Syrian Shiek, Who Looks The Real Thing, Visits Here

But Harem Consists
Only of a Single
Beautiful Wife

Hearts of Lubbock ladies would
have been beating double-quick
time yesterday had it been known
that a real live, honest-to-goodness
royal blooded Shiek—pronounced
"Sheik"—if you please—was in
town.

But then it might have been a
bitter disappointment to have
learned that the shiek's harem con-
sisted of one beautiful wife whose
picture he carries with him con-
stantly.

The shiek, if you care for names,
is Shaiikh Ameen (They) Hamada,
direct descendant of a royal line
of kings and princes that ruled
over all Arabia and Mesopotamia
before the Mohammedans gained control
1400 years ago. His father who
died several years ago was a
Grand Marshal Shiek, who ruled a
whole province. The rule is heri-
tary and passed to Ameen's older
brother at the death of the father.

Represents New Party.
Shaiikh Hamada lives at Mount
Lebanon in Syria. He is a repre-
sentative of the new party of Syria
which is gradually gaining con-
trol of the government, he says.
He was a representative of his
party to the League of Nations.

This is his first trip to America.
He has been in this country six
months. The purpose of the visit,
he says, is threefold: To make
and renew acquaintances; to visit
American friends who have re-
quested that he come to see them;
that he met during his extensive
travels in Europe, and to acquaint
himself with the principles of the
Turkish government so that he may
better aid in the reconstruction of
his country.

In Lubbock the Shiek is the
guest of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Saffady
of the Boston Hotel. He knew the
family of the Lubbockers in Syria.
"Shaiikh" equivalent to "Lord".
The Shiek's title to his name is a
merit title given him by the
Turkish government for his ser-
vice in Syria. He explained that
the title "shaiikh" was equivalent to
"lord" in England.

Shaiikh Hamada speaks a very
broken English, using an inter-
preter to translate most of his say-
ings. His native friends who now
live in England.

MAY TRY BLACKMER

Millionaire Oil Man Likely
To Be Brought Back

DENVER, June 15 (P).—Indicted
by a federal grand jury today on
charges of perjury and evasion of
the income tax laws, Henry M.
Blackmer, millionaire oil man, was
announced key witness in the
celebrated Teapot Dome case, faces
the prospect of being extradited from
his haven of self imposed exile in
France to the United States for trial.

Six true bills, containing 14
counts, were returned against him.
Blackmer charged perjury in con-
nection with the making of income tax
returns to the government and two
alleged evasion of income tax pay-
ments. Bond was fixed at \$25,000
in each case an aggregate of \$150,000.

Bright Outlook For Stock Seen

Cattle Has Shown Marked
Improvement And Now
Equals Average Condi-
tion For Time of Year.

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, June 15.—A happy out-
look for Texas stockmen was seen
today by H. H. Schuch, federal sta-
tistician, in his regular live stock
report issued here.

The condition of ranges, he de-
clared, is "nine points" better than
that of a month ago and "three
points" better than a year ago.

"Cattle," he added, "have shown
a marked improvement and now
equal the average condition for
this time of the year. Prices are firm,
sheep and goats have responded to
better range conditions and are
gaining steadily. The general tone
of the wool market has been strong."

Charges of shooting with intent to
kill, were filed here today against

Texas, in connection with the
wounding Wednesday of Walter
Shawalter, Oklahoma City attorney.

shooting to enmity which he said
this aroused. His wound was not
considered dangerous.

Miss Renfro has admitted firing
the shot, which struck the attorney
in the back of the left shoulder.

Blanton Criticizes Texas
Papers

FORT WORTH, June 15 (P).—
Newspapers came in for a drub-
bing at the hands of Congressman
Thomas L. Blanton, who spoke here
today in interest of his candidacy
for United States senator. He de-
voted a large part of his address to
criticizing Amos O. Carter, Fort
Worth publisher, and newspapers in general.

"The leaders" of Fort Worth
were criticized by the speaker,
who claimed they forced him to
pay \$50 for use of the auditorium
in which he spoke, whereas, he said,
he had spoken in Houston, Dallas,
and other cities without charge.

Five Injured As Katy Train Hits Auto At Bartlett

One of Those Hurt In Grade
Crossing Wreck May Die
Of Injuries; Automobile
Demolished.

(By Associated Press)
TEMPLE, June 15.—Five persons
were injured, one seriously, when
an automobile driven by Miss Josephine
Level of El Paso was struck by a
Missouri-Kansas-Texas north-
bound freight train on a grade
crossing at Bartlett at 6:15 p. m. today.

The injured are: Miss Josephine
Level, 17, south wounds and injuries
to the head; Miss Barbara Stitt, 18,
El Paso, body bruises and badly
lacerated hand; Jack Stitt, brother
of Barbara Stitt, 12, fractured leg;
Miss Jewel Moore, 15, Bartlett, body
bruises.

At a hospital here to which the
injured were brought, physicians
said the full extent of Miss Level's
injuries could not be determined
quickly but that she was undoubt-
edly badly hurt.

The accident occurred when the
automobile crossed the railroad
tracks after a switch engine had
passed and was struck by the
freight train which was traveling
about 18 miles an hour. The auto-
mobile was demolished.

NEW LABOR IDEA

Want Special Division In
Latin-America

GENEVA, June 15 (P).—Project
to create a special labor organiza-
tion for Latin-America, including
associations of workers in Cuba and
Mexico, was communicated to the
international labor organization at
Geneva today, and also to the fed-
eration of labor.

The idea is to establish a per-
manent bureau at Buenos Aires and
convoke the first conference at Rio
Janeiro.

Originators of the project em-
phasize that it is not directed
against any existing labor organiza-
tion on the American continent.

SETTLE WAR DEBTS

Thirteen Countries Send In
Payments

WASHINGTON, June 15 (P).—
Payments, totaling \$90,797,068.61,
were received today by the treasury
from 13 foreign countries towards
settlement of their war indebtedness
to the United States.

Great Britain made the largest
payment of the \$67,208,000 in the
form of treasury notes purchased
on the American market.

France paid in cash \$11,250,000
on the principal payment of its war
debt, while the Italian payment of
\$9,000,000 was its third annual in-
stallment on its debt principal due
from that country.

The Woman's Day

Summer

A certain midwestern city has just completed estimating that commencement or graduation exercises will cost the fathers something like \$100,000. Considering that this city has about 3,000 June graduates, this allotting of only a little more than \$30 to each seems rather low. If Dad gets out of it for \$50 he can thank his lucky stars.

For the past 14 years or more one city after another has attempted to cut down the high cost of graduation. Some schools insisted that the girls wear simple little white duck skirts and middie, and the boys equally inexpensive sartorial effects. With few exceptions, all these attempts failed until today there is hardly a school in the country which does not permit its commencement festivities to be on about the same plane as debutante "coming out parties" in another realm of society.

Queerly enough the richer communities, generally schools of the larger cities, were the ones first to advocate a tightening up on commencement, extravagance, and are the very ones which have made most headway here.

The poorer and perhaps the more provincial the school, the greater the hullabaloo made about commencement.

School authorities frankly throw the problem at the parents. They say they have ruled and fought and implored for commencements without expense, but that the parents whose pocketbooks they are attempting to save are the very ones who thwart their efforts.

"The way I choose to dress my daughter for her graduation is my own business and school boards will keep their hands off," is the repeated opinion and thought reaction of the majority of parents to any and all attempts to soften the H. C. L. blow of commencement for them.

So it's on with the class rings and the class pins and the class annuities and the engraved invitations and calling cards and corsages and taxis and banquet tickets and a dress with all the fixings for baccalaureate sermon, and another for the junior-senior banquet, and another for commencement itself!

The whole problem is one of the power of tradition. Education was a much less taken-for-granted thing in our parents' day than it is today. Even graduation from the eighth grade was sufficiently of a feat to most parents, and new dresses and fol-de-rol, and graduation from high school was almost as exceptional as receiving a master's degree today.

Parents saw in their children's educational achievement sort of a crown on their own lives of denial and lack of opportunity. They basked in reflected glory and preened themselves on their own accomplishment.

But education is almost as taken-for-granted these days as silk stockings. Even parents of today's high school graduates achieved that much education for themselves, but they cling to the old tradition as tenaciously as their own farm mothers who did well if they got through the eighth grade.

Women Crash The Political Gate

Feminine Leaders Are Prominent In Night Session of Convention

By MARTHA DALEYMPLE Associated Press Staff Writer KANSAS CITY, June 15.—Women crashed the political game in dead earnest during the early hours of the lengthy nominating session of the Republican convention last night.

Important feminine political figures, that have been determining factors in many of the midnight conferences in stuffy hotel rooms, let fly their dignity, and led delegations in the two stampedes for Hoover and Curtis.

Two Second Nominations. Two of them reassumed their serious mien however, and stepped upon the platform to voice their second vote in the nomination of the two men. Untroubled by the blinding glare of the photographers' lights directed upon her as she took her place before the speakers' stand, Mrs. Christine Bradley South of Kentucky, in a clear, loud tone, told the world that the women were behind Hoover.

Her diminutive stature necessitated lowering the microphone, to come within range of her mouth, but it didn't bother her. She stepped smilingly to one side and graciously accepted the applause that accompanied her appearance, as the concession to her height was made.

Her closely cropped head bobbed emphatically and her slim, small hands waved broadly as she sought to tell just what Kentucky and particularly Kentucky women, thought of their candidate. She wore a simple white two-piece sport frock.

Misses Raised For Second. Mrs. H. J. Cornwell of St. John, Kansas, alternate, made the first address seconding the nomination of Senator Curtis. Taller, broader than Mrs. South, the microphone had to come up again.

Her gown was of plain tan crepe de chene in startling contrast to the many formal, brilliant gowns that were parading about the floor and in the corridors of convention hall.

On the floor womanhood was in turmoil during the long demonstration for the commerce secretary and Kansas Senator, Mabel Walker Willebrandt, chairman of the resolutions committee, a delegate from California and one of Hoover's most ardent workers, forgot the composure and sureness with which she addressed the convention on Wednesday, picked up a flag and led the yelling California delegation on its cheering way through the aisles.

After the 25 minute demonstration she returned to her seat in the California section and initiated a great business of backslapping, handclapping and general whoopee. Even the large, perfect waves of her simply dressed hair became a bit disarranged and it took several minutes of a trembling hand to put in order.

Mrs. Tincher Prominent. Mrs. H. "Poly" Tincher, wife of the Kansan who made the nominating address for Senator Curtis, presented a striking contrast to her 200 pound husband as she took part in the aisle in the madhouse outburst that greeted her husband's appearance on the platform.

From the strictly Hoover delegation from Rhode Island came a brave slim figure to join in the Curtis demonstration. It was Mrs. Leona Curtis Knight, daughter of the Kansas senator, and a member of the eastern delegation. During the Hoover enthusiasm she was the only member of her delegation to remain in the section, a demure little figure in an all-white costume.

When her father was being acclaimed, she entered the lists carrying a tiny flag. As she returned to her delegation several of the men informally slapped her upon the back in sincere congratulation.

Scald gelatin in cold water for 5 minutes. Dissolve over hot water. Moisten cream cheese with milk and cream, using equal parts. Work until smooth. Add grated cheese, whipper cream, salt, paprika and gelatin. Line a mold with slices of olives and turn in cheese mixture, taking care not to disturb olives. Place on ice to chill and harden. Unmold and serve on a bed of watercress.

White House Now Located Beside The Placid Brule
Coolidge Is Installed In New Summer Home Deep In Wisconsin Woods; A Message Sent to Hoover.

SUPERIOR, Wis., June 15.—With an endorsement of the nomination of Herbert Hoover as Republican candidate for president as his first official act, President Coolidge installed himself today in his summer home by the placid waters of the Brule river.

Arriving to an enthusiastic reception in Superior after a 36 hour ride from Washington, Mr. Coolidge drove to town across 33 miles of rolling pine and hickory land to Cedar Island Lodge, a rustic home where surrounded by virgin forests he and Mrs. Coolidge will spend the next three months.

Notified this morning on the presidential train by Edward Clark, his private secretary, of Mr. Hoover's nomination at the Kansas City convention, Mr. Coolidge immediately prepared a telegram to the nominee in Washington to which a message of affection from Mrs. Coolidge was added.

Sends Hoover Message.
"You have been nominated for the most important position in the world," Mr. Coolidge's telegram said. "Your great ability and your wide acquaintance will enable you to serve our party with marked distinction. I wish you all the success that your heart could desire. May God continue to bestow upon you the power to do your duty."

Mrs. Coolidge's more intimate message read: "The president and I send you and your our love and best wishes."

The messages were dispatched as soon as the train drew into Superior. The actual news of the nomination reached the presidential train last night after Mr. Coolidge had retired for the night.

Crowd Shouts Welcome.
Emerging from their special car as soon as the train drew into the station, Mr. and Mrs. Coolidge stood smiling and waving their hands on the observation platform to the great flag-waving crowd which shouted their welcome.

Mrs. Coolidge, dressed in a champagne red suit and wearing a tan silk hat, and appearing in much better health than would have been supposed by her long indisposition, stood beside her husband obviously enjoying the reception.

Mr. Coolidge, spotted in the crowd Mrs. Irvine Lenroot, wife of the former senator from Wisconsin, and joyfully waved her hand to her. The latter thereupon climbed to the platform and presented Mrs. Coolidge with a bunch of flowers.

A reception committee followed Mrs. Lenroot on the train platform and after formal greetings, Mr. Coolidge abandoned the car walking to his automobile between rows of school children.

Stocks Undergo
A Sinking Spell

Several Issues Break Below Bottom Levels Reached In Tuesday's Drastic Reaction.

(By Associated Press) NEW YORK, June 15.—The stock market experienced another sinking spell today in which several issues broke below the low points reached in Tuesday's drastic reaction. In the absence of any adverse news developments, the decline was generally described as the "secondary reaction" which invariably follows the first sustained rally after a sharp break. Although a sprinkling of issues moved against the current trend, and a few were pushed into new high ground, most of the standard industrials and rails lost 1 to 5 points while the declines in some of the specialties ran from 6 to nearly 14 points.

Trading Relatively Light
Unlike Tuesday's 5,000,000 share session, trading in today's market was relatively light in volume, the day's sales aggregating only 2,695,760 shares. Less than 300,000 shares changed hands between 1 and 2 p. m. the smallest hour's trading since last March.

For the time being, political developments were, aside from credit conditions as market factors. The drop of \$136,000,000 in brokers' loans apparently was less than many had expected, and probably accounted for some fresh liquidation. While federal reserve authorities state they are more interested in trends than in actual figures, there is a rather widespread belief in Wall Street that loans will have to be pared between \$500,000,000 and \$1,000,000,000 below the recent record-breaking total before the situation is cleared up. Fears of an increase in the Chicago federal reserve bank discount rate today again proved to be unfounded.

Hoover Sketches Political Views

Disclaims Compliments and Declares He Is Deeply Indebted For Honor

By CLINTON COFFIN
(Associated Press Staff Writer)
WASHINGTON, June 15.—Herbert Hoover, Republican presidential nominee, issued today his first campaign document in the form of a telegram of appreciation to the Kansas City convention that selected him last night as its standard bearer. His message, directed to Chairman Moses for transmission to the delegates, was deliberately expanded beyond the usual note of appreciation to a sketch of the position he will take as a candidate.

"Government is more than administration," he told the representatives of his party, "it is power for leadership in cooperation with the forces of business and cultural life in city, town and countryside. The presidency is more than executive responsibility. It is the inspiring symbol of all that is highest in America's purposes and ideals."

Talks of Farm Problem.
He dealt sharply with the contest over farm relief program before congress and the convention, asserting his stand on the Republican platform in the matter but concluding that "we will and must find a sound solution of the agricultural problems that will bring security and contentment to this great section of our people."

In the personal note with which his message opened he disclaimed some of the compliments paid him and declared himself "indebted to my country beyond any human power to repay." No man, he added, could think of the presidency "except in terms of solemn consecration."

Receives Congratulations.
Though late to bed after the jubilant triumph with which his

friends at home hailed his nomination the Secretary was early at his office and drafted first of all the message. The burdened telegraph wires brought to him an ever mounting pile of congratulatory notes, from all parts of the world as well as from leaders in every walk of American life.

The business of the commerce department, still in his hands, though his resignation is expected shortly, engaged him occasionally. He was caught by one demonstration of commerce department employees and others as he passed swiftly to his private office but once cloistered there the visitors in general were turned back by his corps of aides, to give him leisure to attend to the increasing burden of campaign detail.

In spite of the overwhelming convention majority behind his nomination, the outward show of neutrality in the vice-presidential selection was kept up in Washington and there was no announcement or informal discussion of any major campaign details.

paign speeches at strategic points.

Curtis is Strong Campaigner.
As for Curtis, although he rarely
makes an extended speech in the
senate, he is known as a vigorous
campaigner on the stump in his
home state of Kansas. He makes
in old-fashioned political speech.
If Hoover should decide on a
day-at-home campaign, it is the
opposition chiefs that Curtis will
take to the road, carrying on the
speech making campaign for the
party as Daves did in 1924 when
he was the running mate of Cool-
idge, and the president did little in
the way of talking.

Most depends in the shaping up
Republican campaign plans on the
outcome of the Houston convention.
If Smith is nominated by the dem-
ocrats, his opposition expects a
whirlwind campaign by the New
York governor. That in itself pre-
sents a problem would prove the incentive to
Curtis to cover much more ground
in his travels.

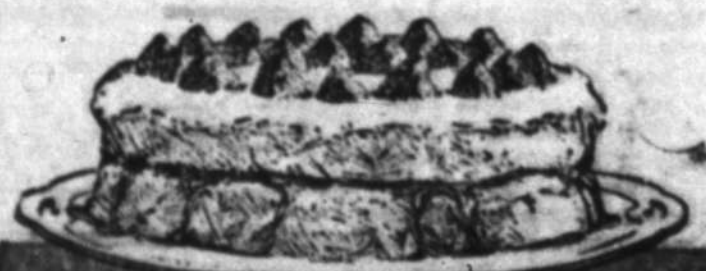

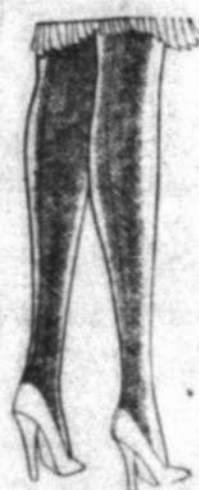

Place the Bible called Calvary or Golgotha outside the wall of Jerusalem, probably to the north.

Golden Text: God commendeth His own love toward us, in that while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us.—Rom. 5:8

Introduction.

We now reach the saddest of all Bible lessons, and yet in its inner meaning and results to most glorious and triumphant. We are to study the greatest event in all history, the climax of the life of Jesus Christ. It is the Bible's holy of holies. Let us approach it in the spirit of reverence and prayer.

The Successful Way.

Restoring to Christ His own garments, the soldiers and men from Pilate's palace to the place of execution outside the city. The route through Jerusalem cannot be traced since it is not known where Pilate's palace was or where Jesus was crucified. A tradition holds that the 12th century points out the road now called the Via Dolorosa or Sorrowful Way, which extends from the Tower of Antonia to the church of the Holy Sepulchre.

"Golgotha" or "Calvary."

"And they bring him unto the place Golgotha, which is, being interpreted, the place of a skull."

"Golgotha" is the Hebrew (Aramaic) word meaning "a skull" and "Calvary" is the English form of a Latin word of the same meaning. The name was given to a bare hill outside the walls of Jerusalem, probably to the north, having the shape of a skull, perhaps with two caves in its side which looked from a distance like eye sockets. A continuous tradition from the time of Constantine declares that Golgotha was situated where the Church of the Holy Sepulchre now is, in the northwest quarter of modern Jerusalem, but the city wall of Christ's time may have enclosed this region.

"They Crucify Him." v. 24.

"And they crucify him." Crucifixion is the most horrible of all tortures invented by cruel man. From the mention of the inscription placed above Christ's head, it is clear that the cross was of the traditional form, an upright, with a cross-piece, a foot or two down. To the latter Christ's outstretched hands were nailed, while his feet were placed together, were nailed to the upright. Between His hands and His feet was probably a rough projection on which His body rested. On such a cross the naked body was left to hang sometimes for days, all the loss of blood, the pain of the festering wounds, and above all the torture of thirst, brought the welcome release of death. "And part His garments among them, casting lots upon them, what each should take." A quarrel of four Roman soldiers, in command of a centurion, kept guard over each of the three prisoners, to see that their friends did not cut them down and take away their bodies. The clothing of the condemned was a possession of the soldiers. Separating Christ's outer garment into four parts at the seams, they divided it among them; but when they came to His inner garment they found that it, like a priest's robe, was woven in one piece throughout, having no seam. If they had cut it into four parts they would have ruined it, and so they cast lots for it, thus unwittingly fulfilling the prophecy of Ps. 22:18: "They part my garments among them, and cast lots upon my vesture."

"It Was the Third Hour." v. 25.

"And it was the third hour, and they crucified him." Sunrise was reckoned as beginning the day, and it occurred at about 6 o'clock at this time of year. "The third hour" was therefore about 9 o'clock in the morning, as we reckon time.

"The King of the Jews." v. 26.

"And the superscription of his accusation was written over: The King of the Jews." The full form of the title is given by John: "Jesus of Nazareth, the King of the Jews." Pilate himself prescribed the title, in Latin, Greek, and Hebrew, in Latin, Greek, and Hebrew which even an unlearned Jew could read. Thus Pilate's title in reality proclaimed the universality of the Gospel, that Christianity was to go "into all the world," as Christ had

He was tremendously impressed by the heroic and majestic bearing of Jesus so different from what he was accustomed to see in his prisoners, and by the supernatural accompaniments of his death. He had caught in the word "the son of God" from some propagandists and he was ready to believe that Jesus was more than a mere man.

Drainpipes and toilet bowls

—must be watched

When I was a young woman, keeping house was play until it came to cleaning pesky things like drainpipes and toilet bowls—and then I could have cried!

But that was years ago and women of today have an easy, safe, quick, and sure way to slay and defeat that is nothing short of magic!

For sluggish drainpipes

Thrust a small amount of them—kitchen, laundry, pantry, refrigerator and bathroom. Flush the drainpipes with a kettled of boiling water. Follow with a cup of Clorox, then more water. Your pipes will be as clear as a bell and completely disinfected and free from odors.

Danger in toilet bowls

Toilet bowls can be a serious menace unless they are kept immaculately clean.
