TURKISH SITUATION LOOKS WORSE NOW

THOUSANDS SEE WORLD SERIES IN TWENTY-ONE

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, Sept. 26.—Two hundred and sixty-nine thousand, nine hundred and seventy-seven persons paid their way into the Polo Grounds last year to see the world series games between the New York Giants and the New York Yankees. This set a new record, the largest paid attendance previously having been recorded in 1912 when the Boston Americans defeated the Giants. The attendance at that series was 252,237.

The official gross receipts last year were \$900,233, eclipsing the former record of receipts, \$722,414 recorded in the Cincinnati Reds-Chicago White Sox series of 1919.

NEW YORK, Sept. 26.—American League pennant winners have won 16 of the world series played since 1905, and National League clubs have taken 7.

Last year the Giants threw off a jinx that had followed Greater New York National League clubs in world series since 1905 by defeating the Yankees. Four times previously the Giants had lost series to American League champions and the Brooklyn Nationals had been unsuccessful twice.

The Philadelphia Athletics hold the record for the least number of runs scored in a series. They counted but three in the five-game series against the Giants in 1905.

SENATOR WATSON OF GEORGIA PASSES AWAY

WASHINGTON, Sept. 26.—United States Senator Thomas E. Watson, of Georgia, died suddenly at his home here early today. Death was said to be due to an attack of acute asthma from which Senator Watson had suffered recurrently for many years. He was stricken suddenly after dinner last night, and death came early this morning. Deceased was sixty-six years old.

ATLANTA, Ga., Sept. 26.—Senator Thomas E. Watson was one of the most famous figures in the history of Georgia politics, during the past four years being considered as wielding the strongest political influence in the state. He was also one of the most prominent editors and authors of the South.

Senator Watson's body will be taken to his home at Thomson, Georgia today. Deceased is survived by his wife and two grand children.

HERE BOOSTING LEGION CONVENTION

A. C. Ater, travelling passenger agent for the Santa Fe Railroad, and E. A. Farr, division passenger agent for the same road, were here Tuesday in the interest of the American Legion convention at New Orleans. The gentlemen are working up a special train of Legionnaires to go over the Santa Fe to the convention at New Orleans next month.

Mr. Ater has been to New Orleans, where he got some idea as to the entertainment which will be staged for the doughboys, and he declares that it will be the greatest convention ever held in the South. Texas is going strong and will make herself heard at the convention. More than \$10,000 has already been spent by New Orleans in providing for the entertainment program, and as New Orleans is somewhat noted for its beautiful French girls and Creoles, it is expected that the stage to be set for the entertainment of the ex-service men will carry them back to the days of Brittany, Normandy and other picturesque French scenes through which the overseas boys passed during the war. The Ballinger post will be represented at the convention with the Texas delegation.

Runnels County Exhibit Attracts Much Attention

ABILENE, Sept. 26.—It is generally conceded by the thousands who are being attracted by the Runnels county exhibit at the West Texas Fair here that Runnels county will carry off first money. The awards are being made today, and crowds are gathering around the Runnels county booth and expressing amazement at the wonderful showing Runnels county is making at the fair.

The Runnels county exhibit was arranged by C. R. Stone, D. F. Eaton, Stuart L. Williams and C. S. Guin. 142 varieties of minerals, oils, farm products and manufactured articles are shown in the exhibit and the arrangement is attracting much attention. The manufactured articles include a Cressy Rotary Filer Company machine in operation, a Cressy collapsible cot, overalls from the Lanford factory, products from the Ballinger Cotton Oil Company, various grades of sand, gravel and building stone from the Ballinger quarries, canned goods, pickled goods, and farm products of the various kinds. Mitchell and Callahan counties are competing with Runnels for first money.

The fair opened yesterday with a parade which attracted much attention. There was over a mile of decorated autos and floats. Horse races featured the first day's program.

A large delegation is expected to attend the fair from Ballinger Friday. Messrs. Williams and Guin are in charge of the Runnels county booth today. Mr. Eaton will return here tomorrow to relieve them.

ATTACK MADE ON GRAIN RATE

KANSAS CITY, Sept. 26.—Representatives of state railroad commissions in twelve states, including Oklahoma, Texas and Louisiana, are in conference here today to discuss ways and means to support the complaint filed by the Kansas public utilities commission against freight rates on grain, grain products and hay in the Western railroad group.

The complaint attacks as unreasonable, unjust and discriminatory the freight rates on these commodities in the states making up the Western group.

RULES IN TRIAL OF ROBERTSON

OKLAHOMA CITY, Sept. 26.—Judge Mark L. Bozarth, district judge in the Oklahoma county district court, was today disqualified by the state supreme court from sitting in the trial of Gov. Robertson on charges of accepting bribes. The court ordered Bozarth to certify his disqualification at once.

The decision of the supreme court is regarded as a victory for Governor Robertson as Bozarth's alleged personal interest in the case constituted the principal issue. The case for which Robertson is on trial grew out of his indictment in connection with the failure of a state bank at Okmulgee.

The Turkish situation reached the critical stage today. Kemal Pasha's reply to the allied governments has been made known at Constantinople by his aide de camp. The reply is an acceptance of the proposed conditions but with the insistence that the Turkish military government shall proceed, and that Russia, Bulgaria and Persia shall be admitted to the proposed peace conference.

The military situation is increasingly serious with the Turkish forces occupying Kum Kalesi at the mouth of the Dardanelles. The Nationalist cavalry is also at Ern Kui, ten miles from the British lines at Chanaka. The armistice conference has been set by the allied high commander for October 2nd, at Mudania.

Constantinople dispatches reports growing indications of the abdication of the Sultan of Turkey and the selection of a successor acceptable to Mustapha Kemal Pasha.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 26.—Unequivocal approval by the Washington government of the allied proposals to insure the freedom of the Dardanelles and Bosphorus, and also to protect the racial and religious minorities in Turkish territories involved in the present Near East situation, was expressed by Secretary Hughes today to reporters of the Associated Press.

FIVE HURT IN AIR EXPLOSION

CHICAGO, Sept. 26.—Five workmen were injured, one of whom is expected to die, and the lives of forty others imperiled by an explosion of an air compressor in the new Illinois Merchants' Trust Bank building early today. Windows in neighboring skyscrapers were shattered.

NEW SWIMMING RECORD SET BY ENGLISH GIRL

ALDERSHOT, Eng., Sept. 26.—Miss Hart has broken the world's swimming record for 100 meters breast stroke, accomplishing the distance in one minute thirty-three and two-fifths seconds. She swam in the Aldershot Command Baths. The previous record was one minute thirty-seven and three-fifths seconds by Miss Van Bogaert, in Belgium, on July 22 last.

WEST TEXAS TELEPHONE CO. REMOVING ITS POLES

The West Texas Telephone Co. is removing the line of old poles on Eighth Street and Hutchings Avenue, transferring the cable to the new poles recently set. The old poles have been doing service since the Ballinger exchange was installed many years ago, and the new poles occupy a place further out in the street, making room for the widening of the sidewalks, which work is to begin in connection with street paving soon.

TWO YOUNG MEN SHOT AT PARTY

OFFICERS BAG CHICKEN THIEF

RURAL SCHOOLS BEING COMPLETED

Schools which were wiped out in the rural district of this county last March are being rebuilt and made into more modern buildings than they were previously.

The Cross Roads school was demolished, but is now being made ready to open for the next school term which is about October 16. The Kristoff school was also razed, but has been replaced by a modern rock building. The Hatchel school, which was badly damaged, was replaced by a two story rock building and is being made ready for the dedication ceremonies which will take place in about two weeks. This school is expecting to enroll a large number of pupils this year.

The bond issue recently voted in the Dale district was lately approved by the attorney general. It was presented by County Judge Paul Trimmer. The trustees met last week and will award a contract for another room to be added to the school, making it a three teacher school. Three years ago the Hatchel district had two one teacher schools. 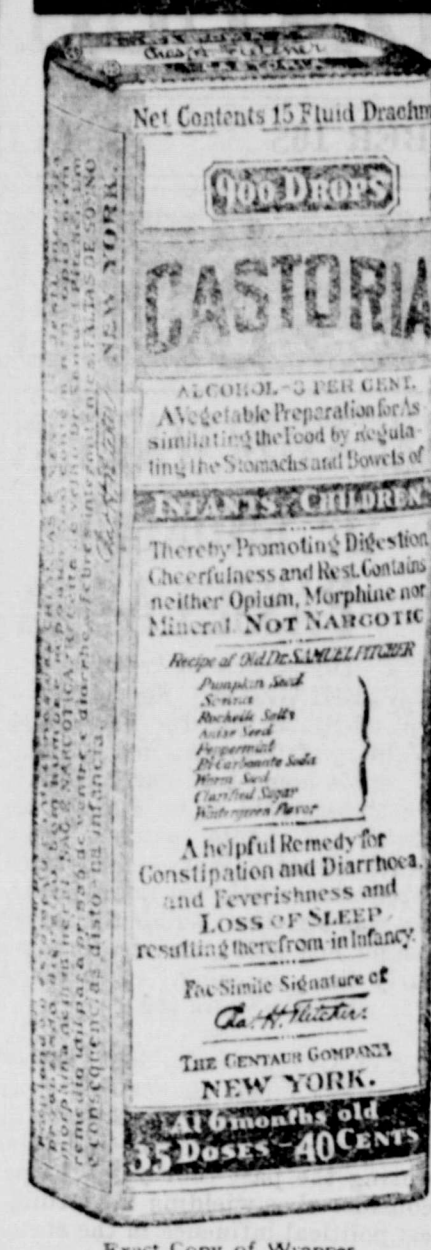
