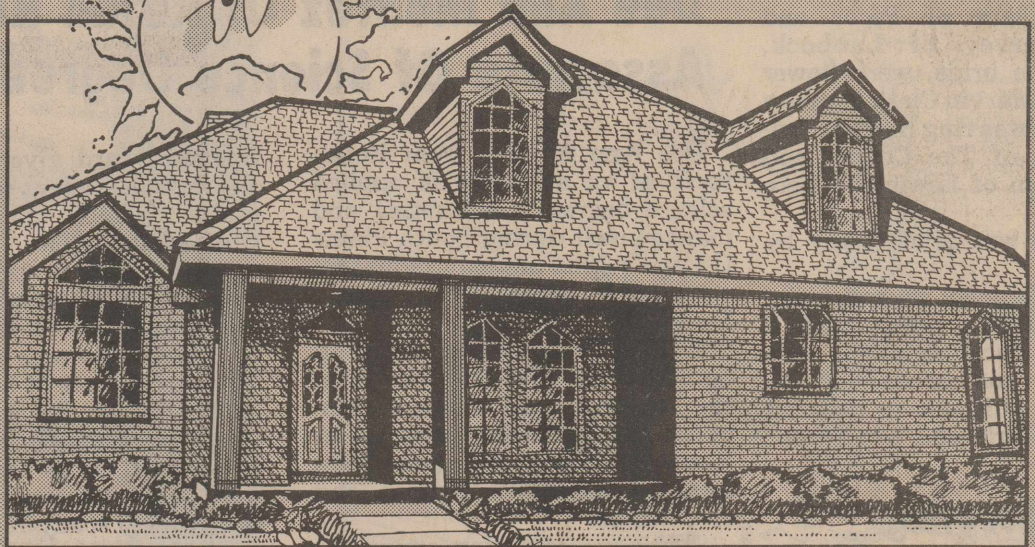

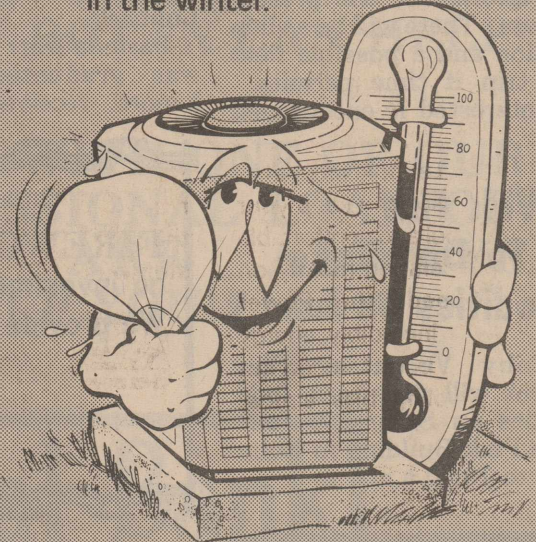

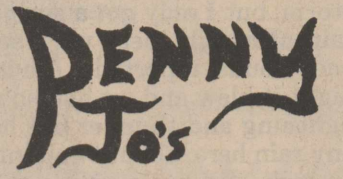
