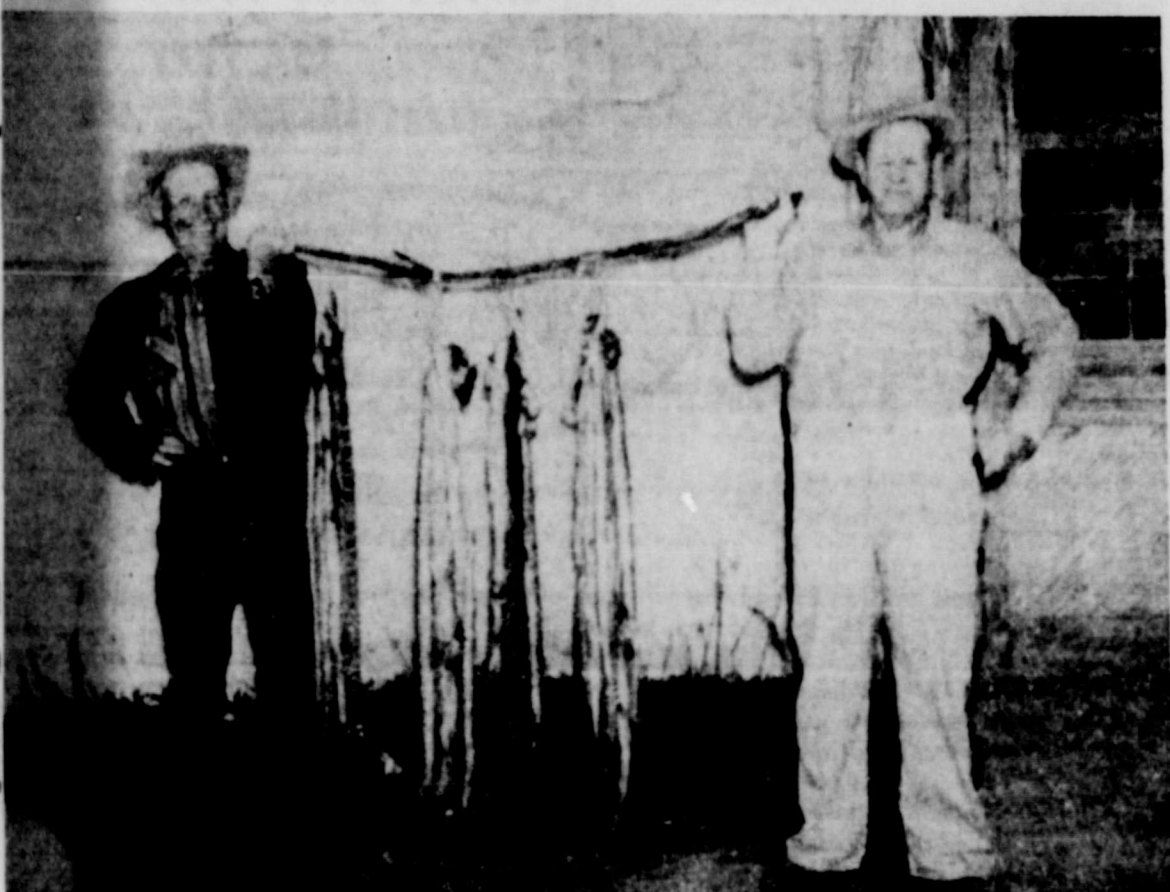

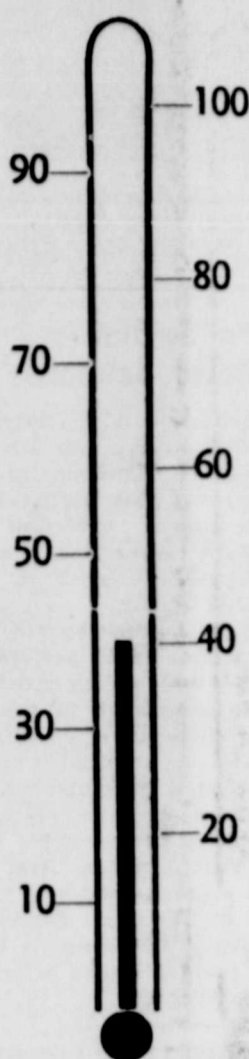

Outstanding Production Record Recorded by Holladay Dairy Cows

Brattleboro, Vt.—The Holstein-Friesian Association of America has announced the completion of two outstanding official production records by registered Holstein cows owned by G. E. Holladay of Hico. Milked twice daily for 328 days, Glasse Fobes Pietertje 3919988 produced a total of 15,186 lbs of milk and 518 lbs. of butterfat as a 6-year-old. Milked twice daily for 335 days, Bosque Breezy Julie 3959544 produced a total of 14,088 pounds of milk and 507 pounds of butterfat as a 3-year-old.

Texas A & M College, working in close cooperation with the national Holstein organization, supervised the weighing and testing of production as a part of the Herd Improvement Registry program.

This official testing program, commonly referred to as HIR, provides continuing lactation and lifetime production records on every cow in participating registered Holstein herds.

Participating is currently at record levels with more than 86,000 cows in more than 2,200 herds enrolled.

Lifelong Hico Resident, Willard C. Sellman, Buried Here Sunday

Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock for Willard C. Sellman, Sr., 76, at Hico First Methodist Church, with Rev. D. L. Barnes officiating. Burial was in Hico Cemetery.

Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Margaret Sellman of Hico; two sons, Dr. Willard C. Sellman Jr. and Thomas Collin Sellman, both of Dallas; and two grandchildren.

Pallbearers were H. H. Ramage, Lusk Randalls, Louis Chaney, Jim Carman, J. P. Rodgers Jr., and Frank Stipe.

Willard Chamberlin Sellman was born on Aug. 25, 1882, on the Chamberlin Farm near Hico. His parents were Tom Sellman and Emily Chamberlin Sellman. His father was homesteading land in what is now McCulloch County at the time, and was later killed in the "fence wars" there.

Emily Sellman and her son returned to Hico after a short time. He received his elementary schooling at Duffau and later attended Dr. Wyson's private school in Hico. In later years he was a student at the McIlhenny Academy in Stephenville and the old Dallas Academy in Dallas. He was an enthusiastic physical culturist in that period, playing football for the Dallas YMCA team and doing amateur boxing.

He returned to Hico to work for Cleve Driskill in the old Driskill Furniture Store, and was later employed by A. B. Barrow Furniture in Rotan.

His uncle, Richard Sellman, encouraged him to return to the farm near Hico about 1912 and shipped him foundation stock of purebred Morgan horses and Angus cattle.

The next few years developed an interest in selective livestock breeding and soil improvement which continued throughout the remainder of his years.

On January 1, 1915 he married Margaret Caroline McClure of Duffau. Two sons were born to this marriage, Willard Jr. and Thomas Collin. Later in 1918 he sold his livestock and enlisted in the U. S. Army. While awaiting orders to duty the Armistice was signed and he returned to Hico.

In 1923 he moved his family to Rochelle and became associated with Sellman Mercantile Co. as general manager. He remained in that capacity until 1929. For a year after that he was agent for Pierce Petroleum Co. in Brady until that company was absorbed by Sinclair. He worked in collections for Flanagan-Chamberlin Chevrolet in Henderson from 1930 to 1933.

In 1933 he returned to the Hico farm. He lived there until 1951 when he and Mrs. Sellman moved into Hico. From 1951 until his death they had lived at the old family home in Hico.

He had been in very poor health for the past two years and had been confined to his home for some weeks until February 1. He was taken to Dallas at that time and was in the home of his son, Dr. Willard Sellman, at the time of his death.

A pioneer Hico resident, John William Autrey, 91, died Monday at his home here. Funeral services were held at 2:30 p.m. Thursday in Hico First Methodist Church, with Rev. D. L. Barnes officiating. Burial was made in Hico Cemetery.

Mr. Autrey was born in Hill County and first came to Hico in 1883 to attend Hico's first school. He had lived here continuously since 1887, longer than any other Hico resident with the exception of Mr. Frank Smith, who moved here in 1888.

Mr. Autrey had voted in every local election except one since 1888 and in 18 presidential elections. He was fire chief for many years and a former member of the city council. He retired from his profession of barbering in 1915.

Surviving are two daughters, Mrs. Claude Huddleston of Hamilton, Mrs. C. M. Langham of Anaheim, Calif.; two sisters, Mrs. Annie Farrow of Houston and Mrs. Joe Hancock of Clifton; two brothers, Lee Autrey of Hico, and Claude Autrey of Dallas; and five grandchildren.

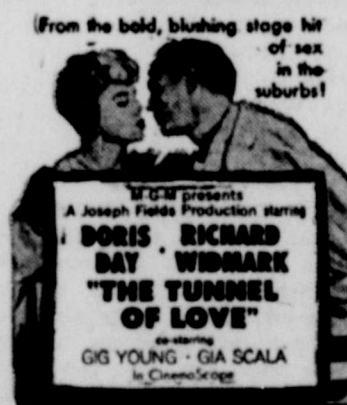

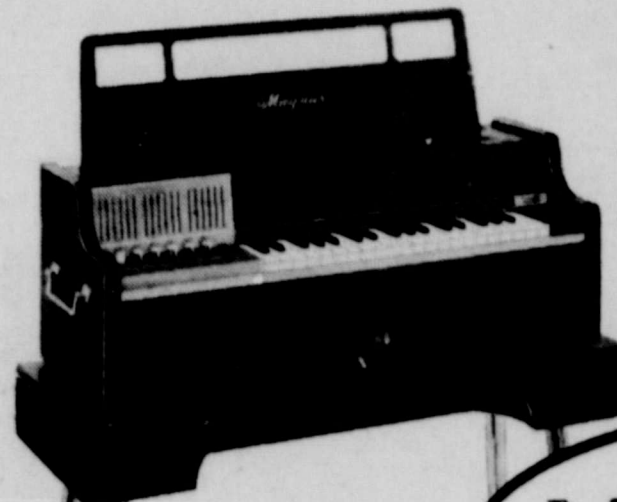

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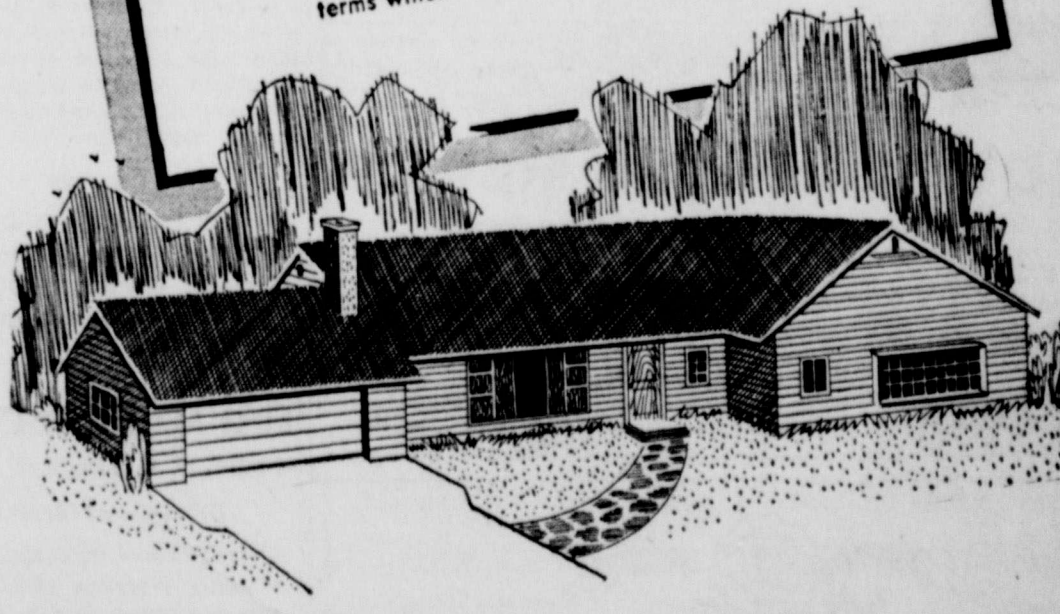

THIS WEEK IN AUSTIN—

Finance Sub-Committee is Verbal 'Tug-of-War'

A glance inside the Senate Finance Committee room gives a clue to the Texas legislative pace, which gathered real momentum during the past week. Several hearings a day are conducted in the verbal tug-of-war between appropriations and revenue, with the Finance Sub-committee bearing much of the work load.

Senators Bradshaw, Lane, Roberts, Aikin, and your Senator comprise this sub-committee. We will hear more than 120 state agencies, institutions, and departments before finally arriving at a tentative Senate appropriation bill.

The committee room is already jammed with reports, books, information, and agency representatives. This busy pattern will continue day and night for several weeks until budget work is completed.

First to be heard were junior and senior colleges and the State Commission on Higher Education. Other agencies, including the Department of Correction Extension Services, and Court of Civil Appeals, will follow.

Tarleton State College's growth is mirrored in its appropriations from the general fund. For example, six years ago, the Legislature appropriated the junior college \$416,352 to operate in 1954 and \$403,305 in 1955. This year's

Legislative Budget Board recommendation is for \$623,269 in 1960, and \$597,052 in 1961.

After approval of our report by the full 21-member Finance Committee, the entire membership will vote on the measure. Differences between the Senate and House versions of the bill will be adjusted in a conference committee, requiring another two to four weeks.

Miss Virginia Duff, representative from District 52 (Ellis County), and I are sponsoring a local court bill concerning misdemeanors or cases.

The measure, S.B. 52 and H.B. 73, provides for the transfer of misdemeanor cases from the 40th Judicial District Court to Ellis County Court. It was introduced to ease a crowded District Court docket.

Both District Judge A. R. Sout and County Judge Milton Hartfield are in favor of the change.

RANCHERS ASK AID

Coryell County ranchers have recently contacted your Senator in support of the Rodent and Predatory Animal Control Service. Reports of the Texas Commission on Higher Education and the Legislative Budget Board seem to have caused a misunderstanding as to the fate of the service.

The situation is this: In its re-

port to the legislature, the Education Commission said the service was not educational in nature and asked that it be transferred from the A & M Extension Service, of which it has been a part since 1952. In line with the request, the Legislative Budget Board suggested moving the Rodent and Predatory Animal Control program to the Texas Game and Fish Commission, with an appropriation equal to its last budget—\$304,000.

Your Senator, like many concerned ranchmen of the 12th Senatorial District, has at various times called upon the service to control livestock predators. In 1958 a trap per killed seven wolves in one of my pastures. The training and ability of these men is top quality. They are very necessary to Texas livestock raisers.

I definitely favor maintaining the Rodent and Predatory Control Service in our state.

Gatesville and Abilene are thus far the only cities applying for the new State correctional school. The Legislative Budget Board general appropriations bill has included \$1,750,000 "for constructing, equipping, furnishing, and paying architects' fees for a new school for delinquent boys to be located near a metropolitan area at a site to be determined by the Legislature."

The Board also allotted \$405,000 to the Texas Youth Council for the Gatesville School for Boys. Plans include construction of four dormitories, various repairs, and rehabilitation of the vocational building. Senate Finance sub-committee members heard the Council Thursday, February 12.

Game Warden Reports

If there ever was a fine day for fishing, it was this past Sunday, and believe it or not, several good strings of crappie were caught late Saturday night and early Sunday morning. Also seen in my rounds a good bass and channel cat caught in the upper end of the lake near Lakeside area.

So it seems to me it is about the right time of the year to be getting your fishing tackle in shape for this early spring fishing. It make good sense to start checking your tackle by giving your reels a good cleaning and remove the old line and replace it with a new one and to check all the guides and wrappings on your rod.

Next I believe I would check the old tackle box by removing everything that is useless or worn out. Next I would take my time and assort my "catchem" plugs from my "look pretty" plugs (and all fishermen have a few of these). See that the hooks are good and sharp and all are intact.

Now most fishermen either carry too much stuff or not enough in their tackle boxes. I would see that I had a small oil can, a small container for carrying matches, and this should be waterproof. Also one pair of long-nose pliers and a small can of first-aid equipment such as band aids, etc. This next item is not a must but it sure wouldn't hurt a bit, and that is a snake-bite kit. Another small item could be a few different size

nails held together by a small piece of tape which might come in handy for handling your lanterns or in case you run out of lead sinkers, you could use them for weights.

I stated before it is very easy for one to carry too much, but it is certainly embarrassing to be out on a lake or stream and need such a small thing as a match or nail and not have one.

Now after you have gone to the trouble of checking your fishing equipment and you are just about ready to go, it would be wise to make one more check, and that is to check your wallet and see that you have your valid resident fishing license required of everybody over the age of 17 and under the age of 65 years, who use a rod or reel or any winding device while fishing.

And then when the right time comes, go a "fishin" and have a good time.

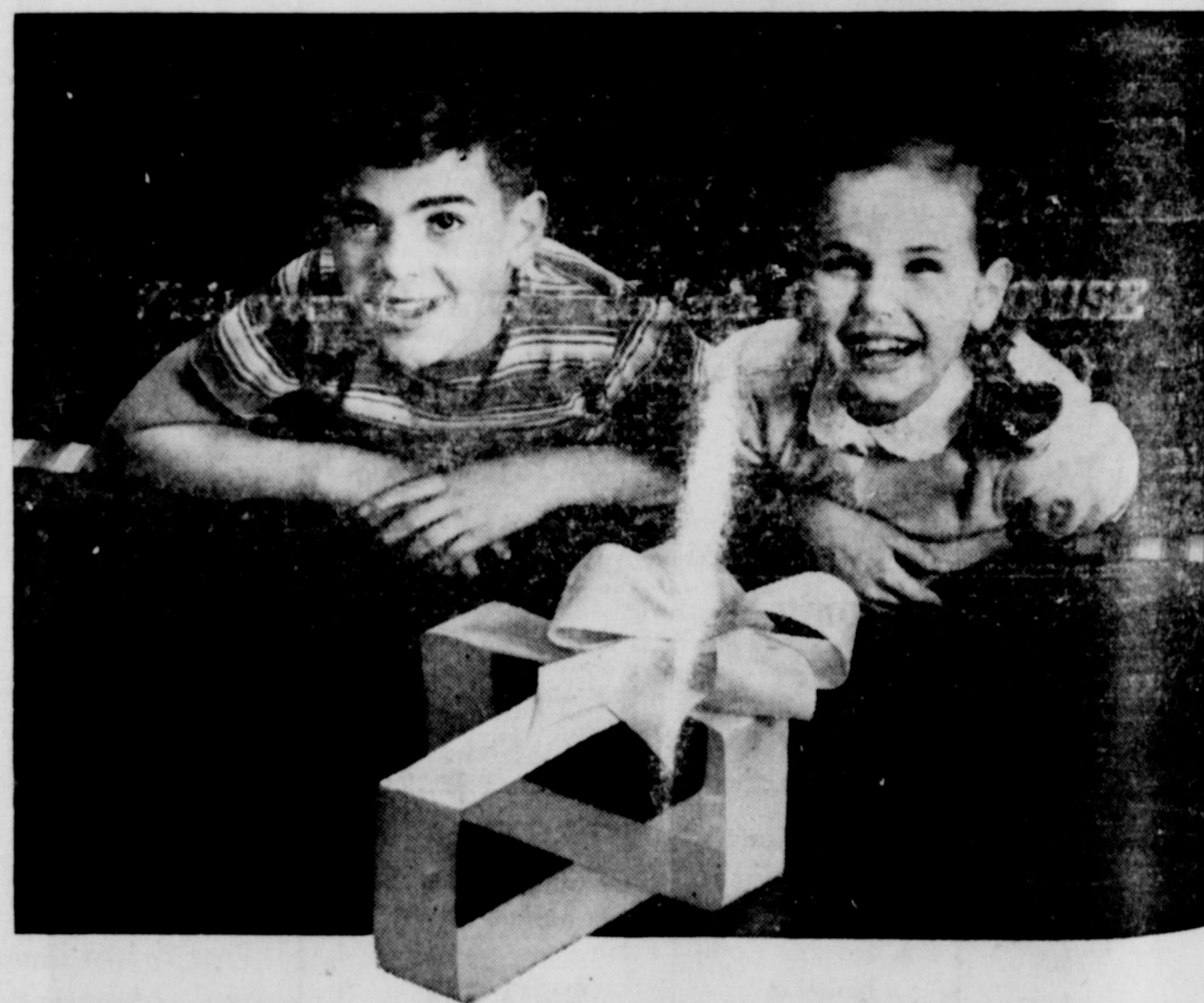

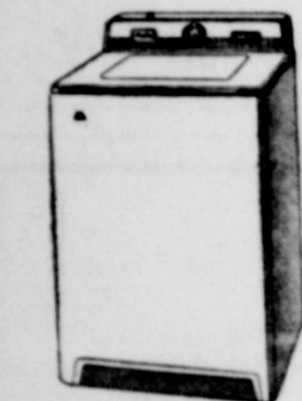

FOOD SUPPLIES

Supplies of potatoes during the next several months will be large enough to furnish ample quantities at low prices. We are now eating potatoes that were put in storage last fall. The fall potato crop this past year was 19 per cent above average. The winter potato crop promises to be about 4 per cent above average.

Potatoes are not as high in calories as you may think. A medium size baked potato has only about 100 calories. It's the butter, gravy and other ingredients added to the potato that makes the calories mount.

Juice oranges, as well as the Naval and Temple varieties are now in good supply in most markets. Prices are reasonable.

On the vegetable counter look for high quality celery at lower prices. Carrots, cabbage, white and sweet potatoes, turnips and rutabagas are economically priced now in most markets.

As for the meat picture, all cuts of fresh pork offer good values in return for money spent. More attractive prices are on pork loins (whole or half), bacon and sausage.

Bake in pan of hot water at 325 degrees F. for one hour and 15 minutes, or until mixture doesn't adhere to knife.

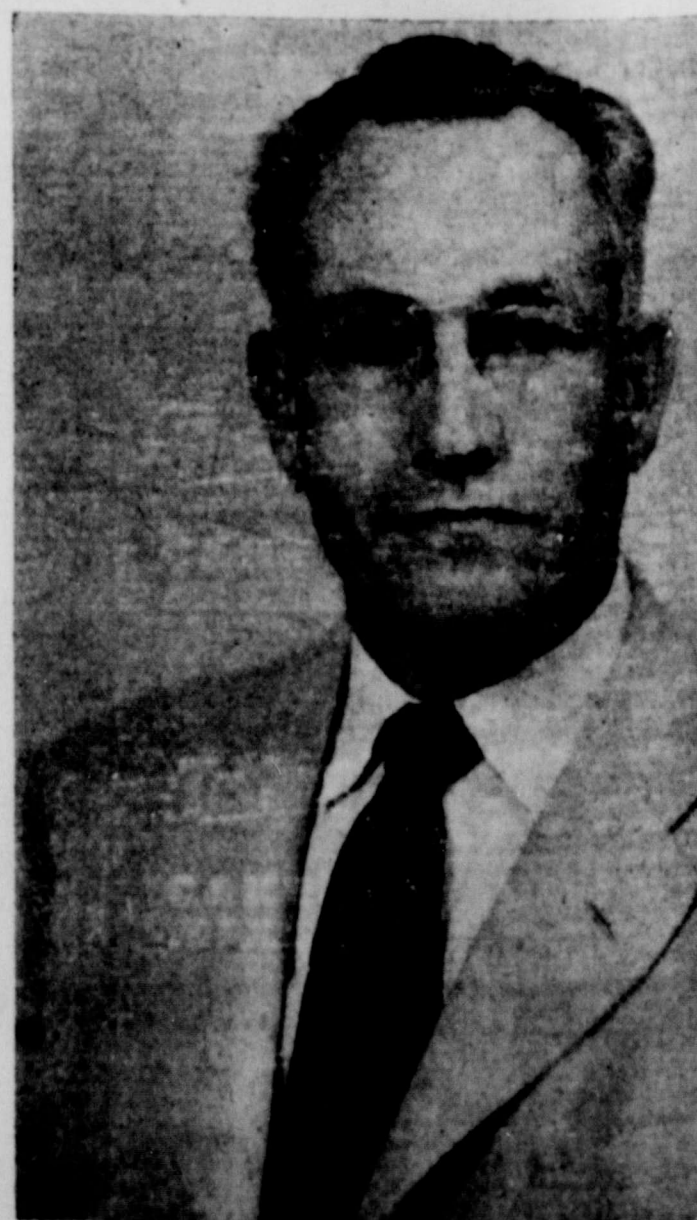

IT HAPPENED HERE OR NEAR—

The Long Arms of Good Men

Back about the middle of the first half of this century a minister read one day in a newspaper report of the Rockefeller Foundation the phrase "The long arms of the Foundation in many foreign lands, lifting burdens and helping people to stand up and..." It was an impressive sentence and the minister grew a sermon as a result of the impression made on his mind by the sentence, and he called it, "The Long Arms of Good Men." Then he preached it many a time in various parts of the state in which he lived and ministered. In his sermon as an illustration he told this story:

"When I was a lad back in the Eighteen Nineties there was an epidemic of typhoid in our part of the state, and I took the malady in rather violent form. For weeks I lay helpless on a cot in the boy's room of our house. People were dying in great numbers and the funeral processions passed our house almost daily while I was ill. I would lie on my side and watch the processions of farm wagons and buggies as they passed and wondered if I would soon be in the lead-wagon in such a procession.

But due to the services of a good doctor and the blessing of Heaven I finally recovered. It was a happy day for me when one morning Mother said I could go to the table for the noon meal, my first in many weeks. My meals had been served me as I sat on the side of the bed all those weeks. I was filled with exultation. When dinner was announced I stood up to walk into the dining room. I did not realize my weakness until I tried to make my feet carry me to the dining room table. My head began to act funny and I was in the act of falling when Dad, who had realized what might happen and was now immediately behind me, put his hands under my armpits and kept me from falling and gave me sufficient help to get to the table. That's a picture of the long arms of good men helping the weak and needy."

And that was a good illustration of the sentence in the newspaper story of the Rockefeller Foundation's helpful ministry in so many fields in so many parts of the world.

A little sermonizing here and now will not hurt. Men and women ought to be good for when they are they can stretch out hands

of helpfulness to weak and needy souls the world around. Mission enterprises afford us a never-ending picture of that very thing. One of the most influential men in the world today, Switzer, went to a dark area of Africa early in this century and gave his help to ignorant and savage natives who lived in utter hopelessness. Now the whole continent feels the power of his life and is becoming one of the great and influential areas of the whole world. And when you rejoice about that marvelous advancement of a backward people, you know that the long arms of that self-sacrificing missionary have helped a continent to stand up and be counted in the affairs of the world. And the story can be told of so many parts of the world rising out of helplessness because good men reached out hands to help.

The minister quoted above in his discourse told how as a boy he had some evil desires that constantly beset him, but as he was attacked by the sinful impulses he remembered Joseph, how he refused to be seduced by Mrs. Potiphar, and he said, "I was helped to stand up and resist depraving temptations because I felt the

hands of Joseph reaching from a Palestinian grave across an ocean and so many centuries and helping me to stand up and be pure. And so have multitudes of tempted souls found strength in weakness because a young man sorely tried stood up and grew long arms that have wrought miracles of helpfulness."

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

Hamilton County will have two places this year where Coastal Bermuda grass sprigs can be secured.

One of these places is from the Oakley Nursery about two miles south of Hico on Highway 281. The other place is the R. G. Stapleton farm on the river, south side, about a mile west at the new bridge on Highway 281. Stapleton has secured a sprig digging machine and will start digging around the last of February. Those needing sprigs should contact Mr. Oakley at his nursery or write to Stapleton, Box 97, Wolfforth, Texas.

The Hamilton County Soil Conservation District Supervisors have purchased a machine to set out the springs and it can be rented from them for a small charge. The Hamilton FFA Chapter is in charge of this machine and should you wish to use it, see Reuben Smith, chapter advisor.

T. J. Thompson has a small field that he put to Coastal Bermuda last year that is doing good. The grass is easily seen as it is located at the new bridge on 281, just south of the river and to the west of the highway.

Lynn and Ed Taylor also have coastal on the places they are working. Their grass has been out several years and is pretty well established.

Indications are that Coastal is a good grass to sprig where the river gets out and causes damage. The grass will stand lots of water and will not be killed out if it is covered for as long as thirty days.

Jeff Perry says he has enough silage left to carry his stock thru the winter. Jeff is very well pleased with the results he has had in wintering his stock on silage and is planning to have a trench silo filled again this year.

Practice of B-2 of the ACP program is one that has been getting good results in pastures where it has been carried out. This is the deferred pasture practice.

Resting a pasture is one of the best ways to improve it—and at the same time get paid for doing it. There are two resting periods to the practice, one for six months and one for nine months. The six months deferred period runs from May 1 to October 31, while the nine months period is from April 1 to December 31. Payment for the six month deferment is 50c an acre, and for the nine months it is 75c per acre. Resting a pasture should produce a good supply of winter forage for winter use.

Practice B-5 is another one that many took advantage of this past year. Under this practice comes the digging of wells and the construction of adequate water storage facilities. Many big concrete storage tanks were constructed last year and there appears to be a need for more of them. This practice will pay 50 per cent of the costs.

It is to the advantage of the county to plant all the allotted cotton acreage. If you do not expect to plant yours, turn it back to the ACP office so they can let some one else have it who would like to have more.
