June Milk Price Schedule Posted For This Section

Producers supplying milk for the Central West Texas marketing area will be paid \$5.09 per hundredweight for base milk and \$2.93 per hundredweight for excess milk delivered in June, Byford W. Bain, Market Administrator of Federal Milk Marketing Order No. 82 has announced.

These prices are for milk containing 4 percent of butterfat delivered top plants in Abilene, San Angelo, Stamford, and Sweetwater. For each one-tenth of one percent that the average butterfat content of a producer's milk is above or below 4 percent, the butterfat differential is 6.3 cents.

For base milk delivered to Brownwood the price is \$4.89, and for base milk delivered to Midland and Lamesa the price is \$5.29.

Milk production for the Central West Texas market for June totaled 10.9 million pounds—an average of 362,750 pounds per day. This was a seasonal decline from May to June of 6.3 percent in daily average deliveries.

In June, 721 producers (5 less than in May) delivered an average of 503 pounds of milk each day. Sales of Class I milk (chiefly bottled milk and cream products) which averaged 347,929 pounds per day in June, were 5.8 percent greater than in May. About 14 percent of the milk received from producers was classified as Class I milk in June 1954.

The price for the 9.5 million pounds of base milk delivered in June was 6 cents above the May base price but 64c below the June 1953 base price. This decline from a year ago results mainly from a decline of 63.7 cents per hundredweight in the Class I price. The Class I price for June was \$5.09.

Prices payable to producers were computed on the basis of reports of receipts and utilization of milk submitted by 10 milk handlers operating milk processing plants at which minimum prices to producers are fixed by the Central West Texas milk marketing order.

SEVEN PERSONS DIE IN MISHAPS IN THIS DISTRICT LAST MONTH

A total of seven persons died in automobile accidents in the 13-county Abilene highway patrol district during June, according to a report released today by Captain G. L. Morahan, commanding officer. This compared to 11 deaths during the same month of 1953.

The patrolmen investigated 91 rural traffic accidents, 26 in which 45 people were injured. The property damage from the 91 accidents was estimated at \$63,670. A summary of rural motor vehicle accidents the first 6 months of 1954 revealed that 24 people have died in accidents where only one car was involved. A total of 38 dead has been recorded since January 1, 1954, as compared to 33 who died the first six months of 1953.

Drinking drivers were involved in 9 of the fatal accidents, with speed and fatigue figuring as a major factor in a large portion of the accidents. Captain Morahan said, "patrolmen, in rural traffic supervision, made 1262 traffic violation contacts during the month, 1206 were for moving hazardous violations, and 54 were for non-hazardous and non-traffic. Of these 939 were issued warnings and 323 summoned to court. A total of 153 were charged with excessive speed, 24 for improper passing, 17 for DWI and 14 for Stop Sign violations. Fines were paid to the counties as a result of Patrol arrests as follows: Callahan \$1,537, Eastland \$510, Fisher \$88, Haskell \$460, Jones \$883, Mitchell \$615, Nolan \$124, Scurry \$1,029, Shackelford \$213, Stephens \$39, Stonewall \$144, and Taylor \$1,809.

Three patrol cars were dispatched from the Abilene district for emergency duty in the Ozona flood area. Patrolmen traveled 46,850 miles during the month directing traffic, investigating traffic accidents and Traffic Law Enforcement.

Commission Sets Hunting Program For Coming Fall

AUSTIN, July 16.—The Texas Game and Fish Commission has shaped the fall wildlife harvest, recommending almost identical waterfowl and mourning dove dates as 1953. It suggested the season on whitewing doves be closed and decided against antelope hunts for this year in both the Panhandle and West of the Pecos since the herd count was found to be low.

The Commission asked the Federal Fish and Wildlife Service, which fixes regulations for migratory waterfowl, to zone Texas for duck and geese providing the state will not have to sacrifice any great share of its hunting season. If that plan fails, the Commission asked to have the Texas waterfowl season opened on Friday, November 5.

A sixty-day season, similar to last year, was considered likely since reports indicate favorable hatching conditions up north.

The Commission again voted for the zoning system for mourning doves, requesting a north zone shoot beginning September 1 and a south zone season opening October 1. Closing of the whitewing season in the Valley was asked of Federal authorities because the population of this popular game bird is at a record low.

The Commission approved a \$200,000 quail restoration on the program, voting \$75,000 to operate an experimental hatchery in conjunction with the Gainesville State School for Girls and tacitly sanctioning a companion movement calling for broad development of habitat through plant cultivation and through teamwork between farmers and sportsmen.

This undertaking was included in a new budget which also contains \$200,000 for the Rollover Pass on Bolivar Peninsula and \$200,000 for a fish hatchery in the Gulf Coast area.

The Commission set seasons for the Panhandle, West of the Pecos and for other areas over which it has regulatory authority, and authorized the Executive Secretary to work out a program for trapping game on the King Ranch and on other areas for restocking purposes to the extent of reimbursing persons producing deer and turkey to be shared by others.

The Commission instructed the Director of Coastal Fisheries to determine whether oyster dredging damages reefs, with temporary banning possible during certain periods, and authorized representation at a coming Coastal conference for a joint digging of a channel across Padre Island from the Gulf to Corpus Christi.

Location for a 1,350 foot wild-cat oil test was staked this week three miles northeast of Carbon in Eastland County, it was reported here. The test is the Don L. Choate and S. S. Drilling Co., Cisco, No. 1 Larry McAfee. Drill-site was given as 1,320 feet from the south and west lines of Section 17, block 3, H&TC Survey.

He will be the second foreign agricultural student to visit in the county this year it was said. The first one was from Israel sent into the county to study horticultural practices and methods.

Reward Is Posted By Twelve Banks

Twelve area banks have agreed to continue participation in a reward program for the capture and prosecution of cattle thieves, according to an announcement today by President Sam Kimmell of the West Texas Ranchers Association.

Several years ago, the First National Bank of Cisco posted a reward for the capture and conviction of cattle thieves in this West Central Texas area. The other banks promptly joined the movement and a substantial reward fund is ready for use.

Banks participating in the reward fund are: First National Bank, Cisco; Eastland National Bank, Eastland; First State Bank, Rising Star; Citizens State Bank, Cross Plains; Commercial State Bank, Ranger; First National Bank, Gorman; Moran National Bank, Moran.

First National Bank, Albany; First National Bank, Breckenridge; First Strawn National Bank, Strawn; First National Bank, Santo; and, First National Bank, Gordon.

The West Texas Ranchers Association is composed of farmers and ranchers in Callahan, Palo Pinto, Shackelford, Stephens and Eastland Counties. It is active in any movement to better the livestock industry, Mr. Kimmell said.

Among the many activities of the Association, he added, is its interest in protecting the members from depredations and losses caused by thievery. Cooperation of the banks to maintain the reward fund has been praised by the membership.

The association holds regular membership meetings to study mutual problems and hear speakers on subjects of interest to the cattlemen. A large percentage of ranchers of the five counties are members of the association.

Two Ciscoans On Honor Roll At OU

NORMAN Okla., July 16.—Nearly 1,800 students have been named to the University of Oklahoma Honor Roll for the spring semester by Dr. George L. Cross, OU president. Included in the list are 106 students with straight "A" averages for the term.

Selection for the Honor Roll is based on an overall grade average of "B" in a minimum of 12 semester hours of work during the period. Not included are students in the University School of Medicine at Oklahoma City, or those in the Graduate College or the Norman campus who are working on advanced degrees and must maintain a "B" average in their studies.

The top students are listed by colleges within the University, and an asterisk (*) following a name denotes a straight "A" average. Included among the students who are listed on the OU Honor Roll are two from Cisco. They are Johanna R. Chapman, Arts and Sciences, and W. W. Donohoe, University College.

"As It Looks From Here"



WASHINGTON, D. C. — Immediately after the Puerto Ricans shot up the House of Representatives wounding five members of Congress, it was decided by top officials that we must have better protection.

As a member of the Committee to handle the matter, we have been trying to devise plans for a professional and efficient police force. With the exception of a half-dozen or so out of over one-hundred, the Capitol Police re-

ceive their jobs through patronage and there is a rapid turnover in personnel.

It probably will require some period of time to really do a good job of reorganizing the guard force for the Capitol and the surrounding grounds and buildings. If it is not done before the Congress adjourns, we will have to hold hearings and write a Bill sometime during the recess.

Subsequent to Mr. Anthony Eden's "Locarno" speech to the British Parliament, and just before he and Mr. Churchill came to the United States, I joined with twelve other members of Congress in contacting President Eisenhower expressing grave concern with such a policy. The "Locarno" idea gets its name from the agreement made in Locarno, Switzerland, in which Hitler's Germany and Mussolini's Italy participated. In the modern instance it means we would be doing business with the Communists instead of the Nazis or Fascists. It embraces the idea that an agreement of non-aggression would be dependable. It also would confirm and recognize as legitimate the advances the Communists have made.

An editorial in The Daily Star of Tucson, Arizona, says that the action of those of us contacting the President would not contribute to peace, but contrarily to war.

As a matter of fact, the President fully agreed and requested that we write a letter expressing our views, and we did so. A few days afterwards, the House of Representatives, without a dissenting vote, adopted a provision to the Foreign Aid Bill in almost exactly the same language as contained in our letter to the President.

We should know by this time that any agreement with the Communists is not worth the paper on which it is written, and that if we recognize the aggressive conquests of the Communists, we thereby endorse and condone their actions. A "Locarno" type of agreement, following Indochina, would be another "Munich."

The Small Watersheds Bill — better described, I think, as the flood prevention measure — passed the Senate with crippling amendments.

The Department of Agriculture has been almost put out of the picture entirely.

Another blow to the Bill passed by the House requires that any dam holding over 2,000 acre feet of water must be approved by Congress. In addition, any small watershed project would have to be approved by an "appropriate" State agency. A few States have such agencies, but the great majority would have to create a new department, and this would be up to the various Legislatures.

In other words, the Bill seriously handicaps the good start which had been made. Those of us who have worked on this legislation for a long time are hoping that something yet can be done to maintain the progress previously made and to strengthen it for the future.

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It is perhaps even more difficult to translate into human conduct and apply in the settlement of individual cases.

How does a case come before an appellate court? If you and your neighbor have a dispute over the property line between your two lots, you would be foolish to go to court for a settlement if you did not believe that right was on your side. Therefore, practically every civil action that comes before a trial court originates in an honest difference of opinion as to what the law or the facts of that case are.

But right cannot be on both sides; so one or the other of the litigants must be mistaken. When you seek legal counsel on such a question, it frequently happens that your lawyer will advise you not to go to court. Only a relatively small percentage of cases reach trial. The law is clear enough so that among the millions of transactions taking place in the country only a relatively few ever result in lawsuits.

But suppose you and your lawyer have decided that your case has enough merit to warrant going to court. The facts on both sides are presented, the lawyers on both sides argue the merits of their clients' cases and the court is then called upon to render a decision.

mediate courts between the trial court and the state Supreme Court. In such cases a case from District Court is appealed directly to the Supreme Court, the highest court of appeal in the state.

In Texas, cases are appealed from a District Court to one of eleven Courts of Civil Appeals. Sometimes the judgment of the latter court is final, as in ordinary divorce cases not involving property. But if the case meets certain requirements it may be further appealed to the Supreme Court of Texas. Criminal cases are appealed directly from the District Court to the Court of Criminal Appeals, which is the highest state court in criminal matters.

Federal cases are appealed from a U. S. District Court to a Circuit Court of Appeals and from there to the Supreme Court of the United States, provided the latter will assume jurisdiction of the matter.

When you appeal your case, you ask that the error you believe you have found be corrected. If it was an error, that is what will happen — the trial judge's decision will be reversed.

Sometimes the courts are compelled to decide a question one way because the law says so, but the results bring to light serious defects on the existing law. When such an injustice is discovered,

the legislature may remedy the defect by passing laws to correct it.

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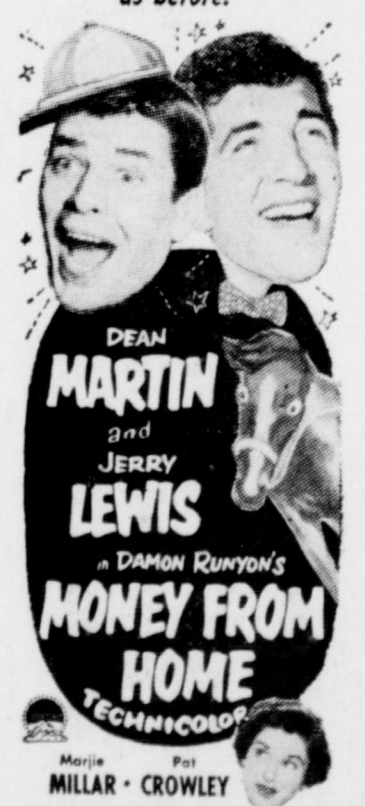

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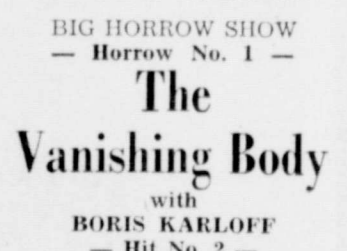
