Warn Motorists On Illegal Passing Of School Buses

The Texas Department of Public Safety announced an intensified enforcement program against motorists who illegally pass a school bus stopped to take on or discharge children.

Captain Glen Warner, commanding officer of this district of the Highway Patrol, warned motorists that patrolmen would issue arrest citations for this violation.

"The law is very clear as to a driver's responsibility," the Captain said. "It requires the driver of any vehicle, upon meeting or overtaking from either direction, any school bus which has stopped on the highway for the purpose of receiving or discharging any school children, to stop the vehicle immediately before passing the school bus. After stopping, the driver may then proceed past the bus at a speed which is prudent and not in excess of 10 miles per hour. Even then, the driver must use due caution for the safety of the children." The statutory fine, prescribed by law for violation of this act, is one dollar to two hundred dollars, plus cost of court.

"During the first six months of this year, Texas had three persons killed and 122 injured in accidents involving school buses," Warner said. "This is tragic and useless. School buses are plainly marked and motorists know that they carry a priceless cargo—human lives."

TALCO TROJANS DOWN COOPER IN MUD BATTLE FRIDAY, 14-0

Talco Trojans slid and sloshed in the mud Friday night to a 14-0 conquest of the Cooper Bulldogs at Cooper in the season opener for both teams.

The Trojans rammed over the Bulldog goal in their first series of plays in each half, and generally dominated the rest of the game. Bu trains of the past week made running slow.

The Trojans stormed through their first series of plays, scoring in only six tries after the opening kickoff.

Fullback Jack Dixon put the Trojans in the scoring column with an 11-yard jaunt through right tackle that gave Talco a 6-0 lead. The TD play was preceded by a nine-yard blast by Rodney Russell, 3 14-yard gainer by Dixon and an 11-yard sweep by Sidney Bonds. Bonds swept around the right side of the Cooper line for two extra points.

Cooper threatened briefly when Silmon recovered a Trojan fumble on the Talco 10. The Bulldogs moved close to the goal line before another fumble gave the ball back to the Trojans.

The Bulldogs fumbled on the first play after the second half kickoff, and the Trojans moved to the Cooper 20 before fumbling. On the next play Cooper again lost the ball on a fumble, and Talco struck pay dirt again, in six plays as they had on their first TD.

Bonds, 160-pound halfback, scored from the three-yard line, where a penalty had put the ball after he had romped seven yards

in each of two plays. The extra point try was no good.

The Bulldogs took to the air when their ground attack stalled, but the muddy field cut into the aerial attack. Talco, moving on the ground, didn't throw a pass during the entire game.

Gas Tax Refund Deadline Oct. 1

Annual claims for refund of federal excise tax paid on gasoline, used on a farm or ranch for farming or ranching purposes, must be filed with the Internal Revenue Service district director by October 1.

According to IRS Dallas District Director Ellis Campbell, Jr., refund claims should be made on Form 2240 for gasoline used between July 1, 1961, and June 30, 1962.

Forms and a helpful booklet, "Farmer's Gas Tax Refunds," are available at IRS, or County Agricultural Agent offices.

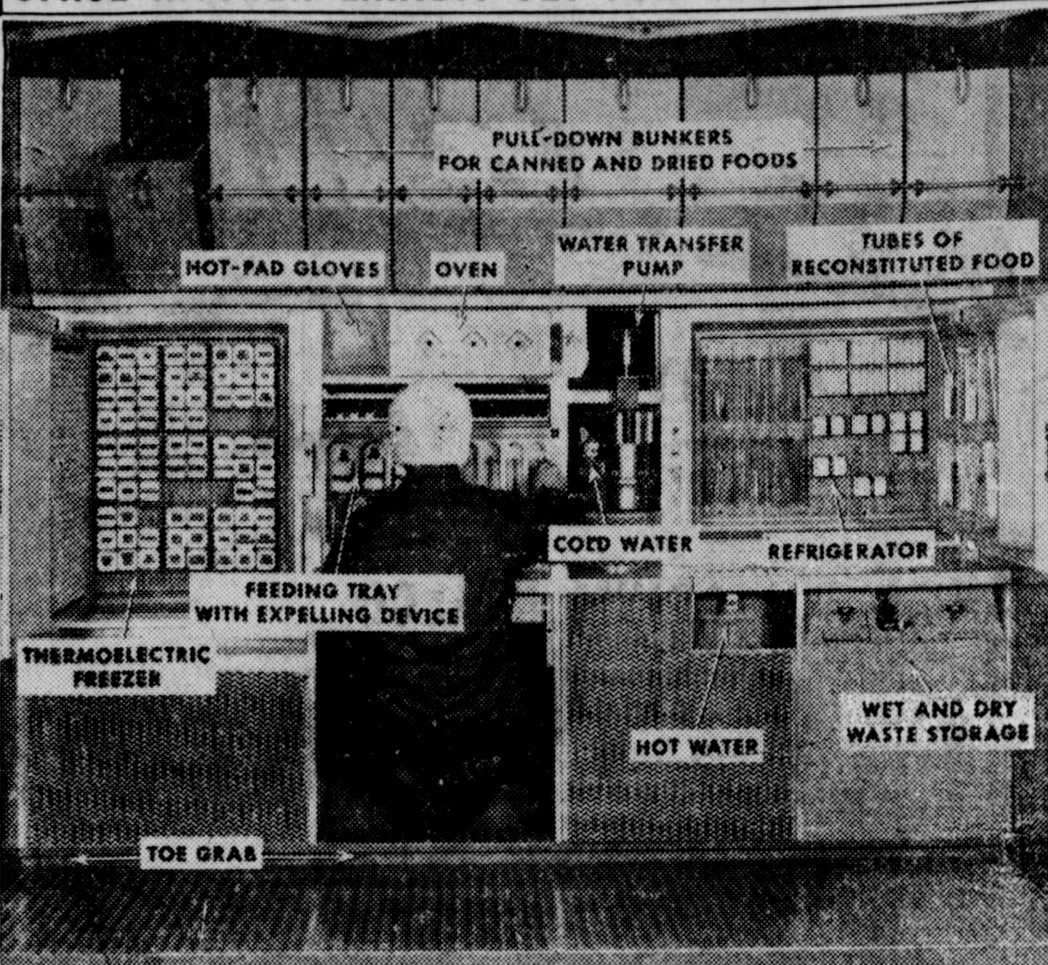

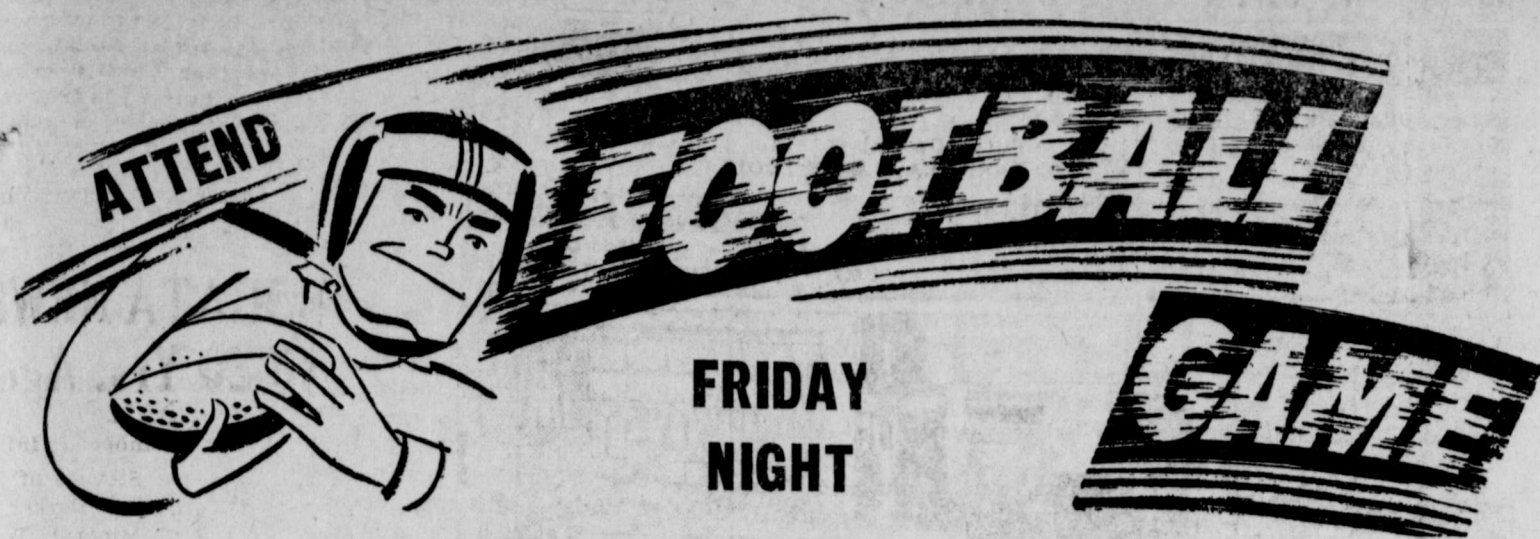

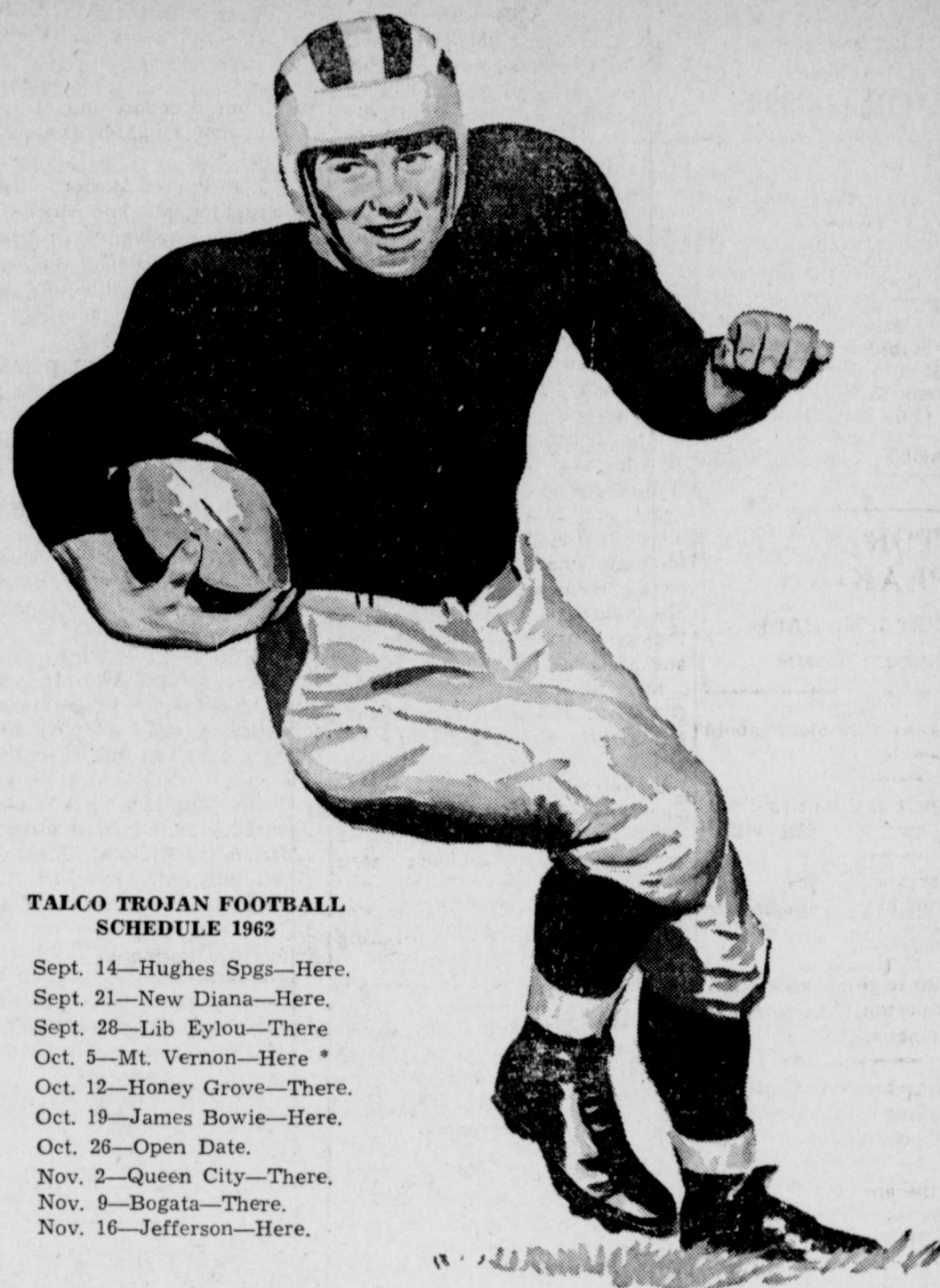

Alcorn Tells How to Read Newspaper To Get Straight News From Russia

Editor's note: Achin Alcorn Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Sulphur explains how to read a newspaper, his letter this week indicates.

Dear Editor: A friend of mine came by this place yesterday and said: "Well, have you heard the good news? Russia has had five rocket failures recently."

According to him — I didn't see the account myself — Russia has tried five times to send a rocket to Venus and Mars and has failed.

"I'm sure glad to know this," he said, "I was beginning to believe they never failed over there."

What this proves is that a lot of people don't know how to read the newspapers. They read only what's printed instead of going between the lines. This way they miss about half of the news.

For example, nobody has ever read that one of Mr. Khrushchev's automobiles had a flat tire, but regardless of how many times a Russian astronaut orbits the earth, you can't make me believe Russian tires don't go flat.

I have known for years that any time a man gets up every morning to drive a tractor, sooner or later he's going to get up one morning and find one of the tires

flat. There is no system of propaganda and one-sided reporting that will keep a tire from going flat, and by using this same understanding I've known for years that some of Russia's rockets have fizzled.

Moreover, you never hear about any Russian planes cracking up, but I'm sure as I am that my tractor battery is going dead eventually that Russian planes have trouble too.

What was the traffic accident toll last week-end in Russia? According to what you read from that country, they apparently don't have wrecks over there, but if Russia had only two cars, sooner or later they'd run together, and I've seen pictures showing they've got a lot more than that.

I'm not discounting Russia's ability, but engines miss and cars run out of gas and generators burn out and mufflers fall off and people get mad at each other and women gossip and school kids' shoes wear out over there the same as they do any place else. I don't have to read it in a paper but I can sit right here on this Johnson grass farm and tell you for a fact at least 1,000 Russian farmers couldn't get their tractors started this morning. Why wouldn't a few rockets sputter too? Yours faithfully, A. A.

Grant \$225,000 R. R. Co. Hospital Improvement

P. D. Marable, Chairman of the Red River County Hospital Board, and C. A. Tedder, Hospital Administrator, were notified this week that the State Board of Health has approved a grant of \$225,000 for construction of a new wing and renovation of the present hospital.

The grant was made from Hill-Burton funds, which are used to pay up to 50% of the cost of non-profit hospital improvement. Earlier this year, county residents voted \$225,000 in general obligation bonds for the building program, estimated to cost a total of \$450,000.

A contract has been completed with O'Connell and Probst, Architects, for hospital improvements. In a meeting this week, Probst advised County officials that plans and specifications would probably be completed late this year. It is expected that bids can be taken about January and that construction will require approximately one year, inasmuch as normal operations must continue at the hospital during the construction period.

After consultation with the county depository bank, County Judge Gavin Watson, Jr., has authorized investment of county hospital building funds in U. S. Treasury bills until such time as the money is required. The interest rate being received by the county is roughly equal to that being paid on the bonds.

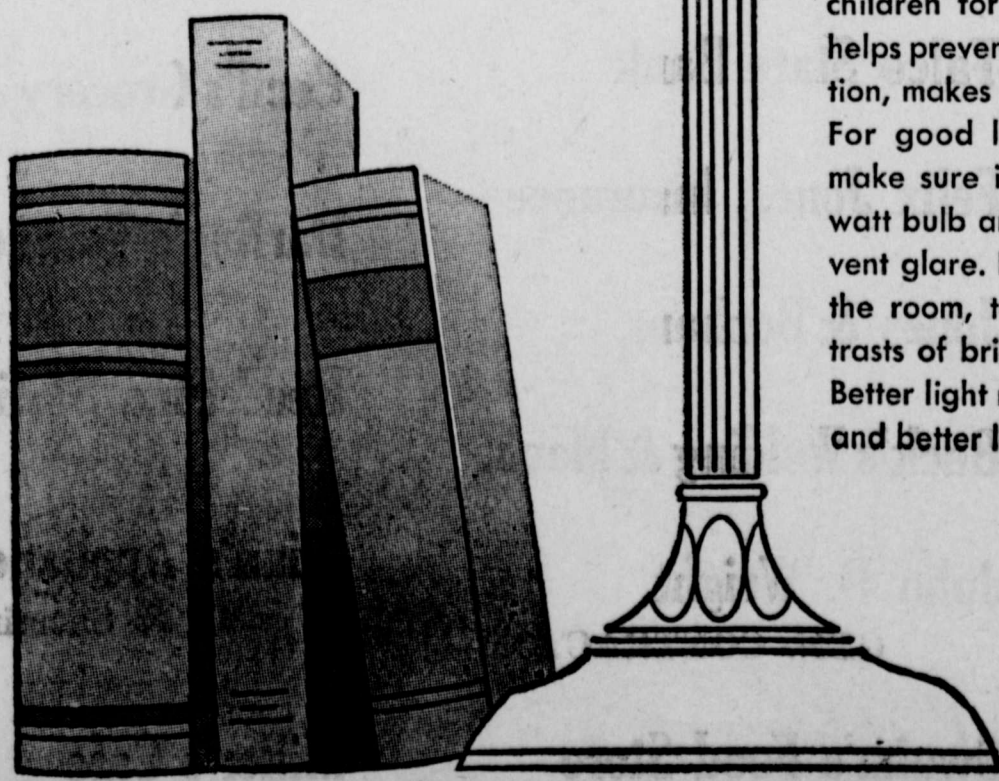
