

Giles Says Texas' Case Is Different

Congress Called States' Last Hope In Battle For Tidelands

AUSTIN, Aug. 14. —Congress is "the last hope" for the states to re-establish their lost titles to tidelands, in the opinion of Land Commissioner Bascom Giles. In the California tidelands case, title to the submerged areas was held to be in the Federal government. Giles says that despite an altogether different legal situation in Texas than in other states, the Supreme Court is so sweeping in its opinion that "even ownership is held immaterial" if the Federal government decides it should have the land.

The decision, which has raised a controversy across the nation and was the subject of a resolution adopted by the Governor's Convention in Salt Lake City on the initiative of Governor Beauford Jester, directly affects only a small number of Texas oil wells. Giles explained that most of the offshore drilling in Texas has been in bays and inlets rather than in the Gulf proper, which would be covered by the language in the California case. Texas has leased only thirteen tracts out in the Gulf, and only three wells have been brought in on these tracts. However, on all submerged areas excluding the riverbeds located inland, there are 164 producing oil wells on state-owned tracts, which bring in royalties of around \$200,000 a month.

And, Giles charges, "this is just the first step. What I fear is that some bright young attorney general will step in one of these days and assert the Federal government's claim to the bays and inlets as well as the actual open sea."

What the oil companies think of the relation of the California case to Texas tidelands—despite the difference in the bases for the respective claims of the state—may be shown November 4.

On that date, the school land board will sell several hundred leases. While the land to be offered in this lease sale has not yet been designated, Giles said that it would include considerable

areas in the open sea.

The chief difference between the Texas claim to its offshore lands and that of other states is in the fact that the Texas boundaries were established by conquest.

Lawyers say that in international law, the strongest possible claim is that established by conquest. The Texas title was established by war with Mexico, and the boundary line, 10.56 miles into the ocean was fixed in the treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo, and later in official documents in 1850.

California's title, on the other

hand, was established by purchase.

Moreover, Giles points out, the state of Texas specifically retained title to its public lands—and a whopping public debt—when it went into the union; while other states gave over both their public lands and their debts to the United States.

But, he thinks, the time for discussing the legal questions is passed. He believes that Congress should, once and for all, tell the Supreme Court that it must stop legislating and limit itself to construing the law.

LIGHTS PLAN RETURN TRIP TO TEXAS BY MULE DRAWN WAGON

SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 14. —The John Lights are going back to Texas the way they came to Washington state—by mule-drawn covered wagon. And the near 70-year-old couple figures they'll be back in Corpus Christi by Christmas although it's more than 2,000 miles away by the route they've chosen.

The Lights made the long trek from Texas to Dayton, Wash., just a little more than a year ago and planned to settle there. A few days ago they set out on the return trip. Light said he found the climate in southeastern Washington affected his health.

Besides their span of mules, the couple is taking along on the trip two milk goats and a dog. They stopped overnight at suburban Dishman last night to have their wagon tires reset at

Torrey's blacksmith shop. They plan to return to Texas by way of Montana and Kansas. Light says the mules will clip off better than 25 miles a day and at worst it shouldn't be long after Christmas when they pull into Corpus Christi.

Bucket Trade

Lions Observe Charter Program

In a program symbolizing the 18th anniversary of the chartering of the Big Spring Lions club, early members of the organization were honored Wednesday.

The club was chartered officially on Aug. 9, 1929, the third of the four service clubs in operation now to be organized. The first Lions club in Big Spring, however, was organized in 1923 and functioned for two years.

Dr. C. W. Deats was the only one of the 38 charter members who was present at the Wednesday meeting. Cecil Collings, who was the first president, is the only other charter member now active in the club.

In recounting difficulties which saw the active membership dwindle to 10 at one time during the depth of the depression, Joe Pickle paid a tribute to the charter members for their initiative, tenacity, experience and emphasis, even in the midst of trouble, on service.

Accompanied by their instructor, Mrs. Ann Gibson Houser, Jan Master, Wanda Lou Petty, Ann Crocker, Barbara Greer, Penny Roberts and Susan Houser, sang three numbers. Reports on appropriation of \$300 for high school campus beautification and approval of participation in the DDT fog machine purchase were made by Dan Conley, secretary. Walter Phillips reported on a publicity committee meeting.

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State Schools To Co-operate In Study Of Cattle Deaths

LUBBOCK, Aug. 14. —Arrangements have been completed by Texas Technological College officials for cooperative research studies with Texas A. M. College in an effort to determine causes of cattle deaths resulting from grazing on winter wheat.

The group plans to study 8,500 acres of land at the Pantex Ordnance Plant near Amarillo. A use permit from the War Assets Administration authorizing the college to conduct experiments there for seven years upon payment of one dollar to the WAA was signed by Dr. W. M. Whyburn. He said the college has no additional financial obligations on the project.

Dean of Agriculture W. L. Stangel said upwards of 6,000 acres of this land were planted in wheat last year and averaged better than 19 bushels per acre in dry land farming.

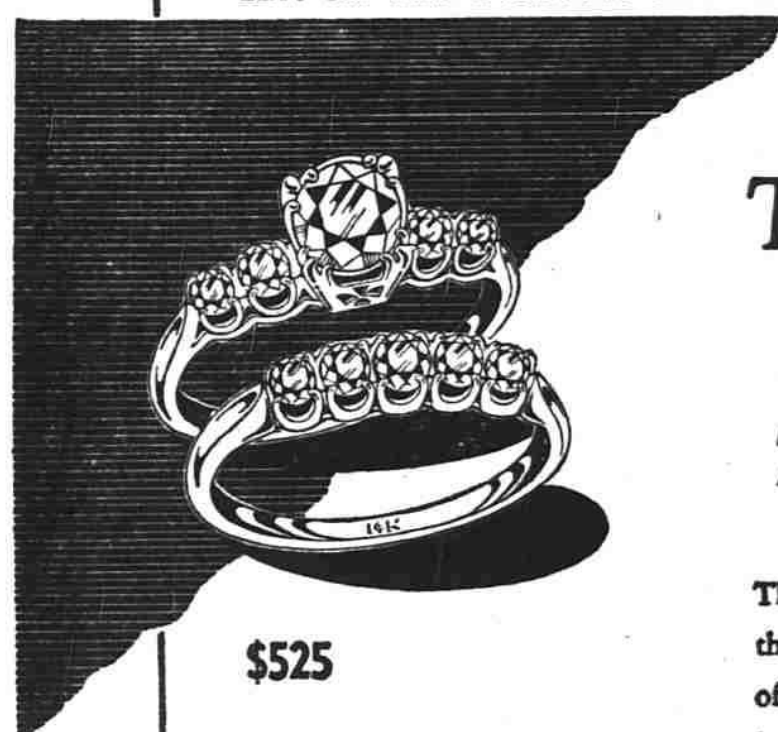
Present plans are for the colleges to arrange for farmers now working there to engage in cooperative farming with the schools to grow wheat for the research studies.

Stangel, in his capacity of director of farms, will be in general charge of Tech's operations there. Although complete details of the proposed program have not yet been worked out, it has been agreed that A. M. will provide personnel and laboratory supplies and that Tech will supervise growing of wheat and make arrangements for cattle to be provided as needed in the research. Stangel said a number of livestock owners in the region have agreed to co-operate with the college in making cattle available.

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Soil Conservation News -

Super Phosphate Is Best For Vetch, Clover, Winter Peas

The John Davis Feed and Seed Store in Big Spring is getting a carload of 20 percent super phosphate around the Aug. 20, reports Davis.

The super phosphate is recommended for legume cover crops of vetch, clover and winter peas at the rate of 150 to 200 lbs. per acre on most soils within the Martin-Howard Soil Conservation District. These recommendations are based on averages from about 25 soil analyses that have been made this year by the Soil Conservation Service laboratory in Fort Worth.

Since fertilizer attachments are not generally available for grain drills or row planters, several farmers have successfully applied super phosphate with their drills prior to seeding. In all cases, best results have been obtained from commercial fertilizers when applied as a side dressing, not over six inches from the seeding or row and covered about the same depth as the seeding.

A. H. Shroyer, a district co-operator in the Vealmoor conservation group, is sub-surface tilling his farmland with a chisel type plow this summer in preparation for early planting of small

grain cover crops and temporary pasture.

Construction of stock tanks began on several ranches in the district last week. The Wilson brothers are building a 5500-cubic yard tank on their ranch in the County Line Ranch group. The tank will be dug at least 20 feet deep to insure a permanent water supply for the livestock, Wilson states.

Binie White is enlarging one of the stock tanks on his ranch in the Vincent Ranch group by digging it deeper and adding 2000 yards to the dam. When complete the tank will have 3500 cubic yards in it.

A diversion terrace laid out by the SCS will be constructed to give more acres of water drainage to the stock tank.

Lloyd Branon also in the Vincent Ranch group plans to increase the size of a stock tank on his ranch by raising the dam and spillway.

Three more miles of terraces have been laid out on the cultivated land of S. L. Lockhart in the County Line Ranch group. Lockhart is also building terraces above his cultivated land designed to spread extra water on a level field.

Among conservation plans approved by district supervisors last week at their regular meeting were the farm plans of G. B. Vinson, L. G. Adkins, Morris Patterson and W. F. Heckler and the ranch plan of Steve Calverley, Jr. Range surveys have been completed on the 50-section Douthitt ranch near Forsan. Information furnished by the range surveys, including present range condition and potential production of the range, will be used by Claude Collins, Jr., operator of the ranch, in working out a well rounded range management program designed to improve the range and conserve soil and water.

Du Pont Planning Tetraethyl Marketing

WILMINGTON, Del., Aug. 14. (AP) - The Du Pont Company has designed five district offices and managers to aid in the marketing of tetraethyl lead anti-knock compound for motor and aviation fuels. Du Pont has manufactured tetraethyl at Deepwater Point, N. J., for 24 years. Its present contract with the Ethyl corporation expires at the end of 1947 and it will then sell the compounds to the oil refining industry.

District headquarters and managers will include: Tulsa, Okla., for the Mid-Continent district, Charles Wirth III. Houston, for the Gulf Coast district, Joseph A. Hyland.

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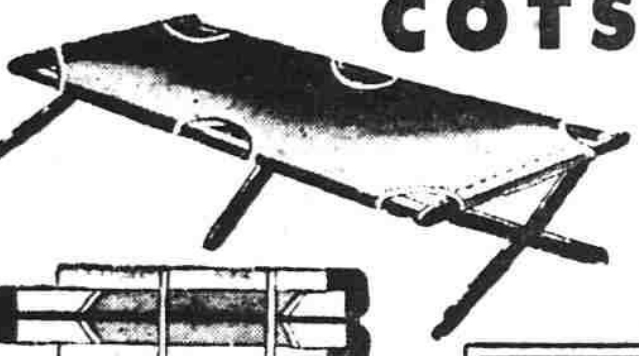
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WORKER ELECTROCUTED

Future Action Challenges Nation

America's Allies Against Reds Are Growing Steadily Weaker

Weaker grow the reeds upon which American leans in its rivalry with Soviet Russia. Britain and China are two vital examples. Without the bulwark of Britain, what would keep the governments of France and most of western Europe from going communist? Without the Chinese Nanking government, what would stop communism on the Asiatic continent? Last week British power shrank again—or rather once more recognized that it must withdraw another step from its old role as a great power. This confronts the United States with another decision on whether and how to take up the slack—just as an earlier contraction of British power in Greece last winter evoked the phase of American foreign policy known as the Truman Doctrine.

Now Britain must again adjust to reality, must reduce her troops, meaning she may leave another politico-power vacuum in critical areas like Italy and Austria. Britain wants America to shoulder more occupation costs in Germany. Britain relaxes her hold over India at a time when strife in another em-

pire—Indonesia—stirs echoes of racial hatred and colonial unrest in all empires. Britain's shortage of U. S. dollars can mean more American loans, but also reduced American exports which already have declined.

In Asia, America's largest and most unstable ally is China. China is rent with a civil war that is partly a reflection of Russo-American rivalry, which automatically puts a certain premium on conflict in China. How goes it with this American ally, the Nanking govern-

ment? Allowing for Nanking's natural inclination to display its needs while the Wedemeyer mission is around, it is clear that Nanking is far worse off than when undeclared civil war first flamed with the communists after Japan surrendered.

The question of what to do in both Asia and Europe confronts America in acute form. Congress is off on vacation, among the people. Are the American people ready for the question?

Governor Takes Vacation

Jester Family Is Off To Guatemala

AUSTIN, Tex., Aug. 14. (P)—Gov. Beauford H. Jester with his wife, his daughter Joan and Beauford Jr., was on his way today to Guatemala for a week's vacation. The Jester family left here last night by plane after the Governor had arrived earlier in the afternoon from his trip to Great Falls, Montana, where he successfully sought support of the interstate oil compact commission for federal legislation which would deed submerged lands to states. Before his departure on his

brief vacation, the Governor related that his plans on his return include consultation with members of the Texas delegation in Congress on legislation to protect the state's interests in the tidelands matter, visits to eleemosynary institutions, and a study at first hand of all services and functions of the state.

He said the full schedule for the remainder of the summer and fall may preclude his acceptance of further invitations to local celebrations, fairs and meetings, and that it might be necessary to cancel some engagements already made tentatively.

While in Guatemala, the Jesters will be the guests of Ambassador R. J. Kyle, former Dean of Agriculture of Texas A. and M. College. They plan to leave on the return trip to Texas Aug. 21.

Many Applicants Are Unqualified For Jobs In Highway Patrol

AUSTIN, Aug. 14. (P)—Too many unqualified applicants are "wasting their time" in seeking state highway patrol jobs, Homer Garrison, director of the state department of public safety declared. "We want as many applicants as we can get—so long as they are among the finest young men in Texas," he said. "We are already receiving a lot of applications, but many of the applicants can not qualify." The 50th Legislature voted increased appropriations for 200 new patrolmen. Examination of candidates will begin in September and four training schools of about 50 men each will begin about Dec. 1, Garrison said.

Strick Regulations For School Buses Instituted In Law

AUSTIN, Aug. 14. (P)—Strict regulations for school buses, drawn up under authority of the uniform traffic code enacted by the 50th Legislature, have been announced by State Superintendent of Public Instruction L. A. Woods.

Under new regulations, full responsibility is placed on the school bus driver for the safety of the child en route from home or school.

Every driver is required to have training in first aid and to carry valid certificates of completion of standard and advanced courses taught by the American Red Cross.

Inspection of buses prior to the opening of school each fall by the state highway patrol is also required.

Latin American Wins Scholarship

LUBBOCK, Aug. 14. (P)—Manuel Garcia, 19-year-old Texan of Mexican ancestry, this fall will realize a long-cherished hope of going to college.

He has been awarded the Mr. and Mrs. Hiram Parks scholarship, which will provide him \$350 next year for college expenses and a like amount annually for the following three years so long as he maintains a grade average of C and otherwise remains in good academic standing.

Mr. and Mrs. Parks, residents of Lubbock and Brownfield, established the four-year scholarships in 1945 to be awarded annually to a high school graduate on the Panhandle or South Plains who is of Mexican descent.

Physical Check-Ups Urged For Children

AUSTIN, Aug. 14. (P)—Complete health checkups for school children before they return to school next month are advised by state health officer George W. Cox.

A child is not really "ready for school," Dr. Cox said, until he has had a complete medical and dental checkup, including eyes, ears, nose, throat and teeth, and complete protective treatment against preventable diseases.

"The earlier that physical defects are corrected, the better chance the child has for academic progress and for social and emotional development," Dr. Cox said.

New College Has Acting President

HOUSTON, Aug. 14. (P)—Speculation continued today as to whom will take over the presidency of the new Texas State University for Negroes. Yesterday, Dr. Allen E. Norton Jr., 37, Dean of the Houston College for Negroes, was named acting president of the institution.

Craig F. Cullinan, Houston oil man and chairman of the university's board of directors, said Norton will remain head of the institution until the president, chosen Tuesday by the board, takes over the duties.

Cullinan gave no indication as to whom the new president is or when his name will be disclosed. He said Norton has been "loaned" to the university by the Houston independent school district.

Universal Training Backers Plan Action

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14. (P)—Congressional backers of universal military training disclosed plans today to carry their case to the people through each of the 48 governors.

The lawmakers have enlisted the aid of a national organization, as yet unidentified, to send out letters to the state executives urging them to whip up sentiment for the legislation.

The governors adopted a resolution advocating universal training at their July conference in Salt Lake City.

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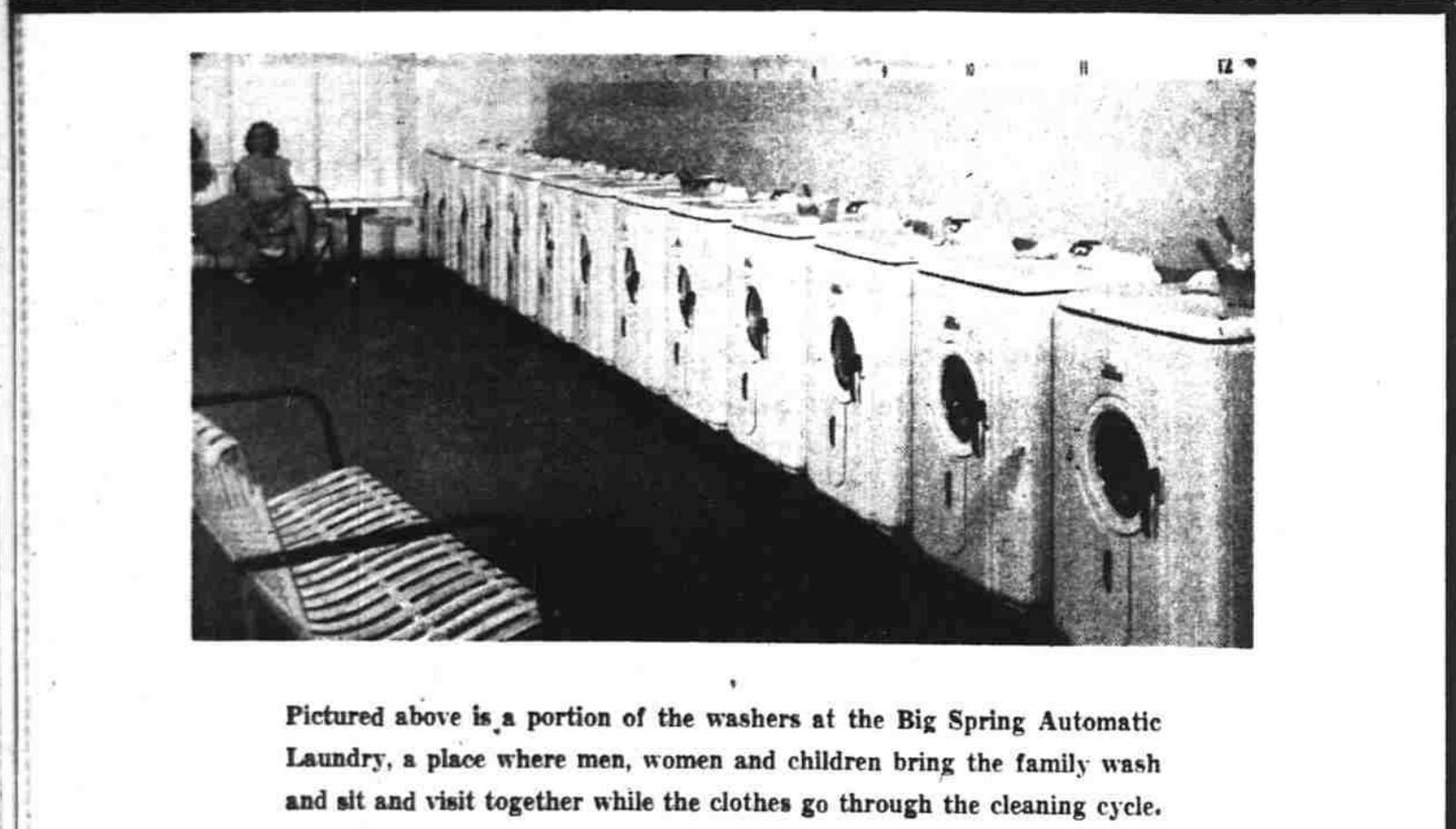

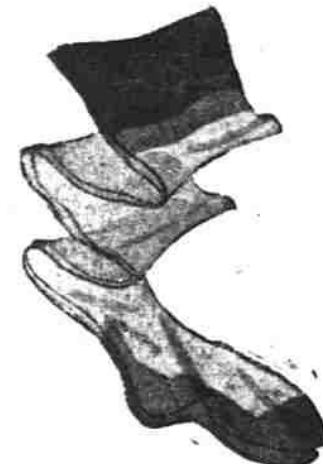

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Iced Tea Perks Up Hot Weather Parties

Come over for tea," in summer, usually means iced tea, though there are those among our British and other European cousins who consider the icing of that beverage a barbaric custom. We in the United States, however, drink more tea iced than hot. Iced tea is a delectable thing when the weather is warm and sultry.

Make your tea strong—double strength, in fact—and make it fresh for icing. Never make it and store it in the refrigerator for hours. No improvement, only deterioration of flavor, results.

Let's think up a good variety of foods to go with this iced tea party. First come the sandwiches.

Get some of those very small

loaves of salty rye bread with caraway seeds in it and spread them with cream cheese which has had chives chopped up in it.

Tuna fish or salmon, mixed with mayonnaise and a dash of chopped fresh dill, are both nice tea sandwiches.

Thin, thin slices of cucumber, spread lightly with sour cream and treated to a grind of fresh pepper, are awfully good between dark pumpernickel bread.

A dish of red caviar set in a bowl of crushed ice, accompanied by a bowl of sour cream, a little dish of chopped chives, and a plate of crackers, offers the makings of a delicious tea accompaniment.

For the sweets, cookies are a tasty touch.

Gelatin Loaves Tasty On A Summer Day

There's nothing cooler looking or tastier on a sultry day than a jellied meat or fish loaf. These can be served with cold cooked or raw vegetable salad—provided you serve a hot soup first, or something else hot with the meal. On the other hand, a very good way to arrange the essential hot dish in every meal is to serve the following:

Macedoine of Vegetables
1 1/2 cups cooked green beans
1 1/2 cups diced cooked carrots
1 1/2 cups cooked celery crescents
1-3 cup melted butter or vitaminized margarine

Garlic salt
Pepper, freshly ground
Combine hot vegetables with butter or margarine and season with garlic salt and pepper. Serve in individual cups or dishes, so that the hot vegetables will not spoil the cold entree, which is inevitable if they are served on the same plate.

Here's a delicious sauce to serve with molded meat or fish entrees.
Sour Cream Sauce
1 cup sour cream
1 teaspoon grated onion
1 teaspoon finely chopped olives
1 tablespoon white wine vinegar
1/2 teaspoon salt
4 stuffed olives, chopped
Freshly ground black pepper
Combine all ingredients, beating them together well. Serve icy cold.

Here are some of those suggested cold entrees:
Summer Meat Loaf
2 tablespoons gelatin
1/4 cup cold water
1 cup hot veal stock or chicken bouillon
1/4 cup real mayonnaise
1-3 cup sandwich spread
3 cups finely chopped cooked veal
1/4 cup chopped pimiento
2 tablespoons minced parsley
1/2 teaspoon salt
Boston lettuce

Soften gelatin in cold water. Add hot stock or bouillon and stir until dissolved. Cool slightly and add mayonnaise and sandwich spread. Combine veal, pimiento, parsley, onion and salt, and fold in mayonnaise mixture. Pack in 5x9 loaf pan which has been rinsed in cold water. Chill until firm. Unmold on chop plate. Garnish with Boston

lettuce and additional chopped pimiento and minced parsley.

Meatless Day Mianstay

Menu mainstay for meatless days combines thrift with convenience, assures savory eating. Cook according to directions on package one 8-oz. package elbow macaroni. Over boiling water melt 3 tablespoons fat. Blend in 1-3 cup flour. Add 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon prepared brown mustard, 1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce and 2 cups milk. Cook until thickened, stirring constantly. Grate 1/4 lb. American cheese. Add to sauce, stirring until blended. To macaroni add 2 tablespoons finely chopped onion, 1-3 cup chopped pimiento, 2 eggs well beaten, and 1/2 of the cheese sauce. Mix well. Pour into greased loaf pan. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 40 to 45 minutes. To remaining cheese sauce add 1-4 cup pimiento. Serve hot on macaroni loaf. Serves 6 to 8.

Halibut Mousse
1 package gelatin
1 cup hot water
1 cup cold water
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1 tablespoon vinegar
1 teaspoon salt
cup mayonnaise
1 cup shredded cooked halibut
1 cup cooked peas
2 tablespoons chopped pimiento
2 tablespoons chopped fresh dill (optional)
Dissolve gelatin in cold water. Add hot water, lemon juice, vinegar and salt. Cool. When mixture begins to thicken, fold in other ingredients. Turn into mold which has been rinsed in cold water. Chill until firm. Serve on a bed of crisp lettuce, accompanied by a dish of mayonnaise.

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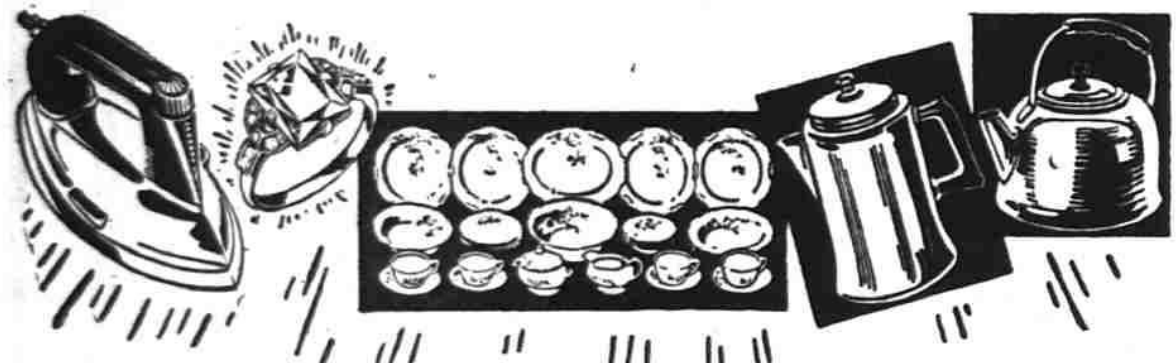
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Rescue At Zoo Trunked Up Affair

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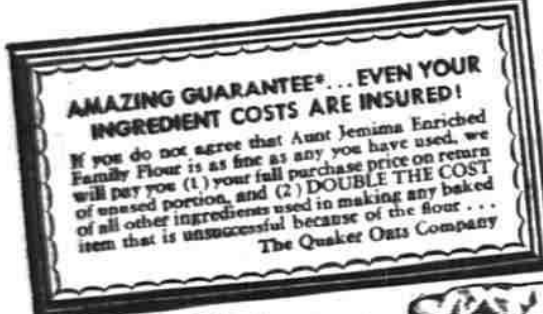
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Get Eggs Into Salads As It Adds Variety

Sure! Everybody's had egg salad—particularly in drugstore sandwiches. It means hard-cooked eggs, chopped coarsely, combined with mayonnaise and served with lettuce between pieces of bread, or just in a bowl. It's good, too.

However, there are more ways than one to get eggs into your salads, and since they offer enough protein so that you can serve such salads, eliminating the meat from a meal, it's good to know a variety of ways to use them in fine summer dishes.

Mixed Green Salad with Eggs

Lettuce
Dandelion greens
Sorrel

Fresh basil (or dried)

2 tomatoes, peeled and quartered

1 avocado, sliced

2 hard-cooked eggs

1 small tin anchovy fillets, chopped

Simple French dressing

First make the simple French dressing in your wooden bowl, using oil and vinegar in the proportion of three to one, salt, and freshly ground pepper. I suggest that you add nothing more, so that the full delicate flavor of the greens isn't overcome by the dressing. Let the dressing stand at least a half hour before adding the greens. They should have been well washed, drained, and crisped in the refrigerator for some hours. Tear the greens with your hands right into the bowl. Add the tomatoes, the hard-cooked eggs, chopped fine, and the anchovy fillets. If fresh basil is used, chop it fine. Remember that dried herbs are far stronger than fresh and go very easy in adding them—half as much as you'd

think is a good rule to follow. Toss the ingredients now in the bowl with the dressing and when every leaf is coated, slice the avocado over the top. Sprinkle with a dash of paprika for color.

Western Cottage Salad

1/4 cup cottage cheese

1/4 cup chopped boiled ham

1/4 teaspoon salt

1/2 cup chopped ripe olives

2 tablespoons mayonnaise

1/2 cup chopped celery

1/4 cup cooked peas

Salad greens for garnish

1 hard-cooked egg, grated

Paprika

Combine cheese, ham, salt, olives, mayonnaise, celery and peas and blend lightly. On individual salad plates arrange crisp greens as a base and in the center place mounds of the first mixture. Sprinkle grated egg over the cheese mounds and give the final decoration with a dash of paprika.

Frappe Makes Novel Party Refreshment

Need something novel to serve as the first course for dinner, for bridge party refreshments, or when the club meets at your house? Then Tomato Cucumber Frappe is the recipe you need. It has the sunny taste of ripe tomatoes, captured in crimson systals that melt smoothly on your tongue. Yet it has a robust pungency and tang that call for hearty partners, too—accompaniments like shrimp impaled on toothpicks to be dipped in Russian dressing... sharp cheese spreads on salted wafers... olives broiled in bacon blankets... bar-b-q poles of tiny sausage slices alternated, on toothpicks, with gherkin slivers.

Tomato Cucumber Frappe

Pare and cut in dice-size cubes

1 medium sized cucumber then mix with—

2 cups tomato juice

2 tablespoons cider vinegar

1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce

Let stand 2 hours; strain; pour into refrigerator tray and chill to a mushy consistency. Serve in sherbet glasses and pass a tray of canapés or small sandwiches if you want some accompanying swish.

Palomino Show Taking Shape

Crops In Wolf Pens

Zoo Keepers In Berlin Monkey With Vegetable Gardens, Too

BERLIN—Thousands of Berliners who visit the zoo these days to see what's left of its once-great animal collection remark that the zoological gardens are doing a good job as a vegetable garden.

With its animal population down nearly 90 percent due to wartime losses and dispersals and postwar starvation, the big zoo has lots of vacant yards and pens. But enterprising keepers are permitting very little wasted space.

Wolfing the Beans
In what were once wolf pens they are raising healthy-looking crops of cabbage, tomatoes and beans. The former giraffe house has a yardful of corn, beans and beets. Food-conscious adults admire nearby tomato patches while their chattering children cluster about the monkey cages.

"Who harvests it?" said an attendant. "Why, we people who work here get it. We planted it and we guard it against thievery." Despite its decimated population the zoo is still a popular place, especially on week-ends. Located in the British sector of the city, at the end of once-glittering Kurfuerstendamm, it is visited also by hundreds of occupation troops and their dependents. On a summer Sunday one frequently sees Soviet army officers and their wives and children strolling the zoo paths or sitting listening to a band concert in the open air restaurant.

Animals Manky
Foreigners, and Germans too, find the once-gaudy zoo a pretty tawdry place now. Some of its buildings were bombed and the surrounding panorama visible over its walls is one of bomb-blasted buildings. Most of the remaining animals are scrawny and mangy. The beer and tea served at the restaurant are weak.

In a city where several hundred people are reported afflicted with "Chinese Beggar disease," attributable to eating certain wild herbs, zoo-goers smile wryly at the signs which remain on cages from former days: "Please don't feed the animals."

But the children still love the zoo, though many go away disappointed because it no longer has an elephant. Huge "siam"—the elephant—died last winter, some said of hunger. But he wasn't the only victim of the savage winter. The zoo has only one goat now and a lot fewer birds. Thieves got the others and they landed in the cooking pots.

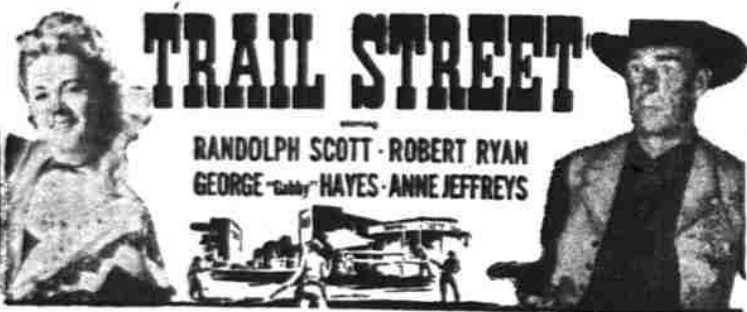

University Of Houston May Change Name

HOUSTON, Aug. 14. (U.P.)—The executive committee of the Houston chamber of commerce has approved a proposal to change the name of the University of Houston to Cullen University, honoring Mr. and Mrs. H. R. Cullen, Houston philanthropists.

The Cullens have made gifts to the university totaling approximately \$5,000,000 and the school is expected to benefit greatly from the recently announced Cullen foundation which oil properties with an estimated value of \$160,000,000 were given for Texas educational and medical institutions.

Contract Awarded For Chlorine Plant

HOUSTON, Aug. 14. (U.P.)—Tellepsen Construction Co., of Houston has been awarded a contract for construction of a \$4,500,000 chlorine plant at Freeport for the Dow Chemical Company, Dr. A. P. Beutel, manager of Dow's Texas division said Wednesday.

Beutel said the plant construction was to have started in February but was delayed by labor and material shortages. The project includes six buildings of concrete, steel and masonry but is primarily one of foundation work, piping and tank erection.

Completion of the project will require about one year, Beutel said.

Old Seattle Star Suspends Publication

SEATTLE, Aug. 14. (U.P.)—The Seattle Star, founded in 1899, announced it has suspended publication after Wednesday's editions because of rising costs of operation combined with the world-wide newspaper shortage.

At the same time, the Seattle Times announced it would purchase the remaining newspaper owned by the Star.

A formal front page statement said "terrific increases in every item that goes into the publishing of a newspaper, chiefly labor and newsprint, have brought this industry to a point where only those with heavy volume could survive."

Colorado City Police Receive New Uniforms

COLORADO CITY, Aug. 14. (U.P.)—For the first time in the history of this city, police soon will be sporting uniforms.

Mayor Peter Martin said that new uniforms, made of serge and are being altered. Chief Dick Hickman will sport a gold badge, other members silver badges on the uniforms.

An addition to the force is A. J. Morris, 24, holder of the Purple Heart in World War II, who succeeds "Hard" Henderson, long time member of the staff.

Aldermen have set a new policy of sick leave and vacations with pay to regularly employed municipal workers. The board also took under consideration a plea by Jim Ferguson, county veteran's service officer, for employment of veterans under the rehabilitation program.

Twenty Buses To Serve Mitchell County Children

COLORADO CITY, Aug. 14. — Mitchell county schools, set to open Sept. 8 will operate under what County Superintendent Roy D. Coles terms a "100 per cent motorized set-up."

Twenty school buses will transport some 840 pupils to various schools in the county. Fourteen are practically new.

By districts, bus totals stack up like this: Loraine five, Hyman two, Buford two, Carr, one, Westbrook two, Loran, Seven Wells, Luoney, Space, Cuthbert-Rogers, Payne and Horn's chapel one each.

There are three high schools at Colorado City, Loraine and Westbrook so that those in western Mitchell go to Westbrook, in central Mitchell to Colorado City and eastern Mitchell to Loraine. Only Buford and Seven Wells communities operate grade school buses.

Dorn and Longfellow operate rural grade schools for Negro children.

Mexico Broadens Gambling Rules

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 14. (U.P.)—Licensed gambling in Mexico was broadened Wednesday by presidential decree but strict control and governmental share in the profits are provided.

Under the new regulations the department of the interior (Gobernacion) may license many forms of gambling, including horse racing and lotteries, already permitted in limited form.

Specifically mentioned for possible legal betting are chess, checkers, dominoes, dice, bowling, billiards, all forms of ball games, target shooting, races of persons, vehicles and animals, wrestling, boxing, sports events, raffles, lotteries including the present national lottery. No betting will be permitted except in those categories.

All betting must yield a profit to the government to be used by the department of health and public assistance, as is done now with the returns from racing and the lottery and also from the tax on bullfights and similar events.

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Dates Set For Second Annual 4-H Rodeo

DATE for the second annual 4-H club rodeo has been set for Aug. 22, it was announced Wednesday.

The event will be held at the rodeo grounds and will include traditional contests with the exception of bull and bronc "busting."

There will be roping, calf riding, boys and girls individually and as teams.

Proceeds from the rodeo will go toward purchasing a portable feed crumper and mixer, said Durward Lewler, county agent.

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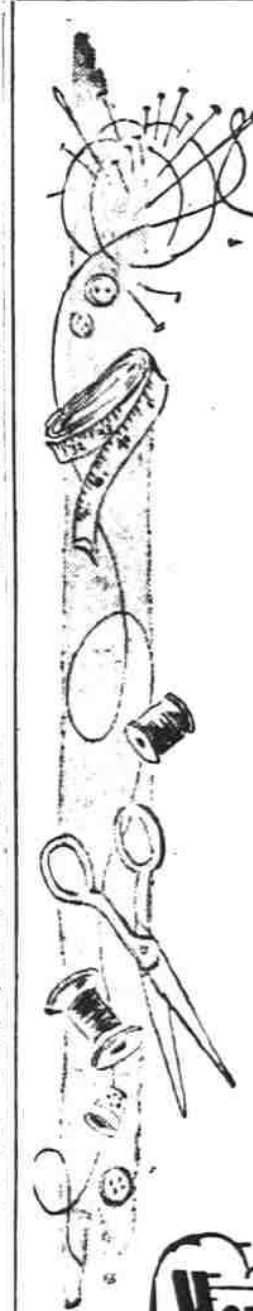
