THE STUDENT WHO CAUSES THE INSTRUCTOR TROUBLE

The following brief article was prepared by Dr. John C. Granberry, head of the department of history of the Tech and a close observer of the social conditions of the student body. He is giving a summary of the present work to members of the present time.

1. The class, regarding the instructor to be, at and excess observation, give extra work, and work, besides making work that he should have.

WHAT A FIZZLE!

The brewers and distillers, aided and abetted by the wet press and a few spineless or corrupt politicians, have shot their bolt. Their big Bertha of bombast and buncombe has resounded through the nation, and their hopes of breaking the bulwarks of decent citizenship have skyrocketed for a brief moment and speedily gone aglimmering. Their mountain has labored and brought forth a mouse.

New York was their own chosen battleground. New York was to be a shining example to the rest of the country. The Empire State was to be the leader in the wet drive that was to sweep the country. But, alas, New York has proved a weak sister! She has fallen of the thirsty ones. Faithless New York! If this is the best the wets can do, we suggest that they dry up—and that quickly. For everyone believed New York was overwhelmingly wet until the wet themselves with their senseless Referendum, dishonest and essentially hypocritical in conception and intent, proved that it wasn't wet after all, that, in fact, the best it could do was to give a majority of 10 per cent, to the wet cause. That was the most unkindest cut of all. After all that bombast and buncombe! A miserly 10 per cent! Alas, poor New York! Poor Wets! Of course, the wet press spread deceptive, eight column leads across the front page claiming a wet stampede. Of course, the headlines were contradicted by the text. Of course, they distorted the figures and lied about the results. But let us look at the truth of it. Let us enjoy ourselves for a brief space at the expense of the triple alliance of bombast, buncombe and booze. Life has so many serious phases, it is well once in a while to give way to merriment. First, we must prove our statement that the Republican Party New York is overwhelmingly dry, for we do not deal in deceptive heads as the wet press does. Let us first take the Greater City—the citadel of the wets. The total vote for Governor in New York City was 1,238,643 made up as follows: Alfred E. Smith, 838,287; Ogden L. Mills, 354,866; Jacob Panken (Socialist), 45,490.

Out of this total vote there were 1,004,011 who voted "yes" on the Referendum and we must assume that the wets, vehemently anxious to register their sentiments, did not fail (every mother's son of them) to vote on the Referendum. Moreover, these persons were the ones who also mainly voted for Smith, the champion of the wets. We can take it for granted that a Smith voter was a "yes" man on the Referendum, every time. Now we have a total vote cast of 1,238,643 out of which 1,004,011 voted "yes" on the Referendum, leaving 232,632 who either voted "no" or else followed the suggestion of their dry leaders not to vote at all. These 232,632 were not Smith voters; neither were they socialists since these are wringing wet; hence, they must have been Mills voters, regular enrolled Republicans. So it appears that out of 354,866 Mills voters, 232,632 were dry. Sixty-five per cent of the Republican voters in the Greater City of New York are dry. They are satisfied with Prohibition. They don't want any change. Now, laugh that off, Mr. Wadsworth—if you can. Now, let us take the State as a whole. Let us get down to brass tacks. The wets have bungled this thing "something awful." It is simply appalling. But we can't help it. We are not responsible for this mess. The wets have made their bed and they must lie in it. They may squirm and wiggle and squeal, but they can't get out of it. They must take their medicine. For they mixed the dose for themselves, and it's too late now. It can't be remedied. Now, the total vote cast for Governor throughout the State was 2,764,450, made up as follows: Alfred E. Smith, 1,478,684; Ogden L. Mills, 1,240,286; Jacob Panken, 45,490. Out of the total vote cast of 2,764,450 there were 1,649,561 "yes" votes on the Referendum or a little less than 60 per cent of the total, and 86 per cent of the total Republican vote cast for Mills refused to vote wet. The wet Republican vote can be arrived at by deducting the Smith wet vote of 1,478,684 from the total wet vote on the Referendum of 1,649,561, which leaves 170,877 wet Republican votes, or about 14 per cent of the 1,240,286 votes cast for Mills. As in the case of the Greater City, we must assume that every wet, burning with enthusiasm to register his repugnance of present conditions, was sure to vote

on the Referendum, and also that those same voters were Smith voters and not Mills voters. So, after all the fuss and feathers, the buncombe and bombast, after the expenditure of all that good brewery money, including large fees to Elihu Root, the author of it all—after all that, the only things that the wets were able to prove were as follows: The Referendum. The Republican Party in New York City dum won by a margin of less than 10 per is 65 per cent dry. The Republican Party in New York State is 86 per cent dry. Lawsy, lawsy, what a fizzle!

The people of America are not sodisgusted with prohibition as some of the wet leaders would have us believe. Even the fellows that drink the stuff, would not want the open saloon back in the nation. The thousands of wives and children who now own homes and have plenty to eat and wear who were barefooted and hungry, with no place to stay when the husband and father could get all the drink he wanted at the bar, would not for anything see the saloons back in America. If that is the best that New York can show, which is possibly the hottest anti-prohibition center of the nation, what would the balance of the more decent towns and cities do, and what would the rural districts do for the brewers and distillers. America is dry to remain and the only thing that needs to be done throughout the nation is to make the penalty more severe for offenders of the law, and make it more and more hard to obtain whiskey, or any of the drugs that will cause intoxication.

PRAISES STAMP HOBBY

The educational value of stamp collecting was pointed out in a recent address by Third Assistant Postmaster General Regar, who told of the encouragement given by the department to this widespread and growing hobby.

He expressed the belief that young people who devote a portion of their spare time to stamp collecting add much to the knowledge gained in school, particularly with reference to history and geography.

For example, the life of Washington means more to the young person who has made a collection of postage stamps bearing his likeness, and the same holds true with respect to other presidents and national leaders who have been honored by stamp issues. Stamps issued in commemoration of historical events serve a similar purpose, while a study of foreign stamps lead to a desire for more knowledge concerning the countries represented.

In order to facilitate collectors, the Post Office Department in 1921 established a sales day agency in Washington, known as the Philatelic Agency, where stamps not found on sale in local post offices may be secured. The business of supplying stamps to collectors has been developed by private individuals and firms until it has become an extensive industry, and rare stamps bring high prices.

Mr. Regar declares that he can think of no pastime that is more appealing or offers more abundant rewards in an educational way than that of stamp collecting.

KOSCIUSKO HONORED

America again paid homage to Thaddeus Kosciuszko recently upon the 109th anniversary of his death, with ceremonies at Memorial Continental Hall in Washington.

The distinguished Polish patriot performed valuable service to the cause of American independence during the Revolutionary War. Coming to America with the French fleet, after an unfortunate love affair with the daughter of a Polish nobleman, Kosciuszko offered his services to Washington without any stipulation as to rank, but his signal ability won for him immediate recognition, and finally a brigadier general's commission.

But it was as a military engineer, rather than as a leader of troops, that the most greatly aided Washington's Army, his most notable work being in connection with the fortification at West Point and other strategic positions.

Returning to Poland, he was made a major general, and his brilliant exploits in the wars with Russia which followed won for him undying fame, although he finally lost through sheer force of numbers when Prussia joined his country's foes. Severely wounded he was held a prisoner in St. Petersburg for two years after which he again visited America, where he had been given the privileges of citizenship, a grant of land and an annual pension.

Kosciuszko returned to Europe again in 1798, spent several years in France and later settled as a farmer in Switzerland, where he died on October 17, 1817, as the result of an accidental fall from a horse.

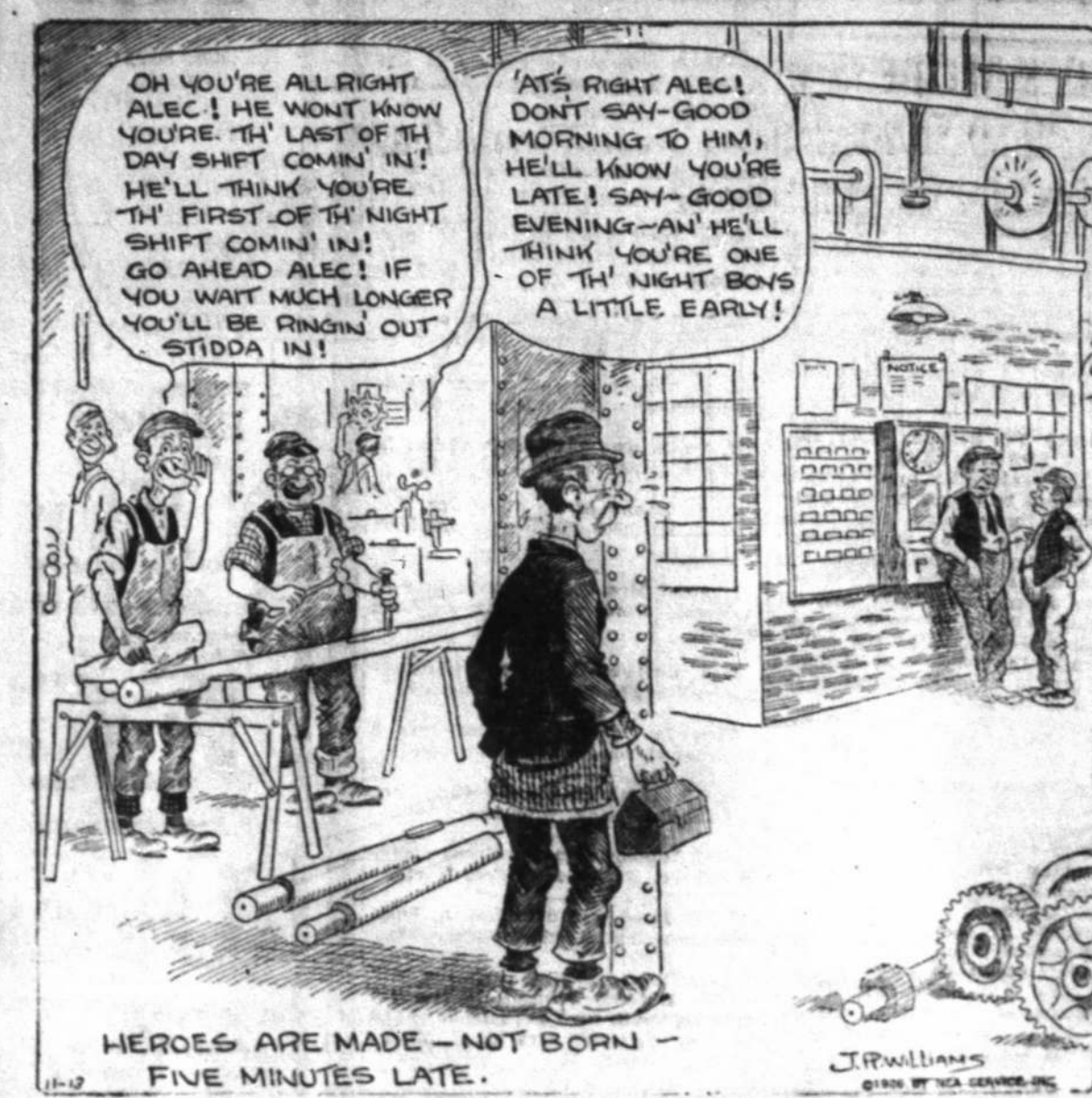
By his brilliant military career on both sides of the Atlantic, Kosciuszko gained an immortal place among the world's greatest exponents of human liberty. In the language of Campbell's poem, "Freedom shrieked when Kosciuszko fell."

It's true we have succeeded in making perhaps the greatest all-round crops ever harvested in this part of the state, but the price for both feed and cotton is ruinous to the farmers, and how the daily papers can deplore it out that we are prosperous is more than we can see. Of course everybody will 'get by' no doubt, but so far as prosperity is concerned it just 'ain't here.' Instead of a wave of prosperity hitting West Texas it looks to us more like a wave of 'hot air' hitting the papers."

There is no use to complain. Fact of the business there is no real good reason for complaining at the conditions in this country. True we are not getting a great price for the cotton crop, but we are getting as much as the fellows down in the state and other states where they cannot raise anything else, and that really does make it very hard on them. In this South Plains section, where there is no need to even get down to the point where we "will get by" in this section of country. Those who are in position to know say that the farmers are in better shape this year at this time than last, and more people have a diversified program in effect this year than last. There are more chickens in this country. There are more dairy cows in the country, and there are more hogs in the country, and all of these are calculated to stimulate and help the condition of the country.

Proposal to Level Tariff Walls Hasn't Ghost of Chance in Congress

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—Any proposal to level America's protective tariff wall together with the protective tariff walls of other countries throughout the world, stands about as much chance of being adopted as the proposal to cancel Europe's war indebtedness to the United States.

That is to say, none at all. Such is the almost universal verdict of public men of Washington on the suggestion, from a group of the very most exalted among international bankers and industrialists, that protective tariffs are hampering world trade and that it would be the best for all concerned to tear them down.

Not many of the national lawmakers are here at present, but the few who are on the ground, probably furnish

State Highway Expenditure \$650,000,000 Last Year

The total expenditure by the State highway departments in 1925 for road and bridge construction on the several State highway systems amounted to \$649,325,101, according to reports from the highway departments just compiled by the Bureau of Public Roads, United States Department of Agriculture. Of the total expenditure 53.6 per cent was spent for road and bridge construction, 18.8 per cent for maintenance, and 35.5 per cent for materials and equipment. Administrative and engineering costs accounted for 4.7 per cent of the total. Interest and principle payments on bonds 7.3 per cent, and miscellaneous expenditures amounted to 6.9 per cent of the total.

To meet these expenses the highway departments received from various sources during the year a total income of \$750,913,292 of which \$115,656,721 was available as a balance from the previous year's operations, so that the amount of money raised during the year was only \$635,256,571. Of the latter amount 42.5 per cent was raised by means of motor vehicle license fees and gasoline taxes, 38 per cent from the former and the balance for the latter. The sale of bonds realized 21.3 per cent of the total for the year, and federal aid received from the national government amounted to 13.9 per cent. Funds transferred to the State by the counties and other local governments amounted to 10.8 per cent, and the balance was made up of funds derived from special highway taxes and appropriations and from miscellaneous sources as follows: Taxes, 2.3 per cent; appropriations,

5.0 per cent; and miscellaneous 2.2 per cent. Although the year's expenditures were slightly greater than the previous year's total of \$605,665,297, the balance of \$126,956,191, carried over into the current year, was even greater than the amount of unexpended funds carried over from 1924. The rate of construction remained about the same as in previous years. One of the most significant facts brought out by the report is the remarkable increase in the percentage of the total highway income derived from motor vehicle and gasoline taxes, and the falling off in the percentage representing real and personal property taxation. There has been a steady tendency in this direction since 1921. In that year the combined income from motor vehicle licenses and gasoline taxes amounted to 25.9 per cent, the gas tax revenue amounting to less than one per cent. In 1925 the income produced from these sources was 42.5 per cent of the year's total and the gas taxes alone amounted to 13.3 per cent.

In the same period taxes on property, specifically, for road purposes have dropped from 11.2 per cent to 2.3 per cent of the year's total income. Including the income from appropriations and miscellaneous sources, most of which is raised indirectly by property taxation, the 1925 percentage was 26.7 and the 1921 percentage was 19.5.

Funds raised by the sale of bonds were also a smaller percentage of the total in 1925 than in 1921, being 21.3 per cent in 1925 as compared with 37.3 per cent in 1921.

They say Eugene V. Debs is dead. We answer yes and no.

The great loving heart that always beat for and in sympathy with the poor, the oppressed, the suffering and with all the working people of the world that strive by their labor to support themselves and their dependents and to make an honest living, yes, the great loving heart has ceased to beat in sympathy with those; but the model of life, of trust, of love, friendship, honor, integrity—the great spirit of truth, unwavering firmness in principle and honest and sincere convictions of right and justice lives on—without successful challenge by anyone, and even his bitterest political opponents, who are informed as to the nature and character of the man, or personally know him, admit these facts to be true.

The poor and suffering had no greater friend and worker had no greater friend, not many of those for whom he spent his great life, talents and energy, turned on him and reviled and scorned him and cursed him, and for what did they do this? Simply because they differed with him in political questions, or at least thought they did, but in this they were often mistaken, for lack of understanding him, or the propositions under consideration. In this great American country blood bought and heeded to the world free government, religiously and politically, haven't I or Mr. Debs the same right and should we not have the same privileges of religious and political belief, honest convictions and speech as you?

E. V. Debs was charged with many things of which he was not guilty, many things of which he was opposed. That he was opposed to war, he never denied, but he did not try to obstruct it after we had gone into it. So was I opposed to war, so was Christ and the apostles (and even they were persecuted and crucified). So are the quakers, and so are all true followers of Christ and His spirit of love, justice, peace, human sympathy, and righteousness—aren't you too? Or do you want war, suffering and destruction? If not, why then condemn the man who honestly, sincerely and conscientiously and from the principle oppose war as Debs did and as I do—not one war, but all war—not only the war, but the principle of warfare. For this cause, it was said, he suffered imprisonment, as many many just men have done, and in consequence of this his life has been ebbing away ever since his release. Debs never was a criminal, he never committed a crime. Christ and the Apostles were not criminals, yet they were imprisoned and crucified. So it was with Debs, Bunyon and many other great and good men who were guilty of no crime. There are now honored and revered, and so will Eugene V. Debs, the great soul of honor, principle and integrity be honored. The work of the suffering, the great spotless, sincere and honest lives they sent will ever live and be green and lived and the great causes they represented in the memory of the just, oppressed and appreciative people.

What then? No, never, they live on and on. They never fail or fade away. They are the leading stars that shine on and never die. They are the lights along the way that lead us to a better day.
