HOUSE VOTES FOR SPECIAL SESSION

BOARD TO STUDY PROHIBITION LAW VIOLATIONS

METHODS FOR IMPROVEMENT TO BE SOUGHT

GENERAL LAWLESSNESS TO BE PROBED BY COMMISSION

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Jan. 16.—President-elect Hoover is to appoint a special commission soon after March 4 to investigate prohibition and general law violations as well as court procedure and to make recommendations looking to improvement of the whole situation.

This developed today after a conference between Mr. Hoover and Senators Jones of Washington and Edge of New Jersey, respective leaders of the senate dry and wet forces, who advised the next president of their decision to abandon their resolutions to authorize a prohibition inquiry.

The senators said Mr. Hoover had with them that legislation was unnecessary at this time and that all that would be required in any event would be a measure appropriating money for the expenses of the commission. This would be offered at the special session of the new congress to be called in the early spring.

The Jones resolution would have ordered a congressional inquiry while that by Senator Edge would have directed the president to appoint a commission to conduct the investigation.

Enforcement conditions will be fundamental basis of the presidential commission's inquiry but the president-elect has stated the investigation should extend to the Volstead law itself so as to determine whether alleged abuses in enforcement.

ROTARY HEAD SPEAKS HERE

DISTRICT GOVERNOR IS LUBBOCK VISITOR AT NOON TODAY

The keystone of Rotary is "Fellowship," members of the Lubbock Rotary club were told at their regular weekly noon luncheon today by Rue P. Parcells, of Amarillo, governor of the 41st Rotary district of Texas.

The meeting together and learning one another better—the theme of the address—has spread the membership of Rotary from three, back in 1905, to several hundred thousand, in more than 3,000 clubs, located in nearly every nation on the face of the globe.

Governor Parcells declared, "If Rotary clubs did nothing more than to establish acquaintanceship, one with another, and enrich friendship and fellowship, then it is worth while."

The Lubbock club was presented with a Texas flag by Governor Parcells, the flag being a token of esteem from the newly organized club at Floydada. During his talk he stated that the attendance of the local club had been a thing to marvel at for many months and that officers of Lubbock's Rotary were recognized as very efficient and exceedingly well informed about the organization.

'AL' SPEAKS OVER RADIO TONIGHT

NEW YORK, Jan. 16 (AP)—Alfred E. Smith will address the nation tonight over a coast-to-coast radio hook-up.

Subject of his discourse will not be revealed until he faces the microphone. Even democratic leaders, including Chairman John J. Raskob and Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt, professed ignorance of the topic on which their party's recent presidential candidate would speak.

Governor Roosevelt indicated that by virtue of Mr. Smith's position as the titular head of the party, it was his privilege to make the radio address without consulting party leaders regarding its subject matter.

This speech, which will be begun at 8:30 p. m., eastern standard time, will be broadcast over a chain of 30 stations linked with WPA of the National Broadcasting company.

The stations include: WFAX, Dallas; KPRC, Houston; WOAI, San Antonio.

START THIRD CAMPAIGN ON PAVED ROADS

PETITION CALLS FOR A NEW ROAD DISTRICT WITHOUT SLATON

Following closely on the heels of the defeat of the proposed creation of a new road district in Lubbock county within two months, a movement was started this week toward a third project by means of the creation of an independent road district.

A petition signed by more than 100 local citizens asking that road district No. 2 be formed to include all of the county with the exception of district No. 1, which includes Slaton and the southeast corner of the county was presented to the Lubbock commissioners court this morning. This petition was drawn up by the leaders of the movement Monday night, circulated and filed with the county clerk yesterday.

Slaton's overwhelming stand against the \$1,000,000 bond issue voted on last week and one of the principal causes of its defeat, is the apparent reason for the proposed creation of this district. The road district No. 1 has an outstanding indebtedness of \$22,000 which the two previous bond issues sought to relieve, the entire county assuming the bonds in the county wide project.

Following action by the commission on this petition, the next plan will be the circulation of another petition calling for a third election, this time to finance hard surfaced roads in the new district.

A copy of the petition passed yesterday.

Gentry Released As Bond Is Made

Sam F. Gentry, arrested by county and city officers Monday night in connection with a series of liquor raids, was released from the county jail yesterday afternoon after he had made two bonds of \$1,500 each. The two counts against him charged both sale and possession of liquor.

A. D. Garner, arrested the same night in another raid in a different section of the city, was still in jail this morning. His bond was set at \$1,000.

Six Of Family Die In Tenement Blaze

NEW YORK, Jan. 16 (AP)—Six members of one family lost their lives in a fire that swept a five-story tenement in East 113th street last night.

Three of the dead were identified as Mrs. Justina Martinez, 45 years old, and two young grandchildren. The children's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Dionisio Esposito, and another child were missing.

HILTON HOTEL PAPER SIGNED BY OFFICIALS

CONSTRUCTION OF NEW HOTEL TO START BY FIRST OF MAY

With the receipt of advice today that the hotel deal between the Hilton Hotel company of Dallas and the Merrill Hotel property owners had been ratified by the officials of the company, last legal obstacles were cleared and construction of the 12-story, \$700,000 structure will begin about May 1.

Roscoe Wilson, representing several local individuals interested in the deal, this morning was notified that the deal had been ratified. This action removes the final hitch in the transaction and assures this 200-room proposed hotel for the city. The present Merrill Hotel building is to be torn down to make room for the new structure. Tenants have been notified to vacate by April 1.

Influenza Causes Trial Postponement

ANSON, Jan. 16 (AP)—Prevalence of influenza today led to a postponement of the trial of Bill Fritts, charged with murder in the slaying of Earl W. Hamilton, Haskell county youth. It was postponed for an indefinite time.

Hamilton and his father were shot to death at their home after the youth had agreed to appear as a witness against Fritts in a liquor violation case.

E. E. JONES NOMINATED

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16 (AP)—Edward E. Jones of Hartford, Pa., was nominated by President Coolidge today to be registrar of the treasury. He will succeed Walter O. Woods, who has been named treasurer of the United States.

OLD QUESTION BOBS UP AGAIN

TWO GUN DETECTIVE IS INJECTED IN QUIZ OF JOHNSTON

OKLAHOMA CITY, Jan. 16.—The name of Jose Alvarado, two gun detective whose employment by Governor Henry S. Johnston as a special state agent was the basis of a purported impeachment charge voted by self-convened members of the legislature in December, 1927, today bobbed into the investigation of the governor's office being conducted by a committee of the house of representatives.

Alvarado, now serving a sentence in the state penitentiary at McAlester for burglary of a store at Burbank, Osage county, was employed by the governor in 1927 to hunt down bank robbers, although he was under conviction at the time and his case was pending.

The governor, who was an attorney at Perry, defended Alvarado, and obtained his acquittal on a murder charge, granted him several stays of execution and refused to extradite him to Texas, where he was wanted on a charge of robbing a bank at Wildorado.

A. E. Cooper, detective who was discharged yesterday from the state bureau of investigation, testified the governor had declined to grant further clemency to Alvarado after Cooper had investigated the activities of a man he identified as the convict-detective, in inquiring into the affairs of Maud Lee Mudd, Indian actress, who formerly lived in Ottawa county. Cooper believed he was responsible in having Alvarado committed to the penitentiary.

Another Change In Court House Offices

Another change in the location of county offices in the court house has been effected by the Lubbock county commissioners court following dissatisfaction on the part of several office holders concerning the quarters assigned.

The county treasurer and the county auditor will be located in the rooms formerly occupied by Justice of the Peace G. R. Scott and which early this week was set aside as a meeting room for the commissioners court. The county school superintendent's office will remain in its present location.

J. H. Freeland Is No. 2000 At Tech College

Enrolling in Tech college yesterday afternoon, J. H. Freeland of this city was the 2000th student to register this year. In keeping with an offer made early this session, the Avalanche-Journal publications paid the fees of the 2000th student.

Freeland enrolled as a sophomore in the school of engineering. He was a student of Tech last year, although he had not attended this session. He is a basketball and track athlete. In 1927 he graduated from Lubbock high school.

Appellate Court Refuses McKenzie

AUSTIN, Jan. 16 (AP)—The court of criminal appeals today denied the second motion of Pete McKenzie, youthful slayer of Sam Street, chief of San Antonio detectives, for a rehearing of the case. McKenzie is under a death sentence.

At the time of shooting McKenzie was a fugitive from the State penitentiary where he had been committed for the killing of a night watchman in El Paso.

HUNDREDS DIE AS SHIP SINKS OFF HONGKONG

TOLL OF DROWNED WILL BE 300 IS BELIEF OF SURVIVORS

HONGKONG, Jan. 16.—More than 300 lives apparently were lost today in the sinking of the Chinese steamer Hsinwah.

The vessel sank a few minutes after striking a rock off Waglan.

Only 23 survivors were known to have been picked up. One survivor said that the vessel carried 300 Chinese passengers and most of the crew down with her.

The survivor said the vessel, owned by the Chinese Merchants Navigation company, left Swatow yesterday and encountered heavy seas and a strong wind. At 3:40 a. m. today the ship struck a rock and filled rapidly with water.

It was believed only one life boat was launched. In this were a boat-swain, fifteen members of the crew and four passengers. The lifeboat tossed about on the heavy seas for about an hour and was sighted by a junk just as the Hsinwah heeled over and sank. The junk brought the twenty survivors to Hongkong.

Another junk picked up Chief Officer Jacobsen and two Chinese. All were lifeboats but were so numbed by cold that they were unable to grasp the ropes thrown to them.

The fishermen jumped into the water and lifted them aboard the junk. Search for other survivors was being continued this afternoon.

The Hsinwah was of 1,640 tons. The ship was commanded by Captain Jensen. The chief and second engineers were British and the other officers were either Russian or Chinese.

WEALTHY WEST TEXAN IS DEAD

B. S. WALKER, BANKER, RANCHMAN, DIES AT FORT WORTH

(By Associated Press)
FORT WORTH, Jan. 16.—B. S. Walker, 52, multi-millionaire oil man, banker, and ranchman, died here today after a year's illness.

He was the first white child born in Stephens county, of which his father was one of the organizers and for whom the town of Breckenridge was named. Before moving to Fort Worth, he was mayor of Breckenridge, president of the First National bank there, owner of ranches, oil wells and farms. He was chairman of the board of the First National bank, Fort Worth.

Settings Made For 99th Court Term

Settings for the first six weeks of the present term of the 99th district yesterday were made by Judge Clark M. Mullican. This week will be taken up with non-jury suits and civil jury cases are scheduled for the next five weeks.

No criminal docket will be called during the first half of this term. Thirty-one civil suits have been set for the first six weeks period after which time the remainder of the docket will be set.

Next week the following cases are scheduled for trial: Garrett vs. Izard; McClatchy vs. Worsham; Champlin vs. Clark; and Rayland vs. Gunn.

DOG DAYS FOR FILM EXTRAS

HOLLYWOOD, Jan. 16 (AP)—The earnings of Hollywood's film extras slumped more than a third of a million dollars during 1928, and only two of the approximately 15,000 registered extras here averaged as much as five days work a week throughout the year.

These and other facts concerning employment conditions among the "atmosphere people" of the movies are revealed in figures made public today by the Central Casting Corporation operated by the studios as a clearing house for extra talent. Although the aggregate sum earned by extras during 1928, was only \$2,469,711 as compared with \$2,538,136 earned in 1927, the average wage of those who worked at all was 35 cents a day higher than in 1927. The 1928 average was \$8.94 as against an average of \$8.59 for the previous year.

Talking pictures generally are blamed for the reduced employment of film extras.

PROBE DEATH OF PORTALES GIRL IN 'HOME'

'TWILIGHT SLEEP' WAS GIVEN JUST BEFORE DEATH, REPORT

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., Jan. 16.—A coroner's jury here has opened an investigation into the death of Helen Haskew, 16, of Portales, at the New Mexico Girls Welfare Home allegedly after an injection of "twilight sleep" said to have been given to six girls who had been captured after escaping from the institution.

Fay Graves, one of the six, charged they had all been given the injection after they were returned to the home and they were then placed in solitary confinement on a bread and water diet. Other companions of Miss Haskew said she had seemed in good health when they were captured last Friday, but that all of them were sick and sleepy "after the injection."

The girl originally was reported to have died of heart failure, but an inquiry into the death was started at the instigation of her father.

Miss Bertha Lips, superintendent of the home, testified at the inquest yesterday the girls were given "twilight sleep" injections at the order of Dr. Evelyn Frisbie, physician at the home, after they had disturbed "the whole institution and it was feared that they might injure themselves."

The inquest was continued until today.

Final Majority Is 120 For Bond Issue

The official total of the \$1,000,000 road bond election of last Saturday was 1,793 votes in favor of the bonds and 1,672 opposed to them, according to a canvass made by the county commissioners court this morning. This gave a majority of 120 votes in favor of the bonds although a two-thirds majority would have been necessary for passage.

No other definite action was taken by the court this morning and a discussion was begun with the opening of the afternoon session concerning the petition presented today asking that a separate road district be created.

Irresponsibility Is Harsh's Plea

ATLANTA, Ga., Jan. 16 (AP)—Initiating a plea of mental irresponsibility, the defense at the murder trial of George Marsh, young college man, today called as its first witness Dr. George B. Carhart, Milwaukee physician, who testified the youth apparently had been handicapped for life by mental or physical defects which appeared during a period of illness shortly after his death.

DEFER MONEY BILLS UNTIL LATER TIME

ACTION COMES AFTER SHARP FIGHT ON RESOLUTION

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Jan. 16.—By a vote of 122 to 10, the house today approved recommendations of its appropriation committee that appropriations bills be considered at an extra session. The move came after a heated debate in which a dozen lawmakers were on their feet at a time clamoring for recognition.

The senate Tuesday went on record as favoring disposal of "money" bills at the regular session.

The verbal tilt was precipitated by the report of John F. Wallace of Teague, appropriations committee chairman.

Cries of "Time" greeted Representative Henry Webb of Odessa when he moved that the house should sustain the committee chairman's report.

Representative B. E. Quinn was the first to assert himself against Wallace's recommendations.

Representative R. L. Kincaid, of Crowell said he understood the appropriations committee had no other duties to perform and that if they failed to turn their attention toward monetary aid at the regular session "we might as well discharge them."

Speaking in behalf of the extra session, Representative Woodruff of Decatur answered Kincaid with charges that "the 39th legislature, which approved appropriations at its outset, bungled more measures

CRUISER BILL IS CONSIDERED

BUILDING OF FIFTEEN NEW VESSELS UP TO SENATE

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Jan. 16.—The Kellogg multi-lateral treaty renouncing war is ratified and today the senate turned to another bill favored by President Coolidge—the construction of 15 cruisers for the navy.

After two weeks of quarreling over an interpretation of the pact pledging the nations of the world to resort to peaceful methods in the settlement of disputes, the senate yesterday ratified the treaty, 85 to 1. Senator Blaine, Republican, Wisconsin, voted against it.

Chairman Borah of the foreign relations committee, in charge of the treaty fight, broke the stubborn deadlock resulting from the demand for an interpretation by assenting to a report by the foreign relations committee embodying its construction of the pact.

Senators Reed, Democrat, Missouri; Moses, Republican, New Hampshire, and Bingham, Republican, Connecticut, had held out for the interpretative report of the committee which declared the pact did not interfere with America's right of self defense and added the Monroe Doctrine was a part of that system of self defense. Senator Borah yielded with the written agreement that the report was not to be considered as changing or modifying the treaty or as effecting any reservation to it.

Busy With Navy Bill

While Secretary Kellogg was busy today notifying the other nations of the world who have signed the treaty, of America's adherence, the senate was just as busy considering the bill passed last year by the house authorizing the bigger navy.

Proponents in the treaty contest, in many instances, were opponents in the naval fight. Opponents of the treaty for the most part were on the other side today maneuvering for the naval bill.

PARIS, Jan. 14. — Hat modes created for the mid-winter collections are more indicative of the spring than the dresses they are meant to accompany. One of the reasons for this is that considerably more latitude is allowed in a hat than in an ensemble.

In any creative sphere the eye must work in conjunction with the fingers but in millinery the contrary is the case, because here the handwork is the prime factor. This is perhaps the reason why a hat always looks newer, more decided in character, than a new dress. Another factor is that millinery is essentially capricious in its manifestations, but even so, a hat must follow the general lines of fashion although it is only an accessory.

Hats are bright. In spite of the fact that my dresses for mid-winter wear are still subdued in hue, you will find my hats conspicuous for the most part, for their note of gaiety and brightness. They almost unavoidably make you think of a bright sunny day in March.

Many mid-season hats are made of straw and felt combined, the straw expressing a sense of spring in the forestalling of the seasons. The springlike aspect of the straw is thus somewhat subdued by the use of felt, preventing it from looking too unseasonal. Among the newest ideas to be found in my salons are hats made of a straw shape with wide bands like a fishnet which is fitted onto a felt shape. Yellow and chartreuse green on black and beige on blue are the color combinations used so far.

Modistes usually adopt a very independent attitude towards dress creators, yet they are often obliged to seek inspiration from dress designers. To prove this you will see in my collection hats made of straw woven

to imitate tweed—these will accompany the numerous tweed ensembles I have created for winter resorts and advance spring wear. Constant search for novelty in the way of materials and designs has often led me to create both my own colorings and designs for many of my collections. This now applies to my millinery department also and I have the same exigencies here. I am pleased to see that hat manufacturers have made a great stride forward in this direction and foremost among the leading novelties in straw is the fancy bangkok. These are now being shown in a number of new designs worked on the straw itself, lending an even more feminine note to the straw models.

Another newcomer is the "feutre peau de gant" or glove felt. This is as soft to the touch and as pliable as the finest kid glove and will enable Parisian modistes to exercise their inimitable handwork to even greater advantage than heretofore. Differences in Art.

There will be occasion for many controversies in the near future regarding the length to be given to the back of brims and crowns. This will be but a repetition of what we in the world of Haute Couture have gone through the last few seasons in connection with the length of skirts.

OUT RUMORS OF REBELLION

ANDINO IS NOT BEING TAKEN SERIOUSLY IN NICARAGUA

(By Associated Press)
MANAGUA, Nicaragua, Jan. 16.—General Augustino Sandino, rebel leader, has proposed that the province of Nueva Segovia be separated from Nicaragua and placed under his control.
President Jose Maria Moncada's reply to the proposal was to call it a joke and to order the enlistment of volunteers to combat Sandino and his followers, whom he termed outlaws. He added that the proposal was "unlucky."
President Moncada and General Sandino were followers of Dr. Juan Sacasa, recently appointed Nicaraguan minister to Washington, when he headed a liberal government at Puerto Cabezas.
Moncada was commander of the rebel armies and agreed to make peace with the conservative Diaz American supervision of a general election, one of the terms of the agreement, which Moncada refused.
The proposal of General Sandino was sent to President Moncada through relatives and included a request for a peace conference between the two at which the matter would be discussed.
The rebels have taken steps to stop this peaceful force of patriotism by ordering the enlistment of volunteers to combat the outlaws, President Moncada said. "Peace reigns over the country except in a small area in the north near the border of Honduras where small bands of outlaws are destroying crops."

CONDITION OF CATTLE GOOD

TEXAS SHEEP AND GOAT INDUSTRY IS IN BEST SHAPE

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Jan. 16.—Although rain and snow in Northwest Texas worked hardships on stock cattle, making them lose weight, livestock and ranges were generally in very good condition on January 1, the United States Department of Agriculture report for December showed today.
Green grass and weeds left when freezing weather began in December contributed largely to the continued good condition of cattle, while stock water and soil moisture were ample and with more rain in February the spring prospects should continue to be good.
Sheep and goats are in the best condition in years, the report said, crediting this condition to a late winter and good ranges. Some losses resulted from blizzards.
Cattle shipments for 1928 showed a slight decrease under 1927, and a slight increase over the average for a 5-year period. Shipments from 1923 to 1927 averaged 534,172 during the first six months, in 1927 shipments totaled 539,683; in 1928, 538,713.

"If we are going to let the governor run affairs singlehanded, let's abolish the legislature," he shouted.

Representative G. J. Cox of Paris interrupted him with the question, "Don't you think the senate has two candidates for governor and another for lieutenant governor, and they're trying to make a record by speedy legislation?"

"I can only say you are an astute politician," Kemble replied.

WHITE SOX TO FIGHT FOR CONTENDING POSITION THIS YEAR

FLOW OF NEW MATERIAL TO GIVE CHANGE

WILLIE KAMM IS ONLY VETERAN ASSURED OF HIS POST

CHICAGO, Jan. 16 (AP)—For the first time since the "Black Sox" scandal of a decade ago shattered a mighty baseball team it appears as though the Chicago White Sox may be something more than a doormat for other teams of the American League in the 1929 race.



Led by a manager of the old school, Russell "Lena" Blackburne, the White Sox will put a young but fast outfit in the field. Neither Blackburne nor the "Old Roman", Charles "Old Man" Comiskey, is predicting a pennant, but both expect a first division berth.

With an array of rookie material and veterans from last year's fifth place club, Blackburne's problem is who to discard. Only Willie Kamm, leading defensive third baseman of the junior circuit, finds his position uncontested.

Four Rookies Stand Out
Of the rookie hopefuls, four stand out—"Dutch" Hoffman, an outfielder obtained from Sacramento for \$25,000 and Earl Sherry, J. C. Walwood, a hard hitting outfielder from Shreveport; Johnny Kerr, 28-year-old second base sensation of the Coast League who is up for his second trial in the majors and Bob Weiland, a southpaw obtained from Moline of the Mississippi Valley League.

Several other likely looking youngsters, who made good in the closing days of the 1928 season, will be back. The most promising of these is Art Shires, Texas League product. He is regarded as a fixture at first.

Four Seck Second
Second base has four applicants in Kerr, Karl Swanson, a rookie, and Bill Hummel and George Redfern, who alternated at the position last season.

Bill Cusick, the "123,000 cavalryman", will be at shortstop again unless Irvine Jeffries, who comes from Dallas, beats him out.

For the outfield Blackburne has Carl Reynolds, Johnny Mostil, Bill Barrett, Bib Falk, veterans, and Randy Moore, George Blackberry, Hoffman and Walwood. Moore is coming up for another trial after being farmed out last season to Waco of the Texas League, while Blackberry closed the season with the Sox after leading the Texas League in hitting.

Shortage of Backstops
Most of Blackburne's troubles seem to hinge about the backstop position. He has but one man of dependability, Noe Berg. Buck Crouse has been retained. Jack Mealy, Dallas prospect, will be taken to the spring training camp.

The pitching staff will consist of five veterans—"Red" Faber, Ted Lyons, Alphonse Thomas, Grady Adkins and Ted Blankenship—and a group of promising rookies—Young Ed Walsh and George Cox, who were with the club last season, Weiland and Leslie Cox, a San Antonio product.

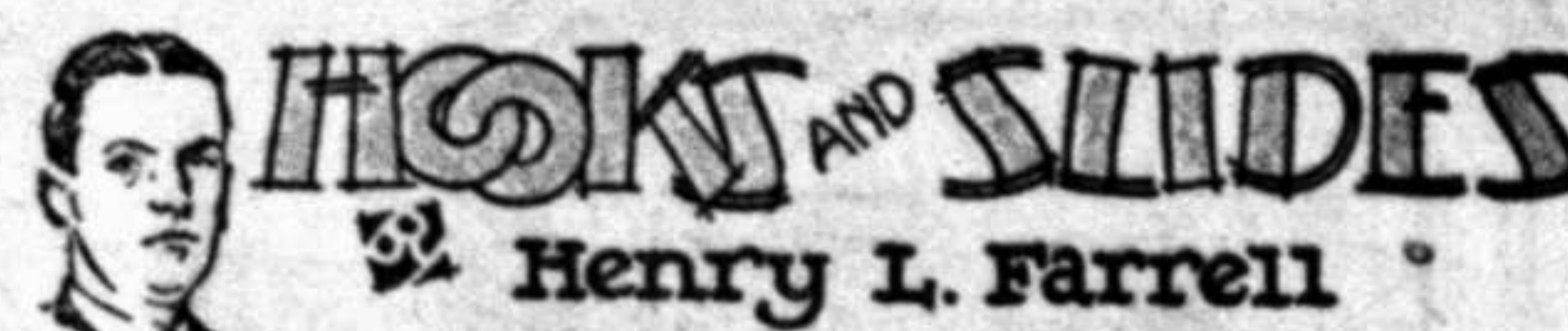
LUBBOCK PUT THROUGHFAST PRACTICE CLIP

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WOULD BOOST TAX ON BUSES

TILLOTSON HAS PLANS FOR BOOSTING ROAD FUNDS

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Jan. 16.—An effort to swell state highway funds by increasing the gross receipts taxes on buses and trucks, which is now two per cent, will be made during this session of the legislature, Rep. Leonard Tillotson of Sealy, who has an extensive highway program for presentation, announced today. His companies are now fighting to have the two cent tax removed.
In support of an increase in the tax, Tillotson said that the gross receipts tax in California is six per cent and that it is above two per cent in other states. As another argument for an increased tax, he pointed out the fact that railroads pay the government all profits above 5.75 per cent under the re-emption clause of the transportation act. In addition to this inequality, Tillotson said, railroads pay for building their roads while the bus lines use roads that cost the public \$40,000 per mile, free. Railroads, he said, cannot issue passes, but bus companies are not restrained in this respect.
Tillotson has not decided how much he will endeavor to raise the gross receipts tax, but he hopes to realize enough in this manner to make an increase in the gasoline tax unnecessary.

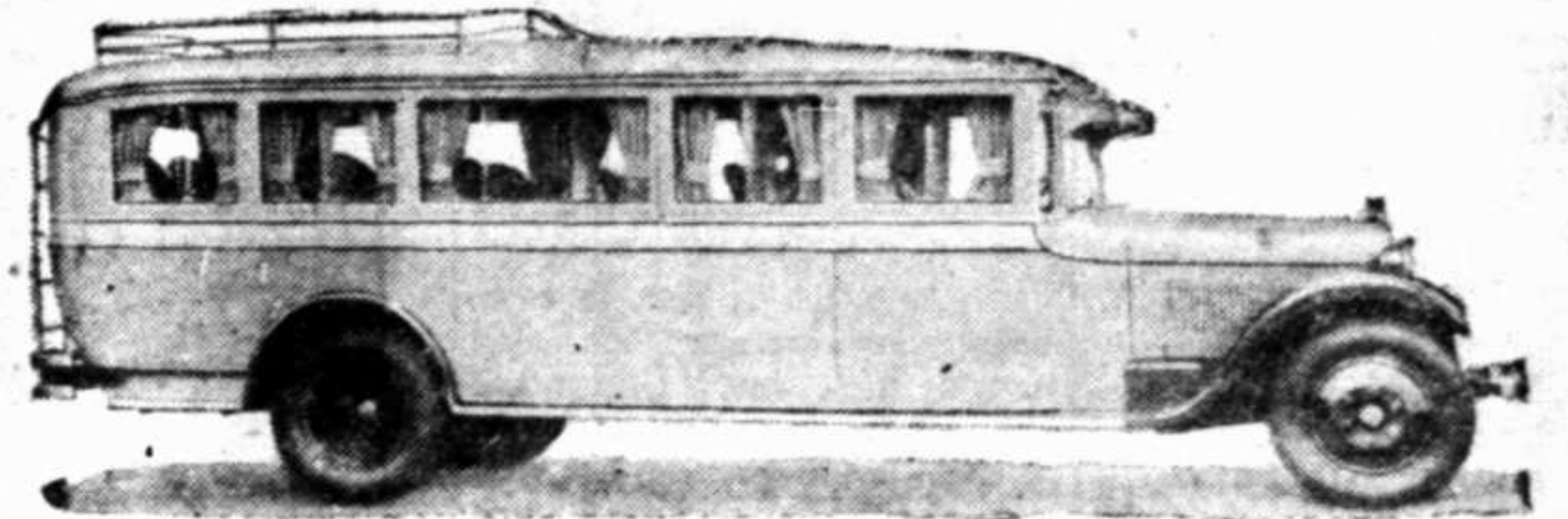

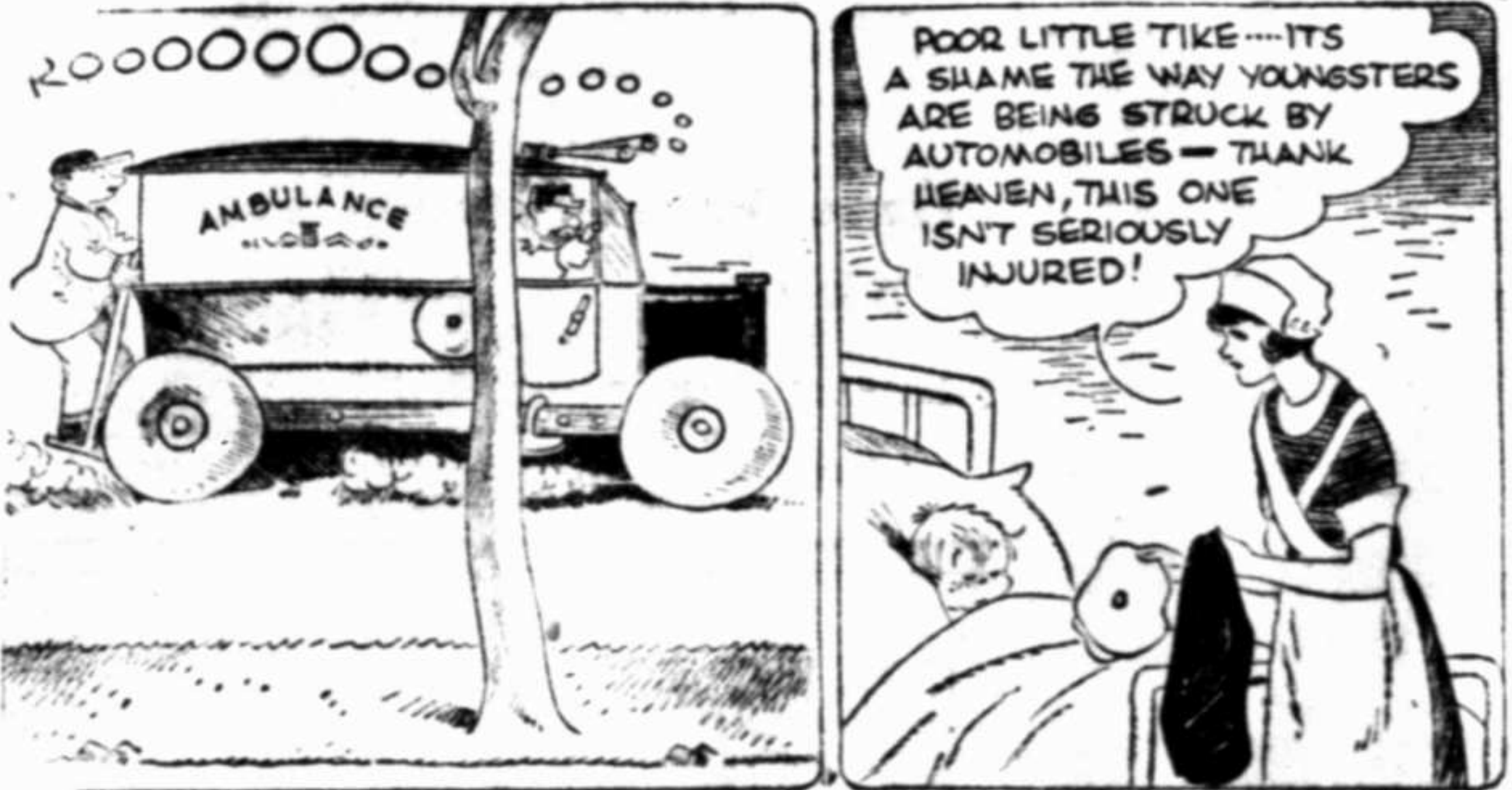

BOOTH WON'T RESIGN POST

GIVES NEGATIVE REPLY TO DEMAND FROM HIGH COUNCIL

(By Associated Press) LONDON, Jan. 16.—General Bramwell Booth, in a statement given to newspapers for publication today, announced he would not resign as commander-in-chief of the Salvation Army.

This statement was understood to be the gist of his reply to the high council of the Army, and the Daily Herald said it had been rejected by a show of hands. The council proceeded to a discussion of his fitness to govern the Army. "It should be clearly understood," the statement said, "that the founder of the Salvation Army instituted powers under which the high council could be called for the sole purpose of turning out of office a general who was spiritually unfit and of electing a successor if that were done, or if for any other reason there should in fact be no general of the Salvation Army. An important point indeed is that in declaring the general unfit the high council has the power to set aside his nomination of a successor."

The general contended that legally the council had no power to propose or make changes in the constitution but that he wrote the council stating he was prepared to consider any feasible scheme for broadening the constitution. He also asked for a little time to regain his health. This was scarcely to retire from office "under what considered he said and he was asked amounts to nothing less than a threat of expulsion."

AFGHAN FIGHT IS UNABATED

ABDICATION OF KING FAILS TO SATISFY WARRING GROUP

(By Associated Press) LONDON, Jan. 16.—London newspapers said today that they had learned in authoritative circles here that serious fighting was continuing in and around Kabul, Afghanistan, despite the abdication of Amanullah as king.

The Daily Mail said the rebels did not approve of King Inayatullah, Amanullah's successor, any more than they did of his younger brother. The Daily Express said a grim and ferocious battle was turning Kabul into a shambles. Bachai Sakao, the rebel commander, refused to regard the abdication as a reason for laying down his arms.

The British residency, where Sir Francis Humphreys, British minister, and his staff were stationed, was in the line of fire.

BERLIN, Jan. 16 (AP)—Berlin newspapers today expressed the belief that the abdication of King Amanullah of Afghanistan was a British diplomatic victory over Russia.

The Deutsche Allgemeine Zeitung said the abdication meant the end for an indefinite term of Soviet influence in Kabul, remarking that from the moment Amanullah openly sided with Russia, it was clear that England would not permit him to be victorious over the rebels. The Lokal Anzeiger said that the British government feared that the example of an independent king in Afghanistan would enhance the ambitions for freedom of provinces in the neighboring Indian states.

OIL NEWS NOTES

DALLAS, Tex., Jan. 16 (AP)—Reports have been received that the Sun Oil company has brought in another producer in the new Cedar Creek oil field a few miles west of Bastrop in South Texas. The well is said to be flowing 150 barrels a day.

Nearly all of the surrounding territory near the new discovery well on the Tamp Johnson farm four miles from Thornedale in Milam county is being leased. The new hole is 1,900 feet deep.

TULSA, Okla., Jan. 16 (AP)—Salt water is again showing up in new wells in the St. Louis pool. Tidal Oil company is drilling ahead at 4,358 feet in Simpson sand topped at 4,287 feet, with the hole full of salt water on its number 1 Smith in the northeast of the southwest of the northeast of 26-7-4.

Ramsey Petroleum corporation, and Magnolia Petroleum company have spudded in number 1 state lands in the northeast of 22-5-5, Cimarron county in the Oklahoma panhandle. The well is located one mile west of the Panhandle discovery well drilled by Ramsey two years ago in the northwest of the northeast 27-5-5.
