Young Man Killed When Car Hits Bus

A collision between an automobile and a motor coach, that occurred late Saturday afternoon, resulted in the death of one young man and injuries to another.

According to officers who investigated the accident, a car occupied by James Olan Adams and Fred Freeman crashed into the rear of a Waits bus about five and a half miles north of Mt. Pleasant on Highway 271. Both vehicles were headed toward Talco, and the bus, officers said, had stopped on the side of the road to discharge a passenger. After crashing into the motor coach, the private car overturned.

Adams died almost immediately and Freeman was rushed to a local hospital where it was found that he was suffering mostly from minor bruises and lacerations.

Adams would have been 22 years of age on September 26. He was born and reared in Titus County and was a veteran of the late war. Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Wyvon Southerland Adams; a daughter, Nina Yvette; his mother, Mrs. Beulah Adams; two brothers, Roy Adams of Alaska and Billy Joe Adams of Dallas, and five sisters, Misses Marie and Eva Nell Adams, Dallas; Mrs. Hazel Truman, Glendale, Calif.; Mrs. Annie Mae Morris, Tyler; and Miss Patsy June Adams of Mt. Pleasant.

Funeral services were held at Nevill's Chapel at 2 o'clock Monday afternoon, under the direction of Rev. H. W. Young, pastor of the Mt. Pleasant (Dove Avenue) Baptist Church, and Rev. J. D. McClung. Burial took place in the Nevill's Chapel cemetery, with full military rites provided by members of Jessup-Reed Post 210 of the American Legion in cooperation with members of the National Guard.

To Build Bridge Over Red River On Highway 37

An agreement has been approved by the Oklahoma State Highway Commission to build jointly with Texas a new \$1,000,000 bridge across Red River on Highway 37 between Idabel and Clarksville.

Proposed site of the new span is directly south of Millerton, Ok., and was accepted by the commission in preference to two others farther east along the river.

The bridge will be one of the longest over Red River; it was stated, with construction costs to be shared by the two states.

Price of 1949 Ford Increased \$85-\$125

Ford Motor Co. Saturday announced a price increase of from \$85 to \$125 on its new 1949 Ford. Henry Ford II said the increase will average 6.7 per cent.

The new Ford goes on public display June 18.

Ford announced the increase in a circular which he termed "a personal message to all employees of the Ford Motor Co."

It was the first boost in Ford prices since Aug. 24, 1947, when they went up from \$20 to \$97. Previously, on Jan. 15, 1947, Ford reduced his prices from \$15 to \$5.

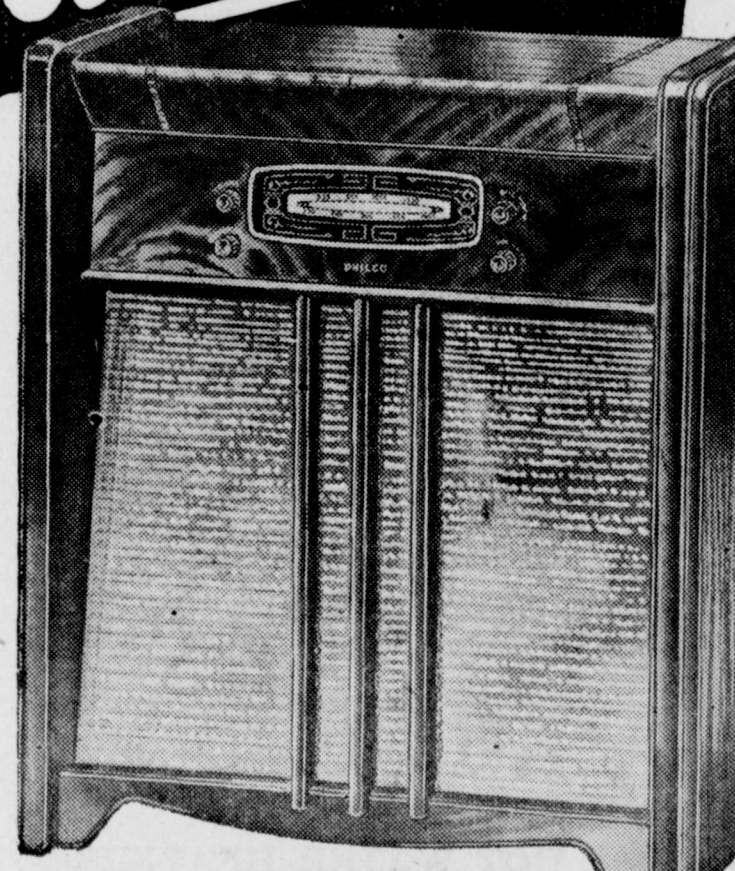

Father Local Girl Files Suit for \$35,000 Damages

Suit has been filed in 62nd District Court at Paris on behalf of Eva Louise Watkins, 17, of Deport, seeking \$35,000 damages for injuries she suffered in an accident allegedly involving a drag line used in work on Mustang Creek here.

Defendant in the case is J. C. Watson, doing business as the J. C. Watson Company of Dallas, who is cited in the suit as the owner of the drag line.

As the truck began to pull away with its load, the bucket of the drag line is alleged to have struck a nearby tree and knocked a limb into the cab of the vehicle. The tree limb is said to have struck Eva Louise, inflicting the described injuries.

The suit was filed by Sam Watkins, father of the girl, who also seeks \$300 in damages for medical fees.

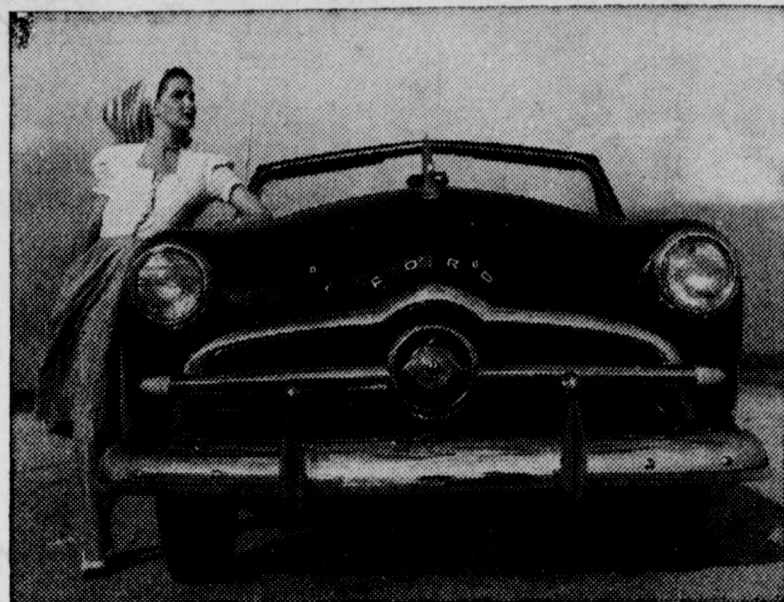

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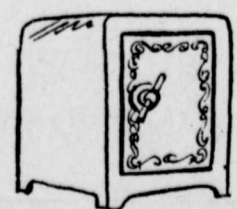

It's the Field Against Patman in First District Congressional Race

TEXARKANA. — It's the field against veteran Congressman Wright Patman of Texarkana in the 11-county First District and his friends are ready for the battle.

If the number of his opponents is a measure, it will be Patman's hardest race since he began hav-

ing opposition to re-election in 1936. The four opposing him make the biggest field in his twenty years as a congressman.

Those who want Patman's seat in Congress are:

Ben Woodall, Marshall, 43, former state representative, county attorney and assistant attorney general, and a Marine Corps veteran of World War II.

Isom P. (Bill) Hydrick Jr., Marshall, 50, retiring member of the Legislature, World War I veteran and cabinet maker by occupation.

Goebel Templeton, Cooper, 41, Delta County school superintendent, electrical engineer and former teacher and football coach.

Floy G. Cloniger, Hughes Springs, 45, college-educated farmer and former school teacher who is not going to let the campaign interfere with his hay baling this summer.

One common theme in the platforms of all four of Patman's foes is rotation in office. Some raise several secondary issues, but all agree that Patman's twenty years in Congress will be the basis of their main attack.

The congressman is ready to join issue on that point, too.

In his announcement he told the voters that, whether they like it or not, a congressman's influence is directly related to his seniority, which governs committee assignments. His length of service, he said, has given him a place of influence and the First District better representation.

Past campaigns have approved his record up to the past two years, pointed out Elmer Lincoln, a Patman friend and supporter here through the years.

In announcing for his eleventh term, Patman promised to cast votes and give support "in favor of a permanent world peace; adequate national preparedness; proper aid to war veterans, including housing; aid for the worker; the aged (increase amounts and have no investigation of need, if applicant does not pay a federal income tax); the farmers, schools, improvement of our rivers and streams, and preserving small business."

Woodall is preparing for a hard and intensive campaign and has started taking Patman to task on some issues. Already he has a big campaign headquarters and a manager, Vincent Ferrell of Linden, an overseas navy veteran who resigned as American Legion district commander to help Woodall.

Woodall will stress the civil rights issue, too. Patman, he has charged, did not speak out against the program until the Harrison County Democratic committee expressed concern at an apparent indifference in his attitude.

In this district, with a heavy negro population, federal aid for schools will be viewed with concern. Woodall opposes it on the grounds it would lead to federal control and the end of segregation. Patman is one of the sponsors of the pending bill and contends it would not result in federal control.

Woodall also proposes a law to compel congressmen to reveal the source of all of their income; strengthening the Hatch act to prevent the building of political machines, and a federal antinepotism act like the one in Texas.

Geographical rivalry will be injected in the race by Templeton, a native of Delta County, which is on the western boundary of the district. That section, he said, never has had a congressman.

Patman's home in Bowie County and his birthplace in Cass County place him in the middle of the L-shaped district.

The tall, athletically built Templeton has a platform in the main more liberal than the others.

He favors a veterans bonus in the form of "differential pay" instead of the current vocational and educational aid payments; pensions for all over sixty-five regardless of need; a long-range farm program, stepped-up farm to market and school road building; legislation to enable the laboring man to gain more security; complete detachment of civil service workers from political obligations, and handling of civil rights as a problem of the states.

In his sectionalism fight, Templeton will not have the advantage of a large concentration of votes in his area. Three counties with the most paid poll taxes this year are Bowie, 11,980, in the northeast corner; Lamar, 9,941 in the northwest corner, and Harrison, 7,407 in the southeast tip.

The fourth and fifth largest, however, Hopkins with 5,868, and Red River, with 5,241, are adjacent to Templeton's home county.

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Woodall Lambasts Federal Aid to Education

Ben Woodall of Marshall, speaking at Clarksville in behalf of his candidacy for Congress Saturday, placed federal aid to education as one of the paramount issues of the campaign. Definitely declaring himself on the side of opposition to federal aid, the candidate charged that the present Congressmen, Wright Patman of Texas, was one of its foremost advocates.

"Federal aid to education is now being advocated by a great number of people as a cure-all for the ills of our school system," Woodall declared. "Mr. Patman recently sent out, under his free postage franking privilege, a statement to all school teachers and school trustees in which he said, 'Bills for Federal aid to education are now pending in Congress. As you doubtless know, I was one of the original sponsors of this proposal, and you may be assured that I will continue supporting the proposal vigorously in the future.'"

"Mr. Patman further said, 'Under the plan, it is not intended that the Federal Government should have supervision over the expenditure of the money, but to leave that question to the States, since it is not contemplated that there will be Federal control.'"

Woodall said, "The fact that Patman said 'it is not intended' and 'it is not contemplated' in the above letter, shows conclusively that Mr. Patman recognizes the danger to our free school system, once we are entangled in the web of Federal aid. Certainly no advocate of Federal aid is going to openly admit Federal

control and Federal supervision of our school system. That would lead to such wide-spread opposition as to insure its defeat. Like all other hokum, it must be sugar-coated in order to attract the voter—but the people of the First Congressional District are not going to be deceived on this issue.

"I am for a more efficient school system; teachers must have better pay, but the State of Texas must and will take care of that. We don't need to send our dollars to Washington to come back in the form of Federal aid to our schools, less a brokerage commission to support more bureaucrats. Rather, let us end some of this useless and wasteful spending of the taxpayers' money, reduce Federal taxes, and keep our Federal dollars in Texas for the use of the Texas legislature to improve our own school system.

"Just as surely as we fall for Federal aid, we lose the last argument of the South against racial segregation in our public free school system."

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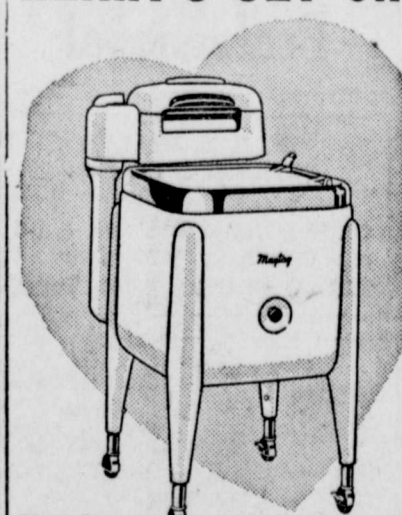
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
