## DAWSON COUNTY FAIR NOW IN FULL BLAST

### Terrapin Race To Be Featured Next Trades Day, Oct. 3

#### ATTENDANCE GOOD IN SPITE OF UN- FAVORABLE WEATHER

Though impeded by an early-morning drizzle which rapidly increased to a steady downpour, the Dawson County Fair opened on schedule Thursday morning. Superintendents and assistants of the various departments were on the job at an early hour, and exhibits began pouring into the booths by eight o'clock.

The Adams buildings on Austin street are being used for display, so that all items are in safe and sheltered places.

Fair directors expressed themselves as being well pleased with attendance during the first day, especially in view of the fact that the unexpected rain doubtless kept hundreds of visitors away from the buildings.

From the first impression, the exceedingly pleasant young lady at the information desk, to the final hamburger and ice cream cone, Dawson County's Fair has been an unquestioned success.

Entries in the Women's department were unusually varied and attractive, and booths devoted to their display were well arranged indeed. Colorful quilts, dainty embroideries, and artful handwork made things of beauty in truth, and comments of visitors were admiring in the extreme.

Booths devoted to canned fruits and vegetables were enough to win a smile from the most discriminating epicure, showing every variety of vegetable, fruit, jellies, jams, and preserves.

The Dog and Cat show was one of the most interesting features of the entire fair. The big pointers sat in their cages with attentive and politely interested expressions, but a small Boston bull pup made the welkin ring as he voiced his heartbroken protests against being cooped up in such a manner. The Persian and Maltese cats, surveyed the scene with great dignity, seeming to get as much amusement out of watching the crowd as did the crowd from viewing the exhibits.

In the poultry department, where coops were filled with some of the finest birds we have seen in years, at least two lusty-lunged cocks sent challenges to each other and everybody concerned, and apparently tried to tell the officials just how affairs should be conducted.

The community exhibits were in process of being arranged as the reporter made the inspection tour, and several of them were incomplete, but the fact that Lamesa is located in the garden spot of the south was plainly evident. We have never seen such vegetables, such melons and fruit of such splendid samples of feeds and cotton as are on display in the agricultural building. Much taste and care has been shown in arranging the booths. Only two individual displays had been arranged Thursday morning, J. L. Garrett and J. A. Dunn being the exhibitors. Weaver, Wilson, Bartlett, Klondike, Sparenberg, Wilson, Woody and McCarty communities are represented by well-arranged displays. Especially interesting are the different manners in which the names of the communities are brought out by use of products. A trip through the agricultural and canned products departments will quickly banish any ideas as to hard times in Dawson county.

The commercial booths were for the most part being arranged as the reporter looked through, but indications even at that early hour were that they would be very attractive. Higginbotham-Bartlett's booth was complete, and showed every variety of furnishing and equipment for the farm home, while several out-of-town firms were showing their wares.

As we go to press, several changes in places and times are yet to be announced, the rain having upset some arrangements, but it goes without saying that this Dawson County Fair is one of the best, most complete, and most successful ever held.

Full details as to winners and a more complete story of the Fair as a whole will appear in next week's Courier.

#### UNITED STATES BUREAU OF LABOR TO HAVE REP- RESENTATIVE HERE

C. W. Woodman, director of the Texas division of the United States Bureau of Labor in a letter to the local chamber of commerce states that again this year we may tell the farmers of Dawson county that he will send an agent to Lamesa to dispatch farm labor to be used in gathering cotton and maize. This is the fifth year the local chamber of commerce has made arrangements for this service, believing such labor service is indispensable the Dawson county farmers and especially this year with such a heavy yield of crops to harvest. Mr. Woodman states that the prevailing price now paid in other sections of the state for picking is thirty cents per hundred. He further states that much labor will have to be transported again this year and that transportation will undoubtedly be cheaper than that paid in previous years. Of course he states the farmers here will be expected to pay transportation charges upon arrival of pickers and reserve these charges from the first picking.

The agent located here will be able to secure hundreds of pickers and maize headers that will come here of their own transportation and will serve the farmer in disbursing this labor here.

In the meantime and awaiting the coming of this agent the local chamber of commerce will list for any farmer his labor needs to be turned over to the agent when he arrives.

#### AN URGENT APPEAL!

It is with hope that I come to our members and friends, and make an urgent appeal at this time in the name of the Methodist Church. It is my earnest request that you come to the aid and assistance of these men as they lead out. If ever the church needed you, it needs you now. Will you not respond? The call is urgent. The need is great. The task is not small, but God is with us. It is a mighty good time to make an investment for God. We have been trying many things in the past few years, why not try God's plan for a while. I am sure He will hear our cry when we come to Him alright. With sincere thanks for all you have done in the past, and with confidence that you will again respond, I come in His Name.

#### Lesson for September 25

REVIEW: MOSES HONORED IN HIS DEATH.

GOLDEN TEXT—Precious in the sight of the Lord is the death of his saints.

LESSON TEXT—Deuteronomy 32:48-52; 34:5-8.

PRIMARY TOPIC—Moses Goes to Live With God.

JUNIOR TOPIC—The Death of a Great Leader.

INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—What We May Learn from the Life of Moses.

YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—What the World Owes Moses.

I. Moses Debarred From Canaan (32:48-52).

This act of God strikingly displays the tragedy of an unfinished task. Moses was loyal to God and faithfully served him through a long life. Though his "eye was not dimmed nor his natural force abated," he was obliged to leave his work unfinished. This is true of all of us. However, the tragedy is only apparent. Life is a probation. The question is not of finished tasks, but fidelity in service and growth in divine grace.

1. The reason for (v. 51). It was sin. The nature of this sin is given in Numbers 20:1-13. It was his failure to sanctify the Lord at Meribah. This penalty, while severe, was not too severe, for the righteousness of God demands the meting out of penalty upon every transgression. This was too glaring a sin for the Lord to pass over, though Moses had served him faithfully for many years.

2. God's treatment of Moses (vv. 49, 50). While it was severe, it was yet most tender. It was in keeping with God's nature. While God cannot pass over sin, he is always as gracious as his justice will permit. He appointed the place of Moses' death on the mount of vision. Moses was gathered "unto his people."

#### II. Moses Views the Promised Land from Mount Pisgah (34:1-4).

At the Lord's bidding Moses ascended the mountain of Nebo from which he got a view of the promised land. He obeyed though he knew that he was to die there (32:50). He greatly desired to go into the land (3:25), but submitted to the will of the Lord. Though he was not permitted to enter the land, God gave him a view of the fullest dimensions of the land which was to be the inheritance of the people he had delivered and led for forty years. While Moses suffered this severe penalty, we should remember that his salvation was not affected. He was debarred from entrance to the land at that time, but we see him in the land some fifteen centuries later in a state of glory discoursing with Christ on the loftiest theme of the universe: namely, the death which he would accomplish at Jerusalem (Matt. 17:1-5; Luke 9:28-31).

#### III. The Death and Burial of Moses (34:5-8).

1. His death (v. 5). Though he died in the vigor of manhood, his work was done. God put him into the world for a purpose and as soon as that work was done he called him home. It is stated in verse five that he died according to the word of the Lord.

2. The burial of Moses (v. 8). God buried him. Moses had no human help or sympathy in his dying hour, but he had something better. The Lord was with him. His grave was concealed to prevent his people from making it a shrine.

3. The time of mourning for Moses (v. 8). They mourned for thirty days. It was customary to mourn for the dead from seven to seventy days. It is not wrong to lay away earthly friends even with tears, but as Christians we should not mourn as those who have no hope.

#### IV. An Encomium upon Moses (34:10-12).

In this eulogy Moses is given a place at the head of the Old Testament prophets. With the exception of the greater prophet (Deut. 18:15-18) of whom Moses was a type, he stands as the greatest prophet of Israel.

1. Because of his intimacy with God (v. 10). "Whom the Lord knew face to face."

2. He was great in that he gave to the world a code of laws unequalled in the world's history.

3. He was great as a general in that he liberated the Israelitish nation from the oppression of the great east nation of the earth.

4. He was great because he led two or three million Israelites through the desert for forty years.

5. He was great because he gave to us in the book of Deuteronomy three orations, which, according to the judgment of competent critics, stand at the head of the world's literature.

## PROFITABLE USE OF RUN-OFF WATER IN WEST TEXAS

The Spur Experiment Station re-  
ports the use of a simple and inex-  
pensive system of diversion terraces  
for impounding the run-off water on  
June 20 from a two-inch rain result-  
ing in the application of seven inches  
of water on a 120 acre tract of land.  
Sudan grass was planted on thirty-  
five acres of this land, and as a re-  
sult of this artificial irrigation 62  
head of Hereford yearlings and 15  
head of work stock and milk cows  
were grazed on the 35 acres from  
July 18 to August 15, the Hereford  
yearlings making a gain in this pe-  
riod of 3856 pounds worth at 5 1-2c  
\$212.08, or \$6.00 per acre, not in-  
cluding the grazing of the 15 head  
of work stock and milk cows for the  
period. In addition to the grazing, a  
hay crop of 30 tons was harvested,  
and at the end of the period the graz-  
ing on this tract was considered bet-  
ter than at the beginning, which illus-  
trates the practicability of using  
waste rainfall water to great profit  
by diverting it onto farm land.

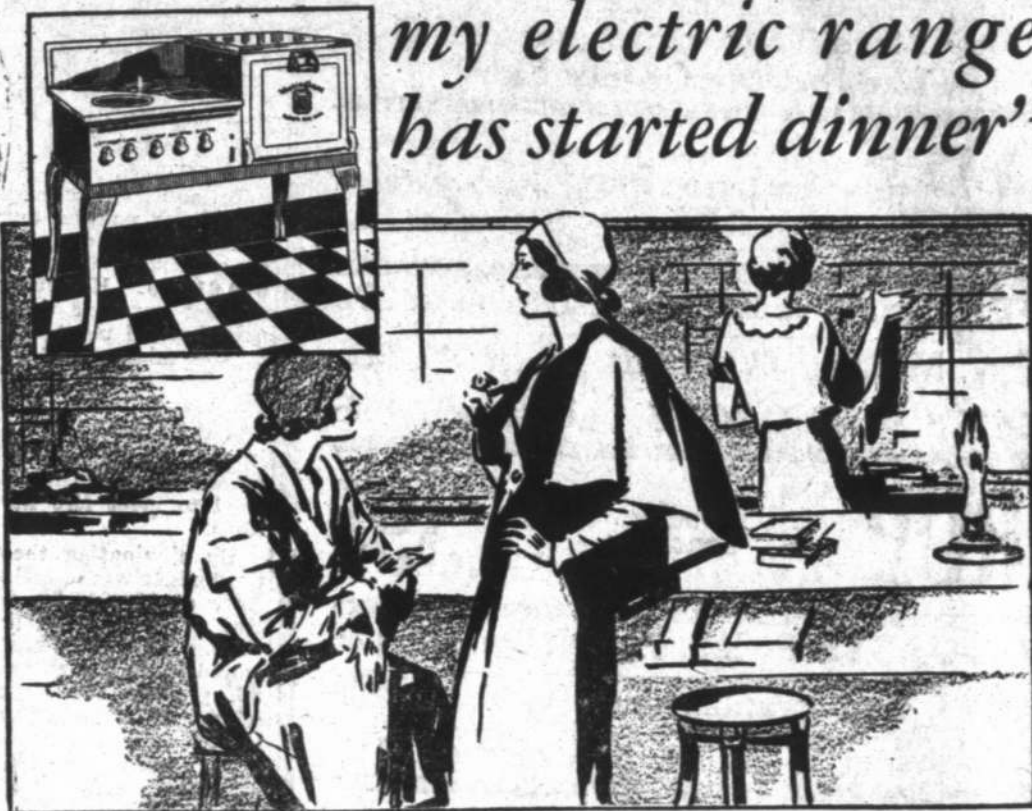

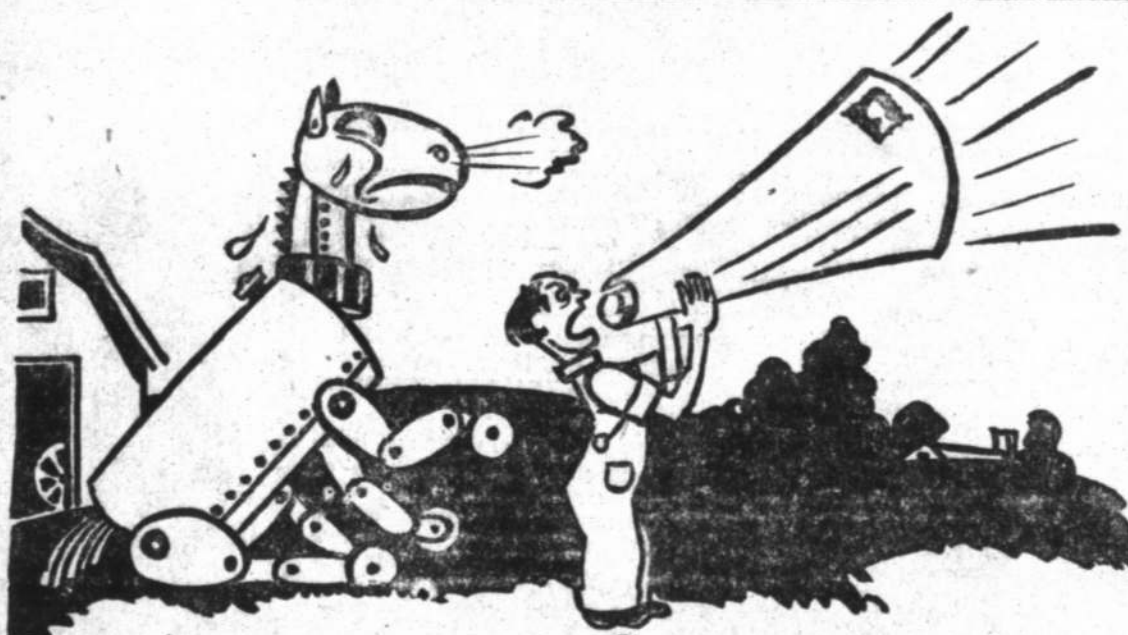

## Mayor Lowrie Addresses Luncheon Club On City Budget

In an address to Lamesa business men recently, Mayor J. R. Lowrie outlined the public expenditures of the City for the periods of April 8, 1931-32, and also figures anticipated for 1933. In other words, a definite budget plan was presented by him.

For the year 1931-32, he showed actual receipts of \$58,752.20, and expended for the same year \$58,083.39, leaving a cash balance of \$670.81, or a reduction in both receipts and expenditures of about 45 per cent over a like period in 1929. This percentage reduction, Judge Lowrie points out, is largely due to general business shrinkage conditions.

In quoting the budget for 1933, the Mayor pointed out the fact that estimated receipts would be \$51,883 as against planned expenditures of \$70,011.20. However, the Mayor pointed out that the City needed a new disposal plant, which would cost at the minimum \$15,000, and that the City needed a new erector for street work, which would cost \$3,000 and that the budget also carried an item of \$800 for 1000 feet of fire hose which the City would no doubt need to meet fire insurance regulations.

By eliminating these three items, the budget would call for an expenditure of \$51,211.20, which is \$7,543 less expenditures than were made during 1931-32 fiscal year, and it would leave a cash balance of \$671.30, provided the estimated receipts of the 1933 budget were fully collected.

In commenting upon the necessity of collecting taxes to meet the budget requirements, the Mayor said, "I had much rather hold our valuations up, for many reasons, and to cut the tax rate, which would in the end net the city the same amount of revenue. But it seems the general public is clamoring for a valuation reduction, which to my mind is the wrong thing to do, and which forces the City Commission to levy the constitutional tax rate limit, since valuations are reduced to minimum."

Last week the City Tax Equalization Board, consisting of C. H. Lusk, R. E. Simpson, and M. Hatch, met and heard petitions of tax payers for reduction in valuations. Although the work of this board is not complete as yet, it is thought that the valuations of the city properties will be around 15 per cent less than last year.

A citizenship Tax Committee, composed of Audrey Cox, N. E. Bartlett, O. B. Norman, and M. C. Lindsey, met with the Mayor, the City Commission, and the Tax Equalization Board. They were furnished a

copy of the proposed budget for 1933- which they have studied, and they have filed with the Mayor and the City Commission their recommendations. This report is public property and may be inspected by any taxpayer interested in the incorporate limits of the City of Lamesa.

The first recommendation of the Tax Board reads, "We made thorough investigation of the sewer disposal plant, and while it is inadequate and antiquated, it is being operated in a manner to get the maximum efficiency, and is as sanitary as the average."

"Due to the stressed times and burden of taxes already on us, we recommend deferring the rebuilding or replacement of this plant until such time as we are more able to pay for it."

The Tax Committee also recommended that for the time being the City not buy a new tractor, as called for in the budget, stating that although the streets could not be well maintained without it, that the citizenship would be willing to forego the convenience of smooth streets until better times.

The Committee further recommended that the valuations be reduced by 15 per cent, quoting the Committee: "We believe that by reducing taxes on the average as much as 15 per cent, it will satisfy the critical, also inspire a spirit of cooperation and tax paying, enabling you to collect more taxes for the coming year than you will in letting the rate and valuation remain where it is."

Further quoting the Committee, "We realize that your fixed expenditures, which is interest and sinking fund to liquidate bonded indebtedness is very heavy for a town of this size. You are not responsible for this, nor can it be remedied now. The citizenship of Lamesa voted that on themselves; but we recommend that an energetic campaign be waged to collect delinquent taxes as it is not fair that the property of those who pay to be taxed to take care of those who do not."

The Mayor and City Commission, in commenting upon the recent work of the Tax Equalization Board and the Citizens Tax Committee, said, "We fully appreciate what the Equalization Board has done equalizing the tax valuations of our city, and the work and study the Citizens Tax Committee has done. We feel certain that the taxable valuation in our city will be lowered as much as 15 per cent, according to the request of the Citizens Tax Committee, and expect to give special attention to the collection of delinquent taxes."
