Squash Pickles

3 qts. squash (yellow) sliced and packed
3 med. bell peppers
3 large onions
1-4 oz. jar chopped pimientos
4 tsp. salt
1/4 cup water
2 cups vinegar
2 1/4 cups sugar
1 tsp. prepared mustard
2 1/2 tsp. mustard seed
2 1/2 tsp. celery seed
1/2 tsp. turmeric powder

Slice all the squash, pepper, onion and pimento together. Sprinkle with salt and let stand 3 hours. Drain and put vegetables, liquids and spices together in big Dutch oven. Boil, then simmer until clear looking. Pack in hot sterile jars and seal. A 15 minute boiling water bath is fine if you need it to seal jars.

Hot, Dry Weather Holding Area Under Powerful Grip

Although far short of records in many ways, the taste of hot, dry weather Cross Plains area residents have been taking the past several days is reminiscent of other times.

Times are not nearly as hard as they have been in days gone by, but the gradually advancing temperatures which have approached or reached the century mark have

helped the now drier south winds dry moisture from the ground, which in turn, requires more irrigation for crops, gardens, lawns and other prized vegetation.

A quick check with Billy D. Dillard at the City of Cross Plains on Tuesday revealed that water pumpings by the city water department have averaged 344,000 gallons daily during the month of July thus far. Dillard quickly said

a record would have to surpass the 380,000 gallons pumped and used for several days a year or so ago. Exact time and dates could be established by checking records if required.

Heretofore this summer showers have fallen periodically limiting demand for unusually heavy pumpings. Usage of water was creeping upward first of the week as temperatures climbed and moisture faded. Last rain gauged here was 1.20 inches on July 17.

Although vegetation is not yet tinder dry, hazard of fire will grow daily until moisture is received, therefore, persons burning trash or piles of brush are advised to be cautious about the threat of spreading fire.

It was believed that most peanut crops need moisture, and hay and feed crops can always use rainfall except when the hay is cut and still in the field.

T-Square Petroleum of Rising Star has filed application to drill Eastland County Regular Field projects two miles southeast of Pioneer.

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State Capital HIGHLIGHTS

The Travis County District Attorney who drew fire for not prosecuting House Speaker Gib Lewis' financial disclosure slip-up is now probing the campaign files of several Texas officials.

The DA, Ronnie Earle, is investigating possible campaign report violations by Texas Atty. Gen. Jim Mattox. Earle is targeting Mattox's loan to himself of \$125,000, but the thread leads back to South Texas rancher Clinton Manges.

Manges' huge donations to several statewide candidates last year has attracted close inspection by the Capitol press. Now the DA is watched by the press as he examines the Mattox files, and he is obviously not going to run the risk of being called soft on political crime again.

He is looking into the campaign files of several other candidates who received money from Manges, including former Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong who got \$200,000 from Manges in losing the '82 gubernatorial primary.

Earle is also looking over records from present Land Commissioner Garry Mauro and all nine members of the Texas Supreme Court.

Armstrong, who now works for Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower, said Earle was doing a Manges-Mattox oriented investigation, and the DA confirmed he was searching periphery records, although he was only looking into the Mattox allegation.

Ethics Duck

Last week the House Ethics Committee not only recided not to look into Speaker Lewis' failure to report more than 100 sources of income on his 1981 financial disclosure statement, but the committee chairman praised the Speaker for pleading "no contest" and paying an \$800 fine.

The panel's decision ends any inquiry which might be made in the House of Representatives. Whether some other governmental body takes up the investigation remains to be seen, but most observers feel the case is closed, at least until next election.

Governor Faulted

The fact that so many Democrats are under the press' magnifying glass has Texas Republicans quietly jumping up and down with glee. Some, however, are not so quiet as to refrain from pointing out ambiguities in Gov. Mark White's '81 campaign reporting.

Just after Christmas, White reported making a \$500,000 personal loan to his campaign, but failed to report personally borrowing a like amount from a bank where two board members were law partners with his campaign treasurer.

Two weeks later, White's campaign repaid the candidate and he repaid a like amount to the bank.

Those loans, Republicans say, are similar to Mattox's loans for which he is being investigated.

Strict Interpretation?

The widespread practice of such campaign transactions has sparked controversy over how the campaign reporting law, which was written in early 1981, should be enforced.

White's Secretary of State John Fainter asserts that a candidate is not required to reveal the bank loan, if there were no guarantors or intermediaries other than the candidate.

In contrast, Land Commissioner Mauro, whose reports list the bank and co-guarantors of his campaign loans, believes it was the intent of the Legislature to make candidates say where the money was coming from, whether directly or indirectly.

Democratic candidates weren't the only ones to be caught in the confusion. Former Houston Sen. Mike Richards, who lost running for comptroller, also did not report Houston banks as the sources of about \$200,000 he loaned his campaign.

Teacher Pay Session

The timetable laid out by the Select Committee on Public Education indicates the Legislature may not get to vote on its recommendations until November or later.

That means that lawmakers will put in the position of having to vote in November or December session for a tax hike to pay higher teacher salaries, and then face the primary election heat a few short months thereafter.

The vote could spell doom for some lawmakers careers, and the bets are in that White may just decide to let the issue wait until the next regular session.

Coordinating Board

The governor last week named a former Clear Lake City legislator, Bill Caraway, to the state College and University System Coordinating Board.

Caraway, a leader of the moderate faction in the House until 1980, will serve until 1987 on the board that regulates college construction and curriculum.

Caraway and his wife, Kippy, were given much credit for the political organizing in Harris County, which the governor carried in the general election.

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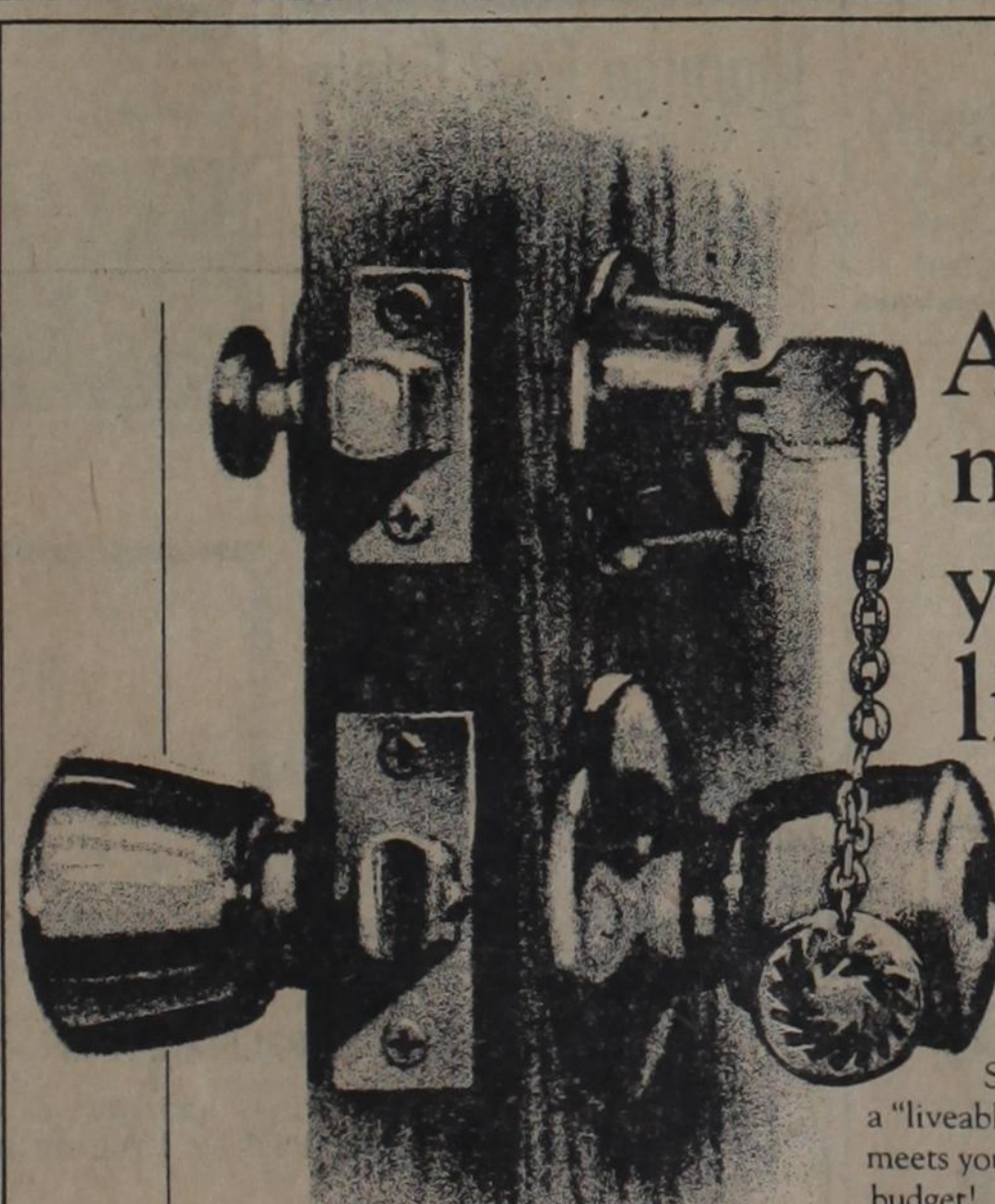

Time To Treat For Grubworms In Lawns

Have you been noticing the brown beetles about 1/2-inch long lying under lights that have been on at night? You might think these are harmless enough but they could spell real trouble if you don't take action against them in the near future, says Greg Gerngross, County Extension Agent at Burd. These beetles are the adult stage of the very troublesome white grub that destroyed many home lawns in Callahan County last year. The beetles that you find dead on the ground are male beetles whose only function in life is to mate with female adults. The males usually live only about one day after they emerge from the soil. Female adults, which live much longer, bore back into soil and lay about 30-40 eggs each. These hatch as grubs about 1 to 3 weeks later.

According to Gerngross, to determine whether or not you need to control white grubs in your yard, dig up a one square foot of sod section for each 1,000 square feet of lawn area. Examine all of the roots and soil to a depth of 4 inches. If you find more than 2-3 small grubs (1/4 to 1/2 inch long) per sample, treatment is justified. After examination, soil and sod should be put back in place, pressed down and watered so that it will continue to grow.

The insecticides most commonly used on white grubs include Diazinon (Spectracide) or Dursban. These can be purchased as granules or as liquid but the granules are easier to apply. These can be applied with a fertilizer spreader using the settings specified on the package. Diazinon 5% granules are applied at 5.0 pounds per 1,000 square feet. Immediately after application, the lawn should be watered to move the granules into the soil where the grubs are located. If liquids are used, water lightly immediately before and heavily immediately after application using the rates specified on the label.

Lawns requiring treatment should be treated between July 20 until August 15. Many people wait until grub damage is apparent in September or October before they begin to treat. These late treatments are usually not effective. Treatments in early spring are likewise not usually effective.

We hear so much about the education crisis. First we look at the indicators of this crisis. Poor performances in three basic skills is what we hear most about. (There are others) Some disintegrating influences have caused this poor performance in two of these fields; the reading and writing abilities of some students in High School and in college. One example, more than half the entering Freshman in University of California, Berkley, are required to take remedial courses in Reading and writing, due to their inadequacies in these fields. Many more examples can be cited.

Three deterrents to proficiency in reading and writing are cited here: Excessive viewing of television, Objective tests in all school levels and Audio-visual equipment.

Some of the arguments for blaming T. V. are: it shortens the attention span in reading; limits the mental work of the viewer and may cause the viewer to cease to think.

Too much use of Audio-Visual equipment in the classroom discourages the use of books; school-books, books for entertainment,

and books as sources for research.

The devastating influence of objective tests, introduced into our secondary schools, when universities abandoned the essay type entrance examinations is cause for complaints. There are only a few deterrents, teachers and more taxes cannot correct.

When To Contact Social Security Told

People in the Big Country area should be aware of when they should get in touch with Social Security, Glyn Hammons, Social Security district manager in Abilene, said recently.

The first time most people contact Social Security is to apply for a Social Security number. A person should remember to allow at least two weeks to get a number. Everyone must present evidence of his or her age, identity, and citizenship or immigrant status. A person 18 or older must apply in person.

After getting a Social Security number, most people probably will not think of Social Security until they, or someone they know, may be eligible for benefits, Hammons said. A person should contact Social Security:

- If someone in the family dies, to see if survivor benefits can be paid.
- If a worker becomes disabled, to see if disability benefits can be paid.
- At retirement, if the person is 62 or older.
- Two or three months before reaching 65, to arrange for Medicare health insurance protection.
- Whenever a person has questions about Social Security.

There is a variety of free publications available at the Abilene Social Security office. They describe the various kinds of Social Security benefits and when they can be paid.

The people at the Abilene Social Security office will be glad to answer any questions about Social Security. The office is located at 342 S. Pioneer and the telephone number is (915) 698-1360.

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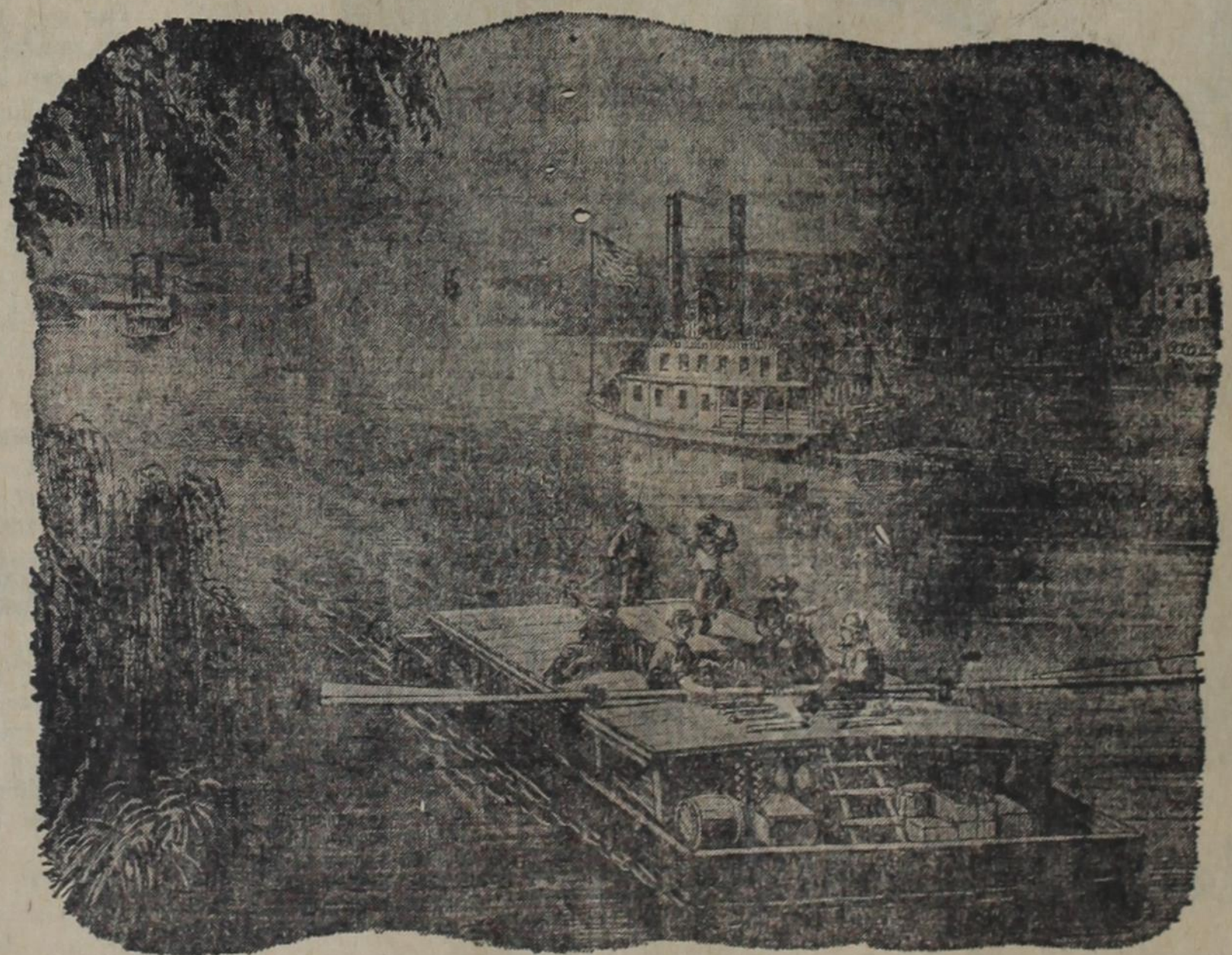
