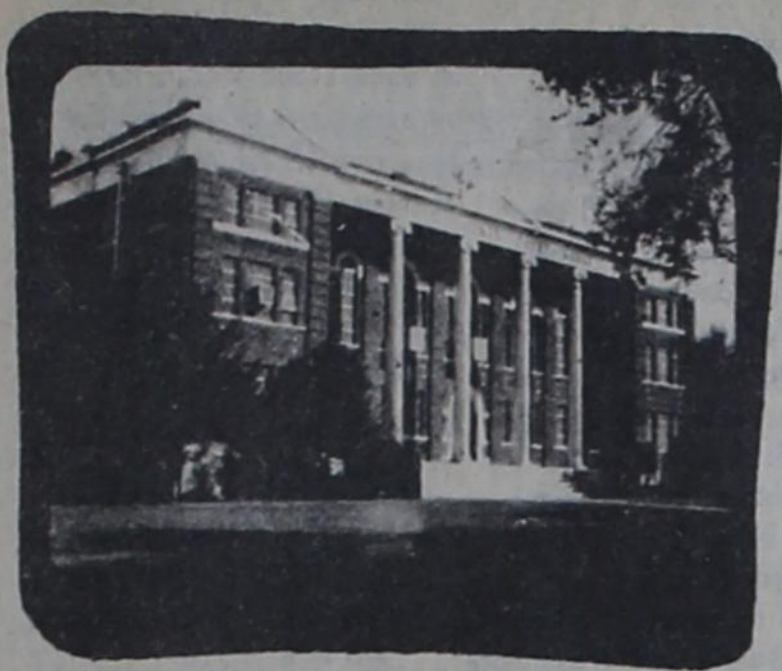

Wheeler Youth Dies at Lake

A Wheeler youth died of an apparent heart attack Sunday while water skiing at Skipout Lake in Western Oklahoma.

Craig Frankenberg, 16, was pronounced dead at Cheyenne, Okla. Hospital about 4:30 p.m. Sunday.

Frankenberg was skiing at the lake with two friends, Gary and Kent Ware, when he fell. After noticing the fall the brothers picked him up and rushed him to the shore where mouth-to-mouth resuscitation was administered.

He was taken to Cheyenne by ambulance. Doctors there said Frankenberg, who had undergone open heart surgery on two occasions four years ago, died of an apparent heart failure.

Born in Neodesha, Kan., Frankenberg moved to Wheeler 10 years ago. He had attended Wheeler schools and would have been a senior at Wheeler High School in the fall.

He was a member of Wheeler High Key Club, Spanish Club and the Church of Christ.

Funeral services were at 3 p.m. Tuesday in the Wheeler Church of Christ with Lee Henry, minister, officiating. Burial was in Wheeler Cemetery by Wright Funeral Home.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Bob Frankenberg; three brothers, Kevin and Mark, both of Wheeler, and Kenneth of Pampa; and his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Frankenberg of Altona, Kan. and Mr. and Mrs. Joel Penn of Fairfield Bay, Ark.

Pallbearers were Steve Alexander, Ken Elliott, Terry Tidwell, Freddy Velasquez, Gary Ware, Dwight Watson, Ricky Watson, Scott Weatherly, and Steve Earney.

His classmates served as Honorary Pallbearers.

MOBEETIE SCHOOL FILES SUIT IN DISTRICT COURT

The Mobeetie Independent School District has filed a damage suit against Continental Oil Co. and Groendyke Transport Inc. as a result of an explosion which occurred at the Continental warehouse in Mobeetie on August 23, 1974.

The suit was filed in the 31st District Court of Wheeler by the school district through its trustees.

They include Jack Hefley, Glen B. Hodges, Douglas Corse, Paul Hathaway, William Seitz, Gordon Estes, and Joe Darnell.

The school's petition states that at the time of the petition a transport truck owned by Groendyke Transport Inc. was unloading gasoline at storage tanks "when suddenly without warning a fire

and explosion occurred resulting in serious damage to property owned by the plaintiff."

The property was within 2,000 feet of the explosion. Trustees stated that the explosion caused severe vibrations and damaged the school building located on the north side of 4th Street in Mobeetie.

The damage, they allege, caused extensive cracking throughout the building and necessitated repairs totaling \$4,325.10.

Groendyke has asked that the suit be transferred to a district court in Dallas County.

School officials filed a controverting plea and asked that the suit remain in

Ice Cream Social To Honor Ramsey, Ball Players

Newly elected Wheeler County Sheriff Doyle Ramsey and the youngsters participating in the summer baseball program will be honored with an ice cream social Tuesday evening at the City Park. The festivities will begin at 7:00 p.m.

Doyle Ramsey presently serving as deputy under Sheriff Bus Dorman announced as a candidate for Sheriff December 18. This action fol-

lowed the announcement December 11 that Sheriff Dorman would retire at the end of his term in 1976.

Ramsey drew three opponents in the race. George Hooten of Shamrock announced the same time as Ramsey. In January, Lonnie Miller and Ted Nelson entered the race.

The May 1 primary narrowed the contest to two candidates. When the votes were counted after the polls closed, Hooten had received 915 votes with Ramsey running a close second with 864 votes. Both candidates had a month to collect enough votes to win the race.

With the backing of his home town and the surrounding communities, Ramsey won the election. 600 "wanted posters" were circulated and appeared in businesses, automobiles and on front lawns, showing Ramsey to be the individual's choice of Sheriff.

The social Tuesday evening will be a victory celebration for Ramsey supporters and everyone is invited to come out and congratulate the newly elected Sheriff.

Also to be honored at the affair will be those young people participating in the Summer baseball program over the county. These young people from Wheeler, Kelton, Briscoe and Mobeetie are divided into three age groups, Pee Wee, Little League, and Babe Ruth. The summer baseball program is sponsored locally by the Kiwanis Club and is a community project in the surrounding communities. A total of 220 young people from pre-school through age 15 participate.

A short Week End Gospel Meeting is to be held at Allison Church of Christ beginning Friday night June land ending Sunday night June 13.

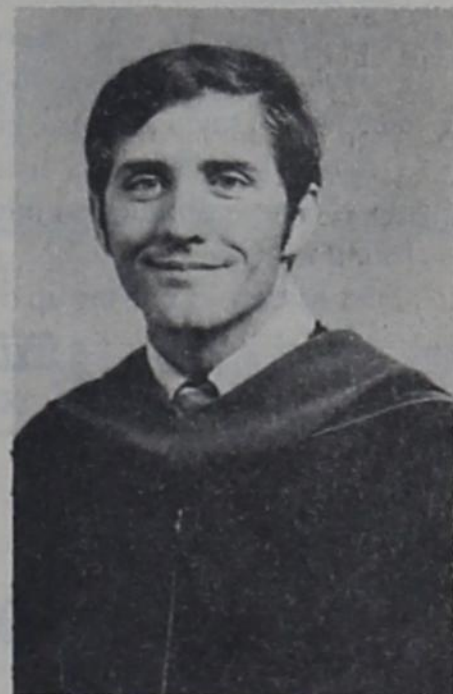

Parts, Service Program To Help

Special Council Meeting

Topics: Budgets, Audit

A special meeting of the Wheeler City Council was held Monday evening, June 7. The purpose of the meeting was to adopt an amendment to the 1975-76 budget, adopt the 1976-77 budget and discuss the audit for the 1975-76 year.

Meeting with the council were Robert Adams, representing the Wheeler Library Board, Linda Davis, Swimming pool manager, and Richard Wallace, Baldwin and Rucker, accountants.

Roberta Adams presented an ordinance which made Wheeler Library a part of the Texas Library System. The ordinance was adopted and will enable the library to receive grants which consist of money, books and equipment for the library.

Linda Davis, discussed the operation of the pool with the council. It was determined that season tickets would be available for youngsters and adults at \$35 per person; this can be handled at the pool.

Richard Wallace presented the audit compiled by Baldwin and Rucker, along with the budget and amendment. These were discussed the audit was tabled until the June 21 meeting.

The bid by Masters and Kent to furnish water for the City at a cost of 20 cents per thousand gallon was discussed by the council, but the council voted not to accept the offer.

The council voted to accept bids for a new pickup to be used in the water and sewer department. The specifica-

tions are listed in the classified section of the paper.

The city will also accept bids to sell one pickup. This information can also be found in the classified section.

The council voted to contribute \$5000 toward the construction of three tennis courts on North Alan L. Bean Boulevard. The moneys will come from revenue sharing.

The council voted to furnish paint and supplies for the painting of fire plugs in Wheeler in bicentennial decor. The painting is a project of Beta Sigma Phi Sorority.

The meeting was adjourned and the council will meet Monday, June 21 for their regular meeting.

It only takes one time of losing luggage during air travel for consumers to seek "a better way."

Although there is no way to eliminate the possibility of mislaid suitcases, there are ways to lessen the chances.

The best precaution is to arrive at the airport well ahead of departure time. Almost half of all luggage problems are related to late check-ins. Similarly, the closer connections for changing plans are, the more likely luggage problems will occur.

And be sure to remove old destination tags from bags to prevent a bag handler being confused.

To help reduce the risk of accidental switches-or someone else claiming your bag as their own-be certain that each piece is readily identifiable. Brightly-colored tape is a good bag marker, and even if the luggage has attached tags, be sure to use the adhesive identification labels provided by the airlines so your name and address will remain with the bag.

Also, how you pack affects how inconvenienced you will be if problems do occur. Don't check indispensable items through-carry them with you. Don't pack such things as billfolds, prescriptions or keys to a car parked at the airport.

Airlines are not required to reimburse for cash that is packed in luggage. The value of expensive items such as jewelry or cameras can exceed the airline's liability for loss or damage. Valuables such as these should be packed in bags you carry with you.

Consumers spend over a million dollars every hour on scheduled passenger flights on American airplanes.

But there is often quite a variation in the fare paid by one person and what another person, sitting next to him, pays.

Consumers can follow these procedures to be sure they know what they are paying for and what they're going to get for money spent.

--Whenever possible, avoid busy airport ticket counters.
--Start planning the trip early.
--Consult at least two air-

lines or two travel agents, especially if planning a flight involving two or more airlines.

--The more questions you ask, the more you can learn of new options and opportunities for saving on fares.

--Try to keep a flexible itinerary.

Ask whether fares can be reduced by a slight change in travel dates or time or in itinerary. Often, stopovers can be arranged for only a few dollars more, and sometimes extending the duration of the trip can mean considerable savings.

--Ask the travel agent or airline ticket agent for information on individual tours and package plans.

Since airlines can offer these programs in bulk, large savings are frequently possible. Be sure to read all literature on a tour package to understand what is included. Check prices item by item to be sure the savings are real.

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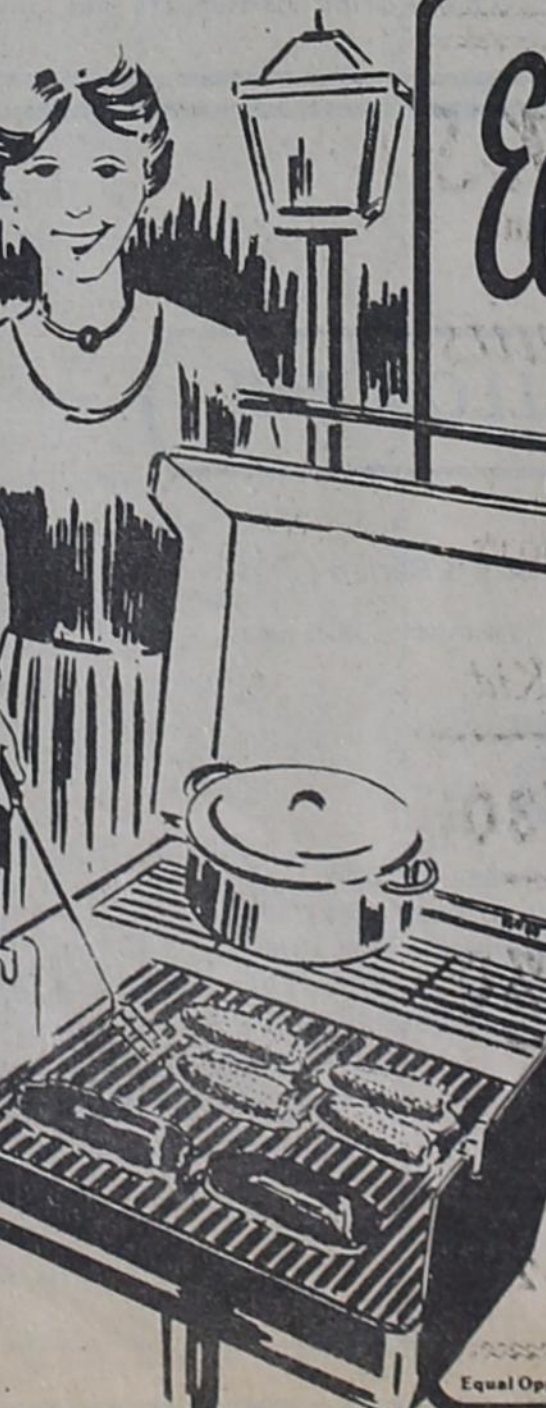

proximate cause of the damages," the plaintiffs allege.

The original petition filed by the Amarex representatives said that as a direct result of "alleged breach of warranty" the well being drilled by Amarex was lost below the depth of 17,000 feet thereby preventing completion in the upper Hunton formation. The loss, according to the plaintiffs, resulted in \$3 million in real estate damages.

Amarex, the petition states, was unable to complete the well in the formation or adequately test such formation and has been unable to participate in a drilling program to attempt such completion in the area covered by the mineral lease in question.

Additionally, Amarex officials say that the partnership has suffered damage to its professional image.

For such damages, Amarex seeks \$5 million.

The Amarex representatives ask for a judgment against Land and Marine for \$200,000 and seek a \$25,422.06 judgment against Gulf Coast Tool Service. It also seeks \$3 million jointly against the defendants for loss of the well below 17,000 feet and \$5 million for damages to its professional reputation and goodwill.

The incident from which the suit stems occurred in Wheeler County in June 1975. Amarex says it ordered from Gulf Coast 200 joints of 3 1/2 inch drill pipe which was presented to be Grade S-135 "Blue Ribbon Premium."

On June 17, the plaintiffs allege that operations were being conducted to recover pipe lodged in the hole as a result of a break in the pipe. It was later discovered that one joint of the pipe furnished by Gulf Coast was Grade E -- a weaker grade.

The defendants requested that the suit be removed from Wheeler County District Court to the U. S. District Court in Amarillo.

Judge Halbert O. Woodward of Lubbock federal judge, returned it saying there is no federal question to allow removal.

No trial date for the suit has been scheduled as yet in Wheeler.

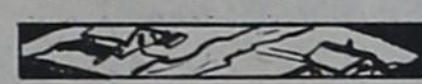

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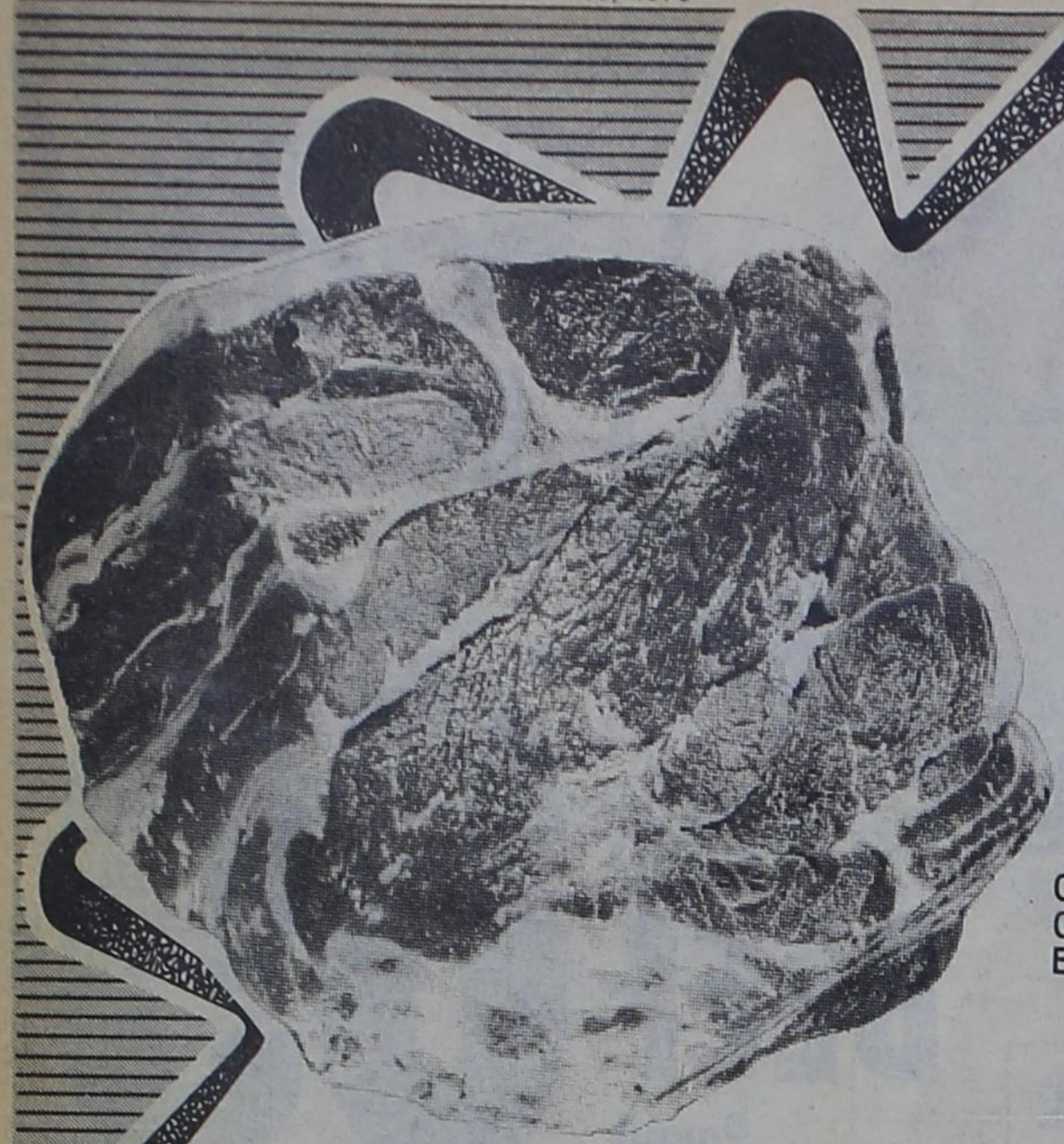
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
