AT HIGH SCHOOL

Agriculture Film Will Be Shown Here Monday Night

This technicolor motion picture is to be presented this week in a private showing under the sponsorship of Garza Tractor and Implement company, dealer for Ford Tractors and Dearborn farm equipment. The colorful picture is presented, as a part of the "We Salute American Agriculture" program — a mid century tribute to American farm progress since the passage of the Morrill Act which created our land-grant colleges in 1862.

The time and place of the showing is next Monday night at 8 o'clock in the high school auditorium.

The seed of inspiration for "Waves of Green" was implanted in January, 1948, when John A. Hannah, president of Michigan State college, spoke to the members of the Economic club of Detroit on the contributions of land-grant colleges to the development of American agriculture.

Garza county's 1951 March of Dimes campaign got officially underway here Monday, David Willis, director, said.

Miniature cardboard iron lung coin collectors have been placed in all business houses. In case one has been skipped, Willis asks the manager to call him at 542 and he will bring one out.

Mike Cornell, 7-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Jess Cornell, is a polio patient in Hendricks Memorial hospital in Abilene.

Mike was carried to the West Texas hospital in Lubbock Monday suffering from a throat and gland infection Tuesday night, doctors diagnosed his case as bulbar polio after tests were made and he was carried to Abilene the same night.

Community chairmen have started work. A full-length motion picture will be shown next Thursday night at 7 o'clock at the Garnolia school. Proceeds will go to the March of Dimes.

Block mothers have organized. One woman in each block is to help in this part of the campaign. The big gifts committee is soliciting local merchants now.

Goal for Garza county is \$2000. Several Garza county families have been hit by polio. Henry Cash is assistant director. The drive ends Jan. 31.

Southland Gets New Teachers; 2 Needed Here

Two new teachers were hired at Southland this past week and two vacancies remain to be filled at Post high school.

William Armstrong and Mrs. Ross, both of Lubbock, were hired in Southland. They replace Mr. and Mrs. Morris Foster who resigned to accept a new position. Supt. F. W. Calloway is now acting as girls' basketball coach there.

Mrs. Elbert Haws resigned as fifth and sixth grade teacher in grade school.

Jess Wright resigned effective this week to become manager of Kelly Implement company in Lamesa. The Wrights will move to Lamesa next weekend. No successor has been chosen for Wright.

Last Thursday night a meeting of the chamber park committee and the city commission was held. Members of the committee are Dr. A. C. Surman, Si Thaxton and Tom Power. Samson and Pat Ryan, chamber manager, also met with the city group.

Funds to purchase the park were raised by public subscription in a campaign in December. The tract purchased contains some 45 acres on both sides of the highway.

Operations are scheduled to begin Feb. 15 on two Murchison Brothers - Brown Brothers locations in Post. One is in Block 22 and the other in Block 49. In the Rocker A pool, L. F. Long has slated a 2500-foot rotary test five miles west of Justiceburg. Operations are to begin immediately.

Lane - Wells survey was run Tuesday on the Continental Oil company No. 2 Swenson, prospective reef discovery 20 miles northeast of here. The prospect is plugged back to 7100 feet with casing set to that depth. The survey is made preparatory to perforating.

The North Polar Ellenburger pool in Kent and Garza counties has its second completion in the American Liberty No. 1 G. W. Williams. It pumped 173 barrels of oil plus 5 per cent water daily from 7807 feet. It is a west offset to the No. 1 Blanche Young.

Redistricting In 30th Area Is Proposed

Legislative redistricting of the 30th Senatorial district which includes Garza county, should result in at least double representation for the people of the 24 counties in the district.

That is the opinion of Senator Kilmer B. Corbin of Lubbock, based on his study of population figures and poll tax payments in the 24 counties.

Senator Corbin is co-author with Senator Rogers Kelley of Edinburg of the senatorial redistricting bill filed as Senate Bill 1 in the 52nd Legislature.

A House of Representatives redistricting bill was scheduled for introduction as soon as the House started taking bills. Separate bill must be passed for revamping Senatorial and House districts.

Senator Corbin pointed out that the Senate bill, as introduced, does not yet specify what counties would make up the various districts in what is now his 30th Senatorial district. Only single-county districts (Jefferson, Dallas, Tarrant, Bexar and Harris) are specifically mentioned, with the exception of Senator Kelley's own district which the bill specifies would include three Lower Rio Grande Valley counties.

While House redistricting must be done on the basis of population, the Constitution provides that Senatorial districts are to be divided according to the number of qualified voters. On the basis of last year's poll tax payments and exemptions, Senator Corbin estimates that the present 30th District is entitled to nearly two Senators instead of one. And on the basis of the House redistricting, the counties are entitled to seven or eight representatives instead of their present three or four.

Total ginnings for the year at Graham are 3360 to date; at Close City, 2835; at Pleasant Valley, 1236; at Storie, 1284; at Southland, 2682; and at Planter's in Post, 2112. Garza is still short of the hoped for 18,000 bale total.

Acresage restrictions and insect damage cut this year's crop at least 10,000 bales below last year's near record.

ROGER W. BABSON WRITES THIS WEEK

Lead a Righteous Life and Get Plenty Of Sleep, Make Decisions at Right Time

WASHINGTON, D. C.—I have been interested in a recent correspondence between President Truman and Representative Hebert, a Democrat of Louisiana, who wrote the President asking that a certain day should be appointed for national prayer.

He distinctly asked that God should "endow officials with the wisdom and courage to make the right decisions." This request was well worded as too many of us are not content to ask God to help us make the right decisions; but before praying we make the decisions for ourselves and ask God to see that they are carried out!

It, however, is always sound to pray for wisdom and courage. If we would have such a prayer constantly on our mind in a spirit of thankfulness for such blessings as we have—without asking for definite things—we all might be much better off.

Although President Truman's reply did not satisfy Mr. Hebert, yet the President's retort was very sound. It looks as if he were a better Bible student than Mr. Hebert as his reply was based on the Bible promise that "prayers of the righteous availeth much." This means that in order to have our prayers answered, we must live a life that Jesus would approve; with kindness, unselfishness, and integrity.

Jesus commanded that before we go to the altar to make our sacrifices and ask for blessings, we should first go to those whom we have wronged by act or word and secure their forgiveness, making restitution if possible. President Truman wisely hinted that this applies to most political leaders while playing politics or talking unjustly about officials. Furthermore, those who have been too lazy or indifferent to vote, have a poor case when praying for better government. I, therefore, am 100% for President Truman in his reply to this and similar requests.

Although the above discussion has ended, it has brought up a most interesting fact which the President and all others in authority must some day recognize. I have in mind how decisions of Presidents, Senators, Congressmen, and other federal, state, and city officials are affected by other factors. We all know that our own decisions are definitely affected by our health and home relations, especially what we did the night before!

Health and habit have been responsible for the enactment of much bad legislation, the rendering of unjust court decisions, resulting even in sending innocent men to prison or perhaps to the gallows. But let me this week discuss other causes in which Washington is getting interested.

I even found the Weather Bureau looking up conditions on the day the President, through the United Nations, directed our troops to land in Korea. Based on the conditions of that day, I believe his decision was sound, even though we may later pull out all our troops. It was worth all that it has cost to "smoke out" the Russians and awaken our own people. It would be a wonderful way to start off the New Year and the 82nd Congress.

GUEST EDITORIAL

The antelope was an animal much in favor with the human population of the west in the early days. He was a fleet-footed beast, one of the world's fastest, as a matter of fact. He was also very tasty.

Yet the early settlers had little trouble in stocking their larders with the lordly creature despite his speed and his wariness. For the antelope had a fatal flaw in his make-up. He was curious.

His curiosity was one of the reasons why the antelope was reduced to the point of extinction in Texas. A huntsman lying in the grass or brush could lure one right up to him by tying a rag on the tip of his rifle barrel and waving it back and forth. The antelope felt compelled to investigate. He minced up to the rag and thereupon ceased to exist.

The fearless bald eagle and not the antelope is the symbol of the United States, we are happy to say. But recently the stupid curiosity of the antelope seems to have been substituted for the keen vision of the eagle. Like the antelope, we have minced up too closely to two allied problems, Russia and inflation.

But bedeviled by the war-like exercises of rhetoric in Washington is the well-known, publically well-founded ba-

sis of Russia's world strategy. This is that the United States will completely eliminate herself as a world force by spending herself into disaster. Inflation surely is a guaranteed way of doing this.

December 20, a United States Senator in a position to know said that inflation had cost the armed services the equivalent of 300 B-36 bombers, or 2,250 jet fighters, or enough tanks for ten armored divisions. Nobody but capital, labor, agriculture, government, and you and I are responsible.

You and I are the most important on this list. But can we—as ordinary citizens—actually call a halt to inflation? Yes, we can. If you and I and others like us sat down today and wrote a boiling-hot letter to our Senators and Congressmen demanding immediate economic stabilization, we would measurably prod the government into giving it to us.

The voice of the people may not be, as the Romans said, the voice of God; but it certainly is the voice that rules the United States Government.

Unless a swelling tide of our wee voices is heard in Washington right now, we seem likely to suffer the fate of the antelope. (Texas Manufacturers Association.)

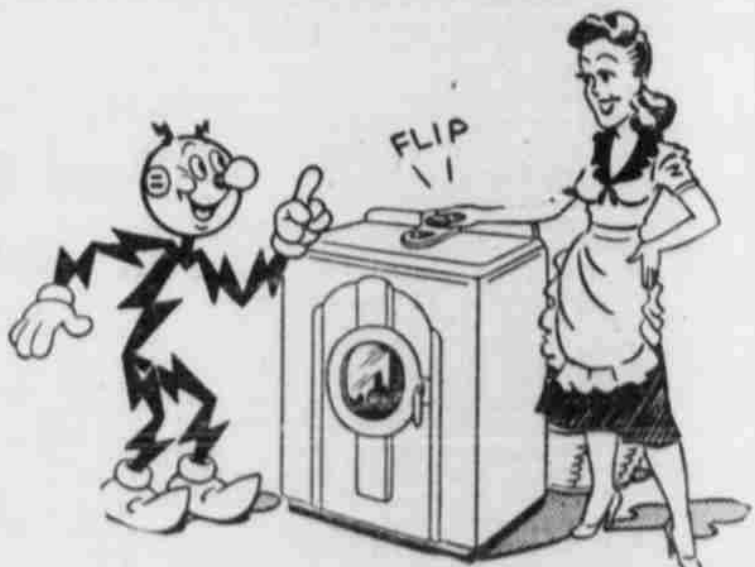

On the foot of one bed is a multicolored-stripe handknit afghan.

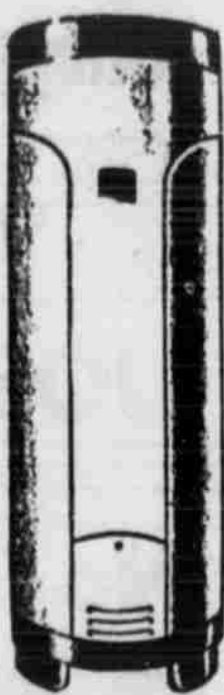

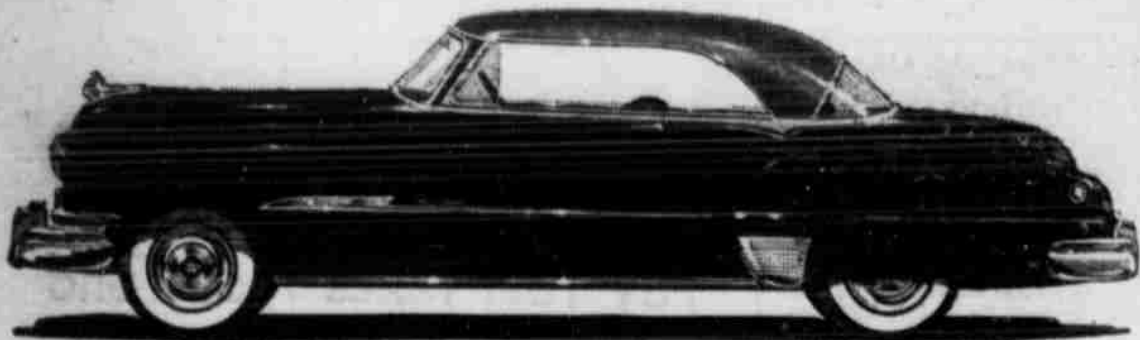

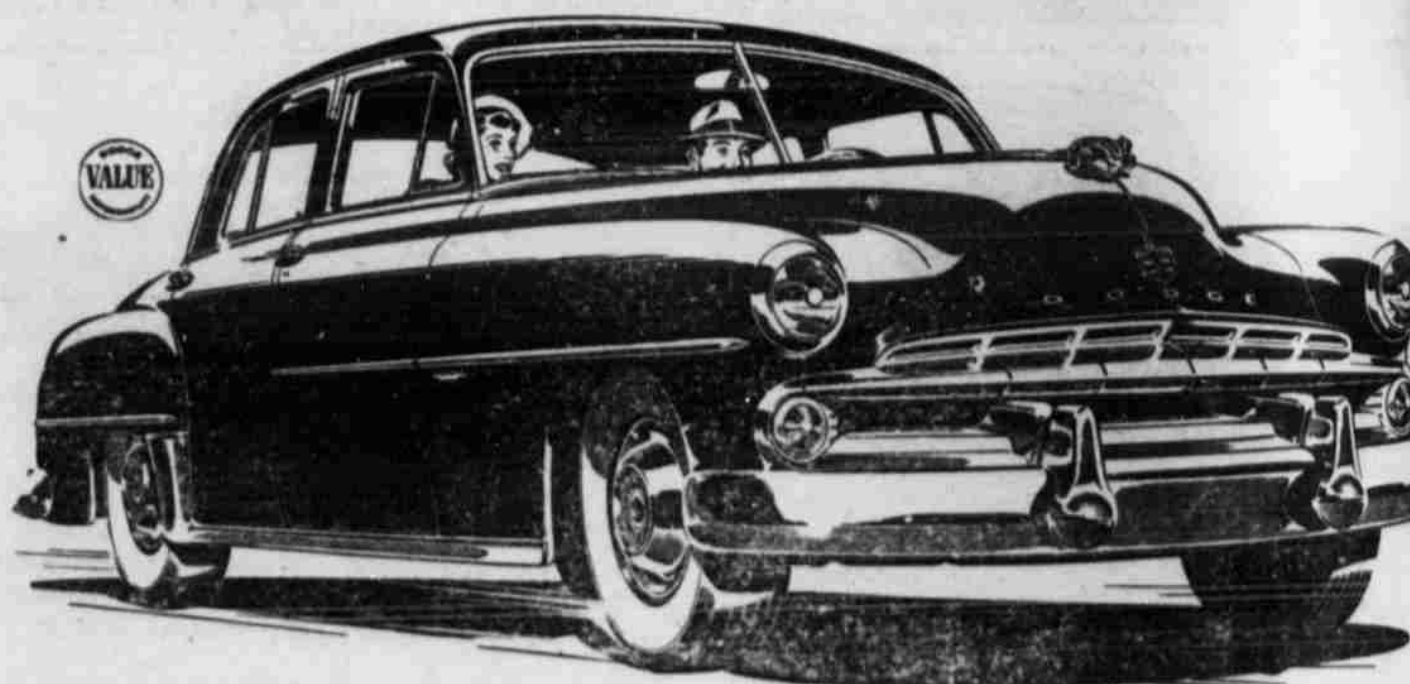

The 1950 football season really is hardly over, but most coaches are already making plans for spring training. That's right, the spring drills are just a few weeks away.

If you've got a copy of Southwest Conference rosters handy, you might notice that most of the teams are going to be in fine shape next season. Some of the brightest individual stars will be missing, but there's plenty of quantity.

The rosters of the squads as issued at the beginning of last season give a good indication of what and how much material each team will have. If players are not lost to the draft or in other manners, here's what each school should have:

Arkansas: 13 of 14 ends returning; 9 of 11 tackles; 7 of 11 guards; 4 of 5 centers; 19 of 26 backs.

Baylor: 10 of 13 ends; 12 of 14 tackles; 15 of 17 guards; 5 of 7 centers; 20 of 27 backs.

Rice: 11 of 13 ends; 9 of 11 tackles; 8 of 9 guards; 5 of 5 centers; 12 of 18 backs.

TCU: 7 of 9 ends; 8 of 11 tackles; 9 of 12 guards; 4 of 5 centers; 12 of 16 backs.

Texas: 6 of 10 ends; 6 of 8 tackles; 8 of 9 guards; 4 of 5 centers; 15 of 17 backs.

SMU: 0 of 10 ends; 5 of 8 tackles; 6 of 8 guards; 6 of 8 centers; 16 of 20 backs.

This breakdown possibly is inaccurate in some instances. Some players have been quietly eliminated from squads; others have gone into service, and others will have given up football because of injuries, etc.

The spring training periods will tell just how much of this numerical strength is going to benefit each team. But on this basis, it looks like another even, topsy-turvy race.

The display car is equipped with Dynaflo transmission, radio and heater. Short went to Oklahoma City Tuesday to get the car. January 8, he attended a meeting for the launching of the 1951 Buick at the Shamrock hotel in Houston. Some 1100 Buick dealers of the Southwest were present.

Coffee will be served grownups and cookies and soft drinks will be on hand for children Saturday. Les Short company will be open from noon until 5 o'clock Sunday afternoon for those who are unable to attend the Saturday opening.

The 1951 line of Buicks contains three series of cars, ranging from the low-priced Special up through the Super to the luxury models in the Roadmaster, with new body and engine.

"Important advances in styling features coupled with major chassis and body improvements combine to make the 1951 Buick the greatest value in Buick history," Short said.

There are eight models in the Special series, six in the Super and four in the Roadmaster. The '51 Special is completely new throughout. It has a new body, new chassis and is powered with

the F-263 Fireball engine introduced in the Super last year. This engine develops 128 brake horsepower with Dynaflo and 120 with Syncro-Mesh transmission. Rear fenders are integral with the rear quarter panel, eliminating the fender line caused by the welts. The Special, coming in standard and deluxe trim, is mounted on a 121 1/2-inch wheelbase and has an overall length of 204.8 inches.

Riviera in Special

The Riviera "hard-top" convertible, which Buick pioneered in 1949 to start a new trend in automobile styling, has been extended to the Special, giving Buick three of these models for the 1951 market.

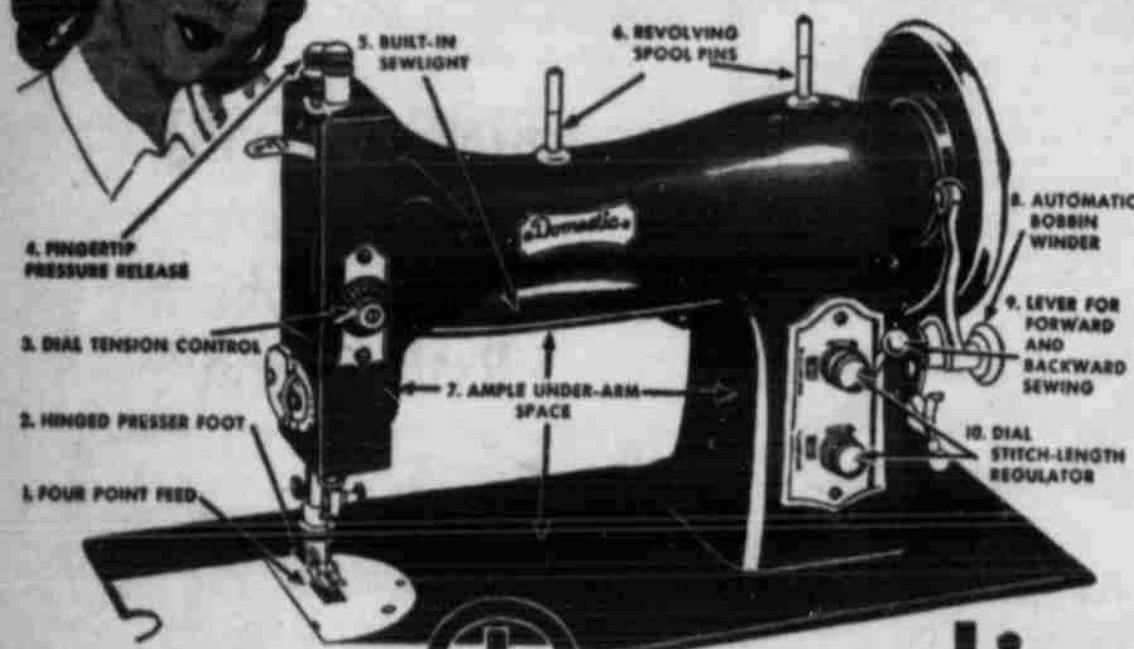
