Joint Program Is Arranged by American Legion Post and Texas Tech; Wartime Memories to Be Revived

VETERANS of Chateau-Thierry, Argonne, of Somme, of St. Mihiel, of the Marne, of many misty battlefields as the greatest world-wide conflict of all time will march again today, bringing back memories of the day—November 11, 1918—when the signing of the armistice brought an end to the World War.

The staccato of marching men throughout the world today will revive wartime memories, only partially dimmed by the twelve intervening years.

Spotted Rains Drench Plains

Lamesa Gets Heaviest Week-End Precipitation with a Total of One Inch; Slow, Cold Drizzle in Lubbock

Although moisture falling in Lubbock and immediate vicinity Monday was barely enough to gauge reports received from surrounding sections indicated that precipitation of varying degrees had been experienced in practically every direction, the heaviest fall being at Lamesa, where a full inch was reported to have fallen since Saturday.

URGES DISARMAMENT

Prime Minister MacDonald on Lord Mayor's Program

LONDON, Nov. 10. (P)—Questioning that the world had learned much since the Great War, Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald pleaded for disarmament in a speech given at the Lord Mayor's banquet tonight and broadcast to the United States.

"The old Adam is still rampant," he said. "Words are used which make us doubt how much the world has learned by the bitter, tragic experience of 1914 to 1918."

Great Britain, while perfectly prepared to lead the way, looks toward at the same time as she looks toward her, and wants to know how the other nations are following her, because she cannot allow herself to be isolated in the steps she is taking to secure peace.

Executives of W.T.C.C. Meet To Plan Drive

Annual Membership, Financial Campaign Outlined Monday at Session of Executives Held at Abilene

Budget Decreased

Total of \$60,000 Asked for Legislative and Publicity Programs for Coming Year; Quotas for Towns Made

(By Associated Press) ABILENE, Nov. 10.—Plans for the annual membership and financial drive of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, to start at the beginning of the fiscal year, were mapped by executives of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce here today.

The budget, tentatively set at \$60,000, marks a decrease from the schedule of former years, when it has ranged close to \$100,000. The amount would be used largely in furthering publicity and legislative programs.

Suggested quotas for some 90 member towns will be forwarded to the five regional directors for approval, and these officials will direct membership work in their own regions. Four-fifths of the budget will be sought in these towns, and the organization proposes to obtain additional members towns for the remainder of the sum.

The West Texas Chamber of Commerce will endeavor to strengthen regions as more independent units next year, and each regional director will be asked to shoulder the work of the membership campaign for his area.

Will P. Jones, Childrens' banker, was named the chamber of commerce representative to attend the annual conference at St. Louis and Washington next week.

Attending the session were Charles E. Coombes, president; D. A. Bandeen, manager; G. M. Caldwell, Abilene, and Houston Hart, San Angelo, vice-presidents. Coombes and Bandeen are from Stamford.

Texas Bank Is Robbed by 2 Men at Willis

Bandits Get \$4,000 in Cash and Currency After Cashier and Customers Forced Into Vault; Three Suspects Held

(By The Associated Press) WILLIS, Tex., Nov. 10. — Two men robbed the First State bank of Willis of some \$4,000 in cash and currency at about 4 p. m. today and fled in an automobile. They forced Cashier L. P. Paddock, his wife and three customers into the vault.

It was left unlocked, however, and the quintet emerged 15 minutes later to give the alarm.

One suspect, arrested on the outskirts of Conroe a short time after the robbery, and two arrested at Huntsville were being brought here. The Conroe suspect was driving an automobile with a Harris county license and was taken into custody after being chased a mile by a constable.

Willis is 48 miles north of Houston on the Huntsville road. The two bandits, according to Paddock, came into the bank at about five minutes before four. One of them carried a brown brief case on his arm into which currency and cash were scooped after the cashier, his wife and three male customers had been herded into the vault.

Cashier Paddock, who was seated at his desk, said he first noticed the bandits when one of them thrust a gun into his face and ordered him to "stick 'em up." The man, who wore dark glasses but no mask, was attired in blue jumper and blue overalls.

His companion, who was unmasked and wore a leatherette jacket, was covering the three customers. J. S. Hunt, W. H. Drigger and J. C. Vaughan, when Paddock looked up.

Eleven Men in Four Airplanes Still Missing

Pacific Northwest Aviation Interests Plan Concerted Attack on Strongholds of Canadian Wilderness

(By The Associated Press) SEATTLE, Nov. 10.—Eleven men and four airplanes were missing in northern British Columbia today while Pacific Northwest aviation interests planned a concerted attack on wilderness strongholds.

The latest missing were two Royal Canadian air force seaplanes. They left Comox, Vancouver Island Saturday for Prince Rupert, B. C., to search for Pilot Robin Renahan and two companions, missing since October 28, when they left Vancouver, B. C., for Atlin to look for Pilot E. J. A. Burke, not heard from since October 11.

The Canadian planes were piloted by Flight Lieut. L. R. Finney, and Flying Officer C. R. Dunlap, with a crew consisting of Sergeant A. H. Warner, Corporal W. C. Atwood and Corporal M. Squire.

Sam Clark, mining man, and Frank Hatcher, mechanic, both of Seattle, accompanied Renahan, while Burke's companions were Emil Kading, mechanic and Bob Marten, prospector.

Meanwhile Capt. Zeno E. Briggs, acting commandant of the Bremerton navy yard, declared incorrect reports he had recommended the navy department amphibian planes be sent north from San Diego to join the search.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 10. (P)—Arthur "The Great" Shires of baseball and flistic fame, was married today, but not before Hollywood movie cameras.

His movie manager, Walter Percival, explained Shires took his bride to the county court house because a thousand dollar gift, promised by studio officials, failed to materialize.

Last week Shires announced to the world, and especially to the press, he would wed Miss Elizabeth Greenbaum either at sunrise or high noon on a studio lot for the benefit of news reels and movie sound cameras. Percival let it be known the "arrangement" had been contingent upon a gift of \$1,000 to the bride, assertedly for being married before the studio sets.

Charter Given Poultry Group

Texas Panhandle-Plains Poultry Association Incorporated; First Annual Show to Be Held in December

Following application by Taylor White and R. E. Shaver, of Tahoka, and D. P. Eason, of Lubbock, charter was granted by the attorney general's department to the Texas Panhandle-Plains Poultry association, with headquarters named at Slaton, according to announcement received from Austin yesterday.

Mr. White is president of the association which was chartered with no capital stock.

The association was formed last August when poultry leaders of 34 Northwest Texas counties met for that purpose and for discussion of plans for a Texas Panhandle-Plains Poultry show. This show will be held in Slaton on December 10, 11 and 12, and will be an annual affair.

The association was formed for the further advancement and improvement of poultry raising in this territory.

Hoover Speaks To Advertisers Monday Night

Articles Sold Must Satisfy Desire Created by Advertising if Public Goodwill Maintained, President Says

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Nov. 10. —President Hoover told the Association of National Advertisers tonight that if the goodwill of the public toward them is to be maintained the desire created through advertising must be satisfied by the article sold.

"The goodwill of the public toward the producer, the goods or the service is the essential of sound advertising, for no business succeeds upon the sale of an article once," he said in a speech before the 21st annual meeting of the group.

"And to maintain this confidence of the public you and the medium which you patronize have an interest that others do not violate confidence and thereby discredit the whole of advertising. The very importance of the position which advertising has risen to occupy in the economy of the old law of supply and demand until you have transformed cottage industries into mass production. From enlarged diffusion of articles and services you cheaper costs and thereby you are a part of the dynamic force which creates higher standards of living."

Part of President Hoover's address follows:

"It gives me great pleasure to extend greetings to you upon your assembly in Washington. Advertising is one of the vital organs of our entire economic and social system. It certainly is the vocal organ by which industry sings its songs of achievement. The purpose of advertising is to create desire and from the torments of desire there at once emerges additional demand and from demand you pull increasing production and distribution. By the stimulus of advertising which you administer you have stirred the lethargy of the old law of supply and demand until you have transformed cottage industries into mass production. From enlarged diffusion of articles and services you cheaper costs and thereby you are a part of the dynamic force which creates higher standards of living."

Abilene and Southern Railway Again to Present Application to Interstate Commerce Commission for New Line

Parallels Orient

Rock Island Application for Rehearing on North Texas Construction Authorized Denver Railroad Denied

(By The Associated Press) DALLAS, Nov. 10. — A dispatch from Washington to the Dallas Morning News says that Interstate Commerce Commission today granted re-argument on the application of the Abilene & Southern railway to extend its line from Ballinger to San Angelo.

The line would parallel the Orient railway, a subsidiary of the Santa Fe. It would be about 30 miles long.

An examiner who conducted a hearing on the proposed extension recommended that it be permitted if the Santa Fe would not give the Abilene & Southern trackage, but in a division of the commission denied the Abilene & Southern application.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10. (P)—The Interstate Commerce Commission today dismissed without comment application of the Chicago, Rock Island & Gulf railway for rehearing on construction in North Texas authorized the Fort Worth and Denver.

The Rock Island based its application on objection to the joint use of that part of the construction between Shamrock and Wellington.

The commission previously had held extensive hearings on the proposed building involving the Rock Island, the Denver, a subsidiary of the Burlington, and the Frisco. Designed to shorten the distance between the Panhandle and Fort Worth and Dallas.

PORT WORTH, Nov. 10. (P)—It is the plan of officials of the Fort Worth and Denver City railway to begin an extension of its line from Childress to Pampa at the earliest possible date, General John A. Hulen, vice-president of the Rock Island railway over joint use of trackage on the proposed Shamrock-Wellington line.

Building of the extension, which will cost approximately \$4,000,000, brought an objection from the Chicago, Rock Island and Gulf for a

R. B. Walthall Leaves Board With Regrets

Present Chairman Of The State Board Of Control To Quit Position Soon; Pool And Wallace Mentioned

AUSTIN, Nov. 10. (AP)—It will be with considerable regret that R. B. Walthall, retiring member of the state board of control, turns over his office to that successor who has kept the political forecasters busy for the past several months.

Walthall has served in the post a six year term under appointment of Gov. Pat M. Neff, and nearly an additional year, pending appointment of his successor by Governor Dan Moody. Many speculations have been made as to his probable successor, with Adrian Pool of El Paso and John Wallace of Teague, both members of the legislature, the two most frequently mentioned.

Many More To Make
Walthall's regret will be because he has not been able to do all the things he wished to do while a member of the board. His chief concern has been the institution maintained by the state for unfortunate, and while the state has made many improvements in Walthall's six-year tenure, many more still are to be made.

Enlarged facilities, many additional employees and more scientific methods of treatment have been improvements made. When Walthall came on the board the methods of treatment of the insane were not the most efficient. They have improved immeasurably in the last half decade, and Walthall believes that Texas institutions will compare favorably with those of any other state.

To Modernize System
Completion of the new psychopathic hospital at Galveston, and furnishing a laboratory for students of medical science will aid in modernizing the Texas system, Walthall said.

Perhaps the two greatest present needs, he said, are fireproofing of all buildings and additional employees.

When Walthall retires from the board of control it is likely he will get another state post under Neff, now chairman of the railroad commission. He served in two other appointive posts—secretary to the governor and oil and gas supervisor for the railroad commission—effort his appointment to the control board.

The board of control boasts of one of the most faithful state employees—J. D. Hall, chief of the budget. Hall was stricken with appendicitis a few weeks ago, while at work. He was taken to the operating room in a critical condition. Now he is back at his desk, having allowed himself a very short time to recuperate.

GOOD news for children: Miss Marion S. Van Lew, who is at the head of the home making center of New York City, says that if children are allowed to roll their hoops, play with dolls or amuse themselves in any other way their fancy dictates, instead of having to wash dishes and do other household drudgery, they will not grow up to detest such tasks.

That sounds good, but I don't think it will work.

It seems that I am forever disagreeing with someone who is in a position to have theories—which probably doesn't speak so well for me—but I can look around at my list of acquaintances and find young women who have always washed dishes and who apparently rather like the task and see others who have practically never washed a dish and who dislike washing them very much.

I'll admit that I'm not particularly fond of washing dishes and I've been doing them ever since I can remember. That is one point in favor of Miss Van Lew's theory, but I'm pretty sure I wouldn't be any more fond of washing them if I hadn't had so much experience.

I'm getting philosophical, however, I think dirty dishes are among the things we have with us always and that we are acquiring some unnecessary gray hairs when we fret over them. It's easier to get them all washed up.

STAMPS ARE HANDY
MANY housekeepers find rubber stamps are handy for stamping names on cans and jars of home-preserved foods, according to a household hint.

A FEW STAY-AT-HOMES
THE other day I was quoting some statistics about women working. Here's one I left out. Dr. William M. Stewart, director of census, says there are twenty-three million women in the United States now who are listed as housewives.

Some of these people who are always worrying over women getting out of the home can think over that for awhile.

TO CAN SAUSAGE
SOME meat canning receipts have been brought in by Miss Ruth Stockton, county home demonstration agent, with the explanation that this is the time of year at which women are preserving their meats for the winter. The recipe for sausage is as follows:

Twenty-five pounds (4 parts lean to one part fat), one-half pound salt, one and one-fourth ounces black pepper, one and one-half ounces powdered sage, three table-spoons red pepper, one cup sugar. Use only clean, fresh pork for sausage. Grind meat through a medium plate. Mix seasonings thoroughly into the ground meat. Fill No. 2 cans with bulk sausage, using a wooden paddle. Pack cans from the side and avoid air spaces. Fill cans to within one-half inch of top. Place the cans in a pan of boiling water. Set the pan in a moderate oven and allow the heat to penetrate to the center of the meat. Seal and process fifty minutes at 15 pounds pressure. When the sausage is opened, it may be sliced and heated or served cold.

ON DRESSING WELL
THE other day I saw some advice that an expert had given on budgeting wardrobes for appropriateness as much as for costs. School teachers should wear little black, the stylist said, because the color is depressing and children appreciate change. Red, reds, blues, purples, tones, browns that have their own coloring, and all the wine colors are good choices, this woman said. Figured frocks are tired of much sooner than plain colors, the stylist continued.

The business girl of small means was advised to wear jersey frocks with removable collars, cuffs, belts and other white or colored touches, to get a winter coat of a neutral color in order that it might be worn with dresses of different colors and to choose colors for the entire wardrobe that blend so that hats, shoes, gloves and other accessories might be used with all the dresses without clashing. Blacks and browns were advocated for the office worker and classic lines were favored because they give one more dignity and are more appropriate for every occasion.

Following these rules does make it sound simple to dress well, doesn't it? And, whatever anyone may say about clothes, they do make all the difference in the world in the impression that one makes and a little forethought in selecting clothes according to one's type and the position one holds is likely to yield results.

Gaines County Proposes Bond Issue On Road

North And South Route For County Considered; May Call Election Sometime In Near Future

By Staff Correspondent
SEAGRAVES, Nov. 10.—Plans are being discussed by many good roads enthusiasts in Gaines county to propose a bond issue of \$150,000 to the voters to take care of the surfacing of a north and south road across the county to connect Terry county on the northeast and Andrews on the south.

This highway, it was explained by C. M. Armstrong, president of the chamber of commerce of Seagraves, would join with a road in Andrews county that connects with the new road Ector county is building north.

Most Of It Constructed
Right of way 100 feet wide is to be secured for the road. Most of the road is now constructed, especially the section between Wellman on the Terry county line and Seminole.

Commissioners have put the road up to a grade and distance between Brownfield and Seminole shortened by several miles through new construction.

"We have been talking about a 12 or 14 inch caliche base for this road, clear across the county," Mr. Armstrong explained. "We believe it can be done for around \$150,000."

To Use Residents
"It is the plan for county residents to be used as road workers and that the residents be given preference. This would give many of our people needed work and would also help them as well as the county."

At a recent meeting of farmers I attended, 48 out of the 49 men present were in favor of the proposed bond issue.

There has been a change in sentiment in favor of the caliche surface for the road, Mr. Armstrong said. Many people who heretofore had opposed a bond issue, are now for the plan, Mr. Armstrong added.

Hester Reaps Soy Bean Crop

Dawson County Farmer Finds New Forage From Planting Of Legumes; Much Seed Yielded From Plot

LAMESA, Nov. 10. (Special).—The fact that soy beans can be made a profitable money crop on the South Plains, has been demonstrated forcibly this year by B. W. Hester, prominent farmer living northeast of Lamesa, in Dawson county.

On the 24th day of June, this year, Hester planted three acres of Laredo soy beans. The crop did not receive any rain from the time it was planted, until it was harvested last week. Despite the dry conditions the crop did exceptionally well, the foliage being heavy and the yield of seed good, approximately 1,500 pounds of seed being produced from the three acres. The stalks grew to a height of two and one half feet, and were so thick in foliage one could not see through the rows. The soy bean produces many pods of seed at each joint of the stem. On account of the scarcity of the Laredo variety of soy beans, an advance of price for seed is expected to reach 18 cents per pound.

Soy beans make a fine hay crop, being a wonderful forage for cattle. Mr. Hester states that the soy bean is the best drought resisting and producing plant he has found for the South Plains, and says farmers will do well to raise them for winter hay.

Lynn County Gets Praise For School System From State

TAHOKA, Nov. 10. — (Special).—Lynn county has one of the best systems of schools in the state, is the opinion of G. L. Huckaby of the State Department of Education who has just completed an inspection of the system. And he has recommended that the State Department allow each of the Lynn county schools the legal limit of state aid.

"There are at least three respects in which your schools stand at the top," he said while here. "They have better buildings and longer terms

Mr. Huckaby attributes much of the success of Lynn county's system to the work of County Superintendent H. P. Caveness.

The department of education, he says, is making a special effort to inspect all West Texas schools as quickly as possible and award all the state aid possible as a drought relief and business depression measure. All East Texas inspectors have been transferred to West Texas until this work is completed.

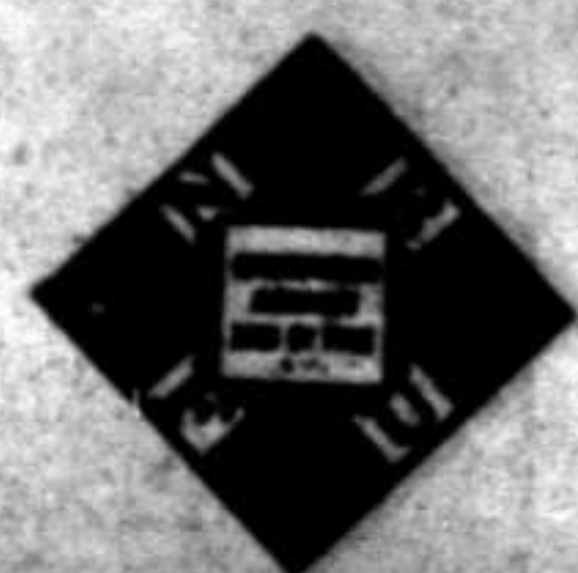

TODAY the Nation mourns her soldiers dead, honors her soldiers living, and with face resolutely to the future voiceless dedication to the ideals of peace. In today's observance there is no glorification of war. There is, indeed, little of the celebration of victory. There is much sober realization of the cost of it all and a grim determination that it shall not come to another generation through fault or omission of ours.

Practical Health Problems

COLOR BABY'S SKIN IS HEALTH BAROMETER
EDITORS NOTE:—This is the second of a series of four articles by Dr. Morris Fishbein on nutrition of the child.

By Dr. Morris Fishbein, Editor, Journal of the American Medical Association, and of Hygiene, the Health Magazine.

The color of the skin of a newborn baby is, of course, indicative of the state of health and of the nature of the diet given to the child.

A gray color of the skin should not be present in a normal child. If, however, the volume of the blood is insufficient, and the child is receiving an insufficient amount of iron or of the necessary vitamins, the skin becomes exceedingly pale.

The normal baby also has a good amount of fat under the skin. If one picks up a fold of the skin on the abdomen, it will be found that the fold will be at least one-half inch thick, which is due to the fat under the skin. If, on the other hand, the child is undernourished, the fold disappears rapidly.

Under these circumstances, a fold of the skin is picked up, it will be found to be no thicker than a piece of blotting paper. Thus the physician who is examining the child to find out the state of its health makes this test in order to find out if the child is properly nourished.

Mothers of new babies are likely to be particularly worried about the shape and size and other factors about the head. The head grows more rapidly during the first year than at any other time. This is because of the development of the brain, which is housed within the skull.

The head will continue to grow not infrequently regardless of whether the nutrition is good or bad, so that in an undernourished child the head appears much out of proportion in relationship to the rest of the body.

A normal child at birth has a head circumference of about 13 to 14 inches. By six months, a tape measure placed around the head will reveal a circumference of 17 inches, and by the age of one year 18 inches. By the age of two years, the circumference of the head is 18 3/4 inches. These measurements indicate the rate of growth of the head.

A child born before its time has a head that is smaller than a child born at the usual time, but a child born previous to the full term has a head which is even more out of proportion to the rest of the body in size. If the child is reared under good conditions, the circumference of its head by the age of one year is approximately normal.

The factor which is likely to disturb the mother more than others is the closing of the soft spot at the front and at the back of the head. Obviously, this soft spot is necessary in order to permit the head to be taken care of during the process of birth. The opening in the back of the head is usually closed before the end of the second month. The one in the front of the head may increase slightly in size during the first six months, but it slowly becomes smaller as the bones surrounding the opening become harder.

The opening in the front of the head closes between the ages of 18 and 20 months. This varies, however, a great deal among infants under various conditions.

Debt Cancellation Up Again

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10.—In ex-President Hjalmar Schacht of the German reichbank Uncle Sam has been entertaining a visitor lately who would cost Americans a lot of money if his hints were to be taken seriously on this side of the Atlantic.

Dr. Schacht's suggestion is not exactly new. It is the good old suggestion that the European nations would like to get out of paying their war debt to the United States; would like to stall them off for five years anyway, and then cut them down some more—in addition to previous cuts, at rates varying from 17 to 75 per cent.

However, the doctor's present excuse for seeking debt cancellation, or at least delay any further reduction—that's new. His theory is that Uncle Sam is causing the world-wide business depression by insisting on repayment of the money he loaned (that is to say, repayment of part of it) to Europe's belligerents during the 1914-18 period. What he suggests, in effect, is that trade and industry would perk up immediately if Uncle Sam would call off all collections for half a decade—and not necessarily resume them then either, lest he precipitate another stringency.

The impression I gather from talks with several of Uncle Sam's treasury officials is that Dr. Schacht undoubtedly is right in believing Europe would be greatly relieved by a receipt in full, wiping out all obligations due to the United States.

It seems reasonable a debtor naturally would feel better for having his creditor tell him not to bother about paying what he owes.

The idea the treasury experts cannot grasp is how the creditor is benefited by such an arrangement. Dr. Schacht has explained it again and again but the treasury folk do not understand it well enough to relish the job of making it clear to American taxpayers.

Europe's war borrowing in the United States was mostly done, it is true, by Great Britain, France, Italy, Belgium and others of the group of allied countries; not by Germany—so that Dr. Schacht may not appear to have any direct German interest in urging still more American leniency (plus the 17 to 75 per cent already extended) toward England, France and the rest.

Yet when one recalls that England, France, et al. are on record as promising just as much leniency to Germany as Germany can get for them, out of the United States, one realizes that indirectly Dr. Schacht has a very considerable interest in the matter.

That Dr. Schacht came here expecting to take a debt cancellation agreement or a five-year moratorium or another reduction compact home with him is deemed rather unlikely by the treasury folk.

A little preliminary missionary work is regarded as having been his more probable purpose. The council of the International Chamber of Commerce is due to meet in Paris a few weeks hence with all the leading countries foremost financiers in attendance, to discuss hard times the world over. At this gathering Uncle Sam is sure to be told a number of things he can do to improve the situation. It will be a big help if Dr. Schacht has succeeded in mellowing him in advance.

Not only will war debts be mentioned, but tariffs also. It can safely be predicted, and more loans—if Europe can get rid of its present ones without paying them.

And it is worth remarking, perhaps, that there is one class of Americans who really are favorable to war debt cancellation—the big bankers, who will float the fresh loans supposing there are any to be floated. Bankers get commissions on the loans they float. They floated the war loans, got commissions for doing so, and now it would pay them to float some more and get commissions on those, too. But of course they cannot float more while it looks so doubtful if the first batch ever will be paid off, the simplest way to get rid of them is to have them cancelled.

TEN YEARS OF RADIO

Radio broadcasting has just celebrated its tenth birthday anniversary. Within that short period of time the radio program and home receiving set as we know them today have been developed. Nor is that industrial giant, the radio industry, any older than that. Great is America's debt to radio. Ten years ago it was an impractical plaything. Today it is indispensable in countless ways, a source of pleasure, culture and information to the millions, the employer of thousands of men and women and a perfected mode of communication.

It has only taken us as a nation, a few years to conceive ourselves that radio is not merely a luxury. One experience of not having radio when you want it is sufficient to bring complete conviction of that score. This modern miracle is an instrument of many purposes and uses. It is indispensable to aviation, the railroads are using it, politics could not get along without it, no home is complete without one, it is the farmer's market ticker, and next to the newspaper, the greatest purveyor of entertainment, instruction and information to the people.

Radio, as we have it today, is capable of inspiring flights of fancy, but upon those men of science who gave it to us it had just the contrary effect. None of them saw in ether waves more than a means of studying certain physical phenomena. Marconi once said that 10 miles was the utmost range possible.

STIMSON BACKED A LOSER

The intelligence service of the State Department or someone somewhere is responsible authority at Washington appears to have blundered. On the face of the recent Washington news, sales of arms and ammunition from United States sources to the now-dropped government of Brazil were authorized by our own government, but sales to the revolutionists were prohibited. The ban against an arms traffic with the revolutionists was officially announced at Washington only a day or so before the Luis government was overthrown and the present military Provisional Government established.

It may have been an excusable error and perhaps was an act that normal circumstances would have required. Yet the injury to United States trade and interests can be of serious magnitude. The United States standing in Brazil opinion, on account of our tariff changes coming in the midst of a separate Brazil business situation, was none too good anyway. Apparently, if the State Department was adequately advised, the action on the arms question might have been delayed.

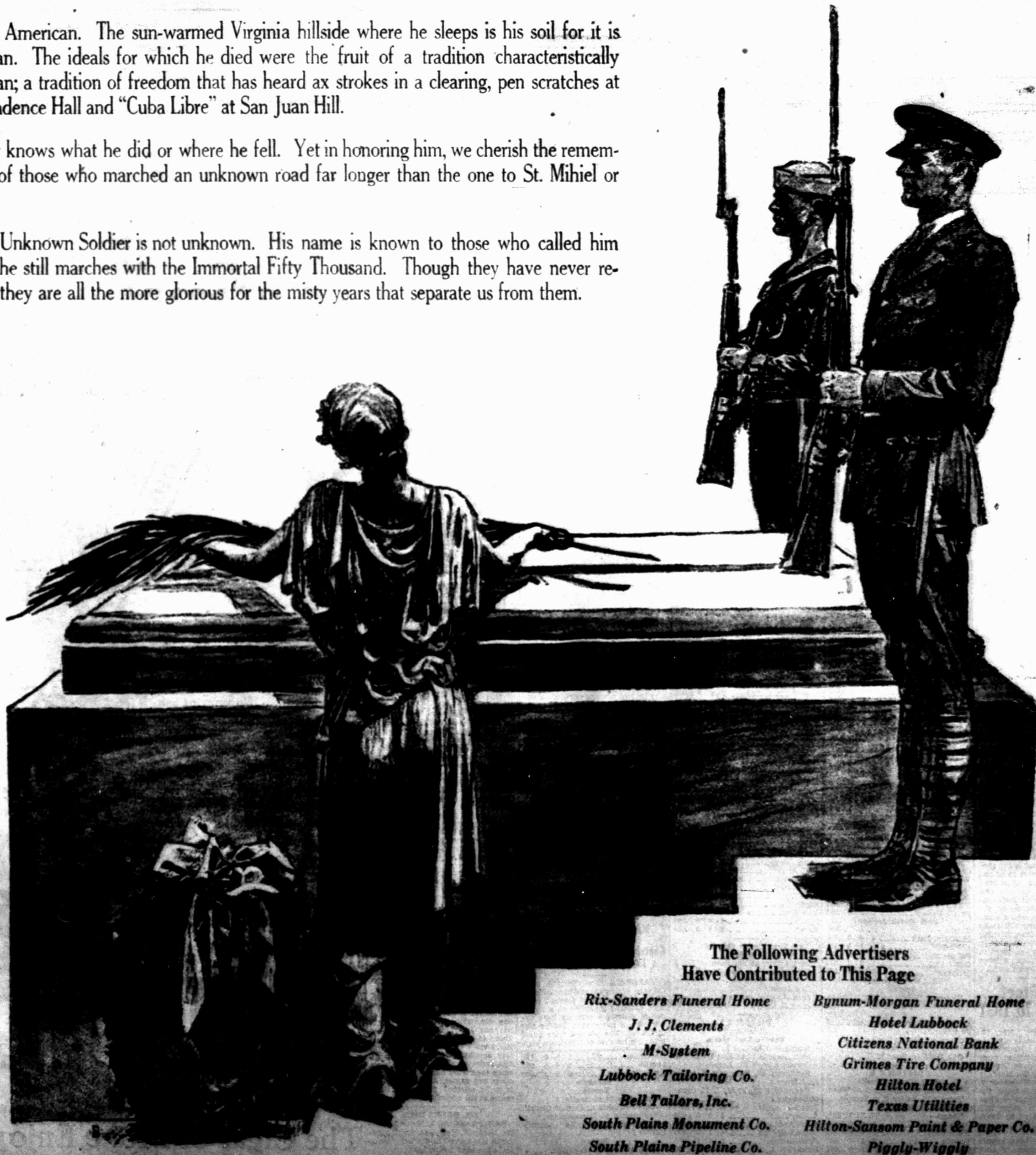

Tech Matadors Meet A.C.C. Wildcats Sixth Time Today

Class B Teams In Heated Argument For Sub-District Titles Today

Game to Start At 2:30 Sharp On Tech Field

Christians Arrive Yesterday for Sixth Meeting; A. C. C. Has Won Three Out of Five Games Since 1925

When the first whistle sounds on the Texas Tech athletic field this afternoon it will be the signal for the beginning of the sixth conflict between the two teams on the gridiron. Three times at Lubbock, twice at Abilene, and now again at Lubbock, the football teams of Abilene Christian College and Texas Technological College have met each year of Tech's existence. Only one other school, West Texas State Teachers college of Canyon, has met Tech each season in the last five. The count is even between Tech and Canyon, and if the Matadors win today the count will be even between Tech and A. C. C.

Wildcats Arrive Yesterday
Coach Bugs Morris and his Wildcats arrived in Lubbock yesterday afternoon, too late for a workout but, in time to get a good night's rest before the game today. They will take the field in a rather crippled state, having suffered rather severely from injuries all season. Possibly a dozen regulars will be on the sidelines this afternoon with injuries received in recent games. The crowning blow came week before last when Sammy Bryan, regular fullback, sustained a broken leg in the game with the T. C. U. Horned Frogs. Captain Frank Wortham, end and center, was also hurt in the game, but may be able to play. Brit Phippen, end and halfback, suffered from severe facial injuries, but is likely to get in the game today.

Confident of giving the local college a hard fight, the Tech players last night over their prospects. Like Tech, they will be fighting for their third victory of the season. In the season so far the Wildcats have won two games, like the Matadors, but have a slight edge over the last night when they played one scoreless tie wherein Tech has lost outright four of the six games played.

Matadors Practice Light
Coach Pete Cawthon and Del Morgan sent their Matadors through a light workout yesterday afternoon to top off six days of hard drill. They aspire to win today, not only for the sake of winning a game but to make it their third victory of the season and to even things up with the Wildcats. Last year saw the local go down in a heart-breaking 7 to 0 defeat after a field goal, kicked by Chubby Dewitt early in the game, led the scoring until late in the contest, when a pass, chucked by Keyes, resulted in a gain of 20 yards a touchdown, and a victory.

Team In Fair Condition
All of Cawthon's regulars, with the possible exception of Vinzant, will be ready to go today. Vinzant, hurt a shoulder in the Texas Mines game and has not been able to play standard football since. He was in the game for a time against the Canyon Teachers week before last, but was not able to play in his true style. Bill Teal and Harlan Howell probably will get the call for the wing positions today. The games will be called at 2:30 today.

When Tech and A. C. C. first met in 1925, the game was played at Abilene, and the Matadors took a 10 to 7 victory after a hard fought contest. In 1926 the teams played here and again Tech was victorious, this time to the tune of 29 to 6. Since then the Matadors have not been able to score a touchdown or win a victory over the Wildcats, though twice they have kicked field goals to prevent shutouts. In 1927 the teams played at Abilene for the last time, and A. C. C. took a 6 to 3 victory. The next season saw a powerful Wildcat team score a single touchdown to take a 7 to 0 victory over a weakening Tech aggregation. Never have the Christians been able to register more than one touchdown on Tech, though three times they won the games by crossing the Tech double stripe once.

Good seats left
Unfavorable weather conditions yesterday hurt the ticket sales considerably, and officials in charge of the sales announced last night that many desirable seats were to be had. The entire west stands have been reserved for Lubbock tickets and out of town visitors, with Tech students occupying the stands on the east side. It is thought that a great number of A. C. C. fans will make the trip to Lubbock this morning for the annual Armistice Day clash. Since it is the only college game to be played in this section, a large crowd is expected to be on hand.

Porkers to Meet Maroons in 1931

FAIRBANKS, Ark., Nov. 10.—University of Arkansas officials announced today the Razorbacks had accepted an invitation from Coach Alvin Engle of the University of Chicago to play the Maroons on the gridiron there November 7, 1931. The game would mark the Razorbacks' first appearance against the Ten competition since 1925 when they were defeated by Iowa, 26 to 0, at Iowa City.

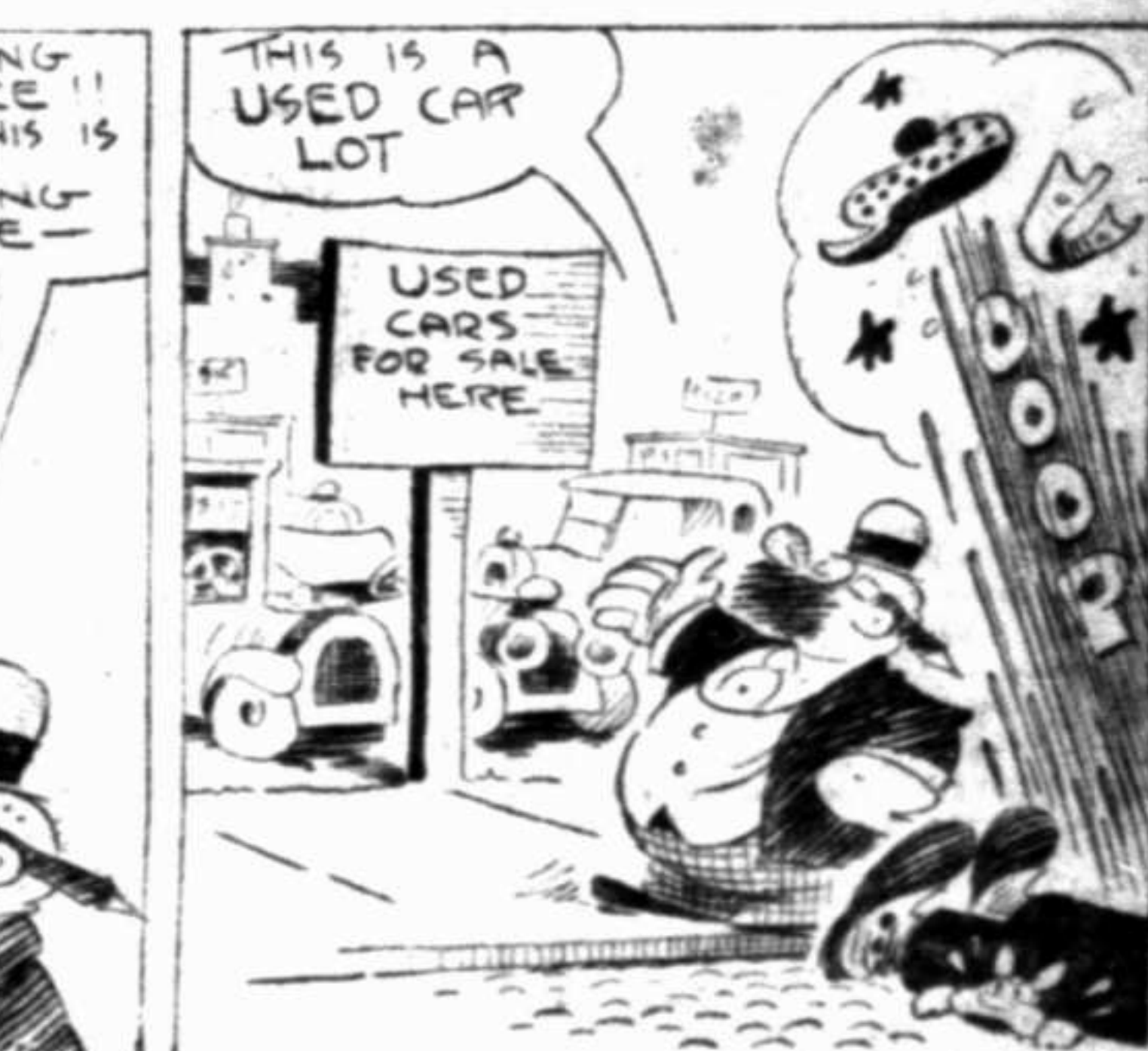

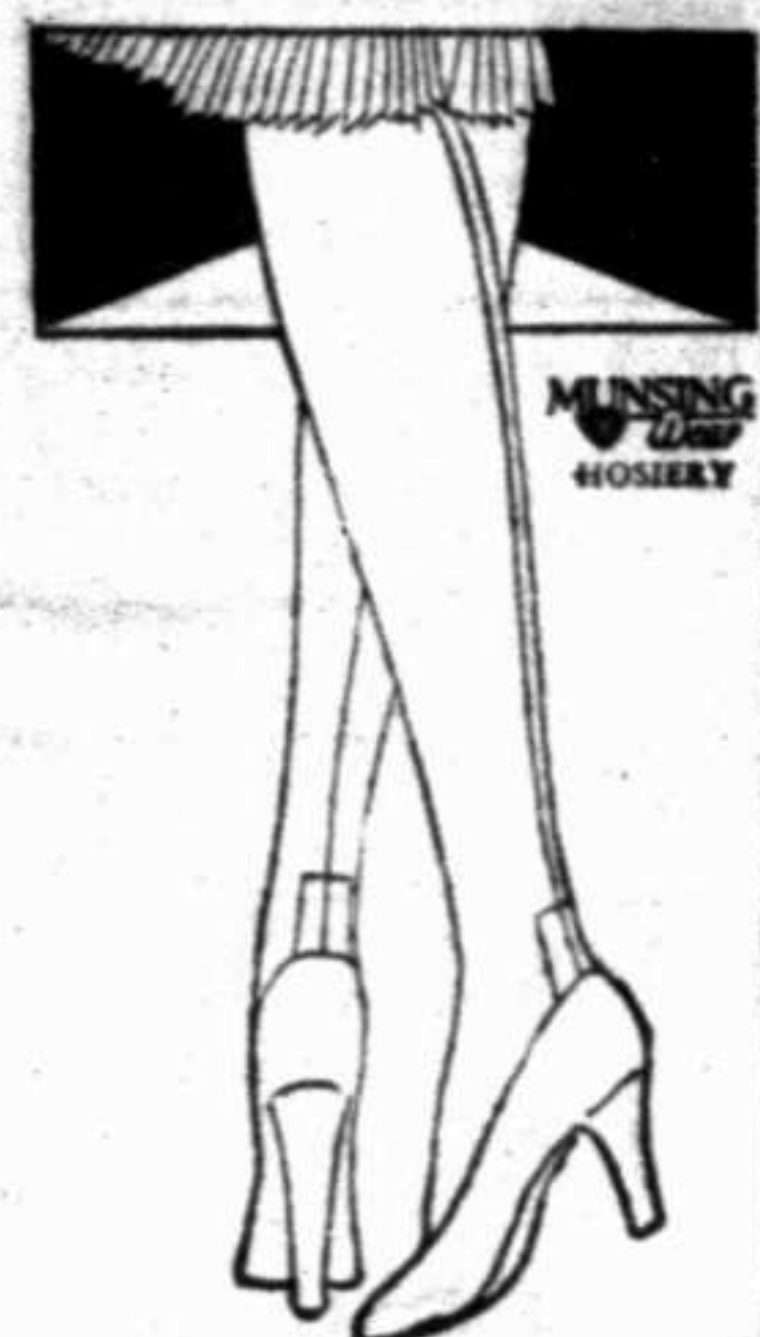

Television Transmission Problems are Studied by Broadcasting Company

NEW YORK, Nov. 10 (AP)—Problems of television transmission, and there are many of them, are being tackled in earnest by the National Broadcasting Company.

It was learned today that tests now under way in the heart of the Broadway theatrical district are dealing solely with attempts to learn just what is to be expected in sight sending.

For this purpose, the N. B. C. Times Square theater studio is being used as a laboratory, where television equipment has been set up. In addition to providing adequate space for the apparatus, which includes the short wave transmitters W2XBS and its antenna on the roof of the eighty-story building, there is ample provision to permit studio development work when that stage is reached.

The tests are entirely experimental, and do not touch on the de-

signing of the apparatus itself. That is being taken care of in the RCA Victor laboratories at Camden, N. J., where about everything imaginable within the present ken of engineers is being tried out.

Mexican Held In Automobile Crash Monday

Bond of \$200 Set for Joe Miller Held on Aggravated Assault Charges After S. O. Sanders Badly Injured

Bond of \$200 was set Monday afternoon for Joe Miller, Lubbock Mexican, being held in the Lubbock County jail on a charge of aggravated assault with a motor vehicle in connection with an accident which occurred yesterday morning in which S. O. Sanders, local man, was possibly critically injured. County authorities reported last night that Miller was still being held, having failed to furnish the necessary security.

Sanders is at the West Texas hospital suffering a fractured skull as result of the wreck which occurred at the intersection of 8th street and Texas avenue. Attendants at the hospital stated last night that seriousness of his injuries would not be determined until after about 48 hours, though he is considered to have a good chance for life if complications do not arise.

Grover Stevens, driver of the truck in which Sanders was riding, and Bob Evans, another passenger, were uninjured by impact of the two automobiles. Officers stated that the accident occurred when a light coupe, driven by Miller, struck the truck and turned it completely around, throwing Sanders into the pavement.

Miller told officers that his windshield was muddy and that he could not see the other vehicle.

Member of Capone Gang Is Arrested

CHICAGO, Nov. 10 (AP)—Sam Hunt, reputed member of the gang of Alphonse Capone, and one of more than a score of men named in vagrancy warrants, was arrested by detectives last night as he stood in a south side drug store, sipping a soda.

Hunt, once suspected, police said, of trying to slay Leo McGovern, bodyguard for George (Bugs) Moran, north side gang leader and foe of Capone, refused to explain his presence on the far south side, except to say he had gone to a moving picture show. He was taken to the detective bureau for questioning today.

THREE PERMITS ISSUED

Building Total Is Boosted by \$5,100 on Monday

Three building permits, totaling \$5,100, were issued at the city hall Monday to bring valuations in the city to \$13,750 for the month and to \$1,408,276 for the year.

HANDLES 30,000 BALES

Last Shows Largest Receipts For Lubbock Compress

More than 30,000 bales of cotton have been handled so far in the 1930 season through the Lubbock compress, it was learned Monday. Last week, with in excess of 9,000 bales through the local plant, was the largest week of the year and the largest week's receipts for two years.

Besides cotton from the local gins, the compress handles cotton from Shallowater, Wolfarth, Idolou and Levelland. The latter has been one of the largest contributors of cotton to the local plant.

War Buddies Recall Armistice Day

Former Service Men of Lubbock Tell of Experiences on Day Greatest War of All Times Was Ended 12 Years Ago

EDITOR'S NOTE: Twelve years ago today, Nov. 11, 1918, at 11 o'clock in the morning, (about 4 a. m. Lubbock time) the armistice that ended the World War became effective. Some of the former service men have here told where they were and what they did and saw, on that date.

"I was in Wainville, near St. Mihiel, in the St. Mihiel sector, when the armistice was signed, Nov. 11, 1918," Judge Homer L. Pharr said. "I was attached to division headquarters and we had copies of the armistice before us about 8 o'clock in the morning, three hours before it became effective. The last 20 minutes before 11 o'clock the boys turned loose everything they had from cap pistols to cannons. I guess, that night the quiet was awful. My buddy had located an old safe through in a stable, with one of the trough cut off and some hay in it. We put six or eight blankets over the hay and slept well. The barn had been used for three years by German officers."

"I learned about the armistice being signed at 5 o'clock in the afternoon of that day when I got back from a trip into the North Carolina hills, up from Charlotte," C. E. Luce, police officer, said. "I had gone up there for some real bad boys. They sure were bad, none of these so-called Oklahoma boys either. It was not until our bunch got back to camp that we learned about the war being over."

Tom Carter, of the Avalanche-Journal mechanical force, was a sailor and was in the Atlantic when the war ended. "We were at the Azores when it was signed," he said, referring to the armistice. "I was on the U. S. S. Tonopah. A couple of days before we got a report that the armistice had been signed and we celebrated. Then we heard the report was false. The second time we had to celebrate all over again."

"I was near Verdun. I forgot the name of the town. A. L. Grollman, state highway engineer, said, 'I was with the 36th division and my outfit was due to go back into the line on the 13th of November. We had just come out of the Meuse-Argonne and had been recruited up. After the armistice was signed, we went to Espinoux, where some of the boys stole some old wine. The owner, a woman, complained and after keeping us in the guard house for a while, we got out by paying \$25 each. Some of that wine she said was 300 years old. The bottles had cobwebs on them.'"

"I was in Camp Humphreys, Virginia, drilling rookies for service overseas," Guy R. Johnson, of the state highway department, said. "I had had some previous army experience and they put me to work drilling rookies. We didn't get off all day kept on drilling. You can imagine what those fellows felt like."

"I was in Camp Grant, Rockford, Ill., on Armistice day, 1918," L. H. Quinn, publisher of the Avalanche-Journal, said.

"I was teaching in A and M college, Bryan, on Armistice day, 1918," J. Bryan Miller, city manager, said. "My job was to instruct the boys in the student officers corps and I was giving signal instruction."

"Had just retired for the night in the company barracks at Camp Travis, San Antonio, when I heard that the armistice was signed," W. C. Holden, professor of history at Texas Tech, said. "I was a member of company G, 88th infantry."

"My outfit, the 144th infantry of the 36th division, was in Tricourt, Judge Clark Mullican said. "We had just come from the front line and had gotten our recruits and were to go back up to Metz. There was a banquet that night by the

French and American officers. We had a good meal and some wine and everybody made a speech. The French spoke in French and the Americans in English. We didn't understand them and they didn't understand us. But we applauded every time a man spoke."

"My outfit was in Bourbon les Bains, below Grandcourt, with the remount service," O. B. Conley, chief deputy sheriff, said. "It's been so long since I thought of the town I had forgotten where it was."

"I was down at S. M. U. Dallas, a member of the A. O. T. C., said Gerald Wren, of the chamber of commerce. "I became old enough in September and got into the training camp in October of 1918."

"I was down in Guatamo Bay, Cuba, with the marines," E. Paul Carter of the Avalanche-Journal circulation department, said. "We were at Deer Pass."

"My regiment, the same as Judge Mullican's, was getting ready for another drive," Charles Whitacre, former post commander, said. "We had been up in front and were about 10 miles back of the line. Our regiment had been in the Meuse-Argonne fighting."

"Camp Travis, Texas," Amos Howard, county clerk, said. "We were in training there for overseas."

"I was at Charenton-le-Roi, near Verdun," A. M. Scott, attorney, said. "And it was the first day that American airplanes, about which we had heard so much for months, were seen over that sector. You could not find them there at all before Armistice day."

"I was with the 144th infantry, 36th division, in the Argonne, on Armistice day," Durwood Bradley, district attorney, said.

"We celebrated out in San Diego, Cal., Armistice day," Roy D. McKinney, of the West Texas Gas company, said. "We got short leave that day and went down town. Everybody there bought face powder or talcum powder and the like, and threw it over every one else. People looked like they had fallen into a flour barrel."
