## New Potential For Lake's Fish Growth

A feasibility study in cage fish culture is pointing up exceptional potential for the warmed waters of Texas Electric Service Company's discharge channel at Lake Colorado City.

Unprecedented fish growth during the usual cold months when fish do not add weight is the report from the study conducted by Texas Electric Service Company Research Biologist John Tilton and Colorado City's James F. Kelley.

Highlight of the study, which could lead to commercial water-rearing in the channel's water area, reveals:

1. The channel water, heated as it cools generators of TESCO's giant Morgan Creek Power Plant, is definitely useful and enhanced for fish culture instead of being handicapped by any kind of thermal pollution.

2. Growth of 1,000 pounds of fish per 1 cubic meter size cage, compared to the few hundred pounds in a surface acre of pond water, usual method for fish production.

3. Optimism by fishery and fish culture experts from across the country that the channel has a potential for possible production of a million

pounds of fish per year.

4. Implications of worldwide importance in face of the critical need for more food to feed the world's soaring population.

Inquiries concerning the tests, which began systematically Jan. 9, are already being received by TESCO from across the nation.

Fish placed in the test cages at that time had approximately doubled in weight in the swift warm water flowing 2000,000 gallons per minute through the canal.

State Game & Fish personnel and West Texas fishermen have long described Lake Colorado City as one of the best fishing lakes in Texas if not the best.

However, the careful testing by TESCO is the first experiment in commercial fish production potential.

Texas fish require 60 degree water temperature to grow. That limits their growth—production of weight, if you consider commercial potential—to approximately six months each year in Texas waters.

Deep level areas of many

larger Texas lakes provide no growth for fish even in summer weather, because of the low water temperature at deep level.

Yet, while fish were not growing elsewhere in Texas, those fish in TESCO's cages floating in discharge channel at Lake Colorado City had 45.6 per cent weight increase within only 16 days.

Biologist Tilton is supervising the tests with Kelley as local cooperators in the experiment and designer of the cages and equipment.

Channel cat have been used

exclusively in the tests, which began with 9 round cages Jan. 10.

A preliminary test was made with a single cage beginning last November for the simple purpose of determining if the more detailed project was feasible.

In that initial caged culture try, Tilton and Kelley placed 1,260 pounds of channel cat weighing one-tenth pound to pound and averaging two-tenths each.

Now, they are stocking each cage with 700 to 1,000 fish.

The fish have come from both commercial culture ponds and breeding ponds of Texas Game & Fish Department.

Tilton said "we can grow almost 1,000 pounds (increased weight) in each one cubic meter cage."

The biologist's conservative estimate for the channel's yearly production is 250,000 pounds.

He emphasizes that this is "conservative," definitely conservative.

Dr. H. R. Schmittou of Texas A&M University, one of the

world's foremost fishery specialists and developer of the cage culture for fish, is much higher with his estimates.

He said the annual potential from this single canal probably would be many times more than the 250,000 pounds we are conservatively estimating," Tilton emphasized.

Dr. Schmittou's comment points to possibility of more than a million pounds of production per year.

That is tremendously impressive—see FISH Page 11

## TV Cable To Add 6 Channels

But 700 to 1,000 tiny, small channel catfish into a 16 by 36 inch cage, then lower 'em all into the water.

When you pull 'em out 16 days later, they are 30 per cent bigger and heavier.

Amazing, even to fishery and fish culture experts world over.

But how do you accomplish it?

Texas Electric Service Company Research Biologist John Tilton of Fort Worth and Colorado City's James F. Kelley have worked in providing the assets of discharge water from TESCO's Morgan Creek Power Plant at Lake Colorado City.

The discharge channel, of course, is the big secret, with 60 degree temperature in winter.

But here is the way Tilton and Kelley

## Kidnaping Suspects Moved To Dallas

Three youths, accused of kidnaping, went back to Dallas Saturday in handcuffs and chains.

They were released to Dallas police detective at Mitchell County Jail, where they had been held since being captured at 8 a. m. Friday 7 miles west of Colorado City.

Charges were expected to be filed against the trio in Dallas over the weekend.

Herbert Wayne Hawkins, 27, Dallas bus driver and father of four children, rode a bus home Friday afternoon when the keys to his car could not be found.

One of the trio in custody is believed to have thrown the keys into a field when they fled on foot after Hawkins escaped from the auto.

Hawkins' head was bandaged and blood stains marked his shirt when he stepped into the bus.

The injury, which required medical treatment here, was inflicted by the oldest and largest of the trio near the Oak Cliff section of Dallas Friday night at the beginning of the kidnap ride.

"He hit me with a Coke bottle," Hawkins told The Record. "I don't know how many times."

"He told me he would kill me if I did not keep my head down."

"I believe he would."

The youth accused of the assault is 6'2", 220 pounds, a 20-year-old Mexican from Fort Worth. Hawkins is 120 pounds at 5'7".

Other two suspects are 17-year old Anglo boys from Sherman.

Hawkins said the trio kidnaped him when he refused to take them to California.

Hawkins was in the back seat with the big 20-year-old, dozing off-and-on from effects of the head beating, he said, when they stopped his car at Cattleman's on Interstate 20 West of Colo-

rado City at about 6 a. m. Friday.

"The driver said he was going in to get Cokes," Hawkins told The Record.

"I heard the Mexican tell the other boy in the front seat that I was asleep and that he was going to the restroom."

"The other one up front didn't answer so I figured him to be asleep."

"I raised up slowly," Hawkins continued, "and when I saw the Mexican, the big one go into the station, I got out and ran."

The little Dallas man, who

is a driver for Texas Motor Coaches, "ran into the cage."

"Several men were sitting there and I asked the lady (Mrs. Donna Delong, waitress) to call police," he continued.

"She told me to get back in the kitchen."

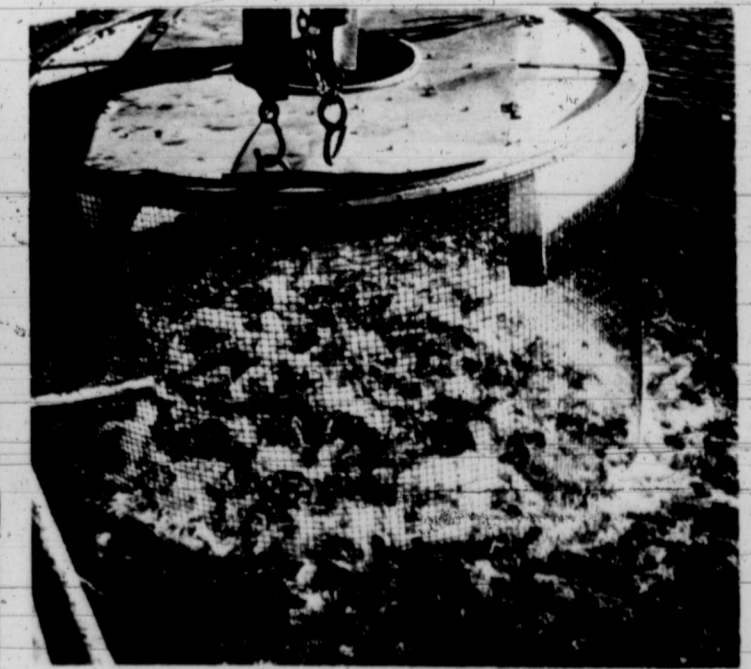
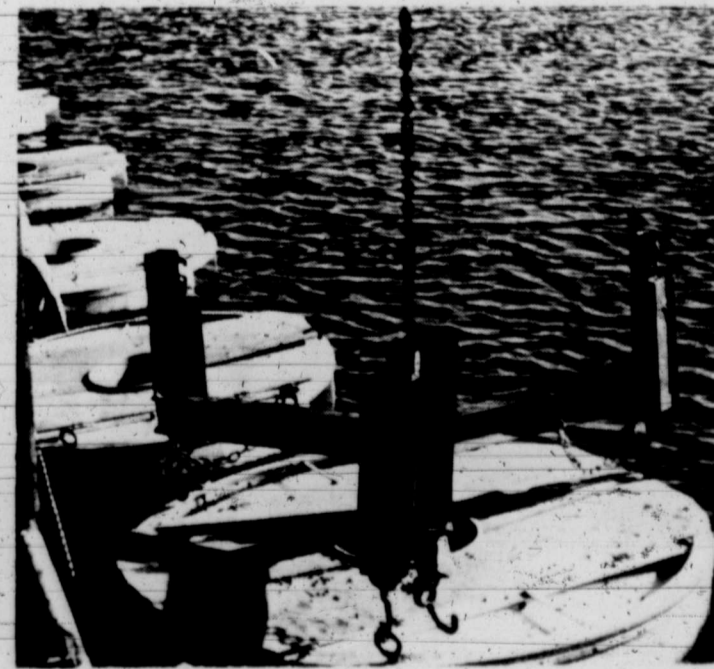
"I told 'em don't tell them where I am... they'll kill me."

Hawkins said the night-long ride began when the big youth, accompanied by the pair from Sherman, asked him to drive them to Fort Worth so they could start to California.

At dawn she got up from her knees and prepared cornmeal cakes for breakfast for the relatives who were arriving early.

"No," she said to each uncle, aunt, and cousin. "No! We may starve but we'll starve together."

They did not starve. They sold the farm and moved to Texas where all six boys grew up to be strong young men. The husband's father was the sixth son. For that matter, husband Bill is fifth child of six children!

Again, foxy to Finch. Somebody's third or fourth or seventh child may grow up to be a genius, or maybe the President.

**HEAR TELL** by the way, is the day we celebrate as birthday of our first President.

## Heart Drive

Heart Fund envelopes have  
been distributed in Kelley,  
Hutchinson and Wallace Ele-  
mentary schools. Students con-  
tributing to the fund will re-  
ceive a heart pin.

But these cages in the channel  
at Lake Colorado City will  
amaze enterprising fish farm-  
ers.

Disease, a constant and costly  
hazard to the commercial  
farmer, has not developed as a  
problem in the 20,000 gallon per  
minute flow of the channel.

Parasites wash away, ac-  
cording to Biologist Tilton.

"They don't pick up bacteria  
as much as in the farms,"  
Tilton explained, "and they are  
not exposed to it."

A surface area poped 3 feet  
deep in water can raise 100  
pounds and up. But 1,000 pounds  
of production is considered out-  
standing even under best con-  
ditions.

So, there is no wonder why  
Tilton raised the eyebrows of the  
World Conference on Aqua-  
Mara Culture this month at  
Louisiana State University with  
his research paper on the dis-  
charge channel tests.

There are 10 cages now -  
nine added after an initial cage  
was tested late in the fall -  
floating with the help of styro-  
foam in the discharge channel.

A cable keeps the round cages  
together, easily accessible to an  
electric powered barge that  
travels out and back from shore  
twice daily.

Before the fish go into the  
cages and lake water, they are  
dipped in a formaldehyde solu-  
tion to eliminate bacteria and  
other disease threats.

Feeding is twice daily from  
the barge through feeding tube  
into each cage.

Commercial trout chow - 40  
per cent protein, 2.5 per cent  
fat, 3 per cent mineral - in  
pellet form is the menu. This  
is fed 7 days per week in daily  
amounts averaging 4 per cent  
of body weight of the fish.

An I-beam on the barge allows  
for lifting the cages from the  
water when necessary for  
weighing and other purposes.  
The specially rigged cages -  
designed by Kelley with alumi-  
num top and mesh-type cloth -  
also allows for disease control  
treatment.

First care of fish amounted to  
1,260 pounds of channel cat -  
averaging .2 pound each and  
ranging from .1 to 1-pound.

When moved from a state  
hatchery in Fort Worth to a  
lake cage, 100 fish weighed 1.4  
pounds and measured about 4  
inches from tip to tip.

After 45 days in the canal,  
the 100 fish weighed 7.5 pounds  
total and measured 7 inches  
long.

Back in the pond, a batch of  
the same fish after 45 days  
showed no gain in weight or  
length.

The increase from Jan. 10  
to Jan. 26 - only 16 days -  
the gain averaged 45.6 per cent  
for all. That means a cage of  
fish weighing 1,260 pounds in  
slightly more than two weeks  
weighed 1,875 pounds in the  
channel.

Back in the pond, not a single  
measurement of increase.

Fish were handled three times.  
In the move from pond to lake  
channel. That resulted in a loss  
of 2 to 3 per cent.

Loss of fish after being placed  
in cages has been less.

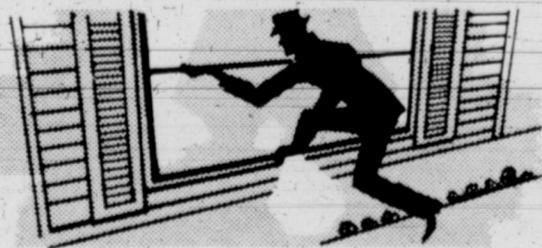
