WP & RB'S Latest That Effects You Read 'n Remember

Registration "point" rationing begins Wednesday, and continues thru Saturday. Consumers must file Consumer Declarations to get War Ration Book No. 2, and have the "Declaration" ready before you go to register.

Here's what to do. County cans, bottles and jars, 8 ounces or over of fruits and vegetables on hand Sat. Feb. 20. Includes canned fruits, vegetables (including spices) fruit and vegetable juices, soups, chili sauce and catsup. Take from total, 5 cans for each member of family. The new total must be reported on "Declaration". If there are no more than 5, then report "None".

Don't count these. Canned olives, meats and fish, pickles, relish, and jams, jellies, preserves, spaghetti, macaroni, noodles, home canned foods, if not for sale. Coffee on hand Nov. 28, '42, must be declared, minus 1 pound for each person whose age stated on Book 1 is 14 or over.

We "Polled" The Camps & Tents In 3 Mile Radius

The News poll of house cars and tents, in Gatesville and within a 3 mile radius was completed late Sunday afternoon.

Our "statistical department", 3 women and 2 young men, found the following results.

Trailers in Gatesville, 199. Outside the city limits 273. Tents in Gatesville, 55, outside city limits 140.

This makes a total of 667 dwelling units in a 3 mile radius of the courthouse, but does not include the houses moved off Camp Hood reservation, garage apartments, or any other kind of living quarters, including rooms, apartments, hotels, light-housekeeping rooms, cot houses or anything else.

With these figures, and figuring the national average of 4.3 persons to the family, this would give Gatesville and vicinity, in tents and trailer houses alone, a population of 2,868, and add this to our '40 count of 3,175 would make the population 6,043, and that don't include "plenty more" in nearly everybody's home or rent property. This burg must be in the 10,000 class, anyway. Maybe more. Folks, that's people!

Chamber Commerce To Make Survey Of Population

With the assistance of the Morris Federation, the Woman's Forum and the U. S. Army authorities, the Gatesville Chamber of Commerce will make a population count of Gatesville this week.

At the school there will be a table where "service" (Army people) will be asked to register, and at another table, another group will register construction workers and "natives".

The Woman's Forum will be at the tables with six ladies Thursday and the Morris Federation will be detailed from Camp Hood to assist in this registration.

Tables will be placed at the entrance of the school, so all can register as they go to get the War Ration Book No. 2.

At the completion of the survey, the Chamber of Commerce will compile the statistics and furnish these figures to government agencies in an effort to get better consideration for Gatesville and vicinity in the rationing and other "controls" which are now in effect. It will also be used to correct, if possible, the housing situation here.

Take Book 1 of all persons listed to the registrar's when applying for Book 2. No Book can be issued unless Book 1 is presented at the place of registration for "tailoring".

MORE TIRE NEWS

Rationing of Grade F camelback is discontinued, and this will permit any person, including operators of light trucks to have his own tires recapped with passenger type camelback without local board authorization. This will be about March 1.

OPA has cautioned, no relaxation of eligibility for tires or gasoline will be permitted.

The '43 home canning program will be ready some time in March, but the CCWP&RB may accept applications and authorize sugar in reasonable amounts where the conservation of early strawberries requires prompt action. Who's got strawberries in this county? If so, use Form R-135.

DAIRIES GET A BREAK! GET INCREASE IN MILK PRICES HERE

Ceiling price of sweet milk in Gatesville was increased from 12 to 14 cents per quart retail under an order issued by the regional OPA office in Dallas, February 10, it has been announced.

Placed in Class 3, Zone 2, in a region-wide ceiling price revision order, the city of Gatesville has been reclassified and placed in Class 1, Zone 2.

The following new ceiling prices are now in effect: Wholesale, gallon, 48, half gallon, 25, quart 12½, pint 6¼, 1/3 qt. 4-1/3, ½ pint, 3½.

Retail: Gallon 52, ½ gallon 27, quart 14, pint 7.

NAZIS CAPTURE PASS

N. Africa, Feb. 21 (PA).—German Armored columns have captured Kasserine Pass in Central Tunisia, smashing thru green American troops, and have plunged thru that key gateway into the battered Allied front along the Algerian border, it was announced Sunday.

LARGEST U. S. SUB GONE

Washington, Feb. 21 (AP).—The sub Argonaut, largest in the American Navy and possibly the largest in the world, is presumed to be lost on patrol operations, the navy announced Sunday.

REDS IN DNIEPER BASIN

Moscow, Feb. 21 (AP).—Russian armies in the Dnieper River Basin stormed to within 34 miles of Dnieperopetrovsk and Poltava Sunday, entering on a wide front the provinces of which those cities are capitals.

GHANDI'S LIFE IN DANGER

New Delhi, Feb. 21 (AP).—Mohandas K. Ghandi's condition

grew increasingly grave Sunday as the Indian nationalist leader completed the 12th day of his 21 day hunger strike and the government issued a bulletin saying that "If the fast is not ended without delay it may be too late to save his life".

BOMBERS RAID CRETE

Cairo, Feb. 21 (AP).—American Liberators blasted the Italian ports of Naples and Crotone in daylight Saturday, Allied communiques disclosed Sunday, while other bombers of the 9th United States Air Force attacked Axis airdromes in Crete Saturday night for the second time in 24 hours.

STALIN SPEAKS

London, Feb. 21 (AP).—Britain and Russia are agreed on the broad principles of collaboration for peace as well as on the utter destruction of the Axis, Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden said Sunday in a speech commemorating the 25th anniversary of the founding of the Red Army.

CHINKS STOP JAPS AT SALWEEN

Chungking, Feb. 21 (AP).—Jap forces trying to extend their grip along the Burma Road in western Yunnan Province attempted to cross the Salween River Saturday for the 3rd straight day and again were driven back, the Chinese high command reported Sunday.

WHEAT CONTROLS TO BE EASED

Washington, Feb. 21 (AP).—With the food situation growing tighter the government is expected soon to abandon its rigid control program on wheat, including a 60 cent a bushel penalty on excess sales, and allow some expansion in production. They are waking up.

SERVICEMEN'S DEPENDENTS COST

Washington, Feb. 21 (AP).—When John Doe kisses his wife and 2 children good-bye and marches off to war, the government must set aside \$100 a month to pay John and his family.

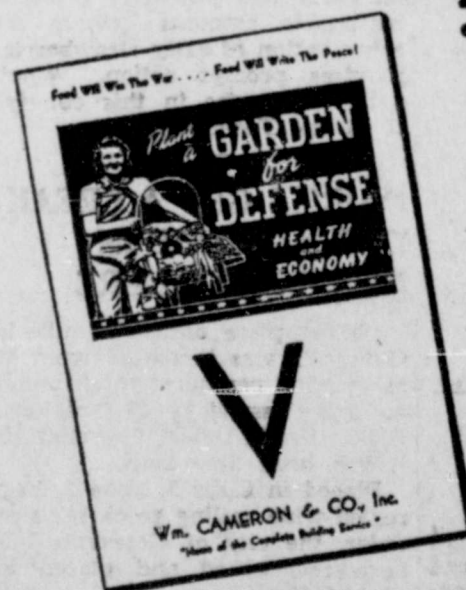

That nite the show worked and moved on: "You'll meet some good folks, Kid, real good folks, folks who've had a chance to go bad and are good, are real good."

Say maybe the old guy knew something even if he was nuts about most things. Aw nuts, come on Kid, are you goin' soft; you ain't cryin', that dust blows in a fellow's eyes, sure the old guy was nuts, your tough Kid, yeah, tough, we gotta tell these yokels about Hilda, they know from nothing. Wonder how the girls are in the next town, boy the last one sure was a red one, a pushover, I'll say.

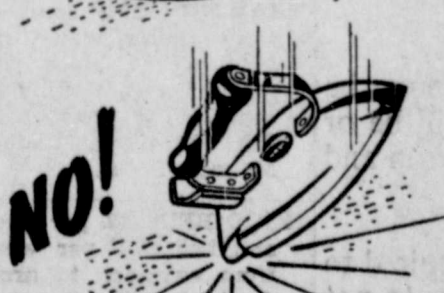
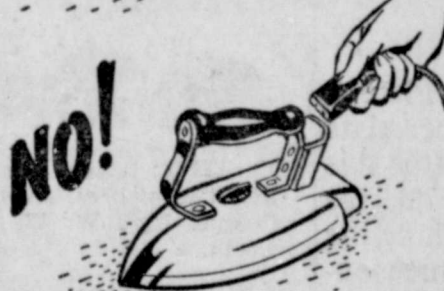

THREE "Don'ts"

THAT WILL MAKE YOUR
IRON LAST LONGER

DON'T use your iron if handle is rickety.

The constant wiggling of a loose handle causes plug to rock back and forth on rigid terminals in iron socket. This in turn produces arcing or flashing of electric current inside the plug, which burns and pits the terminals, resulting in poor electrical contact and slow or irregular heating, or perhaps no heat at all. Always have your iron handle tightened at the first sign of looseness.

DON'T pull plug from iron socket while cord is connected to outlet.

Each time you do so, the electricity arcs or flashes when connection is broken, gradually burning and pitting the terminals and eventually resulting in unsatisfactory operation of iron due to damaged electrical contacts. Always disconnect cord at wall outlet. If your iron is automatic, use thermostat to regulate heat instead of pulling plug.

DON'T drop your iron. Of course, you wouldn't

do this intentionally, but use every precaution against it. Dropping your iron may break inside connections or damage the thermostat. More irons are put out of commission by being dropped than by any other single cause. Always set iron firmly on a stand or its heel rest... never on a sloping or slippery place.

OTHER TIPS on Iron Care: Avoid ironing over buttons, hooks, zippers and other hard articles that might scratch sole plate.... Keep bottom of iron clean by wiping with damp cloth when cool or by using mild abrasive or fine steel wool if necessary... Never immerse iron in water.... To remove starch, sprinkle a little salt on waxed paper and run warm iron over it.... Never wrap cord around hot iron.... Always let iron cool before putting it away.

The ordinary man on the street would say that the Internal Revenue Department can easily discover any excess profit from any war contract. Certainly we can use the manpower that would be wasted to much better advantage in other places.

We, the people, want Congress to adopt the most direct, efficient and economical method of doing this job. None of us believes in excess profits on war contracts. There are ceiling prices on most things we produce. Now let's get at the job of cutting down unnecessary civic expenditures and cutting unnecessary payrollers off the payroll.
