The evangelist will be Tommy Phelps of Amarillo, a former professional wrestler for 17½ years.

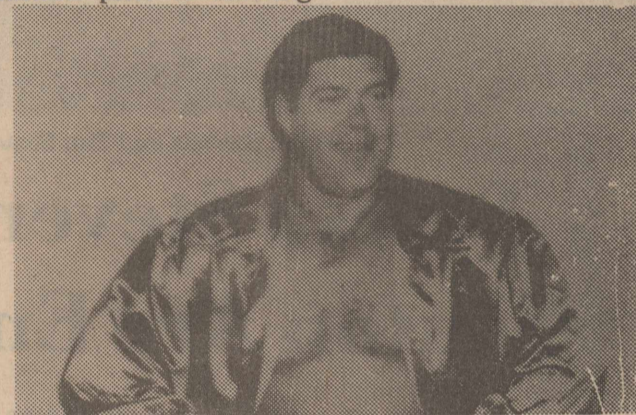
Dan Tucker of Dumas will be presenting special music at each of the revival services.

The Rotan boys track team will take part in their first season meet on Saturday, March 7th at Anson, according to Coach Ted Posey. The meet will be the first time for the new 3200 meter (2 mile) run and will give track fans the premier look at the 1981 squad. Posey is excited about the prospects of a very successful season.

The Rotan Yellowhammers 1981 track schedule includes: Anson on March 7th for boys; Aspermont on March 14th for boys and girls; Jayton on March 21 for boys; Snyder on March 28th for boys, J.V.; Hamlin on April 4th for boys and girls and the District meet at ACU on April 9th for boys and girls J.V.

On April 17th the teams

will travel to Coahoma for boys and girls and J.V.

There will be a boys regional qualifiers meet on April 25 with regional at Odessa on May 1 and 2. The state qualifiers meet will be at ACU on May 9th with the state meet set for Austin for May 14 and 15.

Green Thumb Director Diane Parrish urges both

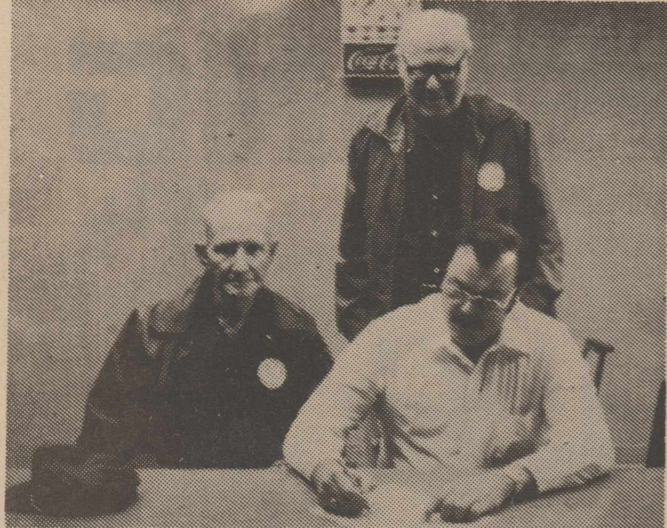

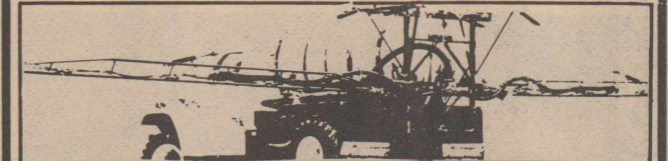
