## Payment In Kind

# PIK proposal submitted to public scrutiny

A very radical departure from previous practices regarding agricultural marketing and surplus has been proposed by Secretary of Agriculture John Block and its impact upon Mitchell County farmers is sure to be felt if details of implementation can be worked out.

Called "payment in kind" (PIK), the plan was first submitted to public scrutiny during an address by Secy. Block to a Congressional committee Dec. 9.

Since that date, further word has been received by Mitchell County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service Executive Director Don Stewart that lack of Congressional action has forced a delay in its implementation.

What the plan calls for is a sweeping reduction in surpluses, at the same time maintaining strength in the foreign markets and letting farmers have control of marketing decisions.

The government would offer farmers an amount of commodity for reducing acreage beyond what is called for in the 1983 program for wheat, feed grain, rice and upland cotton.

Initial plans would be to offer reduced acreage participants a certain amount of commodity for withdrawing an additional 10 to 30 percent of their base. The farmer will decide how much to withdraw within that range. The amount of commodity offered for withdrawing acreage has not been established to date.

Certificates for the commodity would be issued to participants and could be redeemed for ownership sometime after the first day of the marketing year for each commodity. The 1983 marketing years begin Oct. 1 for corn; June 1, wheat; and Aug. 1, rice and cotton.

After the farmer takes ownership, he would be responsible for marketing decisions and

crued storage charges. He would have 4-6 months to take delivery of the commodity.

Objectives outlined by Secy. Block are as follows:

-Reduce stocks while cutting production, lessening the overhang on the market in future years and enhancing prospects for a market-led recovery in farm prices.

-Maintain supplies in the marketplace, showing that U.S. intends to be a reliable supplier

abroad. -Less government outlays for farm programs (loan volume, storage and deficiency payments).

-Sound conservation practices would be applied to a larger amount of acreage.

-Lessen storage space problems. When asked his reaction to the payment in kind program, Stewart said it looks as if there's going to be some type of PIK. "If there's not See PIK, Page 2

## Local man charged in Snyder

Tommy Lee Bailey of Colorado City was charged with aggravated assault last week in Snyder.

Bailey 33, shot 20-year-old Berlinda Lee January 1 at the Townhouse Apartments in Snyder where Ms. Lee resided. Ms. Lee suffered a .38 caliber gunshot wound to the head and is in Lubbock Methodist Hospital. Lee's condition has improved from critical to satisfactory.

Bailey is out on \$1,500 bond, and according to Snyder Police Department Lieutenant Steve Warren, more developments are taking place in the case, but they cannot be released yet.

## Three hostages escape in Mitchell County

Three Ohio juvenile females say they were raped and forced into sexual acts with each other by a hitchhiker they picked up Wednesday, January 5 on Interstate 20, according to Howard County Sheriff A. N. Standard.

The rapes allegedly occurred in Mitchell and Howard Counties, according to law enforcement reports.

Clifford Bart Dunbar, a suspect in the rapes, has been arrested in Midland on a Howard County warrant and is expected to be transferred to Big Spring, Standard said.

The police report stated that the three juveniles left Akron, Ohio

Sunday and were given a ride in Sweetwater, Tennessee and the three then took their benefactor's car and money that night at a motel and left for Texas.

The report also said that they picked up the hitchhiker Wednesday and he pulled a knife and "forced them into various sexual acts with the knife to their throats."

According to officers' reports, one girl escaped in Mitchell County during one assault and the other two were released ½ mile southeast of the intersection at Highway 821 and Interstate 20 following a second assault.

The two then flagged down Department of Public Safety Trooper Jim Lasater on the Interstate.

Mitchell County authorities said they expect to charge Dunbar with three counts of aggravated assault and one count of aggravated rape of a child.

Dunbar was in possession of the stolen car when he was arrested, Standard said.

He also stated that the three juveniles are in the custody of the Howard County juvenile probation office.

## Pritchard & Abbot meets with Appraisal District

The Mitchell County Appraisal District met Thursday night with Ed Pritchard of Pritchard and Abbot, the appraisal company hired by the District, to discuss the lawsuits involving Valero Transmission Co.

Clarence C. Burt first reviewed the problems with Valero and stated that the District had employed Pritchard and Abbot approximately three years ago to appraise mineral values, pipelines, etc. He also said that this was the same time that the lawsuit between the Colorado Independent School District and Valero over the latter's delinquent taxes were going on.

Burt noted that Judge Starley, who presided over the trial, set the upper limit at which Valero could be taxed, an improper action under Texas law, adding that when District's Board of Review requested records from Valero, the company refused to turn them over, saying that they stood by the judge's decision.

After the review, Pritchard reported to the group on "what we're doing to try to resolve this problem."

He said that he had talked to Ken Graber, executive director of the State Property Tax Board, who told him that he had tried to act as mediator with Valero with negative results.

Pritchard also noted that, during the past two months, his firm had set up five full-day workshops with the lawyers

for twelve appraisal districts that were also involved in lawsuits with Valero "getting ourselves on the same wavelength."

Another step taken by Pritchard and Abbot, he stated, was to employ Jack Hopper, PH.D., of Austin as an independent appraiser. Hopper will appraise Valero for the Midland District first, but will also be available when the suit between the Mitchell County See DISTRICT, Page 2

widespread objections from such groups as labor unions or related businesses."

Block, in a more recent statement received at the ASCS office this week and dated Dec. 21, said that they are still working to see if PIK can fit into existing programs and will know soon. He stated that the President has given it his full support but implementation awaits Congressional clarification by passing enabling legislation.

"We cannot compromise the future of our farmers with shortsighted quick fixes," Block told the Committee on Agriculture, Nutrition and Forestry, Subcommittee on Agricultural Production, Marketing and the Stabilization of Prices on Dec. 9. "I am going to discuss three policies that the president recently has endorsed. They are an innovative program to reduce stocks and lay the groundwork for price and income strength in the future; a program to share our abundance with the needy overseas; and some changes in our farm programs to ensure we do not stimulate increased produc-

tion," he went on to say. Block then outlined factors which have contributed to the present situation. These are:

-Large global supplies.  
-Soviet grain embargo.  
-Global recession.  
-Strong U.S. dollar.

The increasing value of the dollar has actually increased the price of our commodities in terms of foreign currencies despite the decline in prices in U.S. dollar terms.

-Unfair trade practices whereby the European Commonmarket, Japan and others subsidize and build walls around their domestic markets.

-Financial plight of major importers, such as Portugal, Mexico, Poland, Brazil, etc.

"It is essential that in taking action that we not fall victim to the temptation of simply legislating near-term prosperity through higher price supports or other rigid non-market additions," Block warned. "Yielding to such temptations will only encourage farmers to produce more at a time when the market is strongly signaling the need for

less." He then described the administration's new idea: payments in kind. "Among the many proposals the department has been considering is one calling for payments in kind (PIK) to farmers who agree to reduce their production beyond what is called for in the 1983 programs for wheat, feed grains, rice and upland cotton. The basic idea for PIK is that farmers are offered an amount of commodity as payment for reducing additional acreage," he said.

As advantages of the idea, Block gave the following:

-Production can be reduced beyond that expected under the 1983 programs.

-Stocks can be reduced at the same time that production is cut back, lessening the overhang on the market at harvest next year and enhancing the prospects for a market-led recovery in farm prices and incomes in future years.

-The availability of market supplies will be maintained, signaling to exporters and importers that the United States fully intends to remain a reliable and consistent

supplier when production adjustments are made.

-Government outlays for domestic farm programs should decline.

-Self-terminating when excessive stocks have been worked off.

-Farmers would have the same or greater net returns while stocks are being reduced.

-Conservation would be applied to a larger acreage.

-Storage space problems would be lessened.

Secy. Block gave the following example of a corn farmer: "Thus, for example a corn farmer with a farm program yield of 100 bushels per acre would need to evaluate his costs of production on the acre and his expected return on 100 bushels. If he feels that the quantity offered per acre based on a percent of his program yield will provide him with the same or greater net returns when he sells it, he will idle his acreage."

He then said that each PIK participant would receive a certificate of entitlement for the calculated amount of commodity. "This certificate would effectively

transfer ownership of the calculated amount of wheat, feed grains, rice or cotton to the participating farmer."

"To provide the farmer some flexibility in handling the commodity acquired under the PIK program, the CCC would allow from four to six months to take delivery if necessary. During this time, the commodity would be owned by the farmer who would be responsible for any marketing decisions and accrued storage charges," he added.

"I know, and other farmers know, that we will not restore prosperity through the marketplace until stock levels are reduced. These stocks hang over the market like the dark clouds of a summer thunderstorm," he warned, then asked for legislative clarification in the following two areas:

-As you know, the CCC is required under provisions of the 1981 Farm Act to not resell any of its stocks for less than 110 percent of the current farmer-owned reserve trigger prices. While there may be ways for us to deal with this problem, it would

be most efficiently handled through a legislative exemption covering stocks distributed under a PIK program.

-A second problem concerns the payment limitation provisions of the 1981 Farm Act. This could limit participation by many farmers who would otherwise be willing to put 10 to 30 percent or perhaps their entire base under the PIK program. While in-kind payments may not be subject to this limitation under current law, a legal clarification would be helpful."

It is this legislation which has hit a snag, apparently, because the most recent statement issued by Block mentioned that lack of Congressional action has forced a delay in implementing the PIK idea.

There is also some provision for bidding to take a larger share of commodities and lay out a larger portion of acreage from production, but details of that plan are rather sketchy.

Stewart summed up the local ASCS stance when he said, "It's still very much up to Congress."

nty Appraisal District and Valero comes to court, Pritchard said.

In closing, Pritchard told the group that there were two dates to watch for: January 24, because that is when the Glasscock County case with Valero is scheduled and February 1, which is when Valero's taxes are due.

The reason this is important is because, in the past, Valero had always offered to pay the amount of taxes they felt were due and have always been turned down because acceptance of the offer would indicate that the taxing district felt that the amount tendered was sufficient, Pritchard noted.

However, new laws have changed this situation, he stated. The taxing district can now accept whatever amount Valero tenders without prejudicing the case.

After Pritchard discussed the situation with the Appraisal District, the members said they felt much better about the case, with Chairman Curtis Latimer stated, "I'm encouraged."

According to Playhouse President Jolyn Mikow, the banquet will be a pot luck supper. The playhouse year will be reviewed and Ms. Mikow will present the President's Award.

# Pack expected to challenge for district crown

The district 6AAA boys district basketball race shapes up to be an exciting one that may go down to the wire.

District coaches have given the pre-district nod to Crane and Ballinger, with Colorado City and Ozona close behind, and Sonora and Coahoma figuring to be important factors in the race also.

Crane coach Arlen White has an abundance of talent coming back from a 16-12 team last year. The Cranes (8-7) are loaded with experience led by 6-3 post Eddie Jones who is averaging 13 points and 13 rebounds per game. Another leader for the Cranes is 6-3 post Clint Barrett who is averaging 15 points and seven rebounds per contest.

But the catalyst of the Crane squad is point guard Eugene Morris who is hitting the nets for a 17.5 average. White calls Morris his best outside shooter and a player that can handle pressure.

Other Crane starters are 5-10 wing Junior Sena, and 5-9 wing Carlos Aguilar.

Coach Robert Buxcamper's Ballinger Bearcats (8-6) will be starting out with a young team. The 'Cats lost eight players from a 24-8 team that was de-

With all of the delicious-sounding recipes that Mrs. Hudgins had to choose from, it was difficult to pick only three, but here are the

finalists.

### GREEN CHILI CASSEROLE

1 can cream of mushroom or chicken soup  
1 soup can of milk  
1 small can of chopped green chiles (not hot)  
1 c. grated Velveeta cheese  
½ chopped onion  
1 large bag of plain Doritos

Mix soup, milk and green chiles and heat. Crush the Doritos by puncturing a hole in the bag and crushing with both hands, and put into casserole. Add grated cheese and onion. Pour hot soup mixture over Doritos. Heat at 350 degrees until cheese is bubbly.

This can be varied by browning hamburger, drain and add to soup mixture or chicken pieces can be used also.

### QUICHE

1-9 inch pie shell  
1 small can Bits of Bacon (not Baco bits)

2 eggs  
1 c. grated Swiss cheese

1 t. chopped onion  
½ c. milk

Combine eggs, cheese and onions—stir in bacon bits. Add milk and blend. Pour into slightly baked pie shell. Bake at 350 degrees for 25-35 minutes. Add ham if desired.

### SWEET DILLS (candied)

Drain juice from 1 qt. of cheapest dill pickles available. Into large bowl slice the pickles ¼ inch thick. Pour over them 2 c. sugar, 1 T. vinegar, 2 T. mixed pickling spices. Stir gently with a wooden spoon and let set several hours at room temperature to dissolve sugar and make syrup. Put pickles back in jar, place an onion chunk on top (optional), seal and refrigerate 4 days before using. Turn jar occasionally to mix well.

## Cotton Council begins survey

The National Cotton Council will mail questionnaires this week to a sample of cotton growers to assess their 1983 planting intentions, President Edward Breihan said.  
 The Council initiated its own survey last year when the U. S. Department of Agriculture consolidated its January and March surveys into one. This year's USDA survey will be carried out in February, and results will not be reported until late that month.  
 "The Council survey will provide planting intentions earlier," Breihan said. "Individual cotton growers need this information for plan-

ning purposes. In addition, Council delegates will need it for their policy deliberations at our annual meeting early in February.  
 "We want to encourage every grower who receives a questionnaire

to complete and return it promptly," the Council president said. "Results will be made avail-

able to all cotton growers through announcements in the media."


The Council's 1982 survey indicated that cotton producers planned to plant 11.8 million acres. Actual planted acres turned out to be 11.5 million, according to USDA.

# County growth heralds change

In 1880, shortly before Colorado City came into being, an official census was taken which showed Mitchell County to be inhabited by 118 people.

When the U.S. census was taken in 1980, the total population of the county was 9,088.

A comparison of the two studies presents some very interesting

statistics about the sex, age, race and marital status of the residents then and now.

For instance, in 1880, 38 females lived in Mitchell County, which was 32 percent of the population; in 1980, there were 4,220 women and girls, slightly more than 46 percent of the total.

There was a larger percentage of people un-

der 18 in 1880—the 45 young people living here then made up a little over 38 percent of the population. On the other hand, the 2,705 young people in Mitchell County in 1980 accounted for just under 30 percent.

In the 18-64 age group, the 1880 census showed 71 people, a little more than 60 percent, while the 1980 census found

4,627 in that group, a little over 51 percent.

The 65 and over group of residents shows a big difference, since there were 1,724 (almost 19 percent) people in that bracket in 1980 and there were absolutely none who were 65 or over in 1880.

The racial make-up of the county has also shown a change in the last 100 years. In 1880, there was one black family with five members, which makes a bit over four percent; in 1980, there were 467 blacks, barely more than five percent. The biggest change is in the number of people of Mexican descent; there were none in 1880 and 1,331 in 1980, more than 14 percent of the population. Also in 1980, there were four American Indians, three Japanese, eight Filipino and 18 "other."

Of the 23 households in Mitchell County 1880, 12 of them were married couples, 11 were single men and one was a black woman with four children.

To average the number of children to a

household in the same manner as it was done in 1980, the figures look like this: in 1880, there were 2.1 children per married-couple family and in 1880 there were three children per married couple family; in 1980, there was an average of one child per male householder—no wife present while in 1880 there were none; in 1980, there were 2.1 children in the female householder—no husband

present category and in 1880, there were four children in the female householder—no husband present group.

However, no matter how you compile the statistics and compare the figures, the words of Ralph Waldo Emerson still hold true: "The true test of civilization is, not census, nor the size of cities, nor the crops—no, but the kind of man the county turns out."

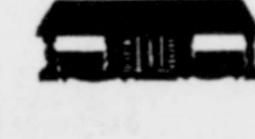
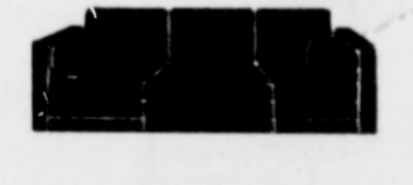

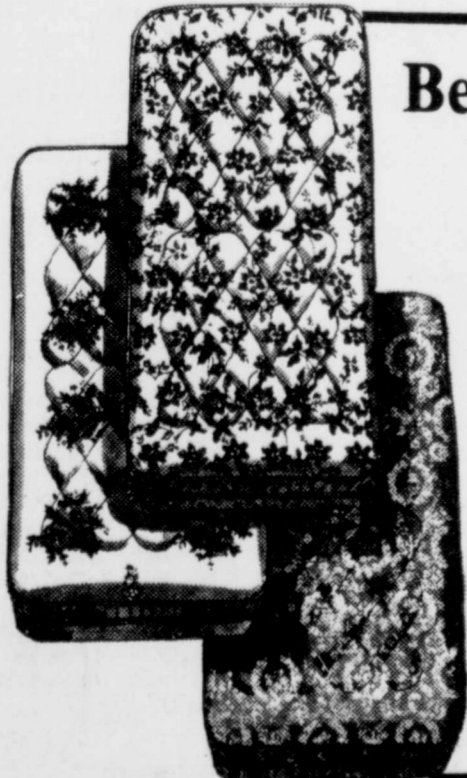
