Rivercrest Rebels Dump North Lamar 44-0

Though tied with Winnsboro for first place, Winnsboro will represent the district because they defeated the Rebels 6-0 in the only loss of the season.

The Rivercrest Rebels bowed out in a big way Friday night to wind up their 1973 season by completely trouncing the hapless North Lamar Panthers of Paris 44-0. It was the third straight shutout the Rebs had performed and it gave them a co-championship with Winnsboro, the only team to defeat them in two years.

Friday night's game was one of those that the locals could have just about picked their score as they moved the ball anywhere and everywhere they pleased. The Panthers were stalled on all but one drive where they moved down to the Rebs one before the awesome Rebs defense held them for four consecutive downs.

The game had a little bit of everything to offer, including linemen playing in the backfield and backs playing on the line, but Coach Bobby Dobbs and his very capable staff let the boys play as they pleased, especially the seniors, as this would be their last game in high school football. The blustery cold weather did not hamper the loyal fans of Rebel football as an excellent crowd braved the chilling winds and as in each and every previous game this year backed the locals in their win.

The Rebels scored once in the first quarter, twice in the second, and three times in the third before slacking off and winding up the season. The first tally for the Rebs came halfway through the first quarter after fullback Glen Fulbright, the games' leading rusher, had returned one of seven North Lamar punts 27 yards down to their 18 yard line. Fulbright then got eight, halfback W. M. Simpson hustled two and then quarterback Terry Giddens swept up

the middle for eight yards and paydirt. J. T. Morgan's kick was wide, but the Rebs were rolling now with a 6-0 lead.

Nearing halfway of the second quarter, the Rebels drove 83 yards in 15 plays to the Panther 8. On first and goal Simpson, who had 78 yards in 10 carries for the night, went around the right side untouched for the score. Fulbright did the same thing for the two pointer to make it 14-0.

The Rebels scored again with only one minute left in the half, this time a 10 yard keeper by Giddens. To set this one up the Rebs had executed a 67 yard drive in only four plays with the big one being a 42 yard jog by Simpson. Giddens passed to halfback Danny Black for the two extras, but it was short, and

gave the Rebs a 20-0 halftime lead.

The third quarter was the most successful one for the Rebels. The Panthers kicked off for their only kickoff of the night and Randy Jones picked it up at his own 17. Thirty yards later he was tackled at the 47. From there Fulbright once again put on a dazzling run of 53 yards for the touchdown. Giddens passed to Jimmy Curtis for two more extra points and it was 28-0. The Rebs kicked off and the Panthers could go no where from their own 26.

On fourth and six the Rebs defense put on a blitz similar to the pros and blocked the North Lamar punt. Jones caught it, and raced into the

end zone for the score. Giddens again found Black for the two points and it was 36-0.

It all ended as far as the scoring was concerned with 6:25 left in the third stanza when Simpson went off tackle from the one. This score had been set up on a 24 yard halfback pass from Fulbright to end Ricky Norman. Quarterback Ricky Nolen threw to Black for two more extra points to complete the 44-0 night.

Family Planning Clinic Set Today

A Family Planning Program will be held at Bogata in the educational building of the First Baptist Church on Wednesday, November 21, 1973, which will be from 9:00 a.m. until 12:00 noon. Mrs. Lillian Fralin and Mrs.

Sherron Hicks will conduct the clinic, explain the program and talk to anyone interested in attending.

The program is sponsored by Public Health Region 7 of the Texas State Department of Health serving counties in

Northeast Texas. It is designed to serve women of child bearing age, who for economic reasons, lack of knowledge, or other reasons, are not presently availing themselves of services offered under the program.

Purpose of the clinic is to provide any female with family planning information. Any questions will be answered and whatever birth control method or device chosen will be furnished at no cost.

The program provides a limited physical examination, counseling in fertility control and health education with emphasis on personal responsibility for health matters and the relationship of behavior attitudes to successful fertility control by individuals. The clinics are staffed by a registered nurse, a clerk-typist and a community service aide under the supervision of a licensed physician.

Hand Made Dolls Ready For Methodist Home

Charity on occasion is easy enough for most of us, but charity all year is a challenge which few of us, save Mrs. Sidney Frugia of Talco, can meet.

This December marks the twelfth year that Mrs. Frugia has prepared and delivered 50 hand painted china like dolls for Christmas to the Methodist Home in Waco, and her project is accomplished with

the help of members of all faiths in the Talco community.

Mrs. Frugia failed to make that trip to Waco herself with the dolls only one time, and that year they were delivered by Kennard B. Copeland, formerly of Mt. Vernon, and now administrator of the Methodist Home.

Making the dolls is a task that requires the entire year to complete, including the

casting of the ceramic heads, feet, arms and hands, the painting of the dolls, the making of the dresses, and the stuffing of the bodies.

Material for the dolls' dresses is donated by interested individuals and clothing factories, and each dress is a miniature masterpiece of hand tailoring. Some are dressed in taffeta and lace, and some are in gingham trimmed with rick rack. Each

doll has pantaloons and a net petticoat to match her dress, and high top lace up shoes are painted on the ceramic feet. There are blondes and redheads and brunettes in the group, and the ladies never quibble over who is the most beautiful as they sit side by side on the shelves awaiting delivery to the little girls of the Methodist Home.

Delivery date is generally set for the first two weeks in

December, and although it appears that the schedule will be met this year, there have been years in which some of the dolls were completed on the way to Waco. These trips, Mrs. Frugia said, were hectic, with one lady stuffing dolls and one lady dressing dolls, and another lady driving.

Most of the dolls are given to children who are not sponsored by individuals and

churches, and many letters and notes of appreciation have been received by Mrs. Frugia from the girls who are given the dolls.

This year the trip to Waco will be made by Mrs. Frugia and Rev. Ernest Jennings, pastor of the United Methodist Church of Talco, and fifty orphan girls will have a happier Christmas because of the charity of the people of Talco.

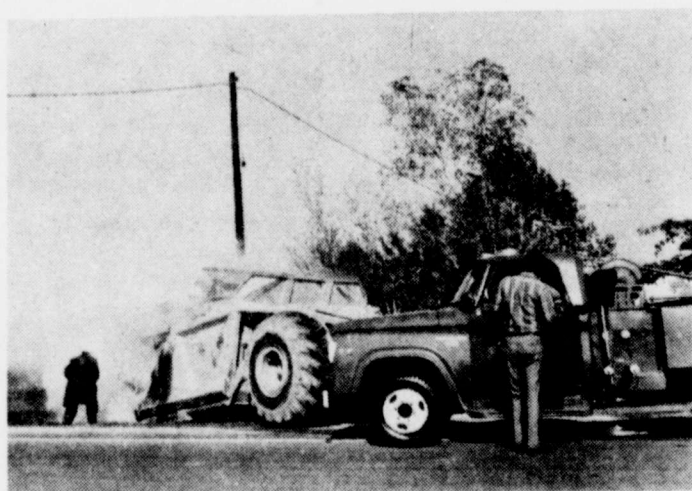

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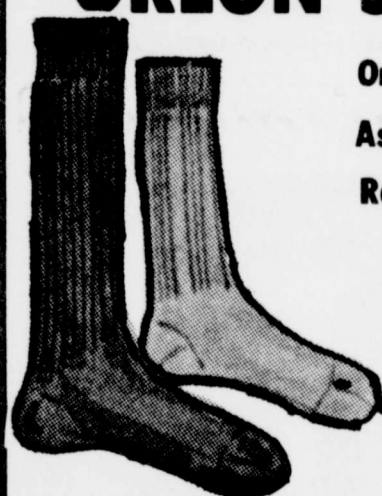


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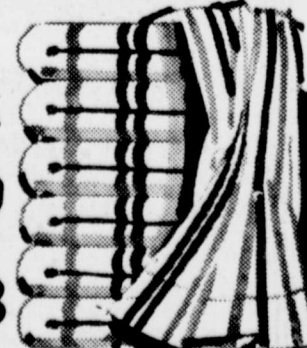

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Junior Varsity Rebels End Season With 9-3 Record

Rivercrest's junior varsity dropped the final football game of the season to Mt. Vernon 14-8 in a hard-hitting contest played in a persistent drizzle at Rivercrest Thursday, November 8. The loss brought the Rivercrest record for the season to nine wins and three losses.

The Rebels held Mt. Vernon scoreless in the first half, and achieved four first downs while denying Mt. Vernon any third down conversions during that period. Rivercrest tailback Gary Neill scored over the middle from the three yard line with 3:48 left in the second quarter for the first score of the game. Fullback Bill Montgomery charged over right guard for the two points after, bringing the score to 8-0 when the half time whistle blew. Neill was the leading ground gainer of the game with 69 of the total 200 yards to Rivercrest's credit. A fumble by the explosive Mt. Vernon halfback Sam Fountain on the Rivercrest 15 yard line was recovered by linebacker Mike

Medlin of Rivercrest, saving a possible Tiger score during the second quarter.

Mt. Vernon returned from the half time break with new strength, however, and gained 181 yards on the ground during the second half as compared to only six during the first. Fountain broke loose and ran 37 yards for the Tiger's first score with 5:47 left on the clock, and then cleared left end for two points after. Three and one half minutes later, Mt. Vernon's Bob Morris ran from his own 43 yard line to score. A fumble by Fountain on the extra point attempt ended with the ball chased down on the Rivercrest 37 yard line.

Midway in the fourth quarter, a pass from Neill was intercepted by Tiger Mike Jagers, ending a scoring drive that might have put Rivercrest on the winning side. Mt. Vernon's quarterback, Lloyd Stone, completed one pass for six yards to Morris, but another identical pass play resulted in an incompletion.

The second half was plagued with penalties, with

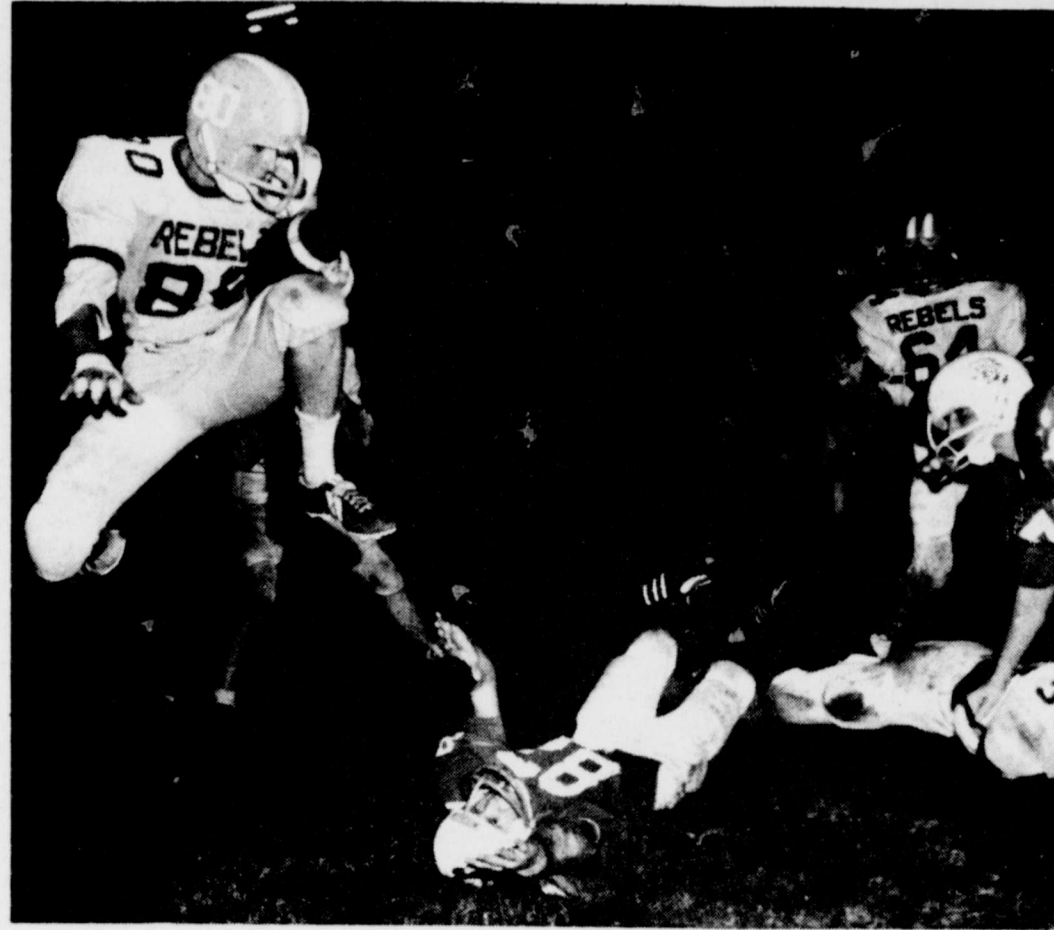
two illegal procedure penalties against Rivercrest de-

clined and a roughing the kicker penalty against Mt.

Vernon resulting in a 15 yard gain, just two yards short of a first down. A failure to convert would have given Mt. Vernon excellent field position, however, and the decision was made to punt again. A final penalty for 5

yards against Mt. Vernon was called for delay of the game with 2:02 left on the clock.

Additional credit goes to Rivercrest's Todd Wright, who gained 61 yards during the game, and to defensive tackle Mike Glosson for excellent defensive coverage.

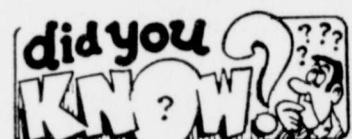

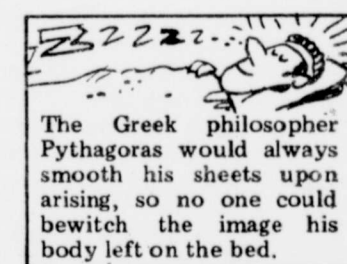
When it comes to avoiding or removing dishwasher film, you can really dish it out. Fill dishwasher with all your glasses and porcelain china. (Never put any silver, aluminum or brass in the washer when this method is used, as they will turn black.) Put bowl in bottom of dishwasher. Pour one cup of household bleach into the bowl. Run through washing cycle but do not dry. Fill bowl again with one cup of vinegar and let the dishwasher go through the entire cycle. This will remove all film not only from your glasses but from the dishwasher too.

An effective means of cleaning your car is by using Ajax Dishwashing Liquid dissolved in warm water. It's a good vehicle for removing dirt from metal and an excellent avenue of approach.

To remove white water marks from table tops, apply mayonnaise and rub it in. Let stand and wipe clean with a soft cloth in an hour or so.

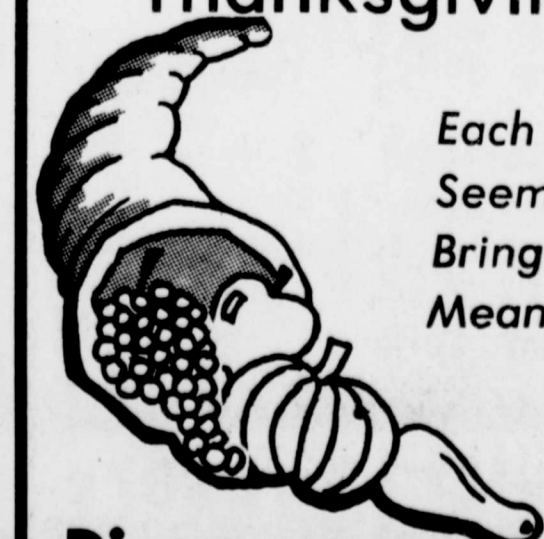

Vanilla Butterscotch Sauce

In a small heavy saucepan heat 1/2 cup sugar until golden, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and gradually stir in 1 cup boiling water. Return to heat. Add 1 teaspoon butter or margarine and 1/4 teaspoon salt. Cook 3 minutes, stirring constantly. Mix 2 tablespoons cornstarch with 1 tablespoon cold water. Stir into sugar mixture; cook until thickened, stirring well. Cool. Beat 1/2 cup heavy cream with 1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract until stiff. Fold in to cooled mixture. Serve over ice cream, fruit cake, etc. Yields 1 1/2 cups.
