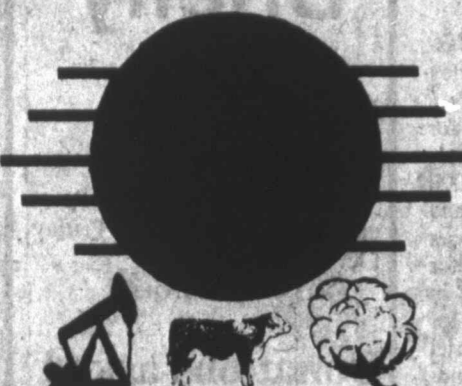

The Mitchell County Jail Monday was cited for five areas of non-compliance during an annual inspection by the Texas Jail Commission.

Jail escapee still at large

A prisoner who escaped from the Mitchell County Jail Thursday, Sept. 24, is still at large, Sheriff Wendell Bryant said Tuesday. Lina Quintana Meza, 36, an illegal alien from From Mexico, was discovered missing from the jail about 6:30 p.m. last Thursday. He was being held in jail for evading arrest, criminal trespass and criminal mischief and was awaiting action from the U.S. Border Patrol. Meza had been in the jail since Sept. 6 after being arrested by city police. Bryant said Meza is not considered dangerous.

"These areas of non-compliance do not create that much of a problem, and we should have them corrected in the next couple of months," said Sheriff Wendell Bryant.

Last year the jail was cited for three or four areas of non-compliance and did not receive a certificate of compliance and Bryant said a certificate will not be received until all areas are corrected. "We will correct these items, but next year, the inspector may find other areas of non-compliance," said Bryant. "This is a continual process of updating the paperwork and the structure of the Mitchell County Jail and we will continue to strive to meet these standards." Inspector was Joe Slater of Sweetwater. The first area of non-compliance was a smoke detector

in the detox cell which did not operate when a smoke bomb was released.

"We have ordered smoke bombs and as soon as we can get them, we will experiment for the best position for the smoke detector and place it there," said Bryant.

The second area of non-compliance concerned the separation of male and female inmates. On Monday, the inspector noted that male and female inmates were not separated by sight and sound.

"The door between the male and female cells in the hallway was ajar on Monday about a foot and a half, and the inspector

wrote us on that," Bryant explained.

The third area of non-compliance cited the jail for not having an annual inspection of the food service area by health authorities.

"We will call the Texas Department of Health and have them come to the Mitchell County Jail when they have time and inspect the jail kitchen facility," said Bryant.

The inspector also cited the jail for not having a grievance plan provided in the jail operating plans.

"The grievance plan will be studied in the jail standards book and will be adapted to our jail operating plans," said Bryant.

The last area of non-compliance cited the jail for not providing a jailer on the second floor when 10 or more inmates are housed there.

Bryant said that a jailer will be placed upstairs when the count reaches 10 or more "which may mean that we have to get the city police department to answer our phones and dispatch our radio traffic."

The jail, which has a capacity of 27 prisoners, has two cells downstairs which house eight inmates. There is space for 19 more inmates upstairs in the two-story structure. The jail offices are located on the first floor along with the detox cell.

The board also named Marion Basham as secretary. Mrs. McCarley had been secretary of the board.

The board adopted the budget for the fiscal year which begins Oct. 1. The new budget is about \$300,000 more than the current budget, and Mason said the increase is due to an anticipated increase in revenues for the coming fiscal year. Included in the budget is a salary increase for employees of the hospital district ranging from 3 to 5 percent, depending upon years of service.

Board member Gus Armstrong voted against adoption of the budget, explaining that he doesn't feel the hospital is in a financial position to raise salaries. Total amount of the salary increases for the hospital and nursing home is about \$81,000.

"I think we should hold the line another year on the salary increase," said Armstrong, citing the fact that tax revenues are not expected to improve any next year.

Armstrong said he regretted having to vote against the budget because of the salary increase because "I love these people (employees) up here and I know a no vote will cause some hurt feelings."

In other business, the board: agreed to use \$76,000 from a savings fund to pay for a chemical analyzer for the lab;

gave permission to advertise for bids for X-ray equipment for the hospital and for a new phone system for the nursing home;

amended the medical staff by-laws upon the recommendation of the medical staff that will require 50 percent attendance of the medical staff at staff meetings instead of a quorum before any action can be taken, and;

agreed to formally dedicate the new chapel at the hospital on Tuesday, Oct. 6 at 10 a.m.

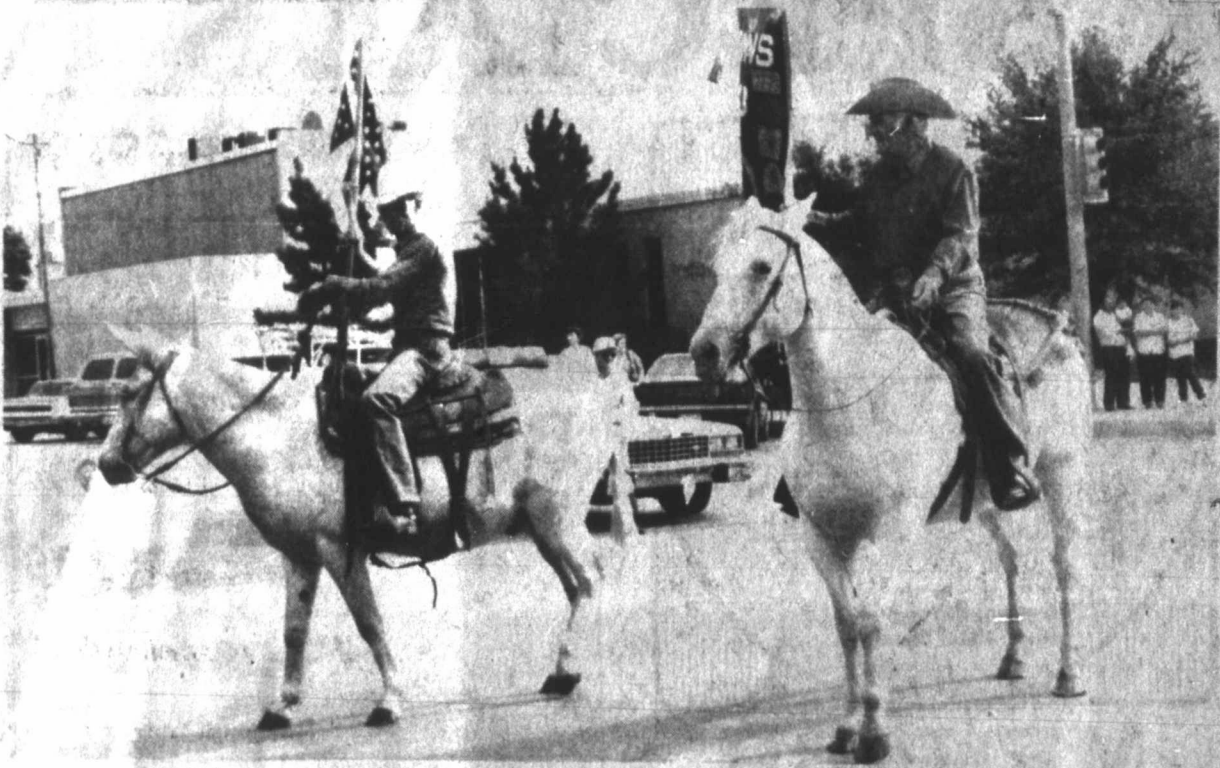

Coahoma Bulldogs improved

The Ballinger Bearcats, supposedly the class act of district 5AAA, had their hands full against the Colorado City Wolves last Friday before pulling out a 2-1 big play advantage.

Taking on the district favorites early can mean easier opponents for the rest of the season but that hasn't been the case in 5AAA.

"It's going to be like that every week," said Wolves coach Tom Ramsey. "The Merkel and Clyde game was close (Merkel won 25-17), Sonora and Brady was close (20-17 Sonora). It was 9-6 Coahoma in the fourth quarter."

No team in the district has a losing season record.

That includes the Coahoma Bulldogs who come to Wolf Stadium for an 8 PM kickoff Friday. The Bulldogs went 0-10 last year but are 2-2 in 1987. They could have been 3-1 had they not given up three fourth quarters touchdowns to Wylie. Wylie won 27-9 after trailing 9-6 after three quarters.

"They're a good football team," said Ramsey. "They're 2-2 and playing pretty well. Their running-back is the coach's son. He's 5'10" and is a sprinter. He's the one they get the ball to."

Curtis Hudson, son of Colorado City coach Larry Hudson, quarterbacks for Coahoma.

"He's doing a good job of running the team and throwing," said Ramsey.

The Wolves have been more consistent on defense.

"The kids are working hard," said Ramsey. "They've got good habits and good attitudes. The defense has been playing well."

Colorado City's defense has been hard to penetrate except at times when a few offensive turnovers have put the defense in dire situations.

"Ballinger went a total of 49 yards for 14 points," said Ramsey. "We both scored after a fumble recovery so we were even there. Their long punt return gave them a 2-1 edge in big plays and that's how the score ended (2 touchdowns to one)."

Ramsey said the Wolves didn't expect much success passing the ball against Ballinger. "Their 8-man front really comes at you when you drop back to pass. Their defense is to rush. When you've got a 6'4" 250 pound person you can rush a lot more. You can't block them all. We wanted to stay away from the sack in order to keep from losing the down and yardage. We wanted to control by running and we did to some extent."

Ramsey expects a different look from Coahoma. "They're

quick and play a 4-3. They just get after it. Probably, if they hadn't made mistakes they would have beaten Wylie. Wylie got two breaks and scored two easy ones. It going to be a good football game here Friday. Coahoma will battle you. They're a scrappy football team."

"Of the four games last week a break or two and the winners could have been the losers."

On Ballinger running back Terry Stramble, Ramsey said "I can see why he's All-State. When he touches the football he makes it happen for them. What impressed me is that he carried 37 times and didn't cough it up. We were hitting him."

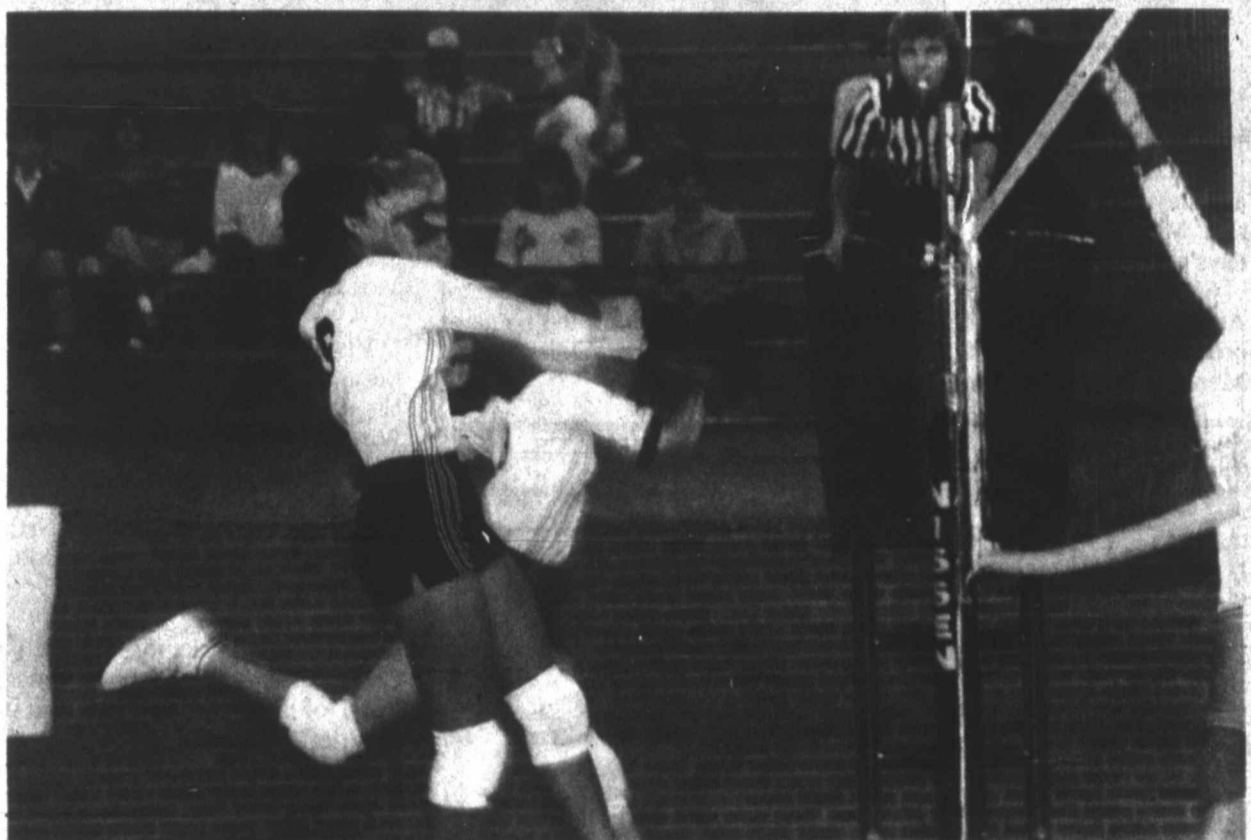

The pass must be shown to gate keepers to receive reduced prices.

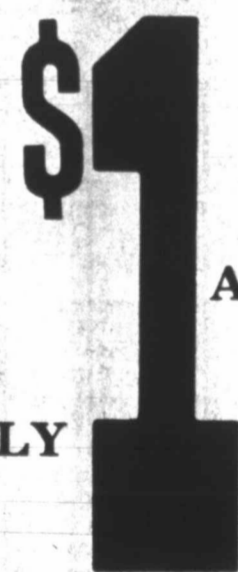
