RABBIT DRIVE NEXT WEDNESDAY

HUNTERS TO ASSEMBLE AT CREAM PLACE, THREE MILES NORTHEAST OF PERRYTON

Arrangements are being made for the holding, on next Wednesday, March 24th, of the biggest rabbit drive that has been held in Ochiltree county this winter. The hunters will assemble at the home of C. A. Cream place, which is 2 miles north and 1 mile east of Perryton. The hunt will start promptly at 10:00 o'clock in the morning. The drive will extend north and east from the Cream place. A free lunch will be served to all participants but the boss cook says bring cups and spoons.

The exact extent of the territory to be covered will be determined by the number of hunters who show up. The men who will be in charge of the different lines will be appointed and announced at the general meeting preceding the drive. No boys under 16 years of age will be allowed to carry guns. No rifles or revolvers will be allowed. The ears of all rabbits killed will be turned over to those in charge of the hunt to help pay the necessary expenses and if there is any surplus it will be transferred to assist in the general expense of a hunt in some other locality.

The people of Perryton and the entire county are urged to take part in this hunt and any other hunt that is held. Hundreds and thousands of these pests are killed in these community drives. Just remember that every time you "bump off" a rabbit, you are saving yourself or your neighbor several dollars worth of damage, which government statistics show that a rabbit does in a small grain country, like we have here. Join in this hunt next Wednesday and in every one possible hereafter.

It has been found that the best policy is to build the country and the country will take care of the growth of the town.

PERRYTON CHAMBER OF COMMERCE OFFERS \$250.00 FOR BEST TEN ACRE YIELD

\$250.00 in cash will be paid by the Chamber of Commerce of this city to the farmer living in the Perryton trade or gin territory, who raises the most cotton lint on ten acres of land and enters same according to the rules of the contest. The rules for the contest are few and simple. The prize is being offered to stimulate a greater interest in a more intensive and diversified farming program and cotton is a great money crop which can be grown successfully in this section as has been proven beyond a doubt by the many splendid crops raised during the past two years.

C. J. Hutchinson, County Agent, and Russell J. Cook, Vocational Agricultural Instructor in the Perryton schools, will be glad to advise with any contestant regarding methods of soil preparation, planting, cultivation, picking and assist in any way possible to make the contest a success. These two gentlemen will appear at the following schoolhouses next week and give short talks on cotton contest and other vital agricultural problems: Lone Tree, Monday, March 22nd, 8:00 P. M. Farnsworth, Wednesday, March 24th, 8:00 P. M. Union, Friday, March 26th, 8:00 p. m. The talks will be short and to the point. The Perryton band or orchestra will accompany them and render a short concert. Other dates will be arranged if the meetings prove a success. The following rules will govern the contest:

1. The prize will be \$250.00 cash.
2. The contest is open to any one in the Perryton trade or gin territory.
3. The prize will go to the contestant raising the most lint cotton on ten acres of ground.
4. The cotton must be ginned at the Perryton gin, and the gin bale receipts showing the weight of each bale will be accepted as official in deciding the contest.
5. All contestants must be registered with the County Agent at Perryton by July 1, 1926.
6. The land entered by contestant, to be measured by a committee appointed by the Perryton Chamber of Commerce, not later than October 1, 1926.
7. Following the measurement of the ten acres, the contestant must run a turn-row around or other wise delimit his ten acres so that the limits of the field will be clearly defined before picking starts.
8. Affidavits to be made by contestant and two neighbors that cotton was raised on the ten acres, measured by the above committee.
9. Less than ten acres may be entered as ten acres.
10. The cotton must be picked and ginned on or before December 31, 1926.

REPORT OF RABBIT DRIVE

The Union School District drive, March 10th, Though damp, cold and misty raining, with north wind most all day. 28 of the 36 square miles was covered.

By count, as best as could be made showed that 4844 shells were used and 2773 rabbits killed. At 4c per shell, \$193.36 worth was used.

Had the remaining eight square miles been covered, and the rabbits numerous, 3560 rabbits might have been our number. But the day was bad, many got almost wet, all cold and damp. The use of pencil and cards, with cold and numb fingers, to make notes of shell and rabbits at end of each drive was difficult. No one can realize the task except by real experience. We claim it a wonderful success in view of the weather for the 120 men in the drive. We wish to thank all who came and took active part, and especially those who came from beyond the bounds of our school-district. We believe there would have been three times as many men in the drive, had the weather been good, and many hundreds more rabbits destroyed.

Nevertheless we are certainly proud of the result of this drive.

There were 25 or 30 men that did not report, leaving before the drive was over, and they are not reckoned in this count, although they are included in the 120 men, spoken of.

Another paper suggests against the cheapest way to enforce Prohibition is to have everyone that is watched. Who is going to do the watching?

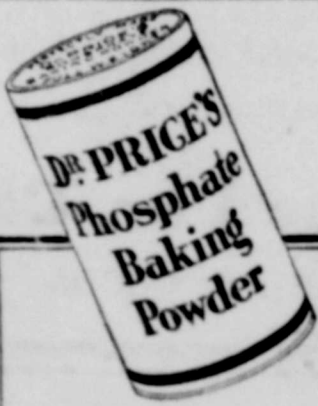

FAMOUS FORTS IN U. S. HISTORY

By ELMO SCOTT WATSON

When the Piutes Rode the War Trail

Life was never dull in Nevada in
the sixties. If there wasn't trouble
among the rough characters of the
silver mining camps, the Piute In-
dians could always be counted upon
to lift a few scalps and burn some
cabins. Early in 1890 they had been
so active that the settlers had to ap-
peal to California for help.

Several hundred volunteers immedi-
ately rode over from the gold camps
to help their silver-mining brethren.
But more important was a force of
150 regulars from Alcatraz island, led
by Capt. Jasper Stewart of the Third
artillery and Capt. E. F. Flint of the
Sixth infantry, which took the field
and formed the nucleus for a force of
800 men that kept after the Indians
until they were brought to bay near
Pyramid lake. There a three-hour
battle was fought on June 3, and the
Indians were defeated.

The soldiers remained in the region
until the middle of July and put in
their time by building Fort Churchill
on the Carson river, 35 miles below
Carson City. This fort was the most
important of several that were built
in the territory and when the Piutes
broke out again in 1892 it was made
military headquarters for the Third
California volunteers, under the com-
mand of Colonel Conners, command-
ant of the military district of Utah
and Nevada. For the next six years
the Piutes kept up a desultory war-
fare and expeditions were constantly
being sent out from Fort Churchill
against them so that it is no over-
statement to say that the settlement
of Nevada might have been delayed
for many years but for this fort.

Fort Churchill is also noted for its
connection with another historic oc-
casion. It was on the route of the
Pony express and one day when
"Pony Bob" Haslam, one of the rid-
ers, arrived at Fort Churchill, the
man who was to carry the pouches
on to the next station was unable to
go. So "Pony Bob" took his place
and this resulted in his famous ride
of 880 miles with scarcely 11 hours
rest from the time he started until
his job of "getting the mail through"
was done, over every mile of which
he was in constant danger of death.

By 1872 the troubles with the Pi-
utes were definitely over, the Pony
express was a thing of the past, the
garrison at Fort Churchill was with-
drawn and its career as the protector
of an infant state was at an end.

CHEVROLET SETS LONG MILEAGE RECORD

A thirteen-year-old Chevrolet has
been driven more than 260,000 miles
by A. R. M. Stone, stationery broker
of 6135 Wagner Avenue, St. Louis,
Mo., who believes his machine is the
oldest Chevrolet still in active service.
The mileage represents more than
10 trips around the world.

Mr. Stone, a former locomotive en-
gineer, purchased the car in 1913,
the first year of Chevrolet produc-
tion. The loss of a leg had incapacit-
ated him for railroad work. In order
to operate both the clutch and brake
pedals with his one foot he connect-
ed them with a cross bar. This enab-
led him to throw out the clutch and
apply the brakes in one operation. He
drives from 60 to 70 miles daily
within a radius of 40 miles of St.
Louis.

Mrs. Stone says he has replaced
the car top and in addition has spent
only \$4 for replacement of parts.
The Chevrolet has averaged 25 miles
per gallon, he says. The car thus far
has burned about 10,400 gallons of
gasoline or approximately the capac-
ity of two railroad tank cars.

FAMOUS FORTS IN U. S. HISTORY

By ELMO SCOTT WATSON

The Fort That Was Built by a "Tenderfoot"

Just when the term "tenderfoot" was first used is unknown. But it is pretty certain that it could have been applied to Nathaniel J. Wyeth of Boston. Back in 1832 he decided that a profitable salmon fishery could be established on the Columbia river in the Pacific northwest, to be operated in connection with the fur trade, enlisted a group of New Englanders in his enterprise and started West.

Not one of the party had ever seen an Indian, handled a rifle nor had the faintest idea of plainscraft. Fortunately for them, at Independence, Mo., they fell in with two veterans of the plains, Capt. William Sublette and Robert Campbell, partners in the Rocky Mountain Fur company, who were bound for the annual trappers' rendezvous at Pierre's Hole far up in Wyoming, and, traveling with them, the easterners learned their first lesson in the frontier's hard school.

Then followed several months of exciting adventure and despite the loss of several men in fights with the fiercest Blackfoot Indians and the desertion of others, Wyeth pushed on with 11 men into the Snake river country and finally in October, 1833, reached Fort Vancouver, the Hudson's Bay company post on the Columbia. Here most of his men deserted him, but undaunted, the leader, accompanied by only two of his followers, started on the back track. After another perilous journey he reached St. Louis in safety and organized the Columbia River Fishing and Trading company.

Then he set out again and in the summer of 1834 built a fort in what is now Idaho on the left bank of the Snake river above the mouth of the Portneuf. It was finished on August 6, 1834, and named Fort Hall in honor of Henry Hall, the oldest partner in the company. He raised over it a "flag made of unbleached sheeting, a little red flannel and a few blue patches, saluted with damaged powder and wet in villainous liquor" and thus the American flag was first unfurled over that part of the West.

In 1836 Wyeth sold Fort Hall to the Hudson's Bay company. In the days of the great migration over the Oregon trail it was an important post, since it marked the place where many emigrants turned off to seek their fortunes in the gold fields of California, and in the '70's it played a leading part in the Bannock and Plute war. But the greatest fame of Fort Hall lies in its early history when it was the living symbol of the indomitable courage of J. Wyeth.

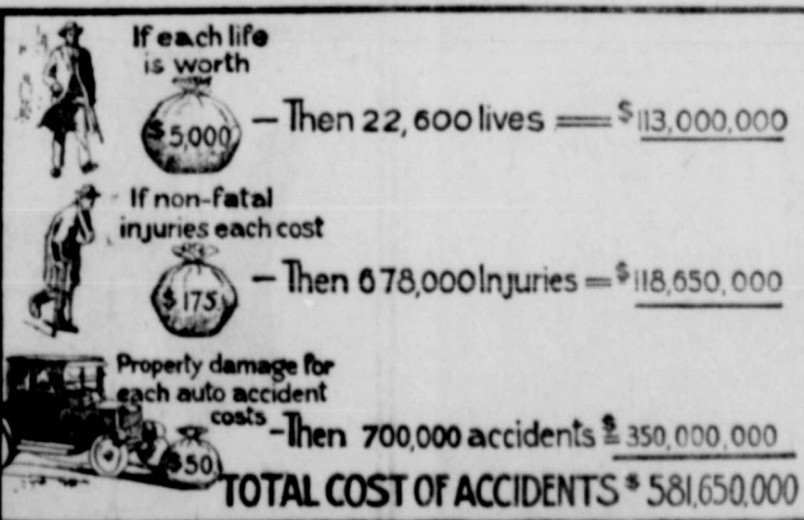

\$600,000,000 a Year Loss Caused by Auto Accidents



CLOSE to \$600,000,000 a year is the annual economic loss due to automobile accidents, both fatal and non-fatal. This appalling sum is only an estimate, as no complete figures on the number of automobile accidents in the United States are available, but it has been conservatively estimated that 22,600 lose their lives each year by automobiles, and \$5,000 a human life is the lowest value put on it by economists.

Of non-fatal accidents 678,000 occur annually, causing average cost of \$175. Then, each accident averages \$50 property damage, insurance records show. This makes the staggering total of \$581,650,000 a year.

No account is taken here, points out the Stewart-Warner Safety Council for the prevention of automobile accidents, of the economic value of time lost by the injured due to delays caused by accidents or to minor property values, such as bent fenders, expense incurred while motor vehicles, particularly the commercial ones, are out of service, due to accidents. Were all these taken into the reckoning, the total figure would surely be doubled, or around \$1,113,750,000.

Some idea of the enormity of this economic loss, most of which is avoidable, can be gained by such relationships as these: It is twice the cash income of the 1923 wheat crop; it is equal to about one-third of the much discussed French debt to this country; and, finally, this loss would buy the entire city of Chicago at its present realty assessment valuation.

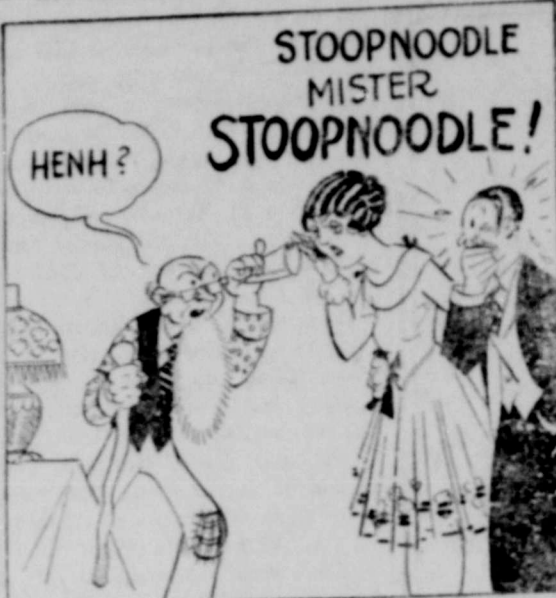

STATE FINANCES

Statement of the State's Finances etc., made by W. Gregory Hatcher, State Treasurer, at the expiration of his first year in office, Treasury Department, Austin, February 5, 1926

Believing that the tax payers of this State are interested, and should have from me, as State Treasurer, a brief report of the conduct of this office during my first year's administration, and sickness having prevented my making this informal report at the beginning of the second year, January 16th, I am now giving out the following statement for publication through the press.

The records of the Treasury Department show that on the 31st day of August 1924 the State of Texas went on deficiency, and at the time I assumed the duties of State Treasurer, there was a deficiency of about \$2,052,006 in the General Revenue Fund. On February 25th following, having received sufficient funds, I issued a call for all outstanding warrants and the State went on a cash basis, and has remained upon a cash basis continuously since that date.

Within a few days after taking office, I transferred about two million dollars of State funds from Austin Reserve Depository Banks, where they were drawing interest at rate

of two per cent per annum to State Depository Banks scattered over the State where they would draw four per cent interest. This was shortly followed by the creation of twenty additional State Depository Banks, and the placing of another half million dollars of State funds at four per cent interest. On March 1st, 1925 funds in Reserve Depository Banks in Austin had reached the sum of \$5,500,000. Immediately afterwards I obtained the passage of a resolution by the Depository Board creating Reserve Depository Banks in the ten "centrally located cities" of Texas with a population of twenty-five thousand, or more inhabitants, and for the first time, State funds were deposited in Reserve Banks outside of the city of Austin.

During July and August, I visited twenty-one counties in the drought area, (at my own expense), and in October obtained the passage of a resolution by the Depository Board allowing me to deposit two-thirds of the funds allotted to State Depository Banks, amounting to over \$2,000,000, with the fourth area banks, the same being secured by a surety bond in double the amount of the deposit. Seeing that the State was going on deficiency, as it had done for four years previously, on October 16th, I wrote to all County Tax Collectors asking their assistance by remitting tax monies as fast as collected. This was followed by a personal visit by me to the larger counties, and I obtained about \$200,000, which kept the State off of deficiency for two weeks.

I visited the Reserve Depository Banks in my home town, Dallas, and they agreed to let me have a million dollars to keep the State off of deficiency. Austin Banks then voted to advance a half million. Reserve Depository Banks in other Reserve cities offered their assistance.

On November 1st, the Banks of Austin advanced \$500,000. On December 1st, Dallas and Austin banks advanced \$750,000, and on January 1st, Dallas and Austin Banks advanced \$1,500,000, and Fort Worth and San Antonio Banks shortly afterwards advanced \$500,000, making a total of about \$2,000,000, carried by the banks of these four cities, and

for which they received no interest. On January 30th, I repaid the Austin banks, and made partial payment to the Dallas Banks, I am now owing about \$750,000, which will be paid during the next ten days if sufficient funds are received during that time.

Credit for keeping the State off of deficiency should be given to the Reserve Depository Banks above named. It was their assistance, and splendid co-operation which enabled your State Treasurer to keep the State on a cash basis. This will be quickly shown by referring to the State Comptroller's reports which showed that on November 1st, there was only \$7,841 in General Revenue, and that warrants to the amount of \$2,007,619 were outstanding and unpaid; that on December 1st there was only \$35,080 in General Revenue, and that outstanding warrants amounted to \$2,171,996, that on January 1st, 1926 there was only \$75,729 in General Revenue, and that warrants to the amount of \$3,226,064 were outstanding and unpaid.

I now have deposited with State Depository Banks about three million dollars drawing four per cent interest, and with Reserve Depository Banks in nine Reserve cities about \$6,000,000. Nearly all of the Reserve Depository Banks are now paying two and one-fourth, and two and one-half per cent interest, instead of two per cent, the amount previously paid by them for reserve funds.

A friendly mandamus suit was filed by the Attorney General in the Supreme Court to determine whether the Oil Royalty monies received from University Oil Lands, should be deposited in the Available Building Fund for the University of Texas, as provided in an act passed by the 39th Legislature, or to the Permanent Fund. This case was submitted on January 7th, and the decision of the Court is awaited to govern the deposit of this fund. In the meantime, the State Treasurer has this money now amounting to \$2,063,150, deposited with Depository Banks drawing interest at the rate of about three and one-half per cent per annum.

Every warrant presented to the State Treasurer since the State went on a cash basis, February, 1925, has

been paid, either by him or by the banks with whom he arranged for payment and no employee, individual or corporation has ever had to discount a warrant.

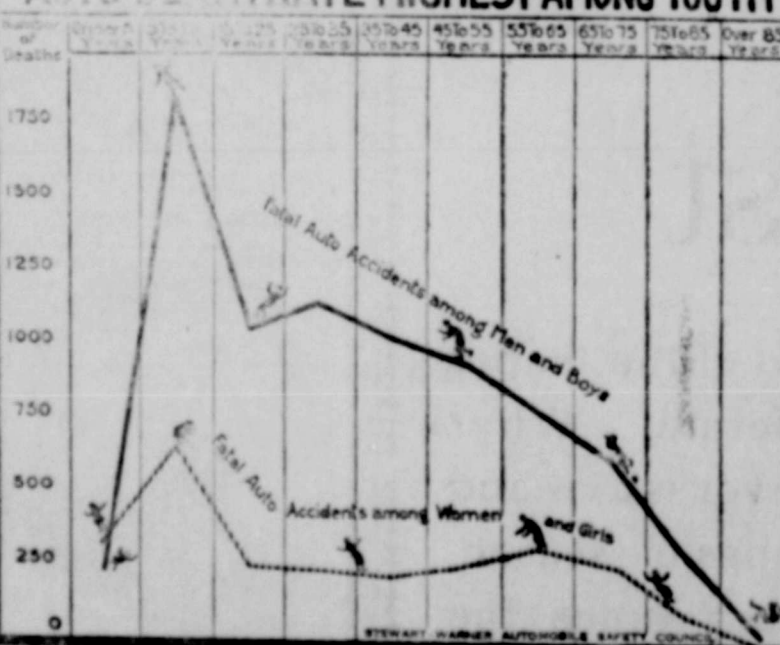

Youth of Nation Tops Death List in U. S. Auto Fatalities

AUTO DEATH RATE HIGHEST AMONG YOUTH



YOUTH pays the heaviest toll in annual automobile fatalities. From five to fifteen years is the period when the greatest number of fatal accidents occur, for both sexes. The chart shows the age distribution of automobile deaths for men and women as given in the latest mortality figures prepared by the government. These figures, says the Stewart-Warner Safety Council for the prevention of automobile accidents, emphasize the need for more playgrounds and increased safety education among school children.

Complete statistics are not possible, as only 85 per cent of the United States keeps mortality records. About 22,000 a year is generally conceded to be the annual number of automobile fatalities. For 8,621 males known to have been killed in one year there were only a third as many women, or 2,845, in spite of the fact that the male population is only 4 per cent greater than the female.
