'Band Wagon' Days At Hand In Politics

Each Candidate Says He Has Cinch To Be In Runoff

(By Associated Press)
THE "Band Wagon" days are at hand in Texas politics and the four remaining days of campaigning before the first primary will see each of the seven stumpers candidates for governor telling his scattered audiences that he is a cinch to get into the runoff.

The claims already have been made but they will be emphasized and perhaps enlarged before Saturday, the theory being that a considerable portion of the voters is anxious to "ride" a winner.

"Ma" Favored.
All the active candidates except Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson maintain headquarters at Dallas and supporters of at least four of these aspirants to the state's chief executive post say that Mrs. Ferguson will be the "other" candidate in the runoff.

Observers see in these concessions to Mrs. Ferguson one of those three possibilities: That she will be in the runoff; that each of the other candidates would like to oppose her in the second primary because he feels that she would be the easiest to beat; or that the Ferguson strength in past elections has given a false impression of strength in the current race.

While Mrs. Ferguson and her husband "Farmer Jim" were resting Monday, each of the other active candidates was making at least two speeches.

Ross S. Sterling, whose claimed campaign practice and whose proposed state highway bond issue have been the central target of most talking, being scheduled for speeches at Schertz, Granger and Taylor during the day and at San Antonio at night.

At Sterling's Dallas headquarters, Charlie Abbott gave out the results of three surveys which he said had been made by unprejudiced organizations. These showed Sterling and Mrs. Ferguson running neck and neck with one giving third to Harry Miller and the others giving that place to Clint Small.

Dallas headquarters for Jim Young said that Young would clinch his attack on Thomas B. Love in Dallas, Love's home city, Tuesday night. The move was said to be in retaliation for Love's action Saturday in using Young as his main target in Kaufman, Young's home.

Worker Makes Confession of Crime Monday

Claims Deed Prompted Because Wife Unable to Take Care of Children; Statement Is Doubtful by Officers

Strangling Hinted

Pieces of Cloth Found Tied About Necks of Victims by Authorities; Slayer Held on Charges of Murder

MARTINSBURG, W. Va., July 21.—The bodies of the three small children of Taylor Holt, 35, Martinsburg, laborer, were found today in water of a quarry hole into which the father later confessed, county authorities said, he pushed them last night.

Holt's statement that he killed the children, Gertrude Virginia, 7; Calvin W. 6; and Floyd S. 3, by drowning them and was prompted to do so because his wife was unable to care for them were doubted by officials. Holt was out of work.

Autopsies indicated, they said, the children were killed before being hurled into the quarry hole. C. N. Campbell, assistant prosecuting attorney of Berkeley county, also said pieces of cloth tied around the children's throats indicated they had been strangled whereas Holt related in his confession he tied the cloth over the children's mouths to prevent outcry.

Holt said he lured the children to the quarry hole under pretense of permitting them to go wading. He was held in jail tonight under charges of murder.

Following identification of the children and summoning of the parents for questioning, Mr. and Mrs. Holt, first told a story of giving the children yesterday over to the care of a "Kiddie" family in order to permit them a vacation in the mountains.

Airman Overcome By Heat Seeking Endurance Record

ROOSEVELT FIELD, N. Y., July 21.—The "Green" plane, one of the two ships seeking to break the refueling endurance record of almost 354 hours, landed today after E. S. Anding, one of the pilots, was overcome by the heat. The "Red" plane remained aloft.

Both ships took off early last night.

Anding, who comes from Rosebud, Texas, was not in a serious condition, physicians said. He and Jack Charleston of Ottawa, Mo., hopped off at 7:24 p. m. last night. They came down after less than 23 hours in the air.

Fifty-five seconds before they took off, the "Red" plane, manned by Louis Reichers and Robert J. Black, army reserve pilots, took the air in an assault upon the record held by the Hunter brothers of Chicago.

Today the two crews chatted with each other by radio as they circled over the field under a blazing sun that drove temperatures up around the 100 mark. The hot glare finally proved too much for Anding.

St. Louis Fliers Seek Record Again

ST. LOUIS, July 21.—(AP)—Dale Jackson and Forest O'Brien took off from Lambert-St. Louis field at 7:11 a. m. today in their monoplane, Greater St. Louis, in an attempt to regain the world's endurance flight record.

The first refueling contact was made successfully at 3:52 p. m., just as the fliers completed their first 13 hours in the air.

Jackson and O'Brien must remain aloft until 8:11 a. m. Aug. 13 to wrest the record from the Hunter brothers, who recently stayed up 353 hours over Chicago.

No New Clues Found Here in Sunday Attack

Mrs. Marie Watson Is Struck Over Head by Unidentified Prowler in Bedroom; Local Officers Find No Motive

No new clues to the prowler who early Sunday morning attacked Mrs. Marie Watson, 1508 Avenue J, have obtained, John Lemond, chief of police, said last night. Police made a thorough investigation but were unable to secure any definite information concerning possible motives for an attack.

Mrs. Watson said she had been asleep in a rear bedroom with her nine-year-old son and did not hear the prowler enter the room. Her first knowledge of his presence was a blow on her head, she told police.

Stunned by Blow.
"I was stunned by the blow, but the flow of blood revived me and I screamed," she said.

Physicians stated that the bruise on her head might have been caused by a heavy ring on the finger of the attacker. It also might have been made by a light instrument.

Police Make Search.
Police made a search of the premises and vicinity but were unable to locate any definite clues. They had been in that part of town earlier in the evening to investigate reports of a suspicious person.

A small purse in the room was not disturbed. Jewelry and other valuables in the room also were untouched.

Pact Ratified by Vote of 58 To Nine After Reservations Overwhelmed by Senators

Senate Adjourns Until December After Final Roll Call on Treaty; Militant Band of Opponents Yields to Dominant Majority; One Reservation Passed

WASHINGTON, July 21.—(AP)—The London treaty limiting all classes of ships in the American, British and Japanese navies was ratified today by the senate by a vote of 58 to 9.

The final roll call came quickly after a dozen reservations were overwhelmed. The militant band of opponents under Senator Johnson, republican, California, saw the inevitable and yielded to the heat and the dominant majority.

One reservation was adopted but it requires no new negotiations among the signatory powers and with the formal ratification of the treaty by Great Britain and Japan the document will go into effect.

Delegates Present.
Two of those who helped frame the agreement at London early this year participated in the two weeks debate and were present to see the formal ratification—Senator Robinson, Democrat, Arkansas, and Reed, Republican, Pennsylvania.

News of the ratification was quickly flashed to the White House but President Hoover who had called the special session for consideration of the treaty withheld any statement.

Senate Adjourns.
With the treaty contest ended, the senate adjourned the special session sine die. It will reconvene in December along with the house for the three months' short session. The next four months will be the longest time congress has not been in session since President Hoover took office more than 16 months ago.

Seven Republicans and two Democrats voted against the treaty while five others were paired against it, including one Republican, three Democrats and the Farm-Labor member, Shipstead of Minnesota.

The one reservation which was accepted by the senate was offered by Senator Norris, Republican, Nebraska, which stipulated that in ratifying the treaty the senate withheld approval of any secret labor agreements or understandings which might exist in relation to the treaty.

Refuses Request.
This disposed of one of the big fighting points in the treaty controversy. After President Hoover had refused to give the senate all the See NAVAL TREATY, Page 9

When H. B. Thompson, owner of the Myrick Confectionery, in the lobby of the Myrick building on Avenue J opened up his place Monday morning he found the cash box, left in the store room, was broken open and \$7.40 in cash taken, he told police.

The lock on the door was not battered, indicating, police said, that the prowler had a key. Some checks and \$30 in cash was found untouched.

Mr. Thompson said he was of the opinion some youths wanted to get some spending money. Similar occasions have taken place heretofore, he added.

Six Notables Die in Plane Crash Monday

Mid-Air Explosion Tears Air Taxi to Shreds; Over English Hamlet; Viscountess Ednam Among Victims

MEOPHAM, Kent, Eng., July 21.—(AP)—Six persons including the Viscountess Ednam, a woman of rare beauty and a close friend of the Prince of Wales, plunged to death when a mid-air explosion tore to shreds an "air taxi," speeding a party of distinguished society folk to Crocydon from a week-end at Le Touquet, France.

Mrs. Henrik Loefler, another woman famed alike for her beauty and the receptions she gave at her elegant home in Grosvenor Square, Mayfair, was a victim. Mrs. Loefler's receptions were among the most important events of the London society season.

The Marquis of Dufferin and Ava and Sir Edward Ward, who moved in the same exclusive circles, Lieutenant Colonel George L. P. Henderson, an airman with a fine flying record, the plane's chief pilot and a Mr. Shearing, 23-year-old assistant pilot, completed the death role of the fearful happening.

The afternoon, this picturesque hamlet four mile south of Gravesend, was startled by a roar in the sky and a terrific detonation. Villagers who looked skyward saw the Junkers plane, a machine owned by the Henderson Flying school, and led to the Whitcomb Air Lines, Limited, suddenly fly into bits.

The bodies of all of the occupants hurtled earthward and fell in a cluster in a garden next to a cottage. The rest of the outfit, wings, engines and cabin were flung about for hundreds of yards.

Martial Law Reign Looms In Chihuahua

tempt to Prevent Recurrence
of Riots Accompanying State
Election in Juarez; Two
Men Are Shot to Death

EL PASO, July 21. (AP)—A virtual state of martial law was maintained in the state of Chihuahua, Mexico, today to prevent recurrence of sanguinary rioting which accompanied the election in Juarez yesterday.

Two men were slain, five were wounded and a policeman was injured seriously before order was restored. A mob of 500 in which women were conspicuously engaged in hand to hand fighting in one Juarez precinct.

Five Into Truck
Juan Zaldivar, 35, was fatally wounded when a man, said to have been a socialist partisan, fired into a truck loaded with members of the national revolutionary party.

Encarnacion Ponce, 22, died in a Juarez hospital early today from wounds incurred in the fighting. Charged with demonstrating against the administration, 23 members of the socialistic league of resistance were incarcerated.

Order Restored
Order was restored when national revolutionary party officials, who compose the dominant Juarez administration, took over the police shortly after Zaldivar was slain. E. Rivera, Juarez chief of police, immediately ordered all persons who had been drinking off the street. He ordered that all persons found carrying arms be arrested.

Election of Andres Ortiz, prominent engineer and contractor of Chihuahua City as governor, was boycotted by followers in Juarez of Manuel Prieto, rival candidate. They insisted however, that their right to vote was denied and plan to protest to the federal government, claiming unfairness and coercion by police.

Dispatches from Chihuahua City, the capital, said the city had been without disorders. General Matias Ramos, under-secretary of war who virtually placed the state under martial law when he took command of the Fifth military zone Saturday, was given credit for the quiet election at the capital. Antonio Corona, stormy figure in Chihuahua politics was defeated in his race for the state legislature from the Juarez district by Arturo M. Flores, brother of Gustavo Flores, mayor of Juarez.

BALLOT BOXES SECURED

Primary Election Judges Call

Judges of the primary election in Lubbock county are calling at the office of Amos Howard, county clerk, to secure their ballot boxes and election supplies for the primary Saturday.

In the event that not all of the boxes are handed out by Friday, the day before the election, a distribution is to be made to the precinct judges it was said.

Storey Again Denies Charge

Candidate for Attorney General
Issues Statement in
Reply to Moody's Charge of
Ferguson Support

HOUSTON, July 21. (AP)—Cecil Storey, candidate for the Democratic nomination to the attorney generalship, issued a statement today again denying that he was a "Jim Ferguson candidate."

His statement was in response to Governor Dan Moody's attempt to "prove" that Storey was a "Ferguson man."

Voted for Amnesty
Storey said he voted for the amnesty bill because "the vindication of Jim Ferguson was an issue in the campaign when Mrs. Ferguson was elected governor" and "the people elected her by a substantial majority and the passage of the amnesty bill was in obedience to the express mandate of the people and was supported by Ferguson's political friends and those who had not been."

"I opposed the resolution for the investigation of Mrs. Ferguson in the special session of the 29th legislature because I thought if there were grounds for any such action as contemplated thereby there was only one legal way to expend the people's money, and that was by impeachment proceedings, while the legislature was then in session, and did not believe that the legislature was authorized under the law to appropriate funds for such committee to carry on such investigation after the legislature had adjourned."

Welcomes Support
"I want to say to the public once and for all I am no individual's or faction's candidate, but I welcome the support of all the people of Texas regardless of whom they may have voted for governor in the past, or will vote for in the future, and will never apologize for any man or woman's voting for me."

OKLAHOMA CITY SUED

Oil Company Seeks Freedom
In Drilling Wells

OKLAHOMA CITY, July 21. (AP)—A suit to enjoin Oklahoma City from interfering with the drilling of an oil well on the Harn tract, adjacent to the capitol building, was filed today in United States district court here by the Cromwell-Franklin Oil company.

The petition argues that inasmuch as wells would be drilled not less than 500 feet from any residence, the company should be permitted to drill there. It alleges that in the U-S, or drilling zone, wells are being put down within 100 feet of residences, endangering lives and threatening property. It charges that the refusal of the city to allow drilling on the Harn tract amounts to "an unreasonable exercise of police power."

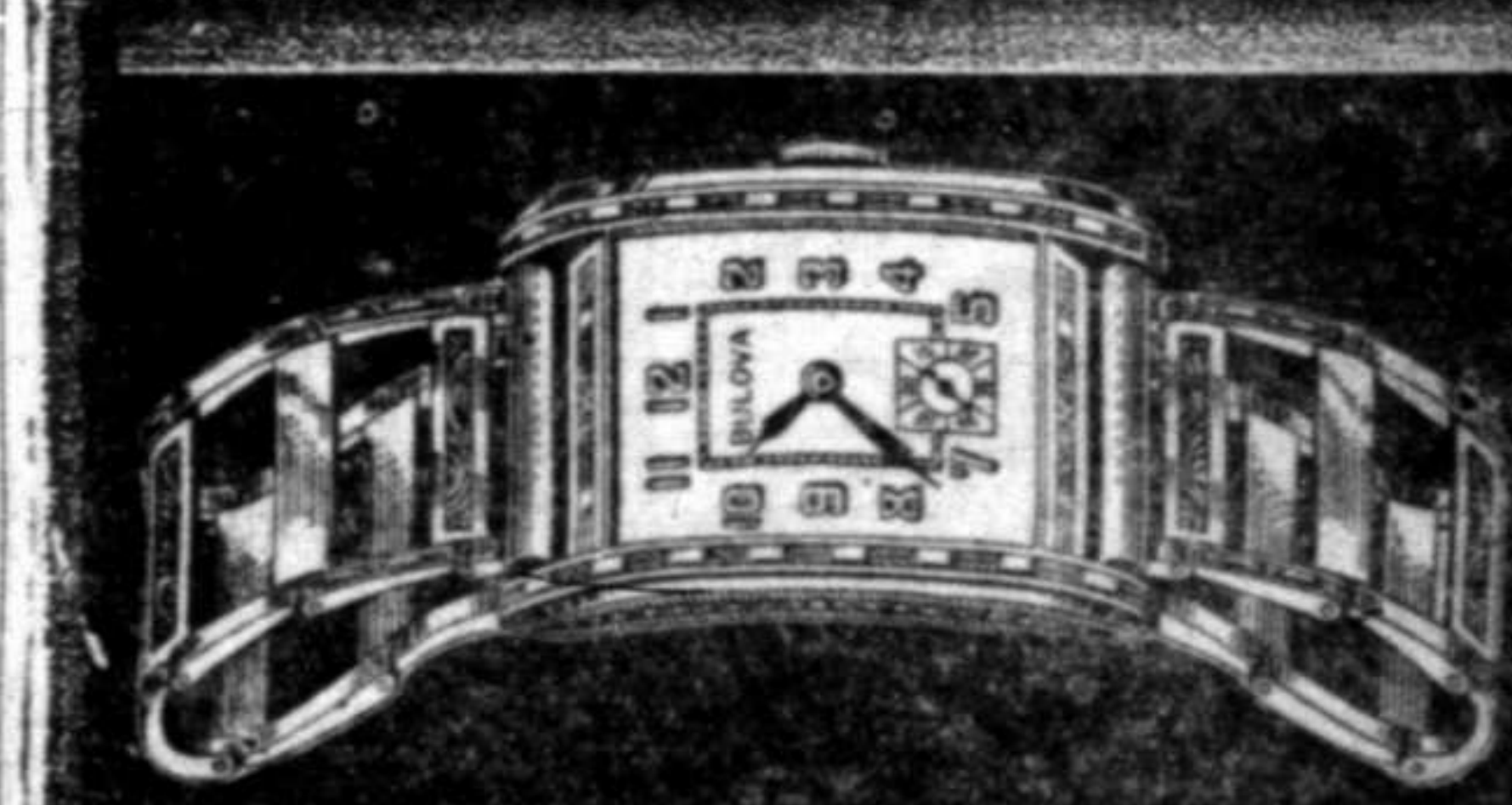

THE FORGERY SITUATION

FORGERY cases are on the increase in Lubbock and the surrounding territory and have become so numerous here that County Attorney Vaughn Wilson has been moved to issue a word of warning.

The situation, while disturbing, is not serious at the present but steps should be taken now to make forgery not only difficult, but likewise dangerous. Making an example of a forger or two will help a lot and will re-act to protect business people against the crooks who take advantage of a trust.

If Lubbock county and the South Plains, through its prosecutors and its jurors, can build up a reputation as being "rough on forgers", a lot of the transients who beat their way about the country will give us a wide berth. A few penitentiary terms won't be amiss in the campaign.

THE WHITE MAN'S PARTY

Efforts on the part of unscrupulous whites and insolent blacks to force the negro ballot in the Democratic primaries should be met with a solid wall of opposition on the part of the rank and file of citizens. The Democratic party must be maintained as a white man's party at all costs.

We Democrats can have family fuses—in fact we do have "knock down, drag out" fights upon almost any provocation—but when they start trying to ram the negro down our throats it's high time for us to drop our rows with one another and stand together against the common foe.

THE AGE OF ART

The American people are in revolt against ugliness. On every hand the demand for beauty is in evidence. Parks are not the only sign that the public is beginning to recognize and value beauty. In addition to millions authorized for the purchase and maintenance of parks for pleasure, authority has been given the expenditure of more millions for the erection of imposing public buildings. There are beautiful statehouses, city halls, postoffices and other public structures. Modern school buildings and grounds frequently rival in beauty the handsome estates of the rich, and the children who attend such schools unconsciously receive an education in taste and beauty.

It was proper and necessary for the nation to build for utility first. Rapid growth is not conducive to art and grace, which are the fruits and playthings of easy and plenty. America can now afford to spend time and money on "dressing up" and is doing so efficiently. A job of it as she did with her development long utilitarian lines. Slowly, but surely, her face is changing for the better.

Americans go to Europe and Asia to view the architectural and engineering wonders of the past. All the world travels to the United States to see the engineering and structural wonders and the architectural beauties of the present. What America lacks in antiquity she is making up in grandeur and grace.

WHEN TO CHALLENGE

Lecturing to a group of university students a sociological expert told his audience that one of the questions put by psychologists to business leaders—in an attempt to construct an Anatomy of Leadership—was: "Do you always try to correct people who make erroneous statements?"

It would be interesting to know whether a "Yes" or "No" to this inquiry is regarded as exhibiting the qualities essential to leadership. On the one hand, it might be argued that a person who insisted on correcting the erroneous statements of others in and out of season would probably be knocked on the head by justly infuriated fellow-citizens before he advanced very far in life. On the other hand a person who never corrected the erroneous statements of others might miss any chance of being picked out for leadership by appearing to identify himself with the mistakes of his fellows.

This seems to be one of those questions which require a certain tact in answering. Probably some of those who have succeeded in life would propound another answer by way of reply and inquire: "Erroneous statements made by whom?"

Public esteem does not go out to those who habitually permit mistakes to go unchallenged, nor is he held in high esteem by his fellow men who leaves no statement uncontradicted. The safe and sane course to follow seems to be, in this case, the middle course. The born leader has the faculty of knowing when to challenge and when to leave to flexible, Truth her own defense.

On the Firing Line at the Nation's Capital

WASHINGTON, July 21.—The U. S. supreme court is a mighty august body never really to have had a home of its own.

A new bureau or commission, just created by congress, frequently considered itself lucky to be assigned to quarters almost anywhere. Illustratively, for months the federal radio commission lacked funds even to pay its rent and was thankful for free office room donated by the commerce department.

Since the war, a good many of the subdivisions even of the big governmental departments have been sheltered in mere "blacks", originally intended to be only temporary, but this supposedly temporary status has strung out to the tune of ten or a dozen or more years.

Now, however, the U. S. Supreme Court is settling up buildings at the east end of the city, the coast and geologic survey, the public health service, it's a long list.

But the supreme court—that's one of the coordinate constitutional branches of the government itself; no mere congressional fancy. The founding fathers established it.

It has as good a right to an independent habitation as the president has to the White House or congress to the Capitol building.

And, yet, to begin with, it was tucked away in the dismal, dark coop, now known as the congressional law library, on the Capitol ground floor, under what then was the senate chamber—this was in the old days, before the north and south wings were completed and the Capitol was scarcely half the size it is now.

But that was not the worst of it—not the most undignified part, at any rate.

In due course the two Capitol wings were finished, the senate moved over to the northern extremity of the enlarged building, into the handsome chamber where it holds its sessions at the present time, the old senate chamber thus was left unoccupied and what did some generous solon suggest?—but—

"Let's let the judiciary have that old room that we've got grown. It was too cramped and uncomfortable for us, but it will do for them."

And the supreme court accepted gratefully—accepted that cast-off senate chamber, as a younger member of the family might accept an outgrown pair of his brother's pants—and has been settling constitutional questions, and really shaping the law of the country, with that as its headquarters, ever since.

Is it any wonder that all true Americans, who revere the supreme tribunal of their land, are re-joined to see workmen, at long last, clearing the ground across the plaza east of the Capitol, for a new structure soon to arise?—the supreme court's very, exclusive own.

It is a beautiful site, a whole city block in extent. As stated, it faces the Capitol, the plaza alone intervening between them, with the congressional library to its southward and the Methodist building on its northern hand.

A block! It seems large, but the supreme court edifice will not be a skyscraper, but simply imposing, pillars, gleaming white in the Washington sunshine and set well back in "ample, beautifully-parked grounds"—a fitting detail in the civic combination which the Capitol Planning commission has so carefully worked out.

And yet, a city block!—or, say, the half of one in actual building area, allowing for the wide setback of green lawn from the curb.

Glancing in at the supreme court's present, congested accommodations in the Capitol, and reflecting on the narrowness of the space it has managed to do with for so long, one cannot but wonder what it will do in its new home with all that room.

A little investigation serves to throw considerable light on the question.

The supreme court, like everything else governmental in Washington, has diversified into all sorts of weird places. One finds detached fragments of it, here there and everywhere, when one begins to look.

There is the old senate chamber on the main floor of the Capitol building, where the courts hold sessions, yet, One thinks of that as the whole thing, but it is only the nucleus.

Across the corridor is the robing room—and the clerk has a couple of crowded, insufficient offices. Around a corner, where one can hardly find it without a guide, is a cubby which the marshal calls his office. Down another mysterious corridor is a store-room where the clerk keeps his files.

"She's not the kind to give a man much peace," Stornaway went on.

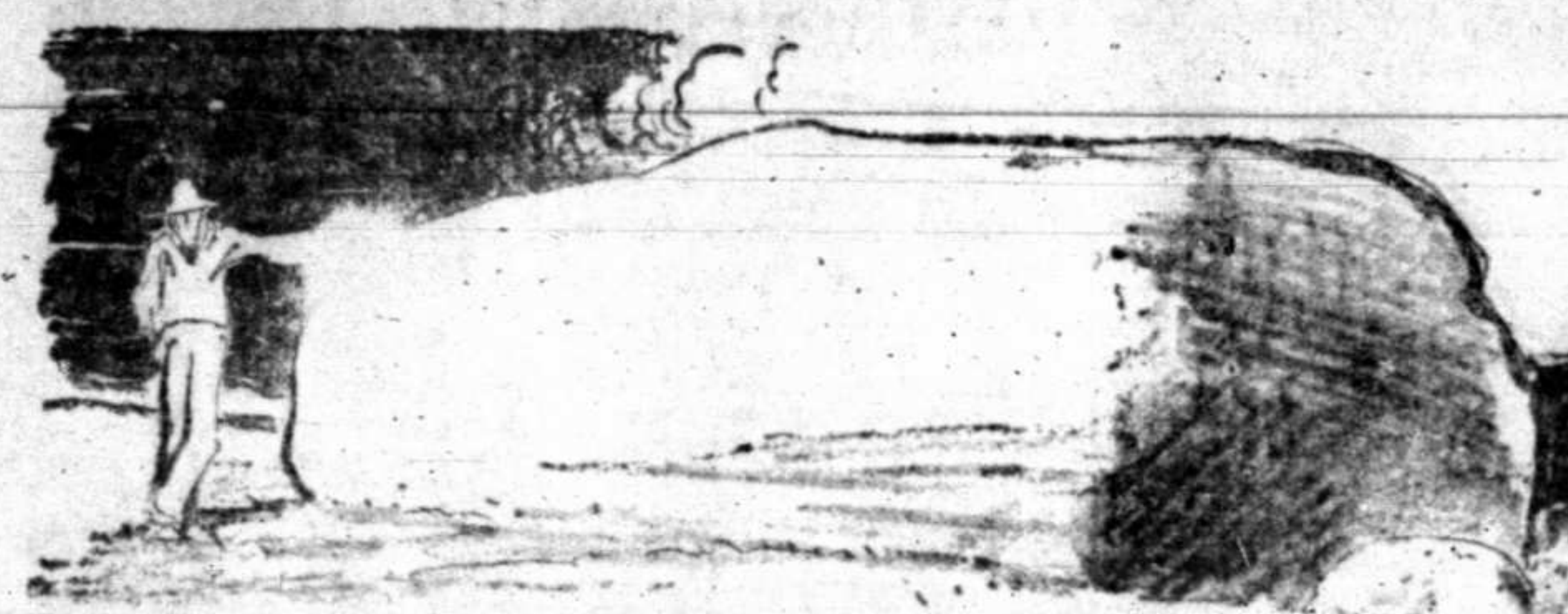

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Government Is Seeking Uses For Products

Agencies Making An Effort To Raise Consumption In U. S.; New Uses For Cotton Being Presented

By ALEXANDER R. GEORGE
WASHINGTON, July 21. (AP)—With the approval of President Hoover, governmental agencies are appealing to the buying public for aid in the struggle to keep king-cotton on his industrial throne.

While the Federal Farm board is launching massive cottonation operations backed by millions of dollars, the department of commerce and agriculture are urging consumers to help cut down the vast surplus which is crippling the cotton industry.

To increase consumption. Trade experts estimate the world supply of American cotton will be 5,800,000 bales August 1, the end of the season. Economists of the department of agriculture say that if all the possible new uses for cotton were taken advantage of, the consumption in the United States could be increased about 2,000,000 bales a year.

Government trade and production experts, cooperating with the cotton-textile institute, have been quickly pushing a cotton research and service program aimed at better coordination of supply and demand. The results of their studies, which show the possibilities of a great increase in the use of cotton products, have been brought to the attention of manufacturers in many lines.

Concentrating efforts. Governmental agencies now are concentrating their efforts on acquainting the public with the opportunities for inexpensive and effective utilization of cotton fabrics. The department of commerce is distributing 400,000 booklets describing how articles made entirely or in part of cotton "can make a vacation more successful." These articles range from arctic down sleeping robes and auto awnings to lamp shades, beach pajamas and canvas wading pools. Other cotton conveniences suggested for the rationer are shatter lenses, refrigerators at fresco, portable boats, pin cushions, life saving vests and inflatable pillows.

The bureau of home economics in advocating increased use of cotton clothing. Cotton sun suits, modish cotton dresses, suits for small boys and protective garments for preschool children have been developed by the bureau and are said to be winning widespread approval.

A committee that has been studying conservation of lumber in the United States has estimated that some wood-working industries waste from 25 to 40 per cent of their raw material.

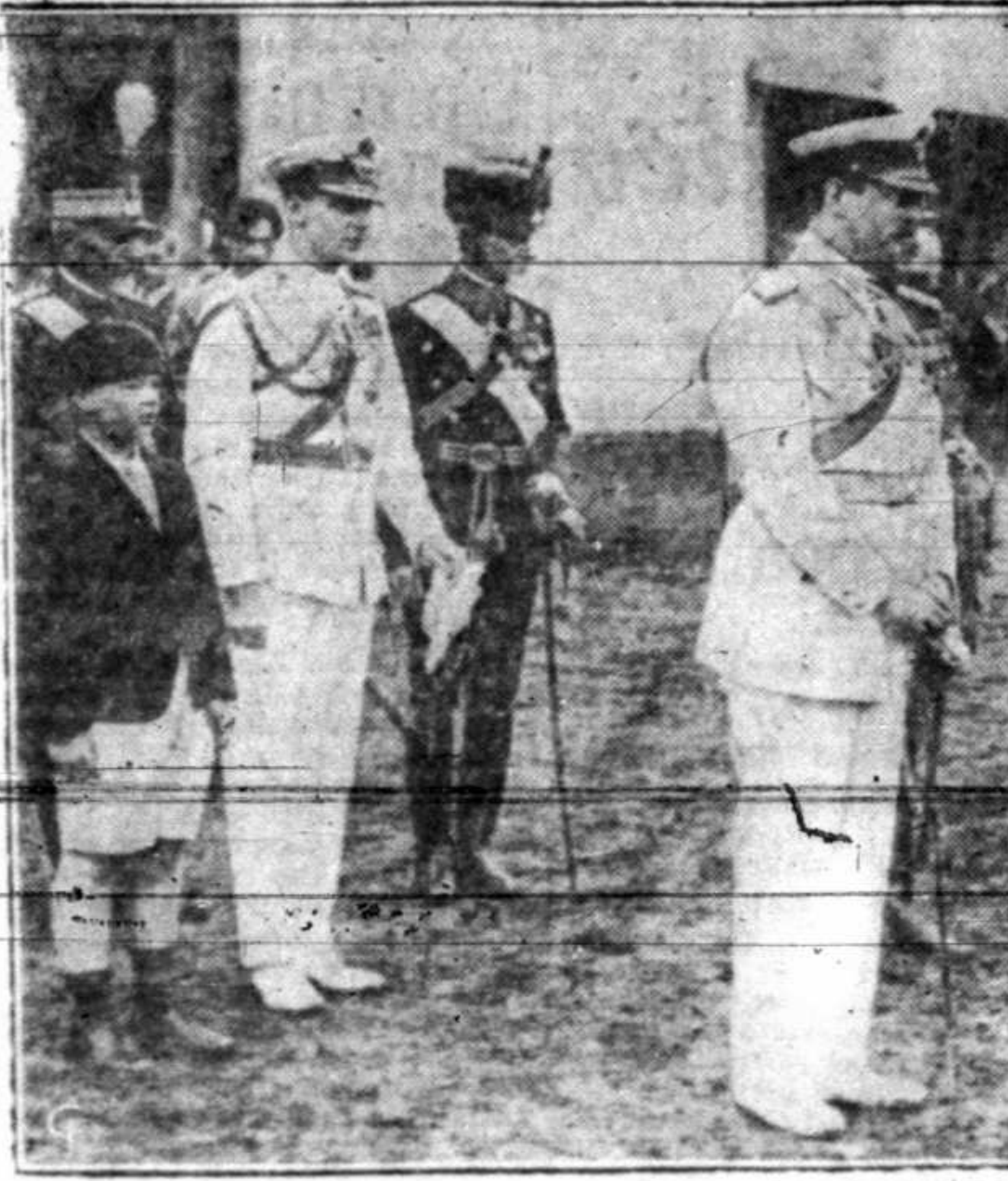

COMMUNISTS PLAYED

Plan To Form Revolution Claimed In Hearing

NEW YORK, July 21. (AP)—Charges of Gregory Bessedovsky, former Soviet charge d'affaires at Paris and Tokyo, that the Moscow government planned to send vast sums to foment revolution in the United States, were placed before the special house committee investigating communist today by police inspector John A. Lyon of the radical bureau.

The charges were contained in an article by Bessedovsky printed in a Jewish newspaper last March. The former diplomat, who was refused entry into the country, accused the Amtorg Trading company of carrying on propaganda work besides being a commercial agency of the Soviet Union.

Man Admits Beating His Aunt To Death With Blackjack

(AP)—Bernard Thompson, 26, of Dorchester, Mass., today was on his way back to Saugus, Mass., following upon a confession to police here that four days ago he had beaten with a blackjack his aunt, Mrs. R. Edith (Thompson) Wright, a private detective. The body of Mrs. Wright was found in the Saugus home Wednesday.

Police said Thompson told them the fatal beating was administered Tuesday morning because of "vile remarks" the woman detective had made about his mother.

John Thomas In Statement On Candidacy

Lamesa Candidate for State Representative Announces Platform in Interview; in Favor of Good Roads

(By Associated Press)
LAMESA, July 21.—Stating that he believed Lubbock is proud to be the home of this district's state senator and that that city is willing for the member of the lower house to come from its trade territory, John N. Thomas of Tahoka, candidate for state representative for the 11th district, released some of the planks of his platform in an interview here recently.

Thomas is 36 years of age and was born in Georgia. As a youth he moved to Alabama where he received an education from the public schools and from North-Eastern Agricultural college of Albertville, Ala., and Perry-Raney college of Auburn, Ga. Mr. Thomas served his home county of Lynn as tax assessor for three terms, six years, retiring from the office in 1920.

Pioneer of County.
The Lynn county man is a pioneer of this section, having moved to Tahoka in 1905 where he has since made his home. He recalls many changes in this section of the country during these past 24 years; among them the passing of the great ranches and the coming of the farmers.

"I have also seen the school system develop into one of the best of our Lone Star state from the few scattered one-room buildings to the many fine brick structures which are our pride. In this respect we have seen the coming and many of us have participated in securing for this section, one of the outstanding institutions of learning in the southwest. If not of the nation, our Texas Technological college. This institution is our own and we are just proud of it. My pledge to the people of this district is that I will at all times be alert to its every need and will untiringly fight for appropriations that will not hamper it in its development and in the education of the youth of the southwest. I, also of course, stand for the continued progress being made in our rural schools of this area.

Favors Good Roads.
"One of the present issues being carried to the people is that of good roads and highways. I judge to our citizenship to at all times fight for this section's equitable rights in the proportion of our state highways and the maintenance of same. I am, and have always been, in favor of good roads and hard surfaced highways, however, I cannot support at this time, a bond issue for the amount of something like three hundred and fifty millions of dollars. A loan of this size on the commonwealth of Texas is not in keeping with the present economic condition.

"As this section of the country has turned from ranching to the growing of crops and a great portion of the area is now under the plow there is no other question to us than that of our farmer and farm owner. My aim is to assist in any way possible and support such legislation as will tend to stabilize a better price for farm products, including dairy, poultry and stock farming.

"The penitentiary problem is another major issue before our state. I am for and will support legislation for the improvement of our penitentiary system and the handling of the state's unemployed prisoners. I believe a plan can be arranged whereby it will not be necessary to tax burden our state in bringing about a correction of the existing condition."

Thomas also mentioned prohibition as an issue that the voting public is interested in in their candidacies. He states, "If I go to Austin I will conduct myself the same as among my home people, in a sober, moral way in keeping with the dignity of the position. The many existing organizations with the purpose to undermine our prohibition laws makes this an issue at all times."

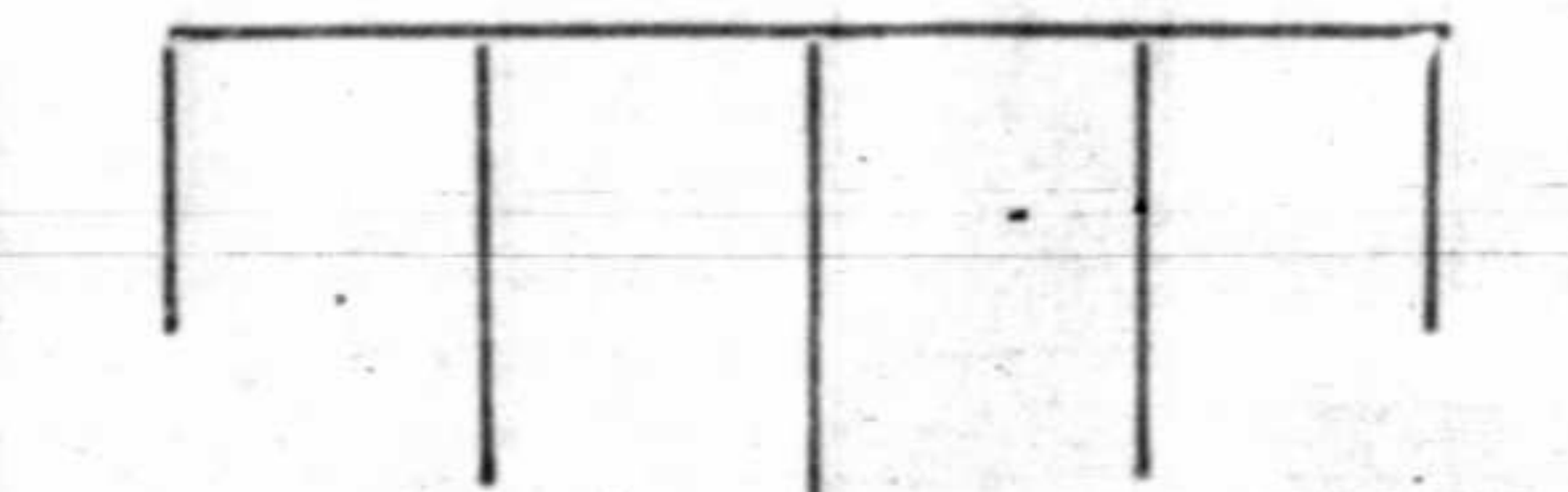

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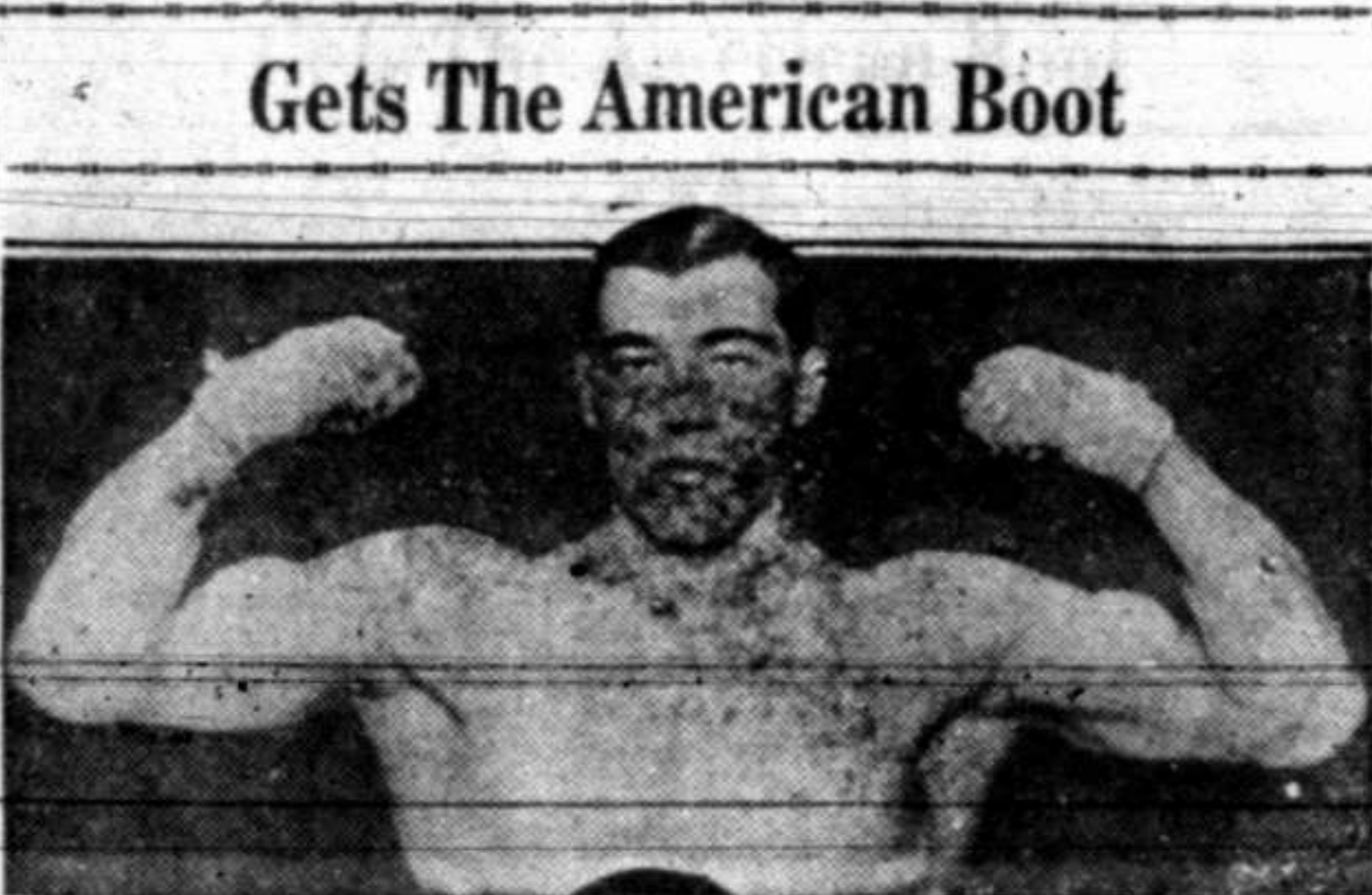

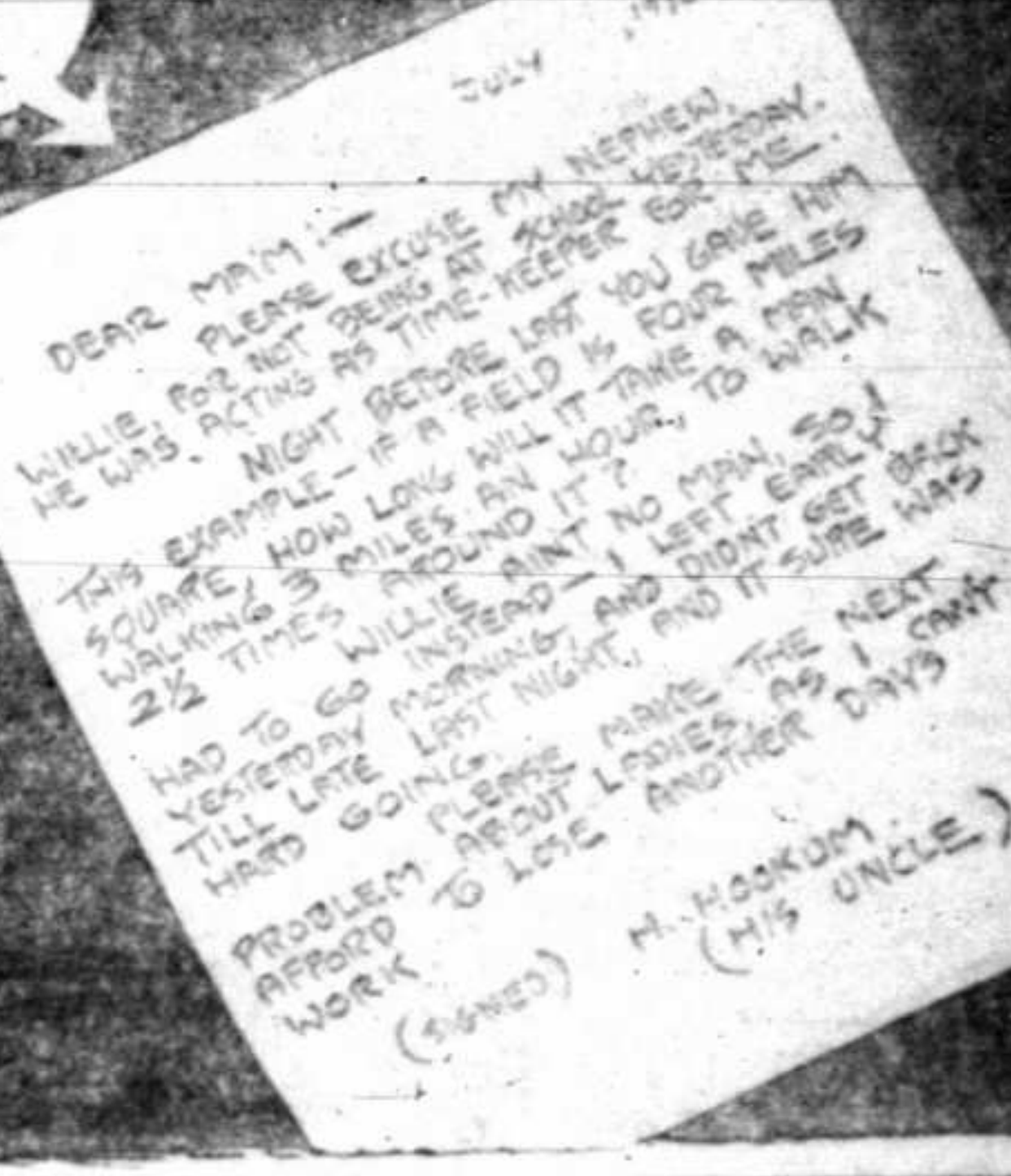

Norris' Name Given Place

Broken Bow Grocer Is Barred From Ballot In Nebraska Primary; Belated Filing Is Held Void

(By Associated Press)

LINCOLN, Neb., July 21.—Chief Justice Charles A. Goss of the Nebraska supreme court has ruled that the name of George W. Norris, Broken Bow grocer, should not appear on the republican primary ballot as a candidate for the United States senatorial nomination in opposition to Senator George W. Norris of McCook.

The chief justice reversed the decision of the secretary of state, Frank Marsh, who had accepted a belated filing for the Broken Bow grocer.

The secretary of state was ordered by the court to refrain from including the name of the Broken Bow man on the August 12 primary ballot.

Under the ruling of Marsh announced yesterday, the name George W. Norris would have appeared twice on the ballot for the republican senatorial nomination. The secretary of state ruled that the filing received by mail at his office July 5, bearing postmarks of July 3 were legal notwithstanding the time limit expired at midnight July 3.

INVITATIONS MAILED

More Than 500 Are Asked To Druggists' Session

SNYDER, July 21. (Special)—More than 500 invitations were mailed out of here today by President Lee T. Stinson of the West Texas Pharmaceutical Association for the semi-annual convention of the organization at Lubbock, August 12th and 13th. Secretary Lawrence B. Davis of Sweetwater has likewise mailed special data to each member. President Stinson believes that the Lubbock meeting will be even greater than the Fort Worth meeting this spring when more than 600 members and guests were in attendance.

Task Of Bringing 60,000,000 People Into Church Is Goal of Its Members

(By Associated Press)

CLEVELAND, O., July 21.—Church members face the task of bringing 60,000,000 people of the United States into their houses of worship, missionaries told delegates to the International Waltham league convention here last night. The missionaries said their work is growing tremendously and that more trained workers are needed to handle it adequately.

"Church members need the courage to face the missionary tasks confronting us, with their feet firmly placed upon the solid ground of sanctified practical intelligence," said the Rev. Walter Birkner of Fort Wayne, Ind., who spoke on home mission projects.

"We need men and women who will help tackle the task of reducing the vast army of 60,000,000 unchristened here at home by means of systematic and consistent effort. We need men and women with whom the word 'sacrifice' is more than a soothing catchword or a passing fad."

BOAT CRASH IS FATAL

Girl Killed When Speed Boat And Racer Collide

CHICAGO, July 19.—Betty Ayres was killed early today when the speed boat Whoopee, which she was riding with a pleasure party, crashed into the racing yawl Scourah owned by George Pulver of Washington, D. C., catapulting her against the sailboat from the prow of the speedster.

Both boats were sunk, but the other occupants escaped with minor hurts. Passengers on the speedboat "Whoopee" testified at today's inquest that the yawl "Scourah" carried no lights and that it cut across their path too late for them to avert a crash. Those on the other boat, who missed the inquest due to misunderstanding of the place, told newspaper men that they not only had navigation lights, but that they tried to signal the smaller boat with a flashlight. Both boats sank.

REVIVAL IS SUCCESSFUL

SNYDER, July 19. (Special)—With 34 conversions and 63 additions to the First Baptist Church in a revival that has just closed, church people believe a record has been established here. Rev. Philip McGhee, local pastor, did all the preaching while E. Otis Allen had charge of the singing service.

Rhinelander, Wife Reach Agreement

LAS VEGAS, Nevada, July 21. (By Associated Press)

Attorneys for Leonard Kip Rhinelander, scion of a socially prominent New York family, and Mrs. Alice Rhinelander, his octocon wife, announced today they had reached an agreement under which she would recognize the divorce he received here several months ago.

Harley A. Harmon, Las Vegas, attorney for Rhinelander, and L. R. Jacobs, of New York, attorney for Mrs. Rhinelander, said the final property settlement would be taken before Judge Edwards in the district court here for approval. The attorneys declined to reveal details of the agreement but indicated it called for payment of between \$200,000 and \$500,000 to Mrs. Rhinelander.

Note Purports To Be From Aviators

NANTUCKET, Mass. July 21. (By Associated Press)

Gordon Chase, fisherman, Friday found in the water off Smith's Point a bottle containing a note bearing the "4-30-29." And a message purporting to have come from aviators lost at sea.

The message, written in pencil on a sheet of paper torn from a note book, was as follows: "We are exhausted, all fuel gone now drifting on a calm sea with no food. Help is prayed for by us all. The engine is gone and we could not fly if fuel was obtained. Unable to give latitude on account of no instrument."

Aviation Circles Brand Note As Hoax

NEW YORK, July 21. (By Associated Press)

A note found in a bottle off Nantucket purporting to have been written by aviators lost at sea, was considered a hoax in aviation circles here.
