The manufacturers decided it was caused by something in the set that permanently burned an image or lettering on the picture tube.

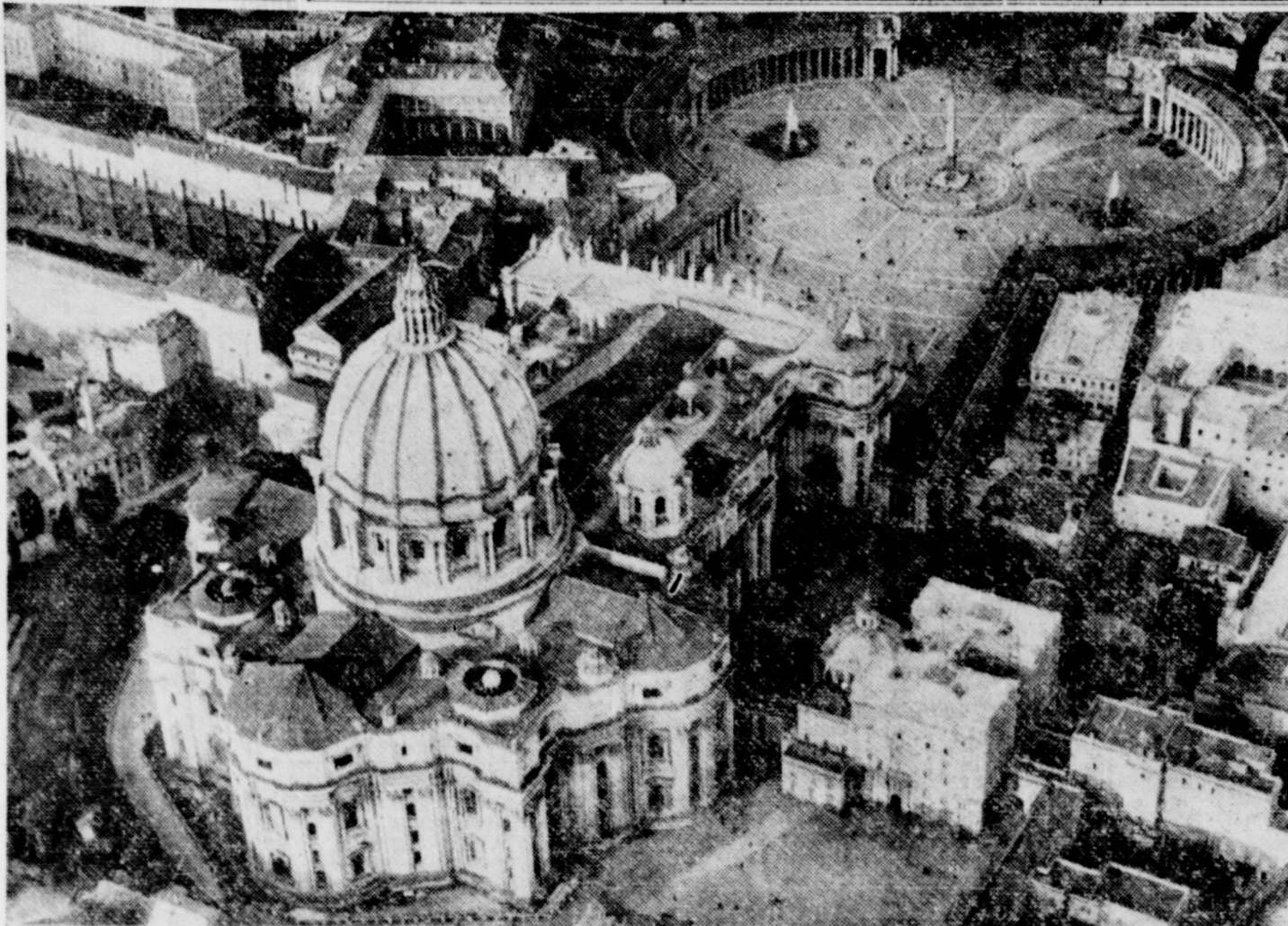

FHA GIVEN AUTHORITY TO MAKE DISASTER LOANS TO FARMERS

Authority to make Economic Disaster Loans in all counties of Texas has been received by L. J. Cappelman, state director of the Farmers Home Administration, it was reported this week by George I. Lane, County Supervisor at Eastland.

The effect of the designation, Mr. Cappelman explained, is to continue making of production disaster loans throughout the state in 1954 and to authorize the making, for the first time, economic disaster loans.

Mr. Cappelman explained that there was a difference in economic disaster loans, and aid in the case of production loss. The farmer who has suffered crop losses because of drought, floods, insects or other natural causes is eligible for a production disaster loan if he is unable to obtain operating funds elsewhere. If the farmer is a sufferer from the effects of insufficient income and excessive operating costs he is eligible for an economic disaster loan if unable to get needed credit from local sources.

Production loans were first made in Texas in 1949, following the disastrous freeze in the Rio Grande Valley, and the tropical hurricane which swept the rice area in October of that year. Later, the loan authority was extended to the entire state because of drought, insect infestation and adverse weather conditions. In announcing the new loan, Cappelman said that the \$11,350,000 fund allotted Texas for crop production loans is now

practically exhausted, although \$3,000,000 was added in the closing days of November.

He pointed out in addition to the disaster and economic type loans that funds are available in the form of special livestock loans to established ranchmen to carry on their operations. Funds of this type already advanced to ranchers total \$7,800,000, he said. Ranchers, in addition to borrowing for operating expenses, may obtain funds to restock their ranches and replace herds depleted by effects of the drought.

Special livestock loans provide emergency credit at five percent to ranch operators who are unable temporarily to obtain from recognized lenders the credit needed to continue their operations and have reasonable prospects of working out of their difficulties.

Applicants certify in writing the extent of damage they suffer and the fact that they cannot obtain needed credit from other sources. Their eligibility is determined in all cases by a county committee familiar with the conduct of farming and livestock operations.

Production loans are approved for a wide variety of purposes such as purchase of feed, seed, and fertilizer, or to meet other essential operating expenses.

Special livestock, disaster and economic loans are scheduled for repayment over the minimum period consistent with the borrower's ability to pay. They are secured for the full amount. Those secured by liens on cattle or other livestock are scheduled to be repaid as determined by the borrower's ability to pay, in no event longer than three years. Credit extended for crop production purposes or for feed ordinarily is scheduled for repayment when the income is to be received from sale of crops or livestock products produced with the aid of the loan. Funds are available and applications may be secured at the office of George I. Lane, county supervisor, Petroleum Building, Eastland.

MAYOR EXPLAINS OPERATION OF CITY IN ROTARY CLUB SPEECH

Mayor G. C. Rosenthal told Rotarians at their meeting Thursday that Cisco's present form of city government was adopted by charter on July 7, 1919, and that it was what is known as a Home Ruled City.

He described a home ruled city as one with a population of over 5,000, given certain powers and immunities by Section 4, Chapter 147, Acts of the 33rd Legislature. He explained that under the home rule type of government the official family was the mayor and five commissioners, the only elective offices of the city. He explained the manner in which they were elected and the duties of the various offices.

He told of many of the problems faced by the mayor and the commission and of the many requests they received. He said that all the records were available to the citizenry and that commission meetings were open to the public.

He told of the police department, the water and sanitation department, the fire department, of their duties and their personnel.

Mayor Rosenthal told Rotarians that the present indebtedness of Cisco was \$475,500 with \$135,450 payable from tax receipts and \$341,150 payable on revenue from the water department. He said that the monthly payments amounted to \$1,700. He said that the bonds were issued in 1942, and that payments were comfortably ahead of schedule. At the present rate of payment, he said, the indebtedness will be retired in about 20 years, eight years before maturity.

He explained the recent raise in rates given the Telephone Company and told of the plans for expansion by the company. He also explained the plan for the election on the proposal for consolidating the two gas companies.

He said that the purpose of the city officials was to act for the majority of the citizens, and not for the minority, and issued a plea for cooperation in an effort to make Cisco grow.

Mayor Rosenthal explained the city's part in the support of the Chamber of Commerce, the library and the high school band.

The program was a classification talk with Rotarian Rosenthal as chairman for the day.

Visitors at the meeting were Rotarians Bill Stevens, Ed Stewart, C. G. Williams and O. D. Dillingham of Abilene. Other visitors were Bill Knowles of Abilene and Ed Routh of Fort Worth.

Service Station Operator Found Dead In His Car

Nutlie C. Buchanan, 67 year old service station operator who had lived in Cisco for some five years, was found dead in the rear seat of his automobile in the enclosed wash rack of his service station at Avenue N and West 8th early Wednesday. He had apparently been dead for several hours.

He was found by his wife at 7:40 a. m. Wednesday when she went to the station to see about him. His body was across the rear seat and he was pronounced dead by the doctor called to the scene by Justice Of The Peace Henry Curtis. It was estimated that he had died near midnight.

He had played dominoes at a local domino hall with friends until about 10:30 p. m. and the friends reported that he seemed cheerful and in good health when he left.

Justice Of The Peace Curtis was continuing his investigation Wednesday and had not returned a verdict at noon.

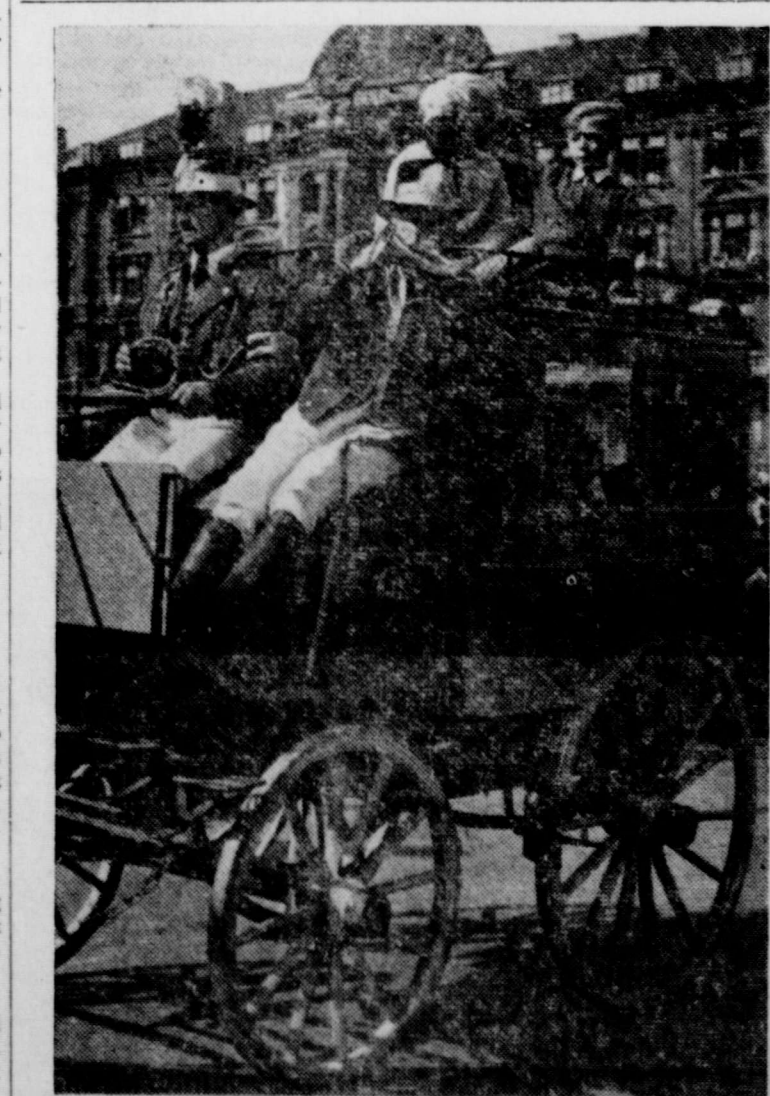

Several Wildcats Tests Are Planned

The third oil test in the Mangum area, seven miles southeast of Cisco, was nearing the production horizon today, according to a survey of oil development activities. The well is the Chark P. Chandler et al, San Angelo, No. 1-C Ethel Hittson Coats.

The test was drilling at 3,200 feet and expected to top the Ranger sand at about 3,300 feet. Location is 1,178 feet from the west and 2,330 feet from the north lines of Section 9, Block 3, H&TC Survey.

Results of an official potential test for the second Mangum well — the No. 2 Ethel Hittson Coats — was announced by the Chandler company. The well gauged 103 barrels of 43 gravity oil for a calculated daily potential of 309 barrels during an 8-hour flowing test.

Flow was through a 20/63-inch choke with packer set on the casing and 175 pounds tubing pressure from 36 perforations at 3,321-30 feet. Total depth was 3,375 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 1,150 to 1.

The well is located 1,375 feet east of the Chandler No. 1 Coats, in Section 9, Block 3, H&TC Survey. Potential test has not been run on the Chandler No. 1 Coats due to strong gas pressure, according to reports here. The pool has been called a Ranger Conglomerate discovery.

The Chandler concern has announced a new wildcat test as their No. 1 J. W. Gage, a 4,000 foot project planned six miles southwest of Carbon, 330 feet from the south and east lines of the C. H. O'Bryant Survey.

The firm has two other locations staked in the Mangum area. Elsewhere, possibilities of an oil strike in the Nimrod area appeared good after the Gray Drilling Co. No. 1 Anderson Bros. and McCrea was reported to have run pipe. Pipe was cemented Tuesday afternoon in the wildcat test to about 3,250 feet. It was reported that oil and gas shows were logged in both the Caddo lime and in the Marble Falls formations. The test is some 15 miles southwest of Cisco in the northwest quarter of Section 115, Block 3, H&TC Survey.

The Seth Beach No. 1 McCracken, a 3,950-foot wildcat seven miles south of Cisco, was drilling at 2,300 feet late Tuesday. The location is near the Christ Lutheran Church in Section 72, Block 3, H&TC Survey.

In the Rising Star area, Jack Hailey, Cisco, has completed his No. 5 R. A. Sone in Section 40, Block 2, ETRR Survey, with a daily potential of 40 barrels. The well was pumping from open hole at 1,146-50 feet. The pay section was topped at 1,070 feet.

The Roger Oil Co., Cisco, has staked location for their No. 1 G. A. Dunn as a 1,995-foot project three miles northwest of Rising Star. Location is 2,490 feet from the north and 1,302 feet from the west lines of Section 39, Block 2, ETRR Survey.

CcClung and West, Cisco, have filed an amended location to drill their No. 1 O. P. Weiser, a shallow wildcat test four miles southwest of Cisco. The new site is 1,152 feet from the south and 2,070 feet from the east lines of Section 64, Block 3, H&TC Survey. Proposed depth is 1,200 feet with cable tools.

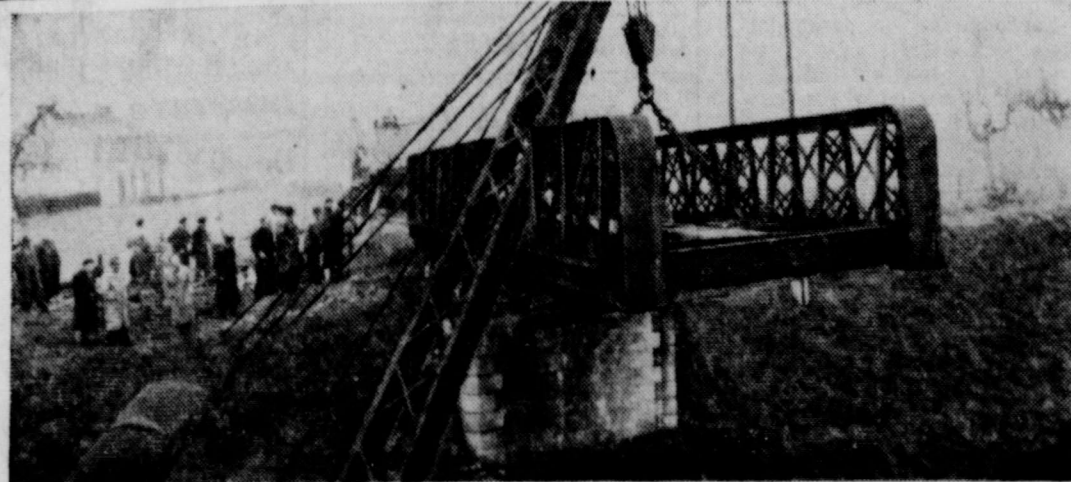
Frank Diller, Abilene, has announced location for his No. 3 Reynolds Estate six miles northeast of Carbon in the regular field there. The project will go to 1,250 feet in the northeast quarter of Section 23, Block 1, H&TC Survey.

Four miles south of Eastland in the Hoffman Field, O. E. Harvey et al of Vernon will drill their No. 1 Fannie Hall, a 1,300 foot project in Section 26, Block 2, H&TC Survey.

AUSTIN. — Prospective liberal and conservative candidates were teaming up the race for governor this week on the heels of a declaration by Attorney General John Ben Shepperd that he is out of the running.

John C. White, 29-year-old agriculture commissioner, had his hat ready for tossing by saying that many people had asked him to run for governor and that he was giving the matter "serious thought."

"I will offer my services where I believe I can do the most good for all the people of Texas," he asserted.

As an outspoken critic of the Republican administration and the state's cross-filing election

system, White is considered a party liberal. He also has criticized the Legislature for failure to increase teachers' pay and pass effective water laws.

Another liberal prospect for the race, Ralph Yarbrough of Austin, took a crack at the state investigation of Communists.

He charged that the probe of and conservative factions of the alleged Communist infiltration of some labor unions was politically inspired. Yarbrough ran against Governor Allan Shivers last year.

In eliminating himself from the race, Shepperd declared:

"The term politics has been rather loosely charged in connection with the investigation of these Communist front organizations and I am taking the term politics out of it."

Subsequent to this surprise announcement, Speaker of the House Reuben Senterfitt said that mail backing him for governor had sharply increased.

Senterfitt, San Saba lawyer and Speaker for two terms, is the only one who has definitely stated that he intends to seek the governorship.

Political observers have speculated that if his campaign catches on, Governor Shivers will not run for a third term.

Young Democrats of Texas tried to iron out their differences. There were two groups involved, representing the liberal and conservative factions of the party.

Representatives of both were denied seats at the recent national convention of the organization at St. Paul.

Since that time, a committee with members from the rival camps has been shaped, and a meeting was held Tuesday in Austin to try for harmony and national party recognition.

Mrs. Hilda Weinert of Seguin, Democratic national committee-woman, and Wallace Savage of Dallas, state executive committeeman, named the Young Demo group, which has Representative Joe Kilgore of Edinburg as chair-

man. Arrangements were to be made for a state convention in February.

Republicans of Texas, who must hold a primary election in 1954 for the first time in 20 years, are expected to cross-file conservative Democrats where they are available.

Cross-filing means the listing of a candidate's name under both the Democratic and Republican columns on the ballot.

Carlos Watson of Brownsville, attorney for the Republican State Executive Committee, told a meeting of that group that the party must hold a primary next year because their candidate for governor polled more than 200,000 votes in the last election.

Their candidate was Allan Shivers (cross-filed), who had 488,319 votes on the Republican ticket and 1,375,547 on the Democratic ticket.

Laws "with teeth in them" to prevent Communist influence of Texas labor unions will be drawn up by a legal advisory committee of three.

That was the outcome of the Texas Industrial Commission's investigation into communistic aspects of three national labor unions trying to enter the state.

Committee members are Martin Harris, Austin attorney named by Everett L. Looney, president of the state bar; N. D. Wells Jr. of Dallas, named by the Texas Federation of Labor; and Attorney General John Ben Shepperd.

Following its hearing, the commission issued a statement that the attempt of three unions under communist influence or domination shows a "clear and present danger" to Texas.

Present laws of the state, the commission found, are inadequate to cope with the infiltration of subversive elements.

Specifically under study were the Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers, the International Fur and Leather Workers, and the Distributive, Processing, and Office Workers of America.

Members of the commission were Chairman C. E. Fulgham of

Lubbock, Walter Buckner of San Marcos, L. E. Page of Carthage, E. G. Rodman Sr. of Odessa and William J. Harris of Dallas.

Anything wrong in advertising spectacles for sale?

Yes, says the State Board of Examiners in Optometry. The board plans to limit such advertising to the listing of the names and addresses of optometry shops.

No, said the Legislature, which at its last session refused to pass a bill limiting optometry advertising.

No, says Representative Paul I. Hill of Smith County, who says that a lawsuit will probably result if the board's ruling goes into effect. Hill says that as a member of the Legislature he voted against the measure because "it was an attempt to stifle legitimate business."

Some other opinion: State Senator Warren McDonald of Tyler "can't see any harm in advertising glasses." Representative Bill Wood of Smith and Gregg Counties thinks the attorney general should be asked for an opinion and the optometry board should be guided by it.

Chairman E. H. Thornton of the Texas Highway Commission re-stated an old state problem at a convention of the County Judges and Commissioners Association in Dallas.

More roads are a primary need, said Thornton, and that means more money. The chairman added:

"We must have an increase in income at the state level if the people of Texas are to continue to enjoy an adequate system of roads."

Congressman Lloyd M. Bentsen Jr. of McAllen, speaking at the same meeting, suggested a solution: That the entire collection of federal gasoline taxes be turned over to the states to finance local road building.

That would suit Texas. We pay the federal government a lot more in gasoline taxes than we get back in terms of federal aid for roads.

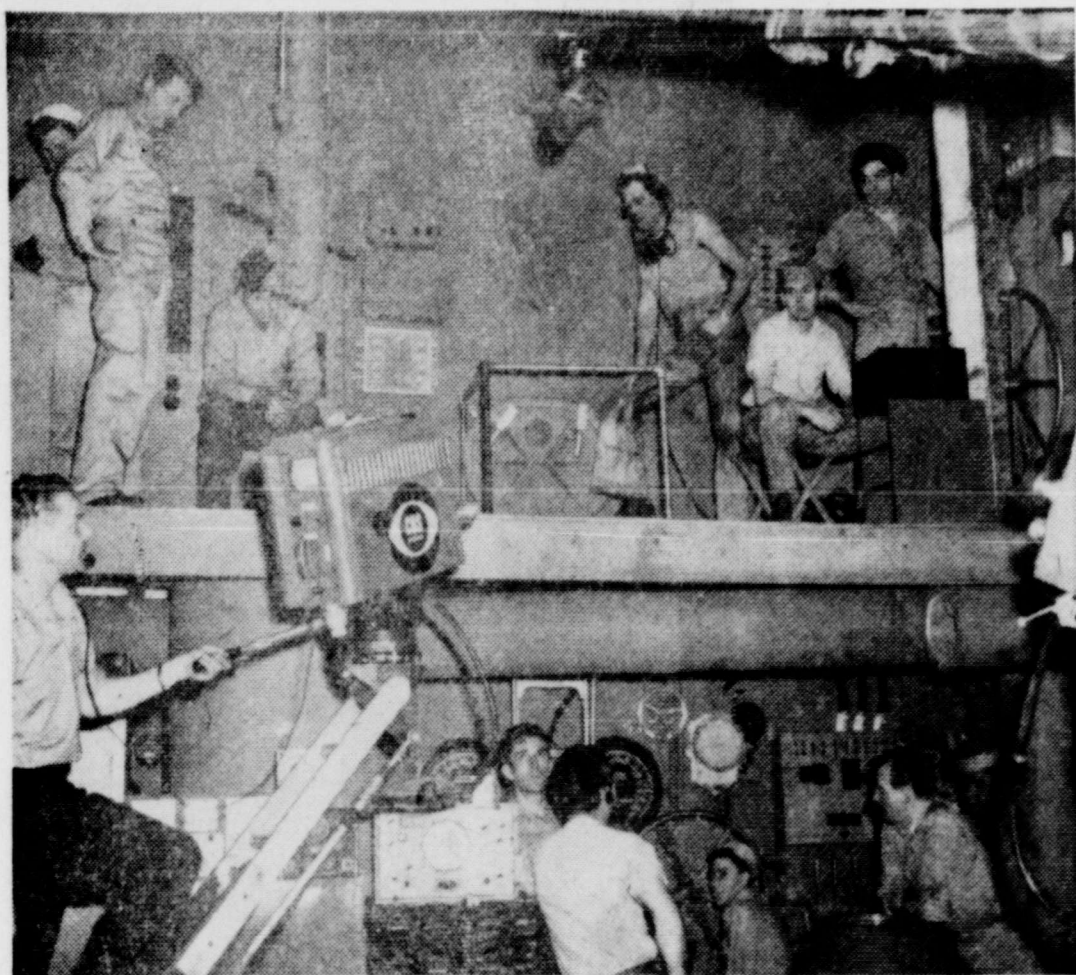
Approximately forty members attended.

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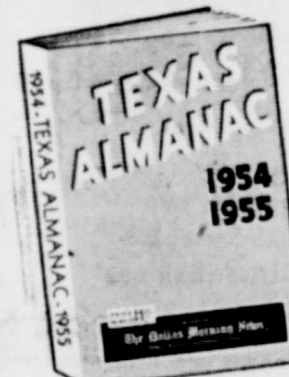
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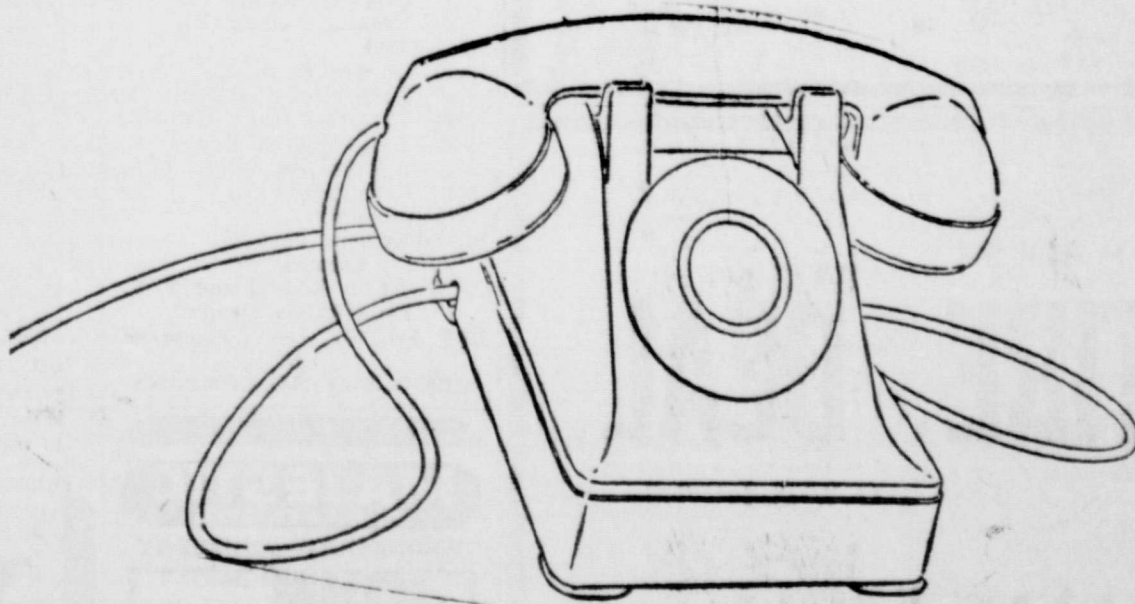
