

South Plains Development Praised At Banquet Forty Ferry Passengers Swept Into Icy 'Frisco Bay

First Reports Had All As Drowned; Later, All Saved

No Accurate Check On Toll Of Accident Occurring As Big Boat, With Passengers "Dipped."

NAVY BOATS RESPOND TO PICK UP VICTIMS

Coast City Thrown Into Confusion By Report of Accident; Boats Report No Bodies Sighted.

(By the Associated Press) SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 17.—Between 15 and 20 persons swept overboard from the ferryboat Peralta into San Francisco bay were reported rescued tonight two hours after the disaster. The ferryboat Hayward brought seven persons to shore here, a navy boat from Coast Island was reported to have picked up several more, and the others were believed to have been saved by other ships.

J. P. Potter, vice president in charge of operations of the Key Route Ferry system, issued a statement saying he believed all the passengers had been rescued. He said he believed that nearby boats had picked up all the victims from the water.

Boats which cruised the scene of the accident reported that no bodies had been sighted nor had any victims been seen struggling in the water.

No reports of missing persons had been received at the police stations.

AT FIRST TWENTY FEARED DROWNED

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 17. (AP)—Possibly a score of persons were drowned or killed by shock or exposure when 35 to 40 passengers were swept from the ferry boat Peralta into the cold waters of San Francisco bay shortly before six o'clock tonight. No exact estimate could be obtained tonight from any source.

The Peralta, jammed with commuters was en route from San Francisco to Oakland when off Yerba Buena Island in the bay the front of the boat suddenly dipped as though struck by a mammoth wave. Seven persons were almost immediately picked up by lifeboats from the ferryboat Hayward which passed as the Peralta nose dived. The remainder of those swept into the water was unaccounted for. Dark-

Rumor Sandino and Marines Make Peace

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17. (AP)—Although it was said at the Navy Department today that no official advice had been received from Nicaragua regarding reported peace negotiations between Sandino and Rear Admiral Sellers, it was pointed out that the admiral in command of the fleet in Central America, had authority to represent the United States in such negotiations. Secretary Wilson declined to comment on the report, as did Major General Lejeune, commander of the marine corps, who said, however, that if Sandino laid down his arms the marine corps would be gratified.

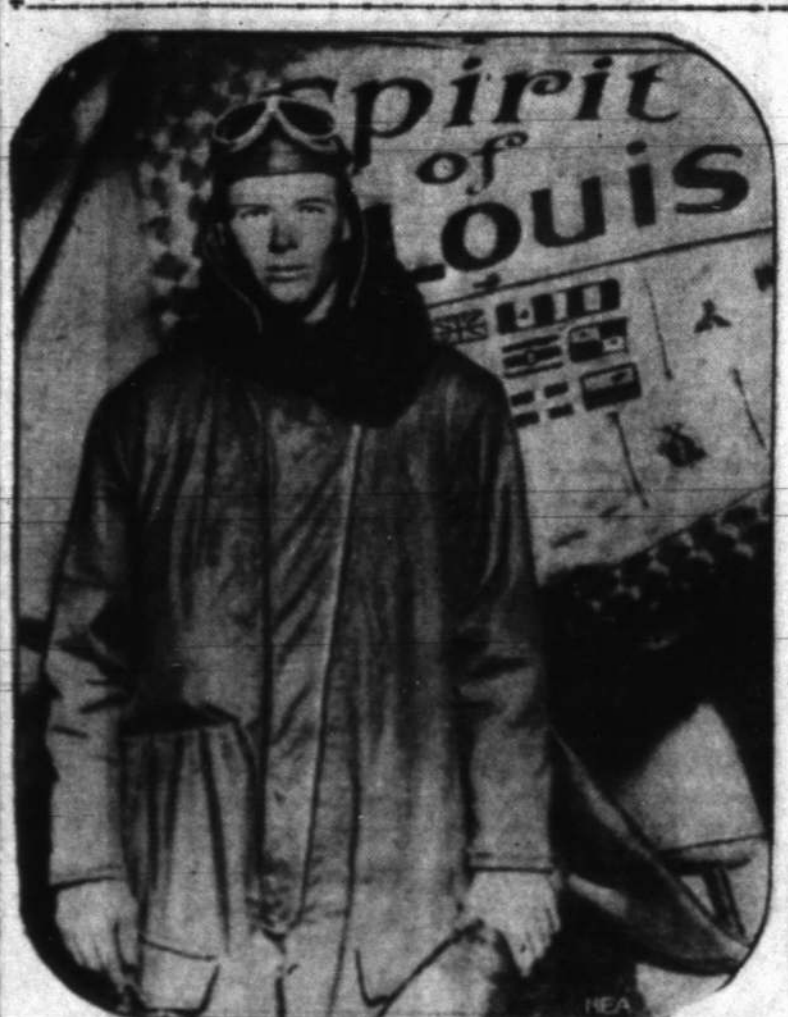

Five Year Term Arbitration Held Key to Peace In Calloway Case

Fourteen Hours of Deliberation are Required; Notice of Appeal Given By Defense Attorneys.

Notice of appeal from the verdict of a jury which after 14 hours of deliberation found P. T. Calloway guilty on a charge of criminal assault, alleged to have been committed on the person of an 11-year old Lubbock school girl, was given yesterday afternoon by Senator W. H. Blaine and Charles C. Crenshaw, defense attorneys.

Mr. Calloway who is fifty-nine years of age is the manager of a large cotton compress here. He was assessed a term of five years in the penitentiary by the jury.

An appeal bond, in the sum of \$5,000 was set yesterday by Judge Homer L. Pharr who presided in the case. It was signed by W. B. Poey, banker, and T. B. Dugan, vice president of a large trust company.

The case was given to the jury at 7 o'clock Thursday night and a verdict was returned at 11:30 Friday morning, nearly 14 hours later.

The defendant in the case has been a Lubbock resident for about two and one-half years. He came here from Temple. During his stay in Lubbock, Mr. Calloway has been active church worker. The complaining witness in the case is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Curley Morris, Mr. Morris is in the restaurant business. The offense is alleged to have taken place on or about March 10, 1927.

Little Boy Lost Missing Four Days, Father Reports

Little Johnnie James, two and one-half years of age, son of George James of Muskogee, Oklahoma, is lost or kidnapped somewhere on the great stretches of the South Plains, and his father is now at a local tourist camp, frantic with fear for the safety of his son.

The little boy has been lost four days. He was last seen in Levelland Wednesday, his father said yesterday. He was first missed at Littlefield, and the father has not seen him since. The youngster is about three feet in height, and has two front teeth missing, according to a description given by his father.

VENUE CHANGE IS DENIED TO HELMS, HELD IN BANK RAID

TRIAL WILL START MONDAY AT CISO, Judge Rules Following Defense Motion for Change.

EASTLAND, Feb. 17. (AP)—Henry Helms will go to trial here Monday in first district court before Judge O. L. Davenport on a charge of robbery by firearms in connection with the robbery of the First National Bank of Cisco on December 22.

The trial was set after Judge Davenport then turning denied his motion for a change of venue from which a jury will be selected to try Helms, who it is alleged was one of the four bandits who took \$12,200 from the Cisco bank and engaged in a gun battle which O. L. Helms, Cisco police chief, and G. W. Camacho, callie-men, were mortally wounded has been ordered to report to court Monday and it is expected that selection of a jury will begin at once.

J. Lee Caskey, who defended Marshall Helms, the bandit who garbed as Santa Claus last Christmas, also was charged with three other bandits into the bank and who was given a 99 year sentence will be counsel for Helms.

Robert Hill, held as the third bandit, is in jail here. Arraigned several weeks ago on a robbery with firearms charge, he pleaded guilty but he will be tried on this charge before he is sentenced. The fourth bandit, L. E. Davis, of Bristow, Okla., who was wounded in the shooting at the bank, died in Fort Worth jail Christmas eve.

Charges of murder also are pending against the trio, and a second charge of robbery by firearms face the three in connection with the seizure of an automobile belonging to Ellis Harris of Rising Star.

Helms, Hill and Ratliff were all wounded when they were captured. Ratliff was arrested after a gun battle near South Bend, when the two companions escaped into the underbrush. They were taken three days later in the town of Graham. At that time Helms was delirious with fever induced by his wounds and his condition accounted for the capture, Hill said.

Wash rice through many waters and put into a round bottomed sauce pan with 2 cups cold water.

Beauty!

How and Why

Time was when eye glasses were considered things of utility and necessity and nothing more was expected of them than that they serve these purposes. Then some beauty lover conceived the idea of making a virtue of necessity and applied the principles of art to this terrible consciousness of art; with the result that now it is possible to buy glasses that are both interesting and becoming.

Until recently, glasses were made oval in shape. They were clamped to the nose with a wire-like clip, or were fastened to the convenient ears with large, glistening gold or silver bows. Today there are many intriguing shapes—square, round, oval, rectangular and leaf shape. By carefully studying your type of face with the various shapes it is possible to get a very becoming effect.

There are other things to be considered as well as the shape of the lens; for instance, whether rimmed or rimless glasses should be chosen, nose glasses or spectacles. If nose glasses are your choice, remember that your appearance may be marred by the shape of the piece of metal or shell which bridges the nose. There are two patterns in general use. One rests on the bridge of the nose and has the effect of a ring across it. The other style, arched, does not break the natural line of our most prominent feature. It will repay you to study these important features with the aid of a mirror. Upon the proper selection will depend whether your appearance is to be distinguished or commonplace.

NEXT: Rimmed or rimless glasses, and 1 teaspoon salt. Cover closely and put over a hot fire. Bring to the boiling point, reduce heat to simmering point and simmer ten minutes. Do not lift cover while cooking. Mince onion and cook in bacon fat until brown. Add mutton cut in inch dice and brown on all sides. Put a layer of prepared rice in casserole, add 1 cup tomato sauce rubbed through a sieve and half the meat and onion mixture. Cover with a layer of green pepper cut in shreds with seeds removed. Add another layer of rice, tomatoes, meat and pepper. Add stock or boiling water to barely cover mixture and bake one hour in a moderately hot oven. Serve from casserole.

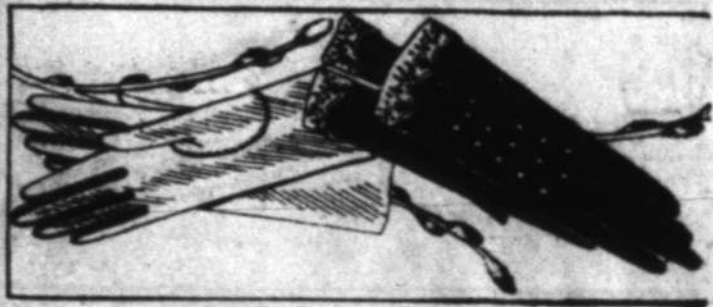

The fundamental force in the universe, the force of gravity, for God seems to have used it to set in motion the forces of heat, light, and chemical activity. This gigantic force holds the universe in an orderly whole, and confines the stars to their enormous orbits. The winds and waves move at the bidding of gravity, and when Christ compelled them to subside he proved his mastery of this greatest of all natural forces, a force so mysterious that the wisest scientists have as yet no idea how it works, and yet a force co-existent with space itself. This may well be regarded as Christ's greatest miracle, and the most conclusive proof of his Deity.

Three Great Miracles, Mark Chap. 5.

In the fifth chapter of Mark I call that the high-water mark of the gospel—there are three persons that were very far gone in the sight of man. One was possessed of devils, another was possessed of an incurable disease, and the other was dead. You couldn't get three harder cases than that anywhere, could you? If we had them with us now, we would put the first in a madhouse, the second in a hospital for incurables, and the third in the grave; but Christ was a match for the whole three. Don't think any man or woman is a hard case and God can't save him?—D. L. Moody. The Man With a Legion of Devils.

5:1-5.

This poor wretch, being possessed with a legion of evil spirits, had been driven to something worse than madness. He fixed his home among the tombs, where he dwelt by night and day, and was the terror of all those who passed by. The authorities had attempted to curb him; he had been bound with fetters and chains, but in the paroxysms of his madness he had torn

the chains in sunder, and broken the fetters in pieces. Attempts had been made to reclaim him, but no man could tame him. He was worse than the wild beasts, for they might be tamed, but his fierce nature would not yield. He was a misery to himself, for he would run upon the mountains by night and day, cutting himself with sharp flints, and torturing his poor body in the most frightful manner.—C. H. Spurgeon.

Clothed and in His Right Mind v. 15.

speaking in quiet tones and uttering reasonable words. It was a wonder that even his relatives and his friends recognized him. Insanity often takes the form of a passion for nakedness, and "clothed" and "in his right mind" belong together.

Tell Your Friends v. 19.

Do not go with me among the strangers in Galilee but stay where you know and are known, and where your testimony will be most readily believed. Heretofore Christ had bidden those whom he healed to keep silent concerning it, but that was in the part of Palestine where Christ's enemies swarmed, where he intended to continue working, and where the people were ready to take him for a leader and rise against the Romans. In the country east of the lake there were none of these reasons for secrecy

as to Christ's miracles, and moreover, this cured man was the only agent for evangelizing the region. The healed demoniac obeyed Jesus. He went all over Decapolis ("Ten Cities"), the region east and southeast of the Sea of Galilee. His was a simple but glorious theme. He told how great things Jesus had done for him, and he told it with such loving power that "all men marveled."

Farewell Tour Of Foy Ends Fatally

Veteran Actor Is Victim Of Heart Attack During Last Tour On Stage; Burial To Be In New York.

(By Associated Press)
KANSAS CITY, Feb. 17. — The farewell tour of Eddie Foy, veteran stage comedian, ended in death here today.

As he had wished it, Mr. Foy died before age had forced him from the footlights.

The 71 year old actor appeared at the Orpheum theater last night in his play, "The Fallen Star." A heart attack seized him when he awoke in his hotel room this morning and within a little more than an hour he was dead.

After lying in state at an undertaking parlor arrangements were made to send the body tonight to New Rochelle, N. Y., for burial.

News of the passing of Mr. Foy, who had been on the stage for more than half a century, brought words of condolence from theatrical stars throughout the country. "A great actor," "The greatest clown," and "a lovable character," were terms used in describing the veteran.

Mrs. Foy, who was the actor's fourth wife, was with him at death. The Rev. John Hennessey administered the last rites of the Catholic church.

Six of the seven Foy children, who were scheduled to open a vaudeville engagement at Madison, Wis. today were notified and will join the funeral party at Chicago. The eldest son was in California.

Mr. Foy had been subject to heart attacks for several months but his condition was not regarded as serious. After his performance last night he complained of having eaten something that did not agree with him.

WAR ON BANDITS

Bankers to Keep Only Small Amounts of Cash

WICHITA, Kas., Feb. 17. (AP)—Kansas bankers, in an effort to make bank robbery unprofitable, have agreed to keep only small amounts of cash at their counters, to carry their cash reserves in safes under time lock and combination at all times and to keep their doors closed and locked except during business hours. R. C. Cleveland, treasurer of the State Bankers association announced today.

The association, he said, has made a standing reward of \$500 for the apprehension of each person later convicted of robbery of a Kansas bank.

GOVERNMENT SELLS

Shipping Interests Sold On Pacific Lines

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17. (AP)—The government went out of the shipping business on the Pacific coast today when the shipping board sold its remaining three cargo lines for \$3,743,661.

In making the sale to three different concerns the board ended a controversy which, raged for months over whether the line should be sold under a five-year or a ten-year guarantee with the advocates of the five-year period prevailing.

The American-Australia Orient line, which operates 21 ships out of San Francisco and Los Angeles to Australia, New Zealand, the Philippines, China and Japan, was sold to a corporation owned by the navigation company and the American-Hawaiian Steamship company for \$1,981,755.

The Oregon-Orient line of 11 ships, operating from Portland, Ore., to Japan and China, was sold to a corporation headed by K. D. Dawson, of Portland, vice-president of the Columbia Pacific Shipping company, for \$1,665,000.

WHEAT BENEFITTED

FLOYDADA, Feb. 17. (Special)—Bringing the week's moisture to two and one half inches, a heavy snow, which started falling at 3 o'clock this morning continued throughout the day. Floyd county's 120,000 acres of wheat will benefit greatly by the moisture.

Artificial Radium

New Tube Invented By Expert

NEW YORK, Feb. 15. (AP)—The possibility of construction of apparatus which will produce the beta and gamma rays of radium is held forth by Dr. W. D. Coolidge, assistant director of the research laboratory of the General Electric company, in announcing development of a new superpower cathode ray tube operating on 900,000 volts. The previous limit of power had been 300,000 volts.

The announcement was made at a meeting of the American Institute of Electrical Engineers where Dr. Coolidge received the Edison medal for his contributions to incandescent lighting and the x-ray.

The new tube is a three-in-one arrangement of the 300,000 volt cathode ray tube. A cascade arrangement expels electrons at the rate of 175,000 miles a second, which is the fastest man-made speed ever attained. It is 400,000 times faster than the speed of a bullet shot from a standard army rifle.

STERLING RETURNS

Demo Campaign Given Big Impetus at Houston

HOUSTON, Feb. 17. (AP)—The campaign to raise \$350,000 for the national democratic convention is expected to be given impetus Friday by the return of R. S. Sterling, general chairman of the finance committee, from New York.

Subscriptions reported Thursday to headquarters of R. M. Farrar, general vice chairman and treasurer of the committee, approximately were \$32,000. More than \$30,000 additional was assured, principally from large contributors, according to R. J. Seaman, campaign manager.

Actual receipts and subscriptions thus far were said to be about one-half of the total amount sought, with two days left of the week in which it was hoped to "go over the top."

"We still can do it, if the solicitors will do their part and the solicited will do theirs," said Mr. Farrar. "Let's all get busy and try our best to finish by Saturday night."

RAILROAD HEARINGS

February Docket Cleaned Up by Commission

AUSTIN, Feb. 17. (AP)—The state railroad commission cleaned up all except one of its February docket cases Thursday, postponing several by agreement. Scheduled for hearing next Tuesday, February 28, involves the application of the Texas-New Mexico Railway company for a permit to build a 35-mile line from Monahans, Texas and Pacific point, through Ward and Winkler counties to the New Mexico line. The Texas and Pacific already has applied for permission to buy the short line company.

Four interlocking cases, having to do with crossings of one railroad over another, were among those postponed. Two of the interlockings are at Houston, one at the crossing of the G. H. and H. with the H. B. and T., and the other at the H. E. and W. T. with the I. G. N. on West Street.

TO DODGE CONTEMPT

Railway Officials to Test Court Rule, However

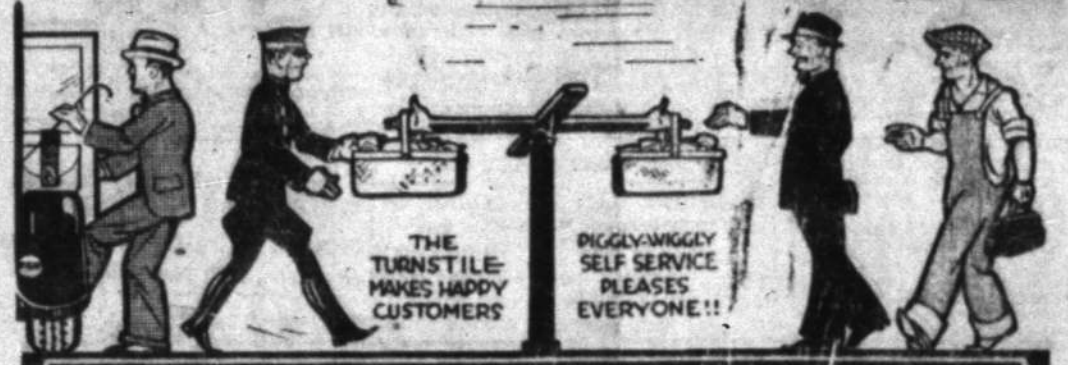
HOUSTON, Feb. 17. (AP)—H. M. Lull, executive vice-president of the Southern Pacific lines in Louisiana and Texas, indicated here tonight that he and two of his assistants would purge themselves of contempt of federal court for which the alternative was a jail sentence.

At the same time, Mr. Lull said, the basis was being laid for an appeal which apparently was intended to test the Esch-Cummings railroad act.

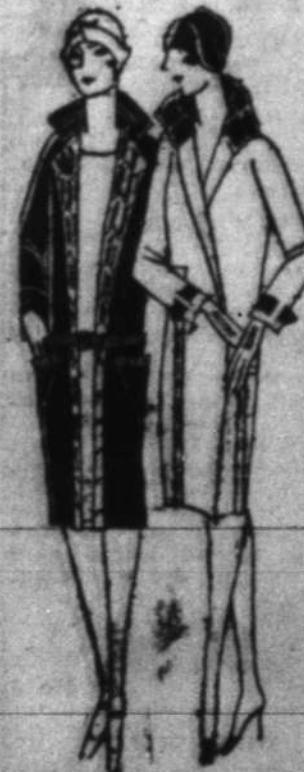
